

5 - Ray was never considered for the sniper's part. After more than 25 years spent in prison, he would have been totally incapable of killing a man, at a distance of 203 feet, with a single well-placed rifle shot. Rather, his role was to be that of a decoy with instructions to plant false evidence, scatter about misleading clues and lay a false trail of flight in order to throw off potential pursuers of the real sniper. Unknown to him, of course, Ray had also been picked by the plotters as an ideal fall guy - for there is no more defenseless human being than an escaped convict after he has given his performance as a decoy. It was the old Oswald story all over again, with slight variations.

6 - A key element of the strategy was to create a fictitious double personality shared by Ray and his accomplice, the real sniper. They were men of similar appearance who studiously enhanced their likeness in looks, dress, speaking manner and carefully coordinated their activities. They drove exactly the same make and model of cars, used the same driver's license (one the original, the other a duplicate) and, in the final stage of their adventure, traveled abroad on two copies of the same false passport.

7 - Dr. King was not shot from Mrs. Beale Brower's telephone window; instead, the fatal shot came from a Memphis replica of the famous, grassy knoll of Dallas.

8 - After the shooting, Ray and his confederate, the real assassin, took off almost simultaneously in identical white Mustangs, but in different directions. While Ray drove to Atlanta, for his final performance as a decoy, the assassin headed for Milwaukee, for a reunion with his girl friend.

9 - The two men met again, shortly later, in Toronto where they shed their previous joint personality (Eric Starvo Galt) and adopted a new one (James Earl Ray). With the help of the CIA, which had previously used the good services of Eric S. Galt (the real killer, not Ray) as passport in that name was obtained in Toronto and another shortly later in London.

10 - Early in the game, the FBI found out that there were two Eric Starvo Galts and that one of them was the escaped convict James Earl Ray. But when they learned the identity of the other - a veteran CIA operative who had also participated in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy - they were appalled. This man was thick; he enjoyed protection at the highest level. He could not be arrested, much less brought to trial, lest the truth about the Kennedy murder would come out into the open.

11 - So the tracks now were further blurred with the active help of the CIA, which gave chase only to Ray while hiding his alibi, the real assassin, to hide abroad. Fantastic! Right, but also the truth.

12 - The crowning glory of it all, however, was the almost simultaneous report of both Snipers at London Airport on June 8, 1968, the first at 6:50 a.m. by design and the second at 11:15 a.m. by accident, one arriving by plane from London and the other attempting to jump London on a Brussels-London plane.

13 - For Scotland Yard was in a real quandary, for the first thing the FBI wanted was to have two Snipers delivered into its hands. So the two police agencies combined to brush up the truth about the double-sniper and pretend that only one man - Ray - had been caught.

In connection with the hearing which was to be held on December 12, 1968, at which time Judge Battle of the State Court was to inquire of Attorney Percy Foreman as to whether he is ready to proceed with trial on March 3, we have been advised there may be some delay.

SAC Jensen stated, according to information he received from the State's Attorney General and the Sheriff's Office, it appears Foreman will not show on Thursday, December 12, 1968, inasmuch as he has some commitments on the West Coast. If he does not, the hearing has been set for December 16, 1968.

The State also feels that Judge Battle is annoyed with the dilly-dallying on the part of the defense and is considering asking a public defender to appear in court, at which time he will instruct that the public defender be prepared to proceed with trial. This would not seem to be too logical a course. (This does not seem to be too logical a course inasmuch as the defendant is entitled to an attorney of his own choice in the event he has the ability to pay for it.)

It is also understood Percy Foreman has not asked to see any of the evidence nor has he conducted any investigation or interview of witnesses. He has, however, placed a lien on the Ford Mustang which was purchased by Ray and which was found in Atlanta.

