The previously submitted bedspread, specimen Q13, is composed of brown cotton fibers, green cotton fibers and green rayon fibers. Brown cotton fibers, green cotton fibers and green rayon fibers that could have come from the Q13 bedspread were found on Q95, Q97 through Q104 and Q106 and in the Q117 sweepings. No such fibers were found on Q89 through Q92 or in the Q114 through Q116 sweepings.

Caucasian head hairs like the hairs previously found on the Q13 bedspread, in the Q15 sipper bag, on the Q26 towel, on the Q29 and Q30 socks and on the Q38 hairbrush were found on Q35, Q37, Q39, Q100 and Q103. These hairs could have come from the same person. It is pointed out that hairs do not possess enough individual microscopic characteristics to be positively identified as originating from a particular person. Caucasian head hairs were also found in the Q114 through Q117 vacuum sweepings. Some of these hairs are like the Q13, Q15, Q25, Q20, Q30 and Q23 hairs and could have come from the same person. Some Q114 through Q117 are different from the Q13, Q15, Q26, Q30, Q30 and Q38 hairs and did not come from the same person. No hairs were found on Q33 through Q32, Q33, Q101, Q102, Q104 or Q103.

The Q80 through Q91 floor mats are composed of translucent red plastic. No brand names are indicated on the mats. The letters "MIS" are hand printed on the back of each mat, apparently with a felt tip marker. The significance of the letters is not known.

Specimen Q02 is a black and gray plaid rubber mat. No marks were found on Q92.

Specimens Q94, Q103 and Q109 are standard items furnished with Mustangs.

Specimen Q95 is a dark blue short-sleeved sweat shirt of medium size. No labels or laundry marks were found on Q95.

Specimen COS is a black and white rubber sandal for the left foot. A label on the bottom bears the following: "MEN'S - N SHOE SIZE 7-82 JAPAN"

Specimen Q97 is a twin-bed size, fitted, white bed sheet. Specimen C99 is a white pillowease. A white laundry tape is present on C97 and C99. The following is printed in black on each tape: "2-0R-3" It was concluded that the marks on these tapes did not originate from the machine which prepared the laundry tapes on the C69 shorts and the Q70 T shirt.

Specimen Q93 is a black and white shirt jacket. The following is present on the label of Q93:

H RN19783 653 DACRON 358 COTTON T5-154 MONTICELLO SHIRT JACKET TAPERED"

Specimen Q100 is a twin-bed size, fitted, white bed sheet. The sheet is in two pieces. The two pieces are stitched together with yellow thread and white thread. Inquiry at a department store in Washington, D. C., developed the following information concerning Q100: It is a #3 grade irregular seamed sheet. Nost such sheets even if manufactured in the United States are sold in other countries. It sold in this country, they are sold in low class "illegitimate stores." Such sheets do not bear the manufacturer's name.

Specimen Q101 is a black short-sleeved shirt. The following is present on the label of Q101:

"ARTURO ROSETTI CUSTOM TAILORED -L- 100% COTTOM MADE IN U.S.A. RM15722"

Specimen Q102 is a pair of clive green walking shorts. The following is present on the label of Q102:

"Hong kong diplomat custom tailored 65% polyester Piere 35% super fine cotton vaist 34"

Specimen Q103 is a light pink, looped pile cotton rug that measures 24" by 56%". No labels were found on Q103.

Specimon Q104 is a feather pillow that measures about 19" by 24". The pillow has a specification label. The back of the label is stomped "9 1007."

Specimen Q105 is a container for a Polaroid camera, possibly a model 230. No label was found on Q108.

Specimen Q106 is a pair of men's stretch socks with no label.

Other than the laundry tapes on C97 and C99, no visible laundry marks were found on may of the cloth items listed above. No invisible laundry marks were found on any of these items.

No buttons are missing from any of the garments listed above.

The Q107 hunting knife has a blade that measures 3 9/16" in length. The blade is rusty. The words "GESCO JAPAN" are imprinted on one side of the blade and the number "45" is imprinted on the other side. The word "GESCO" is stamped on the sheath.

Specimen C110 is a flat-tipped Stanley brand screwdriver.

Specimen Cill is an "ANCO" brand windshield wiper blade. Part of the rubber has been torn off.

Specimen Q112 is a "Personna" double-edge razor blade. No hairs were found on Q112.

The K30 and K44 through K50 soils from Hemphis are different from the soil found on the proviously submitted Q13 bedspread in physical characteristics and composition. Therefore, the soil from the bedspread and not come from the sources of K30 and K44 through K59.

No soil similar to the soil from the bedspread was found in Q113, Q143 through Q153, Q160 and Q161 or on the Q163 tire and wheel. None of these soils from the car originated from the source of the soil on the bedspread.

