Enclosed is a clipping from The Oak Ridger newspaper dated 5/3/71, relating an escape attempt by subject.

Subsequent to the publication of this article, contact was made with Warden R. H. MOORE, Brushy Mountain Prison, at which time he furnished the following information:

Warden MOORE stated that he had received information from inside the prison that RAY was going to attempt to escape after "he got a visit". Warden MOORE speculated that "visit" was a code word for outcome of appeal, which appeal was turned down. MOORE advised that RAY attempted his escape as described in the newspaper article taken from The Oak Ridger, Oak Ridge, Tennessee, dated 5/3/71, and that he was accompanied by another inmate by the name of MORELOCK. MOORE stated that MORELOCK had been assigned to inside plumbing, knew the tunnel work and also had access to tools which probably accounted for RAY's choice of MORELOCK as an escape companion.

Warden MOORE was specifically questioned as to whether any outside help had been utilized in attempting to perpetrate RAY's escape and as to the identity of this outside help, if any. He advised that JAMES EARL RAY's brother, name unknown, who was believed to be staying with RAY's lawyer, a Mr. STONE, appeared at Brushy Mountain Prison around 2:00 PM, 5/3/71, and requested to visit RAY. He was questioned by the warden as to why he had happened to be at

the prison on that date and he replied that STONE had gone to Florida and he decided to visit his brother. After the story of RAY's attempted escape was released to the press and became public, RAY's brother was advised that RAY could not receive visitors.

It is Warden MOORE's theory, although he cannot substantiate it, that RAY's brother was aware of the escape plan well in advance of the attempt and that he was in the area to pick up RAY once he made good his escape.

RE: James Earl Ray Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution--Murder; Martin Luther King--Victim

What I am about to disclose for your information and such official use which the Bureau may decide is something that may already be known to the Memphis Division and/or the Bureau; but I feel constrained to supply this data inasmuch as it may be in some manner helpful to the complete solution of this case which I feel, based on press accounts, has not yet been completely solved due mainly, in my opinion, to the rather obvious conclusion that James Earl Ray did not have the mental capacity to plan and execute this murder and then make his getaway via Canada under devious circumstances. However, this is enough as far as my personal opinion is concerned and I do not presume to inject or substitute my opinion for the real facts known to the FBI.

Annual Convention in Atlanta, I flew on Delta Airlines from Atlanta to Memphis to meet with my sister and brothers for a family conference. I do not remember my flight number, but it departed Atlanta at 12:05 P. M. and landed in Memphis exactly one hour later. During the course of this flight, I sat by a man to whom I introduced myself for conversational purposes and learned his name was Oscar Middlebrook, 889 Mosby, Memphis Tennessee, 38105.

Mr. Middlebrook was an extremely intelligent person and advised me that he was 69 years of age and a retired employee of the City Government of Memphis. I did not ask in what capacity he had been employed, but he said that he had served, as I best recall, 32 years before retiring. He also advised me that he was returning to his home in Memphis after a visit with his daughter who resides in Miami, Florida. talking to Mr. Middlebrook for approximately 30 minutes, it became apparent to me that he was not only a very intelligent man but extremely perceptive and possessed of good judgment. During this time we discussed some of the nation's problems and, more particularly, racial matters, during which time Mr. Middlebrook made the observation that there were "Niggers" and Negroes among the black race. He explained that by the "Niggers" he meant the "no-good" blacks who did not want to work for a living, and included in that group were those blacks who wanted to stir racial strife in every area of the nation. This gave me an opportunity to ask Mr. Middlebrook as to how the late Martin Luther King was regarded among the Negroes of Memphis, and he replied that the late Martin Luther King was one of those men who "talked out of both sides of his mouth" and did whatever necessary to advance his own image in the USA and abroad. We then discussed to some extent King's murder, and Mr. Middlebrook made the observation that James Earl Ray was part of what he felt was a rather broad conspiracy of people involved in this murder which included at least one member of the Negro race. He continued by saying that a Negro taxi cab driver in Memphis, whom he declined to identify, had "set up" King for the actual shooting in the following manner. King had been in the edge of his room at a door leading to a small balcony and the unidentified Negro taxi cab driver had called him from the ground level of the motel or building in which King was located and got King out on the balcony and had told him as an excuse for the conversation, "Be sure and wear your coat. It's going to be cold tonight.", and approximately at the end of this statement by the unidentified Negro taxi cab driver, King was hit by the bullet fired by James Earl Ray. Thereafter, the unidentified Negro taxi cab driver so as not to draw any attention to himself and the part he played in "setting up" Martin Luther King continued Mr. Clifton O. to live in Memphis for approximately 30 days, then left and was gone from Memphis until several months ago when he returned and either died or was killed under somewhat mysterious circumstances which indicated to Mr. Middlebrook that the conspirators involved in the King murder had "gotten this man out of the way" so he could never make any disclosures to the FBI or other authorities regarding his part in the murder and the overall conspiracy leading to King's death.

