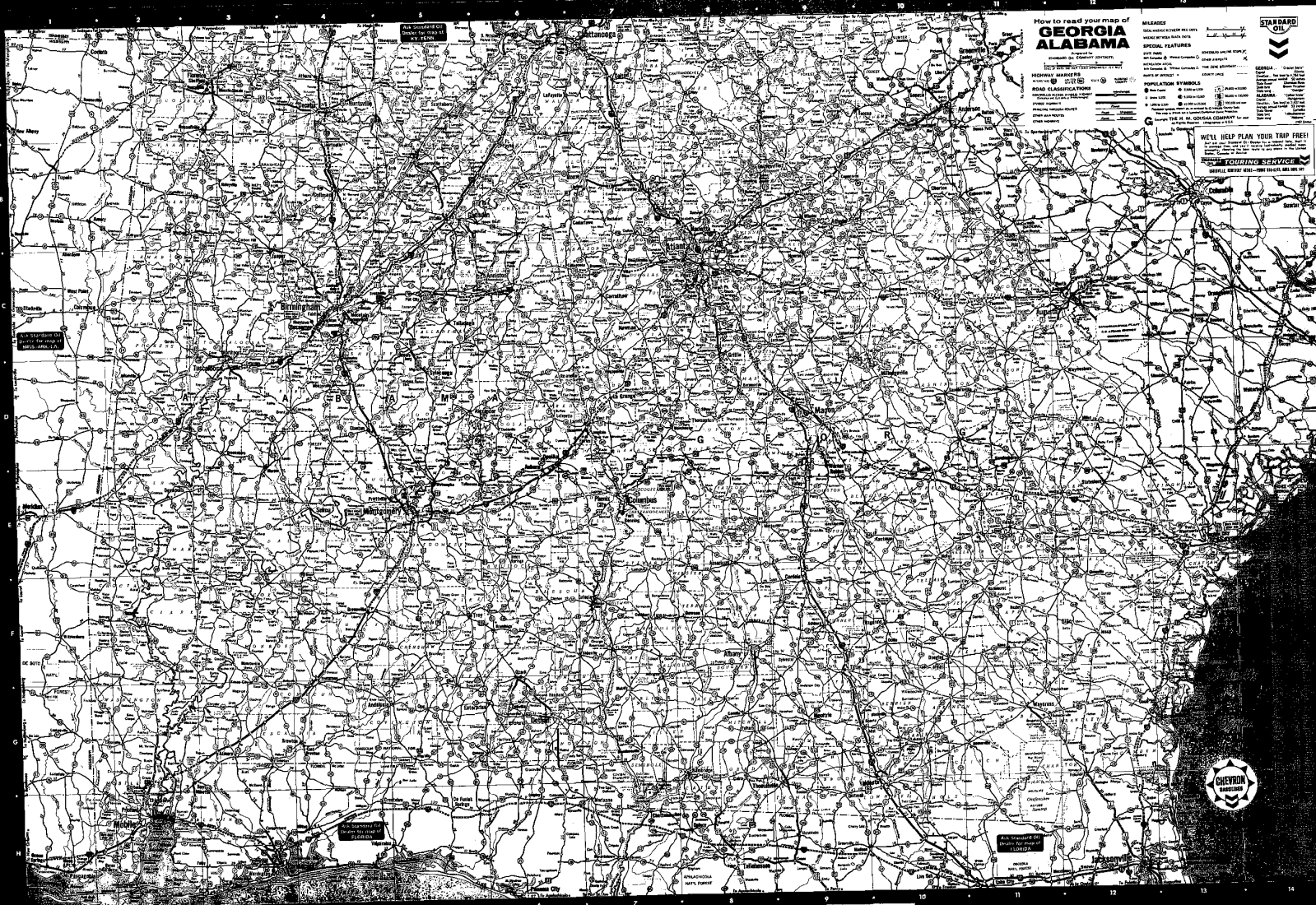

LBJ's Health Is Discounted As Factor In Withdrawing

President Johnson's health would have permitted him to become a candidate for another term of office, two of his physicians said yesterday.

Dr. James C. Cain of the Mayo Clinic of Rochester, Minn., said the President, who is 59, is in excellent condition.

