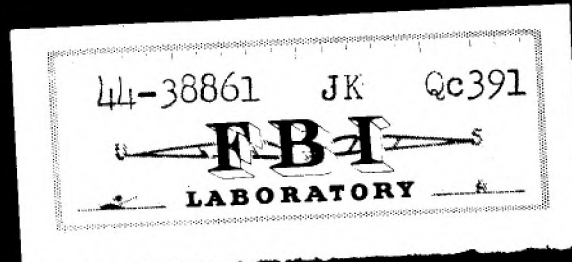

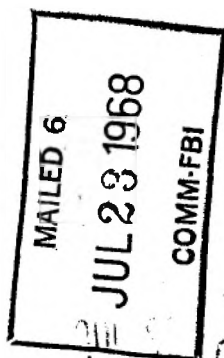

1. With reference to para. 36, report dated 13 JUN 68, please be advised that 103 branches of various banks in the area mentioned were checked, as well as 125 branches of the Royal Bank of Canada in Toronto, Ontario, with negative results. All names used by the suspect were checked for possible bank accounts or safety deposit boxes (see Telex CIB1261 sent to the Commissioner, 8 JUL 68). Also, C.B.A. and S.P.A. telecommunications were checked for any money transactions from the U.S.A. under all names in question without result.

2. At 3:15 a.m., 12 JUL 68, an anonymous phone call was received at the information desk to the effect that if we wanted information on RAY see "Blanche" who used to work at the PIONEER TAVERN. A second call came in at 4:00 a.m. from one, Blanche VAN LUVEN, 140 Kingston Road, Ontario, stating that she had information on RAY. Cpl. J.M. Dunlop from this Force and Det. Sgt. R. Marsi contacted this woman and took a long detailed statement from her, beginning 6:20 a.m., ending 10:15 a.m. Shortly thereafter VAN LUVEN admitted the first statement was not true, therefore, a second statement was taken, beginning 1:15 p.m. ending 2:35 p.m. Copies of statement and photograph of VAN LUVEN attached. It is felt that this woman might have spent one night with RAY (about the 24 APR 68) possibly at the LOMB SIMCOE HOTEL in Toronto. The records at the Hotel were checked from 3 APR to MAY 6, 1968, but neither RAY nor VAN LUVEN can be identified either by the personnel at the Hotel or from records of patrons.

3. Blanche Beatrice HUTCHINSON & VAN LUVEN (DOB [REDACTED]) was born in Edmonton, Alberta. She married Anthony T. KOBAYASHI, Japanese-Canadian, in Kelowna, B.C. 25 MAR 52 and was divorced from him in 1961 in B.C. She then moved to Vancouver, B.C., where she met Robert William VAN LUVEN, which resulted in a common law relationship. These people came to Toronto in November 1964 and during 1967 Robert's father, Fred VAN LUVEN, age 53 years, moved in with them. In APR 68, Robert VAN LUVEN found work and moved to Montreal, where he is still employed. Blanche is living at 140 Kingston Road, Toronto, Ontario, Apt. 13, with Fred VAN LUVEN, and now employed at LEBROS TAVERN as Hostess. This woman can be described as a prostitute, alcoholic and confirmed liar, incapable of telling the whole truth. Although there is some doubt whether she actually did in fact have any association with RAY, one of the areas marked on the map, mentioned in para. 39 report submitted 13 JUN 68, is the parking lot used by tenants of 140 Kingston Road, Toronto, Ontario. Repeated interviews of this woman and searches of this area have failed to reveal any further information concerning RAY or explain the mark on the map.

4. Mr. Fred VAN LUVEN, although an elderly man, would appear to be quite honest and a decent type of person. Apparently Blanche VAN LUVEN became upset when she saw RAY's picture in the paper and after

explaining to the old man her relationship with RAY, he advised her to co-operate with the police. Fred VAN LOVEN could not supply any definite information in this case.

