SMITH advised that one thing he remembered was that the man indicated that he was an artist and he gave SMITH the impression he was not employed at present.

The individual described above, who drove with him to Leeds, Alabama, appeared to be friends with (First name unknown) CHEETER (Phonetic), the owner of the Economy Boarding House. SMITH advised he saw this individual speaking with CHEETER several times during the week be stayed at the Economy Boarding House. SMITH advised further that during the entire period of his stay at the Economy Boarding House, he was under extreme nervous tension and was destraut. He advised that he could not recall anything else concerning the individual described above, but that should he recall anything further, he would immediately contact the FBI.

Specifically, he stated he could not identify either of the individuals described in the photographs as being identical with the individual he met at the Economy Boarding House in Birmingham, Alabama during September, 1967, who drove him to Leeds, Alabama.

She said her husband, RAYMOND ROSCHELLE, had stopped at a truck stop in Brookhaven, Mississippi, managed or operated by a Mrs. (first name unknown) MARTIN on the late evening of April 4, 1968. She said her husband overheard a conversation that one JESSIE KIMBELL, or KIMBALL, a white male from Brookhaven, Mississippi, had been having with some truck drivers at the truck stop. She said her husband told her that KIMBELL, or KIMBALL, who appeared to have been drinking, said he had just arrived from Memphis, and made some remarks about MARTIN LUTHER KING. JR's being shot there and about a blanket muffling the shot from the assassin. She said her husband continued that KIMBELL, or KIMBALL, related information that the gun used by the assassin had been purchased at a Sears, Roebuck and Company Store in Memphis, Tennessee, on Jefferson or Poplar Street. She said her husband overheard KIMBELL, or KIMBALL, to say he worked for a wholesale drugstore or pharmaceutical company in Brookhaven.

Mrs. ROSCHELLE said her husband told her that KIMBELL, or KIMBALL, was driving a late model white Chevrolet but her husband had been unable to obtain the license number. She said her husband did not want to be contacted by the FBI in this regard. She said the information she had provided from her husband could possibly have a bearing on the assassination of MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

Mrs. ROSCHELLE said she does not have a telephone at her residence but, if necessary, can be contacted at the home of a neighbor at telephone number 352-6010.

M. E. TOOTLE, Manager, base laundry, Keesler Air Force Base, advised that his business employs: four Thermo-Seal machines manufactured by Textile Marking Machines Company, Syracuse, New York.

Mr. TOOTLE advised that to the best of his knowledge, his is the only laundry on the Gulf Coast which utilizes the Thermo-Seal marking machines. He advised that the machine is supplied with tapes which come in eleven various colors. including the color red and he stated his employees merely rotate the color and that therefore, colors have no significance per se.

He further stated that the marking system which he devised for himself, reflects the lot number, employees initials, and bundle number. Mr. TOOTLE advised that his company wdid not use either of the following codings:

C. H. HESTER, 801-12th Avenue North, was contacted at his place of employment, the Mississippi National Guard, Amory, Mississippi. He was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent and he furnished the following information:

HESTER stated that his father-in-law, FLOYD AGNEW, is currently the manager at the Ramada Inn in Mobile, Alabama. He stated his father-in-law's address is 2212 St. Teresa, Mobile, Alabama.

HESTER stated he does not know very much about his father-in-law's operation of the Amory Steam Laundry, but he does recall that when laundry was marked, it was marked in indelible ink on the garment and the marking had the initials of the garment owner, then a single numeral designation which was utilized for route delivery in and around the Amory, Mississippi, area. He stated he did not know what brand of machinery is father-in-law utilized at the laundry.

DUNCAN stated he is the owner-manager of the Duncan Steam Laundry. He stated he purchased this laundry from M. D. HOOD in May, 1964, and took over operation on May 4, 1964. He stated the laundry was originally known as the Amory Steam Laundry.

DUNCAN stated that he has two marking machines, which he uses to mark laundry. He stated that both of these machines are national marking machines which are manufactured by the National Marking Machine Company, Cincinnatic Ohio. The serial numbers of these machines are 1158-C and 1155-C.

