



FBI Trailed King, Foreman Says

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)-Percy Foreman, making an unsuccessful bid for a further delay in the trial of James Earl Ray, said Wednesday he understood a squad of FBI agents had shadowed Dr. Martin Luther King for two years trying to prevent his assassination.

Angry Words

The hearing was sparked by angry words between Foreman and an assistant prosecutor, and a denunciation by Foreman of "people who believe there are unlimited funds, and that the James Earl Ray case is like king cotton to Memphis industry.

No definite starting date for Ray's trial on charges of murder in the sniper-slaying of King was set. Foreman wanted a postponement from March 3 and the prosecution objected.

Battle kept a March 8 date as tentative, Ray's trial was scheduled to begin Nov. 1 but was postponed when the 40year-old ex-convict fired Arthur J. Hanse, former Birmingham, Ala., mayor, from his job as defense counsel.

Foreman complained of fruitless attempts to get the FBI's files on King, the assassination and the search for the killer. "I asked J. Edgar Hoover three times," for the files Foreman told the court.

Negro SCLC Aide **Claims Ray Not Dr. King Slayer**

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)— A bearded Negro minister, present at the Lorraine Hotel in Memphis when Martin Luther, King Jr. was slain, said Sunday he has "evidence" to prove James Earl Ray innocent of the crime.

The Rev. James L. Bevel, 32, an official of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) said he has offered to take Ray's case without a fee, Bevel, who has no law degree, declined to discuss his evidence.

"In terms of discussing specifics, that wouldn't be to his (Ray's) best benefits," Bevel

Asked what will happen to the evidence if Ray does not accept his help, Bevel said:

"I guess he'd go to jail or to the electric chair or whatever you do to those people, I'll just keep it."

Ray in Memphis Jail

Ray is jailed in Memphis awaiting trial for murder in the slaying of King, founder of the SCLC. King was shot as he stood on the hotel balcony April 4. Ray's trial has been postponed until March.

Bevel, sitting on a bamboo chair in a neatly furnished apartment in the hearth of the North Philadelphia ghetto, said he does not know Ray's present attorneys.

"Possibly we would not groove together,"

The SCLC's Atlanta headquarters made clear Bevel was speaking for himself, not the

"He has been under a lot of pressure lately," the SCLC said of Bevel.

"Since Dr. King's death, he has gone into a deep depression, and if he sent the telegram, he is speaking for himself," a SCLC spokesman

Bevel's telegram to Ray said:

"I would like to inform you that I would be very happy to take your case without fee. I was present at the Lorraine Hotel when Dr. King was killed. You have been charged with murdering him. Of course, I know you are not

Copies of the telegram also were sent to various newspapers.

"Don't Need Law Degree"

Asked how he could defend Ray without a law degree, Bevel replied, "The constitution doesn't say you have to have a law degree.'

Bevel was wearing an imitation leopard skin

Bevel was wearing an imitation leopard skin jacket over an orange shirt with brown slacks. The 32-year-old minister said he had been sailed 25 times for civil rights actions, including twice with Dr. King, once in Birmingham and once in Selma, Ala.

Bevel had gone to Memphis to help recruit volunteers for the Poor People's March on Washington. He said he was standing "on the ground" outside the hotel when King was shot. The SCLC sent Bevel to Philadelphia last summer to serve as director of nonviolent education.

Bevel said he attended the American Baptist Seminary in Nashville, Tenn., and has been a minister for the past 12 years.

Reporters Called

Newsmen accredited to cover Ray's April 7 trial were notified at midmorning that Foreman had been granted the Monday hearing by Judge Preston Battle. There was no elaboration.

These same newsmen had been asked to come to the press room facilities, set up near the courtroom, an hou and a half before the bearing opens at 9:30 a.m. Monday Again, there was no indication what this conference would involve.

Judge Battle has issued strict orders against pretrial publicity by any of the principals in the case. The Huntsville Times said, however, that a source close to the case said the gulity plea would be "the only way Ray can escape the death sentence."

King was assassinated i Memphis last April 4, after h had come here to lead a demonstration in behalf of city garbage workers who at that time were on strike. Ray is accused of shooting Dr. King from a rooming house opposite the Lorraine Motel, where Dr. Kirg vas standing on a balcony.

The Star-Tribune Thinks

Evidence of a Conspiracy

James Earl Ray's plea of guilty to the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and his sentencing to 99 years imprisonment will not still the clamor for futher investigation.

The question of conspiracy inevitably arises in assassinations. It has long been debated in the slaying of President John F. Kennedy, and it has not been absent in connection with the assassination of his brother, Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. The claims of conspiracy in both these assassinations are open to question.

There can be more reason to believe that James Earl Ray was not acting alone when he shot Dr. King. His ready source of finances and his change of identities must have involved co-conspirators. His ability to obtain a false passport in Canada so that he could go to Europe is unexplained.

