Gentlemen:

This 38 year old white male was seen for psychiatric evaluation on December 13, 1966. He was admitted here in March of 1960, to serve a twenty year sentence for armed robbery. This is his first admission to this institution. In 1952, he served a year and one half in an Illinois Penal Institution for robbery and in 1955, he served two and one half years in Leavenworth for transporting stolen goods across the state line.

He is presently charged with an escape attempt in March of 1966 and has recently been returned after an evaluation at the Fulton State Hospital. He has requested an independent psychiatric evaluation following their evaluation. This examiner only recently received this request from the Cole County Circuit Court signed by Judge Riley requesting such an evaluation. However, the inmate expressed his desire to have someone conduct an independent "psychiatric evaluation who was not connected with the administration." We informed him that we would communicate his wishes to the court and possibly someone else might be found.

Ray is an interesting and rather complicated individual. He reports that within the last year, he has had considerable difficulties from a physical point of view, involving a number of somatic complaints such as pain in the "solar plexes," tachycardia and "intracranial tension." When we commented that these were rather large words, he reported that he had been reading up in the medical literature. He then stated that he thought at times that he had cancer or heart trouble but that he no longer feels this way. On certain days, he has rather severe head pains but this is only intermittent. He is now on librium and works intermittently on a construction job.

Ray was born in Alton, Illinois, where his father worked for the railroad. Both parents are now deceased. He has two younger sisters. He reached

the second year in high school, worked eighteen months at the International Shoe Company, entered the service in 1943 and remained there for three years. His highest rank was that of PFC. He has never been married although he has lived for brief periods of time with women. This man's basic problem revolves around what appears to be an increasingly severe obsessive compulsive trend. He states that at the age of ten, he awoke one night and thought he had lost his eye sight. He became quite fearful. These various fears confront him from time to time and in a typical obsessive compulsive way, he feels that he must do certain things in order to undo what he feels is going to occur and might result in harm to him. For instance, he describes a feeling of fear which can be alleviated if he takes his glass of water which he is drinking and sets it on the table and moving it back and forth several times. He also describes at length some rather marked obsessive compulsive features but is reluctant to go into them in detail. Indeed, he just started to discuss this with the people at Fulton prior to his being sent here. He appears worried and his brow is creased. It is evident that this man does have an underlying obsessive compulsive personality. He is of the opinion that his escape attempt was the result of undue anxiety and tension with the need to actually do something. He is fearful that this might lead into more serious difficulties.

At the present time, there is no evidence of delusions, hallucinations or paranoid ideas. There is evidence of a rather deep underlying obsessive compulsive personality trend which he has really never discussed at any length with anyone. This is not psychotic in nature but severely neurotic. Within the last year or so, there is evidence that he has become overly concerned about his physical health and some of his obsessive compulsive concerns have moved in this direction. We would not deny the fact that there may be some physical difficulties although he reports that this was the primary focus of his work-up at the state hospital as well as here and that very little has been found.

At the present time, it is doubtful that he is in a position to be considered for parole. His psychiatric condition must be evaluated by an independent psychiatrist and according to the court, he has the right to have this done. Where they will find this independent psychiatrist is somewhat difficult to determine in this area although they might order him to the University and have it done there. It is felt that he is in need of psychiatric help and that should any serious parole consideration be given, some type of psychiatric help should be considered, that is help, which he can receive on the outside during his parole period. He is becoming increasingly concerned about himself. We question whether or not he is beginning to be a bit depressed although he denies this. We hesitate to go into this to any greater degree at the present time until the court decides what action it will take in regards to assigning an independent psychiatrist for evaluation.

CONSIDER FOR TRANSFER TO THE HONOR FARM

Ray is serving an aggregate sentence of 3 Years and 9 Months, which he received on 7-1-55 in the U. S. District Court at Kansas City, Mo., for forging postal money orders. He was committed to this institution on 7-7-55 and became eligible for parole consideration on 9-30-55. He declined to file for parole. Ray is in Medium Custody, has no detainers lodged against him and, since commitment to this institution, has received one disciplinary report. That occurred on 9-13-55 for being not dependable, lack of interest in his job. On this occasion he was given 30 days restriction and a job change. His conditional release date of 5-20-58 has been advanced to 4-30-58, by his having earned 20 days of AOT on his Bakery assignment as of 8-31-57.

