Stokely Calls King Slaying Big Mistake

NEW YORK, April 12—(AP)—Stokely Carmichael said Friday it would have been better if the assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. had killed him or H. Rap Brown.

"They clearly made a mistake when they killed Dr. King," Carmichael told a press conference. "It would have been far better if they killed Rap Brown or myself. Then they could have said that 'they lived by the sword and they died by the sword.'"

Carmichael said the assassination would be a "powerful unifying force for black people." He said the ranks of militant Negroes would begin to grow.

Carmichael said the slaying of Dr. King means "a lot of people who were afraid to pick up guns will now pick up guns."

The Black Power advocate said he was "totally convinced" that the assassination was the result of a conspiracy. "Where were the FBI agents?" he asked.

Carmichael, former head of the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee, spoke at a conference open only to Negro reporters. Brown succeeded Carmichael as head of the militant group.

Carmichael also told a convention of the National Black Antiwar, Antidraft Movement that Negro and white antidraft organizations must be separate.

White youths, he said, view draft opposition as an intellectual exercise, while for Negro youths, avoiding the draft is "a matter of life and death."

Stokely Says Killers Chose Wrong Man

NEW YORK —(AP)— Stokely Carmichael, former head of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), says the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. will be a "powerful unifying force for black people."

Carmichael told a press conference Friday that the slaying of King means "a lot of people who were afraid to pick up guns will now pick up guns." He added:

"They clearly made a mistake when they killed Dr. King. It would have been far better if they killed Rap Brown or myself. Then they could have said that 'they lived by the sword and died by the sword.'"

'NO EXCUSE'

"There is no possible way for them to make an excuse for Dr. King's killing. He preached love, forgiveness and mercy."

Brown, who succeeded Carmichael as national chairman of SNCC, currently is in jail on a federal gun charge.

Carmichael's press conference was open only to Negro reporters.

The black power advocate also addressed a convention of the National Black Anti-war, Antidraft Movement, which was formed last January after a dispute between Negro and white representatives at a conference of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam.

'DIFFERENCE'

Carmichael told 300 youths from several major cities that Negro and white anti-draft organizations must be separate.

White youths, he said, view draft opposition as an intellectual exercise while, for Negro youths, avoiding the draft was a matter of life and death.

She related there were approximately 40 people in the tour and they all signed a register before starting.

jrw sure the person referred to above actually went on the tour at Coors as she only saw him in the reception room where about 35-40 people were waiting to start the tour. Iler was rather vague about this incident, could not furnish any further descriptive info. and her husband had not seen the photo on TV, and had not noticed the man at Coors to her knowledge.

Probers Checking Possibility of Plot in King's Death

By GAYLORD SHAW

MEMPHIS, Tenn. —(AP)—Investigators appeared Saturday to be re-examining the possibility that more than one person was involved in the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

They seemed puzzled about conflicting reports on the number of getaway cars involved and about police radio transmissions detailing a high-speed chase — which apparently never took place — through northeast Memphis 30 minutes after a sniper killed King with a single rifle shot.

MAINTAINS SILENCE

The FBI, conducting the most massive manhunt in its history, maintained silence on all aspects of the investigation. But Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark issued a new statement that dropped his earlier reference to "one man on the run."

Sixteen hours after King was slain April 4, Clark said evidence "indicates a single individual" was involved. "There is no evidence of a widespread plot," he said.

In a seven-line statement issued in Washington Friday night, Clark said the FBI was devoting all its resources to the investigation, "working around the clock pursuing every lead." He said it was impossible to predict when an arrest would be made.

OTHER TIMES GIVEN

Another Justice Department spokesman noted it took 12 days to make arrests in the May 1963 slaying of civil rights leader Medger Evers, and more than five months in the 1964 slayings of three civil rights workers in Mississippi.

One member of Congress has criticized the FBI's probe.

Noting what he called discrepancies throughout the investigation, Rep. Charles W. Whelan Jr., R-Ohio, said the FBI should "set the record straight."

"The handling of the investigation and the efforts to apprehend the guilty person or persons hardly had been reassuring to a tense and troubled nation," Whelan said in Washington.

