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

We certify that this is a report of psychiatric exemination pursuant to the provinces of Section 552.020 RNo 1963, as ordered by the Circuit Court of Cole County, Cause No. 6303, in the case of JAME EAM, RAY, a 38 year old, single, Cause isn male, who was admitted to Fulton State Respital on 8 September 1966.

I. PERTINENT HISTORY

Reason for Admission: Pre-trial exercisation pursuant to Section 552.020 by Circuit Court Order of Cole County alloged to be charged with the crime of attempted eccape.

Legal Status: Subject was transferred to this hospital for pre-trial evaluation from the Missouri State Penitentiary, where he was serving a sentence of twenty years, having been convicted of the crimes of first degree robbery and two charges of operating a motor vehicle without the permission of the owner. In addition to the sentence, he is serving, he now has a charge against him of attempted escape.

Pertinent Social History: According to ac empanying information received from the Missouri State Penitentiary, at or about 9:00 p.m. on 11 March 1966, the subject attempted to escape and actually had hidden out inside the penitentiary walls until: was discovered at approximately 12:10 a.m. on 13 March 1966 attempting to make his way to the roof from which he apparently planned to scale the prison wall. He had placed a dumny in his bed to cover up for his absence at the 9:00 .m. count on 11 March and had taken a 14 foot from rod with a metal hock on the end with which he was able to scale several flot of one of the walls incide the ponitentiary. He had cut a hole through a security screen on a window and had been hidding out from search parties on various areas of the roof.

I. PHYSICAL STATUS

Laboratory Data: 9 Sep 66: Urinalysis essentially negative. Heratology within normal limits. Serum broades negative. Blood oughr and blood urea nitrogen were within normal limits. VDNL nonreactive. 13 Sep 66: Chest x-ray reported as negative.

II. MINTAL STATUS

Orientation: He is oriented for time, place and person.

Pemory: His memory is unimpaired for both recent and remote events.

Speach and Hental Activity: He is coherent, alert, relevant and there are

no hallucinations or delusions.

Mood and Affect: He appeared to be somewhat tense and auxious and at times

showed some mild depression but not of psychotic proportions.

Insight and Judgment: He has a good verbal associament of reality but in the

past he has used poor judgment.

Psychological Testing: Psychological tests indicate that he has an IQ of 105 which places him within the average range of intellectual functioning. Fasts also showed some degree of degrees on. IV. COURSE IN HOSPITAL

He has made a good hospital adjustment and has not been a management problem.

Socionathic Personality, Antisocial Type with anxiety and depressive features.

VII. DISCUSSION

Patient has been observed, studied and tested. No symptoms or signs indicating a mental discuss or defect could be found. Although he showed signs of amxiety and depreciate, these could not be considered of psychotic proportions.

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

MISSOURI L. ATE PENITENTIARY FOR MEN — I. JULATIONS

VISITING: No visit will be authorized until the inmate has been assigned from the Reception-Diagnostic Center to the institution and has made the proper request for the issuance of a visitor's pass to his prospective visitors. All visitors must possess a visitor's pass issued from the institution. Identification will be required. The pass is valid only for the person whose name appears on the pass. Visits at the institution are permitted every day except Monday, between 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. Men assigned to the Sawmill Farm are permitted visits only on Saturdays and Sundays. Their visitor must notify the institution for 24 hours in advance of the intended visit. Children of inmates may be permitted, if conditions permit. Nieces and Nephews may be denied due to the limited visiting facilities. Men are permitted four (4) visits per month. Visits in the hospital are limited to Mother, father or wife, the length of the visit dependent on the condition of the inmate. No article will be brought into the institution. On the farms a family lunch may be prepared, subject to inspection. No one having served a sentence in a correctional institution will be permitted to visit. Anyone having the odor of an alcoholic beverage on their breath will be denied a visit. Visiting passes are issued at the request of the inmate. Do not write for a visiting pass.

CORRESPONDENCE: All correspondence for men whose assignment is in any way connected with the State Penitentiary must be addressed giving the man's name, register number, Box 900, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65102. This affects men who may be assigned to the Sawmill Farm, Renz Farm, Church Farm, Fordland Honor Camp or any other outside unit as well as men at the main institution. The inmates are permitted to write two letters per week. Improperly addressed mall will be returned to the sender. Incoming letters shall not exceed two (2) pages of paper not exceeding the normal $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ inches, and shall not be written on but one side. Only approved correspondents will be permitted to receive letters from the inmate. Enclosures in the letter will prohibit its delivery—news clippings, etc.

MONEY: All money sent an inmate must be in the form of a postal money order, express or cashier's check made payable to the Treasurer, Missouri State Penitentiary. The order is to be placed in an envelope addressed to the inmate. All money orders must bear the name and address of the sender or they will not be credited to the inmate. Personal Checks and Cash will not be accepted. Money will only be accepted from members of the inmates family, exceptions to this ruling must be approved by the Warden.

PACKAGES: No package will be received at the institution. Occasionally the men will be permitted to receive various items, however, notice of this authorization will be transmitted from the institution. Items which are normal necessities are available in the inmate's canteen for purchase by the inmate. Local newspapers must come direct from the publisher to the inmate. All magazines must first be approved by the Associate Wardens Custody or Treatment. No item will be accepted from the home.

ALL ITEMS received at the institution are subject to the approval of the Warden or the Associate Wardens—Custody and Treatment.

FORDLAND HONOR CAMP: All regulations listed apply to this unit. Visits for the Honor Camp are conducted only on Saturdays and Sundays. Mall for men assigned to this unit must be posted Box 900, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.

Do not attempt to visit any man at the institution unless you have a pass