Ray has been working in the Bakery since 3-8-56. He is assigned as a bench hand, working nights, and has consistently earned outstanding work reports. He is a vocational trainee in the Bakery and has been receiving MIT on this assignment since 11-1-56. He also receives a \$10 per month monetary grant, which was effective 4-1-57, to continue through January 1958. He will be eligible for certification on his vocational training program on 9-4-57. Ray is a Catholic and the Chaplain reports that he is negligent and indifferent toward his religious duties. The records of the Education Department indicate that Ray has completed courses in Spanish, Constitutional Government and Typing. He is also enrolled in courses in Baking Theory, Related Training, and in Applied English and Elementary Vocabulary.

Ray is 29 years old. He is serving his second institutional sentence. He has no escape record. During a previous sentence at the Pontiac Branch of the Illinois State Prison, he was assigned to their honor farm, where he worked as a cook in the farm dormitory and as a helper in the officers' quarters. He was considered an average worker and had no punishment reports. He was discharged by expiration of sentence 3-12-54, after completing a 1- to 2-year sentence for robbery. Ray has requested assignment to our Honor Farm. Although his parents are deceased, he indicates he maintains correspondence with an aunt, a Lucille Ryan, residing in Quincy, Ill., his place of legal residence.

The Medical Dept. reports that Ray has not been referred for formal psychiatric examination to date, that he is physically fit for transfer to the Honor Farm, and that he has not been critically ill and is working regularly.

RECOMMENDATION: On November 1, 1956, Ray was approved for meritorious good time and on March 18, 1957, he was given \$10.00 a month April thru January. When the Classification Committee recommended his transfer to the Farm it was also recommended that he retain the monetary portion of the award. Inmate has completed Vocational Training. He has had only one conduct violation which occurred within two months after his arrival here July 7, 1955.

On the above date the above named inmate was missing at the 5:00 P.M. Count. He was not at his assigned job, nor was he in his cell house.

A thorough search was made of the penitentiary, and is still in progress as this I.O.C. is being written. It is not known whether inmate Ray #40016 has successfully gotten outside the penitentiary.

The following named officials were advised during conduct the search: Mr. Ward C. Horn, Warden; Mr. J. J. Smith, Jr., Major; and Mr. Carl White, who was the duty officer. Major Smith and the officers and Sgt. from the Day Watch stayed over to also help conduct the search.

At 7:00 P.M. another Ward Count was taken and inmate Ray #40016 was still missing.

All activities for the evening of April 23, 1967 were cancelled due to the extensive search for inmate Ray.

Another I.O.C. will follow as to the results of the search for inmate Ray #40016.

All local law officials have been alerted of the possible escape.

At approximately 3:25 P.M. Sunday April 23, 1967 Lieutenant William R. Turner, Control Center Desk Officer, was advised that there had been an escape from the institution. He was advised that if security was not alerted there would be another. Subsequent checking and 5:00 P.M. formal count revealed that Inmate James E. Ray #00416, assigned to the Main Kitchen 11:00 A.M.-7:00 P.M. Shift, had not reported for work at 11:00 A.M. and was missing from the 5:00 P.M. count. A search of the grounds and inspection of the walls from both inside and out was conducted without any results. It was assumed and still is as of this date that Inmate Ray is either concealed somewhere in the institution or made good his escape without leaving any visible signs of the mechanics.

This date I interviewed most of the officers involved to try to pin-point the breakdown in security. My findings are inconclusive but do point directly to the old "bug-a-boo" of too much inmate control.

Guard Officer Johnnie Petree, Kitchen Gate

Officer Petree stated that Inmate Ray came to the Kitchen to eat breakfast sometime between 6:30 A.M. and 7:30 A.M. After eating, Inmate Ray sliced some bread (one of his duties for the day) and left the kitchen presumably for the recreation yard. Officer Petree was on duty at the Kitchen Gate 4:00 A.M. - 12:00 P.M. and stated he let Inmate Ray out of the Kitchen as Mainline was going to the yard and that was the last time he saw him.

