BACKGROUND

According to statements allegedly made by JAMES EARL RAY, which were published in a recent issue of a nationally distributed periodical, RAY spent the night at a motel near Corinth, Miss., while en route from Atlanta, Georgia, to Memphis, Tennessee. He allegedly engaged in target practice in Mississippi using the murder weapon. This occurred a few days prior to the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING.

The Bureau instructed the Jackson Division to check motel records in and near Corinth for the period March 29, 1968, to April 3, 1968, in an attempt to locate a guest record identifiable with RAY under his true name or known aliases, i.e., James Earl Ray, John Williard, Eric Starvo Galt, and if any record located, determine if RAY was alone, vehicle utilized, and people he may have contacted.

The foregoing list of names contained in this memo is the result of review of motel and hotel records. It is noted none seem to be identical to RAY.

Each individual listed should be further identified to establish such a person actually exists and is not an alias used by RAY. This can be done by credit and arrest agency checks. In the event arrest record is located for any individual listed, evaluation should be made as to advisability of interview to determine if the individual involved was associated in any way with JAMES EARL RAY.

This matter should be afforded immediate and expedite attention.







Ray Escape Try Might Have Meant His Death

May Never Have Survived Heat In Tunnel Had He Not Left It

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)-James Earl Ray, selfconfessed slayer of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., almost turned his 99-year-sentence into death when he tried

"He would never have survived the heat if he hadn't got out of the tunnel," said Brushy Mountain State Prison Warden Robert H. Moore Monday after Ray's unsuccessful escape attempt.

As it was, he was captured within a half hour in the prison compounds-looking for way to led in the Cumberland Mountains.

He faced a disciplinary board this morning.

"He was in the tunnel for only about 10 minutes," Moore said, "and he had a few burns but they didn't appear to be serious.'

More said it would have been impossible for Ray to have reached the end of the tunnel without being scalded to death in the 400 degree heat. The tunnel, which leads to the prison steam plant outside the prison walls, supplies steam to the prison mess hall and is in use vear round.

Otherwise, it was a "wellconceived escape attempt," Moore said.

"First, he removed a concrete block in his cell and to out into an air chamber, a ventilating area behind the cellblock. He crawded along the air

one bar and broke another with shisel. a crowbar.

"He pulled himself through the hole and got cut into the prison yard behind the cell-block. Then he went to the steam tunnel which leads to our steam plant about 100 yards of the cell." outside the prison.'

Moore said Ray, who pleaded get over the stone wall of the guilty to the sniper slaying of maximum security prison nest King outside a Memphis motel room on April 4, 1968, got help room on April 4, 1968, got help in his escape bid from his cellmate, Roy Morelock, 44, of Greene County.

The warden said Morelock, serving a life term as an habitual criminal from Greene County, worked as a prison maintenance man and had access to the tools Ray used in the escape attempt.

"Morelock had access to such tools as these and he obviously intended to escape with Ray, Moore said. "Our guards caught up the attempt so fast he didn't have time to get out

Ray is no stranger to escapes and was, in fact, a fugitive from Missouri ot the time King was slain.

He had escaped from the Missouri State Penitentiary April 23, 1967, where he was serving 20 years on a car theft charge. He was not recaptured then until he was picked up in London, some two monthsafter London, some two months after King was shot to death in 1968.

His arrest record before he entered the Tennessee prison system shows he first was booked on suspicion of burglary in Los Angeles and was placed on two years' probation. He and supplied him with a hack had been in and out of various charges until he was sentenced to the Missouri prison in 1967.

Ray has sought several times to obtain a new triai in the King slaying, contending he was pressured by his lawyer into pleading guilty. Each time ne has lost, the latest rejections coming in Memphis Feb. 27.

Ray Awarded Rehearing On King Murder

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP) — James Earl Ray was given a chance Tuesday to contest his guilty plea in the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. because of allegations his attorneys compromised his interests to fatten their pocketbooks.

The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that Ray, 41, who received a 99-year sentence for the 1968 murder of the civil rights leader, is entitled to a hearing to contest his 1969 guilty plea.

Ray argued that he was not given proper legal advice. He said his lawyers failed to properly investigate his case and that their only interest was to collect royalties on materials written about him.

In a 2-1 decision, the circuit court sent Ray's petition back to the U.S. District Court in Nashville for review.

Ray alleged he was poorly advised by attorney Arthur Hanes, and by Percy Foreman after he fired Hanes. He alleged both were more interested in funds that would accrue from articles and books planned by Alabama author William Bradford Huie than in his defense.

Ray said the lawyers considered his guilty plea paramount to the financial success of the articles and a possible movie on the case

The court cited two letters written to Ray by Foreman. The first letter said Ray had signed all royalties to Foreman and that Foreman would keep all monies up to \$165,000. It also said Ray would get all royalties above that figure if he pleaded guilty and caused no embarrassing circumstances in the courtroom.

The second said Foreman

would give \$500 to Ray's brother Jerry, "contingent upon the plea of guilty and sentence going through on March 10, 1969 without any unseemly conduct on your part in court."

The court said only by giving Ray a hearing on his contentions "may it be determined whether the plea was intelligent or voluntary or entered as the result of coercion, threats and promises.

"The allegations ... if true, would support a finding that Ray's attorneys deliberately compromised their client's interests in order to further the financial success of Huie's works in which they themselves had a substantial interest."

"Such conduct would constitute an outrageous abrogation of the standards which the legal profession for itself and upon which its clients have a right to rely ..."

The appeals court noted the original trial judge had thoroughly questioned Ray about his plea, and whether it was voluntary.

