In the second case, the victim complained that Judge Battle told a prisoner to be quiet in his courtroom and therefore, this was a violation of the victim's civil rights. In both of these cases, the complaints were referred to the Civil Rights Division of the Department and no further investigation was requested by the Department.

The Bureau files, as well as the Memphis files, contain no information of a derogatory nature concerning Judge Battle.

This is to advise that Special Agent Kenneth L. Bounds of the General Investigative Division on special assignment, Memphis, Tennessee, participated in the turnover of James Earl Ray to Sheriff William N. Morris, Shelby County Sheriff's Office on the morning of 7/19/68.

Sheriff Morris advised Special Agent Bounds he fully understood that once he accepted custody of Ray aboard the military plane, the responsibility of transporting the prisoner to the county jail rested entirely with the Sheriff. However, he asked if Special Agent Bounds could restrain the prisoner on the aircraft and accompany him with the prisoner to the county jail as a matter of cooperation. Special Agent Bounds agreed to this arrangement.

Shortly after the prisoner was legally turned over to the Sheriff, Special Agent Bounds proceeded to apply the Sheriff's restraining gear on the prisoner. The restraining belt was placed around the prisoner's waist and he was asked by Special Agent Bounds, "Is this too tight?" and the prisoner replied, "No." Special Agent Bounds then placed the Sheriff's handcuffs through the restraining belt and applied them to the prisoner's wrist at which time Special Agent Bounds asked the prisoner, "They are not too tight, are they?" and the prisoner replied, "That's fine."

Thereafter, the prisoner was escorted from the plane by Sheriff Morris and Special Agent Bounds and he was immediately placed into an armored car. Special Agent Bounds accompanied the armored car to the Shelby County Jail and upon arrival at the jail, Special Agent Bounds and Sheriff Morris hurriedly escorted the prisoner safely into the confines of the jail without incident.

SAC Jensen of the Memphis Office has telephonically furnished the following information.

James Earl Ray was arraigned before Judge W. Preston Battle in Shelby County criminal court this morning at 10 a.m. and by mutual agreement of the Judge, the prosecutor and defense counsel, trial has been set for 11/12/68.

The entire proceedings took only approximately ten minutes.

Ray was brought from his cell on the third floor of the Shelby County Jail into the courtroom by Shelby County Sheriff William N. Morris and his two chief deputies.

The indictment was read to Ray who was represented by Attorney Arthur Hance and his son and Hance inquired of Judge Battle as to whether Ray was required to enter a plea.

Judge Battle advised Hanes that he could enter a plea at the arraignment if he desired or could do so at a later date whereupon Hanes entered a plea of not guilty. Immediately after the trial was set Ray was returned to his cell in the Shelby County Jail.

There were only approximately thirty speciators in the courtroom including representatives of the press. All persons entering the courtroom were searched and they were photographed and their voice/recorded on video tape.





James Earl Ray was returned to the United States today on a U. S. Air Force plane in the custody of FBI Agents and was turned over to the Sheriff's Office of Shelby County (Memphis). Tennessee, early this morning. This mission was completed without incident.

The extradition order was signed by the British Home Secretary at 6 p.m., London time, 7/18/68 (1 p.m., Washington, D. C., time).

The Air Force plane departed London at 7:38 p. m., Washington, D. C., time, 7/18/68, and touched down at the Naval Air Station in Memphis, Tennessee, at 4:37 a.m., Washington, D. C., time, 7/19/68. The subject was afforded a physical examination by the Air Force flight surgeon aboard the aircraft, was processed by the Customs Inspector and Ray was then turned over to the custody of Sheriff William M. Morris of the Shelby County (Memphis), Tennessee, Sheriff's Office.

The subject was then transported in an armored van preceded by three Sheriff's Office cars and followed by three additional Sheriff's Office cars. The party escorting the prisoner left the Naval Air Station at Memphis at 5:07 a.m., Washington, D. C., time, and Ray was incarcerated in the Shelby County Jail at 5:32 a.m., Washington, D. C., time. The transportation of the subject from Great Britain to the Naval Air Station in Memphis and from thence to the jail was accomplished without incident.