**COST OF AIRPLANE TO RETURN
JAMES EARL RAY FROM
LONDON, ENGLAND, TO MEMPHIS, TENNESSEE**

On October 2, 1968, a memorandum from the Director went forward to Mr. Leo M. Pellerzi, Assistant Attorney General for Administration in the Department, transmitting a voucher in the amount of \$9,214.80 received from the Scott Air Force Base, Illinois, which covered the cost of the flight of the plane from the United States to England to pick up James Earl Ray and return him to the United States and that the Department could effect payment of this voucher which was erroneously directed to the Bureau. The Budget Officer of the Department at the time that this voucher was forwarded to the Department indicated that it would probably be paid from Department funds and that the State of Tennessee promised to reimburse the Department.

By way of background, when the arrangements were being effected for Ray's return to this country from London, England, by Fred Vinson, Assistant Attorney General of the Criminal Division in the Department, it was recommended that the Department should bear the expense and the Director indicated "Most certainly."

Pellerzi of the Department telephonically contacted the writer on December 3rd and stated he wondered if the Bureau as a favor would consider paying the voucher received from the Air Force in the amount of \$9,214.80 since the Department has endeavored to have both the State of Tennessee and the State of Missouri where Ray escaped prison reimburse it for this expense with negative results. Pellerzi stated that the Marshals' funds are practically exhausted and if there was any way the Bureau could pay this voucher it would be appreciated.

Inasmuch as the Director has previously concurred in the Department bearing this cost since they made all of the arrangements in connection therewith and further since this Bureau has itself expended over a million dollars in manpower and other expenses incidental to the King assassination case, it is not felt the Bureau should pay the voucher.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Pellerzi be informed that the Bureau cannot pay the voucher as requested by him.

SYNOPSIS:

This is the case involving the murder of Martin Luther King, Jr.

William Bradford Huie, author, has written two articles which appeared in "Look" magazine concerning James Earl Ray. These articles are based upon notes furnished to Huie by Ray.

Huie, in these articles, infers that a conspiracy exists; however, he did not set forth details to substantiate this. Huie states in these articles that an individual by the name of "Raoul" and Ray entered into a "joint activity" (not further described) and "Raoul" provided Ray with funds. The possibility exists that "Raoul" and Ray engaged in transporting contraband such as narcotics between Canada and the United States and the United States and Mexico as it is noted that Ray attempted to purchase marijuana in Mexico. Investigation by us, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and Mexican authorities has failed thus far to identify "Raoul" or to verify his existence. We have no information to date to indicate that Ray was involved in a conspiracy.

Huie, in these articles, sets forth motels that Ray was registered in as a guest that we were not previously aware of. We have checked this out, found it to be true; however, nothing of significance developed. Huie also, in his articles, furnished an account of Ray's employment at Winnetka, Illinois, which we previously were aware of; however, nothing of significance developed.

ACTION:

This is for information. At our request the Royal Canadian Mounted Police is continuing to run out Huie's statements regarding "Raoul" and we are continuing to remain alert to and will run out any allegations of a possible conspiracy, or any other information of pertinence.

DETAILS: This is the case involving the murder of Martin Luther King, Jr.

William Bradford Huie, author, previously advised us that he entered into a contract with James Earl Ray to write the true account of Ray's activities and background concerning the assassination of King. Huie has been provided with notes from Ray by Arthur B. Hanes, Ray's former attorney, and based upon these notes, Huie has written two articles which appeared in "Look" Magazine.

Huie, in these articles, inferred that a conspiracy took place as early as August, 1967, and continued up to the day King was assassinated; however, no specific detail was provided to bear this out. Huie also inferred that Ray was involved unknowingly, but again he provided nothing to substantiate this. Huie, in these articles, furnished an account of an individual by the name of "Raoul" and Ray entering into a "joint activity" for which "Raoul" would pay Ray \$12,000. The specific nature of the "joint activity" was not fully described or identified, but Ray was to transport packages (not further described) between the United States and Canada.

Huie further stated that "Raoul" met Ray at various motels in the United States, provided Ray with funds and Ray and "Raoul" met at the Mexican Border and an exchange of tires took place.