Officer Petree stated that Inmate Ray was missing when the 11:00 A.M.- 7:00 P.M. workers reported for work at 11:00 A.M. but that he thought he was on the yard and did not try to locate him nor report his absence from duty. He also did not report the absence to his relief officer Harold Schaffer.

Guard Officer Harold Schaffer, Kitchen Gate

Officer Schaffer stated that he did not miss Inmate Ray until around 12:30 P.M. He then called K Hall and asked if Inmate Ray was in his cell. The officer does not know who answered the phone but he was told that Inmate Ray was not in the Hall and was probably on the yard. He did not call Control Center because he found out Inmate Ray was in the kitchen during the morning and had his work done. It is customary to allow the inmates to go to the recreation yard after their work

CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE CRIME AND OF PRISONER'S COMMITMENT

The State's evidence in the trial of James E. Ray, showed the following:
 Ct. No. 1427-H:

That Ray and one James Loama Owens left Ray's rooming house about 8:00 or 8:15 AM on 10-10-59 in a '58 Plymouth, the property of Owens, and proceeded to steal a '50 Ford near the Kroger Store at 3417 Ohio Ave. The Two men then proceeded to the Kroger Store in this '50 Ford, parked a short distance from the front door and both men entered. Ray went to the cashier's office and held an automatic on the cashier and demanded that the safe be opened. After some discussion back and forth to the effect that it took two people to open the safe, Ray became nervous when he saw a second man approach the cashier's cage and he turned and started out of the store, stopping at a check-out counter where he displayed the pistol and demanded that the cashier at this counter open the drawer, which she did. Ray then took about \$120 from the drawer.

During this time, Owens stood inside the front door acting, by his own admission, as the look-out. Owens also had a pistol, but kept it in his suitcoat pocket. After Ray took the money from the cashier's drawer, the two men fled from the store, re-entered the '50 Ford and drove about four blocks where they abandoned the Ford and got back into Owens' Plymouth and proceeded back to Ray's rooming house.

After the two bandits left the store, the manager and one customer got the license number of the '50 Ford, followed the Ford, and saw the switch of cars take place after the robbery, and one of these men obtained the license number of the Plymouth at the time of the 'switch'.

About 30 minutes after the robbery, the police 'spotted' the Plymouth in front of Ray's rooming house, and a short time later arrested Owens while he was getting into the Plymouth, and Ray was arrested in the rooming house after he gave the officers considerable resistance. The two guns, the money and the clothing were recovered in the rooming house.

Both defendants were ident. by the people in the store, and by the two men who pursued them from the scene.

Ray and Owens gave police signed statements admitting their guilt in this holdup.

Ct. No. 1429-H:

On 8-7-59 about 8:45 PM while the victim, Vincent Hromadka, several clerks and customers were in Vincent's IGA Food Market, 1102 Park Ave., two men, later ident. as James Earl Ray and an elderly man who wore sunglasses, entered the store. Ray's accomplice went behind the liquor counter, pointed his revolver at the victim and said, "This is a holdup, keep cool and give him (Ray) the big money," and Ray then walked up to the right of his accomplice, and the victim opened the safe. Hromadka emptied the money from a canvas bag into a large IGA carry-out paper bag while Ray went into the office and took about \$150 from a desk drawer. Ray then went to another cash register from which he took only currency of large denominations, at which time the check-out clerk saw Ray's gun while he was putting the money in his trouser pocket. Ray and his accomplice then deliberately walked out of the store.

While the holdup was in progress a customer ran to his place of business and reported this holdup to the police, and after the robbers left the scene the victim pressed the button on the 'holdup alarm', grabbed his rifle, ran out of the store and after being told by a boy who had seen the robbers run to their auto which was parked in the alley, he fired several shots at the car while it was being driven away.

The victim reported his loss as \$484.66, and \$310.34 which was the property of the Am. Exp. Co., derived from the sale of money orders.

The victim while standing about a foot from Ray while at the check-out register, described him as wearing a Panama hat, dark beard, coal black hair, blue eyes, a Roman-type nose, about 35, 150# 5'9"

After Ray's arrest, the victim and one of the clerk viewed him at the station, and both agreed that Ray was one of the robbers. Ray would make no statement, and the police officers reported he sat there with a silly grin on his face and said, "I cannot deny it and I won't admit it."

