On 5/7/68, SAGGENE L. STEPHENS and WILLIAM PAUL CALLIS interviewed Milwaukee Road Railroad Detective RICHARD VAN SCOY, who stated that he had observed an individual resembling the photos which appeared in the newspaper on JAMES EARL RAY. He stated that this individual was called to his attention? by CLAYTON DENESEUS, also an employee of the railroad.

He stated that the individual first entered the depot at approximately 12:30 a.m. and went to the restaurant where he ate and departed at approximately 1:45 a.m., on 4/18/68. He advised that he again observed the individual having returned at approximately 5:40 a.m.; however, the individual remained only a few minutes and then left. He stated that the individual had a dress type hat pulled low over his eyes and therefore, he was unable to get a good look into his face. He stated that the individual had no luggage with him.

At this point the writer exhibited all available photos JAMES EARL RAY to VAN SCOY and discussed his physical description with him.

VAN SCOY stated that he believed the individual he observed closely resembled the photo of RAY with the exception of the protruding left ear and further stated that the individual he observed to be somewhat shorter than RAY's listed height of 5' 10". VAN SCOY stated that he could provide no further information concerning this individual.

On May 8, 1968, SAS STEPHENS and CALLIS interviewed HENRY CLAYTON DENASEUS, Baggage Clerk, Milwaukee Road Railroad, who advised that he observed an individual on two different occasions during the early morning hours of 4/18/68, which he believed to resemble photographs of JAMES EARL RAY published in a Milwaukee newspaper. He further stated that he had called this individual's presence to RICHARD VAN SCOY, Milwaukee Road Railroad Detective. He stated the individual entered the depot shortly after midnight and went to the restaurant where he ate and then departed the depot at approximately 1:45 a.m. He stated that the individual's actions appeared suspicious to him and upon observing him closely he believed he closely resembled the pictures he had seen of RAY. He described the individual he observed in the depot as follows:

Race White Sex Male Height 5' 7 - 8" 160 Weight 35 - 40Age Complexion Dark Remark One or two days' growth of beard Clothing Dark hat pulled over his eyes.

He stated that at no time did he noticed this individual to make any other purchases other than the meal in the restaurant. He stated the individual had no conversation or contact with anyone in the depot.

DENASEUS observed all available photos of JAMES EARL RAY and stated that the man he observed appeared very similar to the photograph with the possible exception of the ears and he appeared to be somewhat shorter than RAY's listed height. He further advised that he based this similarity primarily on the mouth and nose as the individual wore a hat over his eyes and he could not observe the individual's hair and eyes.

VAN SCOY and DENASEUS advised that neither had observed this individual since the above time and that they would immediately contact the FBI should the individual return to the depot.

Clark Thinks King Suspect Still Alive

Washington, D. C. -UPI-Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark expressed the belief Sunday that escaped convict James Earl Ray, accused of slaying the Rev. Martin Luther King, jr., remains alive. He said he was "very optimistic" that Ray would be captured.

Clark said he found no evidence to support theories that Ray had been hired by conspirators to kill King and then himself was killed. "We have no evidence to believe that he is not still alive," he said. "I believe we will find him," Clark said.

Citing the "massive manhunt" underway for Ray, he said, "It is awfully difficult for an individual, and pagicula ly an individual about whom so much is known, to remain at large in the United States under the se circumstances."



The following investigation was conducted by SAs RALPH D. PERRIGO and GENE L. STEPHENS; on 4/28/68:

At Milwaukee, Wisconsin

ROBERT D. MATHEWS, 2122 North 24th Street, advised that on 4/27/68, at approximately 9 PM, he was standing at the corner of 10th and Center Streets, Milwaukee, at which time a white station wagon bearing Michigan license plates and carrying five white males, stopped and asked him to take them to a place where they could get a drink. He said they went to the Bamboo Club, Teutonia and Center Streets, where all six had several drinks. He said that while enroute to the club the driver of the automobile made a statement to him, "Would you know KING's killer if you were riding in the car with him"? He said the driver appeared to be intoxicated and continued to ramble about the assassination and stated something to the effect that they were to receive \$80,000 for their part in the murder.

He advised that after rleaving the Bamboo Club they went to another tavern on North Avenue where they continued to consume several drinks. About 11 PM they drove him home. He stated that none of the five stated where they were from or where they would be going after driving him home.

MATHEWS stated that he had observed a photograph of Dr. KING's assassinator in the local newspaper and stated one of the individuals who had riden in the back seat had resembled the photograph. MATHEWS stated that he was very intoxicated and after viewing several photographs of JAMES EARL RAY he stated that he does not feel that the individual whom he had previously referred to resembled any of the photographs of RAY.