According to SA Harold Light, who was in charge of the FBI escort crew, Ray was no problem on the plane, was docile and although food and drink was offered to him, he declined to eat or drink. No effort was made to interview him and he volunteered no information. The Air Force flight surgeon, after giving Ray a physical examination on departure from England and arrival in Memphis, stated that he was in good physical condition.

Representatives of the Yard advised that pending Ray's actual removal to the United States that they did not intend to conduct further investigation to substantiate this theory since they were extremely fearful if information regarding Ray's participation in the attempted robbery of the jewelry store and other possible scores became known to the press, Ray's solicitor may insist that Ray be charged in order to clear him of any such charges.

Legal Attache, London advises that the above information may be furnished to the Department of Justice with the understanding that the information regarding the attempted jewelry store holdup should not be revealed to the press or public sources at this time.

Attached is a copy of a letter the Attorney General received dated July 11, 1968, from Arthur Hanes, counsel for the above subject, and a copy of my response.

The Attorney General has now received letters from both the subject and his attorney concerning Ray's intent and wish not to be interrogated. There is the added factor that, on his trip back, Ray will be in restraining devices on a military aircraft.

Because of these factors I have grave doubts that we could ever sustain the burden of proving a knowing and intelligent waiver of those rights referred to in the Miranda opinion.

Therefore, it is my recommendation no effort be made to interrogate Ray on his return trip to the United States. However, this does not mean that statements volunteered by Ray may not be used under some circumstances.

This includes transportation to the United States in the event he is extradited. This man seems to have fear for his personal safety while in the custody of the Justice Department, and I respectfully request that I be given permission to accompany this man, along with the Justice Department agents, on his trip to the United States if extradited.

John Minnich, Legat London, called at 6:20 a.m., 7/15/68, to advise that a Government board in London which grants legal aid certificates has refused to grant a certificate to James Earl Ray. Board has indicated it would be a waste of money to take Ray's cause to the high court.

The solicitor who is acting for Ray is appealing this board's decision to an appeals committee which will hear this on Wednesday, 7/17/58. If the appeals committee upholds the board's decision, that will be the end of Ray's legal actions and Ray's case will not go to the high court unless Ray or someone else will put forth money for legal aid. In the event no one puts up money, it means in all probability the final orders will be signed by the Home Secretary on or about 7/19/68. According to Minnich, this will mean that the Bureau will have to be prepared to move on the evening of 7/19 or 20, 1968.

Minnich states foregoing information will be telephonically given to Assistant Attorney General Vinson by the Consul General at the Embassy today at 12:15 p.m., London time, 7:15 a.m., Washington time.

It is noted Ray had been ordered extradited by the Magistrate's Court in London on 7/2/68. The procedure permits an appeal to be filed within 15 days and it was previously indicated an appeal would be filed 7/17/68 and heard 7/29/68.

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
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

It is further requested that the Bureau furnish the Criminal Division with a copy of the arrest record of James Earl Ray.

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

SUBJECT: MURKIN

In connection with transportation of subject Ray from London to the United States, the question of when the local authorities, namely the Tennessee State authorities, will take custody of subject Ray has been decided today.

SAC Jensen, Memphis, has been in touch with the Sheriff and the Sheriff has indicated that he plans to take subject Ray into custody upon arrival of the plane in the United States at the Memphis Naval Air Station.

This will facilitate the handling of subject Ray insofar as the Bureau is concerned inasmuch as it had been indicated it would be preferable to have the Tennessee authorities assume the responsibility of taking Ray into custody as soon as the plane touches down.

The Sheriff has selected a special group to handle the subject and has made preparations for transportation from the airport to the jail in anticipation of assuming this responsibility.

ACTION:

Assistant Attorney General Vinson will be advised of the decision of the Sheriff to handle subject Ray upon touch down at the Memphis Naval Air Station.