Investigating officers found Ray's Panama hat lying in the alley behind the store.

* * *

Ct. No. 1428-H:

On 10-9-59 about 5:45 PM the victim, Gene Hejna, parked his '50 Ford in front of his home at 3166 Oregon St. (The victim stated his car could not be locked, but he had removed the keys from the ignition) The victim was unaware that his car had been stolen until about 9:30 the following morning when the police arrived to tell him his car was found parked at Indiana and Potomac Sts. He went there, and noted that a jumper had been applied to the ignition.

The victim viewed Ray at the station after his arrest, and he refused to say anything.

This automobile was used by Ray and James Laoma Owens as the get-away-car in the Kroger Store holdup (Ct. No. 1427-H), and two witnesses from the Kroger store ident. Ray as the driver of the car while leaving the scene of the holdup, as they had followed them in an auto, saw them park and get out of the '50 Ford and enter Owens' Plymouth.

At the time of Ray's arrest in his room #5 at 2023 Park Ave. where the two guns were recovered, Ray admitted ownership of the two guns, and said, "I guess you want me for that Kroger store stick-up."

Five witnesses in the Kroger holdup positively identified Ray as one of the holdup men, as did a nother man who saw Ray and Owens when they came out of the store.

The owner of the rooming house viewed Ray and Owens at the station, and identified Ray as the occupant of Room #5 in her rooming house, and Owens as one of Ray's visitors.

Owens had six \$10 bills in his trouser pocket when arrested, and admitted this money had been given him by Ray as his share of the Kroger holdup.

In connection with the holdup of Mr. Hromadka's IGA Store, police reports reflect that Hromadka took a series of photos of the two bandits during the holdup and while they were leaving, by means of a camera leased to him by Dave Nathan of the Dubl-Check System, and the following day Mr. Nathan turned over to police officers several views of the bandits in operation of the holdup. Subsequently one JOSEPH ELMER AUSTIN, (W-41-60 yrs.) was arrested by Alton, Ill. police after a ~~supermarket~~ super market holdup in that city on 8-21-59. Several photos of Austin were positively ident. by Hromadka and his clerk. Austin was later ident. by H. and his clerk while in custody in Alton, Ill. In connection with the robbery of the Alton super market on 8-11-59, Lt. C.A. Roberts of Alton brought three witnesses to St. L. to view Ray, and two of them positively ident. him as Austin's accomplice in the Alton, Ill. holdup. (This accounts for the 'hold' the Alton, Ill. Police Department have on James Earl Ray.)

Ray is being released from this institution by virtue of Conditional Release. He was sentenced in the U. S. District Court at St. Louis, Mo. on May 3, 1955 in Kansas City, Missouri. He was paroled at this institution on May 1, 1956. Ray became eligible for parole consideration on Sept. 30, 1956, but he has never filed application for a parole interview. At the time of his last parole consideration, Ray was placed under medical control and assigned to the First Department. He worked on such assignment until Sept. 13, 1956 when he was reassigned to the First Shop. On Sept. 12, 1956, Ray was reported for our House Team but was never actually transferred to such assignment due to the fact that he did not feel he could live in an House Team Sanitary because they are integrated. Due to this fact, he was never placed under such status. He was assigned to our House Team but remained until released on CR. Ray has no delinquency on file against him and has received a total of one disciplinary report. This report occurred on Sept. 13, 1956 when he was reported for lack of interest in his job. For this report, he was placed under thirty days restriction and given a job change.

On Nov. 1, 1956 Ray was reported for CR only and remained under such status until his release. He was also granted a monetary award of \$10 per month for April of 1957 thru Jan. 1958 on a 1/15 basis.

Release plans call for Ray to return to his place of conviction in Kansas City, Missouri where he will reside. He was referred to our Employment Placement Service who in turn referred him to Mr. Robert Baker, Employment Counselor, Mo. State Employment Service, 1411 Walnut Street, Kansas City, Missouri.

Ray is being released with a total of \$37.93 in his personal account, \$61.70 is being given to him in cash. The remaining \$35.68 is being forwarded to the USPO, Kansas City, Missouri. Ray was also given a \$1 bus fare to Kansas City.

He will be under supervision until Oct. 2, 1958.

