Dr. King Tragedy

The twisted mind behind the trigger that killed Dr. Martin Luther King in Memphis Thursday may have had some hazy idea that the shot was putting something straight; that an evil was being exorcised. But as a crime always does, it was sowing the seed of more evil, not less. Moreover, it was a perpetration of a deed that reverberated throughout the country, shocking, hurting and distressing people regardless of race or vocation who abhor violence and defiance of civilized conduct. Apprehension and punishment of the slayer, however important, can nev- the curse of the land." er atone for the wrong that has been done nor erase the damage of the several sorts that has become obvious.

Dr. King was controversial and aroused emotions of people accordingly. He was the winner of a Nobel peace prize and the most celebrated leader of his race in the pursuit of civil lights. His campaigns and demonstrations, pursued under his banner of non-violence sometimes led to violence, as it did nine days ago in Memphis. He affected his position somewhat by adhering to the claimed right of civil disobedience, a challenge to law questionable in a democratic society capable of remedying its wrongs through its ballot and constitutional process. Lately he had veered somewhat from the civil rights to the economic area, lending the support of his following and marches to labor unions in strikes and disputes with employers. At the time of his death he had returned to Memphis for a repeat demonstration or march (the first of which was broken up by rioting) in support of a two-months strike of garbage collectors against the city. The garbagemen were pressing for recognition of their union through

la strike which the mayor said was - Megal and which had been enjoined by a court.

Thus Dr. King was in a tense situation, which was apparent from the result of the first march. A controversial leader was on the way to becoming more controversial.

But the slayer's bullet settled no strike or any other issue. It created more tensions in many places. It was a dastardly missile, taking a life without justification or cause.

Sen. Frank Church was hardly wrong when he said of the killing: "We are steeped in violence; it is

Memorial Tribute Paid at LSU, Cathedral

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—White students from Louisiana State University joined hands with Negroes from residential districts and marched to the site of a memorial service for slain civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King here Sunday.

An ecumenical memorial service, attended largely by Negroes, was held for Dr. King at St. Joseph Cathedral in downtown Baton Rouge. After conducting a separate outdoor service on the university campus, LSU students held a procession through a predominantly Negro section in south Baton Rouge to the downtown cathedral

The students, numbering about, were joined by Negroes along the line of march to and from the cathedral.

Catholic, Protestant and Jewish clergy representing both races, conducted the memorial services before a crowd which spilled down the cathedral steps into the street outside.

There were no incidents along the line of students' march as police threw up a hurried escort to guide them through Sunday traffic.



For information of Baton Rouge and Lake Charles Resident Agencies, referenced teletype advises that suspect ERIC STARVO GALT, white male, dob 5'11", 175 lbs., blue eyes, brown hair, stayed at a rooming house in Birmingham from latter part of August, 1967, to early October, 1967. Sometime during this period, he purchased a 1966 white Mustang with \$2,000 cash. Persons interviewed by Birmingham have stated GALT indicated an interest in work as a seaman on barges or other vessels and may have been working aboard vessels or at docks previously.

Birmingham instituted a check with the Wages and Hours, Public Contracts Division, U. S. Department of Labor, for checks concerning investigations involving safety operations in which individuals working as seamen, dock workers and related occupations may have received compensation for injuries, theory being that GALT may have received compensation in October or in that period of time as a result of injuries received by him as a result of his employment.

Investigation at Baton Rouge through the State Employment and Security Commission reflects the following places where such records are kept:



Mrs. R. J. GLOVER is reportedly upset because GLOVER took out \$12,000 worth of life insurance on himself and made his girlfriend, EDNA PENNINGTON the beneficiary.

Mrs. GLOVER found this out when the policy came to the GLOVER residence by mistake. She is threatening to go to Vidalia, Louisma, and kill PENNINGTON.

Wrs. GLOVER's Didemobile car home after using it for some time and the muffler was torn up. Also the door was damaged. She reportedly told SONNY TAYLOR not to have anything to do with JACE SEALE and L. C. MURRAY as they "will sell you out".

BLUE MOLLOWAY told SORMY TAYLOR on April 5, 1968, he was working for the County Highway Department, Matchez, Hississippi, and had moved or was moving to Natchez.

WILSON was upset about the Negro riots and stated the klan

SILVER DOLLAR GROUP

R. J. GLOVER visited E. D. MORACE late on April 2, 1968, and asked MORACE if he had found a container for burying explosives yet. MORACE said he had a sheet metal man working on it. GLOVER was talking about TOMMIE LEE JONES and said he is sure JONES is an FBI informant and he is watching JONES, but does not want JONES to know it. GLOVER said someone had recently told him some more information about JONES being an informant. GLOVER recalled the time that JONES claimed his wife received a telephone call saying GLOVER and JAMES LEE were going to kill him. It was GLOVER's opinion that JONES was making that up just to throw them off.

