JERRY RAY WAS DISCOVERED BY BUAGENTS TODAY VISITING THE SUBJECT AT THE SHELBY COUNTY JAIL. AS JERRY RAY WAS LEAVING THE JAIL, HE WAS APPROACHED IN THE CORRIDOR BY BUAGENTS WHO REQUESTED THAT HE ACCOMPANY THEM TO SOME PLACE SUITABLE FOR INTERVIEW. JERRY AGREED TO GO WITH THE AGENTS INTO ONE OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT OFFICES, AND AS JERRY AND BUAGENTS WERE ENTERING THIS OFFICE, THEY WERE JOINED BY THE SUBJECT JAMES EARL RAY'S ATTORNEY, J. B. STONER. STONER REFERRED TO THE BUREAU AS THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INTEGRATION AND ADVISED

REMINDING JERRY THAT HE HAD BEEN WIDELY QUOTED IN THE NEWSPAPERS AS HAVING SAID THAT JAMES EARL RAY WAS A PART OF A CONSPIRACY TO MURDER MARTIN LUTHER KING. JERRY WAS ADVISED THAT IF HE HAS ANY INFORMATION OF A CONSPIRACY HE SHOULD TURN IT OVER TO THE FBI. STONER AGAIN ADVISED JERRY RAY NOT TO TALK, AND JERRY RAY THEN SAID HIS INFORMATION WOULD BEST BE GIVEN AT A TRIAL. JERRY WAS REMINDED THAT AT THIS TIME THERE IS NO REASON TO BELIEVE THERE WILL BE A TRIAL, AND JERRY RAY WAS ASKED IF BY THE TERM TRIAL HE MEANT HE INTENDED TO TESTIFY BEFORE A GRAND JURY. STONER AGAIN CAUTIONED RAY NOT TO TALK AND SAID HE IS CONVINCED JAMES EARL RAY WILL BE GIVEN A TRIAL FOR THE KILLING OF KING.

AS THE AGENTS TURNED TO LEAVE STONER AND RAY, STONER CALLED OUT TO THE AGENTS TO "BE GOOD" AND TO "PROTECT ALL THE NIGGERS." MOMENTS LATER RAY AND STONER WERE OBSERVED TALKING TO A REPORTER FROM ONE OF THE LOCAL NEWSPAPERS.

NO FURTHER CONTACT IS CONTEMPLATED WITH EITHER JERRY RAY OR WITH STONER.

NO OTHER INQUIRIES RECEIVED, HOWEVER, MEMPHIS DIVISION WILL CONTINUE WITH NO COMMENT IN REGARD TO INQUIRIES FROM NEWSPAPERS AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS REPRESENTATIVES.

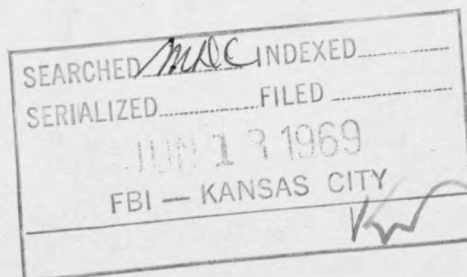

Ray Alleges 'Federal Agents' Killed Dr. Martin Luther King

St. Louis (AP)—A television station quoted James Earl Ray yesterday as saying federal agents killed Dr. Martin Luther King, jr., and "used me to be the fall guy."

Station KMOX-TV said this was part of a statement dictated by Ray to his brother, Jerry Ray, in the Tennessee State prison in Nashville. Jerry Ray read the statement on camera to Barry Serafin, a KMOX-TV reporter who accompanied Jerry to Nashville Wednesday.

James Earl Ray, an escapee from the Missouri State prison, pleaded guilty to killing King and was sentenced to 99 years. His attempts to obtain a new trial so far have been unsuccessful.

The statement was written in long hand by Jerry Ray, who signed his brother's name, Serafin said.

The statement said James Earl Ray was working with federal agents—not otherwise identified by name or organi-

zation—during the spring of 1968.

"They told me I was helping them to supply arms and guns to Cuba refugees to overthrow Castro and the Communists in Cuba," the statement continued. "The reason why I've

made trips to Mexico was in regard to helping the agents of the federal government to supply arms to Cuban refugees there to overthrow Castro. The federal agents led me to believe that I was in Memphis in April for the same purpose."

