PROJECT: LIENVOY

WH - Mexico

ACTION: ADD/P approval of renewal

1 Feb 67 - 31 Jan 68

PURPOSE: Project supports a joint CIA-Mexican Government telephone tap unit and a non-official liaison relationship with access to the highest ranking Mexican officials.

PROGRESS: During the past year covered a total of 30 telephone lines: simultaneously providing 8,644 reels of raw take. Of the 30 lines, at least 15 of them are exclusively for Station targets and the remaining targets are chosen by the Mexican authorities but are usually of interest to the Station. Station targets include the Cuban Embassy, the Soviet Embassy, Czech Embassy, Polish Embassy and the New China News Agency.

> FI/INT files contain 107 positive intelligence reports produced during the review period. This production, although unavoidably uneven in quality and coverage, included a considerable amount of useful information relevant to priority needs of the community. LIENVOY coverage of Cuban and Soviet installations has been of particular usefulness as a check on Station operations. A set of voice samples of Soviet officials has been collected which assists the identification of unidentified speakers elsewhere. The channel established to the President of Mexico has been used to promote a close personal rapport between the President and Chester D. DAINOLD (p) and in consequence closer cooperation between the Government of Mexico and the U.S. Government and CIA in particular.

FI STAFF: Observes that there is a weakness in the operation because of its size. The threat of mere numbers-transcribers, lines tapped, reports produced, leads exploited-increases the mathematical probability of compromise. The Station appears to be fully aware of this problem and is maintaining tight security discipline.

Project LIENVOY

1. FI Staff recommends renewal of project LTENVOY. The project will cost \$57,100 for the period 1 February 1967 to 31 January 1968. The cost covers salaries and support expenses for 12 Spanish-speaking local hire centract employees. Two staff agents and two other contract agents also work on this project, providing management and a Slavic translation capability. The staff agents are covered by other projects and the Slavic translators are paid on a piece-work basis. The desk estimates these additional costs to run about \$35,000 a year.

- 2. As in prior years, this is a three-sided project: it provides positive intelligence, serves as an operational instrument, and is a key element in a profitable limited relationship between the Chief of Station and the President of Monico. The intelligence product has declined in volume ever the past rew years but the project still yields more reports than any other CS audio operation anywhere. Most of the reports concerned Memican Communists, covering topics of generally high interest as well as reports of moderate value on local political parties. Positive intelligence return on bloc targets was relatively measure. The attached FI/IST memorandum provides an analysis of the positive intelligence product.
- 3. The operational information produced by LIZHVOY was significant this year as in the past. The information acquired on the Cuban target was particularly valuable. During President Johnson's visit the taps were very useful in the station's efforts to safeguard the President's personal security. Limiton with the President of Maxico was netive and cordial this past year. The mail intercept was undertaken at his request.
- 4. The only weakhear of Stiff observes in this well managed and encellently exploited operation is its site. The threat of more numbers—transcribers, lines tayed, reverts produced, Janes

Project LIENVOY -- Renewal Period 1 February 1987 - 31 January 1988

Comments and Recommendations (To be forwarded to the Division)

- 1. Our files contain 107 positive intelligence reports produced wholly or in part by LIENVOY and disseminated in the period I February 1966 31 January 1967. Over half of this production (60 reports) dealt with plans and activities of Mexican Communists and other leftists. Included were 17 reports which provided useful information on the unrest at the National Autonomous University (UNAM) and other universities. As our recent study of reporting on Mexico indicates, student unrest has been a subject of high interest to the community. Also included were 13 disseminations which contributed to the station's coverage, highly praised by all customers, of leftist activities in connection with President Johnson's visit. The other 30 reports in this group, primarily concerning the PCM, MLN, and PPS, varied considerably in quality but in general appeared to be of moderate value in relation to customer needs.
- 2. The disseminated production from foreign Communist installations was relatively meager. There were 9 reports on relations with the Soviets, mostly on cultural programs; 3 reports on commercial negotiations with Czechoslovakia and Poland; 7 reports concerned with Cuba; and 5 reports on Chicom (NCNA) activities in Mexico. With the possible exception of information on Mexican-Bloc trade -- a subject of much interest to ORR -- the LIENVOY coverage of official Communist installations did not provide positive intelligence of any great significance. Notably lacking was information on foreign subversive efforts against Mexico, for which customers have expressed an urgent need.
- 3. The rest of the production for the period included the following: 9 reports concerning Guatemalan exile activity, which appeared to be of value; 9 reports on activities of the press secretary of the Presidencia which contributed to coverage of the government's plans and activities -- an area on which the community has a high priority need for information; and one report concerning initiatives for a Vietnamese peace which was disseminated as an Intelligence Information Special Report to the Director. There were also 4 reports on right-wing Sinarchist activity, a subject of relatively little interest to customers.

SECRET

4. In summary, the positive intelligence production as a whole, though unavoidably uneven in its quality and coverage, included a considerable amount of useful information relevant to priority needs of the community. While this disseminated product in itself would hardly justify the total cost for the project, we assume that a substantial portion of the cost is warranted for purposes other than collection of positive information. Consequently FI/INT/RE recommends renewal.

SUBJECT : Renewal of the LIENVOY Project

1. Renewal is requested of the LIENVOY Project for the period 1 February 1967 through 31 January 1968 for a total of \$57,100, with \$22,470 for FY 1967 and \$34,630 for FY 1968. The LIENVOY Project was included in the 1967 Operational Program for \$50,000. The additional funds required for FY 1967 are available within WH Division.

- 2. The LIENVOY Project covers both access to high level Mexican Government officials, including the President, and a joint telephone tap operation run in cooperation with the Office of the President.
- The phone taps produce FI, CE, and operational support information. According to Headquarters records, during the period 1 February through 31 December 1966, LIENVOY was the source of ninety-eight positive intelligence reports, seventy-nine of which were disseminated. These reports covered the following general subject categories: Soviet Embassy activities in Mexico, Mexican Communist Party activities, Communist front activities, the activities of the Chicom representatives in Mexico, and the activities of various extremist groups. Included in this reporting was that prior to and during President Johnson's trip to Mexico City in April 1966. The Station's reporting on this trip, which included LIENVOY, was highly praised by the customers. LIENVOY also provided some good coverage during the trouble at the National Autonomous University (UNAM) in the spring and useful information during disturbances at some of the other universities. The remainder of the LIENVOY coverage could be considered of medium-level interest and value. During the same period, LIENVOY

provided information for ten CE disseminations to the FBI on Americans in contact with the Soviet and Cuban Embassies in Mexico.

- 4. LIENVOY coverage, particularly of the Cuban and Soviet installations, was useful as a check on the Station's operations. It furnished information on double agents directed against the Soviets, for instance, and on several agents in contact with the Cuban Embassy. LIENVOY also identified leads into the Soviets, some of whom have since been recruited as access agents. (e.g. LIROAN and the LIROBBIN's) Another example of the usefulness of LIENVOY is the set of voice samples of Soviet officials which has been collected and which permits the identification of unidentified speakers on other coverage. For example, recently in LIFEAT a man speaking with Suzie PIERRE Charles, a Haitian Communist, was identified as Vladimir Ivanovich SHPAKEVICH (KGB). LIENVOY is also the principal source of information on the travel of Soviets within Mexico and abroad. The Station has a standing requirement for informing the Office of the Legal Attache in Mexico of all travel performed by Soviet officials within the Republic of Mexico, and LIENVOY helps the Station to fulfill this request.
- 5. LIFEAT, the unilateral telephone tap operation, concentrates on individual Soviets, Cubans, Communists, and Americans who are of special WOFACT CE interest.
- 6. The channel established to the President of Mexico through LIENVOY permits direct contact by the Chief of Station. While there is also a channel through the LITEMPO Project, the President and the Station are both careful to select the proper channel which depends on whether there is an anticipated need for the cooperation of the LITEMPO Ministry, or whether the contact and problem should remain a matter of concern only to the President and his special advisor. As can be seen from the attached renewal request prepared by the Mexico City Station, the

principal use of the LIENVOY liaison channel during the past year has been in the political action field. Chester D. DAINOLD contributed greatly to this effort with his briefing of the Mexican President. The briefings, held in December 1966, resulted in an agreement by the President to accept a Panamanian politician to study the Mexican Political Party (PRI) in the hope that Panama might benefit by PRI experience in gaining political stability. Hopefully through the use of a controlled CIA agent, the Agency will also benefit by obtaining information on the organization and inner workings of the PRI which has not been available through other sources. The President offered to send an experienced educator to Panama to review the situation at the University since DAINOLD expressed concern about the problems gnawing at the University of Panama.

- 7. The President of Mexico has also used his special LIENVOY channel to the Chief of Station to obtain advice on personal and communications security, and on the purchase of technical equipment. The Station, on the other hand, has used this special channel to pass to the President background information on Soviets and subversives in Mexico on whom the Mexicans expressed an interest, and against whom we hoped the Mexicans would take some action. One memorandum resulted in the cancellation of a foreign diplomatic assignment of a Mexican career diplomat who is a suspect Soviet agent.
- 8. It is believed that the close personal rapport established between the President and DAINOLD and the Chief of Station has contributed to better relations and closer cooperation between Mexico and the U.S. Government and CIA in particular. WH Division recommends renewal of the LIENVOY Project.

PROJECT LIENVOY RENEWAL

A. CURRENT OBJECTIVES

The LIENVOY Project provides for a joint WOFACT-Mexican Government sponsored telephone tap unit and for a non-official liaison relationship with access to the highest ranking government officials of Mexico. The tap unit provides direct support necessary to cover targets and operational programs levied on the Mexico Station via the RMD as well as spot requests from Headquarters and other Stations. This project also produces considerable positive intelligence.


B. CHANGES

(1) The LIENVOY Project was created in late 1958 and put into operation in early 1959 at the request of LITENSOR who appointed LIELEGANT as his special assistant to work with Willard C. CURTIS in the supervision and administration of the project. In mid-1964 it became evident that LIRAMA would replace LITENSOR in December 1964. (LIRAMA was then LITEMPO-2 and a clandestine liaison contact with Willard C. CURTIS under the LITEMPO Project but was not knowledgeable of the CURTIS/LIELEUANT/LITENSOR relationship in Project LIENVOY.) On 10 August 1964 LIRAMA net with CURTIS and LIELECANT and advised them that LITENSOR had briefed him on the LIENVOY Project in detail and that it should be continued with the same personnel and the same manner of operation. Both LIELECANT and LIENVOY-2 were given nominal positions on LIRAMA's staff with cover for daily contact with LIRAMA. Government credentials were also provided for Arnold F. AREHART (Staff Agent) as well as the local agents working in the LP. Since March 1960, the LP has remained in the same location. Inside the front doorway a credential, provided by LIRAMA, prohibits entry to anyone without special permission obtained from LIRANA.

