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# Ray Appeal Hearing Set For July 29

LONDON. — (UPI) — A British court said today it will hear James Earl Ray's appeal against extradition to the United States to stand trial for the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on July 29.

The surprise announcement was made when Ray appeared at Bow Street Magistrate's Court on charges of violating British gun and immigration laws.

#### BRITISH CHARGES

Ray was ordered to appear again July 16 to answer to the charges of carrying a loaded .38-caliber pistol and two forged passports, which got him arrested in the first place June 8.

It was expected Britain might ignore the charges if Ray is extradited.

#### **IN COURT**

Ray, whose extradition was ordered a week ago, appeared in court today to meet a British legal requirement that prisoners appear before a magistrate every eight days while they are held.

The announcement on the extradition appeal had been unexpected as the appearance today was supposed to deal only with the gun and passport charges.

Ray, brought to court in a caravan of three police Jaguar cruisers, appeared under the name Ramon George Sneyd, the name listed on one of the two forged Canadian passports Scotland Yard detectives said they pulled from his coat along with the gun at Heathrow Tirport.

Ray swaggered into the courtroom without the dark hornrim glasses he wore

when he was ordered extradited last Tuesday. His jaw twitched but he looked less jittery than in previous appearances. His white sport shirt hung open at the neck and he wore the same dark jacket.

Only a small crowd of spectators and newsmen were on hand when Ray arrived. Interest had declined so much that even Mary Brown, 71, a retired hospital worker who had risen at 5 a.m. for Ray's other courtroom appearances, failed to show up. She was first in line outside the court building the other times.

Ray's attorney, Michael Eugen has another week to appeal formally the order that Ray be extradited.

# Ray's Extradition Likely in 4 Weeks

LONDON. — (UPI) — James Earl Ray could be extradited to the United States as early as the first week in August to stand trial for the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King, legal sources said today.

A court official disclosed Tuesday that a hearing on Ray's appeal against the extradition order has been set

for July 29.

Three White -wigged, black-robed justices of the Queen's Bench Divisional Court of the High Court of Justice will hear Ray's lawyers fight the extradition order.

It is the British equivalent of a U.S. Court of Appeals.

Legal sources said that should the appeals court turn down Ray's appeal of the extradition order, he could still appeal to the House of Lords. But permission to go to the House of Lords could be refused.

In that case, Ray would be returning to the United States about the first week in August, the sources said.

Ray appeared at Bow Street Magistrates Court Tuesday to answer charges of violating British gun and immigration laws.

It was carrying what po-

lice said was a loaded .38caliber pistol and two forged passports that got him arrested in the first place as he arrived at London's Heathrow Airport June 8.

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## Ray's Brother Arrested Here

Jerry William Ray, who told police he is a brother of James Earl Ray, the accused in the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., was free today after being dismissed in City Court on a charge of public drunkenness.

Ray was arrested about 2 a.m. Tuesday at Main and Vance where, police said, he was seen staggering drunk. The charge was dismissed later yesterday by Judge Bernie Weinman.

Police said Ray registered .17 on the intoxication meter and was booked. He listed his occupation as a bar waiter but told officers he was unemployed.

Ray gave no Memphis address but said he lived at 1902 Cherokee in St. Louis.

## Lawyer Says Extradition Would Cancel Counts

LONDON, July 8. — (UPI) — The British lawyer defending James Earl Ray on two British charges said Monday they would probably never be pressed if Ray is extradited to America for trial as the accused murderer of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Ray's barrister, Michael Eugene, said "nothing" would happen Tuesday when Ray is scheduled to appear again in Bow Street Magistrates' Court under the name of Ramon George Sneyd. The hearing is in connection with charges Ray violated British gun and passport laws.

"He will be turned around and remanded until the following Tuesday," Eugene said

The British lawyer said he still has not filed an appeal of last Thursday's ruling that Ray be extradited to face the United States charges against him

Eugene indicated the filing of a writ of habeas corpus in district court would not take place before early next week. Ray has 15 days to lodge an appeal.