DUNCAN continued that when he took over operation of the laundry, there were also three other marking machines; however, these machines were obsolete and broken down. He stated two of them were national marking machines and the other was a perfection marker which was manufactured in Denver, Colorado. He stated that the machines now in operation were there when he took operation of the laundry and to his knowledge, had been in use at the laundry for several years prior to his taking over control.

DUNCAN stated that his marking machines do not use tape. He marks laundry right on the garment. The ink utilized is indelible black ink. He stated the only code he uses has the initials of the persons or the owner of the laundry, and a dash and a number designation, which is utilized for deliveries by his laundry in the surrounding area. This number designation goes from one to five; the number one being deliveries in Amory, Mississippi, and orders which are brought into the laundry and picked up at the laundry.

DONALD KILLEN was contacted by agents at the J. F. Barnett Electric and Plumbing Company, 279 West Beacon Street. The identities of the interviewing agents and the nature of the inquiry were made known to KILLEN. He was advised by SA RUCKER that he did not have to talk with the agents and that anything he did say could be used against him in a court of law. He was told that he could consult with an attorney of his own choice before making any statement and could have an attorney with him during interview if he so desired. No threats or promises were made to induce KILLEN to talk with the agents. An attempt was made to allow KILLEN to read a warning and waiver of rights form, which form he declined to read or sign.

KILLEN denied having played any part or having knowledge, other than what he had heard or read in the news, about the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. He related that he is employed at the Barnett Electric and Plumbing Company in Philadelphia, Mississippi, and that he did not work on the afternoon of April 4, 1968. He said that he could not recall his whereabouts on March 29 and 30, 1968. KILLEN did say that he does recall that on April 4, 1968, shortly after 6:00 p.m. he was at his home in rural Philadelphia, Mississippi, watching television when his television program was interrupted with a special announcement of KING's having been shot in Memphis, Tennessee. KILLEN then terminated the interview by saying that he was the brother of EDGAR RAY KILLEN who has been arrested by FBI agents in the past and "I'm a God-fearing man and have nothing further to say."

Mrs. GRADY MARTIN, JR., Route 2, Bogue Chitto, Mississippi, was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent, who also advised her that she did not have to furnish any information, that any information she did furnish could be used in a court of law and that she could contact an attorney or anyone else at any time.

Mrs. MARTIN advised that she is the owner and operator of "The Chef" in Brookhaven, Mississippi, the only all-night truck stop from Jackson, Mississippi to the vicinity of New Orleans, Louisiana.

Mrs. MARTIN advised that she and one other girl worked the counter and tables at the cafe on the night of April 4, 1968. She advised the other waitress, worked only that one night and is a stranger to the Brookhaven, Mississippi area. Mr. WILSON advised that the station broadcastian interview with a man in Memphis, Tennessee, who stated on the air that he saw a man throw a rifle and bag of some kind into his "amusement center" that must have been the rifle used in the assassination. He stated that the man stated on the air that he only saw the man's back and could not identify him. Mr. WILSON advised he did not make any statement about where the rifle was purchased or that if it was wrapped in a blanket. to muffle the sound, nor did he hear anyone else at the place make such a statement.

DELMA PIERCE was telephonically contacted from Dee Dell's Photo Studio in Walls, Mississippi, at which time PIERCE voluntarily advised the following information:

PIERCE advised that due to her employment at Dee Dell's Studio, she travels quite extensively and therefore does not have a permanent address in Walls, Mississippi but can always be contacted through the photo studio. She advised that when she is in Walls she will often stay at a motel in Memphis, Tennessee.

PIERCE advised that to the best of her knowledge, she remembers calling her sister in Muncie, Indiana, on either April 5 or 6, 1968, PIERCE stated that the first time she had called had been from Jackson, Mississippi, and that the second time she called from Memphis, Tennessee, on either the same day or the ddy after. PIERCE stated that during the conversation her sister had expressed a concern for PIERCE, being in Memphis during the riot, and this led to a discussion of the circumstances concerning Doctor MARTIN LUTHER KING's death.

