United States District Judge ROBERT M. McRAE, JR., Memphis, Tenn., made the original items described above available to the Memphis Office, January 2, 1970. Judge McRAE stated that obviously these communications were directed to him as a result of newspaper publicity about his having ruled against JAMES EARL RAY in RAY's suit seeking to void a series of contracts between JAMES EARL RAY and his former attorneys and to forbid publication of certain information in connection with the slaying of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING. Judge McRAE gave this ruling in U. S. District Court, Memphis, Tenn., 12/1/69.

Judge McRAE stated he realizes that the contents of the two communications in question do not constitute a violation of any Federal Law and that these communications do not contain threats to do bodily harm. He stated that these communications have been handled by numerous friends and that he wanted to make these communications available to the FBI in view of the fact that perhaps the same anonymous person may have written similar communications to other people connected in some way with this case. Judge McRAE was also of the opinion that the FBI perhaps maintained a file on such anonymous communications. Judge McRAE stated he would abide by any decision the FBI makes in connection with action to be taken on these letters. In summary, he stated his reason for referring the letters to the FBI is merely informative and that he does not desire to know the results of any possible action taken.

Enclosed herewith for the Bureau are sample handwritings of VICTORIA CRAIG, aka "Yankee". The writing is being forwarded to the Laboratory because of the similarity in handwriting in referenced letter and the handwriting of VICTORIA CRAIG.

VICTORIA CRAIG, 4644 Strahle Street, Pennypack Gardens, Pa., is employed at the Western Savings Fund Society, Broad and Chestnut Streets, Philadelphia. Mrs. CRAIG was first contacted by this office on March 29, 1986, when the name VICTORIA CRAIG, 4644 Strable Street, Pennypack Gardens, Philadelphia, Pa., was found in a group of 4°x6° cards maintained in a file card box at "Minutemen" headquarters. At the time she appeared extremely emotionally unstable and claimed she had been a member of various subversive organizations for over 20 years. She said she had been an informant for HERBERT PHILBRICK in these matters.

She said she lived in Arlington, Mass., for most of her life but her husband and she moved to Florida and through some unexplained misfortune they lost their home. She came to Philadelphia about one year before the interview.

At the time of the interview, Mrs. CRAIG carried a large shopping bag with the official letters from prominent personages which included letters from legislatures, RICHARD Cardinal CUSHING of Boston, General WALKER and some letters from "REBEL", whom she identified as HERBERT PHILBRICK.

By letter dated 7/21/65, the Boston Office indicated that Mrs. CRAIG was a notorious letter writer who made generalized allegations of government mishandling and the Communist menace. According to this letter, she is known to use exaggeration, diatribe, and vituperation in her correspondence.

At the time of the interview, Mrs. CRAIG insisted she loved her country and burst into tears at the thought she was being investigated. She insisted the Minutemen were extremely loyal people and that she knew absolutely nothing which she felt might be dangerous in them. Since that time Mrs. CRAIG has forwarded to the Philadelphia Office numerous pamphlets put out by resistance type groups and Quaker groups concerning anti Vietnam war activities. Philadelphia Office accepts information from her but she has never been directed in any way to help the Philadelphia Office.

The Laboratory is requested to compare the hand-writing of Mrs. CRAIG with sample handwritings furnished by Memphis. If the Laboratory so desires, they can keep the samples for their records as they need not be returned to Philadelphia.

If you love your husband Mrs. Evans and chidren youll for get what you seen and head. Otherwise they will get what Kennedy got! (I don't get much of a chance to read newspapers until yesterday. Then I had seen this man's picture in the paper, named James Earl Ray. : I remembered the man's face in the restaurant. This same man now in the newspaper is one of the 3 men which planned to shoot all 3 men.

- " I have a very good memmoire Warden. This man was in San Francisco 3 weeks prior to Nov. 22-63.)
- "I can assure you Warden I am no nut! I have a good memmoire for faces. The second rifle used in Dalas, Tex. is in Nashville, you may turn my letter over to the Police, FBI, or who ever you wish because I'm not a nut. there are 6-men involved in this. One of the 6 men I have just seen now in the paper & thats James Earl Ray. I would like to hear from you.
- "Please keep my address listed unknown because I have gotten threathenig letters and phone calls since Nov. 22-63. Please acknowledge.

