White House Denies Bombing Halt Rumors

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House said today there has been no breakthrough in Vietnam war negotiations despite widespread reports of a U.S. proposal to halt completely the bombing of North Vietnam.

"The position of the United States with respect to Vietnam remains as set forth by the President and the secretary of state," presidential press secretary presidential press secretary George Christian said.

"There has been no basic change in the situation: No breakthrough," he added in a midmorning statement prompted by newsmen's queries following reports of a possible major new peace move from here, Paris and Saigon.

A SENIOR South Vietnamese political officials said in Saigon earlier today the United States has proposed a full bombing halt and was discussing the proposal with the Saigon government.

In Paris, oSuth Vietnamese diplomats two meetings today between U.S. Amold newsmen they understand the bassador Ellsworth Bunker and South told newsmen they understand the United States had made the proposal as an attempt to further peace negotia-

Washington officials, although declining to say whether a fiinal settlement has been reached, acknowledged the United States and North Vietnam for several weeks have been discussing a package plan to end the deadlocked talks

in Paris.
The Washington officials said a key element of the package is North Vietnam's military restraint in return for a bombing halt.

Also being discussed, they said, is the way the South Vietnamese government and the National Liberation Front-political arm of the Viet Cong - would be brought into the second phase of the

THE REPORT from Saigon followed

Vietnamese President Nguyen Thieu. Later Bunker met a third time with Thieu who meanwhile had met with his cabinet and top political, legis-lative and government figures.

The Saigon source said Thieu told top members of his regime the enemy must guarantee they will not escalate the war if a bombing halt is ordered.

Thieu also said any decision to halt the bombing must be agreed to by the South Vietnamese government the official, who declined to be quoted by name, said. "We'll know within the next 24 hours," the official added.

NO INDICATION occurred during today's 26th meeting in Paris between U.S. and North Vietnamese negotiators of any breakthrough in the talks.

Ambassador W. Averell Harriman, top

the session there had been no talk of the bombing issue.

North Vietnamese Ambassador Xuan Thuy declared: "The 26th meeting was just like the 25 preceding ones." During the session itself Thuy repeated Hanoi's formula for progress in the talks: A total, unconditional halt in U.S. attacks on the North.

The United States has insisted on mutual restraint by North Vietnam as a condition for a full bombing halt. Hanoi has yet to give any word or hint that the recent decline in its military activity is due to a deliberate decision to de-escalate the war.

What the decline means could not be

explained immediately.

FOLLOWING THE White House statement, the President and his advisers were reported to be keeping the situation under constant study.

Some knowledgeable officials warned against drawing any long-range conclusions about the future from the statement.

Specifically, these authorities said the declaration that there has been no basic change in the situation does not mean that a basic change would be impossible on very short notice.

THE MEETINGS of Bunker and Thieu set off a wave of reports and rumors in Saigon that an important development was in the works.

A spokesman for the U.S. Mission said:

the mission has no comment on them.

Another South Vietnamese government source told newsmen to be on the alert for a statement that might be issued in Washington and Saigon on the bombing. Although American sources declined to discuss the talks, one suggested that newsmen keep in touch through the

One source said American planes bombed North Vietnam below the 19th parallel today as usual and that as far as he knew, orders were in effect for another day of bombing Thursday.

A HALT IN the bombing would constitute a major U.S. peace offensive aimed at getting the six-month-old Paris peace talks moving as well as a major concessions by the United States. Heretofore, the United States has

Heavy rains this morning all but inundated much of central and western Kansas and submerged several highways in Sedgwick County.

Within a 24-hour period prior to 7 a.m. today, 4.80 inches of moisture fell at Cheney Lake, while 3.05 inches fell at

The Kansas Highway Patrol said the M&M Road (from U.S. 54 north to Cheney Lake) was closed early today at 21st Street North due to heavy flooding.

ROADS IN AND NEAR Sedgwick also were reported flooded by mid-morning. Al Beasley, editor of the Sedgwick Pantograph, reported streets in downtown Sedgwick had water from curb to

Roads near Sedgwick also were bad because of the rainfall, Beasley indicated. "I drive a school bus and some of those roads are so bad you are fording water for a mile at a time," he said.

