Mr. Hunt. Met with him, I never met with him. I have 5 met him on several occasions but I never had a private seance 6 with him. I met him first at Harvey's restaurant in about 7 1953, and I next saw him in Montevidea where I interpreted for 8 him for a while. I was Chief of Station down there and we 9 were waiting for General Walters to arrive, and I served as 10 an interpreter. 11

I next saw President Nixon at a formal White House recep-12 tion. He recalled, or he said he recalled our previous meetings, 13 and I told him I was now working for Chuck Colson, and he said 14 yes, I know all about that. And that's all in my book, Undercover 15 Mr. Baron. While you were in the Nixon White House you 16 didn't have a direct line to the President? 17
