1. Subject is presently being considered for Contract Type A employment as an Intelligence Analyst with Deputy Directorate for Operations/Information Services Division. He has neither been polygraphed nor entered on duty. Invite clearance was denied on 21 February 1973/ Field

investigation has now been completed and disclosed no unfavorable information. A waiver of HR 10-3 will be required in Subject's case in view of the Mexican citizenhip and residence of a brother-in-law.

2. Subject is a 24-year-old, married, male, who was born in Ohio of a native-born mother and a_Bussian-born father. Subject's father, <u>Boris Dimitri Tarasoff [057 104837]</u> entered this country from Turkey in 1923 and became a naturalized United States citizen in 1936. A review of his security file reveals that he entered on duty with the Agency as a GS-07, Intelligence Analyst in February 1956; was converted to Staff Agency in 1963; and retired in Mexico in November 1970. Subject's mother, Anna Adamoviez Tarasoff [057 131751/ID] was a Staff employee, GS-06, from April 1957 to September 1963, and vas approved for Contract Type B use in July 1964. His sister, [Barbara Tarasoff Rosillo](057 538593/ND),] was a "summer only" employee in 1968. She is now married to one Manuel Rosillo](0S/IR), a Mexican citizen, and resides in Mexico. Subject's parents also continue to reside in Mexico where his father had been assigned for a number of years prior to his retirement.

3. Subject was graduated from college in May 1971, receiving a B.A. degree with a major in Spanish. Developed current employment as a substitute teacher with the Allentown, PA, school district was confirmed and satisfactory as were all listed prior employments. Two

given references and four developed informents furnished favorable testimony regarding Subject's character, habits, moral conduct, and loyalty and recommended him for a position of trust with the Federal Government. Neighborhoods were verified and favorable and local police and credit checks were negative or non-derogatory.

4. RI, K and Office of Security Indices checks were no record or non-derogatory. National Agency Checks were negative with the exception of State/Passport which disclosed that Subject was issued passport $[\frac{1}{2}Z^{-8}33647]$ on 12 June 1968 in Mexico, purpose and place of travel not stated of Subject's permanent residence at that time was given as [Calle Halle $\frac{4}{35}$] Mexico 5, D.F., Mexico, with his parents. The file indicated that a previous passport, $\frac{1}{2}D^{-4}72771$, had been issued to Subject in June 1963 at Washington, D.C.

6. Subject appears to meet security criteria for Contract Type A utilization by the Agency. His investigation was entirely favorable

<u>It is not felt that the</u> Mexican citizenship of his brother-in-law poses a security risk, and, accordingly, it is recommended that:


a. Exception to HR 10-3 be granted;