The Sedgwick County sheriff's office dispatcher said today that no major accidents due to the heavy rains had been reported in the county. No accidents of any nature had been reported, he said.

WATER WAS REPORTED standing on a half-mile stretch of K96 highway between Wichita and Hutchinson north of Andale.

eriff's dispatcher said K96 traf fic had been rerouted from the old K96, which bypasses Andale, to the new road between Colwich and Mount Hope as a

"The new road is higher and drier," he said. "It was simply thought that it would be a lot safer if traffic used the new road."

Beacon Story Ignites Ray Trial Controversy

A front-page story in the Wichita Beacon on Sept. 12 has become the center of a controversy in Memphis, Tenn., over public statements made by the defense and prosecution in the case of James Earl Ray, accused assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King.

The Beacon story quoted FBI fingerprint expert George Bonebrake, the agent who identified Ray at an extradition hearing in London last summer, as saying: "There is no doubt in my mind that he (Ray) at least handled the murder weapon.

IN A STORY TODAY in the Memphis, Tenn., Commercial Appeal, Ray's attorney, Arthur J. Hanes, charged that a court order restricting pre-trial publicity in the case, "protects the prosecution and only muzzles defense.'

Hanes cited specifically The Beacon interview story here with Bonebrake as an example of prosecution witnesses who have made public statements "convicting my client and we have had no chance to counter them."

On Sept. 30, Hanes, private detective Renfro Hays, hired by the defense, and two Memphis reporters, Roy Hamilton of the Memphis Press — Scimitar and Charles Edmundson of the Commercial Appeal were cited for contempt of court for trial-related statements made outside

of court. W. Preston Battle, criminal court judge in Tennessee's Shelby County,

issued the contempt citations. The contempt findings came after complaints Hanes and Hays had voiced about the unusually strict guard placed

on Ray. The two newsmen reported the complaints in their Memphis papers. Hanes had complained the strict security surrounding his client had

Space Age Cooking, Plumbing Shown

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Bearded, rested and feeling better, the Apollo 7 astronauts presented a televised lesson in space age cooking and plumbing on the Wally, Walt and Donn show today and then sped on toward the halfway point of their marathon space

As they swept into their sixth day in orbit, their space chariot was performing so well that plans were being firmed to send three men around the moon Christmas Day.

FOR THE THIRD straight morning, the tediousness of the flight was broken by the daily television. The TV show was shortened from 11 minutes to 9 minutes today because of initial reception trouble at a receiving station at Corpus Christi,

The show began as usual with Navy Capt. Walter M. Schirra Jr. holding up the usual introductory sign: "Hello From the Lovely Apollo Room High Atop

previous days, the astronauts were more businesslike as they demonstrated some of the things they do in space.

showed how the astronauts prepare their food as he took a plastic container of breakfast fruit juice and injected cold water in it through a nozzle.

NARRATOR SCHIRRA said that the

Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin arrived to sign with reluctant Czechoslovakia an agreement legalizing the stay of some Russian troops on Czechoslovak territory. threatened Ray's sanity and called the security measures "cruel and unusual punishment."

LAST WEEK, Time Magazine in reporting the conflict between Judge Battle and the four defendants in the contempt action, reported Hanes also had talked to the press about the possibility of Communist conspiracy in the King murder.

The Time report said that Judge Battle had found no violation of Ray's rights had described the security precautions as "reasonable."

The judge further stated that out-of-court suggestions that Ray's sanity may be in danger were "extremely prejudicial and constitute a clear and present danger" to picking an impartial jury and holding a fair trial.

In issuing the contempt citation, Battle found statements by Hanes and Havs and the subsequent news stories by the two reporters were violation of his order prohibiting any prejudicial out-of-court discussions of the case.

IN TODAY'S STORY in the Memphis Commercial Appeal, Hanes referred extensively to the interview here with Bonebrake. The FBI expert was here to conduct a seminar on fingerprint identification for local law enforcement

At that time, Bonebrake told a Beacon reporter he had testified at the Ray extradition hearing that "the latent fingerprints we found in Memphis matched those taken of the man arrested in London and that the same prints matched those taken of James Earl Ray while he was at the Missouri penitentiary.