But it said "it is clear, that the allegations which are the subject of Ray's petition have never been tried upon their merits or resolved by any court—allegations which, if true, plainly negate any notion or idea that his guilty plea and answers ... were made voluntarily and intentionally.

"... No inquiry was made into the specific contentions that are now before this court."

The major opinion was written by Judge William E. Miller and concurred in by Judge Harry Phillips.

Minutemen, Klansmen Checked In King Probe

WASHINGTON — The FBI investigated members of the Ku Klux Klan and the Minutemen in the early days of the search for Martin Luther King's assassin, newly disclosed FBI documents reveal.

Four days after King was slain in Memphis on April 4, 1968, FBI headquarters ordered an investigation of all known members of the Klan, the right-wing minutemen, "other hate group members, rabble rousers and any other individuals known to have violent proclivities located within your territories."

The order was sent to FBI field offices in Memphis and Knoxville, Tenn., Birmingham and Mobile, Ala., Jackson, Milwaukee and Minneapolis.

ROY K. MOORE of Jackson, who headed the FBI's Jackson field office from 1964 to 1971 and 1972 to 1973 before retiring, was not available for comment Wednesday night.

Beckwith "has been involved in Klan activities for many years and has a propensity for violence," said one memo.

PHOTOS of Beckwith were circulated to agents in Birmingham and Memphis to show to persons being questioned in the investigation.

As for the Minutemen, the Boston field office reported that an unnamed informer said the right-wing group had a general plan to foment civil strife by killing Negro leaders, Martin Luther King, Rap Brown and Stokely Carmichael and therefore, seize power in the confusion. No specific timetable was set.

The memo noted that Minutemen leaders Robert B. DePugh and Walter Patrick Peyson had been convicted of federal firearms violations.

At the time of the King assassina-

tion, DePugh and Peyson were wanted on federal fugitive warrants and the Memphis field office suggested the search for them should be intensified. But the Char-

lotte field office reported that an informer was questioned about the two Minutemen leaders and said "he had no knowledge that the Minutemen had any plans to kill King."

Besides, the informer said, if "any of the hard core Minutemen shot King, they would have dismantled the rifle and put it in a briefcase rather than abandon it, and would not have run from the scene."

Attoricys: IBI Tricd To Pressure Ray

PETROS, Tem. — James Barl Ray told House investigators Thursday that the FBI tried to pressure him into naming alleged conspirators in the assessination of civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Ray's attorney said. Attorney Jack Kershaw met with reporters after Robert Lehner, who is leading the King portion of the House Assessmation Committee's investigation, spent more than six hours with Ray behind the walls of Brushy Mountain State Prison. Ray is serving a 90-year sentence for the 1937 murder of the civil rights leader. "I find today that the FBI is involved in this case, in my opinion, in an improper way," Kershaw said. "TEI pressure was brought upon James Barl Ray by meens of threatening members of his family."

HE SAID he signed a stipulation that he fired the shot that killed King, knowing it was false.

"If I had to do it all over again I would have had to -Ithink would have to admit to that stipulation based on the position they had me in - Percy Foreman, the trial judge and the prosecutor," Ray said



Informant Finds Ray Escape Map

The Associated Press

WASHINGTON — A photo copy of a map reportedly drawn by James Earl Ray as part of a new escape plan was found by an informant in his brother's motel room and turned over to police, the House assassinations committee said Wednesday.

The crudely drawn map shows parts of the compound and grounds of the Brushy Mountain state penitentiary where Ray is serving a life sentence for the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

A committee report says it is "in James Earl Ray's handwriting," and that it was made available to the FBI and Tennessee police officials "to prevent a possible catastrophic event, another escape attempt by James Earl Ray."

The report was prepared by Rep. Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, the committee chairman, in an attempt to refute allegations made by Ray's attorney and an underground informant that activities by a committee investigator were illegal and improper.

Those allegations by attorney Mark Lane and Oliver Patterson, a former FBI informant, prompted some House members to ask that the committee's request for additional funding be delayed pending an investigation of its methods.

The Stokes report denied that investigator Conrad Baetz ever instructed Patterson to record the conversations of Ray's brother, Jerry, and said that staff members had instructed him not to do so on grounds such conversations could not be used as evidence.

"Apparently Patterson ... elected to record certain conversations on his own," the report said.

It said that Patterson did obtain samples of Jerry Ray's hair in an attempt to learn if it matched unidentified human hair found near the scene of Dr. Martin Luther King's assassination in Memphis, Tenn., a April 1988.

The Stokes report did not say whether the samples matched but did assert that obtaining it from a bathroom used by Jerry Ray was "most appropriate" and an entirely legal investigative technique.

The report denied Patterson, a former FBI informant, ever was paid for his services other than to receive expense money.

And it said no effort was made to encourage inm to give false testimony as he has claimed.

"Based on all available information and evidence, the committee is satisfied that the allegations of Oliver Patterson are not founded on fact and that no unlawful or improper conduct has been engaged in by members of the staff," the Stokes report said.

The report said that in mid-April of this year, while Patterson in his undercove role was sharing a motel room in Washington with Jerry Ray, he asked committee investigators if he should go through Ray's effects "for documents pertinent to the committee's investigation."

"Patterson was told immediately and repeatedly that he should not engage in such conduct," the report maintained.

But it said that on the following day Patterson told investigators "that he had indeed rummaged through Jerry Ray's belongings and discovered a map that he thought would be of interest...."

The report said investigators at first told Patterson not to take the map and not to show if to them.

But it said later conversations with Patterson indicated that "the map suggested an active plan by James Earl Ray to escape..."

It said that given this new informations the committee "felt compelled" to ask Patterson to obtain a copy of the map so that law enforcement officials could be alerted.