Reference is made to letter dated January 16, 1970, forwarded by John A. Parker, Clerk of the Supreme Court, State of Tennessee, enclosing a copy of letter damed January 11, 1970, written by a Mrs. Beverly Jean Evans, 1693 Market Street, San Francisco, California,

It is to be noted that Mrs. Evans alleges she has material indicating that James Earl Ray is not the killer of Dr. Martin Luther King. For your additional information, Warden W. S. Neil, Tennessee State Prison, advised that Mrs. Beverly Jean Evans, 1693 Market Street, San Francisco, California, did write him a letter dated January 1, 1970. Mrs. Evans in her letter to Warden Neil made a statement that a short time prior to the murder of President John F. Kennedy in Dallas, Texas, she did observe three men who were conspiring and later one of the men told her there were six in all who were planning the killing of President Kennedy, his brother Robert Kennedy, and Dr. Martin Luther King. She at this time furnished with her letter a photograph of James Earl Ray which had appeared in a newspaper. She alleged that in 1963, James Earl Ray was one of the people she saw in Dallas, Texas. Prison records, as you are well aware, have established that James Earl Ray was incarcerated in 1963 in the State Prison of Missouri.

Submitted herewith for the Bureau's assistance and completion of its files is LHM setting forth correspondence furnished by one Mrs. BEVERLY JEAN EVANS, 1693 Market Street, San Francisco, California. Based on the information set forth in an initial letter written by Mrs. EVANS to Warden W. S. NEIL, Tennessee State Prison, in which she reports she saw JAMES EARL RAY in Dallas, Texas, in 1963, it is readily apparent that she has no information pertinent to the MURKIN case. As the Bureau is aware, JAMES EARL RAY was confined in the Missouri State Prison from 1960 until his escape in 1967, and it therefore would not have been physically possible for him to have been in Dallas and been seen by Mrs. EVANS as she alleges.

The San Francisco Office should review its indices regarding Mrs. EVANS and conduct a local credit and criminal check, and results furnished the Bureau. No effort should be made by San Francisco to interview Mrs. EVANS, UACB.

District Attorney General PHIL CANALE, Shelby County, Memphis, Tennessee, has been advised separately of the contents of the letter which Mrs. BEVERLY JEAN EVANS forwarded to W. S. NEIL, Warden, Tennessee State Penitentiary.

CRIMINAL HISTORY: Subject indicates that his first arrest was at age 18 for forgery. The FBI Report indicates that the subject has been arrested for investigation, passing checks on a government reconvetion, Byer Act, insufficient funds checks, begus checks, involuntary menslaughter, investigation of forgery, forgery, ex-convict registration, no account checks, no operator's license, and for the present offense which is no account check.

At the time of the present offense the subject was on parole from the state of Nevada.

PRESENT OFFENSE: The subject states that he was having problems with his wife, who left him, taking all of his possessions and acres. Subject states that he had already technically violated his purole from the state of Nevada, and wrote several checks during a 1 week period.

There is no Commitment Report aveilable at this time.

Accomplices: None listed.

Detainers: None at present.

FAMILY: Subject is 29 years old. He was born and raised in Fort Smith, Azkansas under fair economic conditions. The subject indicates that his relationship to his parents and to his sister was not good. A previous psychiatric evaluation describes the subject's father as being very nervous and high strung. The report indicates that subject's father has a mental history in connection withhis military service. The subject's mother was described as being obese and appearing older than her actual age.

EDUCATIONAL: The subject states that he has completed the requirements for his G.E.D. while in the federal institution. He states that he has also taken numerous college hours in engineering and related topics. Diagnostic Center test data indicates that the subject has above average intelligence, above average verbal ability and mechanical comprehension. The S.A.T. score indicates that the subject achieves on an 11.8 grade level. This immate indicates that he intends to continue taking college courses in the field of engineering.

MARITAL: At the age of 17 the subject married a 19-year-old girl whom he had known for 8 or 9 hours. There were no children by this marriage which ended in divorce after 1 month.

At the age of 20 the subject markied a li-year-old girl whom he had known for 1 day. There were no children by this markings which also ended in divorce after 1 month.

At the age of 25 the subject married a 23-year-old woman whom he had known for 3 months before their marriage. There were no children by this union which ended when the subject's wife was killed in an automobile accident.

- At the age of 25 the subject married a 43-year-old woman whom he had known for 3 months. There were no children by this marriage, which after 4 years is about to end in divorce.

The subject indicates that his present wife is the cause for his legal difficulties. He indicates that she is a very troublesome person who also has a criminal record.

MILITARY: The subject has served in the Arkanses National Guard from 1955 to 1956 and received an honorable discharge. He enlisted in the U.S. Air Force in 1956 but was given a minority discharge because he was under age when he enlisted. Subject enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1957 and was reportedly given an inaptitude administrative discharge. Subject states that he struck an officer, appeared before a psychistric board and received a discharge because of his emotional instability.