"Therefore, my testimony tended to implicate him in the murder of Dr. King as well as identify him as the fugitive wanted for escaping from the Missouri

BONEBRAKE ALSO STATED that FBI agents had obtained "good" latent prints from a rifle believed used to kill Dr. King, from a telescopic sight on the rifle and from a pair of binoculars all found abandoned near the Memphis crime scene.

In the Commercial Appeal Story, Hanes referred to Bonebrake's statements as an example of how Judge Battle's order limiting pre-trial publicity has different effects on the defense and prosecution.

He added that any effort at successfully limiting the press would have to be at a nation-wide level.

A REPORTER FOR the Commercial Appeal told The Beacon an attempt had been made to contact Bonebrake but the Washington, D.C., FBI office said the fingerprint expert was out of town and could not be reached.

The reporter also said Hanes told him he received a copy of The Beacon story in the mail from an unidentifed sender, apparently from Wichita.

Hanes, a Birmingham, Ala., attorney, is in Memphis continuing his investigation of items of evidence the state is expected to introduce when Ray goes to trial Nov. 12.

The Beacon today attempted to contact Hanes at his Memphis motel for comment on his charges against the court but the attorney could not be

TOP OFFICIALS of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration meanwhile scheduled a meeting later this week to firm up plans for sending Apollo 8 on a swing around the moon in late December.

Two plans are under consideration - a circumlunar flight in which the spacecraft would swing around the moon once or a lunar orbit trip in which the craft would circle the moon 10 times in 24

A target date for the launching was set for Dec. 21. With 31/2 days required to cover the quarter million miles to the moon, that would mean that Apollo 8 commanded by Air Force Col. Frank Borman, will be looping around the moon on Christmas Day.

The Apollo 8 spacecraft already is in place atop a mighty Saturn 5 rocket on a Cape Kennedy launching pad. It originally had been scheduled for an earth orbit flight, but the early excellent performance of Apollo 7 has prompted officials to consider the moon test, a vital step toward a manned lunar landing next

One drawback is that the crew of Borman, Navy Capt. James A. Lovell and Air Force Maj. William A. Anders has had only limited training for a lunar flyaround. Sources said they would undergo extensive training to get ready.

THE DEVELOPMENTS came amid another of the periodic lulls in the ground war, a lull which top U.S. officers in Saigon do not think means the Communist command is de-escalating. But they admit they "can't get the enemy to stick around and fight.'

"It's hard to forecast what they have in mind," said one officer close to Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, commander of

U.S. forces in Vietnam. The U.S. Command's communiques today did not report a single significant ground action between U.S. and Communist troops. South Vietnamese headquarters reported three clashes Tuesday and early today in which a total of 50 Viet Cong or North Vietnamese

One American commander noted: "It's

just like it was before mid-August. There was a lot of speculation then that the enemy had de-escalated." Then the Communist command shattered a two-month lull with a series of sustained attacks on allied bases along the Cambodian border.

SOME U.S. OFFICERS feel the enemy was badly hurt by thousands of allied troops combing the countryside and seizing huge munitions and food stock-piles stashed away for future offensives. Massive air stirkes by B52 bombers may be another reason for the enemy's disinclination to fight.

In the 3rd Corps region between Saigon and the Cambodian border, three main force North Vietnamese divisions "just seem to have disappeared into the woodwork," said one officer.

'There is no indication why or what they'll do now," he said. "It is extremely frustrating. We're just not getting many prisoners. We can't get the enemy to HOW? Just follow stick around and fight."

The bulk of the North Vietnamese 7th and 9th Divisions are reported to have pulled back to bases inside Cambodia Intelligence indicates the enemy's 5th Division is in War Zone C, the long-time Communist territory 50 miles northwest of Saigon. 



Today's Highlights

War Casualties **Decline Sharply**

American, South Vietnamese and enemy casualties all dropped sharply last week, back to the level that prevailed during the prolonged lull in ground fighting in July and early August. The U.S. Command said 195 Americans were killed in action and 1,400 were wounded, with 681 of the latter hospitalized. These figures were about half those for the previous week. The U.S. Command reported 1,664 of the enemy were killed last week, also less than half the enemy losses reported for the previous week. South Vietnamese casualties were 325 killed, 1,081 wounded and 60 missing, also a marked drop. The week's figures brought total American casualties reported for the war to 27,704 killed, 91,263 wounded and hospitalized and 81,926 wounded and treated in the field. The total enemy dead reported since Jan. 1, 1961, is 392,585, the U.S. Command said.