His cardiologist, Dr. J. White Hunt of Emory University at Atlanta, said Mr. Johnson has "had no trouble at all" since the heart attack in 1955 and there is no reason to believe he would be in any danger during the next four years.

While health presumably was not involved in the aborting of the President's decision, the physicians indicated that had they been asked for a medical opinion, neither would have hesitated to give his approval.

Some speculation on reasons for the decision, other than those Mr. Johnson gave, has involved concern over whether he could withstand four years more of burden.

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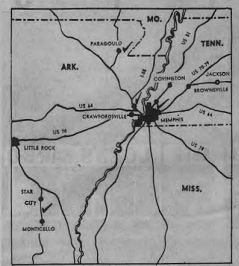

Tornado Strikes Near Millington; At Least 30 Hurt

An estimated 30 to 40 persons were injured when a tornado slammed through the Shady Lawn Trailer Court at 7800 Raleigh-Millington Road, near the climax of a night in which violent weather left persons dead in Arkansas and Tennessee.

Two persons were reported dead at Alhaka, Tenn., 35 miles northeast of Memphis, late last night and seven were known dead after an earlier tornado which ripped from the Star City, Ark., area before disappearing around Hughes.

Eleven persons went to Crittendon Memorial Hospital in West Memphis, Ark., after deputies and Arkansas State Police freed them from the rubble of houses which were wrecked in Vincent, Ark., and four others were taken there after a house trailer was overturned at James Mill.

Shelby County Sheriff William N. Morris Jr. said a father and his child were believed to be the only persons seriously injured when the tornado hit the southwest corner of the trailer park south of Millington where 200 to 300 trailers are usually parked.

He said the man was injured when hit by a flying television. Most of the injured were being taken to Mary Hospital in Millington.

Residents in the trailer court said they had almost no warning of the storm which hit around 11 p.m.

"We were both in our back bedroom and we had just went to bed," said Mrs. Michael D. Dutton. "I remember thinking it was time to go to bed. I told him to go to the baby. Just as we got to be near the trailer turn-over, we had just a few minutes, thank the good Lord."

Robert Mueller of the Millington Fire Department, who lives at the trailer park, stood beside his demolished house with a double-barreled shotgun and said he, his wife, three sons and a grand-daughter were in the trailer when a television crashed under asphalt the top through a wall of the trailer and landed in bed with one of his sons. No one was injured.

Refugees from the park and about 40 persons who were separated from their families were at Baker Community Center near the trailer park. Sheriff Morris said arrangements were made for lodging for all the park residents.

"We were lucky on injuries," he said. Four bodies were said to have been run out of the park after the storm. Officials still were totaling damage to at least 40 trailers, many turned over and ripped apart by high winds that accompanied the twister.

Tennessee Highway Patrol men looked for survivors and persons left homeless by the storm.

In Memphis, when Civil Defense sirens were sounded, many persons reported they tried to get into buildings marked as shelters and found Tennessee Highway Patrol men looked.

King Challenges LBJ Going To Hawaii Today To Consult On Peace Moves, Set Stage For Red Meeting

But US Attorney Says Ban To Be Enforced, Even If Troops Needed

Attorneys representing Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. go before United States Dist. Judge Bailey Brown at 9:30 this morning to challenge a temporary restraining order against any mass march here.

Dr. King and others planning a Monday march in support of striking sanitation workers yesterday appeared headed toward a possible clash with the order—if it remains in force.

"We are not going to be stopped by a mere injunction," said Dr. King.

But United States Atty. Thomas Robinson said the temporary order will be enforced even if it means calling in federal troops.

Dr. King's attorneys, Louis Lucas, Walter Bailey and Louis Burch, talked behind closed doors with Judge Brown for about an hour yesterday.

They are expected this morning to challenge the jurisdiction of the federal courts to stop the march.

Dr. King said granting of an injunction against the march would be "a basic denial of First Amendment privileges."

We stand for the First Amendment. In the past on the basis of conscience we have had to force injunctions and it is necessary we may do it (in Memphis). We'll cross that bridge when we come to it.

Mr. Robinson reacted quickly when asked about indications that any injunction may be ignored.

"We are going to see that the court's order is enforced. It is either enforced or it is disobeyed," the United States attorney said. "Such action is necessary to enforce and respect the order will be taken."