GOLDMAN, Aurora, Illinois, who was assaulted by three white males at Madison, Wisconsin, on 2/27/68, in view of a possible tie in this case because of phone calls made to and originating from Memphis, Tennessee, around 4/4/68.

Review of the mirtel places the assailants in Madison, Wisconsin, on 2/27/68, in Chicago, Illinois, on 3/8 and 3/11/68 and 4/3/68. In addition, phone calls were made from Booneville, Mississippi, and Baldwin, Mississippi, on 3/29 and 3/31/68. In view of the fact that the subject was known to be in Los Angeles at the 3t. Francis Hotel from 1/22 to 3/17/68 and that he purchased the murder weapon in Birmingham, Alabama, on 3/29-30/68 plus the fact that a call was made from Chicago, Illinois, on 4/3/68 when it was known that the subject was registered in the Rebel Hotel, Memphis, Tennessee, it appears to this office that the assailants of GOLDMAN and/or the individual utilizing his credit cards could not logically be identical with the subject and the requested investigation will not be conducted UACS.

Regarding referenced letter, no copy to Memphis, the Milwaukee Office advised that JOHN STOSNY, Wisconsin State Patrol, advised on going through his old wanted cards, checking aliases of JAMES EARL RAY, he observed the name WILLIAM WALTON, wanted by the Richmond, Virginia Police Department, item dated May 15, 1959, number 7720, file 5KQB9, for Forgery. He was of the opinion the description of WALTON was very familiary to that of May. A check of the files of the Richmond Police Department on May 7, 1968, by SA CLAUDE A. BASS, revealed the following:

WILLIAM "WILLIE" WALTON, Richmond Police Department, Identification Number 12941, is a Negro male. WILLIAM WALTON, also known as WALTERS, Identification Number 16447, is a Negro male. WILLY WALTON, Richmond Police Department arrest number 227933, is a Negro male.

The records contained a stop wanted flash for WILLIAM C. WALTON, Document Number 3562, of 5714 "S" Road or Stuart Road, Galveston, Texas, a white male, which the department held a felony warrant for worthless check forgery, for a check issued by WALTON on May 13, 1959, at Richmond, Virginia; however, the stop flash was not placed in their files for WALTON until June 1964.

Sergeant JAMES KEA, Detective, Richmond, Virginia Police Department, advised he was the officer placing the wanted stop flash for WALTON, and that the individuals full name was WILLIAM CLINTON WALTON, of Galveston, Texas, also known as HERBERT E. TOMLIN. He stated that as of May 1959, WALTON was described as a white male, 22 years, 5' 11", 160 pounds, brown hair, with a tattoo on the back of both hands -- "BILL" on one and "ANN" on the other. KEA stated that WALTON was never in custody of the Richmond Police Department, and they had no prints for him, nor arrest numbers. He said the check which WALTON had issued had been dated May 12, 1959, in the amount of \$75, drawn on the First and Merchants Bank, Richmond, Virginia, payable to WILLIAM C. WALTON, by HERBERT E. TOMLIN, and presented to Mr. WILLIAM R. SCHAUB, Proprietor of the Old Dominion T. V. Shop, 5013 Forrest Hill Avenue. KEA advised that on June 2, 1959, the department had received information from the Virginia State Police, their teletype number 7720-K, treferencing Richmond Police Department teletype number 851, dated May 13, 1959, to the effect subject had been arrested by the Police Department, Austin, Texas, and was then in custody of the Sheriff's Office, Galveston, Texas. Richmond Police Department had subsequently advised that the Commonwealth Attorney's Office, Richmond, Virginia, would not extradite subject from Texas, and would only send for him if he was still located within the state of Virginia, or in adjoining state. Sergeant KEA stated their warrant for WALTON was still outstanding, however, his present whereabouts was still unknown. He further advised that their records set forth that WILLIAM C. WALTON'S FBI Number 1s 735344, however, the source of this information was unknown to him.

It would appear from the above information that WILLIAM C. WALTON is not identical with subject of this case, however, should further check be required, it is suggested that possible fingerprints and the verified FBI Number might be obtained through the Austin, Texas Police Department, or the Sheriff's Office, Galveston, Texas.

John Eugene Gawron was interviewed by St. Louis Office and advised be taught Ray to be a burglar. He stated that on or about 6/23-24/67, he read in the Chicago "Tribune" of a \$50,000 bank burglary in a southern state and recalled that he and Ray cased the same bank in 1953 or 1969, but did not rob the bank at that time because he injured his leg. A few days after reading this article Gawron claims he was visited by a man whom he refuses to identify and whom he believes he introduced to Ray in 1959. This man told Gawron he and others had robbed the bank, displayed a value full of soney and gave Gawron \$250. About six weeks ago this man again visited Gawron and allegedly indicated to him that hay and one or more other persons had been involved with him in the bank robbery.