At another point that statement said: "I knew nothing about King being in Memphis until after King had been killed. I could not argue with the federal agents I worked for because they would have put me back in the Missouri State prison at Jefferson City if I failed to take orders from them. I know that the federal agents merely used me to be the fall guy when they killed King."

The statement said Ray hopes some high government official "will expose the whole deal" so he will be freed.

"If they don't, we have more information which we will release in the near future. I don't know what motives the federal agents had for killing King. Ask former Attorney General Ramsey Clark. Maybe he knows."

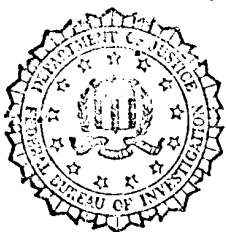

Dear Mr. Goldman, There is somewhat of a similarity between Tennessee v. Ray and the above cause — via the plea of guilty to alleged charges — but more of March 24 a bit naïve, when you assert that "a plea is normal enough in U.S. Court — some authorities to settle far more cases than they bring to trial." Not exactly so, Pete — by reason of the following examples in both cases, supra. In 1968, on the 4th day of July, 1968, I attempted to commit Air Craft Piracy (i.e., the attempted hijacking of a TWA jetliner with 71 passengers aboard) while in the custody of U.S. Government Marshalls. The Government made a "deal" with the defendant [pursuant to Rule 17.1, Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure — which provides for a Pretrial Conference] — not because of any "time" — and money — "convenience" — but did not want any of those seventy-one passengers to file a multi-million dollar civil action damage suit against the U.S. Attorney. Chap. 171, Sections 1346 and 2671. The magnitude of this case provided a "flexibility" beyond the "normal" routine of the so-called "cop-out."

In the Ray "deal" the same "convenience" applies — but since the apprehension of the "big" in New Mexico two weeks ago, the "deal" which was made will now backfire! The shocking events unfold — with the exposure of the shock placed so close within the "deal" that Ray himself was paid by big "B" to "settle" — now not the indicated "deal" but the "deal" itself.

On July 25, 1969, C. R. CRANK, JR., Superintendent, Federal Detention Center, Florence, Arizona, made available the attached copy of a letter written by JOHN HAMILTON MORRIS, inmate of that institution to Mr. PETER GOLDMAN, 444 Madison Avenue, New York City, New York. Mr. CRANK pointed out that the significance of this letter was the fact that MORRIS indicated that JAMES EARL RAY had been paid by an individual known as "BIG D". Mr. CRANK advised that MORRIS was received at that institution on July 19, 1969, and was incarcerated there until July 25, 1969.

MORRIS was maintained at that institution as a stop-over while en route from San Francisco, California, to Leavenworth, Kansas. He explained that MORRIS was serving a sentence at U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, and had been removed from that institution to San Francisco, where he was afforded a hearing on a Writ of Habeas Corpus.

Mr. CRANK advised that an information card maintained by that institution on MORRIS indicated that he had been convicted for crimes of bank robbery in 1949, bank robbery in 1969 and aircraft piracy in 1969. His attorney was listed as PAUL L. LARSEN, 309 South Third Street, Las Vegas, Nevada.

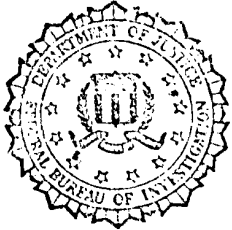

R. 17.1, Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure — which provides for a Pretrial Conference] — not because of any "time- and money-saving convenience" — did not want any of those seventy-one passengers to file a multi-million dollar civil action damage suit against the U.S. Government. Chap. 171, Sections 1346 and 2671. The magnitude of this case provided a "flexibility" beyond the "normal" routine of the so-called "top-out."

In the Ray "deal" the same "convenience" applies — but since the apprehension of the defendant in New Mexico two weeks ago ^{44-1987-Sub-M-647} was made will now backfire! While the shocking events unfold — with the shocking source within the "deal" Ray himself was paid by "top-out" to know not the intricacies of the deal.

Mr. CRANK advised that MORRIS was received at that institution on July 19, 1969, and was incarcerated there until July 25, 1969.

MORRIS was maintained at that institution as a stop-over while en route from San Francisco, California, to Leavenworth, Kansas. He explained that MORRIS was serving a sentence at U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, and had been removed from that institution to San Francisco, where he was afforded a hearing on a Writ of Habeas Corpus.