5. In relation to the map mentioned above, marks on the map in the east part of the City are as follows:

- (1) Edgewood Avenue and Kingston Road, Toronto, Ontario.
This is a parking lot used by apartment buildings located on Kingston Road, especially 140 Kingston Road, as stated. The superintendents of five apartment buildings were questioned, however, none could identify RAY or assist this enquiry.
- (2) Victoria Park and Needhurst Avenue, Toronto, Ontario.
A small weedy park - searched thoroughly with negative results.
- (3) Cassandra Blvd., Toronto, Ontario.
General area is a housing development with a small park winding behind the houses - park searched with negative results. It will be noted, Paul Edward BRIDGMAN, mentioned para. 31 report submitted 13 JUN 68, resides at 80 Cassandra Blvd.
- (4) Leslie Street and C.N.R. Tracks.
Wilket Creek Park, South of Danforth Avenue is a forest and creek area. Searched with negative results.

It might be noted that the areas marked on the map other than Ossington Street, the downtown district (Vital Statistics) and the 140 Kingston Road are termination points of the Toronto Transit Commission. It is suggested that possibly this map was marked by either the suspect or an accomplice for the use of Public Transportation. There has been no evidence to substantiate this theory.

6. As noted in para. 40 of previously submitted report, Eric S. GALT was checked on 19 APR 68. He was contacted personally by myself and Cpl. J.S. Dunlop in this matter on 10 JUL 68. Eric St. Vincent GALT was born 9-1-19, presently employed as Warehouse Foreman, UNION CARBIDE CANADA LIMITED, Toronto, Ontario. His father, James Henry GALT died 23 FEB 19 and was buried in England; his mother, Naomi (Mrs. James) GALT now resides 14 Welwyn Ave., Scarborough, Ontario. No relatives are buried in Toronto. GALT does not know either SNEYD or BRIDGMAN, nor has he had any dealings with RAY. He banks at the Toronto Dominion Bank, Eglinton Square and NATIONAL TRUST CO., LTD., Golden Mile, Toronto, Ontario. He is a member of the VIKING DIVE CLUB, CANADA SUBAQUA, an underwater diving club and is currently president of the Underwater Council. GALT made a trip to the U.S. sometime in 1963 and a second trip in 1966. The second time he and family travelled to Islamorada, Florida, where they stayed at the DROP ANCHOR MOTEL for one week. GALT and family made two brief trips to Montreal, one in 1963 and the second in SEPT 1966.

At no time did GALT loose or misplace any documents during these trips in either the U.S. or Montreal. He could not supply any information to explain why RAY might have been using his name, if in fact the Eric Starvo GALT used by RAY was intended to be the name of the Eric St. Vincent GALT of Toronto. GALT at one time signed his name, Eric St.V. GALT, but four years ago stopped signing the short form of his middle name. The middle name was signed St with a small circle as the period as StO and the letter V again with a small circle as a period as StOVo. The main reason for discontinuing this habit was the company forms requiring a signature were so small he had to cramp the whole signature.

7. Mr. Samuel MARSHALL, Assistant Manager, LOBLAWS GROCETERIA, 1453 Queen St. West, Toronto, advised that RAY entered his store 2:30, 23 APR 68, from the rear and asked him for a full time job. RAY was notified that full time help was only hired from the head office and not by various branches, the correct address and phone number were supplied to RAY. At this point RAY left the store and subsequently boarded a street car and left the area. RAY described as 5'10", 160 lbs., sports jacket checked, grey pants, neat dresser, dark brown hair, identified from F.B.I. Bulletin as well as picture taken in late January or early February 1968 in California. The Head Office of LOBLAWS was checked; however, there is no record of RAY applying for a job under his own name or aliases.

8. Mr. Emerson BENNS, Manager, LOBLAWS GROCETERIA, Balfour and Eglinton Sts., Toronto, Ontario, was contacted by Sgt. Giffin. He advised that during the middle of April 1968, a man wearing a checked jacket, shirt, tie and sunglasses came into LOBLAWS GROCETERIA, 1453 Queen Street West, Toronto, Ontario, to seek employment, where he, BENNS, was working at the time. BENNS thought he recognized the man from a picture displayed in Time Magazine about this time. He followed RAY from the store and watched him board an eastbound street car. BENNS then returned to the store and phoned the Metro Toronto P.D.; however, the M.T.P.D. were unable to locate RAY. No further information was available from BENNS.