During this interview Gawron refused to identify the bank or the man who visited him. He did say that the bank was in the deep South in a State like Mississippi, but not in Mississippi, in a city that is not small and is near a river. The robbers were out of state in five minutes and the loot amounted to \$50,000, plus or minus two thousand.

Based upon available information, the Chicago "Tribune" and the Eureau's bank robbery files have been reviewed without finding any reference to a robbery such as Gawron described.

Gawron has now been reinterviewed and he denies having any contact with Ray since Ray's escape. Regarding the southern bank robbery Gawron previously alleged Ray was involved in, Gawron now states that this could have occurred in July, 1967, instead of June, and was in a city on the east bank of the Mississippi River.

Each office receiving this communication should make a review of their records to determine if such bank robbery or any other robbery coming within the jurisdiction of the Bureau occurred. You should make inquiry at appropriate police departments to determine if a robbery of this magnitude exists in their files.

PUBLICITY ON REWARDS OFFERED

Each Special Agent in Charge and Legal Attache is instructed to promptly remind their established cooperative news sources, in a discreet and tactful manner, of the existence of substantial reward money for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the killer of Dr. Martin Luther King. This money now totals at least \$100,000. The FBI should not, however, be publicized as the source of this reminder.

While the Bureau's continuing policy is to encourage the public to furnish information to law enforcement authorities as a matter of good citizenship, without expectation of financial reward, it is fully recognized that monetary rewards are often necessary to motivate some individuals. The knowledge of the existence of the substantial rewards available in the Murkin case could possibly prove of value in the solution of this major investigation.

Re Bureau teletype to Milwaukee, 5/14/68; Bureau airtel, 5/16/68; Bureau radiogram, 5/22/68; and SAC memo to all agents, 4/22/68.

In captioned teletype, Bureau advised that in view of the fact that subject spent a considerable sum of money from 4/23/67 to 4/4/68, and because this source of his money has not been determined, his photograph should be displayed to appropriate witnesses in unsolved bank robberies or burglaries, where witnesses are available. The bureau also advised that consideration should be given to displaying the photograph of RAY to witnesses in local unsolved robberies to the police departments.

In airtel dated, 5/9/68, the Bureau stated that in order to cover the possibility that subject may have died since commission of the crime, the U. S. Census Bureau and Department of Health, Education, and Welfare were contacted and they advised no central records of unidentified deceased are maintained by those agencies. Inasmich as there is no Federal law requiring the maintenance of such information, and it is possible that if any record of unidentifiable deceased is maintained, it would only be obtained at local police departments, morgues, medical facilities, or the like.

Investigation at the Madison, Bureau of Vital Statistics State Board of Health and Social Service, determined as follows:

The State of Wisconsin does not maintain an unidentified dead file, but these matters are handled by individual police departments and sheriff's offices.

JOHN EUGENE GAWRON was interviewed by St. Louis Office and advised he taught RAY to be a burglar. He stated that on or about 6/23-24/67, he read in the Chicago "Tribune" of a \$50,000 bank burglary in a southern stated and recalled that he and RAY cased the same bank in 1958 or 1959, but did not rob the bank at that time because he injured his leg. A few days after reading this article GAWRON claims he was visited by a man whom he refuses to identify and whom he believes he introduced to RAY in 1959. This man told GAWRON he and others had robbed the bank, displayed a valise full of money and gave GAWRON \$250. About six weeks ago this man again visited GAWRON and allegedly indicated to him that RAY and one or more other persons had been involved with him in the bank robbery.

During this interview GAWRON refused to identify the bank or the man who visited him. He did say that the bank was in the deep South in a State like Mississippi, but not in Mississippi, in a city that is not small and is near a river. The robbers were out of state in five minutes and the loot amounted to \$50,000, plus or minus two thousand.

Based upon available information, the Chicago "Tribune" and the Bureau's bank robbery files have been reviewed without finding any reference to a robber such as GAWRON described.

GAWRON has now been re-interviewed and he denies having any contact with RAY since RAY's escape. Regarding the southern bank robbery GAWRON previously alleged RAY was involved in, GAWRON now states that this could have occurred in July, 1967, instead of June, and was in a city on the east bank of the Mississippi River.

A review of records to determine if such bank robbery or any other robbery coming within the jurisdiction of the bureau occurred should be done. You should make inquiry at appropriate police departments to determine if a robbery of this magnitude exists in their files.

By radiogram dated 5/22/68, the Bureau stated that inasmuch as RAY is known to stay in flophousees and lower class rooming houses, all offices are to furnish copy of identification order to same and to Salvation Army and other charitable type missions.