Mr. CRANK advised that an information card maintained by that institution on MORRIS indicated that he had been convicted for crimes of bank robbery in 1949, bank robbery in 1969 and aircraft piracy in 1969. His attorney was listed as PAUL L. LARSEN, 309 South Third Street, Las Vegas, Nevada.

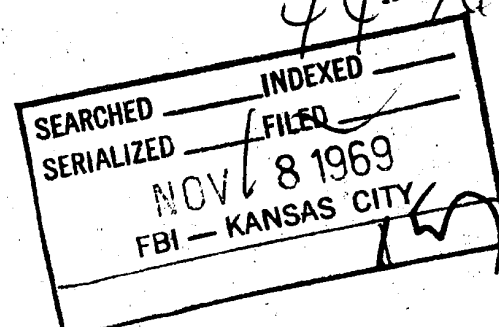

Judge Orders More Exercise and a Job For James Earl Ray

Nashville, Tenn. (AP)—A federal judge ordered Tennessee state prison officials yesterday to provide more exercise and a job to James Earl Ray, who says he prefers the threat of death at the hands of fellow inmates to remaining in solitary confinement.

Judge William E. Miller's order could result in Ray's becoming a part-time food server and janitor in the prison's maximum security section. Ray is the admitted killer of Dr. Martin Luther King, jr.

Orders Plan by State

Miller ordered the state to submit by January 12 a plan incorporating "recreation, work and exercise" for Ray, who had sought an injunction against continued maximum security confinement. He contended it was impairing his health and violating his rights.

The state said Ray, who was sentenced to 99 years in King's slaying, was being kept in the 6-by-9-foot cell here for his own protection.

"Enforced idleness can be cruel punishment," Judge Miller said in handing down his order, "particularly when

it is only to protect him from bodily harm."

Miller described as constructive a suggestion by W. S. Neil, warden, that Ray be allowed to help serve food to other maximum security prisoners while they were locked up, and help janitors with cleanup. The judge reserved final judgment, however, until he received the written plan.

Expresses a Wish

Ray was asked at the day-long hearing whether he feared harm from other inmates, and replied, "I'd rather face that than 99 years in solitary."

Miller said at the outset he would decide only if the confinement violates Ray's rights under the eighth amendment which prohibits cruel and unusual punishment.

Nashville, Tenn. (AP) — James Earl Ray, seeking to win a transfer from a maximum security cell at Tennessee state penitentiary, told a federal court today that if authorities believe a conspiracy was responsible for the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King, jr., they should have a trial.

Nashville, Tenn. (AP)—James Earl Ray went into federal court today to argue that his confinement in the maximum security section of the Tennessee State penitentiary here constitutes cruel and inhuman treatment.

Ray, serving 99 years for the sniper slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was transferred in a heavy rainstorm from the prison to a cell in the federal courthouse before dawn today. He was guarded closely by 10 carloads of state and federal officers.

Ray, appearing pale after 18 months behind bars here and in Memphis, was shackled as he was whisked into the courthouse. He claims maximum security confinement violates

his rights and is damaging his health.

A Motion Rejected

Judge William E. Miller of the U. S. District court ruled that Ray should be present at the hearing, but denied a state motion that he be given a physical examination first.

The state maintains Ray's confinement is for his own good and that his health is fine.

Ray contended in a hand-written petition that it is causing him "untold anxiety, apprehension and ill health" to the point that he believes he "cannot cope with it further."

Among those Ray's attorneys subpoenaed for the hearing were a male nurse and doctor from the prison.

Ray's counsel also sought to call the chief of Vandervilt hospital's psychology section, but Miller reserved judgment on that until today.

Seized In London

Ray has been under tight security since his arrest in London after King's assassination in Memphis, April 4, 1968. He was held in a special cell in the Shelby County jail while awaiting trial and was brought to the prison March 11, the day after he pleaded guilty.

Ray has remained in maximum security since then except for one trip to Memphis where his bid for a new trial on the basis that his guilty plea was forced upon him was turned down.

An appeal of that ruling was turned down by the state Court of Criminal Appeals. An appeal to the state Supreme court is pending.