In the 10 days since King's slaying, the lights have burned all night, night after night, in

the corner suite on the eighth floor of Memphis' new concrete-and-glass federal building.

There, in offices overlooking the wide, muddy Mississippi River, dozens of FBI agents have methodically sifted through what is described as "very substantial" physical evidence.

Exactly what constitutes this evidence is officially unknown, but sources report some of the major items are palm and finger prints, an overnight bag believed to contain clothing and a high-powered rifle with a telescopic sight.

Robert Jensen, 52, special agent in charge of the Memphis office, wore a strained smile as he faced reporters. "All I can say is no comment," he repeated to all questions.

Jensen wouldn't even say how many agents have been sent into Memphis. But in a five-minute period late one night, reporters watched 15 agents hurry in or out of the suite through an unmarked side door.

FBI agents have interviewed hundreds of persons in Memphis, Birmingham, Atlanta and elsewhere. They have taken over the records of two rooming houses and at least one gun shop. They have poured through documents in state and local government offices throughout the

SAY NOTHING

It seems that everywhere reporters go, the FBI already has been there. In many cases, witnesses report the FBI has instructed them to say nothing.

Across the street from the FBI office, spokesmen for the Memphis police insist their department still is working closely with federal agents. But from all indications, the FBI has taken

over the investigation completely.

At police headquarters, Fire and Police Director Frank C. Holloman, for 25 years an FBI agent, hands inquiring reporters a mimeographed statement: "The successful investigation of this case is the overriding consideration and for that reason I have no comment to make concerning the case at this time."

OFFICERS SILENT

Then, politely but firmly, the head of the city's 800-man police force refuses to answer questions. So do other officers.

Holloman held five news conferences within 24 hours after King was shot, and freely answered most inquiries from reporters. Since then, he has joined the FBI's stony silence.

This is an account of the events that have taken place as pieced together from scores of interviews:

On April 4, King held a day-long planning session in his \$13-a-day room—No. 306—at the Lorraine Motel. He had come here to lead a march in support of striking sanitation workers.

WEARY OF FOOD

He told the Rev. Samuel Kyles of Memphis that he was weary of restaurant food.

"I want some soul food," he said.

"You know where to get it," Kyles replied. "Come home and eat dinner with me." King said he would enjoy that.

So 23 minutes before sunset, King stepped onto the balcony in front of his room.

Two hundred-five feet and three inches away, a man wearing a black business suit, white shirt and narrow black tie stood in the bathtub of a flophouse's second-floor communal bathroom. Giving his name as John Willard, a man had rented Room 5A three hours earlier from Manager Bessie Brewer, paying a week's rent—\$8.50—in advance, using a \$20 bill.

PILE OF JUNK

Now he looked out of the bathroom window, across a pile of junk in a vacant lot, just above the tops of scrubby trees growing along an embankment and onto the balcony of the Lorraine Motel.

He squinted through the telescopic sight of a .30-06 Remington pump action rifle.

Ka-blam!

One shot rang out.

The bullet ripped into King's neck.

"Oh!" he gasped as he crumpled to the concrete balcony floor.

It was 6:01 p.m.

King had not asked for protection, but Police Director Holloman had stationed about 40 officers in the vicinity. Some apparently were posted in the vacant lot across Mulberry Street—the lot behind the Main Street flophouse.

The officers, wearing blue helmets and carrying rifles, immediately sealed off the area of the motel. But the killer already was making his way through the Main Street entrance to the rooming house, one block away.

White Mustangs are almost as common as cotton in Memphis. Two of them, both 1966 models, were parked within 100 feet of the rooming house entrance at 6:01 p.m. Fifteen minutes later, both were gone.

Some witnesses said the killer walked calmly down the steps to the street, turned left and

dropped a rifle in the next doorway, and continued several feet to the Mustang bearing a red and white license plate. Red and white plates are used in both Arkansas and Alabama.

At 6:25 p.m., a police dispatcher began relaying calls about a chase in northeast Memphis—eight miles away—including a white Mustang and a blue Pontiac.

A white male driving the Mustang, the police radio crackled, was "responsible for this shooting."