9. On 14 JUN 68, Postal Investigators phoned to advise that an envelope addressed to Paul BRIDGMAN, 102 Ossington Ave., Toronto 3, Ontario, had been intercepted in the mail. Cpl. Dunlop and Det. Sgt. Marsh picked up the envelope and found it to contain advertising material from DIRECT FILM SERVICE, P.O. Box 100/C.P. 100, Ste Yoville, Montreal, Quebec, mailed from Montreal, 13 JUN 68. Written in pen under the type-written name and address are the words Re: E.S. GALT.

10. Cpl. M. Power, Montreal C.I.B. General, was contacted and subsequent investigation by him revealed that Paul BRIDGMAN was recommended to DIRECT FILM SERVICE by a person signing the name E.S. GALT. Obviously this is a crank recommendation relating to the investigation and not uncommon as far as the DIRECT FILM SERVICE is concerned. It will be noted that RAY was arrested 8 JUN 68, wherein the envelope is dated 13 JUN 68. No doubt the publicity given this case prompted someone to this action.

11. Mr. Holmes Yen CHIN, COMMUNITY CLEANERS, 789 Dundas St. West, Toronto, Ontario, phone number RMJ-6877 was contacted as a result of Telex CIB1507 from the Commissioner dated 10 JUN 68. CHIN verified that the laundry mark, letter C circled over number 24, was his laundry mark; however, he could not supply any details on who owned the clothing. When laundry is brought to his shop, he issues a tag to the customer; when the customer returns, the tags are matched and the laundry handed over. No information is recorded. CHIN failed to recognize the second laundry mark, 80-C83. Attached hereto, are copies of Ontario Provincial Report Occurrence No. 8 dated 19 JUN 68, prepared by Mr. C. O'BIRNE, the O.P.P. laundry and dry cleaning mark expert.

12. Mr. C. O'BIRNE searched his records concerning the second laundry mark, 80-C83, appearing on a pair of men's shorts, and as a result gave the following laundries as possibles:

- (1) WONG'S LAUNDRY
60 Cecil St., Toronto.
Checked 9 JUL 68 - Negative.
- (2) PONG'S LAUNDRY
5 Klauk St., Fort Erie, Ont.
- (3) LEE'S LAUNDRY
52 Queen St. East, Hespler.

Copies of this report and photo of the laundry mark in question being forwarded direct to Fort Erie and Kitchener Detachments for the necessary action.

12. A registered letter was written to this Force by Josef KROBOTH, 43 Glen Davis Crescent, Toronto, Ontario, as follows:

Immediately to the date established for the arrival of the assassin of Rev. Martin Luther King here in Toronto I gave a report to the Metro Police Department 52 Station on College St. I did recognize the wanted man from the newspaper sketch and gave a description of him and the place seen here in Toronto to Metro Police. At that time he met with a woman. I feel as a citizen I have done my duty and would like to know if my information was in any way helpful towards the search. Also if there is any reward for information leading to the capture.

13. KROBOTH was interviewed, however, there is some doubt that he actually saw RAY or even reported the event. KROBOTH stated that he was walking south on Elizabeth Street, Toronto, Ontario, during the afternoon of 8 APR 68, when he saw RAY with a red-haired woman in the vicinity of the City Hall. As he is a caretaker next door to # 52 Police Station, College Street, he says he reported same sometime between 12:00 midnight and 8:00 a.m. 9 APR 68. There is no record at this Station of a complaint received from this person. KROBOTH is not known to be a mental case, however, he is considered to be very eccentric. He was notified that RAY was not arrested as a result of information supplied by him. On the completion of the interview KROBOTH was satisfied with the action taken.

14. Enquiries relating to C. Alexander BROWN, author of a letter written 10 JUN 68 addressed to Ottawa and to a letter addressed to Mayor Lindsay, New York City, and Police Chief Memphis, 16 APR 62, signed "Concerned" involving Joseph FORRESTA, have not been completed to date. A further report will be submitted covering these two phases of the investigation.