I spent several minutes trying to convince Mr. Middlebrook that he should come to the FBI office or arrange for a rendezvous with some Memphis agent of the FBI knowledgeable about the King murder inasmuch as it was possible that the information he had could be important in this case. Mr. Middlebrook, however, said that he did not want to talk to the FBI because he feared for the safety of himself and his wife if it should accidentally become known to members of his race that he was furnishing information to the FBI. I did everything possible to convince him of the complete confidentiality of any relationship he might arrange with the FBI but he was adamant in this regard.

As stated before, the above information may already be known to the Bureau and it may be a figment of Mr. Middlebrook's imagination, but I do not believe so and would stake my judgment of human beings on the fact that he is completely convinced of the correctness of the information he disclosed to me.

I sincerely hope that the above may be of some help to the Bureau in the captioned matter.

Inasmuch as I was very much impressed with the intelligence and affability of Mr. Middlebrook, I promised to write him, and a copy of my letter to him is attached. Should it become necessary

at some future time to establish a relationship between the Bureau and Mr. Middlebrook to more fully explore the potential of his story, I would be happy to act as a go-between with him, and the letter will serve as evidence of my sincerity in Mr. Middlebrook's mind.

Old Galt warrant may be dismissed

A warrant for the arrest of Eric Starvo Galt (James Earl Ray) issued in Birmingham April 17, 1968, on a conspiracy charge that has been gathering dust in the office of the U. S. marshal here is being considered for dismissal.

A request for dismissal has been received from Bernard Fensterwald Jr., a Washington attorney representing Ray, who is in prison at Brushy Mountain, Tenn., for the fatal shooting of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Monday, U. S. Magistrate R. Macey Taylor notified U. S. Atty. Waymond Sherrer of the request, asking for a response from the Justice

Department in Washington, within 10 days. After 10 days, Taylor could make a recommendation to U. S. District Judge C. W. Allgood to grant the dismissal and quash the warrant or to set a hearing on the charges, brought by the FBI.

The motion asked for dismissal of the conspiracy charge or for a speedy trial.

According to the warrant of April 17, 1968, Galt and another individual he claimed to be his brother entered into a conspiracy on March 29, 1968. The rifle with which King was shot in April in Memphis was bought by Galt, later identified as Ray, in Birmingham March 30, 1968, it was reportant

Mrs. EMILIA DE NICOLAS ABBONDANDOLO, 5210 Maggiore Avenue, Coral Gables, Florida, telephone 667-4793, was interviewed at her residence by SA LEON E. FISH of the Miami Office of the FBI, and at the outset of the interview Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO was advised of the identity of the interviewing agent. Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO was advised that she was being interviewed in connection with a complaint regarding the murder of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, which complaint she had furnished to the City of Coral Gables Police Department on August 3, 1972. Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO declined to furnish a signed statement but stated she would willingly discuss the matter with the interviewing agent.

Mrs. ARBONDANDOLO advised that sometime between July 28 and August 1, 1972, at approximately 4:15 p.m., she left her residence and headed north on Lejeune Road to do some shopping. As she approached the corner of University Drive at a stoplight, she observed a Negro female standing near a bus stop heavily laden with packages and perspiring heavily. She stated that she could tell that the Negro female was exhausted. At that moment, the Negro female walked over to her car to an open window and asked Mrs. ARBONDANDOLO for a ride and where she was going. Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO told her that she was going to 27th Avenue and Flagler Street and allowed the Negro female to get in.

Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO described this Negro female as being approximately 45-50 years of age, approximately 5'5" tall, weighing 170 pounds, medium black complexion, large lips, and possibly a maid by profession.

Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO stated that as the two of them began to talk, the Negro female stated that white people were not always good to black people. However, the Negro female stated that in her opinion them were many good white people. Her conversation led to the accused killer of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JAMES EARL RAY. She described RAY as being not guilty. She stated that everyong in the Negro neighborhood knew that RAY did not kill Dr. KING. She advised that she knew a boy who was in jail who had been given \$5,000 by \$ORETTA KING, the wife of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, and instructed him to arrange for the assassination of her husband.

