and housed on our acute treatment unit. During the past year he has received several adverse behavior reports for refusing to move to designated area; fighting another patient, plus housed in maxium security units for control. He is ingratiating and manipulative in interviews and attempts to play different disciplines against others to achieve his needs being gratified. In May, 1966, he was observed sleeping outside the office after allegedly, in company of another patient, to have made a homicidal threat against the patient being interviewed. After he wrote a note to another patient indicating that he had a knife secreted in his shoe and he planned to use it on one of the staff members. A knife was found in his shoes as he indicated. In summary, Edmondson has required approximately 45 ward changes, 13 job assignments, and has required maxium security housing for approximately 20 months since his admission here in 1960. Historically he has shown evidence of depression and has made two suicide attempts. In 1963 electro shock therapy was initiated following self-mutilation attempt. CUSTODY: Acute treatment unit, or in max. security housing.

### MILITARY CLEMENCY REVIEW

Edmondson, a 27-year old single-Megro male, continues to serve a 35-year sentence imposed by military court martial for murder. His adjusted release date with lost and extra jour time is h-17-81. Sentence expires full term on 12-11-92. There are no decainers on Military

Edwardson continued in residence in the institution's Maximum Security Unit from 5-3-00 to 8-22-66, at mich time he was transferred to a unit of relatively close structure, by one from which he could have daily in order to participate in institutional amployment dutother programs. During his residence in Maximum Security, he was reviewed on two occasions by the Psychiatriac Treatment Planning Council held on 3-15-57; recommendations-transfer to a unit of relatively less structure, work assignment as unit Orderly, continue residents on that unit until personnel determine his preparedness to transfer to a more open unit, and medication and referal to Maxisum Security physician will be the primary responsibility of the physician on his unit of residence. Since his transfer to a moderately structured . writ, the patients unit supervisor states that he is in fact, no problem to the unit. A positive behavioral difference was noted, and he has created no trouble among innates or officers. His attitude toward those with whom he comes in contact has been one of communications. tion. Edmondson functioned as ward Orderly until 6-27-67. His work supervisor states if the he held duties of gameral sanitation and performed these duties well. He accepts restour 💀 bility well although the opinion was presented that his compliance with authority was motivated only by necessity, not by willingness. An interest in self-improvement was indicated by his frequent studying in the unit. The education department states that he is presently enrolled in bookkeeping, Algebra I, and Economics. His intentions are appointly of self-improvement, and designed to improve occupational skills. Educadeon received his high school diploma from the lake Shore High School in May, 1967. Beta IQ score is 🔀 On 6-27-67, he was assigned as typist to the Parola Records Office. He has this far Tunctioned satisfactorily in that position. This is a job requiring skill as a compelent typist and recorder. The volume of mork is at times quite heavy, and Edmondson has handled this challenge well, displaying no evidence of stress. He has received approidmately four visits from family members since the time of his 1966 review. The Catholic Chaplin states that Edmondson has been attending services every Sunday. He has done tong siderable reading regarding the Catholic Church.

Since his release from Maximum Security, Edmondson has made definite attempts to involve himself in institution progrems which would provide him educational and vocational development, as well as insight into numerous personality problems. There is no doubt, much manipulative behavior in evidence, however this behavior is directed toward positive gos in There has been no report of adverse behavior within the past year, and his known associations are not with a homosexual element. His contention is that he is becoming aware then his life will not be spent envirely in penal institutions, and the longer his behavior is adverse, there exists the possibility that his institution time may be extended. This present approach to institutionalization may sell reverse itself in the future through psychotic deterioration, however at this time, it is this writers impression that Admonstrate son is making a considerate effort for self-improvement vecationally, educationally, and through the acceptance, relactant as it may be, that he does have psychiatric problems compounded by a great amount of time yet to be served.

## AUNUAL MILITARY CLEMENCY REVIEW

Clifford Edmondson is a 26 year old Negro man who is serving a 35 year sentence for murder under GONO #3 % #125. Fis life sentence was reduced on 8-17-64. His release date with good time at 100 (1010-10). His full term expires 12-11-92. He has no reduced to the sentence of the sentence

The tegan serving his sentence at Leaverworth on December 31, 1957.

One June 23, 1957, while Edmondson was stationed at Grose Air

Bast, Labredor, he murdered a follow airman with a .55 calibre
pistel. Shortly after he accumitted the crime he was seen by a
psychiatrist in Labredor, the was of the opinion that he was

psychiatrist diagnosed him as suffering from sovere behavior or
character disorders and close to mild psychosis, and as competent.
During the trial the first psychiatrist continued to consider
Edmundson psychotic, but changed his thinking that he was then
competent to stand trial.