Tshombe May Be Freed Soon

African chiefs of state gathered in the Algerian capital amid growing indications that Algeria will soon release former Congolese Premier Moise Tshombe and allow him to return to Spain. Qualified sources said the 49-year-old Tshombe would be set free sometime after this fifth summit meeeting of the Organization of African Unity opening here Friday. He has been held at an Algerian army camp since his private plane was hijacked in June, 1967, on a flight between two Spanish on a flight between two Spanners Mediterranean islands. Tshombe is under a death sentence imposed on him in absentia by a Congolese military court for treason and conspiracy against Congo President Joseph D. Mobutu.

Israelis Charge Attacks by Arabs

TEL AVIV, Israel

Israeli and Arab gunners battled with light weapons just south of the Sea of Galilee near Ashdot Yaakov, the army reported. A spokesman claimed fire was opened at 11 a.m. on an Israeli force patrolling around a group of farmers in a field. An hour later, an Israeli halftrack was attacked, he said. Fire was returned in both incidents, which lasted a few minutes each. No casualties were reported.

Low-Yield Nuclear Blast Conducted

A low-yield nuclear test was conducted underground at the Atomic Energy Commission's Nevada test site. It was the 20th weapons-related test to be announced by the commission this year. A low-yield blast has a force of less than 20,000 tons of TNT.

U.S., Japan Agree On Military Bases

U.S. and Japanese military security officials agreed at the close of their two-day meeting that American military bases must remain in Japan to maintain security in this area. The officials said they did not intend to solve any differences on the U.S. base issue. In recent months, leftist demonstrators have demanded that all U.S. bases be cleared



North Korea Claims Skipper Of Pueblo Admits Violations

TOKYO (AP) - North Korea said that the captain of the U.S. intelligencegathering ship Pueblo admitted to foreign newsmen today that his vessel was "deep" inside North Korean waters when it was captured on Jan. 23.

The North Korean Central News Agency said Capt. Lloyd M.*Bucher told the visiting newsmen the Pueblo has "full technical equipment for espionage activities and intruded several times into the territorial waters of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea to commit espionage activities."

It said Bucher made the remarks in answer to questions put to him during a news conference held for foreign newsmen in North Korea for the Communist regime's 20th anniversary celebration. It was the first time any of the American crew had been questioned by foreign newsmen.

TWENTY OF THE Pueblo's 81 other crewmen appeared with Bucher at the news conference, the North Koreans

Bucher reportedly said the ship's crew confessed to their "grave crimes" and asked the North Koreans to "Pardon them and deal with them leniently."

A letter sent to President Johnson in March, which the North Koreans claimed was signed by Bucher and his crew, also

N.Y. Teachers Strike Again After Violence

NEW YORK-A new citywide teachers strike has been set for Friday following threats of violence against instructors in the Ocean Hill-Brownsville section of

Classes began Wednesday for 1.1-million pupils after a two-day strike by the AFL-CIO United Federation of

The union's executive board voted for renewal of the walkout after a melee developed outside Junior High School 271, one of eight schools in the demonstration

"The city should not allow the school system to be run by a mob," said union president Albert Shanker Wednesday.

"The executive board has voted, because our agreement was broken as of 9 a.m. this morning, that 48 hours later the schools will be closed and on strike," Shanker said.

ABOUT 100 TEACHERS were accosted by parents and militants outside JHS 271 as they reported for classroom duty in the predominantly Negro and Puerto Rican area.

Three persons were arrested during the jeering and shoving demonstration. "You're dead" one demonstrator shouted to the teachers. "We know your faces. We'll get you, your families, your children. We'll be where you live.

Shanker said the Ocean Hill-Brownsville governing board violated the job security agreement whereby the two-day strike had been settled.

"Members of the governing board physically blocked teachers from entering schools and the chairman of the governing board told them not to go in," Shanker said.