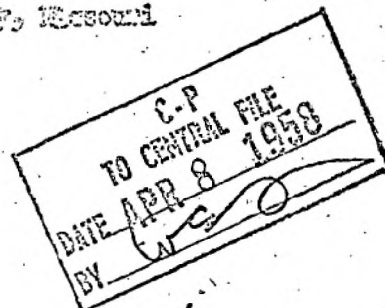

Guard Sergeant David Ekstan, J & K Hall Sgt.

Guard Sergeant Ekstan stated that he was in the Hall from 12:05 P.M. until the end of his duty tour and received several calls from the kitchen inquiring about other inmates but did not receive the call about Inmate Ray. He said however that the call could have been made while he was busy elsewhere in the hall. Inmate James Esson #73789, Hall Clerk stated that he did not take any call concerning Inmate Ray.

Sergeant Ekstan said that he did see Inmate Ray during the day but could not remember for sure if it was after Mainline A.M. or Mainline noon. He said Inmate Ray came to the hall and went to his cell, then later left the hall, presumably for the yard.

Guard Officer Ezra Sheldon, Truck Tunnel

Guard Officer Sheldon stated that the Garbage Truck made two trips through the Truck Tunnel 9:15 A.M. - 9:45 A.M. and 1:45 P.M. - 2:00 P.M. The Trash Truck made one trip 1:45 P.M. - 2:30 P.M.

He stated that he thoroughly searched both trucks, all trips, using the probing rod and did not feel he could have missed an inmate if he had been aboard. He relieved Sergeant Ekstan, J & K Hall for lunch but did not receive a telephone inquiry about Inmate Ray.

Guard Officer Raymond Morgan, Trash Truck

Guard Officer Morgan stated that it was raining while he was inside picking up trash but that he stayed outside the truck and observed the loading of the trash and he was certain that no one boarded the truck while it was being loaded. He said he did have two big cardboard boxes on the truck but that he watched Officer Sheldon probe the boxes and his load in the Truck Tunnel and he doesn't believe anyone was in the truck. He said when he got to the dump the cage was still latched and he dumped his load and watched it burn.

Guard Officer Lufe Gove, Round Gate

There is an inmate rumor that Inmate Ray walked out the Front Door with some civilian visitors just before 3:30 P.M. Guard Officer Lufe Gove stated the the civilians did come through the Round Gate about 3:15 P.M. but that he checked their passes before allowing them to go through the Round Gate and there were no inmates with them. Officer Gove is the type of officer that is very strict in enforcing Round Gate regulations.

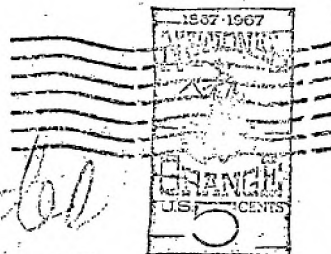

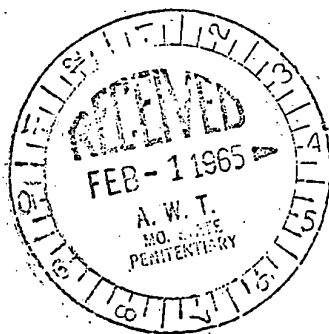

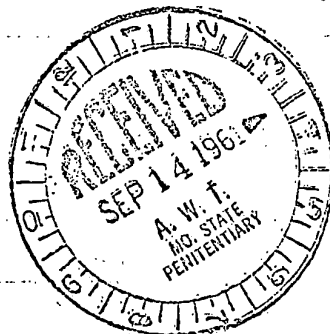

Subject Ray, W-00416-J, who works in the Cleaning Plant, was missed on the 7:00 p.m. K-Hall count. On checking it was learned that Ray, 00416 was in the lobby of J & K Hall at 5:20 p.m., and left with men eating on Greasy Line.

I called #6 tower, Sr. Guard Embra Scott, and asked him if he had seen anyone around the Cleaning Plant. He stated that he had not seen anyone. At about 7:15 p.m. Scott reported to Control Center that he could see someone in the Cleaning Plant.

