1. Attached are a) statement of termination signed by subject and b) agent's service record. Submission of these items has been delayed pending receipt of Field Instruction 236-1. Since this instruction has not been received we are submitting the enclosures to close the record on this case.
2. Paul D. LANGEVIN may be used for recruiting tasks before his permanent departure from Chile in April 1954. His security is not questioned and he has expressed a willingness to perform such tasks.
3. He also requests arrangements for the payment of income tax on his earnings during 1953. This matter will be handled by cable in view of time element.
4. The following explains the timing of LANGEVIN's termination: he had been advised that he would be terminated one month after all advances had been liquidated. This would have been 30 September 1953. This date was also chosen since it was expected that CORNIUS would take over FURIOSO "C" at about that time. CORNIUS did take over the project early in October. However, LANGEVIN did no work during the month of September for which he would be entitled to payment, although he presumably was available for duty. The last payment of \$357.44 for the period 1 through 31 August 1953 was in addition to the liquidation of his advances although it did not cover a full month from the date of such liquidation which must have occurred sometime in August. LANGEVIN accepted this as the last payment coming to him so there did not seem to be any point in forcing another \$500 on him for a period during which he did no work.

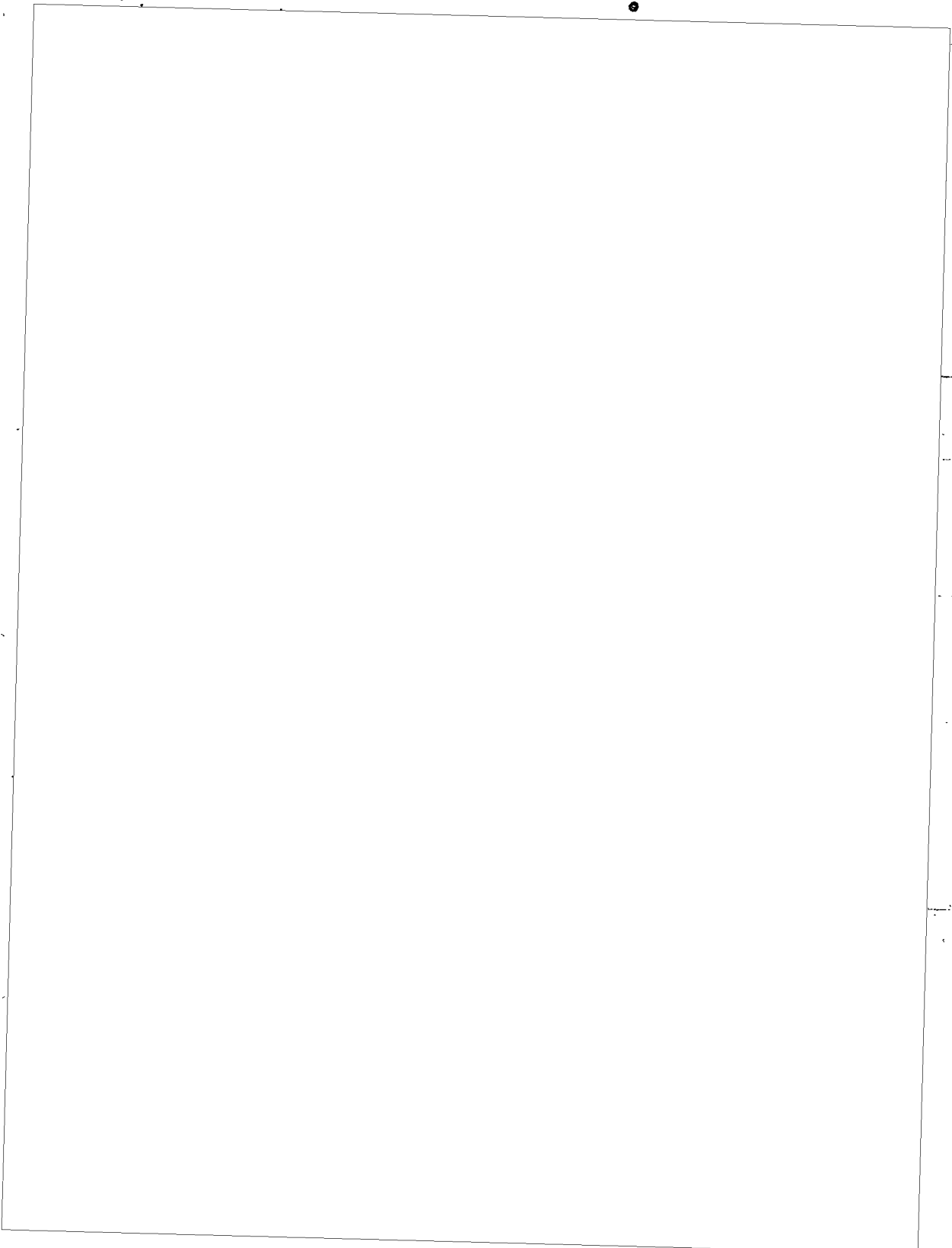

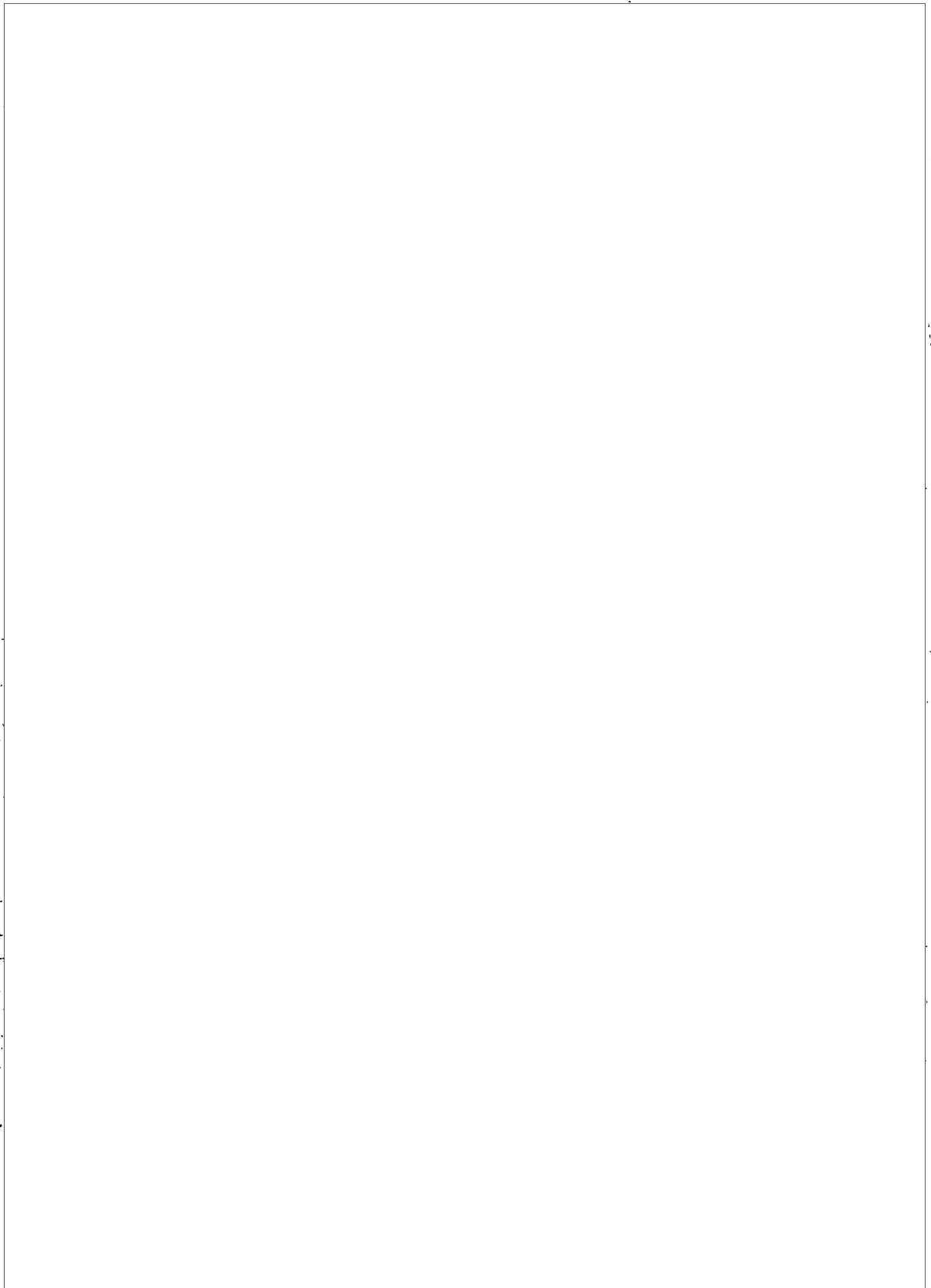

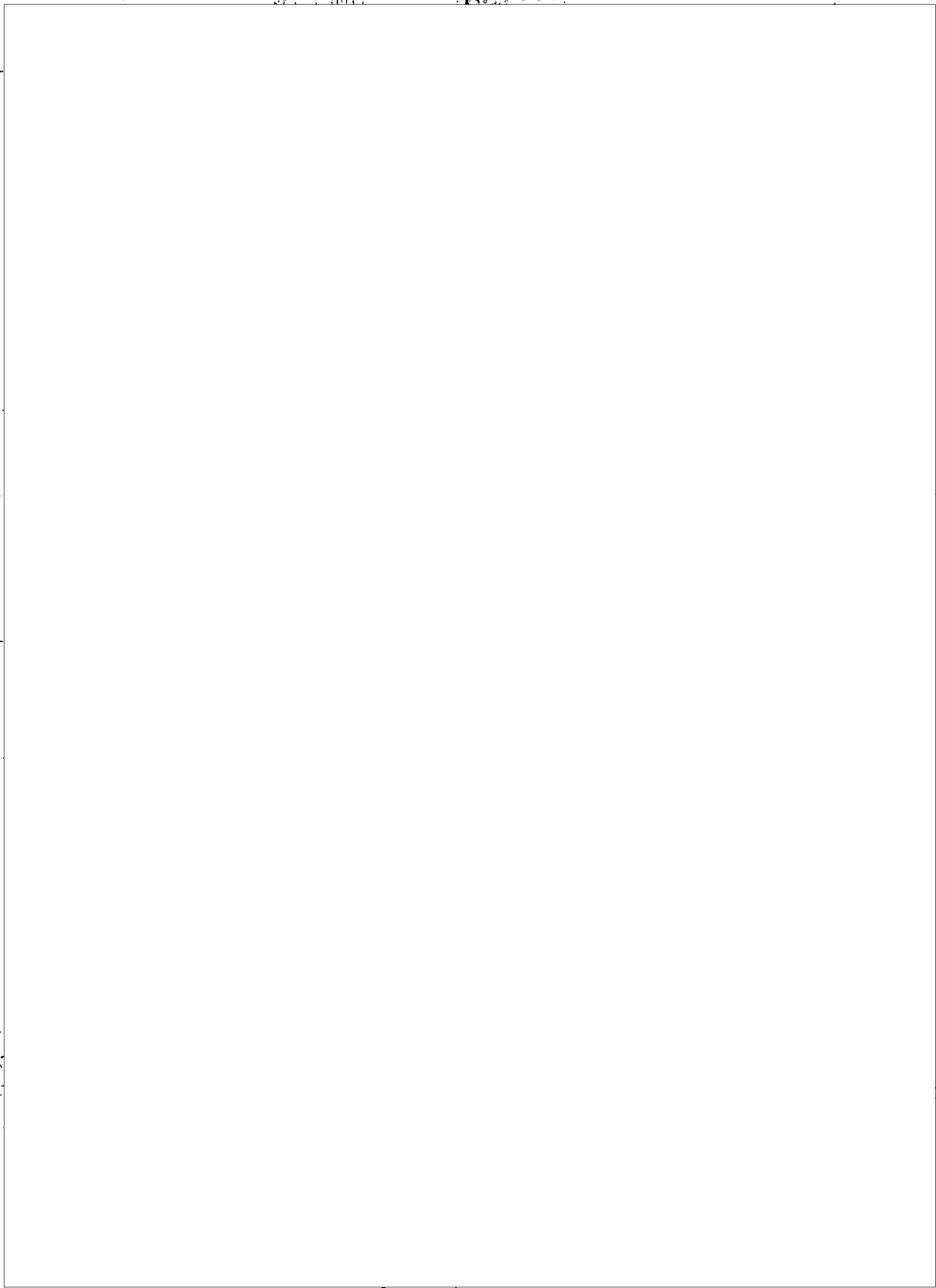

MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief, WH Division

SUBJECT : Mr. David A. Phillips

1. The attached dispatch from the Chief of Station, Beirut, covers the proposed resignation of Mr. David A. Phillips from CIA. The matter was discussed with the Chief of Station during his recent visit to Headquarters, and he feels that Mr. Phillips' decision to return to South America is irrevocable.

