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Interview with Walter P. Halligan 3111157

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A copy of the [redacted] was given to Mr. Halligan who read it and indicated that he understood its contents. Mr. Halligan was given a copy of LTA # 435-173-A which consists of a cover letter dated 12/12/63 from Robert M. Yampell to the Chiefs of SR and WE and to the Chief of Station in Paris forwarding a memo dated 11/25/63 which was written by Thomas B. Casasin to Walter P. Halligan concerning Casasin's prior interest in the Harvey Oswald. This document served as the basis for our questioning.

Halligan stated that in 1963 he served as Chief of the Soviet Section of the Paris station under diplomatic cover. He explained that Casasin was also an officer in the Paris station but he served under [redacted] and worked out of his home using cut-outs to make contact with others in the Paris station. Due to the nature of this arrangement, Casasin frequently wrote informal memos such as the one in #435-173-A which were then passed along to the station. These memos would then be forwarded to Headquarters, generally by Halligan. In this particular instance, Yampell, who served under Halligan, forwarded the letter to Headquarters. [redacted] Halligan was in the hospital at the time.

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Halligan explained the following portions of Casasin's memo:

- "REDWOOD" represents the Soviet Division.
- The "6 Branch" was the Operational Support and Research Branch for the Soviet Division. Its main function was the collection of

information. Casarin was Chief of the 6 Branch until his transfer to Paris.

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- KUTUMT was the cryptonym for the Office of Operations which is currently known as the DOD. If the CIA wished to contact a returning defector, it would have made contact through this office. However, Hattigan stated that it probably was not standard operating procedure to interview returning defectors due to a variety of factors such as a lack of proper follow-up measures or the fact that these cases would have fallen into the jurisdiction of the FBI.

- ODAED was the cryptonym for the State Department. Hattigan explained that it was not unusual that Casarin would have seen a State Department despatch on Oswald as it would have been routine to receive most of State Department memos.

- Casarin's recollection of having discussed the Oswald case in Summer 1960 as stated in the memo, must have been a mistake. Instead, he probably ^{meant the summer} should have ~~been~~ of 1962.

- BI refers to biographic information.

- KROVER was a cryptonym for a cover which was probably a business firm. KUOORE was the cryptonym for the DDP. Hattigan explained ^{in paragraph 3} that he was phasing out of the DDP ^{did not mean} ~~reference~~ ^{reference} that he was phasing out of the DDP altogether. Instead, his reference to phasing out of the DDP referred only to his Headquarters assignment within DDP.

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- NEOCEAN was the legal Traveller program, whereby they (the DDP) gave ^{to} ^{persons} certain travelling to Soviet bloc countries ^{the} ^{usual} ^{requirements} which they reported back to the Agency upon their return.

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The AEDCEAN/3 case was picked up in Europe for the Regal Travelers program in 1952 when she fell in love with a Soviet guide whom she married. He came out of the USSR in the summer of 1962 and his wife was permitted to join him some months later. Hattigan did not believe this to be a case where the couple was eventually divorced as the memo infers. Hattigan stated that it was unusual for Marina Oswald to be allowed to leave the Soviet Union as not many Soviet wives were permitted to leave during that time period.

- Hattigan was perplexed as to the reference to the "Harvey story" in the last line of the memo. He first stated that it must have been a typographical error which should have been the "Oswald story" instead. When it was pointed out that the sentence contained two other references to Oswald which makes it unlikely that this was merely a typographical error, he expressed confusion with respect to the reference. He could think of no explanation for this, nor did he remember ever speaking to Casasia about this point.

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Hattigan recalled that he arrived in Paris for his assignment in June, 1962 and that Casasia probably arrived there in September of the same year. Hattigan stated that he had never heard any rumors to the effect that Oswald had been used by the CIA at any time. He felt that because of his assignment within the Agency, he would have been in a position to know if Oswald had been used in any capacity. He mentioned that he had been in Japan from 1951-1955 and that Casasia had been there from

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1955 to 1958 to 1959.

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was Special Operations ~~with the~~ ^{the Soviet} ~~base~~. SE/9 was composed of 6 persons at the time. He explained that SE/10 was responsible

for the legal Travelers program which utilized U.S. citizens and that SE/2, 3, 4 & 5 ~~was~~ ^{were} responsible for running ^{by SE/10} ~~business~~ in that program.

Since Natigara was generally approved ^{by SE/10} of those persons who were traveling to the USSR under the program, he expressed the belief that it was almost impossible for them not to have known if Oswald had had some involvement with the Agency in this capacity.

Natigara advised that SE/9 was responsible for maintaining its own records while they kept in the same manner as DDO files. If someone needed to know if a particular person was being used,

they would be able to check it through the files. However, Agency operation would not be directly reflected in a 201 file. Instead,

there would be a paper in the file ^{relating} ~~relating~~ to another file in which operational information would be stored. Natigara explained that a 201 file documents the person but not what the person is doing.

A 201 file ~~might~~ ^{might} contain a PRQ, Part I which is entirely disqual-
ical information, a security check and newspaper clippings concerning

the individual, a case file, or the other hand, reflects the operational information. A case **REPRODUCTION** ^{part} number, such as

74-6, where the first ~~part~~ ^{part} ~~number~~ ^{number} reflects the country or area of interest and the second number ~~refers~~ ^{refers} to the specific operation. In regard to the

availability of case files, Natigara stated that the area of primary interest is reflected on a 201 file opening sheet and that ~~the~~ ^{the} ~~files~~ ^{files} go to that channel to seek operational information.
