Also included in this ring were [Yigal Gilaud Tand Efrain Pillersdorf, employees of the Consulate of Israel, New York City.(5)

The Department of State has informed this Bureau that on April 14, 1954, Assistant Secretary of State Henry A. Byroade conferred with [Israeli Ambassador Abba Eban] and expressed to him the disquiet of our Government at the activities of Tal, Gilaad, and Pillersdorf. Mr. Byroade noted the fact that Tal had recently left the United States and told the [Israeli Ambassador] that our Government considered it desirable that Gilaad and Pillersdorf also be withdrawn. It is anticipated that the departure of these three men from the United States probably will not result in the discontinuance of [Israeli intelligence] activities in the New York area. Since the activities have centered about the Israeli Consulate there in the past it is possible that they will continue to be conducted from that establishment. The Workers World Party (WWP) consists of former Socialist Workers Party (SWP) members who split from the SWP in February, 1959. The WWP favors a stricter interpretation of Marxism-Leninism based upon the writings of Leon Trotsky than does the SiP.

This Bureau is currently investigating the WVP and The latter organization has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Milton Neidenberg was appointed organizer of the Buffalo Branch of the WWP on May 26, 1960, and it is anticipated that he will conduct wir business in his home. Current informants reporting on the WMP are only able to report on weekly meetings. Technical coverage would materially aid the Buffalo Office in its investigation of Neidenberg and the WWP, and would provide immediate intelligence information regarding the organizational efforts of the WWP both locally and nationally. It is noted that most of the WWP membership is located in Buffalo, New York.

I recommend, therefore, authorization of a surveillance on the residence of Milton Neidenberg, 95 Busti Avenue, Buffalo, New York, or at any other residence to which Neidenberg might move.
