Ray's suit said he had

entered into a contract with Huie and Hanes to write a book about the assassination three days after he was arrested in London on July 8, 1968.

The suit said Hanes and Huie had "used their positions of trust to impose these contracts on Ray against his will."

Under the agreement, Huie would write the book and Hanes and Ray would each get 30% of the gross receipts from its sale.

Ray fired Hanes later and hired Foreman as his attorney. A new contract was drawn up Jan. 29, 1969, in which it was stated Hanes would relinquish all his rights under the old contract.

On Feb. 3, 1969, Ray signed another agreement in which he assigned any profits he might make from sale of the book to Foreman as pay for his legal services.

Ray later became disenchanted with the contracts, according to his suit, and asked a Tennessee topeals court to void

Ray's talk with reporter Willard Yarbrough of the Knoxville News-Sentinel, published Friday, was the first interview he had granted since his conviction

"I decided to trust you so that I could let people outside know that I wasn't crazy," Ray said. "Some people have thought so, since I always hide when the press comes around."

Ray is housed in a minimum security section of this maximum security prison, a cellblock where inmates have free access to the corridor and can visit other cells to play cards or talk or watch television.

"Once a day I get outside the cellblock and to the gymnasium for exercise, I do this soon after arising around 5:30 a.m.," Ray said.

"I write memos to my lawyer in Washington. He was down to see me about appeals of my conviction two weeks ago.

"I'm in bed and asleep by 8 every night," he said. "I must sack in early because I'm up at 5:30 a.m. next day, and when I finish working and exercising I'm beat."

Officers agree Ray is a "model prisoner," causing no trouble. At 42, he weighs about 175 pounds. He has gained trouble to pounds since being trans-

lecred a year ago trom the math penitentiary at Nashville.

He says he has no fear of bodily harm from fellow prisoners, even the blacks.

"Prisoners here, white or black, aren't concerned about such things," Ray said. "All of us are concerned about day-to day existence and perhaps the day when we won't be locked up anymore."



King Slayer's Appeal Rejected

James Earl Ray's bid to overturn his guilty plea in the slaying of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. was rejected Monday by the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The court said Ray's contention that he anticipated a reopening of his case "is at best highly implausible."

"It is more likely that he simply reasoned that a shrewd attorney might find a way to overturn his conviction regardless of the voluntariness of the plea," the court said in rejecting Ray's appeal for a new trial.

One of Ray's attorneys, Robert 1. Livingston, said he will ask the U.S. Supreme Court to review the appeal.

The unanimous detection concluded that U.S. District Judge Robert B. McRae of Memphis, Tenn., was correct in February 1975 when he refused an appeal after a hearing on the events that led to Ray's March 10, 1969, guilty plea in Shelby County, Tenn.

Ray is serving a 99-year

prison term.

Another of Ray's attorneys, James H. Lesar, contended that Ray did not fay, ly shoot King in Memph Tenn., on April 4, 1968. Les' argued that former defensationney Percy Forema coerced Ray into a guilty ple and that Ray had been framed. However, Lesar said he had no information about who actually shot King.

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — The widow of Martin Luther King said Thursday that King's assassination apparently was caused by a government conspiracy and that investigations into his slaying should be reopened.

"I don't have the facts but at this stage I say it appears there was a conspiracy in the death of my husband,"

Coretta King said.

"The way he was documented and followed around by Hoover and the CIA when he was abroad, it would have to have been attached to the forces of our government that felt he was a threat to the system as it existed."

She referred to the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency and to the late PBI chief J. Edgar Hoover.

Mrs. King, on a three-nation African tour, arrived in Nairobi on Wednesday. She was interviewed before a meeting with Kenyan women leaders arranged by the U.S. Information Service.

Reopening of King Inquiry Studied by Justice Dept.

WASHINGTON—Atty. Gen. Ed ward H. Levi, citing the FBI's harassment campaign against Dr. Mar tin Luther King, has ordered two Department of Justice divisions to recheck the investigation of the King slaying to see if it should be reopened.

Levi, interviewed by members of The Times' Washington bureau, said Wednesday that he wanted to know whether the results of the FBI program "might have had any influence or effect on the assassination—and I thought that ought to be looked at."

"I have asked not only the Civil Rights Division, which originally investigated the King assassination, but also as a double check I've asked the Criminal Division to reinvestigate," Levi said.

The attorney general's comment came in response to a question about the disclosure that shortly before King's death FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover had approved a secret FBI attempt to discredit the civil rights leader by pointing out that he had stayed at a white-owned motel while leading a predominantly black garbage strike in Memphis.

"I don't think circumstances were such that microphones could be used without at least the subsequent approval of the attorney general," Levi said

Justice Aide to Ask New Study of Dr. King's Slaying

WASHINGTON—The Department of Justice's civil rights division will recommend next week that Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi appoint a committee from outside the government to study the 1968 assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, according to informed sources.