He pointed out that federal troops had been used to enforce a similar court order when James Meredith entered the March and Central High School was desegregated in Little Rock.

"We are making sure that Dr. King and others are being given no more than the protection that the community owes them," Mr. Robinson said.

Within minutes after Judge Brown signed the restraining order yesterday two United States marshals and federal troops to serve Negro leaders with copies of the order.

Found Dr. King and four other defendants named in the injunction, Hoss Williams, the Rev. James Orange, Ralph D. Abernathy and Bernard Lee, calling lunch at the Lorraine Motel. Dr. King greeted the federal officers, Marshall C. Ellis and Deputy Marshal Willie Durham, in the driveway of the motel and the defendants accepted service of the order.

US Wary Of Bid To Talk Of Peace On Enemy Terms

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The administration is eager to talk to North Vietnam about Hanoi's latest peace proposals, but it is frankly suspicious that it is merely being invited to talk about ending the war on the enemy's terms.

The fear in official quarters here is that the Hanoi government has misjudged the recent political convulsion in the United States, and may be acting on the illusion that the departure of former Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara, the replacement of Gen. William Westmoreland, the forthcoming retirement of President Johnson mean that the administration is prepared to accept Hanoi's four-point peace plan.

That, of course, the Johnson administration is not prepared to do it still rejects the Hanoi proposal as an invitation to surrender, and is standing on Johnson's statement of last Sunday that "the United States will never accept a false solution to this long and arduous struggle and call it peace."

The main difference between Hanoi's latest proposals and its previous suggestions is that the North Vietnamese government has dropped its demand that all bombing and other acts of war against North Vietnam be stopped before it would talk. Now it has offered to talk first but only about acceptance of precisely the war.

Nevertheless, the administration is following up on the latest proposal in the hope that the preliminary talks will lead to a settlement, and, hopefully, to some kind of arrangement to limit military activity on both sides while the talks proceed.

The purpose of Hanoi's trip to Hawaii Thursday night is apparently to review the strategic and diplomatic situation in the light of the recent military offensive against the state and Hanoi's quick but limited response to the President's Sunday night appeal for peace.

It is also important to define with the greatest precision the instructions to be given to the envoy who will contact Hanoi's officials, and if possible to get agreement on the negotiating instructions from the South Vietnamese government, which has been increasingly uneasy about the trend of United States policy in Vietnam ever since the resignation of Westmoreland.

What Hanoi is asking is that the United States agree to the unconditional cessation of the United States bombing raids and all other acts of war against the Democratic Republic of Vietnam so that talks may start.

That raises some significant questions. If this were accepted by the United States, could American planes make reconnaissance flights over North Vietnam to watch for the movement of supplies toward the Demilitarized Zone and South Vietnam?

Or would Hanoi be free to re-supply its troops at the Demilitarized Zone and deep shipping arms and men into the South? The answers to these questions could obviously affect the balance of power in the war.

There is no disposition here to prejudge Hanoi's reasons for agreeing to limit talks while the bombing continues. Officials are skeptical, but they are also leery of room for the possibility that the enemy was badly hurt in the recent battle for the cities and feels that he did well enough to claim a victory and agree to a compromise.

In any event, the United States government wants to be sure about the precise terms under which proposed negotiations would continue. The talks that ended the Korean War with the Communists went on from July 19, 1951, until July 27, 1953, and in this two-year period, United States casualties are higher than in any other phase of the war.

Also it is recognized here that once serious negotiations—as distinguished from brief preliminary talks—begin and the attention of the world is focused on them, it will be extremely difficult to break them off without an outcry all over the world, even if the North Vietnamese continued sending men and supplies into the South.

So much has been said about the importance of starting talks, any kind of talks, that this has come to be regarded as a sign of impending peace.

Officials here do not rule this out, but they think serious negotiations—if these can be started after the preliminary phase—will be carried on for a long time while the fighting continues in the South.

HANOI OFFER OF TALKS ACCEPTED BY JOHNSON

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(UPI)—The United States and North Vietnam took a small but enormously significant step Wednesday toward preliminary diplomatic discussions that could lead to an end of the Vietnam War.