On 2/20/70, BILL GORDON STEINHOFF was interviewed at KSP, Lansing, Kansas, upon his request. During the course of the interview, STEINHOFF was vague as to why he wanted to talk to an FBI Agent, referring to a previous interview with an FBI Agent, (FNU) JOHNSON. STEINHOFF advised he had talked to JOHNSON in Wichita, Kansas, during 11/68. SA HICKMAN asked STEINHOFF the nature of the interview at which time he stated that the interview was relative to facts concerning the assassination of MARTIN LUTHER KING. STEINHOFF was reluctant to furnish any information concerning his prior interview, and in view of this, no further attempt was made to extract information from STEINHOFF.

On 7/31/70, GEORGE BEN EDMONDSON, a former Top Ten Fugitive, who is presently residing and working in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, under the assumed name of ALEX BORMANN, personally appeared at the Pittsburgh Office at which time he furnished the following information:

EDMONDSON advised that he is presently residing with his wife JINETTE and his young son at Brighton Terrace, Apartment 403, 721 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, Pa. 15233, after having recently moved to Pittsburgh from Montreal, Canada, where he had been living and working since his release from the Missouri State Prison (MSP), Jefferson City, Missouri, on \$5,000 bond pending an appeal with the Missouri Supreme Court on his armed robbery sentence. EDMONDSON stated that since his release from MSP he has been living and working under the assumed name of ALEX BORMANN. He stated he is employed as a project engineer by Rust Associates, Ltd., Montreal Canada, a Division of Litton Industries and was recently transferred to Rust Engineering, Pittsburgh, Pa., for a new work assignment. EDMONDSON stated that officials of Rust Associates, Ltd., and Rust Engineering, Pittsburgh are cognizant of his present status and his background as a former Top Ten Fugitive.

EDMONDSON advised that his purpose in contacting FBI, Pittsburgh at this time was because he was greatly disturbed over some recent developments that have come to his attention which could result in his identity being exposed, thereby jeopardizing his employment and all that he has accomplished since his release from prison.

EDMONDSON stated that he recently learned that a book entitled, "I Slew a Dreamer," written by WILLIAM BRADFORD HUIE, published by Delacorte Press, New York City, is being sold throughout the United States and Canada. He stated that this book is a story about JAMES EARL RAY and the events leading up to the murder of MARTIN LUTHER KING. He stated that upon reading this book, he determined that his name and some of his aliases, including ALEX BORMANN, are frequently mentioned in several chapters of the book with regard to the author's suspicions that he, EDMONDSON may have been involved with and influenced JAMES EARL RAY in the plot to murder KING, while both he and JAMES EARL RAY were serving prison sentences together in the MSP.

EDMONDSON stated he is fearful that notoriety of this book will lead to his subsequent exposure by some news media tracing him to Pittsburgh. He stated he has already received one anonymous telephone call at his place of employment wherein the caller suggested he go to a bookstore and read, "I Slew a Dreamer" which he would find very interesting.

EDMONDSON stated that he immediately notified his attorney, JAMES A. DUNN, Carthage, Missouri, of the contents of the book and mailed him a copy to read. He stated that he has also brought this book to the attention of his superiors at Rust Engineering, Pittsburgh. He stated that if he should be exposed he will consider filing a damage suit for slander against the author and publisher of the book. He stated that insofar as the author's suspicions, that he was involved with JAMES EARL RAY in the murder of KING are concerned, they are not true and FBI records would substantiate him on this as he was extensively interviewed along these lines by the FBI after his apprehension as a Top Ten Fugitive.

EDMONDSON stated that he was merely bringing the above mentioned developments to the attention of the FBI for informational purposes. He stated he is awaiting instructions from his attorney as to what action he should take with regard to his problems.

James Earl Ray In Civil Appeal

Memphis (AP)—An attorney for James Earl Ray, self-confessed slayer of Dr. Martin Luther King jr., says a ruling in a civil suit on Ray's behalf probably will be appealed to the U. S. Supreme court.

The comments of Richard J. Ryan came after the U. S. Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals dismissed Ray's attempt to void contracts between himself and Percy Foreman of Houston and Arthur Haynes, sr. of Birmingham, lawyers and William Bradford Huie, a writer.

Ray contended in his suit that the three men duped him into signing a contract and that they were more interested in getting him to enter a guilty plea to King's death in 1968 than they were in seeing that he had an adequate defense.

Ray had charged that an open trial would have diminished royalties to Huie and the two lawyers from writings about the slaying, since facts would have been placed on open record. The guilty plea did not require a full-scale trial.