PIERCE stated that she uses the name LaBELLA when calling her sister in Indiana, due to the fact that she, PIERCE, has a former husband in Indiana, and she is attempting to conceal her activities from him. PIERCE stated that due to her marital difficulties, she uses the name LaBELLA, and this is the only time that she ever uses this name. PIERCE stated that there is no such person as DENO or DEE LaBELLA.

PIERCE stated that on the night of April 4, 1968, at about 6:00 PM, she was traveling in connection with their business with DEE ARAMIAS. PIERCE stated that at about

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6:00 PM on April 4, 1968, she and ARANIAS had been in Biloxi, Mississippi, and recalled checking both herself and ARANIAS into the Holiday Inn at Biloxi.

PIERCE advised that she is presently driving a 1968 Chevrolet, sea frost green in color, with a black vinyl top, and Tennessee license. PIERCE further stated that this is a company car, and that she does not own a personal car. PIERCE further advised that she also has access to a Buick Wildcat and a 1968 Chevy II.

Date April 16, 1968

Mr. ROBERT EARL DAVIS, 101 McLaurin Drive, advised he is employed by the Mid-Valley Pipeline in Oxford, Mississippi, and in connection with his duties, holds a private pilot's license to fly company planes. He explained that he spends a lot of his time around the University - Oxford Airport and stated that on the morning of April 8, 1968, he was at the lobby in the airport where he observed an unknown white male in the lobby and stated he believes this person had just arrived on a Southern Airlines flight from Memphis, Tennessee. He advised he struck up a conversation with this person and recalls this individual claimed he was an Eastern Airlines pilot who flies DC-8 aircraft. He stated that during his conversation with this person, he was of the opinion that he was not an airline pilot since he apparently did not know much about flying. He also recalls this individual questioned him concerning the cost of a small plane.

DAVIS stated that this person used the Hertz Rent-A-Car telephone located at the lobby of the airport and talked with someone in Tupelo, Mississippi. DAVIS advised he was somewhat suspicious of this person at this time and stated he picked up an extension phone and heard only a brief portion of their conversation. He recalls the person remarked over the telephone, "I'm here; I'm not in Tupelo." He stated that sometime thereafter, someone driving a white Buick picked this person up at the airport and DAVIS assumed this was the person he contacted in Tupelo, Mississippi.

DAVIS stated that during the period of time this person was waiting around the airport, he observed him carrying a blue flight bag with a name stenciled on the side which he believes was either GAULT or GOLT.

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He advised that earlier on April 13, 1968, he had observed a composit drawing of the person responsible for the shooting of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., in Memphis, Tennessee, and stated this was apparently some artist's conception drawn by a newspaper in Memphis. He stated that as he recalled this person, the composit drawing compares favorably with this individual. He described this individual as follows:

DAVIS stated this person was well dressed and wearing a brown suit.

DAVIS advised he had not seen this individual prior to this occasion in the University - Oxford Airport.

TOM MELSON DAVIS, South Acres Drive, New Albany, Mississippi, was interviewed at the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol (MHSP) Substation, at New Albany, Mississippi. He voluntarily appeared for interview.

TOM MELSON DAVIS was warned of his rights by SA ROBIN O. COTTEN and waived them, but refused to sign the Warning and Waiver form. He advised that he fully understood his rights and did not desire to execute any waiver until he learned the nature of the purposed interview.

When questioned concerning his activities on April 4, 1968, TOM MELSON DAVIS advised that he was at his home on South Acres Drive, in New Albany, Mississippi, at approximately 4:00 P.M., when his cousin ROY HARDY, who resides on Highway 30 East, stopped by his house and offered him a drink of whiskey. DAVIS pointed out that he lived at this residence with his mother, and suggested that they drive to the Beacon Hill Drive-In, located west of New Albany. He stated that he drove his 1967 white Mustang, and was followed by his cousin, ROY HARDY, in HARDY's pickup truck. He stated they sat in the truck for a few minutes in front of a small cafe, and each had a drink of whiskey.