15. Checks were made at the following in an effort to find some trace of RAY:

- (1) Air Canada flights from Toronto to Montreal during period RAY is not accounted for APR 19-26/68.
Negative at this point...All records held at Accounts Department Winnipeg. If deemed necessary, may these documents be searched.
- (2) CNR RAPID from Toronto to Montreal - No records maintained.
- (3) Records for newspapers, Telegram, Star and Globe & Mail checked to verify whether RAY used their facilities to obtain background information on SNEYD or BRIDGMAN. Central Library also checked where these newspapers are all kept up to date - negative.
- (4) Bell Telephone Company contacted re Long Distance Tolls from pay phone No. 531-9662 located at 1077 Dundas St. West, the phone used by RAY. Negative, records destroyed after one month. All long distance calls made from phone at both 962 Dundas St. West and 102 Ossington St. checked negative re RAY.
- (5) Motor Vehicle Branch contacted concerning duplicate driver's or operator's license issued under names in question - negative.
- (6) Registered Pawn Brokers checked under name RAY and all aliases - negative.

16. All efforts to trace the movements of RAY from APR 8 - MAY 6, when he was known to be in the Toronto area, have not been successful. Investigation has failed to disclose any employment for RAY nor have the numerous hotel and beverage rooms employees, who have been contacted, identified him as having visited their establishments. It is possible, however, that RAY could lose himself in the low class bars and hotels in Toronto without fear of being discovered.

17. Referring to correspondence from the Officer i/c C.I.B., Ottawa, dated 3 JUL 68, please be advised that the Metro Toronto Police Department Hold-Up Squad have been notified of the robbery in question.

18. Investigation is continuing in this case and a further report will be submitted to meet the undernoted Diary Date.

2. The majority of the investigation requested in this area has now been completed. However, there are still some loose ends being attended to. Further advice may be expected.

In the circumstances of the COMMUNITY CLEANERS, and

identifying mark is applied, by hand, in black indelible ink,
directly on the collar of shirts; the encircled letter 'c' indicates
the address of the laundry, and, the digits indicate the customer
invoice number.



Various London communications have set forth that New Scotland Yard sources were unable to determine RAY's whereabouts from 5/17/68 when he arrived in England from Lisbon, and 5/28/68 when he checked into the New Earls Court Hotel.

As a result of conferences at the Yard it was strongly suggested to them that RAY must have stayed at a small hotel in the Kensington area near the West London Air Terminal. The Yard agreed to do a recheck of all hotels in this area, as a result of which it has been determined RAY checked into the Heathfield House Hotel, 181-183 Cromwell Road, London, S.W. 5, on 5/17 and checked out on 5/28, which is the date he checked into the New Earls Court Hotel.

Enclosed are two copies each of statement made by the proprietress of the Heathfield House Hotel, pertinent page of the hotel's guest book showing RAY's signature, and the hotel's copy of the receipt given to RAY.

With the foregoing information we have now accounted for RAY's residence in England for the period 5/17/68 to 6/8/68, when he was apprehended.

In addition to the information set forth in the enclosed statement, Mrs. WESTWOOD advised that some time after RAY checked out on 5/28/68 her husband deposited three \$10 American Express checks to their account at the bank. Neither she nor her husband can fully recall, but believe there is a possibility these travelers checks could have been received from RAY.

It is not known whether it is possible for American Express, New York, to check for any checks issued to RAY under the name SNEYD without the check numbers. Investigation re these checks being left to discretion of the Bureau. — *Being handled*

The Yard has orally advised me in the strictest confidence that on 5/27/68 at 5:20 P.M. a lone man with a small gun walked into a jeweler's shop in Paddington area of London, pointed the gun at the jeweler, and said, "This is a stick-up, give me the money in the till." The jeweler hesitated and the man panicked and ran out of the shop and did not obtain any loot. When shown ten photographs of different men, the jeweler without hesitation picked out RAY as the hold-up man. The only confusing point is that the jeweler claims the man wore a hat. As far as can be determined RAY was hatless during his period in England, and did not have a hat in his possession. If he is the man involved he could, of course, have disposed of the hat.