EMPLOYMENT: Subject states that his first job was as an electronic's assembly helper. He indicates that he has held numerous electrical related positions, worked as a draftsman designer and as a marber of the engineering staff of the Lear Reno Corporation for 2 months.

RELIGION: This inmate indicates that he has attended the Mormon Church on an irregular basis. Subject indicates that he is personally acquainted with high ranking members of that church's organization.

HEALTH: The subject states that in general his health is good. He has an extensive medical history of both psychiatric and physical problems.

This inmate has received numerous psychiatric evaluations. He has been described as an "emotionally unstable personality of long standing". He was diagnosed as "psychopathic parsonality with anotional instability."

This immate was involved in a materacycle accident in which he received injuries to his back, head, leg and jeu. A previous psychiatric evaluation states that the subject has had an "outside tumor." At one time the subject complained of having blackout spalis. During the interview the subject stated that he has often had severe headsches and stated that he has consumed a great deal of alcohol in order to release this pain.

The Disgnostic Center Medical Report indicates that the subject is allergic to antibiotics and that he is fit for duty.

SCCIAL ADJUSTMENT: The subject has a long history of poor social adjustment in the home, school, military and markful superionce. Subject indicates that he drinks to excess when he is depressed.

The subject's academic pursuits while incarcorated appear to be successful. A previous institutional report indicates that subject received superior grades on a college level in such courses as interior decorating, engineering graphics and engineering drawing.

A previous psychistric avaluation ocases that the subject has suffered from much emotional instability, and has done considerable "scring out."

He reportedly had temper Contrume in thich he would often leave home in the widdle of the night, take the family car and drive to a distant town. On various

occasions the subject has threatened to kill the rest of his femily during these Temper tantrums. On I occasion the subject left a suicide note stating that he intended to do away with himself since "no one loved him."

EVALUATION: The subject is 29 years old. He was born and raised in Fort Smith, Arkansas under fair economic conditions. This inmate has above everage intelligence and good mechanical and engineering skills. Subject has had a very stressful and emotionally insecure life. He has made a generally poor social adjustment in spite of his talents.

During the interview the subject presented himself as a nervous individual who on several occarions reminded the interviewer not to insult his intelligence.

The subject has spent epproximately the last 10 years in various institutions. He generally appears to have made a good institutional adjustment. The subject has a slightly overbearing personclity, but is not totally disagreeable. He has been diagnosed as psychopathic personality with exotional instability."

During the interview the subject stated that while he was incarcerated at the Cummings Prison Farm in the state of Arkansas he was in a position of authority and consequently received the blame for several incidents of brutality which took place in that institution. Subject indicates that in H-Hell he has received several threats from immates who knew him from that institution.

SCURCES OF INFORMATION: FBI Report, relative questionnaire, test data, madical report, previous institutional reports, psychiatric evaluations and interview.

RAYMOND LEON YOUNT | Missouri State Penitentiary \$18900, was interviewed at his request at the Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, Missouri.

At the start of the interview YOUNT was shown a six page statement which had been made available by Warden HAROLD SWENSON. YOUNT read this six page statement and stated that he had prepared this statement a few days prior to this interview and the statement was true and correct, however, he did not wish to sign it.

"I, Raymond Leon Yount, 16900, do hereby offer this statement completely freely and voluntarily. I issue this statement without any threats of promises being imposed upon me. The the best of my knowledge, all facts given are true to the best of my memory.

"During the latter part of the month of June, or the first part of July of 1966, I was in Oxford, Mississippi. I state this date to be true as I recall that it was just a very few days from the 4th of July holiday.

"It was here (Oxford) that I met with another young fellow which I had served time with in the FRERO. This man's last name was Bean. I don't think I even knew his first name. He had the nickname of 'Carnie' as he was a previous carnival worker. Evan appeared to be prosperous, well dressed and with funds. I had known Bean since 1961 at this time.

"I registeren in a motel in Oxford. I de not recall the name of the motel unit. It was a two-story structure located approximately 4 blocks north of the main city square of Oxford. The name used here was either Billye R. Sellers for James G. Sellers. This will be on the motel records as I believe a worthless check was left there or else the bill for

"The next day, we together drove to another Mississippi city to get new I.C. cards. I am unable to recall the name of this town but believe that I could re-trace the route on a map. The I.D. I obtained was under the name of Bruce Richard Caldwell, 412 Elm Street, Windsor, Ontario, Canada. This I.D. was received out of a case located in the rear of a printing firm. The odd thing that I noted here was all of the packs of I.D. that we looked through were of Canadian orgin and that they were not counterfeit, rather real, used I.D. cards. There were several packs of I.D. card we looked through to find one that I fitted.