Edmindson was transferred to Terre Haute on August 25, 1957. He was unable to adjust to the like there and was considered a disciplinary problem since May 1960. In August 1960 he was placed in administrative segregation, where he remained until September 10 when he was transferred to Leavenworth. At Leavenworth he was diagnosed as suffering from a schizophrenic rescalen, paranoid type, acutely disturbed, potentially dangerous, escaultive.

Ho was transferred to the Medical Center on Movember 23, 1960, as a certified psychotic pations. He was placed on the maximum treatment ward, and then one month later to the maximum control ward. From then until Pebruary 1962 he remained on either of these two wards most of the time. He was then transferred to an open ward and remained for four months. He was given a behavior report at this time because he was on a ward other than his own.

Nine months later he was transferred to an open ward. Dr.

Tilefaky, a psychiatrist, wrote this in a report after Edmundson had to be removed from the ward. "Patient continues as schizophrenia reaction, schizoaffective type, much improved. Presently is mildly depressed following loss of his open ward status after a fight into which he was apparently provoked. Unfortunately his control was poor and he injured the other spatient rather badly. His last fight was about three years ago. Nevertheless response to treatment has been very good. Patient has demonstrated a greater capacity for trust, some evidence of conscience, and some espacity to acknowledge depression."

Nine months later he was again transferred to an open ward (12-26-63). To was assigned to industries on 4-9-64, and was able to maintain

that jeb for 8 menths. His progress had been such that he was recommended for reduction of sentence which was granted (to 35 years).

On June 18, 1964, he was removed from certified psychotic status. In May 1964 he received his high school diploma as a result of much conserted effort.

on 3-31-64 he was transferred to the marisum treatment word because he was becoming emotionally upast and needed closer structure. He had received no behavior report at this time, but it was felt to be to his benefit to place him in a less throatening area. At first this was difficult for Edmondson to understand but during the ensuing months he has seen the advisability of the move.

Edmondson was placed in individual therapy with the writer, a psychiatric social worker, in February 1955. At first the hours were bi-weekly, but in the east four months weekly interviews have been maintained.

On Marca 12, 1965, Edmondson had again become depressed and it was necessary so place him on the minimum prestment ward. Great pressutions are always taken when he begins showing suisided tendencies, since he has almost successfully taken his life on ywo different occasions. On one cosesion he jumped from the second story pier onto his head. Another time he allt his threat with a resor. He has been in a more open word in the security unit since May 4, 1965. He was assigned to the industries brush factory on that ward on July 23, 1965.

The ward personnel, including the doctor, recognize the progress this man has made and believe that this has come about through a change of attitude toward himself and others. His chart indicates that he is getting along well with both patients and staff. He has a sense of humor and a sense of fair play.

Through averances of himself as a person and insight therapy this man has discontinued homesexual activities during the past of months. It is this probable contention that this man's identity was tied up with a new coically based conflict. The homogenial acting out was the symptom. The transference relationship with the private, a somen, has also aided in this reworking of identification. It remains to be seen whether the separation from the writer, who is leaving soon, will affect this.

Education's aggressive behavior of the past has been a defense against depression. This was else tied in with his feeling of manliness and that he was hiding the fact that he was a sensitive person. Through recomition with the therapist that it is alright to be this true self he has been able, at least for the present, to drop

He had thoughts in the past that if he took his life it would somehow even the score. He now is able to recognize that being his true creative self is the best solution. This is an intelligent man who does such intrespective thinking and weighing of ethical values, another sign of progress is his ability to have a deep mosningful relationship with the writer.

Although those have been some emotional sathacks in the past 2's years we see a gradual upward trond in this can. Continued therapy is recommended.

REPORT OF NEUROPSICHIATRIC RANGIMATION

In REASON FOR COMMITTAINT: This 21-year old, single Negro mule is serving a life sentence for premeditated murder of a fellow Air Force companion. Sentence began 12-12-57 at Leavenworth Berracks and the patient was transferred to Terro Haute on 8-25-59 because of intransigent inadeptability. Because of continuing aggressive and impulsively uncontrolled activity, the patient was transferred to Leavenworth on 9-10-10 where he displayed evidences of increasing payeble disorganization and was accordingly cortified as psychotic and transferred to the Medical Center on 11-23-50 with a displaced of Schizophrenic meantion, Paramoid Type, Acute.

II. SOURCES OF INFORMATION: (a) The patient who is considered only partially reliable because of the confusion inherent in his acute psychotic episode as well as the underlying enricties the patient has conserning his intrapsychic functioning.

(b) Institutional records. (c) Questionnaires from his mother. (d) Transcripts of official military proceedings surrounding the instant offerse.