Rhody McCoy, Negro administrator of the decentralized school district, told newsmen: "What the community has evidenced is a complete and unequivocal position that they don't want the teachers

THE DISMISSAL OF 10 teachers last spring by the governing board touched off the strike Monday of 55,000 UFT

The walkout was settled Tuesday with agreement to reinstate the 10, plus about 200 other teachers who had walked out in

sympathy.

The agreement with the board of that hinding education. stipulated that binding arbitration settle all future disputes and that all teachers previously assigned to the Brooklyn schools project be allowed

to resume their duties. "What good is arbitration if the next morning a teacher is faced with a mob

Another F111 **Jet Crashes** On Test Run

POINT MUGU, Calif. (AP) — A U.S. Navy version of the \$7 million civilians—crashe

d 90 miles off the California coast Wednesday. It was the second Navy F111B to go down. The Air Force has lost a half dozen of its F111A jets which developed from the controversial TEXprogram.

The SS Mason Like, a civilian ship in the area, reported sighting debris and an oil slick in the Pacific Ocean but no sign of survivors.

The plane was undergoing what the Navy described as a routine weapons test under control of Hughes Aircraft Co. The pilot was identified as Barton Warren and the engineer as Anthony A. Byland, both employes of the Hughes plant at Los

Warren, during radio contact, gave no indication of trouble, authorities said.

A HELICOPTER and other aircraft from the naval base criss-crossed the area until dark and resumed the search

The Navy's version of the F111 is lighter than the Air Force's. It was designed for landing on an aircraft carrier. In both planes, the wings are swung back along the fuselage for supersonic flights.

General Dynamics Corp. of Fort Worth, Tex., was the prime contractor with an order for 493 planes to cost \$1.82 billion. Of these, only 24 were the Navy

The plane which crashed Wednesday took off from this Navy base north of Los

A spokesman for Hughes Aircraft said the company recently fitted the plane with an electrical system to operate the Phoenix missile which will be carried aborad the F111B. The spokesman said the crew was testing the electronic

THE F111 EVOLVED from the tactical fighter experimental program pushed by Robert S. McNamara when he was secretary of defense. McNamara wanted a common basic design for both Navy and Air Force, contending this would save billions through use of many identical parts.

From the start the program, originally known as TFX, was controversial and plagued by troubles.

In 1967, a Navy F111 crashed during a test program on New York's Long Island. Two civilian test pilots were killed.

Three of the Air Force versions, carrying top secret bombing and navigational equipment on Vietnam combat missions out of Thailand, were lost in their first month of combat last

FOUR OTHERS crashed earlier in the United States. The first was Jan. 18, 1967, at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif.; the second Oct. 19, 1967, at Bowie, Tex., the third at Edwards last Jan. 2, and the fourth May 9 in the desert near Las Vegas. One pilot was killed in each of the California and Texas crashes. Two pilots in the Nevada crash ejected the cockpit section like a space capsule and rode a parachute to safety. After the May crash, the Air Force

grounded 42 of its F111s, including five on duty in Thiland, until a defective part could be repaired.

fingerprint identification for area law enforcement agencies. FOLLOWING the assassination of Dr. King, Bonebrake led the search through thousands of fingerprints on file at the Washington, D.C., FBI headquarters for

the identification of the killer. After Ray was arrested earlier this summer in London, England, Bonebrake was the government's star witness in the extradition proceedings that followed. And it was his expert testimony that identified the man being held by Scotland Yard as the fugitive — James Earl Ray. DURING THE PAUSE in the seminar

here Wednesday, Bonebrake, a quiet, unassuming man, discussed the Ray case and others he has been involved in during his 27 years with the FBI.

"My testimony in the extradition hearing was two-fold," Bonebrake said, "since Ray was refusing to admit his true identity. "I was able to testify that the latent prints we found in Memphis matched

those taken of the man arrested in London, and that the same prints matched those taken of James Earl Ray while he was at the Missouri Penitentiary. "Therefore," Bonebrake continued, "My testimony tended to implicate him

escaping from the Missouri prison. BONEBRAKE PICKED up a large chart showing side-by-side blow-ups of two fingerprints. "This one," he pointed to a blurred photo of a fingerprint, "is a latent print, or one which was found at a crime scene. The other is an ink print, one taken from a suspect when he was arrested.

