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LIMOTOR Progress Report Jaruary	- July 1963

BACKGHOUND

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1. On 3 January 1963 Quinton N. OUSLER turned-over the responsibilities of inside Station control of the LINDTOR Project to Marvin A. CABOT during a meeting held with the outside Staff Agent for the LINDTOR Project, Seymour D. TRUBNICH. What follows is the first in a series of Progress Reports which it is hoped will not only serve to keep Headquarters advised of just what is going on in the LINDTOR Project but will also serve to apprise Headquarters in greater detail of the performance of the LINDTOR Staff Agent on the outside under student cover. During the period under review TRINNICH's replacement, Natalie S. MICHNOFF arrived to take over the outside responsibilities for LINDTOR. In the future regular Progress Reports on LINDTOR will be submitted on a quarterly basis.

METINGS

2. During the period under review 32 meetings ware held with Seymour D. THINNICH by Marvin A. CABOT. Two of these meetings were in CABOT's home under the cover of darkness. The remainder were

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at four selected meeting: sites on the streets of the metropolitan area. They have code names and were chosen to allow for maximum check of possible counter-surveillance (use of one-way streats, etc.). CADT turges TRINNICH at the predetermined site at a predetermined time and ultimately picks-up TPINNICH in his QP wendels. These meetings are then held in CABOT's car. The special emergency meeting: sites have been selected but never used; one is close to TRINNICH's residence, and the other close to the UNAM.

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3. As can be seen from the number of spetings held in a seven month period, they were usually held once a week. TRUNICH's meetings with the other LINDTOR assets were so arrenged to allow for a minimum passage of time between the field agents meetings and the meeting with CASOT. The TRUNUCH-CAUOT meetings usually last, on the average, two hours. Specific requirements were passed and administrative matters were attended to. Usually TRUNICH reviewed with CASOT each report received from the LINOTOR agents and immediate guidance is given where possible. Since these meetings were TRUNICH's only contact with the Station, deliberate efforts were when to keep him abreast of general Station developments as well as KDAARK developments. This has proven to be a distinct advantage from the standpoint of the outside Staffor's morale, making him feel such more part of the Station and what it is trying to accomplish.

4. TRINVICH is turn had prodesignated meeting sites for LINOTOP's 14, 19, and 22, similar to those cited in paragraph 2 above, and picked up his agents in his GP whiche. Effective 7 March TRINVICH began preparation of contact reports with each of his agents. In turn LINOTOR-14 was instructed to prepare a short report on each of his meetings with LIEPBROIL-2.

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5. Since January 1963, the Station has attempted, through its regular contact with Seymour D. TRINNICH, to pain Arther insight into just what poes on at the UNAM which is of interest to the Station, and at the same time to examine the LINCTOR assets and their expabilities in terms of the UNAM. The LINCTOR project is, as stated in the Project Renewal, an important Station "eyes and ears" mechanism at the UNAM. Eased on a look at LINCTOR for the period under review the Station notes the following:

a. While the Project is producing it has received little in the way of guidance from the Station or Headquarters on information which it should collect. A reexamination of access was also necessary.

b. There was : insufficient coordination with Station HUCAGE estivities at the URAM.

e. While it did produce, little of the product was considered of value for formal dissemination.

Car , Mag and Car , Mag and Car , Mag and Car , Char and d. There was little or no play-back into the LINDTOR Project. That is to say that while the Project itself, primarily in the person of TRINDUCH displayed initiative and generated activity, it often ended just at that point. This contributed to low sorabe, particularly as it concerned TRINDUCH.

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6. At the beginning of the period under review, the LIMCTOR stable consisted of the following assets:

LIPUTOR-14 (who maintained contact with LIFURNOIL-2 and LIKAYAK-6; the latter served as a contact to LITUROIL's 3 and 4)

LIMOTOR-19

LINCTOP-22

At an early stage in the TRINTICH-CADOT relationship, i.e., at the 24 January moting, steps were initiated via LENCTOR-14 to accomplish the termination of LIXAYAK-6 and LIEPEDFOIL's 3 and 4 for lack of production. This was finally completed effective the end of Harch 1963. Although a bid for drop or termination pay was made, it was rejected. In order to provide LIXAYAK-6 with a means of contact would acrething of importance develop in the future, LEPTOR-14 was instructed to acquire a Post Office Box, which he did. It was taken out in the alias used by LINOTOR-14 with LINAYAK-6 (Pedro MORAW) and also the alias used by LINOTOR-14 with LINAYAK-6 (Purp de la Torre) as an emergency means of contact (using a telegram).

7. As a matter of operational background, Seymour D. TRINNICH was known to LIMOTOR's 14, 19, and 22 under his true name. They also knew his home telephone number which was used for communications from them to him. LIMOTOR-14 was unaware of the existence of LIMOTOR's 19 and 22. He knew OFFLER under his true miciname. Although LIMOTOR's 19 and 22 knew each other slightly socially, they were unaware of each others clandestime relationship with TRIENICH. LIMOTOR-19 knew Phineas P. SLINNARD through their elose cooperation on the BECHICK/FEXMAVE operation (under true mame). LIMOTOR-19 also knew OUSLER under true first name.

5. With paragraph 7 in wind, there follows a brief reasons of each of the LIMOTOR agents:

A. LIEPERCIL-2. For the current period this agent has been a key writer for one of the leading UKAM student newspapers, <u>Revolucionario</u>. He is well-versed in UKAM student affairs and has a wide range of contacts with student leaders. He and the newspaper were of particular interest to us, particularly because the latter was considered one of the biggest at UKAM but because it was also financed by the private secretary to LITENSOM in the mans of LITENSOM's office. However by August Revolucionario was in bad financial straits, victim of experiment of funds, and virtually extinct. Through LINCTON-14 we have attempted to exploit LIEMPROFIL-2's other connections. We have tried to raise the level and desirability of his reporting. LIEMPROFIL-2 does

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not know LIMOTOR-14 by his true name, nor does he know that LIMOTOR-14 represents OCTORE or PEPRIMP. We have tried to impress on LIENBROIL-2's wind that he is working for a "group of Mexican businessmen interested in knowing what is going on at the UNAM". This agent is paid 1,500 peace monthly.