(2) Agents

For information of reviewing officials not familiar with this Project, there is enclosed as Attachment-1, a chart listing current LIENVOY targets as well as the functions of each agent. Two changes during the past project year can be noted: (a) LIENVOY-8 was rehired as a monitor by LIENVOY-2 at the request of LIRAMA and with the egreement of CURTIS. The request was also made for reactivation of his Operational Approval by the Station; and (b) LIENVOY-19 was given training in July 1966 in flaps and seals and set up the LISALAD unit at the request of LIRAMA.

Staff Agent Arnold P. AREHART has been with the project for seven years. His duties inside the LP are to maintain the technical equipment and protect WOFACT interest by observing activities of local agents and preventing negligent breakage or loss from theft. There has been no major mechanical breakdown during the past project year. AREHART also is there to see that WOFACT gets copies of all transcripts and gets reels of all conversations





desired. The equipment in this LP has run over thirty-five thousand hours since installation and is still in excellent condition, due to the excellent care and maintenance by AREMARY.

C. INTELLIGENCE PRODUCTION

The LIENVOY Project has proved a valuable source for positive intelligence on Mexican political figures on Communism and on activities of foreign Communists in Mexico or transitting Mexico. In addition, this project continues to satisfy the Station's support requirements for operational data and provides access to the highest echelons of the Mexican Covernment.

(1) FI information. From 1 January 1966 through 30 November 1966, this project was the source of 122 positive reports. The general subject categories within which these reports fall as related to objectives of the most recent RMD (MRMT-6852, dated 20 June 1966) are:



(2) CI/CE information. In addition to the general subject categories of FI interest, the LIEWOY Project continues to fulfill a standing requirement to provide CI/CE data on the following selected targets:

Cuban Embassy - six lines Soviet Embassy - five lines Chinese Communist New Agency (MCNA) - one line Czech Embassy - two lines Polish Embassy - two lines

Of the above coverage, neither the Crech nor the Polish Embassy targets are listed as a priority in the latest Related Mission Directive. They are covered for possible leads into the Soviet Embassy intelligence activity.

(3) LISALAD. This consists of a one-man intercept center run by LIENVOY-19 under the general supervision of LIELEMANT and LIENVOY-2 with targets selected by both the Station and LIEAMA. It began functioning in August 1966 and covered five addresses used by the Communist Party of Mexico. During the period through November 1966 this activity produced a large volume of fairly low-level information about PCM which was of value for





background use only. It has been decided by Chief of Station, Mexico, and LIRAMA to keep this mechanism for future use rather than attempt to exploit it fully at this time since the Station does not have enough personnel to process all the paper it can produce. Further, it should be noted that LIKAYAK-2 is handling the Station requirements satisfactorily at this time.

D. EFFECTIVENESS

- (1) During the past year (1 January 1966 through 30 November 1966) the LIENVOY Project covered a total of 30 (thirty) targets simultaneously which provided 3,644 reels of raw take. This was processed into 18,766 pages of transcripts (of this amount actual count by LIENVOY processors was 14,266 pages, an estimate by the outside Czech translator was 1,500 pages, the Russian translator 2,000 pages, and the Polish translator 1,000 pages). Enclosed as attachment number 2 is the 1966 Work Load Log for LIENVOY by month and target. Since this includes only the work done inside the LP, total figures very according to additional work done by other Station (unilateral) agents.
- (2) (a) Mexican Targets. Of the 30 lines covered, at least 15 of them are always exclusively for WOFACT, the remaining targets are selected by LIRAMA but are also of definite interest to WOFACT as sources of positive and CE/CI intelligence. The Mexican targets covered during the past project year were:

The reels from the above targets are not all transcribed completely. LIENVOY monitors extract significant conversations and include them in a daily "resumen", the original of which is read daily by LIRAMA and a copy of which is delivered each morning to the Mexico Station. The reels are retained for about ten days for fuller transcripts if requested by LIRAMA or by the Mexico Station. The "resumen" is typed in four copies at the end of each day (covering coversations which occurred that day). On the following morning by 0000 hours, one copy is handcarried by LIENVOY-2 to LIRAMA. At the same time, Arnold F. ARHART delivers a copy to Robert B. RIGGS for delivery to Willard C. CURTIS. A third copy is delivered to LIELEDAMT by LIENVOY-2. The fourth copy is retained in a chronological file in the intercept center.

(b) WCFACT Targets. The WCFACT targets have been limited mainly to CI/CE requirements. These include the Cuban Embassy, Soviet Embassy, Czech Embassy, Polish Embassy, and the Communist Chinese News Agency (NCNA). There follows selected significant examples of the LIENVOY product from each of these targets with a Station appraisal of its effectiveness.

1. Cuban Embassy. The six lines covered are:

The Chancery and Consulate lines regularly identify foreigners in Mexico who contact the Cuban Embassy. Reels are usually transcribed within one day of the conversation; however, if the caller happens to be a U.S. citizen, the transcripts are prepared immediately which frequently permits the Station to arrange for unilateral surveillance and identification of the persons involved. The Commercial Office coverage provides information on Cuban Commercial activities in Mexico and identification of firms doing business with Cuba. The Elena Vasquez Gomez target was connected to support the sensitive AMROD operation. The AMROD Headquarters Case Officer, Thomas O. URQUHART (ps) visits Mexico on temporary duty in cornection with this operation. His comments on this project are:



The take from LEGICT continues to be of prime tactical value to the conduct of such operations as ANROD and JMROD. It enables us to know how to time our various moves, gives us the opportunity to know where the opposition figures are and gives us the general rankground we need to manage these operations properly. So important is this coverage decard that carbons of the primary targets covered for JMROD and ANROD are regularly forwarded to Headquarters at Headquarters request so that it is possible to keep in touch with details of developments in Mexico on the tactical level. On the strategic level, LIENVOY coverage continues to provide one of the largest masses of maneuver of necessary fact for use not only in AMROD/JMROD but also in other operations of a similar nature mounted against targets cutside Mexico from base points often outside Mexico as well.

The six lines against the Cuban target are fully transcribed by LIENVOY transcribers and delivered by Arnold P. AREHART to Robert ? RIGOS each morning. Lengthy conversations sometimes require additional time for transcription. A carbon copy of each transcription is reuched weekly to Headquarters for use of WH/C. The original is retained by the Mexico Station. A third copy is retained in the interest center chronological files. LIRAMA does not read these transcricts unless some significant item appears in the "resumen" which causes him to ask to see a fuller transcript or to listen to the tape. Coversco of the Cuban Embassy target yields a good picture of daily activities, residences, personal habits and weaknesses of Cuban official rersonnel in Mexico. This is used by Station Case Officers in selection of targets for recruitment and in checking on activities of agents already recruited who are working inside the target or who are in contact with Cuban officials. In July 1966 LITSHO sources reported detention by Mexican police of a Cuban diplomat in connection with smuggling of arms through Mexico to Guatemalan guerrillas. The Cuban Rahassy as well as Mexican Government reaction was conitored through this coverage.

2. Soviet Rubasev. The Soviet Government has over fifty efficials permanently stationed in Mexico (the largest foreign embassy in Mexico except for the U.S. Embacsy). Thirty-five of these Soviets (No percent of the staff) are intelligence officers. The five lims under LIFNVOY provide details on the activities of most of these Swiets. These lines are:

15 60 55 Soviet Consulate and Chancery. This line is used by fifteen known or suspect KGB or GRU officers. It is also used by foreigners in Mexico attempting to make contact vith the Soviets. When identifying leads appear and the contacts suggest clandestine meetings, the Station arranges for undateral surveillance and has identified many contacts in this manner.



- 15 61 55 Soviet Chancery. This line is used primarily by the Ambassador and provides more information on protocol contacts than leads of intelligence interest. However, it gives the Station a picture of the personalities being cultivated by Soviet diplomats and of Mexicans who are seeking contact with the Soviets.
- 15 61 07 Soviet Commercial Office. The Commercial Office is used by both the KUB and GPU as cover and of the eight present staffers, seven are considered to be intelligence officers. The volume of trade between Mexico and the USSR still does not justify a commercial staff of this size. The Mexico Station has had some success in running double agents against these officers. LIENVOY provides a helpful check on these cases. The take from LIENVOY also identifies intelligence officers as escorts for trade, scientific, commercial and tourist delegations who continue to travel between the USSR and Mexico, either on visits to Mexico or to and from other latin American countries. Once these groups arrive in Mexico, their movements usually become known through LIENVOY.
- 15 12 64 Soviet Films Office. This leads into the residence and office of the distributor for Soviet Commercial Films in Mexico who is a suspect intelligence officer. There continue to be a number of calls suggesting clardestine contact with Central Americans. When identifications are made, the appropriate WOFACT Central American Etation is notified immediately.
- 15 69 87 Soviet Military Attache. This line is seldem used by anyone. The military staff presently consists of (3) GRU colonels and (3) civilian GRU officers. It continues to be the line used by Americans, particularly servicemen trying to make contact with the Soviets.

As reported previously, the Seviet information is transcribed by the LIENVOY transcribers in the same way as the Cuban traffic except that the reels also contain a considerable volume of Russian language conversations. This requires that the reels be picked up daily and delivered to an outside (unilateral) translator (Staff Agent Douglas J. FIENGLASS) who translates the Russian conversations into English. From these transcripts it is apparent that the Seviets are not aware that their conversations in Russian are being overheard and understood. These daily exchanges between the Soviets and their wives (who also work in the Embassy) provide a good picture of personal habits, grievances, marriage relationships, and weaknesses of targets of interest to WEACT.



5. Czech Embassy. Two lines in the Chancery (45 30 91 and 45 30 12) are covered by LIENVOY. Reels from these targets are delivered daily by AREMART to RIGGS who delivers them to the ES Case Officer who arranges for transcriptions and translations to be done by David B. SCHLAGHTER, field contract agent. This agent also prepares a monthly summary of information on the activities of Czech officials in Mexico. This Embassy has a staff of thirty-four (54) officials of whom (8) eight are known or suspect intelligence officers. LIENVOY has provided the Great bulk of operational intelligence on this Embassy, its personnel and activities in Mexico.