"When I am called to testify in court, I point out to the jury how the two are identical.

"This is what I did in London. I was able to show that the latent prints obtained in Memphis, the ones taken in London and the ones taken of Ray at the Missouri prison were all the same.

BONEBRAKE SAID FBI agents obtained "good" latent prints from a rifle believed used to kill Dr. King, from a telescopic sight on the rifle and from a pair of binoculars found at the scene. "This was a real break for us," he said. "We had several names to go on but we didn't know which one was

"Ray had purchased a car under the name of Gault, bought the rifle under another name and registered at the flophouse in Memphis using the name John Willard "

Once the latent prints were obtained, he said, an exhaustive comparison search was launched of thousands of prints of known offenders and known fugitives.

"This way," Bonebrake added, "We were able to come up with Ray's name and eventually to identify him in

BONEBRAKE SAID he anticipated going to Memphis to testify on the fingerprint identification during Ray's upcoming trial. "There's no doubt in my mind that he

(Ray) at least handled the murder weapon," Bonebrake commented. During the week-long seminar here, Bonebrake is instructing lawmen from

several South Central Kansas police and sheriff's departments on the proper identification of latent prints. The class is designed to teach officers to go to a crime scene and develop the

crime scene or latent prints using

various processes. Wednesday, the law officers compared latent prints found at a prepared crime scene with those of known offenders and established identifications. Today, they were instructed on the means of preparing that evidence for trial. Friday they will present the evidence during a mock trail.

Against Hoffa Face Bribery Probe Vick, whose testimony was credited given him money for expenses incurred

U.S. District Court Judges Frank Grav Jr. and William E. Miller ordered the probe Wednesday as a result of testimony by Walter Sheridan, a former Justice Department investigator.

Sheridan, who was with the Justite Department when the late Sen. Robert I. Kennedy, D-N.Y., was attorney genera testified last month that efforts have been made to bribe Edward Grady Partin, a Baton Rouge, La., teamsters official, and Robert Vick, a former Nashville policeman.

SHERIDAN SAID he had been offered \$1 million to change statements he mad while investigating the Hoffa cast. Sheridan did much of the investigative work which led to Hoffa's 1914 jury-tampering conviction in Chatta-

Hoffa, who is serving an eight-year term at the federal prison in Lewisburg, Pa., was found guilty of tampering with the jury which tried him on a conspiracy charge in Nashville in 1962. The first trial, in which Hoffa was accused of conspiring to divert union funds, ended with a deadlocked jury.

Judges Miller and Gray also ordered the U.S. attorney's office and other federal agencies to launch an investigation into statements made by Sheridan and Earl Wingo, a former official of Nashville Teamsters Local 327 who also testified against Hoffa.

SHERIDAN'S TESTIMONY of a bribe offer came last month during a hearing on a motion to overturn the 31/2-year prison sentence of Z. T. Osborn Jr., Hoffa's Nashville lawyer who also was convicted of jury-tampering.

"During the course of the proceeding," the judges said, "there were statements by at least two witnesses - Walter Sheridan and Earl Wingo - concerning efforts assertedly having occurred in the state of Tennessee, the state of Louisiana and the District of Columbia to bribe and intimidate government witnesses."

Sheridan testified that since Hoffa's 1962 trial, there has been "a concerted intensive effort to intimidate, bribe and corrupt government witnesses and others . . which continues to this day.'

He added, "they actually did bribe several government witnesses in Chat-WINGO TESTIFIED that James

Harding, indentified as a Washington associate of the Teamsters president, said Hoffa had authorized him to offer Vick \$25,000 if Vick would stipulate he was paid to testify.

Osborn lost his attempt to have his conviction overturned. U.S. District Court Judge Marion Boyd of Memphis said he found no evidence that Vick had been paid for his testimony.