London Chief Magistrate Frank Milton last Thursday ordered Ray extradited to face the United States charges of murdering King in Memphis on April 4 and of escaping from the Missouri State Penitentiary last year.

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## Witness Absent At Ray Hearing

### Grand Jury's Indictment Reached Without Calling Charles Stephens

In reaching an indictment against James Earl Ray for the slaying of Martin Luther King Jr., the Shelby County Grand Jury did not even call the man now considered to be the prosecution's most important witness.

But court authorities yesterday pointed out that the state often does not submit its most important evidence if the necessary "probable cause" can be established without it.

Charles Q. Stephens, 46, was the one witness named at Ray's extradition hearing in London last month, David Calcutt, the British attorney retained by the federal government, told the hearing. Stephens heard the fatal shot fired on April from the common bathroom of a rooming house on South Main.

Stephens is now in protective custody of local authorities.

The Grand Jury charged Ray with first degree murder May 7 and with carrying a dangerous weapon May 17 in indictments made available to the public yesterday.

## 'Sneyd' Was Name Used In Letter

'No Doubt' Ray Is Same Person, Says Newspaper

CHICAGO. — (AP) — The Chicago Daily News said to-day in a copyrighted story that a letter written by James Earl Ray to a brother removed any doubt that Ray and Ramon George Sneyd are the same person.

Sneyd was the name under which Ray was arrested in London in connection with the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The Daily News said the letter was written to John Ray and was signed, "Lord R. G. Sneyd."

John Ray said the handwriting was his brother's and he added, "I don't know where he got the name of Sneyd, but he had lots of names." De Mary

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#### 'LORD' TITLE

Asked about the title, "Lord," John Ray said, "That's probably his idea of a joke."

The Daily News published portions of the letter which in part read, "I could appeal my extradition hearing but I am getting tired of listening to these liars so I might close it up about Tuesday."

There was no indication which Tuesday the letter referred to. John Ray said he interpreted the letter as evidence that his brother did not kill King, who was shot to death on the balcony of a Memphis motel April 4.

"If he really did it," John Ray said, "he wouldn't be thinking about signing these extradition papers, would he?"

#### **UNDATED**

The letter was mailed to a married sister who lives in a suburb of St. Louis, the Daily News said. It was not dated.

U.S. officials working on obtaining Ray's extradition have said they are convinced that Ray and Sneyd are the same person.

The letter also implied that Ray would have sufficient funds to finance his defense when he is returned to Memphis to stand trial.

"If you could," the letter said, "I would like for you to give Attorney Arthur Hanes \$600. You can get some of it off Jerry (another brother) and I will straighten it up with you when I get back."

WILLIAM SOMERSETT, formerly MM 607-R, who is no longer being contacted by the Miami Office and who is characterized as having furnished reliable information in the past, and in addition has furnished information which cannot be verified or corroborated, telephonically advised on 7/12/68 as follows:

Since the assassination of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., he has made trips to Atlanta, Ga. and Memphis, Tenn. at the request and expense of the Florida State Attorney's Office and the Miami, Florida Police Department. He indicated the purpose of these trips was to try and develop information relative to the assassination of Doctor KING and other information relating to the National States Rights Party. He did not elaborate on his assignments nor did he indicate he had diverged any unusual or pertinent information. He reportedly was in contact with witnesses involved in the KING case and based on information heard on the "street," it was said that the chauffeur of Doctor KING was suspected of "setting up Doctor KING for the assassination." SOMERSETT was unable to identify source of this information.

It is not known why the Florida States Attenty's Office or the Miami Police Department would have SOMERSETT

I am at present in dention at the above listed address in London England. In the near future I will most proably be deported to the United States. The reason I am writing you is that you will proably dispatch agents to London to return me to the U.S. and I would like to have it on record now that I have no intentions of making any oral statements not that I have anything to hide but I would perfer to tell my story to a judge & Jury. Therefore I would respectfully suggest you send someone with less imagination than Mr. Vinson. I have also written my attorny Mr. Arthur Honas a simular letter.

