Circumstances of Instant Offense Inmate's Version: Subject states that in January, 1953 in St. Louis, Missouri, he was arrested and accused of having stolen a billfold out of a lady's purse. He denies the charge, stating that a fellow with him took the billfold. He was charged with Larceny from the Person in Macunt less than \$30.00. Subject was released on bond. In June, 1953 in St. Louis, Missouri, subject was delivering narcotics when he was arrested and the narcotics were found. He was charged with Illegal Possession of Marcotics. He again made bond. On October 8, 1953 subject plead guilty to both charges and was sentenced to serve 2 years (242 cone) in Missouri State enitentiary.

He claims his parents were strict with him, but at the age of eighteen he was arrested for Assault and sentenced to the City Workhouse for six months. Subject has never married, but claims paternity of one son. He prefers the Catholic religion, attends church occasionally but is not a member. He disclaims use of narcotics and intoxicants. No military service claimed. Subject plans to live in Detroit, Michigan with his aunt when released.

This report is concerned with the behavior and statements of Inmate Earl Harris C-12108 during his Assignment to the Maximum Security Unit.

Wherever Harris has celled in Maximum Security he has spread dissension and created unnecessary incidents. His record during his past and present sentences in the institution is heavily documented as to his preoccupation with violent and often vicious behavior. He is very vociferous, profane, and threatening in his remarks concerning Department administrators, Prison Guards, and employees of this institution.

He uses his reputation and his known propensity to violence to abuse, and intimidate other Inmates until they accede to his wishes in causing disturbances, food strikes, slanderous comments concerning Officers and employees of the Dept. of Corrections.

Harris's statements and behavior are aimed at promoting riot, violence, and disorder in this institution and the state it represents. He has this past week alone made statements such as "We ought to kill six or seven of these screws (Officers) like they did in Illinois." "Kill a whole bunch of the ------: This A.M. he stated several times that Inmates in M.S.P. should raise ---- and start a riot.

When called before Adjustment Board this A.M. on a Violation Report of his Agitating another Inmate (A charge that was witnessed by several Officers) he was insolent, and abusive, (calling adjustment board a Kangaroo Court) and upon being placed in Seclusion Cell he threatened Officer's life stating he would kill them if he got a chance.

We believe and with good reason that if Earl Harris C-12108 were placed in any segment of the population that before long he would have promulgated disorder and behavior contrary to the rules of common sense, decency, and good order.

We believe therefore that Inmate Earl Harris C012108 should be placed in Seclusion Cell for an indefinite period (subject to the decision and judgment of Warden H. Swenson, Associate Warden's, W. Kern and C. White, and the Classification committee) We are under no illusions as to this reforming or changing Harris. It will simply make it more difficult for him to implement his often stated plans of riot, destruction, and murder.

Psychiatric Evaluation

Walter E. Nolan W-56298

March 30, 1967

This 68-year-old white male has been in the prison system for the last 30 years of his life. At this time there is a possibility of a discharge. He is a surprisingly jovial individual despite the thirty years of incarceration. He himself states that there is no use worrying about things like this. He indicates that he has kept up a legal interest for the last thirty years and expects to be discharged. He also indicates that he feels that the warden stopped him from learning more about being a pastry chef. He states that he was transferred to Moberly and this stopped him from being able to continue as a pastry chef. He indicates that he is specifically against the warden for this. This is apparently a grudge that he has maintained over the years. He states that he would be all right as long as the warden had nothing to do with him. He seems to be a rather opinionated individual who once he "gets stuck on something" he follows through to the end. However, there is no evidence of any paranoid thinking or any delusional system. He indicates that he hopes to be able to go into business for himself when he leaves here. He indicates that there are people who cwe him a few favors that he feels that he can approach for a sizable loan. However, this seems to be somewhat guarded in that he states that "There are not too many things that an old man like me can do". During the psychiatric interview he smoked a pipe and talked quite freely. There was no evidence of any guarding. There was no evidence of marked emotional lability. There was also no evidence of any thought disorder. It was clear that he had some difficulties with his sensorium and that both his immediate recall and his past memory were mildly impaired. This would seem the result of a mild brain syndrome. The diagnosis at this time is chronic brain syndrome, mild, which should not impair his functioning very much.