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B. LIMOTOR-14. With the termination of LIKAYAK-6 and LIEMENOIL's 3 and 4, this agent's responsibilities consisted of meeting LIEMENOIL-2 and thereafter to translate his reports. This we feel is not sufficient work for this agent whom we feel is a valuable long-renge asset, and capable. We have been atterpting to interest him in becoming a safe-house keeper in addition to him regular duties. We is also paid 1,500 percess monthly. He has taken on additional responsibilities at him present place of employment, but as a target it is presently completely uninteresting to us. Should LINTIOR ever moquire additional non-FUPRINE assets, this agent would be the handler. He is a Merican citizen.

C. LIMCTOR-19. This agent continues to concentrate on possible leads to present or future menters of the Maxican equivalent of OLACID (see Project Romewal, VI. PLANS, B). Also during the period under review she did yeomen service in the BECHICK/REKNAVE case (see also paragraph 3d (2) of HPMA-22370, dated 24 October 1953). In the first category she has already completed preliminary write-ups on ton of the 29 students of the school in question. She is one of the finest elicitors of information we have seen and continues to do a fine job, whatever her assignment sight be. Incidentally she is on the executive board of the Fobert Coba Jones group, a strange constellation of students, and visitors including diplomate. LINCTOR-19 is the regular source of the Station's list of School for Foreigners students.

D. <u>LINCTOR-22</u>. He is a passive asset at the DAM who has been instructed to report all that he sees or hears which deals with student political proupings of the left in all faculties at UNAM, with particular attention to student elections and political alignments. He has been in the best position, along with LIMMAPOIL-2 to report on the activities of LICOAX and LILISP-C. LIMOTOR-22 specifically, as well as LIMOTOR's 14 and 19, was scheduled for an LCHINTER emmination. The results of that examination will be discussed in the Progress Report covering the period after August 1963 or in a separate dispatch.

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9. As indicated in the Project Peneval we have no immediate plans to expend numerically the assets of LIMOTOR,

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10. During the period January - June 1963, 225 raw reports were produced by the LIMOTOR essets. Of these, 38 originated with Seymour D. TZIMICH; 3 with LIMOTOR-14; 33 with LIMOTOR-14; (although several of these contained several topics); 75 with LIMOTOR-19; and 76 with LIMOTOR-22. These figures may be further malyzed as follows:

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11. By category the above production is as follows:

The personality reports were routed to interested Station officers and were then made part of existing personality files at the Station. All of the reports connected with the UNAN were read by the Station KUCAGE officers for whatever action they felt was necessary. Reports dealing with ES subjects or personalities were routed to SLINKARD. This ray report production does serve to strengthen Station CI and personality files and by its very nature little of it ever sees the light of day in terms of formal dissemination outside the Station (an exception was MEXI-6693).

12. Unfortunately, only two of the 225 raw remorts received formal dissemination, both origination with LIEWROHL-2 (1945-6939 and 7577). As indicated in the Project Renewal submitted with HEVA-21650 and in HEVA-22370, it is knowed through proper midance and increased direction to be able to raise the level of disseminable information originating within the LINCTOR Project. Efforts will be made to enlist the support of the HEVEN Political Section as well as the local COLOMACE to tatter channel the LINCTOR efforts and increase sustance interest in the product, by providing the Station with suitable guidance where possible.

COVER

13. The Station has not encountered ocver problems within the Project during the period under review. The capability of the Project is containly enhanced by the fact that the Staff Agent outside is under student cover. He can develop expertise in the LIMOTOR target through his daily activities and comment with greater authority on the production of other LIMOTORs.

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14. Since early 1963 plans were rade for the eventual appearance of an LOPLUTER team from Handpurters. Based on carlier correspondence, LINLTOR-22 was a prime candidate, and both LINCTOR's 19 and 22 were included in further planning for the LOPLUTER visit.

15. No security incidents have occurred during the period under raview. As indicated in paregraph 3 above, Staff Agent meetings are held as close to the regular meetings with the inside Staffer as possible. Morvency meetings can always be arranged. During the reporting period stope were taken to sterilize the LIMSTOR rew raterial as such as possible, to protect it against exposure of assets should it ever become compromised.

ADMINISTRATIVE

1(. Effective 1 July 1963 LINCTOR-19's salary was increased to 4,360 perces per month (less FLPRIME tax deductions). Ho other salary increase are contexplated.

17. All LD-DTOR production (raw reports alted under PRODUCTION above) is routed to COS and DOOS plus the interested Station officers.

CCHCLUSIONS

18. During the period under review, drinite progress has been made toward the objectives as set down in paragraph 5 above. Plans call for Marvin A. CAOT to brief the Station's operational staff on LIPOTCR during one of the regular weekly operational staff meetings. Similarly, plans called for a meeting of CAOT, SRINGICH, and MICHOFF with Station KUCACE officers. Continued effort is being made to improve the quality and scope of LIMOTCR agent reporting. And last but not least, three non-productive LIMOTOR Agents were dropped. The next LIMOTOR Progress Report will descustrate even further progress toward these modest objectives.

19. One overall factor must also be considered. In view of the scope of this Station's operational activity, and given the very special political complexion of the student body and faculty of the UAAM, this Station cannot easily allow itself the luxury of being without a LIPOTOR-type project.