4. Polish Embassy. The two lines covered are (11 43 52) in the Chancery and (25 32 38) which is the private line of the Polish Commercial Counselor. These reels are delivered daily by AREHART to RIGGS who delivers them to the Soviet Bloc case officer who arranges for translations and transcriptions to be done by Louise B. DRAGASIC (ps), a contract employee who prepares a monthly summary of information obtained from this coverage. This Embassy has a staff of fifteen (15) officials of whom eight (3) are known or suspect intelligence officers. LIENVOY has provided a considerable amount of operational intelligence on this Embassy and their Commercial Office in Mexico. In addition to personality data, this source provides a valuable check on access agents in contact with Polish officials. Most of the leads to access agents in this field have originated with the LIENVOY Project.

5. Communist China News Agency (NCNA). Until 4 November 1966 there were three representatives of the Communist China News Agency in Mexico. During the project year, LIENVOY covered this target as a parallel to a sensitive audio operation. On 4 November 1966 the three nowspapermen packed up and left Mexico for Havana, Cuba, closing down their house and office in Mexico. A cold approach was made prior to their departure, by a Headquarters TDYer but was not successful.

The Maxico Staticn Case Officers responsible for established FI and CI/CE programs continue to feel that LIENVOY makes a very necessary intelligence support contribution. The facilities of this project, due to centralized tapping and transcribing, continue to produce three times the volume of raw audio and finished intelligence as LIFEAT at approximately one half the cost. As a semi-official liaison tap operation, LIENVOY continues to be able to place a tap on any phone desired whereas LIFEAT as a unilateral operation, does not always have immediate access to a desired target. The continued success of Station Mexico's operational program against the Cuban, Soviet and Soviet Satellite installations and personnel in Mexico is largely attributable to the continues and thorough coverage of these targets by this project. Chief of Station. Mexico, recommends that the project be renewed for another year as an essential collection and support operation for the Mexico Station.





E. PROBLEMS

There have been no significant security, cover, control, or liaison problezs during the project year.

F. LIAISON

This Project encompasses an unofficial liaison relationship with highlevel Mexican government officials and contributes to the friendly attitudes of these officials toward inform. Some examples of this liaison are:

- Prior to a trip to Central America in early January 1966, LIRAMA was briefed by Chester D. DAINOLD in Mexico on 20 December 1965. In Pebruary 1966, after his successful trip, LIRAMA contacted Willard C. CURTIS to express his appreciation for this briefing and commented that "the briefing was exactly right on all countries."
- In March 1966 LIRAMA via LIENVOY-2 asked the Station for assistance in monitoring the activities of Victor RICO Galan who was subsequently arrested and is being held by Mexican Government authorities for various subversive activities.
- 3. On 12 March 1966 CURTIS visited LIRAMA to give him a birthday gift and a letter from Chester D. DAINOLD thanking him for a silver tray sent as a gift by LIRAMA.
- 4. On 25 April 1966, CURTIS called on the Chief of LIRAMA's security guard at the request of LIRAMA. They asked for WOFACT guidance in providing selected security and communications equipment. This equipment was obtained through WOFACT facilities but paid for by LIRAMA. WOFACT technicians came to Nexico in December 1966 to supervise its installation and provide training for its use.
- During April 1966, CURTIS saw LIELEGANT on several occasions and obtained reactions of LIRAMA to the student strike at the UNAM.
- 6. CURTIS and LIELEGANT met with LIRAMA on 16 June 1966 at LIRAMA's request to discuss LISALAD, a postal intercept unit set up at the request of LIRAMA. Walter W. CORNEURY came to Mexico the first week in July 1966 to train the agent (LIENVOY-19).
- 7. On 30 June 1966, CURTIS met with LIELEUANT to get his views on LIRAMA's approval of sending a Mexican to North Viet Nam on "an information collecting" mission. On 11 July 1966 CURTIS saw LIRAMA and received his approval for such an operation.
- 8. On 22 July 1966, LIRAMA via LIENVOY-2 requested Station traces on Soviet officials in Mexico suspected by them of conducting espionage activities against the Mexican Government.





- 9. In July 1966, LIRAMA asked for CURTIS' assistance in obtaining cartographic studies of Mexico. These were given to LIRAMA in December 1966.
- 10. CURTIS met with LIRAMA on 14 September 1966 and discussed the physical condition of LITENSOR, details of which were reported by cable to Headquarters.
- 11. In late September 1966, in response to a request from LIRAMA,
 Headquarters technicians conducted a security survey of the private
 telephonic facilities used by LIRAMA
- 12. Chester DAINOLD and Willard C. CURTIS met with LIRAMA on 16 December 1965 and DAINOLD briefed him on student reform and university programs; also, on world problems. A record of this briefing by DAINOLD has been sent to Headquarters. Stefan LARANON came with DAINOLD and acted as interpreter.
- 13. In addition to the above, selected intelligence approved by Headquarters is regularly passed to LIRAMA.
- 14. During the visit of CPLOGIC to Mexico, LIENVOY assets worked closely With the Station, providing all assistance requested. Their role was a significant factor in making this visit a success (security-wise).

G. INTER-AGENCY COORDINATION.

No formal coordination is required in this Project. Chief, LNPURE, Mexico, is the only LNFORT official in Nexico outside WOFACT who is aware of this project and its provision for a special channel to LIRAMA. Chief, LNPURE, was briefed by Headquarters prior to his arrival in Mexico City on LIENVOY. CURTIS advises Chief, LNPURE, of significant and pertinent subjects which are discussed in meetings between CURTIS and LIRAMA. LIRAMA does not know that Chief, LNPURE, knows of LIENVOY or of CURTIS contacts with LIRAMA; he continues to request that (On) one in LNGOLD know of either.

H. PLANS.

The Station plans to continue the intercept program without change for the next project year. In view of LIRAMA's request for a postal intercept asset connected with this project, this operation will be kept available as an auxiliary unit. It is intended to continue the contacts with LIRAMA and service to him.

I. FUNDS.

1. For the past period.

The cost of the LIENVOY Project (paid by the Mexico Station exclusive of Headquarters costs) from 1 February 1966 through 30 June 1966 was approximately US\$ 17,000 and from 1 July 1966 through 31 January 1967 another US\$ 32,000.

2. During the next project year.

During the period 1 Pebruary 1967 through 31 January 1968, an estimated amount of US\$ 57,100 will be required with US\$ 22,470 to be spent in FY 67 and the remaining US\$ 34,630 in FY 68.


K. EMERGENCY CONDITIONS.

WOPROP in the reneval review for LIENVOY Project in 1966 commented that this project in their view was a model for imitation by others, particularly in the area of efficient processing and exploitation of raw take. On 21 November 1966, Samuel K. CASTELON (ps) arrived in Maxico for a briefing on the LIENVOY mechanism and processing procedures for use in setting up a similar installation in Lima, Peru. In addition to the Station briefing, CASTELON was escorted through the LP late in the evening by Willard C. CURTIS and LIENVOY-2 so that CASTELON could see the equipment in operation as well as the type of files maintained in the LP.

SUBJECT

LIENVOY Project Amendment

- 1. Amendment of the LIENVOY Project is requested for an additional \$5,000 for FY 1967. The Project was last approved for the period 1 February 1966 through 31 January 1967 for a total of \$50,698; \$20,960 for FY 1966 and \$29,738 for FY 1967. This amendment would bring the total project approval to \$55,698. Funds are available within WH Division.
- 2. The Project amendment is necessary in order to provide for unanticipated expenses revolving around an increase in the telephone tap LP personnel and the establishment of a new joint letter intercept program now referred to as LISALAD. Regarding the first, headquarters has recommended for some time that additional monitors be hired because of the heavy workload in the telephone tap LP. There are 30 lines running into the center and the monitors who work on a shift basis, monitor all telephone calls received on all 30 lines. This monitoring is only to determine the importance of the call and in order to make notes and a log for the transcribers. This serves two purposes. First, any extremely valuable information can be detected immediately and action can be taken by the Station or the Mexicans with no time lag. Secondly, it makes the work of the transcribers much easier. They must process all the tapes overnight so that a briefing paper is on the President's desk the next morning outlining all information of value received the previous day through the telephone intercepts. The Station has rehired LIENVOY-8 at a salary of \$240/month. This is the same salary the other monitors receive. LIENVOY-8 had previously resigned after returning to the regular army.
- 3. In addition to hiring a new monitor, the Station has made LTENVOY-5 the Supervisor of the LTENVOY listening post. He has responsibility for 4 monitors and one file clerk. Prior to this time there has been no real supervisor with whom the CIA Staff Agent, Arnold F. AREHART could discuss day-to-day problems in the tap center. He had to wait until LTENVOY-2, the Mexicans' principal representative in the LTENVOY project, was available. LTENVOY-5 has been given a raise

in salary of \$128/month, bringing his total salary new to \$363/month. (Headquarters feels that the addition of the extra monitor and the establishment of a supervisor in the LP are good moves and are worth the additional funds required.

- 4. The history of the LISALAD phase of LIENVOY goes back to the summer of 1966 when the President of Mexico decided that he needed access to a letter intercept program which would give him better results than be had previously gotten through CIA's LIBIGHY/LDAD Program. (The LDAD Program is essentially a unilateral CIA operation, but LIRAMA had adopted the practice of giving LIRAMAK-2 several names of persons whose mail he wished personally to receive). Therefore, in June the President designated LIENVOY-2 and his father, LIELSLAW, to establish a new intercept program. The President authorized the Minister of Communications to cooperate with LIELEGAMT in this endeaver. In preparation for instituting actual mail coverage LEGEGANT selected an individual to conduct a thorough study of the Mexican postal system. While the study has not yet been completed, so far a complete list of subscribers to all post office boxes in Mexico City has been accumulated. LIELEGANT is making available to the Mexico City Station all information he gathers as a result of his survey. LIELEGAM plans to hire several postal inspectors who will personally extract that mail which the President wants. LIENVOY-19, who has previously been used under the LHENVOY Project as a spot informant, is now being hired on a full-time basis to do flaps and seals work and to make copies of all of the intercepted items. CIA will pay LIENVOY-19's new salary of \$240/month. LIELEGANT has rented a small bookstore which LIENVOY-19 will manage. He will actually sell books and stationery items. He will do his rlaps and seals work in the rear of the store where he will also have a copy machine. The copy machine is to be purchased by the Mexicans.
- 5. According to present arrangements the Mexico City Station will receive copies of all the take from the Mexican postal intercept program. LIENVOY-2 will secure the take and will pass to the President those items of interest at the same time he passes a copy of the telephone tap resume each morning. CIA has an opportunity of taking advantage of this letter intercept program for specific coverage if we need.