2. Mr. Phillips, as you are aware, was in Havana until the spring of 1957, at which time he accepted a staff agent position in Beirut. His primary responsibility was the establishment of a radio and television production center in addition to providing a variety of covert programs in the psychological field. Mr. Phillips

responsibilities of his Beirut assignment.

3. The Chief of Station indicated that Mr. Phillips did a highly commendable job while in Beirut and feels his departure from the Middle East is regrettable; however, he was unable to dissuade Mr. Phillips from his desires to leave CIA. Headquarters has been equally impressed by Mr. Phillips' services and feels he performed in an exemplary manner, utilizing his mature judgment and excellent PP sense in attaining the objectives which led to his assignment in Beirut.

SUBJECT: Future Resignation from CIA of David Phillips

1. In a recent meeting with the Chief of Station, David Phillips, the PECTATE case officer, informally announced his intention of resigning from CIA in the near future. At that time Phillips requested that Headquarters be informed by the Chief of Station. The decision to resign has been made informally, in order for the Station and Headquarters to have as much advance notice as possible. Actually, Phillips does not expect to leave his Beirut assignment for about four months, or sometime in the month of July. Phillips reports that the PECTATE building will have been finished and occupied by PECTATE staffers long before that time.

2. In the above-mentioned meeting, and in a Memorandum for the Record submitted to the Chief of Station, Phillips has emphasized that his decision was reached after careful thought and has been prompted solely by personal considerations. Specifically the reasons are:

a. The necessity of Phillips' return to Latin America to take care of personal business problems, mainly the sale of his newspaper in Chile. He has been negotiating for this sale for many months, but he feels that an advantageous agreement would be impossible to reach by mail from such a distance.

b. Phillips' desire to inaugurate a business firm in Cuba.

3. The Chief of Station has discussed this matter with Phillips in detail. Phillips has reiterated--and has requested that Headquarters be so advised--that his decision is purely personal. There is no question of dissatisfaction with CIA, or of a morale problem. On the contrary, Phillips has expressed his regret that circumstances prompt him to terminate what he has described as a most rewarding association with CIA.

4. Phillips' plans for leaving the Beirut assignment bring up the problem of future CIA control of PECTATE. Phillips has submitted to the Chief of Station his personal recommendations on this score, which have been considered in preparing a separate dispatch.

1. Please advise CHAMBERLAIN of the following, which has been received by Chief, NE Division, from the COS, Santiago, regarding CHAMBERLAIN's newspaper.

2. "...The newspaper owned by CHAMBERLAIN has been engaging in an all-out campaign against the Klein-Saks Mission and their economic program for Chile. While the newspaper in itself is not terribly important, the Embassy has become disturbed because of the newspaper being owned by an American. Recently the Ambassador called in the local editor of the newspaper and asked for an explanation. He replied that he was himself in complete accord with the Klein-Saks program but that his hands were tied as he was acting upon instructions from his publisher. Personally, I think that that was probably not true but was simply a means of passing the buck to extricate himself from a difficult situation. I do not believe that CHAMBERLAIN is very much in contact with the activities of the newspaper and that its policy is left pretty much in the hands of the local editor. Unfortunately, the Air Attache, who has been here for a considerable period, mentioned to the Ambassador that he thought I might be able to throw some light on the situation due to the fact that he, himself, knew CHAMBERLAIN had some sort of connection with HUNTER. I stated if there was such a connection, I was not cognizant of it. Nevertheless, I think that the most circumspect thing that could be done would be to apprise CHAMBERLAIN of what is going on on his newspaper, so that he could correct the situation if he so desires. I understand the Ambassador intends to write a very strong letter directly to CHAMBERLAIN. A strong statement in reply could very well avoid embarrassment at a future date for HUNTER."