Eight calls, supposedly from a police lieutenant, were relayed by the dispatcher during the next 22 minutes. At one point, the dispatcher reported, the driver of the Mustang was firing on the pursuing Pontiac.

"I was not involved in any chase," the lieutenant said afterwards. A college student with a citizens band radio in his car later said he was relaying details of the chase to the lieutenant. He said the voice he was monitoring identified himself as the occupant of the blue car chasing the Mustang.

The student said the transmissions he received never faded, indicating the calls came from a stationary transmitter. By week's end, police appeared to have concluded that the chase

for whatever reason it was reported, was a hoax. Early Friday morning, 12 hours after the shooting, an Atlanta housewife looked out of the window of her apartment in the Capitol Homes project—383 miles to the southeast—and saw a "nice looking man" step out of a 1966 white Mustang.

Six days later — on Thursday afternoon — federal agents swooped down on the abandoned Mustang.

The car bore a license tag from Jefferson County — Birmingham — Ala., No. 1-38993. Two Mexican inspection stickers were pasted to the front windshield. The floor was littered with cigarette butts and covered with mud.

Between 5:15 and 5:30 p.m., the car was towed to the federal building.

At 5:22 p.m., the Florida police teletypewriter ticked out a "locate and notify" message. It was an FBI alert for Eric Starvo Galt, 36. The bulletin said Galt was driving a 1966 white Mustang hardtop with Alabama tag No. 1-38993.

MESSAGE WITHDRAWN

Four hours later, the message was withdrawn with the explanation it was "erroneous."

Records in Alabama show Galt applied for a driver's license last Sept. 5. The application describes him as 5-11, 175 pounds, with blue eyes and brown hair—roughly the some description given by witnesses for the man seen fleeing the Memphis rooming house.

ADDRESS LISTED

The document says Galt is an unemployed merchant seaman. The Maritime Union has no record of an Eric Galt.

His address was listed as 2068 Highland, Birmingham, a two-story stucco house with a neon light that flashes in red, "rooms."

Other residents of this house say they have not seen Galt in three months, although a duplicate drivers' license was mailed to him at that address last March 1.

The FBI refuses to say why it is seeking Galt.

Brother Tells King Role: One Who Lived by Love

ATLANTA — (UPI) — The brother of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. asked Friday that the slain civil rights leader be allowed to "... live on, not as a memory, not even as a symbol, but as a man who found it possible to live by love."

"I plead and I beg for each of us to understand that as he lived, we too can live," the Rev. A. D. Williams King said at a news conference held in the driveway of his brother's home.

WIDOW WATCHED

He issued a call for an end to the violence precipitated by his brother's assassination. Mrs. Coretta King, the widow, watched from inside the house.

Quoting from King's writings, the pastor of Zion Baptist Church in Louisville, Ky., said, "Some of you have knives and guns, and I ask you to put them up. Some of you have arms, and I ask you to put them up. Get the weapon of nonviolence, the breastplate of righteousness, the armor of truth and just keep marching."

LOVED NEIGHBOR

"Martin Luther King Jr. believed in nonviolence. He did love his neighbor as himself," the Rev. Mr. King continued.

He said his brother, who was killed by a sniper April 4 in Memphis, Tenn., adopted his programs of nonviolence and protest only after "study, self-

discipline and prayer" led him to this philosophy.

"I plead and beg for all the peoples of this world to allow him (King) to live on, not as a memory, not even as a symbol,

but as a man who found it possible to live by love."

With the Rev. Mr. King at the brief news conference was the Rev. Ralph Abernathy, Dr. King's successor as president

of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

The Rev. Mr. Abernathy and Mrs. King are scheduled to lead the "poor people's" campaign in Washington, D.C., next month.

The demonstration, originally planned by Dr. King, was to bring pressure on government to legislate to help the nation's poor.

Racial Calm Prevails Over Most of Nation

National Guard troops were withdrawn from the streets of Chicago Saturday as were all but a few of the 13,000 GIs on duty in Washington. Racial calm prevailed over most of the nation and authorities were hopeful that Easter would bring a return to normalcy.

The violence which recently broke out throughout the country left 43 persons dead.