CUBJECT : LIMINOY Project Amendment

- 1. Americant of the LIENVOY Project is requested for an additional \$5,000 for PY 1967. The Project was last approved for the period 1 February 1966 through 31 January 1967 for a total of \$50,696, \$20,960 for FY 1966 and \$29,738 for FY 1967. This emendment would bring the total project approval to \$55,698. Funds are available within Ti Division.
- 2. The Project amendment to accessory in order to provide for unanticipated expasso revolving around an increase in the telephone tap LP perpendic and the establishment of a new joint letter intercept progress now referred to as LIBALAD. Regarding the first, Honoquerters has recommended for worse time that additional monitors be hired becomes of the lawy workload in the tolophone top LP. There are 30 Mines running into the center and the monitors who work on a shift basis, monitor all telephone calls received on all 30 lines. This monitoring is only to determine the importance of the call and in order to make notes and a leg for the transcribers. This survey two purposes. Secondly, it makes the work of the transcribers much easier. - 3. In eddition to hiring a new monitor, the Station has made LDEWOY-5 the Supervicer of the LESSYOY listening poot. He has responsibility for a memiters and one file clerk. Frier to this time there has been no real supervisor with whom the CIA Staff Agent, Arnold F. AREMANT could discuss day-to-day problems in the tap center. He had to well until LIENYOY-2, the Hexicana principal representative in the LIENYOY project, was available. LIENYOY-5 has been given a reise

in salary of 3123/month, bringing his total salary now to \$363/month. Headquarters feels that the addition of the extra monitor and the establishment of a supervisor in the LP are good moves and are worth the additional funds required.

- 4. The history of the LIEALAD phase of LIEMVLY goes back to the summer of 1966 when the Prosident of Foxico decided that he needed access to a letter intercept program which would give him better results than he had previously gotten through CIA's LIBIGIT/LIMID Frogram. (The LUAD Program is essentially a unilateral CIA operation. but LIMANA had adopted the practice of giving LIMAYAX-2 enveral memos of persons whote mail be wished personally to receive). Therefore, in June the President designated UENVOY-2 and his father, LIELWARD, to ostablish a new intercept program. The President authorized the Minister of Communications to ecoperate with LIZLIDAHI in this endeavor. In preparation for instituting actual mail coverage LUSUAGES TRACELED individual to conduct a thorough study of the !maican postal system. while the study has not yet been completed, so far a complete list of subscribers to all post office boxes in Maxico City has been accumulated. MELECART is making evailable to the Hexico City Station all information he enthere as a recult of his marvey. LIBLEGAST plans to hire several postal inspectors who will personally extract that wail which the Provident wants. LIMFOY-19, who has providenly been used under the LIENVOY Project as a spot informant, is now being hired on a full-time bauls to do flags and scals work and to make regres of all of the intercepted items. CIA will pay LIENVOY-19's how selenty of 62%0/month. Linuxian new remted a small bookstore which LINWOY-19 will some . He will estually call books and stationery items. He will do his flage and seals work in the rear of the store where he will also have a copy eschine. The copy machine is to be purchased by the Maxicans.
- 5. According to present arrangements the Mexico City Station will receive copies of all the take from the Excise postal intercept program. LIENVI-2 will recure the take and will pass to the Excident those items of interest at the same time be passes a copy of the telephone tap resume each parallel. CIA has an opportunity of taking advantage of this latter intercept program for specific coverage if we used.
- 6. No new changes are planted by the Station in the handling of the LINCOLLEGE letter intercept progress.
- 7. WH Division recommends approved of the emandment for an edditional \$5,000 to be used for salaries of LIERWAY-5, LIERWAY-19,

and other expenses such as rest and supplies for the new LICALAD joint letter intercept unit. A cable for your signature is attached informing Mexico City of the approval of the secondary.

4. Brief statement of project aims, character and structure:

The purpose of this project is to provide for joint telephone tap operations run in cooperation with several high Mexican Government officials. This phase of the project is run through a CIA Staff Agent and a Mexican agent who handle the basehouse and the employees there. This Mexican agent also has direct contact with the Station Case Officer. This Project also provides for a channel for direct contact between the COS, Mexico and high government officials. These latter officials are not paid any salary, rotainer, or expenses.

B. Funding Ristory

- 1. The Staif Agent passes money received directly from the Mexico Station to the Mexican principal agent for his own salary and to pay all the Mexican agents their salaries (total salaries average \$2,800/month). Replacement equipment for the tap center is minimal, and money for operational expenses and supplies is given to both the Principal Agent and the Staff Agent directly by the Station. The salary of the Staff Agent is deposited to a U.S. bank account directly by Monetary. He also receives a field allotment and his allowances in the field from the Station.
- Funds have always been handled in this manner. The original equipment was installed by CIA, not paid for by the Mexicans.

SUBJECT: Project LIENVOY Renewal

1. LIENVOT supports the joint telephone taps in Mexico City run in cooperation with high officials in the government. The lines are shared equally--15 targets selected by the station and 15 by the Mexicans. The operation riso provides a channel to the Mexican President.

- 2. This operation is still the largest single producer of positive intelligence at the station. Noteworthy this year among the 176 reports and mass of operational information collected was the product from the six Cubin lines. Indispensable assistance to other operations was provided. Other targets were the Soviets (five lines), NCNA (one). Czech and Polish (two each), plus several CP targets. The staggering amount of nearly 20.000 pages of transcripts were produced in 1965 from this operation.
- 3. The operational intelligence produced by LIENVOY is copies. It is exploited in very active Cuban, Soviet, Sacellite, and Chinese operational programs.
- 4. The LIENTOY Project provides one of two active channels of contact between CIA and the President of Mexico (the other is LITEMPO, the channel through the Mexican security apparatus). Through LIENTOY we pass the President a summary of the day's taps, and the weekly PBBAND summary, which must have a beneficial effect on Mexican foreign policy. The contact has also given the DDP himself two apportunities to brief the President on Latin American strairs, has given us access to all unlisted phone numbers, and has given our Chief of Station direct access to the President on internal security problems. We have trained the President's bodyguard, made him an effective gift of five colorful desk phones, gotten police credentials for two more agents of ours, and generally streagthened the long-standing and intimate friendship between the President and CIA.

- At \$50,698, the project costs \$3300 more than was asked last year, but \$2800 of this is for an additional bilingual monitor to help handle increased production. Operational entertainment is up from \$4000 to \$5000 (including gifts), and QP vehicle maintenance at about \$800 has disappeared.
- 6. FI Staff recommends renewal. This project is, in our view, a model for imitation by others, particularly in the area of efficient processing and exploitation of raw take. Its presentation is excellent.

Provides for joint telephone tap operations run in cooperation with several high Mexican Government officials. There are 30 lines covered, 15 of which are on targets specifically selected by the Station.

PROGRESS: This project continues to be the largest producer of intelligence information for the Station. It is credited with 176 disseminations last year. In addition, requirements for CI/CE information are satisfied by the following taps:

> Cuban Embassy - six lines Soviet Embassy - five lines Czech Embassy - two lines Polish Embassy - two lines New China News Agency - one line Several Rexican Communists

In volume, there was 8,541 reels of raw take which was processed into 19,960 pages of transcripts. The continued success of the Station's operational program against the Cuban, Soviet and Satellite installations and personnel in Mexico is largely attributable to the coverage by this project. In addition to the tap portion of this project, it also provides a channel to the President of Mexico for passage of information and for providing him with appropriate services.

Comments and Recommendations (To go forward to the Division)

- 1. FI/INT/RE files contain 144 positive intelligence disseminations produced by Project LIENVOY and disseminated during the period 1 February 1965 and 31 January 1966. The bulk of the reporting dealt with the Communist Party of Mexico or Communist front activities. There was also reporting on activities of Chinese Communist, Cubant, Soviets, and Eastern European officials in Mexico. A handful of reports dealt with Mexican rightists of the National Sinarchist Union.
- 2. While reporting from this type of operation is necessarily uneven in quality, the production in general provided valuable information on activities of subversive groups and other political elements which oppose the present type of government in Mexico. It is our opinion that LIENVOY coverage of internal subversive activities has showed considerable improvement over previous years.
 - 3. Renewal is recommended.

SUBJECT : Project LIENVOY Renewal

1. Approval is requested of the LIENVOY Project for the period 1 February 1966 through 31 January 1967 for a total of \$50,698; \$20,960 for FY 1966 and \$29,738 for FY 1967. This Project was programmed for \$50,000 for FY 1966, and funds are available within WH Division.

- 2. The LIENVOY Project provides one of two telephone tap operations for the Mexico City Station. LIENVOY is run in cooperation with several high Mexican government officials, and always has coverage of 30 lines, 15 of which are on targets specifically selected by CIA, the other 15 also being of interest but selected by the Mexicans. The LIENVOY Project is an efficient and effective operation, where all the taps run into one center, which has a capability of switching a tap to almost any phone in the city. The connections are made in the main telephone company. LIENVOY is used for all of Mexico City Station's phone coverage except against agents and sensitive intelligence and security targets, which are covered by the unilateral LIFEAT Project.
- 3. The LIENVOY Project is the largest single producer of positive intelligence at the Station. The LIENVOY reports satisfy requirements in the Priority A and Priority B categories of the most recent Related Mission Directive. The subjects covered include Mexican political developments, Mexican Communist and Leftist parties and leaders, and travel and activities of foreign Communists in Mexico or transiting Mexico. Almost all of the intelligence gathered under this Project is not available through other Station assets. From 1 January through 31 December 1965 this Project was the source of 152 positive reports, of which 130 were disseminated. The 22 reports which were not disseminated were considered fragmentary (7), of little or no value (9), overtaken by events (2), or overt (4).

- 4. In addition to positive intelligence, LIENVOY provides information in support of going and proposed operations, as well as a wealth of CE information. Particularly valuable in the last category is the information on Americans, including U.S. servicemen, who have tried to contact the Soviet and Cuban embassies and the NCNA office.
- 5. In addition to the telephone tap portion of LIENVOY, this Project also provides a channel to the President of Mexico, Gustavo Diaz Ordaz, through his special advisor, LIELEGANT, who is the Mexican principal in the Joint telephone tap effort. The Chief of Station is in direct contact with LIELEGANT, and often receives messages from the President via LIELEGANT, or LIELEGANT arranges a personal meeting. It is this channel which is used to pass extracts from the weekly PBBAND summaries to the President. It was also through this channel that many CIA services are made available to the President; i.o., telephones, training of the bodyguard detail, etc. (See paragraph F of the attached Project Outline.) Access to the President is also obtained under the LITEMPO Project.
- 6. WH Division recommends renewal of the LIENVOY Project as presented in the attached renewal request submitted by the Mexico City Station.