He estimated that he left the area of the Beacon Hill area between 4:30 and 5:00 P.M., alone, driving his white Mustang, and stated he was en route to Memphis. He explained that he had planned to meet friends, BETTY SMITH and BOBBY EARWOOD, at the Manhatten Club, Highway 51 South, located just north of Lil Abners Tavern in South Memphis.

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He recalled that he drove to Holly Springs,
Mississippi, and stopped at a whiskey store, located on
the north side of the square, where he purchased a pint
of Old Charter whiskey. Thereafter, he stated that he
drove on United States Highway 78 to a Savings Gas Station,
located just north of Holly Springs, Mississippi, on the
east side of the road, and stated he asked to see a friend,
JUNIOR KIRKINDAL, who previously had allowed him to purchase
gasoline on credit in the amount of \$3.00. He stated that
he inquired concerning KIRKINDAL, and learned from a
"redheaded boy" who was employed there, that KIRKINDAL

He recalled that almost immediately, after he got back into his Mustang and turned on the radio, he heard a newscast concerning the shooting of Doctor MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., in Memphis. He stated that he continued listening to the newscast until he arrived at the Tennessee-Mississippi state line on United States Highway 78, where he stopped at a beer joint located on the east side of the highway, just a few feet south of the Tennessee state line, located in Mississippi. He advised he had been there on previous occasions and knows the owner only by sight, and stated he is certain the owner knows him as a customer, but not by name. He stated he talked with the owner, described only as a white male in his fifties. and stated they discussed the KING shooting. He advised he drank one beer and ate a hamburger. He estimated he stayed at this beer joint approximately 30 or 40 minutes and while having a hamburger, he stated he heard over the newscast at the beer joint that KING had died.

He stated he could not recall the exact time, but stated it was after dark when he heard concerning KING's death.

Thereafter, he advised he drove to the Manhattan Club, located on Highway 51 South, for the purpose of meeting BETTY SMITH and BOBBY EARWOOD, and upon arriving at the Manhattan Club, stated he observed æ veral police officers armed with shotguns guarding the area. He advised that at this time, the Manhattan Club was closed, and he then drove to "Lil Abners" Club nearby, where he met BETTY SMITH and BOBBY EARWOOD. He pointed out that EARWOOD, a white male, approximately 32, is employed at the "Lil Abners" club. He recalled they were closing the club on orders of the police at the time he arrived there, and estimated it was approximately 8:00 P.M., when he met his two friends.

He recalled that BOBBY EARWOOD owned and operated a red Chevrolet pickup truck, and was invited by EARWOOD to visit his apartment for a drink, since the club was closed. He stated he followed EARWOOD in his white Mustang to EARWOOD's apartment, located approximately two miles away. He stated he was not familiar with the address, and could not state the exact whereabouts of the location of the apartment.

He estimated that he stayed at this apartment with BETTY SMITH and BOBBY EARWOOD until at least 2:00 A.M., the following morning, after drinking a considerable amount, and drove back to New Albany, Mississippi, arriving there shortly after daylight on April 5, 1968.

He advised that on this occasion he was wearing a dark business suit, dark tie, and white shirt.

He volunteered to accompany Agents along the same route, if necessary, in an effort to establish his whereabouts on this date as he claimed.

With reference to his whereabouts, during the latter part of march and the first day of April, 1968, he advised he could not specifically give the names of any persons who could account for his whereabouts other than his mother, since he advised he was in New Albany at this time, and definitely had not gone to the State of Alabama. He advised that perhaps neighbors could vouch forthe fact that he was in New Albany. He stated he did not recall going to Memphis on this weekend.

He advised that he does not know a JOHN WILLIARD or a HARVEY LOWLEYER, and advised he has never used either of these names as an alias.

He advised that on the night of April 4, 1968, he did not at anytime go into the city area of Memphis, where the shooting took place.

DONALD SEWELL, employee, 7-11 Store, Number 34. 6099 Millbranch, Southaven, Mississippi, after being advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent and the nature of the investigation, furnished the following information:

He stated that the 7-11 Store purchases its beer from the Service Beverage Company at Clarksdale, Mississippi.