During the Osborn hearings, Sheridan said he once had been given \$3,000 by Stephen Smith, a brother-in-law of Kennedy, to lend to Vic. But the investigator



PERSONAL IDENTIFICATION

To obtain classifiable fingerprints:

- 1. Use printer's ink.
- 2. Distribute ink evenly on inking slab.
- 3. Wash and dry fingers thoroughly.
- 4. Roll fingers from nail to nail, and avoid allowing fingers to slip.
- 5. Be sure impressions are recorded in correct order.
- 6. If an amputation or deformity makes it impossible to print a finger, make a notation to that effect in the individual finger block.
- 7. If some physical condition makes it impossible to obtain perfect impressions, submit the best that can be obtained with a memo stapled to the card explaining the circumstances.
- 8. Examine the completed prints to see if they can be classified, bearing in mind the following:

 Most fingerprints fall into the patterns shown below (other patterns occur infrequently and are not shown here):





The Greatest Police Fraud Ever

THE JAMES EARL RAY HOAX

Once again, the world is being fooled, deliberately and grossly about the true background of a sensational murder and the real identity of the killer. And again - as in the closely related Kennedy Murder Fraud - the deception is wrought by the investigating authorities themselves.

Everything you have read in the papers about the way James Earl Ray allegedly escaped from prison, how he killed Dr. Martin Luther King, how he was identified as the slayer and how he was finally hunted down as a result of "crack international detective work" is false and fraudulent. The whole story is a hoax concected by the FBI and executed with the help of other police authorities at home and abroad for the purpose of diverting attention from and shielding the real murderer of Dr. King, whose identity and whereabouts are well-known to the FBI.

Every aspect of this official fraud is thoroughly explored, and the whole gigantic Swindle is ruthlessly exposed in the present report by

JOACHIM JOESTEN

the first of the Warren Report critics and the only writer who carried his exposure of the Kennedy Murder Fraud through to its bitter end. The report is based on a painstaking private investigation undertaken with the help of devoted friends in the USA, Canada, Britain and other countries concerned. Here are some of its highlights:

- l The assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was planned by a group of Southern politicians and businessmen affiliated with the Ku Klux Klan, the Minutemen and George Wallace's American Independent Party. Its purpose was to strike fear into the hearts of the black people and to deprive them of effective leadership.
- 2 New Orleans, where the plot to assassinate President John F Kennedy had been hatched (in part, anyway) was also the focal point of the conspiracy against Dr. King a glaring fact ignored by the FBI and glossed over in the press, for obvious reasons.
- 3 In the early planning stage well over a year before Dr. King was shot at Memphis contact was established between the plotters and James Earl Ray who at the time was still an inmate of the Missouri State Penitentiary. Ray, a convict with a long criminal record. expressed willingness to do any kind of job expected of him for a suitable fee (agreement was reached on the basis of \$ 12.000 to \$ 15,000, according to performance.)
- 4 Ray did not escape from prison; he was surreptitiously let out with the consent of the Warden who went so far as to circulate to police authorities a false set of lingerprints designed to foil any chance ecapture of the "fugitive."