PROJECT LIENVOY RENEWAL

A. CURRENT OBJECTIVES

The LIENVOY Project provides for a joint KUBARK-Mexican Government sponsored telephone tap unit and for a non-official liaison relationship with access to the highest ranking government officials of Mexico. The tap unit provides direct support necessary to cover targets and operational programs levied on the Mexico Station via the RMD as well as spot requests from Headquarters and other Stations. This project also produces considerable positive intelligence.

B. CHANGES

(1) Operational Mechanism

The LIENVOY Project was created in late 1958 and put into operation in early 1959 at the request of LITENSOR who appointed LIELEMANT as his special assistant to work with Willard C. CURTIS in the supervision and administration . of the project. In mid-1964 it became evident that LIRAMA would replace LITENSOR in December 1964. (LIRAMA was then LITEMPO-2 and a clandestine liaison contact with Willard C. CURTIS under the LITEMPO Project but was not knowledgeable of the CURTIS/LIELEGANT/LITENSOR relationship in Project LIENVOY.) On 10 August 1964 LIRAMA met with CURTIS and LIELDWAMP and advised them that LITENSOR had. briefed him on the LIENVOY Project in dotail and that it should be continued with the same personnel and the same manner of operation. Both LIELEGANT and LIENVOY-2 were given nominal positions on LIRAMA's staff with cover for daily contact with LIRAMA. Government credentials were also provided for Arnold F. Archart (Staff Agent) as well as the local agents working in the LP. During the past project year, the LP has remained in the same location. Inside the front doorway a credential, provided by LIRAMA, prohibits entry to anyone without special permission obtained from LIRAMA's office.

(2) Agents

There have been no changes in agent personnel during the past two project years; however, for information of reviewing officials not familiar with this project, there is enclosed as Attachment-1, a chart listing current LIENVOY targets as well as the functions of each agent. Staff Agent Arnold F. Archart has been with the project for six years. His duties inside the LP are to maintain the technical equipment and protect KUBARK interest by observing activities of local agents and preventing negligent breakage or loss from theft. There has been no major mechanical breakdown during the past project year. Archart also is there to see that KUBARK gets copies of all transcripts and gets reels on any and all conversations.

C. INTELLIGENCE PRODUCTION

The Chief of Station Mexico considers the LIENVOY project as a valuable source

for positive intelligence on Mexican political figures on Communism and on activities of foreign Communists in Mexico or transitting Mexico. In addition this project assists in satisfying the Station's support requirements for operational data and in providing access to the highest echelons of the Mexican Government.

(1) FI information. From 1 January 1965 through 31 December 1965 this project was the source of 176 positive reports. (Of the 641 positive reports sent by the Mexico Station to Headquarters between 1 January and 31 December 1965, 176 (or 27%) of them came from LIENOY.) The general subject categories within which these reports fall as related to objectives of the most recent RMD (HNMS-4218 dated 27 July 1965) are:

Priority A. 1, 2, 3 and Priority B. 1, 2, and 3.

Cuban Embassy Activities in Mexico
Soviet Embassy Activities in Mexico
Activity of Mexican Government with regard to intentions and
strategy in domestic and foreign affairs
Communist Party of Mexico (PCM) Activities in Mexico
Communist Pront Activities (Movimiento Liberacion Nacional - MLN)
in Mexico
Activities of Communist, Leftist, or outspoken Anti-PEPRIME political
figures
Activities of Communist China representatives in Mexico

(2) CI/CE information. In addition to the general subject categories of FI interest, the LIENVOY Project continues to fulfill a standing requirement to provide CI/CE data on the following selected targets:

Cuban Embassy - six lines Soviet Embassy - five lines Chinese Communist News Agency (NCNA) - one line Czech Embassy - two lines Polish Embassy - two lines Several Mexican Communists

Of the above covarage, neither the Czech nor the Polish Embassy targets are listed as a priority in the Intest Related Mission Directive. They are covered for possible leads into the Soviet Embassy intelligence activity.

D. EFFECTIVENESS

(1) During the past year (1 January 1965 through December 1965) the LIENVOY Project covered a total of 30 (thirty) targets simultaneously which provided 8.541 reels of raw take. This was processed into 19.960 pages of transcripts (of this amount actual count by LIENVOY processors was 14.460 pages, an estimate by the outside Czech translator was 1.500 pages, the Russian translator 2.000 pages, and the Polish translator 1.000). Enclosed as attachment number 2 is the 1965 Work Load Log for LIENVOY by month and target. Since this includes only the

work done inside the LP, total figures vary according to additional work done by other Station (unilateral) agents.

- (2) (a) Mexican Targets. Of the 30 lines covered, at least 15 of them are always exclusively for KUBARK the remaining targets are selected by LIRAMA but are also of definite interest to KUBARK as sources of positive and CE/CI intelligence. The Mexican targets covered during the past project year were:

While the above lines were covered at various times during the past project year, the LIENVOY intercept center has the capability of connecting machines to any line which has been covered in the past since once a tap is made running the line into the center, it stays there after the machines have been put on other targets.

The reels from the above targets are not transcribed completely. LIENVOY monitors extract significant conversations and include them in a daily "resumen", the original of which is read daily by LIRAMA and a copy of which is delivered each morning to the Mexico Station. The reels are retained for about ten days for fuller transcripts if requested by LIRAMA or by the Mexico Station. The "resumen" is typed in four copies at the end of each day (covering conversations which occurred that day). On the following morning by 0800 hours, one copy is hand-carried by LIRAMA. At the same time, Arnold F. AREHART delivers a copy to Robert B. RIGGS for delivery to Willard C. CURTIS. A third copy is delivered to LIELEMANT by LIELWOY-2. The fourth copy is retained in a chronological file in the intercept center.

- (b) KUBARK Targets. The KUBARK targets have been limited mainly to CI/CE requirements. These include the Cuban Embassy, Soviet Embassy, Czech Embassy, Polish Embassy, and the Communist Chinese News Agency (MCNA). There follows selected significant examples of the LIENOY product from each of these targets with a Station appraisal of its effectiveness.
 - 1. Cuban Embassy. The six lines covered are:
 - 14 42 37 The Ambassador's private telephone
 - 25 07 95 The Chancery
 - 14 15 26 The Chancery
 - 25 09 14 The Commercial Office
 - 11 28 47 The Consulate
 - 25 07 77 Elena Vasquez Gomez

The Chancery and Consulate lines regularly identify foreigners in Mexico who contact the Cuban Embassy. Reels are usually transcribed within one day of the conversation; however, if the caller nappens to be a U.S. citizen, the transcripts are prepared immediately which frequently permits the Station to arrange for unilateral surveillance and identification of the persons involved. The Commercial Office coverage provides information on Cuban Commercial activities in Mexico and identification of firms doing tusiness with Cuba.

The Elena Vasquez Gomez target was connected to support the sensitive AMROD operation. The AMROD Headquarters Case Officer, Thomas G. URQUHART (ps) visits Maxico once a month on temporary duty in connection with this operation. His comments on this project are:

"The LIENVOY Project continued through 1965 to be of great importance to the conduct of the AMROD and certain related Operations. It enabled case officers to know which of the PERIMEN target personalities were in town, who their contacts were and gave an insight into the operational situation that affected AMROD. The LICLOVE-1 phase of this operation was of particular value in giving an inside fully documentary view of opposition efforts to counter certain phases of the AMROD operation and helped planning the tactical moves in the LICLOVE operation itself. LIENVOY, thus has contributed materially to our handling of the tactical phases of an important operation and has given valuable intelligence information concerning various phases thereof."

The six lines against the Cuban target are fully transcribed by LIENVOY transcribers and delivered by Arnold F. ARSHART to Robert B. RIGGS each morning. Lengthy conversations senetimes require additional time for transcription. A carbon copy of each transcription is peached weekly to Headquarters for use of WH/C. The original is retained by the Mexico Station. A third copy is retained in the intercept center chronological files. LIRAMA does not read these transcripts unless some significant item appears in the "resumen" which causes him to ask to see a fuller transcript or to listen to the tape.

Coverage of the Cuban Embassy target yields a good picture of daily activities, residences, personal habits and weaknesses of Cuban official personnel in Mexico. This is used by Station Case Officers in selection of targets for recruitment and in checking on activities of agents already recruited who are working inside the target or who are in contact with Cuban officials.

- 2. Soviet Embassy. The Soviet Government has over fifty officials permanently stationed in Mexico (the largest foreign embassy except for the U.S.). Thirty-five of these Soviets (70 percent of the staff) are known or suspect intelligence officers. The five lines under LIENVOY provide details on the activities of most of these Soviets. These lines are:
- 15 60 55 Soviet Consulate and Chancery. This line is used by fifteen known or suspect KOB officers. It is also used by foreigners in Mexico attempting to make contact with the Soviets. When the contacts suggest clandestine meetings, the Station arranges for unilateral surveillance and has identified many contacts in this manner.
- 15 61 55 Soviet Chancery. This line is used primarily by the Ambassador and provides more information on protocol contacts than leads of intelligence interest. However, it gives the Station a picture of the personalities being cultivated by Soviet diplomats and of

Mexicans who are seeking contact with the Soviets.

- officers use this number. They are Military intelligence officers use this number. They are Military intelligence officers using Commercial Office cover and in some instances actually performing commercial functions or trade negotiations. The volume of trade between Mexico and the USSR does not justify a Commercial Office staff of ten (10) Soviets. The Mexico Station has had some success in running double agents against these OHU officers. LIENVOY provides a heightly check on these operations. The take from LIENVOY also identifies the OHU officers as escorts for trade, scientific, commercial and tourist delegations who continue to travel between the USSR and Mexico, either on visits to Mexico or to and from other latin American countries. Once these groups arrive in Mexico, their itineraries usually become available LIENVCY.
- 15 12 64 Soviet Films Office. This leads into the residence and office of the distributor for Soviet Commercial Films in Nexico who is a suspect intelligence officer. There have been a number of calls suggesting clandestine contact with Central Americans but the Station has not yet been successful in identifying the callers.
- 15 69 87 Soviet Military Attache. This continues to be the least productive of the coverage in terms of volume because the Soviet Military officers either will not answer the telephone or spend very little time where it rings. It is usually the number called by U.S. AWOL servicemen trying to make contact with the Soviets, and by other Americans who for see reason or another want to work for the Soviets or go to the USSR. There are three (3) GRU colonels and six (6) civilian GRU officers who use this line.