Kansas City, Mo., where 3,000 guardsmen and police were protecting the peace, experienced scattered sniper fire and sporadic arson early Saturday but the violence was not on a par with previous nights.

In Youngstown, Ohio, about 200 guardsmen patrolled the city's predominantly Negro south side. In Cincinnati, however, Guard units were withdrawn from the Negro section of Avondale and police returned to normal work shifts.

The last of about 6,900 federal troops were removed from Baltimore Saturday but another 5,700 guardsmen were kept on duty. It was expected the guardsmen would be pulled out Sunday if the city remains quiet.

Guardsmen in Chicago and

nearby Joliet, Ill., were sent home Saturday. Officials allowed Jewish troops to depart earlier so they could be home for Passover.

At least 400 National Guardsmen were on duty in a 24-block area of Wilmington, Del., where disorders broke out last Monday and Tuesday. A curfew was eased, but still was in effect from 1:30 a.m. to 5:30 a.m.

Philadelphia's 7,000-man police force continued on 12-hour shifts.

It was disclosed Saturday that 68 pistols were stolen from a suburban Baltimore gun store during the height of the city's racial trouble. None has been found. An investigation of the rioting continued and some city officials said they thought it was "organized."

A Kansas City police dispatcher said Saturday afternoon, "It's been a great day,

almost normal." A ban on the sale of guns, ammunition or gasoline in containers was continued. Bars were ordered to close at 8 p.m.

The Mutual Loss Research Bureau reported that racial violence which erupted in Chicago following the April 4 assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. cost the city \$9 million in damages. The national damage estimate was \$45 million.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) disclosed that one of its planes was struck by gunfire while flying over the riot area of Chicago last Thursday. No one was hurt but the plane received a dent in its fuselage, the FAA said.

Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh went on television to announce a "new direction" for his city which included a campaign to require Negroes for the police department. The Detroit police force now is about 5 per cent Negro.

"Community service will become a recognized part of a policeman's duty," Cavanagh said. "The police will reach out to help citizens through neighborhood centers and through the precinct centers."

Talks Renewed to End Memphis Strike

MEMPHIS, Tenn. —(AP)— Passing up an Easter recess, city and union negotiators met Saturday with President Johnson's mediator in renewed efforts to end the long, bitter strike by city garbage collectors.

Reports from the closed meeting said the negotiators were "very close" to a settlement of the work stoppage which would enter its 10th week Monday. The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was here in support of the strike when he was slain.

National union leaders planned to return home for the Easter weekend, but agreed to remain here at the request of the mediators, James Reynolds undersecretary of labor, and Frank B. Miles. Reynolds was sent here by President Johnson to help end the strike.

Wages appeared to be the lone remaining area of disagreement. Earlier, the chief roadblocks to a settlement were the issues of a union payroll dues checkoff by the city and written union recognition.

There was speculation some

form of checkoff had been agreed upon and that letters from Mayor Henry Loeb to the strikers detailing certain improvements promised them might serve as a compromise for union recognition.

The union, the American fed-

eration of state, county and municipal employes, sought a 45-cent hourly wage increase. In earlier negotiations, Loeb agreed to an 8-cent raise for the strikers whose pay scale ranged from \$1.65 to \$2.10 an hour.

The 1,300 garbage collectors, 98 per cent of them Negroes, walked out Feb. 12. The city has continued collections with the aid of nonstrikers, replacements, strikers who returned to their jobs and supervisory personnel.

Morehouse Plans Memorials for King

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Plans for a \$2 million memorial chapel and a library to house the papers and books of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. were announced Saturday by Morehouse College, which King attended.

Dr. Hugh M. Gloster, president of Morehouse, said a scholarship fund in honor of the assassinated civil rights leader also is planned.

King's body has been placed in a crypt of Georgian marble in South View Cemetery. He was killed April 4 by a sniper at Memphis, Tenn., where he went to aid striking garbage workers.

A spokesman for Mrs. King

said the family has been notified of the plans for the Morehouse memorials, but that no decision has been reached as to the final resting place for King's body.

Gloster's announcement said contributions for the memorials are being received by the college.