Legat, London has learned from New Scotland Yard that it has been determined that Ray under the name Ramon George Sneyd, stayed at the Heathfield House Hotel, 181 - 183 Cromwell Road, London, 5/17-28/68, the period previously unaccounted for relative to Ray's activities in England.

The proprietress of the Heathfield House Hotel, Mrs. Doris Catherine Westwood, advised that sometime after Ray checked out on 5/28/68, her husband deposited three \$10 American Express checks to their account at their bank. Neither she nor her husband can specifically recall but believe there is a possibility that these travelers checks could have been received from Ray.

It is not known whether it is possible for American Express, New York to check for any checks issued to Ray under the name Ramon George Sneyd without the check numbers, however, if it can be done, New York appropriately handle.

While talking to the Attorney General on another matter, I told him there were some developments in the James Earl Ray matter. I stated first that the airport from which we were going to leave in England is under repair so the plane will be leaving from a different airport called Lakenheath, which is near the other one and is perfectly satisfactory so far as we are concerned. The Attorney General asked if it were a public airport or a Royal Air Force airport and I told him it was a Royal Air Force airport.

I continued that we were told yesterday here in Washington that the Air Force was contemplating going to another field in Arkansas in case some emergency prevented their landing at Memphis. I stated we took the position this was most undesirable because it would involve the transportation of the prisoner from Arkansas to Memphis. The Attorney General stated there are all those bridges to cross, too. I stated also there was the matter of jurisdiction which would be raised. I stated we would not leave the plane if it had to land in Arkansas and just wait until the emergency was resolved and then take off for Memphis.

I said there is also complication in regard to the matter of a plane from here. I stated that Assistant Attorney General Fred Vinson yesterday indicated the Air Force indicated a plane might not be available in view of the President going to Honolulu and having to press a number of planes into service. I said there has been no further word this morning. I said this man can leave right now if we had the plane over there, but we have to wait and see what the Air Force is going to do and if they won't furnish a plane, we will have to charter a commercial plane. The Attorney General said he could not believe the Air Force does not have enough planes. I commented that it is ridiculous.

I told the Attorney General that confidentially, the Commandant of the Air Base in London when he was here last week was briefed and told the plane is standing by ready to take off without advance notice. I said this is highly confidential because the Commandant was told this by officers of the Air Force. I said I think they are playing games at the Air Force as they say we have to wait for the return of this Colonel Burlesca (phonetic), who is the one Mr. Vinson has been dealing with and he is due back around noon today. I said at that time we will probably know more what the situation is because Ray has now signed the order waiving any appeal so he is ready to move as soon as we get a plane over there. The Attorney General said the Home Secretary has to sign the order. I said he had not yet but he would by noon today so that will clear all formalities, but Ray has already signed the paper he was supposed to sign waiving appeal.

The Attorney General said he would talk with Mr. Vinson, that Clark Clifford, Secretary of Defense, was out of the country. I said I thought it was a matter where he might talk to the highest official over there. The Attorney General said he was sure there was no problem. I said our men are ready to leave at a moment's notice and it should be possible to leave as soon as the Air Force gives clearance and be over in England by evening and be able to arrange to come back tomorrow.

The Attorney General said that the jail may not be ready down there yet, which would be another complicating factor. I told him we understood from our people in Memphis that they were ready as they had put in the bullet-proof shields, et ceters, the Sheriff had picked his squad, and he had five cars standing by in case they were needed.

The Attorney General said then he would talk with Mr. Vinson further and see if we can't move it out and thanked me for calling.

With reference to the extradition of James Earl Ray, Ray was turned over by Agents of this Bureau to officers of the Shelby County, Tennessee, Sheriff's Office and incarcerated in the Shelby County Jail at 5:32 a.m., Eastern Daylight Time, July 19, 1968.

Transportation of Ray from Great Britain to the Memphis Naval Air Station and from the Naval Air Station to the Shelby County Jail was accomplished without incident.

The Air Force flight surgeon who conducted physical examinations of Ray aboard the plane en route from Great Britain to the United States stated that Ray was in good physical condition.