First, the Hanoi government declared in a radio broadcast its willingness to discuss "the unconditional cessation of the United States bombing, raids and all other acts of war against the Democratic Republic of Vietnam so that talks may start."

Then President Johnson told newsmen he was accepting Hanoi's offer. He announced the United States "will establish contact with the representatives of North Vietnam. Consultations with the government of South Vietnam and other allies are now taking place."

The President also said he would fly to Honolulu, Hawaii, late Thursday evening for a long weekend of conferences with American officials from South Vietnam. He said he would be in contact with the government of North Vietnam, or when or where.

Geneva, Switzerland, was considered a likely site. The President already has said his prime reason for the recent North Vietnam, chose to respond to its curtailment of the bombing raids would be Ambassador-at-Large W. Averell Harriman and Lewisohn P. Thompson, ambassador to the Soviet Union.

There was no word from Moscow or any other world capital Wednesday to shed light on the President's specific plans. But it was obvious that his full and hectic day of urgent assessments, considered the Hanoi statement to be genuine enough to warrant a serious response.

The President had a lengthy afternoon meeting with top military and intelligence leaders and then went out to a White House driveway to greet a battery of camera microphones and newsmen.

He read a statement quoted on an official United States government transcript of an English-language broadcast of the North Vietnamese government statement. The English version followed a Vietnamese-language broadcast of the same statement.

The President said: "Today the government of North Vietnam made a statement which included the following paragraph: 'However for its part, the government of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam declares its readiness to appoint its representatives to negotiate with the United States representatives with a view to determining with the American side the unconditional cessation of the United States bombing raids and all other acts of war against the Democratic Republic of Vietnam so that talks may start.'"

"Last Sunday I expressed the position of the United States with respect to peace in Vietnam and Southeast Asia. In that statement I said: 'Now, at this time, to discuss the means of bringing this war to an end, the United States is ready to send its representatives to any forum, at any time, to discuss the means of bringing this war to an end.'"

"Accordingly, we will establish contact with the representatives of North Vietnam. Consultations with the government of South Vietnam and other allies are now taking place."

After reading the brief statement, Johnson said: "So you may have as much advice as I am able to give you on another matter, I will be leaving tomorrow evening for Honolulu and will meet with certain of the American."

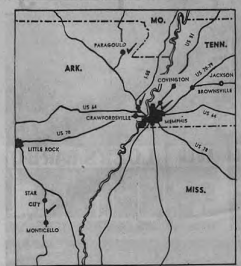

TORNADO ALLEY—High winds and tornadoes struck several South areas last night, with widespread damage near Paragould, between Memphis and Star City and north of Cordova, near the Vincent community in Arkansas. Another hit north of Memphis near Millington. Areas near Cordova also were hit.

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Shelby County Sheriff William N. Morris Jr. said a father and his child were believed to be the only persons seriously injured when the tornado hit the settlement east of Millington where 230 to 250 trailers are usually parked. He said the man was injured when hit by a flying television. Most of the injured were being taken to Navy Hospital in Millington.

Residents in the trailer court said they had almost no warning of the storm which hit around 10 p.m.

"We were both in our back bedroom and had just went to bed," said Mrs. Michael Deaton. "I told my husband that I was going to go to the bathroom. I told him to go grab the baby. Just as we got to the room the trailer turned over. We had just a few minutes, thank the good Lord."

Robert Mueller of the Millington Fire Department, who lives at the trailer park, said outside the demolished trailer with a double-barreled shotgun and three sons and a granddaughter were in the trailer when a television crashed under the wall of the trailer and landed in bed with his wife. His son, No. 6, was injured. Refugees from the park and about 40 persons who were separated from their families were at Baker Community Center near the trailer park.

Officials said they were totaling damage to at least 40 trailers, many turned over and ripped by high winds that accompanied the twister.

But US Attorney Says Ban To Be Enforced, Even If Troops Needed

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But United States Attorney Robinson said the temporary order will be enforced even if it means calling in federal troops.

Dr. King's attorneys, Louis Lucas, Walter Bailey and Laicus Burch, talked behind closed doors with Judge Brown for about an hour yesterday. They are expected this morning to challenge the jurisdiction of the federal courts to stop the march.

Dr. King said granting of an injunction against the march would be "a basic denial of First Amendment privileges. We stand on the First Amendment. We are not going to stop the march."