Sr. Guard Norbert Garzend and I went to the Cleaning Plant and found Ray, 00416, inside. Inmate had mud and blood on his clothing and blood on his face and head. There was several pieces of 1/2-inch pipe sticking under the Cleaning Plant fence Gate, a coil of wire, 1 pr pliers and an A-frame made from 2 X 4 lumber. Inside the building there were several pieces of boards as well as pipe, a carpenter's hand saw and other tools.

On questioning inmate Ray, 00416, he stated that he had attempted to go over the wall between #6 Tower and #7 Tower, in the area between the Tag Plant and the Tailor Shop. We went to this area and found a step-ladder about 8 feet long and 4 pieces of 1/2 inch pipe about 10 feet long as well as several shorter pieces and 2 pipe wrenches. There was also 2 pieces of 2 X 6 lumber about 8 feet long that were fastened together and had steps fastened on it with screws.

Inmate stated further that he had the pipe fastened together and had it hooked on the wall and was at least half way up the wall when the pipe broke and he fell, either landing on his head or was hit with a piece of the pipe. Anyhow he was knocked unconscious for a while. After he was able to get back on his feet he used the pipe wrenches to take the pipe apart and had taken part of the stuff he had used back to the Cleaning Plant.

The pipe was obtained by taking down the pipe racks used as Clothes Racks in the Cleaning Plant.

Ray, 00416, freely admitted that he had intended to go over the wall and believed that he would have made it had the pipe not broken.

Ray was taken to the Hospital for first-aid and later placed in O-Hall.

A search of the Cleaning Plant and the inmate's cell was made. Items picked up were brought to Control Center.

When questioning Ray, 00416, he said that he had tried it at the darkest place on the wall. In talking to Sr. Guard Fred Stock on #7 Tower and Sr. Guard Embra Scott they stated that in this area it was so dark that they could not see anyone in this area unless they had a light.

From my own inspection of this area it is very dark and by all means there should be lights put on the corner of the Tag Plant or the Tailor Shop to light this area.

He arrived at MSP March 1960 with a 20 year sentence for robbery, first degree. He recently finished six months on E-3 for an attempted escape to go over the walls here in the main prison, he says. He claims two years of high school and a hitch in the United States Army.

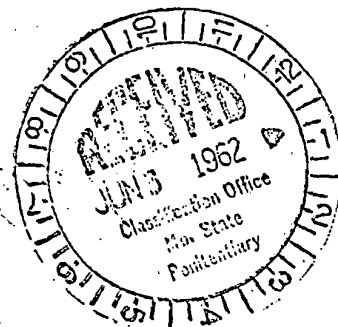
The subject appears to be a rather simple, inadequate, unspontaneous individual of a rather passive sort. His abortive attempt to scale the walls is characteristic of the kind of judgment (one perhaps should say misjudgment) which may be expected from this individual. He smiles in an inappropriate and embarrassing manner at times and gives one the feeling that they are communicating with a rather simple sort of soul.

Subject states that he would prefer to work at "whatever they give me--I don't have any choice." He states that he was previously working in the cleaning plant when he was apprehended in his escape episode. I have no specific recommendations as to work assignment for this individual.

Dear Mr. Kinder:

Attached are a number of reports regarding the attempted escape of the above inmate at or about 9:00 P.M., March 11, 1966, and the search made for him until approximately 12:10 A.M., March 13, 1966.

I am recommending that you prosecute this inmate under Section 557.351, Missouri R.S., for the escape attempt, as I think we have ample evidence for a successful prosecution.

This inmate did place a dummy in his bed in an attempt to "cover up" for his absence at the 9:00 P.M. count on March 11, 1966. He did cut a hole through a security screen on a window at the west end of J-Hall and was able to hide out from search parties on various areas of the roof. He took a 14 foot iron rod with him that is used to ventilate the windows in J-Hall. He attached a metal hook to the end of this rod and was able to hang the rod from the eave of the ventilator shaft of the Administration Building. This was made possible by him scaling several feet up the walls in a corner between the Administration Building and the ventilator shaft immediately above the Officer's Dining Room.

He proceeded to climb up the rod in an effort to reach the roof of the Administration Building where he undoubtedly planned to follow the roof line of the front building and then make his escape from this location.

You will note in the report of Sgt. Williams, dated March 13, 1966, that inmate Ray had items of contraband on his person that would contribute toward an escape, especially the pliers which he used to cut the security