According to the Negro female, the boy was known both by Dr. KING and his wife. The boy allegedly killed KING and then gave the gun to RAY and asked him to say that he had killed Dr. KING. According to the Negro female, CORETTA KING had a "lover", named DEE or LEE, a married man who could not or would not divorce his wife to many CORETTA KING.

ABBONDANDOLO stated that she asked this Negro female why she did not go to the police or the FBI and give them this information and the Negro female stated that she was afraid to talk about it and if she did she would be killed. Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO stated that soon they reached 27th Avenue and Flagler Street and she dropped the Negro female off at that point and went on her way. ABBONDANDOLO stated that she has no way of determining the woman's name, nor has she seen her again since that date, nor does she know where the woman might reside.

Officer MICHAEL GLASHEEN was interviewed at the Coral Gables Pistol Range Clubhouse located at Coral Way and S.W. 73rd Avenue and at the outset of the interview, Officer GLASHEEN was advised of the identity of the interviewed in connection with a complaint he had taken on August 3, 1972 from a Mrs. EMILIA D. ABBONDANDOLO of 5210 Maggiore Avenue, Coral Gables, Florida, regarding the death of MARTIN LUTHER KING. Officer GLASHEEN declined to furnish a signed statement but indicated he would willingly discuss the matter with the interviewing Agent.

GLASHEEN stated that Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO is an elderly woman estimated to be in her 70s. He described her as rather feeble minded and "hungry for attention". He stated that to the best of his knowledge she has called the FBI and the Secret Service on matters before.

GLASHEEN stated that or August 3, 1972, at approximately 2:37 p.m. he answered a call over his car radio to respond to 5210 Maggiors Avenue, Coral Gables, Florida, to interview a woman regarding information she had concerning the death of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING. Upon arriving at Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO's residence, he was told by her that approximately July 28, 1972, a Friday, she was in the downtown Miami, Florida, area, possibly near S.W. 8th Street or Flagler Street and she offered a Negro female who was standing at a bus stop a ride to the downtown Miami, Florida area. While riding together the two of them talked about matters such as crime in the streets and the Negro woman allegedly then told Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO that she knew something that all colored people knew but were afraid to tell the police. According to the Negro female, Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING's wife, CORETTA KING, had a boyfriend and she gave this boyfriend \$5,000 to see that her husband was killed. According to the Negro female, as related by Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO, the boyfriend contacted someone in a bar and a "hit" was set up on Dr. KING. According to the story, Mrs. CORETTA KING was in love with her boyfriend and wanted her husband out of the way.

Officer GLASHEEN stated that from the information he received, this boyfriend of CORETTA KING's was allegedly somewhere in jail in the State of Florida at the present time.

GLASHEEN stated that to the best of his knowledge and in his opinion, even though Mrs. ABBONDANDOLO might be feeble she did not make the story up, but actually received said information from the person she picked up.

GLASHEEN stated that ARBONDANDOLO had described this Negro female as approximately 45 years of age, 5'2" in height, weighing 145 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. He stated that he could furnish no further information than this.

The following descriptive data regarding Officer GLASHEEN was obtained through interview and observation:

Enclosed for the Bureau and Memphis, the Office of Origin in this matter, is one copy each of two FD-302s reflecting investigation conducted by the Miami Division on 8/21/72 and 8/22/72, which relate to this matter.

On 8/7/72, the City of Coral Gables, Florida, made available to the Miami Office of the FBI a complaint report in which on 8/3/72, an officer from that Police Department had taken a complaint from a resident of Coral Gables, Florida, in which the resident stated that on or around 7/28/72, she had picked up an unknown Negro female near a bus stop and had driven her to the downtown Miami, Florida, area. En route, the Negro female advised that the wife of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, CORETTA KING, had paid an unknown Negro male \$5,000 to have her husband killed. According to this unknown Negro female, all Negroes knew this fact, but were afraid to tell the police.

A review of the Miami indices fails to reflect any identifiable information with the complainant in this matter, a resident of Coral Gables, Florida, Mrs. EMILIA DE NICOLAS ABBONDANDOLO.





City Councilmen serving In 1906 might become personally liable for paying a 100,000 reward posted during the investigation of the death of Dr. Martin Luther King.

The prospect arose in Chancery Court yesterday when a suit seeking to collect reward money for Charles Quitman Stephens, 51, a material witness in the King case, was amended to include the councilmen as additional defendants.

The motion, filed by Harvey Gipson, Stephens, attorney, said the councilmen made themselves individually liable when they passed a resolution in April, 1968, authorizing the \$100,000 reward.