The Soviet information is transcribed by the LIZIVOY transcribers in the same way as the Cuban traffic except that the reels also contain a considerable volume of Russian language conversations. This requires that the reels be picked up daily and delivered to an outside (unilateral) translation (Staff Agent Douglas J. FIENGLASS) who translates the Russian conversations into English. From these transcripts it is apparent that the Soviets are not aware that their conversations in Russian are being overheard and understood. These daily exchanges between the Soviets and their wives (who also work in the Embassy) provide a good picture of personal habits, grievances, marriage relationships, and weaknesses of targets of interest to KUBARK.

3. Czech Emossy. Two lines in the Chancery (45 30 91 and 5 30 12) are covered by LIENVOY. Reels from these targets are delivered daily by ARDIANT to RIGGS who delivers them to the EE Case Officer who arranges for transcription and translations to be done by David B. SCHLADHTER, field contract agent. This agent also prepares a monthly summary of information on the activities of Czech officials in Mexico. This Embassy has a staff of thirty-six (36) officials of whom eleven (11) are known or suspect intelligence criticers. LIENVOY has provided the great bulk of operational intelligence on this Embassy, its personnel and activities in Mexico. Although no exploitable Activities

whave come to the Station's attention during the past year, this coverage has provided invaluable basic information on the target.

- 4. Polish Embassy. LIENVIY covers two lines in this Embassy. One of them (11 25 49) is in the main Chancery. The other (25 32 33) is the private line of the Polish Commercial Counsolor. These reels are delivered daily by AREMART to RIGGS who delivers them to the EE case officer who arranges for translations and transcriptions to be done by Louise B. INAMASIC (ps), a contract employee who prepares a monthly summary of information obtained from this coverage. This Embassy has a staff of twelve (12) officials of whom seven (7) are known or suspect intelligence officers. LIENVOY has provided a considerable amount of operational intelligence on this Embassy and their Commercial Office in Maxico. Invaluable information has been obtained rescribing the relationships between various Polish officials. LIENVOY also provides a very valuable check on various access agents who are in contact with Polish officials. Practically all leads to access agents in this field have originated with the LIENVOY Project.
- 5. Communist China News Agency (NCNA). Three representatives of the Communist China News Agency are in Mexico. As a result of a briefing of LIRAMA by Williard C. CURTIS on 18 December 1964, LIRAMA requested coverage of the line which goes into a building used by these Chinese as a combination residence and office. This information has been useful for travel data, identification of contacts of the Chinese Communists in Mexico and some background on the three Chinese news representatives. Using leads from this source, several unsuccessful efforts have been made to place a Chinese speaker in touch with one of the three Chinese newsmen to make a cold approach (during international travel from Mexico to London).

The Mexico Station Case Officers responsible for established FI and CI/CS programs feel that LIENVOY has mad, a very necessary intelligence support contribution. The facilities of this project, due to centralized tapping and transcribing, sentime to produce three times the volume of raw audio and finished intelligence as LIFEAT at approximately one half the cost. As a semi-official lisison tap operation, LIENVOY continues to be able to place a tap on any phone desired whereas LIFEAT, as a unilateral operation, does not always have immediate access to a desired target. The continued success of Station Mexico's operational program against the Cuban, Soviet and Soviet Satellite installations and personnel in Mexico is largely attributable to the continuous and thereugh coverage of these targets by this project. Chief of Station, Mexico, recommends that the project be renewed for another year as an essential collection and support operation for the Mexico Station.

S. PROBLEMS

There have been no significant security, cover, control, or liaison problems during the project year.

F. LIAISON

This Project encompasses an unofficial liaison relationship with high-level

Merican government officials and contributes to the friendly attitudes of these officials toward ODYCKE. Some examples of this liaison are:

- a) Chester D. DAINOLD (ps), Cedric T. FAFATS (ps) and KENNETH H. LEMENTING (ps) came to Mexico on TDY from 30 January to 3 February 1965 and met with LIRAMA on 1 February 1965 to give him a briefing on the political situation in Central America and to provide technical guidance in the selection of sensitive inks for LIRAMA use.
- b) At the request of Willard C. CURTIS, LIRAM instructed a high official in the telephone company on 2 February 1905 to make available unlisted telephone numbers for two of his agents to copy. The two agents were LIENVOY agents from the LP who had been instructed in the use of a miniature camera. Headquarters subsequently provided the Mexico Station with a reverse listing of these numbers.
- c) In March 1965 Willard C. CURTIS visited LIRANA to discuss a possible Mexican Government PNO operation against an official of the Soviet Embassy in Mexico who was known by the Mexico Station to be conducting espionage operations involving a Mexican citizen.
- d) In early May LIRAMA asked via LIELEGANT for a physical security specialist to conduct a survey of LIRAMA offices and make recommendations for improvement of the security of these premises. Headquarters provided the services of Clarence G. PANKNIN (ps) on TDY for the period 16 May 2 June 1965. As a result of this survey, and at the request of LIRAMA, three LIRAMA bodyguards were sent to PEPRIME for special training.
- e) In late May 1965 the Mexico Station passed names of 14 Chinese Communist basketball players to LIRAMA via LISIEGANT and asked that these players be denied visas to enter Mexico. As a result, LITEMPO-S (acting on instructions from LIRAMA) denied them visas to transit Mexico.
- f) At the request of LIRAMA, Headquarters provided special telephones for the five lines in LIRAMA's private offices.
- g) At the request of Willard C. CUNTIS to LIRAMA, two agents under the LIFIRE Project were given special credentials in July 1905 which documented them as being on assignment from LIRAMA's offices. These credentials give these agents access to important travel control data from the international airport.
- h) In September 1965 two representatives of KURICT visited Mexico and trained LIRAMA in the use of a highly sensitive writing medium.
- Beginning on 1 September 1965, Philip G. NUPATT (ps), KUBARK specialist, spent ninety days in Mexico training LIRAMA's Security Forces.
- j) In December 1965 LIRAMA asked for a KUBARK briefing on the political situation in Central America which might be helpful prior to his visit



to those countries in early 1966. On 18 December Chester D. DAINOLD (ps) and Stefan LABANOW (ps) came to Mexico and met with LIRAMA on 20 December. DAINOLD conducted the briefing with LABANOW acting as interpreter.

O. DITER-AGENCY COORDINATION.

No formal coordination is required in this Project. Chief, PESWINJ, Mexico, is the only ODYCKE official in Mexico outside KUHARK who is aware of this project and its provision for a special channel to LIRAMA. CURTIS advises Chief, PESWING of significant and pertinent subjects which are discussed in meetings between CURTIS and LIRAMA. LIRAMA does not know that Chief, PESWING knows of LIENVUT or CURTIS contacts with LIRAMA; he has repeatly specifically requested that no one in ODACID know of either.

H. PLANS.

The Station plans to continue the intercept program without change for the next project year. As previously noted, LIRAMA has asked that the project continue without change in personnel or in the manner of operation.

I. FUNDS.

1. For the past period.

The cost of the LIENVOY Project (paid by the Mexico Station exclusive of Headquarters costs) from 1 February 1964 through 30 June 1965 was approximately US\$ 20,000 and from 1 July 1965 through 31 January 1966 another \$27,000 is estimated.

2. During the next project year.

During the period 1 February 1966 through 31 January 1967, an estimated amount of US\$ 50,698.00 will be required with US\$ 20,960 to be spent in FY 66 and the remaining \$ 21,738 in FY 67. This represents an increase of approximately US\$ 3,830 over the last project year. This is needed to cover the increasing cost of entertainment and gifts for Mexican officials plus a salary estimate of US\$ 2,880 for an additional English/Spanish translator/monitor.



SUBJECT

Project LIENVOY

The LIENVOY Project is submitted for renewal in the amount of \$47,468, which is approximately the same amount allocated for this project last year. The project covers a joint telephone tap operation with the GOM and also provides the COS with unofficial access to the highest GOM officials, including President DIAZ Ordas. The telephone tap operation is extremely complex, involving four outside case officers who handle translations and transcriptions, 10 assets plus a case officer in the LP, and covering 30 lines. CIA directs the placement of one half of these taps, and our coverage is directed against Cuban, Soviet, and Satellite installations and personalities. These taps produced almost 150 disseminated intelligence reports last year, plus a vast amount of CI/CE data on these targets, which are of the highest Station priority. It is perhaps of interest to note that this project produced about three times the volume of raw audio take as LIGEAT, our unilateral telephone tap operation, at only about one half the cost. The Station renewal request provides an excellent detailed breakdown of the mechanics of this operation and of the individual targets covered.

2. In an operation as involved as this there are obviously a lot of areas where problems could crop up. One particular possibility is LIENVOY-2, the son of LIELEGANT. LIELEGANT is DIAZ's principal advisor on intelligence and security matters and he works closely with the COS on this project. LIENVOY-2 was inserted to run the LP at LIELEGANT's direction and there apparently is nothing that we can do about it. LIENVOY-2 is apparently thoroughly corrupt, more of a burden in the LP operation than anything else, and generally a dangerous person with whem to be operationally involved. However, the Desk feels that his father, with whom our relations have been excellent, will keep LIENVOY-2 in line.

- 3. This operation was highly praised by reviewing Headquarters echelons last year and no major changes or setbacks have occured since that time. President DIAZ Ordas has personally asked that the operation be continued with the same personnel and modus operandi, and his satisfaction with this project provided the ancillary benefit of helping to establish excellent personal rapport between the COS and him. Although several high-level GOM officials are aware of this operation, there is no evidence that there has been any compromise to any of the targets monitored.
- 4. Recommend that Project LIENVOY renewal be approved.

PURPOSE: To provide a joint CIA-Mexican Government telephone tap operation and a non-official liaison relationship with

access to highest ranking government officials of Mexico.

PROGRESS: From 1 Feb 1964 through Dec 1964 the LIENVOY project covered a total of 30 targets simultaneously which provided 7,462 reels of raw take. Of the lines covered, fifteen were exclusively for CIA. The top CE targets are the Soviets, Cubans, Satellites and Chicoms. Through this coverage we have learned of several attempts of U.S. citizens to contact the Soviet Embassy or the Cuban Embassy. Costa Rican concurrence to an approach by the Czech Government to open an Embassy in Costa Rica was uncovered by LIENVOY. This move by the Czechs was thwarted through the efforts of the U.S. Department of State. While the greatest value of LIENVOY lies in the channel it provides to the Presidency and the CI/CE information it provides, the positive intelligence production is greater than that of any other source of the Station.