The Yard points out that in the morning of June 4, 1968, he asked the clerk at the New Earls Court Hotel how much his bill would be, and when told he reportedly said, "I'll have to go to my bank and make a withdrawal." The Fulham Bank (Lonairtel 7/3/68) was robbed the afternoon of June 4th.

On 5/27/68 he asked the clerk at the Heathfield House Hotel how much his bill would be, and when told reportedly he made a similar statement about making a withdrawal from his bank.

The Yard has the theory that if RAY is the man involved in the jewelry shop attempt, since he did not get any money then he must have committed a successful job between 5:20 P.M. on 5/27/68 and the morning of 5/28/68 in order to be able to pay his bill at Heathfield House.

LON 88-72

The Yard is not going to conduct any investigation to prove this theory. They are extremely fearful that if information re the jewelry shop job and information implicating RAY in any other jobs leaks to the press, that RAY's solicitor will insist RAY be charged in order to clear him of any or all jobs he allegedly committed.

Foregoing information, plus copies of enclosures, may be furnished the Department of Justice, with the understanding that the jewelry shop information should not be revealed to the press or public sources at this time.

For the Bureau's information only, I understand that Sir ELWYN JONES, British Attorney General, is reviewing all extradition papers, Magistrate's court proceedings, and JONES will appear in the High Court proceedings on 7/29/68 to represent the Governor of Wandsworth Prison.

You will recall that New Scotland Yard had been unable to determine James Earl Ray's whereabouts from May 17, 1968, when he arrived back in England from Lisbon, Portugal, and May 28, 1968, when he checked into the New Earls Court Hotel in London, England.

As a result of a request made by our representative in London, the Yard rechecked all hotels in the Kensington area near the West London Air Terminal and they determined that Ray checked into the Heathfield House Hotel in London on May 17, 1968, and checked out on May 28, 1968, which is the date he checked into the New Earls Court Hotel. The guest book of the Heathfield House Hotel contains the signature of Ramon George Sneyd, 962 Dindas - W - Toronto, Canada. This, of course, is the name Ray used to obtain his Canadian passport and one of his addresses in Canada was 962 Dundas, West Toronto.

The proprietress of the hotel identified a photograph of the subject as the individual known to her as Ramon George Sneyd who stayed at her hotel. The FBI Laboratory has determined that the signature Ramon George Sneyd on the copy of the guest book page is somewhat indistinct but is similar to known signatures of the subject.

The proprietress of the hotel advised that Ray kept to himself, did not receive any mail, phone calls or visitors and left the hotel between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. every morning after breakfast and returned at about 1 a.m. She stated she did not think that Ray stayed out all night on any occasion but she could not be sure.

New Scotland Yard has orally informed in strictest confidence that on May 27, 1968, at 5:20 p.m., a lone man with a small gun walked into a jeweler's shop in the Paddington area of London, pointed the gun at the jeweler and stated, "This is a stick-up, give me the money in the till." The Legal Attache in London has obtained information from a highly confidential source that subject James Earl Ray while incarcerated in a British prison, using the name of Ramon G. Sneyd, sent a letter to Mr. J. B. Stoner, Attorney-at-Law, Savannah, Georgia. This letter, dated 7/4/68, in essence stated that subject Ray was shown a letter written by Stoner concerning a legal fund which Stoner represents, and Ray advises that he has retained Mr. Hanes and would like to get his advice before he takes any action.

The letter continues by advising that Ray appreciates Stoner's offer of assistance.

It is possible that this Stoner is identical to one Jesse B. Stoner, who is Vice President of the National States Rights Party with headquarters in Savannah, Georgia. Stoner has been described as a racial rabble rouser.

In view of Stoner's association with the National States Rights Party, Savannah and Memphis should determine through contact with appropriate sources and informants if Stoner has had any further contact with Ray.
