On April 1, 1968, Mr. WILLARD stated he was at his home resting due to inclement weather, but when the weather permitted around 10:00 a.m. he flew back to the Natchez-Adams Airport for the purpose of taking another flying lesson. He was at the airport for several hours, but due to inclement weather he did not rent the Cessna 150 plane and returned home by his Piper J-3 plane.

Mr. WILLARD stated that on April 2 and 3, 1968, he was at his home assisting his wife in the preparation of flower beds and sodding the lawn with St. Augustine grass. In addition he had some work painting his home and remained at home during the entire period of April 2 and 3, 1968.

WILLARD continued that on the morning of April 4, 1968, he again went turkey hunting in the Homochitta National Forest, but was very tired and came home around noontime. He ate, rested and he and his wife, EVA, sometime during the mid-afteroon fished in their pond on the farm. He stated that Mr. CLETUS SEALS, a neighbor, came by the farm pond and noted he and his wife fishing on the afternoon of April 4, 1968, and further that Mr. SEALS could verify that he was home most of the time between the period, March 29 through April 4,1968.

Mr. WILLARD stated that he and his wife returned to their home between 4:00 and 5:00 p.m. on April 4, 1968, and he cleaned the fish while his wife cooked supper. He pointed out during the evening meal a special announcement came over his television stating that MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., had been shot in Memphis and a later announcement stated that KING was dead.

Mr. WILLARD stated that he has never been affiliated with any Klan or hate-type organization and in fact has a number of Negroes working under his supervision at the gravel pit.

He stated he is opposed to violence in any form and this is the first vacation he has had in several years working 12 to 14 hours per day.

Mr. WILLARD stated that he has not been in Memphis in ten or more years, does not own a white Mustang and is not aware of who assassinated MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

Mr. WILLARD was shown the artist's conceptions of the unknown individuals in this matter and he stated he was not aware of this individual's identity.

Mr. WILLARD advised that he is the Field Superintendent and a Co-owner of the Natchez Gravel Company, Liberty Road, Natchez, Mississippi, and works at the gravel pit for the company near his home.

He stated he worked Thursday, March 28, 1968, and from March 29 through April 8, 1968, he was on vacation. WILLARD said on March 29 and 30, 1968, he hunted turkeys alone in the Homochitta National Forest which is directly behind his home.

On Sunday morning, March 31, 1968, he hunted turkeys in the forest with his son, KENNETH WILLARD, age 17. At noon he returned to his home and flew his Piper J-3 plane from the strip in front of his home to the Natchez Adams Airport. There he rented a Cessna 150 and flew solo for about an hour and twenty-four minutes, traveling from Natchez and Vicksburg, Mississippi, and returning. He stated after the flight he returned from the Natchez-Adams Airport to his home on Route 1, Roxie, in his Piper J-3 airplane.

Mr. WILLARD stated that he is taking flying lessons and pilot CHRIS CUMBAS of Natchez Flying Service, Inc., signed WILLARD out on his logbook.

ALBERT C. LOGAN, Constable, Houlka (Chickasaw County), Mississippi, advised that ROY RAY LOGAN is his brother who resides on Madison Avenue in Memphis, Tennessee. He stated that if there was information contained in the records of the Holiday Inn, Memphis, Tennessee, that ROY R. LOGAN was registered from April 5-6, 1968, whose employment was shown as Chickasaw County Sheriff's Office, this information had to be erroneous. He explained that his brother, ROY RAY LOGAN, is employed on either a full-time or a part-time basis with the Shelby County Sheriff's Office in Memphis, Tennessee, and he thought perhaps that the records of the Holiday Inn were misinterpreted.

LOGAN further advised that he had not been in Memphis, Tennessee, during the past month and he could not account for the activities of his brother, ROY RAY LOGAN, on April 5 or 6, 1968. He stated that his brother is a friend of another Mississippi resident, FRED BALLARD, from Tupelo, Mississippi, who is also employed by the Shelby County Sheriff's Office.

LOGAN described his brother as being approximately 30 years of age and weighing over 300 pounds. He characterized him as being a person who just "naturally hated Niggers", and it would not surprise him if his brother was involved in the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING.

The telephone call was allegedly made from Jackson, Mississippi, to the State of Indiana, area code 317, number 282-3901.

The alleged telephone call was to the effect that the caller had left Memphis, Tennessee, April 4, 1968, and had traveled to Gulfport, Mississippi, where the caller had gotten rid of the vehicle hedwas traveling in and had rented lodging.

The word "KING" was mentioned several times during the conversation.

The anonymous caller said his friend would not identify herself to the FBI as she feared for her safety.

The telephone conversation was terminated by the anonymous caller at that time.

Mr. ROY HARDY, Route 3, New Albany, Mississippi, was interviewed at his residence in the presence of Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol (MHSP) Investigator BURT DUNCAN.

HARDY was questioned concerning his activities on the afternoon of April 4, 1968, at which time he advised that he is employed by BILL PHILLIPS, a road contractor, doing road work near Highway 30, and stated on this date it was too wet to operate the heavy equipment, and therefore he was not working. He advised he took this occasion to take his pickup truck to Harris Body Shop in New Albany, and stated after his truck was repaired he stopped by to visit his first cousin, TOM NELSON DAVIS, who lives on South Acres Drive in New Albany, HARDY admitted that he was drinking prior to the time he decided to visit DAVIS, and stated after arriving at DAVIS' house he offered him a drink of whiskey. He recalled that TOM NELSON DAVIS suggested they drive out to the Barbecue Grill at the Beacon Hill community, located just east of New Albany, Mississippi. Mr. WALTER KOONCE, manager, Southern Greyhound Terminal, Clarksdale, Mississippi, furnished the following information:

He called the Downtowner Motor Inn in Clarksdale on the night of April 4, 1968, to determine if rooms were available, since buses bound for Memphis, Tennessee, were not being allowed to enter the city of Memphis due to the civil disorder there following the shooting of MARTIN LUTHER KING. He stated that a bus from Vicksburg, Mississippi, which came through Greenville, Mississippi, arrived at Clarksdale on time — 9:41 PM. The bus did not proceed to Memphis.

One passenger, a white male, 45 to 50 years old, about six feet tall, 175 pounds, dark hair, with receding hairline, slightly protruding front teeth, attired in sports shirt and slacks, was upset because he was supposed to meet a boat in Memphis, Tennessee. This individual, name unknown, made a remark to the effect that MARTIN LUTHER KING "got what was coming to him," a remark which Mr. KOONCE stated he recalled because it was not appropriate for the time it was made.

Mr. KOONCE stated that the driver of the bus on which the above passenger arrived was Mr. HOOKER, who lives in Memphis, Tennessee.

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due to the security measures and internal controls in use at that facility, it would be nearly impossible for an employee to have someone clock in and out for him each day. He said the only way this could be done would be for another employee, who would have an identification card, to clock in and out for another employee, however, when an employee failed to report for work on his shift, a check was immediately made of the employees time card to determine if the employed had clocked in. He said LOFTON received full pay for the period in question which would indicate that he actually reported for work during the period.