Project LIENVOY Renewal

1. Approval is requested of the LIENVOY Project for the period 1 February 1965 through 31 January 1966, For a total of \$47,468; \$19,010 for FY 1965 and \$28,458 for FY 1966. This project was programmed for \$50,000 for FY 1965, and funds are available within WI Division.

- 2. The LIENVOY Project provides one of two telephone tap capabilities for the Mexico City Station (the other one being LIFEAT which is unilateral) and one of two unofficial liaison projects with top level Government officials. While the Government officials differ between this Project and Project LITEMPO, LIRAMA can be reached through both projects. LIELEGANT, who is the principal Mexican in Project LIENVOY, has been named by LIRAMA as his Consejere Principal (Principal Adviser) on intelligence and security matters. LIRAMA plans to work closely with LIELEGANT on the various aspects of Project LIENVOY to ensure its continued success. Examples of useful liaison through LIENVOY to top Government officials is set forth by the Station in paragraph "F" on page 8 of their renewal request.
- 3. The telephone tap aspect of this project provides very valuable information in connection with the C1/CE program of the Mexico City Station. The top CE targets are the Soviets, Cubans, Satellites and Chicoms. Through our coverage of the Soviets, KUBARK and ODYOKE has learned of several attempts of U.S. citizens or known intelligence agents to contact the Soviet Embassy in Mexico City. Upon identification of the persons involved, our Station has worked closely with the FBI and top U.S. Government offices in investigating any possible threats these contacts may have on the security of the U.S. Government. U.S. citizens have also been identified attempting to contact the Cuban Embassy.

- 4. LIENVOY is an extremely productive positive intelligence project. Its main importance in the intelligence field is its capability of providing indications of the plans and the intentions of the people who form its target. Perhaps one of the most important pieces of intelligence gathered from LIENVOY during 1964 occurred on 15 July 1964 when it was learned that the Costa Rican Government had concurred in an approach by the Czech Government to open an Embassy in Costa Rica. Although it appeared recognition had already taken place, this Agency through its high-level Government contacts and the Department of Sate through the Ambassador to the Costa Rican President, were successful in thwarting this attempt by the Czechs. In August the Foreign Minister told our Ambassador that Costa Rica was not considering diplomatic recognition of Czechoslovakia.
- 5. The project's limitations, from the intelligence point of view are twofold: (1) the significance of fragmentary conversations is not always apparent, and (2) telephone lines do not accept follow-up requirements. According to Headquarters records, production figures in 1964 were as follows:

LIENVOY tap: Total Pouched Reports - 156
Not Disseminated - 49

Total Cabled Reports - 50 Not Disseminated - 9

The subjects of these reports were on Cuban activities in Mexico and developments in Cuba; Communist and leftist personalities in Mexico; Soviet and Satellite activities in Mexico. Reports originating from agents under the project are as fellows:

LIENVOY-1: 2 reports on Mexican Government officials.

LIENVOY-2: 9 reports (4 not disseminated), on Mexican Communist and Communist front organizations, and rightist organizations.

LIEMVOY-19: 1 report on Communist front organizations.

6. One customer evaluation was requested during the last year on a report on a Communist front organization. The report was considered by the State Department to be of moderate value and useful as new information.

7. While the greatest value of the LIENVOY Project undoubtedly lies in the channel it provides to LIRAMA and the CI/CE information it provides, the intelligence product is also of value as evidenced by the fact it produces more positive reports than any other source of the Mexico City Station. It is hoped that the processing of the raw material can be improved so that marginal reporting which resulted in the large number of undisseminated reports will soon disappear. The LIENVOY take also provides a very important support mechanism for checking on other reports received from independent sources, and for following developments related to certain operational activity of the Station.

S. Wil Division recommends renewal of the LIENVOY Project as presented in the attached renewal request submitted by the Mexico City Station.

PROJECT LIENVOY RENEWAL

A. CURRENT OBJECTIVES

The LIENVOY Project provides for a joint KUBARK-Mexican Covernment sponsored telephone tap unit and for a non-official liaison relationship with access to the highest ranking government officials of Mexico. The tap unit provides direct support necessary to cover targets and operational programs levied on the Mexico Station via the RMD as well as spot requests from Headquarters and other Stations. This Project also produces positive intelligence.

B. CHANCES

(1) Operational Mechanism

The LIENVOY Project was created in late 1958 and put into operation in early 1959 at the request of LITEMEOR who appointed LIELEGAMT as his special assistant to work with Willard C. CURTIS in the supervision and administration of the project. In mid-1964 it became evident that LIRAMA would replace LITENSOR in December 1964. (LIRAMA was then LITTMIO-2 and a clandestine liaison contact with Willard C. CURTIS under the LITEMPO Project but was not knowledgeable of the CURTIS/LIELEGANT/LITENSOR relationship in Project LIENVOY.) On 10 August 1964 LIRAMA (LITEMPO-2) asked CUNTIS and LIELEGANT for a conference (reported to Headquarters in MEXI-0521 dated 10 August 1964). At this meeting, LIRAMA advised that LITENSOR had briefed him on the LIENVOY Project in detail and that it should be continued with the same personnel and wanner of operation. LIELEGANT and LIENVOY-2 have been given nominal positions which provide cover for daily reports to LIRAMA. Covernment credentials are also being provided for Staff Agent Arnold F. AREHART and the local agents working in the LP. LIRAMA has requested that the LP remain in its present location and has provided a credential for the inside of the front doorway which prohibits entry to anyone without special permission obtained from his office.

(2) Agents

During the last project year there have been no changes in the agent personnel. For the information of reviewing officials there is enclosed as Attachment-1, a chart listing current LIENVOY targets as well as functions of LIENVOY agents. Arnold F. AREHART, Staff Agent, has been responsible for maintenance of the technical equipment for the past five years. His work continues to be outstanding and accounts for the fact that after almost six years use, the equipment is in good working order and has sustained a minimum of loss through negligent breakage or theft (both very common in Mexico). There has been no major mechanical breakdown since AREHART has been supervising the maintenance of the equipment.

C. INTELLIGENCE PRODUCTION

While telephone tap operations are commonly classified as "support operations", the LIENVOY Project by nature of some of its targets, has produced considerable

positive intelligence. It has been reviewed both at Headquarters and in the Mexico Station as one of the most productive telephone tap projects in KURARK of both FI and CI/CE information.

(1) FI information. From 1 February 1904 through 31 December 1964, this project was the source of 240 positive reports. The general subject categories within which these reports fall as related to objectives of the most recent RMD (HMMS-3190 dated 21 October 1963) are:

Priority A. 1, 2, 3, and Priority B. 1, 2, and 4.

Cuban Embassy Activities in Mexico

Soviet Embassy Activities in Mexico

Activity of Mexican Government with regard to intentions and strategy in domestic and foreign affairs

Communist Party of Mexico (PCM) Activities in Mexico

Communist Pront Activities (Novimiento Liberacion Nacional - MLN) in Nexico

Activities of Communist, Leftist, or outspoken Anti-PEPRIME political rigures

Activities of Communist China recresentatives in Mexico

(2) CI/CE information. In addition to the general subject categories of PI interest, the LIENVOY Project fulfills a standing requirement to provide CI/CE data on the following selected targets: Cuban Embassy - six lines; Soviet Embassy - five lines; Czech Embassy - two lines; Polish Embassy - 2 lines; Yugoslav Embassy - two lines (disconnected in April 1964); and the Communist Chinese News Agency (NCNA) - one line (being installed as of January 1965).

D. EFFECTIVENESS

- (1) From 1 February 1964 through December 1964 (eleven months) the LIENVOY Project covered a total of 30 (thirty) targets simultaneously which provided 7,462 reels of raw take. This was processed into 21,564 pages of transcripts (of this amount actual count by LIENVOY processors was 17,064 pages, an estimate by the outside Clech translator was 1,560 pages, Russian translator 2,000 pages, and Polish translator 1,000). Enclosed as Attachment-2 is a copy of the work load log and list of targets which Arnold F. AREHART provides the Station on a monthly basis. This log, of course, includes only the work done inside the LP and variance of monthly figures is accounted for by additional work done by other Station (unilateral) translators.
- (2) (a) Mexican Targets. Of the 30 lines covered, 15 of them are always exclusively for KUBARK. The remaining targets are selected by LIRAMA but are usually of interest to KUBARK as sources of positive intelligence. The Mexican targets covered during the past project year were:

Of the 19 targets listed above, 15 were covered simultaneously depending upon Mexican interest in the individual at the time; however, lines to all the above run into the intercept center and can be connected as machines become available when other lines are out of order or disconnected for one reason or another.

The reels from the above targets are not transcribed completely, LIENVOY monitors extract significant conversations and include them in the "resumen" the original of which is read daily by LIRAMA and a copy of which is delivered daily to the Mexico Station. The reels are retained usually for ten days for fuller transcripts if requested by the Mexicon consumers of the "resumen" or by the Mexico Station. The "resumen" is typed in four copies at the end of each day (covering conversations which occurred that day). On the following morning by OCOO bours, one copy is hand-carried by LIENVOY-2 to LIRAMA. At the same time, Arnold F. AREHART delivers a copy to Robert B. RICGS for delivery to Willard C. CURTIS. A third copy is delivered to LIELEGART by LIENVOY-2. The fourth copy is retained in a chronological file in the intercept center.

(b) XUBARK Targets. The Mexico Station CI/CE requirement is partially fulfilled by LIENVOY which during the past project year covered the telephone lines of the Cuban Embassy, Soviet Embassy, Crech Embassy, Polish Embassy, Yugoslav Embassy, and made preliminary installation for the Communist Chinese News Agency (NCNA). There follows selected significant examples of the LIENVOY product from each of these targets with a Station appraisal of its effectiveness.

The Chancery and Consulate lines regularly identify foreigners in Mexico who contect the Cuban Embassy. Expeditious processing of the transcripts frequently permits the Station to arrange for unilateral surveillance and identification of other contacts. The Commercial Office coverage provides information on Cuban Commercial activities in Mexico and identification of firms dealing with Cuba.