In the past the basis of conscience have been used to break injunctions and the marchers may do it in Memphis. We'll cross that bridge when we come to it.

Mr. Robinson reacted quickly when asked about indications that any injunction may be ignored.

"We are going to see that the court's order is enforced until it is either affirmed or dissolved," the United States attorney said. "Such action is necessary to enforce and respect the order will be taken."

He pointed out that federal troops had been used to enforce a federal injunction in order when James Meredith entered the Memphis area along Arkansas Highway 81.

The main difference between Hanoi's latest proposals and its previous suggestions is that the North Vietnamese government has dropped its demand that all bombing and other acts of war against North Vietnam be stopped before it would talk. Now it has offered to talk first but only after acceptance of precisely the same terms.

Nevertheless, the administration is following up the latest proposal with the hope that the preliminary talks will lead to a wider agreement, to some kind of arrangement to limit military activity on both sides while the talks proceed.

It is also important to define with the greatest precision the instructions to be given to the envoys who will conduct Hanoi's officials, and it is possible to get agreement to the negotiating instructions from the South Vietnamese government, which has been increasingly uneasy about the sound of United States policy in Vietnam ever since the resignation of Westmoreland.

Masaryk's Death Back In Spotlight

Czech Officials To Reinvestigate 20-Year-Old Disputed Mystery

PRAGUE, April 3. — (UPI) — The Czechoslovak state prosecutor's office announced Wednesday it will reinvestigate the controversial death of former Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk, a disputed mystery for 20 years.

The body of Dr. Masaryk, son of the founder of Czechoslovakia, Thomas G. Masaryk, was found in the courtyard of the Foreign Ministry March 10, 1948. The Communist regime which had just seized power said he committed suicide by jumping from a balcony window. For two decades belief has circulated both here and abroad that he was murdered. His death symbolizes the brutality of Stalin era rule for millions of his countrymen.

An announcement by deputy general prosecutor Frantisek Zabransky that the case would be reopened was viewed as part of the liberal trend in the new Communist regime which took control last January. The senior Masaryk, 80 years a "non person," has been rehabilitated.

Meanwhile, the Czech government continued. Deputy Premier Otakar Simunek and Defense Minister Bohumir Lomsky resigned Wednesday as the new reformist leadership pushed a sweeping reshuffle of the Communist government and party hierarchy. The two formerly were supporters of the ousted president and party chief, Antonin Novotny.

British Wage Battle Due

LONDON, April 3. — Battle lines were drawn Wednesday between the Labor government and labor unions as the government in a white paper announced details of tougher policies to hold increases in wages, salaries and dividends to 5 per cent a year.

The government proposes to take reserve powers to delay pay and price increases 12 months, to require price cuts where recommended by the prices and incomes board, to moderate and phase rent increases and to prevent excessive dividends by corporations.

Despite opposition from union officials in and out of Parliament on the wage curbs, and despite the loss of popular support in recent by-elections, cabinet ministers believe they can enact the forthcoming legislation, although with a reduced majority.

However, observers believe the test will come when the government tries to enforce the 3.5 per cent ceiling in the face of hostile union demands for wage increases of 5 per cent and more.

Nigerian Cease-Fire May Be Near

LONDON, April 3. — (UPI) — A Socialist peer, Lord Brockway announced Wednesday he had received a letter from Nigerian rebel leader Lt. Col. Odumegwu Ojukwu indicating breakaway Biafra was prepared for a ceasefire.

Lord Brockway, chairman of an All-Party Committee for Peace in Nigeria, quoted Ojukwu as saying he was prepared for an immediate cease-fire and negotiations "without recriminations on either side."

Russia Charges Red Chinese Interference

MOSCOW, April 3. — (UPI) — The Soviet Union charged Wednesday that Red China destined a Russian timber-carrying supplies to North Vietnam and that Chinese soldiers broke down doors and used force against its captain and crew. It was the third case this year of official Soviet protests against detention and alleged mistreatment of Russian ships and sailors in Chinese ports.

