Airmail copy of Bureau cablegram dated 10/16/68 received in Buffalo late afternoon $10/\overline{17}/68$. Page 2, paragraph 2, states "Arrangements for interviews of witnesses in Toronto can be best handled through the Buffalo Office; therefore, Buffalo Office immediately sutel if arrangements can be made through RCMP in Toronto for representatives of CANALE to interview witnesses.

Since the above paragraph was not the essence of instructions received from Bureau Supervisor RICHARD LONG, Civil Rights Section, Bureau, I phoned him at 8:45 AM, 10/18/68. He indicated that instructions in the quoted paragraph had been superseded by his telephone call (see my earlier memo) and that the Bureau had never intended for Buffalo Agents to make specific arrangements for interview of witnesses in Toronto. I told him that SA JAMES MC MAHON, the road trip Agent to Toronto, had met the three visitors at the Airport and handled their introductions to RCMP officials. Supervisor LONG indicated that this was the exact intent of the Bureau and that an airtel advising of this action should be sent and that no teletype was necessary.

During this conversation it was mentioned to Mr. LONG that the schedule which these visitors have set for themselves is a very ambitious one and SA MC MAHON and I, who were in Toronto during the initial interviews of most of these witnesses, very much doubt that these projective interviews by these Tennessee visitors can be handled by close of business Friday, 10/18/68. He requested again that Buffalo be in a position to advise Legat, Ottawa, of the travel plans when the visitors depart Toronto for Montreal.

At 9:00 AM on 10/17/68, Inspector CARL DOEY, RCMP, Toronto, Ontario, Canada, was contacted and informed that Misters DWYER, BEASLEY and CARLISLE were scheduled to arrive at the Toronto International Airport at 1:57 PM, 10/17/68. At the same time, Inspector DOEY was informed of the respective positions of these men.

Inspector DOEY indicated that he had already received instructions from Ottawa as to the impending arrival of these men in Toronto and the purpose of their trip, but that their specific arrival time had not previously been furnished to him. He added that he was assigning Corporal JOHN DUNLOP of the RCMP, who participated in the original investigation of RAY's activities in Toronto, to "look after" these representatives of the State of Tennessee.

It should be noted in connection with this particular conversation with Inspector DOEY that he made the observation that it appeared highly improbable to him

that these men would be able to interview all of the people they wanted to talk to and still leave Toronto for Montreal on Friday, 10/18/68.

At 2:08 PM, 10/17/68, Misters DWYER, BEASLEY and CARLISLE were met at the ramp of the Toronto International Airport by SA JAMES P. MC MAHON of the Buffalo Office and Corporal DUNLOP of the RCMP as they alighted from their plane. Their passage through Canadian immigration and customs was facilitated by Corporal DUNLOP and they were thereafter driven to Headquarters of the RCMP in Toronto in an RCMP car by Corporal DUNLOP. During the brief discussion at the airport, DWYER, BEASLEY and CARLISLE expressed their appreciation for the cooperation of the FBI, pointing out that they "don't know what they would have done if it were not for the Bureau."

At that same time, it was pointed out to these gentlemen that the possibility of arranging all of the interviews which they indicated they desired while in Toronto would be extremely unlikely in the one full day which they have allocated for their stay in Toronto particularly since at least two of the interviews, those of the two landladies at the residences in Toronto at which RAY had stayed required the services of a Chinese and Polish interpreter. Despite this, they insisted they were committed to adhere to their original schedule and that they would have to accomplish as much as they could during the time they had allocated for Toronto.

Arrangements were made with Corporal DUNLOP for him to notify the Buffalo Office just as soon as the men from Tennessee "firmed up" their plans for departure from Toronto for Montreal.

As per instructions of ASAC CAMPBELL, the writer telephonically contacted Chief Superintendent JOSEPH DOWNEY, RCMP, Toronto, at about 9:00 AM, 10/17/68, at which time Superintendent DOWNEY suggested that I handle this matter through Inspector DOEY and thereupon had my call transferred to Inspector DOEY.

During my discussion of the matter with Inspector DOEY, it was agreed that the RCMP would handle all of the necessary arrangements for interviews including that of Police Officer SNEXDN of the MTPD. Inspector DOEY indicated that he would contact Deputy Chief B. O. SIMMONS to arrange for that interview at the pleasure of the gentlemen of Tennessee.

During discussion at the Airport, Corporal DUNLOP indicated to me that he had already made arrangements with Detective Sgt. ROD MARSH of the MTPD who had originally worked with him on this investigation to assist in arranging matters for the gentlemen from Tennessee.