The sources said the recommendation by Asst. Atty. Gen. J. Stanley Pottinger would argue that an independent inquiry was necessary even though a four-month review of the King case by the department found no evidence that the FBI or other government agencies were involved in the killing of the black civil rights leader.

Suspicions have been raised about the initial government investigation of the murder because of recent disclosures that the FBI subjected King to wiretapping and harassment. Questions also have been raised about whether the motives and activities of the convicted assassin, James Earl Ray, have been fully explained.

For those reasons, the sources said, Pottinger believes that an independent inquiry is necessary to resolve the questions still surrounding the April 4, 1968, shooting of King in Memphis.

The inquiry would determine whether a full-scale investigation of the assassination should be resumed. The sources said Pottinger's report would recommend that for reasons of credibility the study should be conducted by persons independent of the Department of Justice, which has policy control over the FBI.

Pottinger will recommend that the committee of inquiry look into such questions as whether there was any FBI complicity in King's death, whether the FBI violated laws or policy guidelines in its dealings with King and whether any other conspiracy outside of government was connected to the murder, the sources

WASHINGTON — Justice Department lawyers have found no evidence of FBI involvement in the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and are satisfied that the FBI's investigation of King's death was handled "thoroughly and efficiently." according to informed sources.

The assessment was based on a nearly-completed review of the FBI's voluminous file on the black civil rights leader.

The findings and, possibly, recommendation of a full-scale probe of the FBI's harassment campaign against King are expected to be turned over to Attorney General Edward H. Levi by

early next week.

Levi ordered the inquiry last November after the Senate Intelligence Committee learned that the FBI had sought to destroy King as a leader of the black rights movement.

Levi said he wanted to determine if the harassment campaign had been related in any way to the assassination of King or to the outcome of the BI's investigation of the slaying.

A number of black leaders have charged that the disclosures of efforts to discredit and harass King supported their theory that the April, 1968, assassination was part of a conspiracy that possibly involved the FBI.

But one source familiar with the scope of the inquiry said "every possible lead, allegation and rumor" had been tracked down and there was nothing to suggest that James Earl Ray 11d not work alone.

Ray said that Foreman and another former attorney, Arthur Hanes Sr. of Birmingham, Ala., were more interested in royalties they were assigned from a book and articles written by author William Bradford Huie than in preparing his defense.

But McRae rejected Ray's arguments and accepted instead the state's contention that Ray had made a rea-

soned and reasonable decision to accept a 99-year sentence rather than risk the death penalty by going to trial.

"Although the circumstances (surrounding the guilty plea) include conduct on the part of Ray's retained attorneys that should have been performed differently," McRae said, "the total circumstances do not reflect a violation of the constitutional rights applicable to one who voluntarily pleaded guilty on the advice of competent counsel of his own choosing."

McRae also rejected the accusation that Foreman had

coerced him into pleading guilty.

"On the contrary, the matter was discussed on numerous separate occasions over almost one month, at the least," the judge said. "Ray carefully considered and partially amended the lengthy stipulation of facts that formed the basis for accepting his guilty plea, and Ray coolly and deliberately entered the plea in an open court where he spoke to correct the record as he thought appropriate."

Ray is serving his sentence at the main Tennesse prison in Nashville and was not present for McRae's ruling, but

his attorneys said they would appeal.

King, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize for his civil rights work, was slain as he stood on the balcony of a motel in Memphis on April 4, 1968, to help sanitation workers chiring a strike.

MEMPHIS (AP) - Fifteen minutes before Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated, the only witness to place James Earl Ray near the slaying was so drunk he couldn't stand up, a cab driver testified Wednes-Gay.

James McGraw, the cab driver, gave the testimony on the second day of a federal court hearing on Ray's efforts to withdraw his guilty plea to the King slaying and gain a new trial for murder.

McGraw said he was called to a rooming house across the street from the motel where King was shot April 4, 1968 to pick up Charles Quitman Stephens and found Stephens drunk in an upstairs room.

"He was laying on the bed and couldn't get up." McGraw said.

Stephens told officers he saw Ray running from an upstairs bathroom in the rooming house. from where officers theorize King was shot.

Earlier Wednesday, Ray was quoted by the doctor who treated him during his stay in the Shelby County jail as saying he wasn't alone in the King death.

Stanton, whose father was public defender after Ray's 1968 arrest in London, now is district attorney. He and De-Mere testified before Judge Robert M. McRae Jr. of U.S. District Court.

Explaining why he thought Ray's defense was weak, Stanton cited Ray's fingerprints on the murder weapon, Ray's presence in Memphis at the time and the discovery of his overnight bag at the scene of the shooting.

But Stanton said he was preparing a defense for Ray until he pleaded guilty. "I was amazed and astounded" at the plea, Stanton said.

Ray claims his private attorney, Percy Foreman of Houston, Tex., coerced him to enter the plea and that none of his former attorneys developed a supportable defense for him.