Extensive investigation by us, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and Mexican authorities has failed thus far to identify "Raoul" or to verify his existence. We have no information to date to indicate that Ray was involved in a conspiracy. It is quite possible that "Raoul" and Ray were engaged in some type of smuggling activity as the packages they were allegedly transporting and the tires they were allegedly exchanging could have contained contraband such as narcotics. It is noted that during October and November, 1967, when Ray was in Mexico, he made inquiry as to where he could purchase marijuana.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Never for a moment did I believe the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or any of its officers, had forbidden permission to inspect the premises at 422 1/2 South Main Street, Memphis, Tennessee by attorneys for the defense. I know it was a misunderstanding on the part of the custodian. I dictated my letter to you long distance within a few minutes of being refused access. Early the next morning, I was given permission by the owner to inspect the premises. I would have stopped my letter, but it had already been mailed.

Now, another facet presents itself: I am reliably informed that the F.B.I. had anticipated a possibility of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King for at least two years prior to April 3, 1968. If possible, I would like the privilege of talking with whomever in the F.B.I. is knowledgeable concerning threats against Dr. King. Also, I remember reading that a set of fingerprints was broadcast to law enforcement officers as those of James Earl Ray, but which were in fact of some other person. Is there anyone in the Bureau who could clarify these circumstances?

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Never for a moment did I believe the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or any of its officers, had forbidden permission to inspect the premises at 422 1/2 South Main Street, Memphis, Tennessee by attorneys for the defense. I know it was a misunderstanding on the part of the custodian. I dictated my letter to you long distance within a few minutes of being refused access. Early the next morning, I was given permission by the owner to inspect the premises. I would have stopped my letter, but it had already been mailed.

Now, another facet presents itself: I am reliably informed that the F.B.I. had anticipated a possibility of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King for at least two years prior to April 3, 1968. If possible, I would like the privilege of talking with whomever in the F.B.I. is knowledgeable concerning threats against Dr. King. Since the time preceded the date of the re-^{escape}lease of James Earl Ray from the Missouri State Penitentiary at Jeffersonville, there may be information available that will be of assistance to his defense.

By my memorandum 11/15/68, the Director approved that the Exhibits Section prepare a three-dimensional trial exhibit which had been requested by Phil M. Canale, Jr., District Attorney General for Shelby County, Tennessee.

During period 11/19-23/68 necessary measurements were taken of the crime scene area. Accompanying me were Exhibits Specialists Brent H. Hughes and F. Thomas Peyton. We met with Mr. Canale and other members of his staff and after surveying the area and hearing from them the location of their various witnesses, I informed them it will be necessary to construct two and possibly three models to properly show the relationship of the various buildings and also the interior of the rooming house from which the shot was fired. They were informed we will attempt to have these exhibits completed by 2/15/69. The trial is now scheduled for 3/3/69.

Mr. David Horowitz of the World-Union Press, United Nations, New York, directed a letter to us stating that the young man shown in the Warren Commission Exhibit photograph number 2632 seems to resemble the photograph of Ray as appearing in the November 26, 1968, issue of "Look" magazine (circulated November 12, 1968). Mr. Horowitz's letter was acknowledged by the Director.

Correspondent's reference to Warren Commission Exhibit number 2632 is a photograph of former Chief of Police Currey of Dallas, Texas Police Department holding a press conference on the third floor corridor of the Memphis Police Department, press conference televised sometime between period of 11/22-24/63. This photograph appears on page 232 in the Warren Commission Report.

It is noted that James Earl Ray was incarcerated in the Missouri State Penitentiary from March 17, 1960 to his escape on April 23, 1967. It is further noted that the photograph as contained in the Warren Commission Report as referred to by Mr. Horowitz was taken in November 1963; therefore, it is not possible for Ray to be included in this photograph.

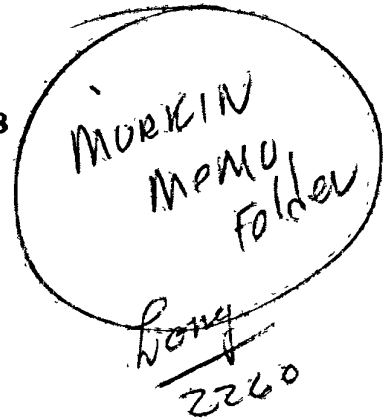
William Bradford Huie has written two articles for "Look" magazine concerning Ray and Huie has allegedly been commissioned by Ray to write Ray's life story.