The only 1968 council member not named in the motion was former Councilman Jerred Blanchard. The suit says Blanchard was absent when the unanimous vote was taken.

On 8-2-73, HARVEY GIPSON of the firm of GIPSON & TUCKER, Attorneys at Law, appeared at the Memphis Office and advised as follows:

His office is Suite 1104 of the Exchange Building, Memphis 38103.

He has been retained by CHARLES STEPHENS in seeking the reward offered at the time of the slaying of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING. This reward, which varies between \$100,000 and \$192,000 was offered by the "Press-Scimitar," Downtown Association, and about 12 other groups, for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the assasin or assasins of Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING.

On the day RAY was convicted, GIPSON filed a civil action before Chancellor (FNU) ROND of the Chancery Court, seeking the reward in behalf of STEPHENS.

GIPSON has obtained copies of records of the Police investigation and statements furnished to the Attorney General's Office. The latter were obtained from AG PHIL CANALE.

GIPSON states he is aware that there are several signed statements in the possession of the FBI furnished by STEPHENS in connection with the investigation. He desires copies of these statements. He stated he desires the statements furnished to him voluntarily as he knows he can get them, if necessary, through court proceedings.

The existence of any statements by STEPHENS was not admitted to and he was advised this matter would be discussed with the Special Agent, in Charge and he would be notified accordingly.

Enclosed for the Bureau are two copies each of three FD-302s reflecting interviews with CHARLES Q. STEPHENS at Memphis, Tennessee, on 4/5/68, on 4/5/68, and on 4/24/68. Asso enclosed are two copies of a sworn affidavit given by STEPHENS during June, 1968.

Mr. HARVEY GIPSON, an attorney at Memphis, Tennessee, has contacted the Memphis Office and has advised that he is representing CHARLES Q. STEPHENS, who is attempting to collect approximately \$100,000 in reward monies which were offered by local newspapers and by others at the time MARTIN LUTHER KING was killed.

GIPSON stated he has filed a civil suit in the Shelby County Chancery Court at Memphis. He indicated he has obtained copies of statements furnished to the State Attorney General's Office and he indicated he is aware that there are several signed statements furnished by STEPHENS to the FBI during this investigation. Mr. GIPSON stated he hopes the FBI will turn these statements over to him voluntarily, but indicated he will seek them through court action if neccessary.

No admission was made to GIPSON as to whether or not STEPHENS had furnished any signed statements to the FBI. A review of the Memphis file does not indicate that STEPHENS has ever furnished a signed statement to the FBI, and the only signed document which can be located is the enclosed affidavit. The Bureau will note that a copy of this affidavit was previously furnished to the Bureau by Memphis airtel dated 6/13/68. It is

believed that this affidavit was furnished to a departmental attorney and it may have been used in connection with the extradition of JAMES EARL RAY from England.

It is suggested that the Bureau discuss with the Department what action is desired regarding GIPSON's request for information appearing in FBI files. It is strongly recommended that we decline to furnish GIPSON any information, as it is believed that any cooperation on our part will encourage GIPSON to seek more and more information to substantiate his client's claim. It is also felt that the information furnished by STEPHENS was not of sufficient importance to justify any reward.

Memphis Office is having no further contact with GIPSON UACB.

On September 24, 1973, there was received at the office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Memphis, Tennessee, a letter dated September 21, 1973, addressed to Special Agent in Charge Joseph V. Baker, signed by Attorneys Harvey L. Gipson and Robert A. Tucker. Enclosed with this letter was a copy of a Motion for Discovery filed in the Chancery Court of Shelby County, Tennessee, in the case styled Charles Quitman Stephens, Complainant, versus State of Tennessee Et Al, Defendants.

On September 24, 1973, a copy of the letter and the enclosed Motion for Discovery were furnished to U. S. Attorney Thomas F. Turley, Western District of Tennessee, Memphis. Mr. Turley stated he had not received any notification and that service had not been made on him and this letter did not constitute service under the State law. He recommended that Mr. Baker not appear in Chancery Court on October 5, 1973, as requested and stated if necessary, a member of the U. S. Attorney's staff would appear and request that the complainant's Motion for Discovery be dismissed.

On September 24, 1973, Attorneys Gipson and Tucker were contacted by Special Agent Joe C. Hester and were advised that this matter had been referred to the U. S. Attorney. C., several weeks ago requesting certain documents in this case and not having received a reply to their request, had filed this Motion of Discovery in the Shelby County Chancery Court.