Stanton said that several documents collected by defense investigators could have been used in support of Ray's innocence, including statements by witnesses disputing the site from which the fatal shot came.

Authorities have discounted the possibility of a conspiracy in King's death, claiming Ray acted alone. But Ray and his attorneys are contending that he was innocent of the shooting and was the dupe of a conspiracy carried out by others.

Robert L. Livingston said Friday he was told about such an assassination plot by an intermediary for the two alleged gunmen. He quoted the intermediary as saying one of the gunmen was the actual triggerman in the April 4, 1968, death of King in Memphis.

Livingston is one of several lawyers for Ray, who is serving a 99-year prison sentence and in January was granted a hearing by the U.S. 6th Court of Appeals on a petition to withdrawhis guilty plea in King's assassination. The case is before the U.S. Supreme Court on appeal by the state.

Both Shelby County Dist. Atty. Hugh Stanton and Asst. State Atty. Gen. Henry Haile said they were skeptical about Livingston's story. Haile added, however, "If there is something to it, and we have is take that possibility regulate, then Livingston could really have something."

Attorney Robert Livingston says that, doring the past room months, he has talked over the telephone and met face to face with an "intermediary" with detailed inside information on king's assassination.

Livings on states that this unidentified go between claimed to represent, we will ment the actual shooting of Dr. King. According to Livingston, one of the two men represented by the intermediary is said to be the "triggerman" who gunned down Dr. King in Memphis in April of 1968.

The intermediary, according to Livingston, has said that there were four "wealthy and prominent Americans," both black and white, who planned and financed Dr. King's murder. Livingston said that the intermediary has offered to produce the alleged triggerman and his partner if they are given complete immunity from prosecution by state and federal officials.

In return, says Livingston, the two men are quoted as promising to identify the four wealthy backers who were behind King's assassination.

James Earl Ray, who was convicted in 1969 of killing Dr. King, has insisted for the past five years that he was the "fall guy" in a larger conspiracy. Ray is currently fighting for a new trial in an effort to reopen the case.

Livingston says that the two men who are allegedly ready to talk are reported to have had a falling out with their financial backers, and are willing to name them in return for their trestom:

Judge Retuses To Order Ray Out Of Solitary

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — Convicted assassin James Earl Ray must remain in solitary confinement as long as the state wishes him to, a federal judge ruled Monday.

U.S. District Judge L. Clure Morton turned down Ray's request that he be allowed to mingle with other prisoners or have access to the prison library.

Ray claims he is suffering physical and mental deterioration from lack of exercise and human contact in the state peintentiary where he is serving a 99-year sentence for killing civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr.

Morton said that Ray's two escape attempts while he was allowed to associate with inmates at Brushy Mountain State Prison underlines the need for administrative segregation.

Ray Granted Review of Plea in King Slaying

CINCINNATI, Ohio the James Earl Ray was given a chance Tuesday to contest his guilty plea in the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King because of allegations that his attorneys had compromised his interests for personal profit.

The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that Ray, 41, who received a 99-year sentence for the 1968 killing of the civil rights leader, was entitled to a hearing to contest his 1969 guilty plea.

In a 2-1 decision, the court sent Ray's petition back to the U.S. District Court in Nashville for review.

Ray alleged that he had been poorly advised by attorney Arthur Hanes and by Percy Foreman after he had fired Hanes. He alleged that each had been more interested in funds that would accrue from articles and books planned by Alabama author William Bradford Huie than in his defense.

Ray said the lawyers considered his guilty plea paramount to the financial success of the articles and a possible movie on the case.

The court cited two latters written to Ber by Forense Barber letter said Ray be signed all royalties over to Forenan and that Forenan would keep all money up to \$165,000. It said also that Ray would get all royalties above that figure if he pleaded guilty and caused no embarrassing circumstances in the courtroom.

The second letter said Foreman would give \$500 to Ray's brother, Jerry, "contingent upon the plea of guilty and sentence going through on March 10, 1969, without any unseemly conduct on your part in court."

The court said that only by giving Ray a hearing on his contentions "may it be determined whether the plea was intelligent or voluntary or entered as the result of coercion, threats and promises."

"The allegations . . . if true, would support a finding that Ray's attorneys deliberately compromised their client's interests in order to further the financial success of Huie's works, in which they themselves had a substantial interest."

The appeals court noted that the original trial judge had thoroughly questioned Ray about his plea, including whether it was voluntary.

But it said, "It is clear that the allegations which are the subject of Ray's petition have never been tried upon their merits or resolved by any court—allegations which, if true, plainly negate any notion or idea that his guilty plea and answers ... were made voluntarily and intentionally.

"... No inquiry was made into the specific contentions that are now before this court."

The majority opinion was written by Judge William E. Miller and concurred in by Judge Harry Phillips.

Judge Anthony J. Celebrazze wrote a dissenting opinion, saying Ray had had every chance to tell the trial judge that his plea was not voluntary if that was the case.