- And was never considered for the uniper's part After more than 13 years spent in prison, he would have been totally incapable of killing a man, at a distance of 205 feet, with a single well-placed rifle shot. Rather, his role was to be that of a decoy with instructions to plant false evidence, scatter about misleading clues and lay a false trail of flight in order to throw off potential pursuers of the real sniper. Unbeknown to him, of course, Ray had also been picked by the plotters as an ideal fall guy for there is no more defenseless human being than an escaped convictafter he had given his performance as a decoy. It was the old Oswald story all over again, with slight variations.
- 6 A key element of the stratagem was to create a fictitious double personality shared by Ray and his accomplice, the real sniper. They were men of similar appearance who studiously enhanced their likeness in looks, dress, speechand behavior and carefully coordinated their activities. They drove exactly the same make and model of cars, used the same driver's license (one the original, the other a duplicate) and, in the final stage of their adventure, traveled abroad on two copies of the same false passport.
- 7 Dr. King was not shot from Mrs. Bessie Brewer's flophouse window; instead, the fatal shot came from a Memphis replica of the famous grassy knoll of Dallas.
- 8 After the shooting, Ray and his confederate, the real assassin, took off almost simultaneously in identical white Mustangs, but in different directions. While Ray drove to Atlanta, for his final performance as a decoy, the assassin headed for Milwaukee, for a reunion with his girl friend.
- 9 The two men met again, shortly later, in Toronto where they shed their previous joint personality (Eric Starvo Galt) and adopted a new one (Ramon George Sneyd). With the help of the CIA, which had previously used the good services of Eric S. Galt (the real killer, not Ray) one passport in that name was obtained in Forente and another shortly later in Lisbon.
- 10 Early in the game, the FBI found out that there were two Eric Starvo Galts and that one of them was the escaped convict James Earl Ray. But when they learned the identity of the other a veteran CIA operative who had also participated in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy-they were appalled. This man was taboo; he enjoyed protection at the highest level. He could not be arrested, much less brought to trial, lest the truth about the Kennedy Murder Fraud come out into the open.
- ll So the tracks now were further blurred with the active help of the FBI, which gave chase only to Ray while siding his alter ego, the real assassin, to hide abroad. Fanisatic? Maybe, but also the truth.
- 12 The crowning glory of it all, however, was the almost simultaneous arrest of both Sneyds at Loncon Airport on June 8, 1968, the first at 6:30 a.m. by design and the second at 11:15 a.m. by accident, one arriving by plane from Lisbon and the other attempting to leave London on a Brussels-bound plane.
- 13 Now Scotland Yard was in a real quandary, for the last thing the FBI wanted was to have two Sneyds delivered into its hands. So the two police agencies connived to hush up the truth about the double arrest and pretend that only one man Ray had been caught.

14 - Then, after a cynically rigged extradition hearing in Bow Street Court, London, the hapless ex-convict was bundled off to the United States to stand trial in Memphis for the murder of Dr. King, although all participants in this macabre police farce are well aware that Ray did not kill the Negro leader.

15 - Meanwhile, the real assassin had been quietly spirited away to a foreign haven where he is to await his next assignment under the protection of the CIA.

MISSOURI STATE PENITENTIARY

Regulations on Visits, Correspondence, Funds, and Packages (Revised November 10, 1966)

VISITS

- 1. Inmates must request visiting passes -- not the visitors.
- 2. Visits are not permitted until inmates are assigned to one of the institutions from the Reception-Diagnostic Center (a period of about one month).
- 3. Visitors must have passes and valid identification. Passes are not transferable.
- 4. Visits are permitted daily, except Monday, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Each inmate is permitted four visits per month.
- 5. No more than two adults and one minor, or one adult and two minors, may visit an inmate at one time. Minors must be supervised properly.
- 6. Visitors may visit only one inmate, except in cases of full brothers or father-and-son relationships.
- 7. When the visiting room is crowded, the number of visitors may be limited, according to the degree of relationship.
- 8. Visits in the hospital are limited to two close, adult relatives, and shall not exceed one hour.
- 9. Proposed visitors with criminal records must include this information on the visitors' questionnaire. Decisions will be based on individual cases.
- 10. Visitors shall not bring packages or other articles into the institution.
- 11. Family lunches may be taken to the farms or Fordland, but are subject to inspection.
- 12. Visits to the Fordland Honor Camp are limited to Saturdays and Sundays, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.
- 13. Any visit may be denied on the basis of conduct, use of alcohol, language, improper dress, etc.

CORRESPONDENCE

- 1. (a) Mail to inmates at the Penitentiary and the farms must be addressed to the inmate by name and number, Box 900, Jefferson City, Missouri 65101.
 - (b) Mail to Fordland Honor Camp must be by name and number, Box 146, Fordland, Missouri 65652.
- 2. Inmates may write two letters per week to approved correspondents.
- 3. Letters to inmates shall contain no more than two pages of regular size, written on only one side of each page. The envelope must carry full name and return address.
- 4. Only approved correspondents may write to inmates.

FUNDS

Do Not send personal checks or cash to inmates. Send only Postal Money Orders, express or cashiers' checks, made payable to: "Treasurer, Missouri State Penitentiary". Address the envelope to the inmate and carry your complete return address on it.

- 1. Packages may not be mailed to inmates except on special occasions. You will be informed by the inmates when these special occasions occur.
- 2. Magazines and newspapers must be mailed directly from the publishers to the inmates.