The Elena Vasquez Gomez target has been of interest in connection with the ANROD operation. The ANROD Headquarters Case Officer, Thomas

G. URQUHART (ps), presently in Mexico on temporary duty has provided the Station with the following evaluation of the LIENVOY "The LIENVOY production on the Cuban Embassy traffic in Mexico City has been one of the basic elements contributing to the success of the AMROD operation, directed against the CUIS for CA purposes. The LIENVOY operation has been of value in two general senses: a. The documentary material derived from the texts has formed some of the basis for reconstruction of historical facts needed for the operation. b. The day to day coverage has enabled the case officer on the AMROD operation to sense the climate inside the target, to keep track of the movements of key opposition personnel, to check on the bona fides of certain exents, to check the work of others for veracity and to live monitor portions of the reactions to the AMROD operation itself. Being able to keep track of the shifts and movements of the opposition and their personal relations has been of vital importance to this operation. On two occasions the AMROD Case Officer also used the LIETVOY base as his command post when engineering personal contacts between a KUBARK staffer and the opposition. This type of close support did much to determine the success of those meetings and contributed greatly to the success of the operation. These transcripts provide one of the best sounding boards for the AMROD operation and are regularly forwarded to me at Headquarters.

The six lines above are fully transcribed by LTEWOY transcribers and delivered by AREMART to RIGGS each morning. Lengthy conversations sometimes require an additional day for transcription. A carbon copy is pouched weekly to Headquarters for WH/SA use. The original is retained by the Mexico Station. A third copy is retained in the intercept center chronological files. LIRAMA does not read these transcripts unless some significant item appears in the "resumen" which causes him to ask for a fuller transcript or listen to the tape.


The coverage of this target also yields a good picture of daily activities, residences, personal habits and weaknesses of Cuban official personnel in Mexico. This is used by Station Case Officers in selection of targets for recruitment and in checking on activities of agents already recruited and either working for or in contact with Embassy officials.

2. Soviet Embassy. The Soviet Government has over fifty officials permanently stationed in Mexico (the largest foreign embassy except for the U.S.). Thirty-four of these Soviets (almost 70 percent of the staff) are known or suspect intelligence officers. The five lines under LIENVOY provide details on the activities of most of these Soviets. The lines are:




- 15 to 55 Soviet Consulate and Chancery. This line is used by fifteen (15) known or suspect KGB officers. It is also used by foreigners in Mexico attempting to make contact with the Soviets. When contacts suggest clandestine meetings, the Station arranges for unilateral surveillance and has had some success in identifying contacts.
- 15 61 55 Soviet Chancery. This line is used primarily by the Ambassador and provides more information on protocol contacts than leads of intelligence interest. However, it gives the Station a picture of the personalities being cultivated by Soviet diplomats and of Mexicans who are seeking contacts with the Soviets.
- officers use this number. They are Military intelligence officers using Commercial Office cover and in some instances actually perform commercial functions of trade negotiations but the volume of trade between Mexico and the USSR does not justify a Commercial Office staff of eight (8) Soviets. This produces some information useful to check on double agent operations run by the Station against the GRU officers. In addition, the LIENVOY product usually identifies the GRU officers as escorts for trade, scientific, commercial, and tourist delegations who now are constantly on trips from the USSR to Mexico. LIENVOY also provides details of the itineraries of these groups once they arrive in Mexico.
- 15 12 64 Soviet Films Office. This leads into the residence and office of Vladimir Petrovich OERUBOV, a suspect GRU officer, who distributes Soviet Commercial Films in Mexico. There have been several calls from what appear to be Central Americans but the Station has not been successful in identifying the callers or determining the nature of the calls.
- 15 69 87 Soviet Military Attache. This is the least productive of the coverage simply because the Soviet Military officers either won't answer the telephone or spend very little time where it rings. Nevertheless, U.S. AWOL servicemen try this number to make contact. There are three GRU colonels and six (6) civilian ORU officers who use this line.

The Soviet information is transcribed by the LIETVOY transcribers in the same way as the Cuban traffic except that the transcripts are delivered daily with the reels from which an outside translator (Douglas J. FEINGLASS) transcribes the Russian conversations into English. These Russian conversations are of considerable value and it is apparent that the Soviets are not aware that these conversations are being overheard and understood. There have been conversations identifying code room personnel; one conversation between two Soviet children revealed the entire layout of the Soviet Commercial Office; personality clashes and prievances are also aired.



In June 1964 the SR Division made available personnel for temporary duty in Mexico to analyze and collate personality and background data collected by LIENOY but which had accumulated in Station files on Soviet officials. These Soviet Personality Reports (SPR) should be useful on a world-wide basis as Soviet officials are transferred from post to post, in providing the KUDMRK representative with a summary of the Soviet's past work pattern, intelligence activities as far as known, physical description, weaknesses, and vulnerability toward recruitment by a Western service. Not all but a large percentage of this data is received from LIENVOY.

- 3. Czech Embassy. Two lines in the Chancery (45-30-)1 and 45-30-12) are covered by LIENOY. Reels from these targets are delivered daily by AREMART to RIGGS who delivers them to the EE Case Officer who arranges for transcription and translations to be done by David B. SCHLAGHTER, field contract agent. This agent also prepares a monthly summery of information on the activities of Czech officials in Mexico. During September 1964 LIENVOY revealed important information on the establishment of a factory equipped with Czech machinery to produce dyes in Mexico (ANYL MEX). In addition to the significance of this information in assessing Czech economic activities in Mexico, there was operational benefit in dealing with DISOBER, a Czech official on temporary duty in Mexico in connection with the opening of this factory.
- 4. Polish Embassy. LIENVOY covers one line (11 25 hg) in the main Chancery which produces data on the activities of Folish officials stationed in Mexico. The second line (25 82 36) is the private line of Polish Commercial Counselor, Czeslaw SLOWAKIEWIEZ, in whom the Mexico Station has a definite operational interest as a recruitment target. Reels (without transcripts) from these targets are delivered daily by AREHART to RICGS who delivers them to the EK Case Officer who arranges for translations and transcriptions to be done by Norma Q. RYMINSKY, a contract employee.
- 5. Yugoslav Embassy. During part of the project year LIENVOY covered two lines in this Embassy. The lines were disconnected by LIENVOY in April 1964 and transferred to LIFFAT. The reason for this termination was to conceal interest in DMPETAL, an agent recruited as a result of a follow-up of a lead supplied through LIENVOY coverage. Puring the time this target was covered, LIENVOY transcribers provided transcriptions of the Spanish conversations. The reels were then delivered to Victor W. OHOLD, a career agent who provided translations.
- 6. Communist China News Agency (NCNA). On 18 December 1964 Willard C. CUETIS briefed LIRAMA on the presence in Mexico of representatives of Communist China using journalist cover for an intelligence mission. LIRAMA agreed to install LIETNOY coverage of this line and share the take with the Mexico Station. This will be a Mexican line and replace the present coverage of the D.F.S. The Station hopes to use this information to influence LIRAMA to declare these persons persona non grata. LIFEAT has been taken off of this target.



In summary, the Station Case Officers responsible for established FI and CI/CE programs feel that LIFNVOY has made a very necessary intelligence support contribution. It should be noted that LIFNVOY facilities during the project year produced about three times the volume of raw audio take as that produced by LIFEAT over the same length of time at approximately one half the cost. This is possibly due to the centralized tapping and transcribing facilities of LIENVCY as compared with the widely scattered ones of LIFEAT. LIENVOY as a liaison tap operation is able to tap any phone desired whereas LIFEAT, as a unilateral operation, must take greater security precautions. The Chief of Station Nexico feels that the success of Station Nexico's operational program against the Cuban, Soviet and Soviet Satellite installations and personnel in Mexico is largely attributable to the continuous and thorough coverage of these targets provided by LIFINOY. COS recommends that the project be renewed for another year as an essential collection and support operation for the Mexico Station.

E. PROBLEMS

There have been no significant security, cover, control, or liaison problems during the project year.

F. LIAISON

This Project continues to encompass an unofficial liaison relationship with high-level Mexican government officials and contributes to the friendly attitude of these officials toward ODYOKE.

Some examples are:

- a). In January 1964 CURTIS met with LITENSOR to discuss Communist China and was told by LTTENSOR that the Mexican Government would not recognize Red China during his administration.
- b). CURTIS had several meetings with LIELEGANT during April 1964 when LIELEGANT provided information from LITENSOR on Communist agitation throughout Mexico.
- c). In August 1964 CURTIS and LIELECANT met with LIRAMA to discuss the continuation of the LIENVOY Project.
- d). In September 1964 CURTIS at the request of Chief, PRSWING, saw LIRAMA to deliver an invitation to visit the home of GPLOGIC. Several other meetings were held between CURTIS and LIRAMA prior to this trip.
- e). On 7 November 1964 Chester D. DAINOLD and Cedric B. PAPATE accompanied CURTIS to a meeting with LIRAMA where DAINOLD and PAPATE gave briefings on the Cuban situation and on Latin America. Full details of these briefings were reported to Headquarters in HMMA-24700 RYBAT detail 9 November 1964.

- f). On 9 December 1964 LIRAMA asked CURTIS for assistance in providing a special ink for the exclusive use of LIRAMA in signing important documents. Headquarters KURIOT fulfilled this request by supplying the ink and sending a specialist to Mexico to instruct LIRAMA in its use.
- g). On 16 December 1964 CURTIS met with LIRAMA and provided him with information on Cuban Embassy activities and association with members of Mexican universities, Personalities in the S.N.T.E. and pro-Cuban associations, Capture of guerrillas, arms and documents in Guatemala, Chinese Communists in Mexico, and Communist Activities in Chihuahua. Copies of information given to LIRAMA were pouched to Headquarters.

G. INTER-AGENCY COORDINATION.

No formal coordination is required in this Project. Chief, PECWING, Mexico, is the only ODYOKE official in Mexico outside KUEARK who is aware of this project and its provision for a special channel to LIRAMA. Special briefings are cleared with PESWING before KUEARK representatives meet with LIRAMA. CURTIS advises Chief, PESWING of significant and pertinent subjects which are discussed in meetings between CURTIS and LIRAMA.

H. PLANS.

The Station plans to continue the intercept program without change for the next project year. As previously noted, LIRAMA has asked that the project continue without a change in personnel or in the manner of operation.

I. FUNDS.

1. For the past period.

The cost of the LIENVOY Project (paid by Mexico Station exclusive of Headquarters costs) from 1 February 1964 through 30 June 1964 was US \$19,415.22 and from 1 July 1964 through 31 December 1964 \$23,677.68 and for January 1965 \$5,000.00 is estimated.

2. Puring the next project year.

During the period 1 February 1965 through 31 January 1966, an estimated amount of US \$47,468.00 will be required with US \$19,010 to be spent from 1 February 1965 through 30 June 1965 and \$28,458.00 to be spent from 1 July 1965 through 31 January 1966.


J. ANNEX.