Panama Court Studies Impeachment Data

PANAMA, April 3. — (AP) — The Panamanian Supreme Court went to the shrouded Legislative Palace Wednesday to study documents related to the impeachment and dismissal of President Marco A. Robles by the National Assembly March 24. An injunction before the court alleges that the impeachment proceedings against Robles were illegal and unconstitutional. The court will rule on this probably by week's end.

Cunfire Downs Patrol Plane, US Confirms
SAIGON, April 4. — (Thursday) — (AP) — The United States Command confirmed Thursday that a Navy patrol plane with 12 men aboard was shot down Monday while participating in an operation against gun-running in the Gulf of Siam off South Vietnam's west coast.

An official announcement said only that the plane reported as being "hit by anti-aircraft fire." Other sources had reported earlier that the four-engine turboprop craft, a P-3 Orion, was fired on by a Cambodian ship.

The command said the bodies of two crewmen were recovered and search operations were continuing.

The plane had been patrolling between the island and the mainland as part of Operation Market Time, the command reported. The operation is an allied sea and air campaign to intercept enemy junks and trawlers bringing arms and supplies to the Viet Cong.

The Orion usually operate about 50 miles off the South Vietnamese coast.

Victory Is Seen As Allied Drive Nears Khe Sanh

Thousands Of Troops Knife Within Three Miles Of Besieged Fortress

SAIGON, April 4. — (Thursday) — (UPI) — A Marine general declared the battle for Khe Sanh won as thousands of allied troops Thursday knifed to within three miles of the besieged outpost in a juggernaut to "put the enemy out of business" in northern South Vietnam.

United States military spokesmen said American helicopter gunships supporting the troops trapped a North Vietnamese company of 120 men in an open field and killed 20.

Heavy fighting Wednesday was reported in two areas north of Tan Son Nhut Air Base near Saigon. Spokesmen said 20 Communists died in the clashes with allied forces.

Advancing eight miles behind columns of tanks rumbling over a hole-trapped, rutted road, 10,000 United States Marines and South Vietnamese infantrymen were out to crush the North Vietnamese armies that had laid siege to Khe Sanh since Jan. 1968.

The goal was to secure all of South Vietnam's northwest corner near the Laotian border, a key Communist infiltration corridor.

It was the first time last September that American forces ventured along the twisting Highway 9 that links Khe Sanh with vital coastal supply points.

The going was slow. Mines and boobytraps were plentiful thick elephant grass along the roadside held unknown danger. Troops hacked through the grass, 11 feet high, in spots, to protect engineers clearing the road.

There was little resistance from Communist troops, although they blew up 17 bridges along the line of march.

In the air war, United States pilots Wednesday continued to hit North Vietnam well below the 20th Parallel border established by President Johnson's limited bombing halt.

Navy pilots hit rail sidings and bridges in the southern peninsula. Spokesmen said their northernmost strike was a rail siding 12 miles northwest of Thanh Hoa, 15 miles below the 20th Parallel.

United States air cavalrymen poured into Khe Sanh's surrounding hills in swarms of helicopters. They found empty bunkers and trenches and said some of the peaks, almost within sight of Khe Sanh, were still aflame from blistering artillery and air bombardments.

In Da Nang, Lt. Gen. Robert Cushman said American firepower coupled with the courage of the 10,000 defenders had won the battle of Khe Sanh.

Cushman, commander of I Corps, said the big push was the second stage of a counter-offensive to secure South Vietnam's entire northwest corner. (Picture and Map on Page 1, Additional Story on Page 1B)

Platoon Lead Larry Morrow of 1st Marine Corps has been awarded the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat V for his action when his boat came under enemy attack during a sweep in the Binh Thuan Province.

Fireman Morrow, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Morrow of Memphis, was serving as a gunner on the Navy armored troop carrier when the attack came.

The boat was one of the lead units, becoming a prime target throughout the 17-mile-long mile-long passage between heavily fortified enemy positions.

In the ensuing firefight, "the boat received three 84mm rocket hits," the Navy reported. "Four members of the crew were wounded and the boat was severely damaged."

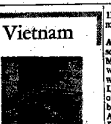
But Fireman Morrow remained at his station throughout the engagement and held down a continuous and effective counter-fire until the enemy fire was completely halted.

Fireman Morrow, who was graduated in 1966 from Tennessee High School, received the commendation medal March 22 from Capt. Robert S.