Circumstances of Instant Offence Inmate's Version: (The following is a statement which subject wrote while he was working in the Classification Department.) He states that he did not commit the instant offense. He could have accepted a one year workhouse sentence for a plea of guilty, but preferred to stand trial. He states that this crime was alleged to have been committed in the year of 1929, and that due to the fact he was incarcerated in the State Prison of Illinois from 1930 to 1941, he could not stand trial in the case sooner. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court and the decision of the lower court was affirmed.

Subject states that on March 16, 1951, he was arrested on suspicion at a friend's House in St. Iouis County. He claims he does not know why he was arrested. On November 18, 1951, he was tried on the habitual criminal act and again on February 4, 1952. On February 18, 1952 he was tried for robbery, and the jury rendered a verdict of not guilty on each charge. Subject states the parole revocation was a mystery to him.

Inmate's Version of Revocation: Subject was only on "the street" from May, 1957 until September, 1957. Jailed in September, 1957 and beat three armed Robbery (Over)

CRIMINAL HISTORY: Prior to entering the service, the subject was charged with grand larceny in June of 1949 at Jasper, Alabama, with the charge showing no disposition, but evidently was connected with the offense for which he received a dishonorable discharge from the U. S. Arter he and his wife broke up, he went AMOL, kept going, and finally was charged with disertion, for which he received a 7 year USDB sentence. In 1955, the subject was charged with non support, with no disposition shown. After serving his Tennessee centence, he was charged with forged check at Springfield, forgery and grand larcony early in 1965 in Alabama and another federal charge later, with none of these charges showing a disposition. After his involvement in the present offense, he went to Alabama and was later extradited to Missouri on the charge of uttering a forged check.

PRESENT OFFENSE: The subject was arrested in September of 1963 at Republic, Missouri after uttering a forged check. After being bound over to the Circuit Court in July of 1964 and while awaiting the next term, the subject jumped bond and was extradited from the state of Alabama to Missouri on the present charge. In September of 1965 he entered a plea of guilty on the charge and received a 3 year 6 months sentence to the Department of Corrections.

EDUCATIONAL: The subject states that he completed the 12th grade at the Boys' Training School in Ternessee, and indicated that he made fair grades in school for the most part. His performance on tests would suggest an above average level of intellectual endowment with an average general mental ability shown. A 7.9 SAT battery median with an erratic profile suggests some educational limitations as compared with his 12th grade achievement. He was lower in arithmetic and higher in the reading area.

VOCATIONAL-FIRLOYMENT: The subject states that he has been a finish carpenter most of his life and while in military service was assigned to the carpenter shop. He states that he was doing construction work in the Springfield area at the time of the instant offense, and had lived in that area for about 1 year. His mechanical aptitude is superior which suggests some qualification for vocational employment in this area.

RELIGIOM: The subject is a baptized member of the Methodist Church, in which he was reared, but states he has not been involved in religious activities more recently.

HEALTH AND HABITS: The subject denies being an alcoholic, but admits that periodically he goes on drinking binges which generally takes him away from home. This evidently was his reason for being in southwestern Hissouri at the time of the instant offense. He does not indicate that he was separated from his wife, but he had been away from her for as long as a year. Subject makes no physical complaints and is cleared for a regular duty status. He denies the use of parcotics or ever contracting veneral discuss or being hospitalized for a major illness. His wife reports that they enjoy fishing and bowling as a family, but that his drinking disrupted the domestic environment.

SOURCES OF INFORMATION: Commitment report, FRI report, transcript of serial record, Tennosses State Penktontiary report, wife's questionneire, medical report, test battery, interview.

EVALUATION OF IMMAND: This is a 1/7-year-old white man from southwestern Missouri serving his 2nd felony incarceration, although he served a diciplinary barracks sentence for desertion while in the military service. He was reared in a boys industrial school in Tennessee where he is said to have received adequate training and developed close relationships with the superintendent of the school, but has evidently had a difficult time in internalizing acceptable social values. 
