After a continued search and still not keeping whether Inmate Ray had made good his escape, but still feeling that he could be inside. It seemed that all available places had been searched and the extra Officers again left. Warden Harold Swenson instructed me to have a guard on each shift placed in my Office during night time. On the 3-11 shift there were still no signs of Inmate Ray.

On the 11-7 shift, Guard Henry Lockett who was on watch in my Office, noticed Inmate Ray's hands coming over the wall of the tunnel roof back of the Officers Dining Room. Officer Lockett captured the inmate and he was returned to the Control Center. Inmate Ray had been hiding in a locked Transformer Room back of the roof of the Officers Dining Room. He had been able to remove part of the door to the room and replace it and hide. After his escape attempt had failed, and after hiding he was climbing to the Control Center Roof when he was noticed by Guard Henry Lockett. Immate Ray admitted attempting to escape.

The following information was taken from the Commitment Record of the two Inmates:

Seibert, Joseph #W-09111 was received at the Prison on 10-2-64 from Jackson County. He is serving a sentence of Natural Life for Mundor 1st. He was placed in Segregation on 8-30-65 for attempt to escape and released from Segreation on 2-11-66. He is 27 years old at this time. He has five conduct violations since arriving.

Rsy, James Earl #W00416 was received at the Prison on 3-17-60 from St Louis City. He is serving a sentence of 20 years for Robbery lat., DDW; and operating motor vehicle w/o permission of the owner. At this time he is 38 years old. He was placed in Segreation on 11-21-61 for attempted escape, and released from Segreation on 5-22-61. He has had three conduct violations sinse arriving.

At the time of the present incident Seibert was assigned to work in the Kitchen and Ray was assigned as a J & K Cleaner.

About 10:00 P.M. on March 11, 1966, I received a telephone call from Sgt. James Whitworth, working the Control Center Desk, Main Prison for men, Jefferson City, Mo., stateing they had two inmates missing. Namely James Ray, W#-00416 and Joseph Seibert #W-09111. I told Sgt. Whitworth I would be over immediately and help in the search.

Inmate Seibert celled in K-90 and Inmate Ray celled in J-42. Both inmates had placed a dummy made of bedding under the blankets according to Guard Clifford Story, assigned J and K Hall Guard, 3-11 Shift.

On arrival at the prison, I was told Inmate Seibert had been found at the T.V. Room after inmates had returned to the halls from recreation T.V. in the Upper Stockade. Inmate Seibert did not return with the lines and admitted he was going to try to escape. He had gone to recreation with the lines from the hall. He had only a road map on his person as was reported to me.

I picked all available Officers and started to search for the other missing Inmate James Ray. Also guards were held over from the 3-11 shift, along with available guards of the 11-7 shift. All buildings and places, mostly above ground were searched, some attics and service tunnels. About 12:00 M. on checking the Control Center Roof South and North of My Office, I found a hole cut in the heavy screen on the West end of J Hall. Shortly after Guard Vernia Wilson reported to Sgt. George Golden that he saw the same hole and said there was a scaffolding near by that had been used to wash windows, on the inside. Guard Wilson is also assigned to J-K Halls on the 11-7 Shift. By this time we felt sure this was where Inmate Ray had left the hall. I also checked the roof of my Office and the roof of the Officers Dining Room finding no evidence of anyone being on the roof. About 2:30 A.M. of the 12th, the 3-11 shift guard were dismissed and left. I left about 3:00 A.M.

About 9:00 A.M. the 13th, I returned to the Prison and joined the search by other officers. Accompanied by Guards Jack Longan, William Smith, Henry Lockett, we searched Service Tunnels, Attics, Roofs, Venilators etc., with no luck in finding Inmate Rey. I did find a bar had been forced out of the barred gate that separates the H-Hall basement from the Main Steam Tunnel. I also checked the Roof of H-Hall, then took Guard James Enlos and after sending for a ladder out of the Outside Construction, checked the Roof at the front of the Administration Building. Then we took this ladder and went to the roof of the Air Shaft at the rear of H-Hall and over the Officers Dining Room. Here we found evidence of where we thought Inmate Ray had been.

In the meantime about 10:00 A.M., Sgt. Geo. Golden reported to me that Civilian Nurse Floyd Cain, assigned at the hospital and looking from a hospital window, had noticed a pipe hanging from the H-Hall guttering and also some clothing on the Officers Dining Hall roof. On checking this out, it was found this was a window rod from J-Hall, and a coat and gloves that Inmate Ray had used in the escape attempt.

This Professional Summary is being precared at the request of the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, where this former immate is serving a sentence of 3 years and 9 months for Forging Woney Orders. This request was forwarded from the Joliet Diagnostic Perot. The material in this Senery is derived from the files of the Criminologist and should be regarded as confidential.

Innate was received at the Joliet Magnestic Depot 5-13-52, to serve a sentence of 1 to 2 years for Mobbery. We had held up a taxicab driver in Chicago, taking his vehicle, and was apprehended abortly thereafter by the police, who shot him during the capture. He admitted his guilt, stabing that he was heavily intoxicated and had used a pipe in place of a gun, placing it at the back of the driver's body. He had previously been on a 2-year probation in les Angeles, California, for burglary, he being caught in the act of entering a restaurant from a back stairway.

We was born at Alton, Illinois, the oldest of three children, his father working regularly as a railroad brakeaum until his beath in 1947. We was raised primarily in Quincy, Illinois, where he graduated from eighth grade and later had some high school training under the G. I. Will. He was in the Army between 2-18-46 and 12-23-46, when he was honorably discharged for lack of adaptability. He had been in Chicago for a short time prior to the offense, and had had several short term jobs as a fretery hand or storeroom worker. He was unmarried, and seemed to be somewhat of a solitary person, with occasional alcoholic excesses.

On the Army Alpha examination, he scored Ill, or superior. It was thought that he had no systematic delinquent traits, and segregation at Pontiac was recommended.

It Pontice, he requested a farm assignment, and was so placed, after a short period in the innates' kitchen. He worked as a cook in the farm dormitory, and a helper in the officers quarters, and was always considered an average worker. He had no punishment reports.

The latest medical report in our possession, dated 1-30-53, is essentially negative, and he was never referred to the Psychiatrist for any unusual or abnormal behavior. Our office had a couple of routine contacts with him, and it appeared that he had been behaving unstably ever since leaving the Army, and that he was subject to impulsive delinquent behavior in connection with drinking, which, in turn, was related to his tendency to become easily discouraged. Our last contact with him was on 2-19-54.

He was discharged by empiration of scatence on 3-12-54.

Official Version: On April 1, 1955, Ray entered a plea of guilty to an information in one count charging him with for the endorsement on a U.S. Post Office money order and he was sentenced.