"Note: I was later arrested with this very I.D. on me in Douglas County Nevada. This was on Aug. 13, 1900. I understand that the I.D. cards were returned to an "Inspector" in Windsor.

"Later in the evening of the day which I received the I.D. cards, Bean arranged for us to meet with three men in a motel in the same city. I do recall various things about the location of this motel and the motif of the structure. Bean arranged this meeting by means of a phone call from the printing firm. Obviously it was a local call.

"Upon entry into the motel room the first thing I noticed was the tension about every one present. Drinks were poured and small talk exchanged."

"The three men were well dressed and obviously did not occupy the room full-time as there was no luggage or extra clothes. I would approximate their ages at 28, 35 and 39. I would recognize any of these men if I ever saw them again.

He was a large man, wearing a wine-colored silk jacket.

The young fellow stood in the doorway. As quickly as I was in the car, I turned the key and was gone:

"Somewhere north, approximately 50-75 miles of Jackson I stopped at a service stationed and phoned the F.B.I. office in Jackson Mississippi. I refused to tell the Agent who nor where I was. I only told him that there was a plot to kill Martin Lather King and to keep him out of public in Jackson the next day. The agent tried to hold me on the phone as long as he could. I talked all of 60 seconds. I explained myself clearly. This call should be on file in the Jackson Office. I hung-up the phone and left. I drove on into Jackson, left the car at the sirport and boarded a plane for San Franisco, California."

YOUNT advised that the abbreviation FRERO refers to the Federal Reformatory at El Rono, Oklahoma. YOUNT advised he has never seen a picture of JAMES EARL RAY and he could not say if RAY was present in Oxford, Mississippi, when this matter was discussed in July, of 1966.

YOUNT advised that he has not seen any of these individuals again, however, he told this story to JOHN EMERSON, 412 West Musser Street, Carson, Nevada, a minister who can be contacted at the above address or through 409 South Tacoma Street, Carson, Nevada.

YOUNT stressed that he had cooperated with U. S. Postal authorities in the past at Little Rock, Arkansas, in November, 1965, concerning some stolen money orders.

YOUNT advised that he had not furnished this information until this time because he felt that the assassination had been averted, but now feels that this information should be given to the proper authorities.

YOUNT stated that unknown subject #1 hangs around the Itt'll Do Club in Dallas, Texas, and that he had met this individual prior to their meeting in Oxford, Mississippi, however, he did not mention this meeting to unknown subject #1.

YOUNT also stated that unknown subject #3 could be identified through an unknown individual who broke his arm in May of 1966 and was treated at Charity Hospital, New Orleans, Louisiana. YOUNT stated that this unknown individual is a "barker" on Bourbon Street in New Orleans.

YOUNT stated that unknown subject #1 could be identified by URETHA (phonetic) who is a cocktail waitress at Love Field Cocktail Lounge, Dallas, Texas. YOUNT stated that he was with URETHA at the Itt'll Do Club in Dallas when unknown subject #1 tried to start a fight with him, and URETHA knew unknown subject #1 at that time.

YOUNT also advised that his fourth wife, BILLYE RUTH SELLERS, was with him on a check cashing spree at the time of this meeting in Oxford, Mississippi, in July, 1936. YOUNT stated that perhaps SELLERS is wanted by the FBI in regard to these check writing activities. He stated that SELLERS is also known as BILLYE RUTH YOUNT, and BILLYE RUTH HARRIS, and was employed for a time at 201 West King, Carson, Nevada, with the State of Nevada Insurance Division. YOUNT stated that SELLERS could be contacted through 1027 East Walnut, Springfield, Missouri, or through her children who reside at 1012 Ivy, Cassvialle, Missouri, or DEBORAH KAY SELLERS, a student at Southwest Missouri State College, Springfield, Missouri.

> On 1/26/70 RAYMOND LEON YOUNT, Missouri State Penitentiary #16900 was interviewed at the Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, Missouri. After the interview Warden HAROLD SWENSON, Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, was interviewed by Special Agents ROWEN B. AYERS and KEITH M. HUNTER, at which time he made available a copy of Missouri Department of Corrections report of Division of Classification and Assignment concerning RAYMOND LEON YOUNT.

It is noted that this report states that the subject has an extensive medical history of both psychiatric and physical problems. "This inmate has received numerous psychiatric evaluations. He has been described as an 'emotionally unstable personality of long standing'. He was diagnosed as 'psycopathic personality with emotional instability'."

The report also states that the subject has served in the United States Navy and was given an administrative discharge after appearing before a psychiatric board and receiving a discharge because of emotional instability.

The above is being furnished for information and evaluation by your office. In view of the above, no leads have been set out by the Kansas City Division.