Although nothing was noted which would aid in the determination of the original sources of specimens Q113, Q143 through Q143, Q143, Q149, Q151, Q152, Q154 and the soil from Q163, they are suitable for comparison purposes. Specimens Q147, Q150, Q153, Q155

No soil of value for significant comparison was found on QS9 through Q106 or in the vacuum sweepings, specimens Q114 through Q117. The mineral debris in Q114 through Q117 consists of typical car floor debris, a mixture of miscellaneous materials from numerous courses. Ho mineral debris of apparent significance was found in Q114 through Q117.

The scrapings from under the glove compartment, Q159, do not contain blood.

The Q163 liquid was identified as water. No traces of any alcohols such as used in windshield wash were identified in this specimen.

He said his comments con-cerning Ray's jail conditions were made in court when he started to make an oral motion. and were repeated in a written motion at Battle's request. He said he may have repeated the gist of the motion in out-of-court remarks.

Hays, the private detective, denied making four of five statements attributed to him in Edmundson's story.

CHICAGO (# - James Earl Ray, charged with murdering Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., worked for two months in a restaurant shortly after his 1967 escape from a Missouri prison, the Chicago Tribune said Thursday in a copyright article.

The paper said the disclosure John L. Rayns when he applied by the owners of a Winnetka for a job June 24, 1967. He lef restaurant to FBI agents sup there unexpectedly. plied the missing link in Ray's whereabouts since his escape from prison April 3, 1967. King was shot in Memphis, on April 14 this year.

> The Klingemans found their employe efficient and raised his salary from \$103 to \$117.50 a week, the Tribune said.

> The paper said Mrs. Klingeman recalled that Ray received a phone call June 24 and a short time later the unidentified man appeared at the kitchen door.

The next day, Ray failed to report for work. The Klingemans received a letter from their employe a few days later, which was postmarked Quincy, Ill., and asked them to forward his check to a post office box in Winnetka.

Less than a year later, when the FBI released photos of Ray as a suspect in the King assassination, neither the Klingemans nor their 72 employes connected Ray and "Rayns.

However, the couple shown several photos of Ray during the FBI interview, the paper said, and identified him as "Rayns."

TO THE FBI, Atlanta, Ga.

Here is some information I feel you may be interested in and I wish to report it in the hope it will be of value to you, but also hope you will not make "my name public.

On the evening of Sunday June 2nd 1968 my niece, husband and children from Illinois came to visit me on their vacation.

On Monday the next day, June 3rd, they felt too tired from their trip to do much sight seeing around Atlanta, but suggested they would like to go the the airport in the evening to see the Jets come in and take off; a past time enjoyed by many people.

That evening of June 3rd when we walked into the main upper lobby of the airport building about 7 PM Atlanta time, we heard a loud voice coming over the airport loud speaker calling Cerr an o - Cerrano. It was repeated several times asking the party to come to one of the ticket counters. My friend who lives with me looked at me and I at her both thinking what an odd name with both first and last names the same.

We went immediately to the observation platform and enjoyed seeing the children enjoying the sights. As I was seated on one of the benches 3 men pushed by me rather rudely, so I took special notice of them. One, a thin slender, blonde about 5ft5inches long thin face with very light complexion. A second man short about 5ft, round face dark hair but looked american, and a taller man about 5ft 9- thin, dark brown hair and dark skin who looked foreign to me. Their countenances looked evil to me and they seemed to be in a hurry. I jumped up from the bench to find the children not knowing whant 3 men were up to. Then I saw them enter (the 3 men) the inner glassed in portion of the observation platform and pointing towards the Eastern air lines planes. The thought crossed my ming and I wondered whether they were plotting to hi-jack a plane. Then they disappeared.

About ten minutes to 9 PM we left the platform going back thru the main lobby to the parking lot to get our car. Again when we entered the lobby we still heard the name Cerrano Cerrano being called and repeated several times. I kept wondering to mys_elf what was the significance of that name.

The next morning Tuesday June 4th when we heard that Robert Kennedy had been shot by a man whose name was SIRHAN SIRHAN, I still could not shake off the feeling of the night before. Then when a clear picture of Sirhan was shown on the news on TV I saw the feed was that of one of the 3 men seen at the airport evening SERVALUED FREED.

Perhaps I should have reported this before but I am one Gho 6058 not want to get myself involved either and tried to forest it ANYA But this morning when reading the Atlanta Constitution page 7 and account of Earl Ray (Kings murderer) telling a news man about a Blonde Latin aman who had made different kinds of arrangements

for him, I thought could this be the same blonde man I saw at the airport and a part of some type of conspiracy? It is since reading this mornings paper that I felt urged very strongly to report what I had heard and seen at the airport on the night of June 3rd 1968.

I shall be glad to discuss this with you but believe I have given all the important details. I would appreceiate very much also that you not give me any publicity in this matter. I am not easily scared and have no fear/ofrem the wrong element. I have reported things before to the FBI here in Atlanta and respect your good judgment.