Sheriff WILLIAM N. MORRIS, Shelby County, Memphis, Tennessee, advised on 11-19-68 he was in receipt of information that might be of interest to the FBI. This information is as follows:

JAMES EARL RAY has advised WILLIAM BRADFORD HUIE that he thought because of recent developments there might be a different approach to his trial, but that the final decision would be left up to PERCY FOREMAN, the new attorney. RAY also requested that any payments that might be due him for attorneys fees not be sent to anyone, including RAY's brother JERRY. RAY also reportedly told Mr. HUIE that he had read an article indicating that HANES is supposedly negotiating with "Life" magazine to sell the defense file which he was going to present at RAY's trial. RAY said that if this were so it would affect to a considerable degree the story being written by Mr. HUIE. RAY suggested to HUIE that in the event he wanted to correspond with RAY again he should do so through Mr. FOREMAN.

We have reviewed the article in the November 26, 1968, Look Magazine written by William Bradford Huie concerning the subject (pages 86-99).

It presents a number of objective facts as to Ray's travel and activities between April 23, 1967, and December 1967. To the extent possible, please determine the correctness of these facts if you have not already done so.

There are also a number of allegedly factual statements in the article which, as part of the continuing full investigation of this matter previously requested, require investigation in connection with the presence or absence of a conspiracy. While not inclusive, the ones appearing in this second article which seem to us to require investigation are:

1. In August of 1967, Ray crossed the Detroit-Windsor border, and made a \$4.50 import tax payment for a television he carried in his car. At this crossing, Ray had left Raoul at a Detroit bus station. Ray was instructed to wait at the Windsor railroad station for Raoul who was delivered there in a cab.

2. Ray allegedly arrived in Birmingham on August 25, 1967, from Canada, by way of Gary, Indiana, and Chicago (where he sold the red Plymouth).

3. On or near August 28, 1967, Ray received a letter from Raoul in Birmingham, and was told that night to meet Raoul at the Starlite Cafe on 5th Avenue

North, across from the Post Office. The article states that Ray and Raoul met at the cafe again the following night where Ray discussed with Raoul the Mustang he had found for sale.

4. On or about August 30, 1968, Ray paid William D. Paisley \$2,000 in \$20- or larger bills for the Mustang. The article states Ray "was handed the \$2,000 in Birmingham, perhaps only a few minutes before he handed it to Mr. Paisley." The denominations stolen from the Illinois bank which we believe Ray and one other man robbed may be relevant here.

5. Sometime after October 5 or 6, 1967, Ray stayed in a motel in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, where he met Raoul. Upon Raoul's instructions, Ray drove back across the Mexican border followed by Raoul in a cab. On the United States side, Raoul took a tire from a car waiting by a frame house, and placed it in Ray's car. Raoul and Ray then together drove through Customs. Raoul got out from the car, and Ray paid the inspectors \$3.00 to be cleared. It was here that Ray obtained his tourist card. Together, he and Raoul drove to Ray's motel where Raoul's car, with Mexican license plates was waiting. The next day, Raoul returned to Ray's motel. The tire was again placed in Ray's car. Ray in his car, and Raoul in his car, were passed through the interior customs.

6. In the middle of December 1967, Ray met Raoul again in a bar in New Orleans, and was given \$2,500 in \$20 bills. Ray contacted Raoul at the New Orleans phone number given Ray in Canada.

7. There is an account of Ray's contact with Rev. von Kos, head of the International Society of Hypnosis, in January 1968 and of his nose operation by Dr. Russell Hadley, plastic surgeon.

8. On March 15, 1968, "Ray received by mail . . . the directive he had been expecting. He was wanted in Selma and Birmingham, Ala." He registered in Selma on Friday, March 22, 1968, at the Flamingo Motel. The AP on March 21, 1968, reported that Dr. King was to be in Camden, Alabama, on March 21.

Please provide this Division (carbon copy to the Criminal Division) with a report of the results of your investigation and checking out of the facts as to Ray's travel and activities.