He stated that the Schlitz delivery man appears at that store every Wednesday.

He advised after examining his stock of Schlitz 12 ounce pop top cans that he had two six packs in his refrigerator with the date March 15, 1968. He stated that this 7-11 Store uses Toreador paper sacks. He advised they do not utilize a number or size 20 paper sack.

He was displayed artist's conception drawings from Birmingham and Memphis, Tennessee.

SEWELL recalled that in the latter part of March, 1968, a white male approximately 5'9" to 5'10" in height, age 27 to 28 years of age, small frame, with a dark crew hair cut, wearing a gray suit with black pin stripes, glasses with black rims, purchased beer at that store.

SEWELL stated that he could not recall what brand of beer this individual bought or how he paid for it.

SEWELL stated that he recalled this incident as the authorities in Memphis, Tennessee, had put a curfew on beer and liquor sales and that at the same time this individual was in the checkout line, a highway patrolman came to the store and told him to cut off beer sales.

SEWELL stated that he had to tell this individual to leave the store.

SEWELL again stated that he believes this incident took place during the latter part of March, 1968, when the City of Memphis first experienced racial problems.

SEWELL stated that he had never seen this individual before and has not seen him since. He stated he did not see which way he turned when he left the store nor did he observe an automobile.

He stated that this individual vaguely resembled the artist's conception drawing from Birmingham.

SEWELL stated that he doubted he could recognize this individual if he saw him again.

Mrs. JOHN RAY (EVA) WILLARD, Route 1, Roxie, Mississippi, was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent and the nature of the inquiry at the outset of the interview:

Mrs. WILLARD advised that her husband was on vacation from March 29 through April 8, 1968. She stated on March 29 and 30, 1968, her husband hunted turkey alone in the Homochitta National Forest which is located directly behind their home.

She continued that on Sunday morning, March 31, 1968, he hunted turkey in the forest with their son, KENNETH WILLARD, age 17. They returned home at noon and her husband flew his Piper J-3 airplane from the strip in front of his home to the Natchez-Adams Airport. She said that her husband rented a Cessna 150 and flew solo for about an hour and twenty-four minutes, traveling to Vicksburg, Mississippi and returning. She pointed out her husband is taking flying lessons and the log should reflect the time that he flew. She added her husband returned home from the airport during the afternoon of March 31, 1968.

She said on April 1, 1968, he went to the airport to fly, but due to inclement weather, he returned to his home in the Piper J-3 airplane.

She said on April 2 and 3, 1968, Mr. WILLARD assisted her in the preparation of flower beds, sodding her lawn with St. Augustine grass and did some painting in the home. She recalled that he remained at home during the entire period of April 2 and 3, 1968.

Mrs. WILLARD stated on April 4, 1968, her husband again went turkey hunting in the Homochitta National Forest and returned home at noon. They ate, rested and she and her husband fished in their pond on the farm. She said Mr. CLETES SEAIE, a neighbor, came by the farm pond and saw she and her husband fishing. She added that Mr. SEAIE also saw her husband on several occasions between the period March 29, through April 4, 1968.

The WILLARDs, according to Mrs. WILLARD, returned to their home some time between 4:30 and 5:00 p.m. on April 4, 1968, and Mr. WILLARD cleaned fish. She cooked steak for herself and her son and fried the fish for her husband. During the evening meal, they heard a special announcement over the television stating that MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR, had been shot and later the announcement came over the television indicating that MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR, was dead.

She pointed out that neither she nor her husband have been in Memphis in over ten years and was not aware of the slayer of MARTIN LUTHER KING. The artist's conception of the unknown subject in this case was shown to Mrs. WILLARD and she stated she did not know this individual. She pointed out that her husband for the past several years has been too busy working as Superintendent of the Natchez Gravel Company supervising Negroes at the gravel pit that he has little or no time to plan anything. She pointed out her husband is not that type of individual and is a very ttolerant, easy-going individual. She was not aware of anyone who might have used her husband's name in connection with the slaying.

She stated that to her knowledge, her husband had never been arrested in his entire life.