At 5:00 PM, 11/25/68, Bureau Supervisor RICHARD LONG phoned with regard to a portion of JAMES EARL RAY's story that appears in the 11/26/68 issue of "LOOK" Magazine at page 87. It is set out there that RAY crossed the International Border at Windsor-Detroit and was carrying with him certain contraband packages in behalf of "RAOUL" secreted in RAY's old red Plymouth automobile. RAY, according to the account, declared a TV set at U. S. Customs, hoping to avoid a search of his car. He claims the declaration procedure required about 30 minutes and he paid \$4.50 duty on this TV set which he had purchased earlier in Montreal. According to the account, the receipt for the duty payment was issued in the name of ERIC S. GALT and this entry occurred in August or September, 1967.

Supervisor LONG said a complete check had been made of U. S. Customs records, Detroit, where no record of this claimed declaration was located. At Detroit the records were filed by item and during the period under review only 3 TV sets have been declared, none of which was in the name of ERIC S. GALT or any other known aliases of RAY.

LEAD:

Explore feasibility of checking U. S. Custom records at all entry points in Buffalo Division to see if this entry may have been here rather than in Detroit. This investigation should be handled on a priority basis.



William Bradford Huie has written a third article for "Look" magazine. The article appears in the issue dated April 15, 1969, but this issue was circulated on April 1, 1969. A review of the article reveals that James Farl Ray allegedly registered at the Travelodge Motel, Five Points, Birmingham, Alabama, on March 29, 1968; at a motel near Florence, Alabama, on April 1, 1968; and at a motel near Corinth, Mississippi, on April 2, 1966. It is to be noted that Ray, using the name Harvey Lowmyer, negotiated the purchase of a rifle at the Aeromarine Supply Company, Birmingham, Alabama, on March 29 and 30, 1968. On April 3, 1968, he was registered at the Rebel Motel in Memphis, Tennessee.

In an effort to establish whether or not Ray was in contact with any individuals immediately prior to the assassination, appropriate investigation should be conducted by the Birmingham and Jackson Offices. It should be understood that there is to be no indication made whatsoever that the following investigation has any connection whatsoever with the case involving James Earl Ray.

Birmingham and Jackson Cifices should make inquiries of the motels in or near the cities indicated above to determine the identities of individuals registered during the period hiarch 29 to April 3, 1968. Efforts should be made to identify all individuals listed. So well as

obtaining descriptions and registrations for the automobiles of such persons. A review of such records might indicate whether any one individual might have accompanied Ray or been in contact with him during this period. Pertinent or questionable registration records should be obtained if possible for examination by the FBI Laboratory.

Memphis should insure that the Bureau is kept currently advised of pertinent developments in this case, particularly all aspects of court action since the death of Judge Hattle on March 31, 1969.



New Data Claimed In King Slaying

ATLANTA, Ga. (A) — Georgia's public safety commissioner, Reginald Eaves, says he will release a report today which he claims contains new information about the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Eaves originally scheduled a news conference for Monday to release the report, then put it off for a day. No reason was given for the postponement.

Glenn Foster, a state police spokesman, said Eaves was given a four-page "overview" of the information Friday and had been reviewing it since then.

Eaves said five weeks ago that he had evidence pointing to a conspiracy in the slaying of the civil rights leader in Memphis, Tenn., on April 4, 1968.

FBI Unimpressed

The FBI dismissed the report as "no new information." The federal agency said it had checked out the same material in 1971.

Eaves countered by saying, "If it had been investigated earlier we would not have been involved."

He said the information was delivered to him by "someone I respect a great deal," but he refused to identify the person.

Published reports have indicated that the material quoted Robert Byron Watson, 21, a convicted felon, who said he overheard several Atlanta men discuss a plot to kill King the day before the civil right leader was slain.

Eaves has refused to confirm that Watson, who was 14 at the time of the killing, was the source of his material.

Katzenbach Raps Hoover on King

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach testified on Wednesday that J. Edgar. Hoover risked the reputation of the FBI — "his life's work" — in a vendetta against Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Katzenbach told the Senate Intelligence Committee that when he was attorney general during 1965-66 he knew of telephone wiretaps against Dr. King by the FBI and once ordered a tap on Dr. King's home phone ended.

But he said he learned later the FBI put electronic "bugs" in Dr. King's hotel room without authorization and used other "unlawful and grossly improper" tactics against Dr. King.

The committee, investigating FBI harassment of Dr. King which allegedly continued for seven years until Dr. King was assassinated April 4, 1968, also was told Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy authorized telephone taps against Dr. King after Hoover insisted Dr. King was under Communist influence.

When questioned about three memos to him written by Hogver in 1965, giving what Katzenbach called "after-thefact" notification of bugs in Dr. King's hotel room, he said the memos contained initials "that appear to be mine" — but he said he could not recall the memos, and said he did not think he initialed them.

There was no explanation as to who else might have initialed the memos.

Katzenbach said Hoover held "conservative views" and as he "grew older and the country changed — for the worse, in his view — the intensity of those feelings and the frustrations at what was taking place grew."

Dr. King criticized Hoover and the FBI, Katzenbach said, and Hoover's "capitulation to personal pique stemming from public criticism of the FBI was particularly reprehensible and clearly contrary to the interests of Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, constitutional government and the nation."