Although he may have his doubts, the layman cannot try this case. In many ways, it is unfortunate that it was not tried in the district court in Memphis. The deal between the prosecution and the defendant appears to be a matter of record. It sticks out like a sore thunb.

and in a first degree murder case of this magnitude the court procedure is open to serious challenge.

So far as the defendant is concerned, his punishment is fixed until some later day when all this may be forgotten and he receives commutation for good behavior. Reverberations against the procedure are certain to mount as the weeks and months go by. Friends and supporters of Dr. King are certain to claim that this was a "fix" at the expense of the black people's interests.

It would have been far better if the trial had been allowed to proceed without the acceptance of a guilty plea. There was a gamble involved—that the jury would not convict — but that is an accepted gamble in all such cases.

The door is not entirely closed, however. Judge W. Preston Battle acknowledged that the handling of the case was not "conclusive evidence that there was no conspiracy."

Meanwhile, the public is denied information to which it is entitled and the cause of racial justice is not advanced. Judge Battle could have done much better.

All information concerning plans in captioned matter should be promptly submitted to the Bureau by appropriate communication. Letterhead memoranda should be submitted and local dissemination should be made. Sources should be thoroughly interviewed for all details and particular attention should be paid to identifying black extremist participants and the extent of their participation. New Left and communist participation should be closely followed.

It will be the responsibility of all offices to follow this matter closely, keeping in mind the violence which followed King's assassination and the violence which resulted when the SCLC was unable to control their massive civil disobedience demonstration in Washington, D. C., in the Spring of 1968.

ASSASSINATION OF MARTIN LUTHER KING

On 3/13/69, at a conference with all headquarters Agents I referred to my memorandum of 3/6/69, to all Agents.

In the conference and the memorandum I alerted all Agents to the possibility of racial disturbances on the anniversary of KING's death, 4/4/69, and that they should contact logical sources to alert them to such possibility and in turn the Agents should promptly advise me of such material.

On 3/20/69, I again had a conference with all Agents. During this conference I pointed out the contents of the Bureau's teletype to all SACS 3/19/69, captioned "Commemoration of the Death of Martin Luther King, Jr., 4/4/69, RM." I instructed all Agents on 3/20/69, to contact all logical racial, security and criminal sources and appropriate Police Department sources for information referred to in the teletype and give that information to SA SAMSON, whether negative or positive by noon, 3/21/69, and SA SAMSON in turn is to send the requested teletype by 3/21/69. I told all Agents that besides the information in the Bureau's 3/19/69, teletype, I again want them to be extremely alert for possible racial disorders and I want to know of them before they happen and not after they happen since the latter information can be obtained from any newspaper.

I again pointed out every man in this office who has been here more than one year is expected to be participating positively in the racial source and informant program, and I intend to continue to follow to see that everyone does.

My memorandum to all Agents 3/6/69, indicated it is entirely possible that on the anniversary of the assassination of MARTIN LUTHER KING, which will be 4/4/69, it is entirely possible there could be recurrences of demonstrations, destruction of property and personal injuries such as occurred on the date he was killed.

That memorandum pointed out every Agent was to contact logical sources, whether criminal, racial or security, for the purpose of instructing them to immediately advise us should they receive any information beforehand concerning any planned demonstrations of the type mentioned above.

The above instructions were reiterated at my conference with all headquarters Agents on 3/20/69.

These instructions are again being pointed out because the anniversary date is drawing close.

In connection with such possible demonstrations, bear in mind the probability of anti-riot law violations occurring during such demonstrations and the absolute necessity of insuring that the Bureau's investigative reponsibilities in that regard are fully discharged.

The Bureau must be in position to bring forth admissible evidence gathered during intelligence investigations presently being conducted for use at possible subsequent prosecutive proceedings, including witnesses to or recordings of inflammatory statements and witnesses who will be available to testify re all details concerning meetings where plans were formuled which would constitute elements of possible violations of Antiriot Laws and/or conspiracy violations.

Informant stated that there is going to be a reorganization of the BPP, starting at a general meeting
3/28/69.

Informant stated that GERALD DIXON and SORL SHEAD have returned from New York and while in New York, they were told not to contact any BPP members in New Jersey as their chapter has been expelled from the national group of the BPP at Oakland, California. The reason for this split is unknown to the informant.

Informant stated that there is a "mild separation" between the Black Panthers and the Crusade for Justice.

LAUREN WATSON feels that CORKY GONZALES got what he wanted at West High School but ignored any demands that the BPP wanted at East High School and Manual High School.

STANLEY WILLIAMS may be expelled from the BPP during the reorganization since he has not been paying his dues and has not been attending meetings. All such members such as WILLIAMS will also be expelled.