GLOVER talked of the Negro situation and said there is sure to be riots all summer they must be ready to fight the Negroes. GLOVER said that some evening soon he wants E. D. MORACE and two other men to drive to Roxie, Mississippi and talk to JACK DAVIS, the barber there who helped GLOVER and DON WILKENSON when they had car trouble. GLOVER wants MORACE to express appreciation to DAVIS for this help. GLOVER was driving the pickup truck belonging to JACK SEALE.

GLOVER requested MORACE to ask JAMES SCAROBROUGH the next time he sees SCAROBROUGH about the meeting SCAROBROUGH and a group of men had two Sundays before and why MORACE and GLOVER were not invited.

JAMES SCAROBROUGH and E. D. MORACE talked on April 6, 1968, and MORACE asked SCAROBROUGH about a meeting he and some men attended two Sundays before. SCAROBROUGH said that was just the Concordia Parish Rifle Association. MORACE was later heard to remark that the meeting had to do with the Minutemen; he felt sure. SCAROBROUGH was getting ready for the Negro revolution which he feels sure is coming soon. His wife had just purchased a case of soup and a case of canned beans for him to stock the hunting camp on the levee near Ferriday, Louisiana.

MORACE stated that if the revolution was coming he needed a better weapon and that he found three men to go in with him to buy one of the machine guns SCAROBROUGH knew about. SCAROBROUGH said he had talked to the man recently and the price of a machine gun had gone up to \$165.00. MORACE asked SCAROBROUGH to see about getting him one.

SCAROBROUGH gave MORACE a stack of klan posters which he wanted put up on the highway near Ferriday, Louisiana, the night of April 10, 1968.

BILL BLANEY, WAYNE REED, DON WILKENSON, and E. D. MORACE met at the King Hotel, and the Bonanza Club at Ferriday, Louisiana, on the night of April 6, 1968. REED and BLANEY were intoxicated. REED asked MORACE of he would help WILKENSON out. WILKENSON then stated he feels sure ERNEST AVANTS has sold out to the FBI, like TOMMIE JONES. WILKENSON said that AVANTS has moved to a new house and got new furniture like JONES. WILKENSON said that if AVANTS talks it will send him, WILKENSON to the electric chair. WILKENSON said he wanted to know that if AVANTS talks that someone will take care of him. MORACE stated he would take care of AVANTS if AVANTS testifies against WILKENSON and sends him to the electric chair. WILKENSON did not say what crime he and AVANTS had committed.

In efforts to determine more about the operation of the Continental Dance Studio during the time it was being operated in New Orleans in 1964, and 1965, so that we might locate any contract for ERIC STARVO GALT, on this date I contacted SAC GAMBLE at Birmingham.

I reques**se**d GAMBLE to contact MARLIN MYERS who formerly operated the dance stadio in New Orleans to determine the following:

- (1) Did he have either an accountant or a CPA handle the books of the studio?
- (2) Identity of the bank where the studio had an account.
- (3) Did the dance studio sell the contracts to any local finance company or did the studio finance their own contracts.

SACCGAMBLE subsequently advised that according to MYERS, GALT was a regular customer and attended the dance studio from June, 1964, until about December, 1964.

The dance studio on occasion sold the contracts with customers to local finance companies; however, MYERS recalled that in the specific case involving GALT, they did not do this. GALT regularly kept up his payments until December, 1964, and when his payments got behind MYERS contacted telephonically the place where GALT lived and was informed by an unknown woman that GALT had left town.

MYERS could not recall the telephone number nor the area in New Orleans, but in some way the name of Napolean Ave., sticks in his memory, that he believed GALT lived in either a second or third rate rooming house.

SAC GAMBLE, Birmingham, advised that ERIC STARVO GALT on 9/12/67 answered an ad in a Birmingham newspaper put there by the Continental Dance Studios in Birmingham. He went to the Studio and there contacted a MARLIN MYERS and signed up for dance lessons. At this time MYERS recognized GALT as having been a former student at the Continental Dance Studio in New Orleans (729 Common Street) in 1965, date unknown. He took three months of dance lessons here. MYERS believes he showed up for the entire lesson.

According to MYERS, he had a partner, LOUELLA LUTZ, in New Orleans. Continental Dance Studio went out of business in October, 1965; LOUELLA LUTZ moved to California and took all the records.

When he was in Birmingham, GALT took four lessons (he signed up for five); 1/2 hour each week, 7:30 - 8:00 p.m. He left there 10/5, 6, or 7/67; he wrote a letter to the Studio stating he could not take the fifth lesson because he was leaving town; the letter was not kept.