The college announced earlier that King's son, Martin III and Dexter, would be offered four-year scholarships with \$8,000 each.

The library building was offered to house all of King's papers, books, citations, trophies and other personal effects.

Sought in King Case Witness 'Links' Man

Name Given After Look At Drawing

BIRMINGHAM, Ala.—(AP)—The owner of a boarding house said Monday he had identified a drawing of a man sought in the slaying of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as a roomer known by the name Eric Galt.

"It's him, I'm sure," said Peter Cherpes, 72, who runs a boarding house on Birmingham's South Side. Cherpes consented to talk after the FBI responded to his request to be released from a secrecy pledge.

Cherpes said FBI agents showed him drawings about last Wednesday, or two days before a car registered in the name of Eric Starvo Galt was found abandoned in Atlanta. The car, a white Mustang with an Alabama license tag, matched the description of a car seen leaving the assassination scene in Memphis, Tenn., where King was shot April 4.

Cherpes was shown a newspaper artist's drawing of the assassin Monday and he said it was much like the drawings exhibited by federal agents. Cherpes said the sketches "looked exactly like Galt."

The man known as Eric Starvo Galt has become the object of a widening search by FBI agents, who have been contacting persons with the same name or similar names from Virginia to Florida and sifting through dozens of stores and businesses in Birmingham for clues to the missing man.

The FBI issued an alert, called a "locate and notify" dispatch, in Florida for Galt last Friday at about the time the white Mustang was being impounded in Atlanta. The alert was withdrawn four hours later with the explanation that it had been erroneous.

Since then, the FBI has declined to say anything about Galt. There was no warrant for Galt, the FBI said last Friday.

Galt rented a room from him, Cherpes said, last fall, at about the time the hunted man obtained an Alabama driver's license.

He also purchased with cash a white Mustang from a Birmingham car salesman. He listed his occupation as merchant seaman, unemployed.

Meanwhile, in Jacksonville, Fla., a man picked up for questioning about the assassination was cleared, police said.

Police sources in Memphis, Tenn., disclosed that the FBI was withholding nationwide distribution of a composite drawing of King's killer, who fired the death shot from a dingy, second floor bathroom in a rundown rooming house.

King, leader of nonviolent civil rights forces, was struck in the neck as he stood on a second floor motel balcony facing the rear of the rooming house.

"They haven't given us anything but a physical description. They aren't handing out pictures of the man," said a police official who asked that his name be withheld.

"They either don't have a good one, or they're going it alone." There has been no indication from any source contacted by FBI agents that the FBI has a photograph.

The assassin's description given by the FBI: 30 to 32 years of age, 5-foot-10, weighing 165, with a receding hairline and a long, thin nose.



Landlord Says Galt Was Tenant

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 15—(UPI)—Eric Galt, object of the FBI's most intensive manhunt, received a letter from Chicago a few weeks before the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., his landlord said Monday.

In a copyrighted interview in the Birmingham News, rooming house manager Peter Nicholas Cherpes said the sketch of the man wanted in Dr. King's slaying "looked exactly like" Galt. He said Galt stayed at his rooming house at 2608 Highland ave. from Aug. 26 to Oct. 7 last year.

He said that in September, Galt received a prepaid package in the mail from Chicago. He said it weighed 20 to 25 pounds, was about two feet long and one foot wide. The next day, Cherpes said, Galt told him it was the wrong merchandise and he planned to send it back.

"About half an hour later I saw him carrying the box to his car," Cherpes said.

In October, Cherpes said, Galt told him he was leaving for Mobile, Ala., to seek a job. Galt said he expected a letter from Chicago and asked Cherpes to hold it for him.

In February or March, Cherpes said, the letter came from Chicago. He said the envelope was thin and green, with a Chicago postmark.

"I was puzzled for a while where to mail it," Cherpes said. "I didn't have an address (for Galt). So I held the letter for a week, and returned it."

Cherpes said it appeared to him the letter contained a check.

When he received the letter, Cherpes said, he went to his file

to look for Galt's registration card and found it. But when FBI agents came to him last week, Cherpes said, it was missing.

He said Galt was a natty dresser who always paid his \$27 a week room and board in cash, on time.