III. FAILET HISTORY: The patient's mother has led a turbulent life. It ago 17 she had the illegitimate elder brother to the patient. At age 19 she bore the patient who was also illegitimate. Six months later she married but was divorced within a year. She subsequently has had four husbands, the farst three of which wore ussuccessful. The fourth husband, however, turned into a stable marital curtner and those has been a stable home both contally and economically for the past ton years. During this time a half-sister has been born to the marriage and the family now lives in acceptably confortable social economic circumstances. The social history of the method reveals that she was an unstable, irresponsible, nervous woman who was a chronic alcoholic in her lato. Teen years. She acknowledges that she drank heavily and maintained a very unstable home for approximately ten years. Ouring the early years of the patient he was placed in several foster homes in succession and would frequently live with his grandmother for short periods of time. One of his earliest emmorles is being in an orphenage and the jamitor threatening to throw he and his brother in the furnace because they were misbahaving. Buring this period the children were removed from the mother she being declared an unflit parent. However when the patient was five the mother regained custody of the two hove and they intermittently lived with the mother, the grandmother and relatives. The patient's memory of his life up til age 10 is one of chaos, insocurity, anniety, beloless ness, dependency and fructrated anger and unreceptive love. Mocords indicate that the patient and his brother would frequently keep the home together by working at odd jobs to provide for their can clothes and food. The patient recalls from a vivid memory of his mother standing maked in the kitchen while she was dead drank throwing dishes out the window. Seeing such as this, the patient recalls with a good deal of anxiety, hostility and guilty love. Suffice to say that the pathent's childhood until ago 10 was marked by lack of any father figure whatcoever and a very chaotic embivalent mother figure whose relationship to the boy is most evidently traumatic. The records indicate that when the patient was 10 the mother quite suddenly reformed and deased her alcoholic pattern of living, settled down to a stable marital existence with her fourth husband and became deeply and devottly religious. She has continued this quite respectable adjustment throughout the ensuing ten years. However, it is apparent that the 44-775-1035

groundwork for psychic distortion in the boy was already layed.

The patient and his older brother were constant commanions throughout infancy and childhood. He states that he and his brother were always getting in fighte and that he could usually provoke his brother to become augry at him. However he recollections that he, the patient, would win the fights when he grow older, his brother would win the fights. His sarliest childhood memory centers around an Easter egg hunt in which his brother found all the eggs and he found none. That there are deep cented hestile, competitive codipal strivings with the brother is manifest in much of the natorial. He mentions that his brother has at the present time twin illegitimate children but has not assumed any responsibilities and continues to live at home with the mother. Records indicate that the brother has a probable componited his deforming and hence perticilly origined. He has not completed school and has been in minor difficulties. Records indicate also that the gatisat was often quite impulsively aggressive toward the older brother arring so stab him with a broken betale at age 5 and lever with a dark and when lo, attempted to kill his brother with a broken bottle which the brother prevented by everpowering the patient. Toward the younger balf-eister the patheat does not express his hostilities consciously but in some of his prior recorded psychotic letters there are many evident hestile allusions to the coroled position the young daughter maintains within the sholtered stable househeld growlded for her which has and was dealed to the patient.

The patient furthermore is his psychotic material of his letters reveals marked ambivalent feelings toward his mother. He, at this time, consciously relates that he has both leve and hate for his mether and that he cannot decipher which of these feelings is the strongest and meet important to him. He does however state that his mother hates him and that he feels this most accuredly especially since he heart har voice talking to him and telling him very bad things. As we approach these areas of his mether's attitude toward him and his reciprocal sactions, the patient becomes exceedingly tense, begins to display a good deal of sonficient and begins to as much more disorganized in his mental functioning. Hence we may assume that the patient's relationship to his brother is the area of probable gross psychopathology. This will be of importance in considering the trimethe patient committed.

IV. PERSONAL HISTORY: Apparently the patient was born after a 32-hour labor and the mother states he was weak and sickly as a baby. He refused to eat any shing except wilk until six months old and then the mother would withhold wilk until he would willingly take any food offered to him. She notes that he was slow to talk because of stattering, even in infancy, and only began to walk at 1h months. We was noted as a shy, retiring, timid child who made friends very slowly and tomical to remain withdrawn within himself. Throughout childhood he had frequent attacks of asther, virus infections and minor maladies which the mother says he born quit) well until he reached the "teen ago years at which time he bagan to become very consorned about his physical condition and become processualed with his resurrent illness as being very anxious about the state of his health. It is noted that he disregarded the health of the rest of his family, however. The patient made steady progress in

It is noted that he often seemed to taunt or tantalize people into anger toward him and that he himself was always known to be prone to impulsive outbursts of eager and acting out aggressive behavior. The patient seemed to resent discipline as a shild and whom punished would always retaliate. It was noted that when he would be alapped he would slap back and if this continued he would always get the last clap in against his mother. She also noted that he would frequently taunt her to see how far he could push her before being severely punished. She notes that whe punished him only lightly he would continue to flours her until she gave him a severe thrashing at which time he would then some to be properly chastened and Cohave properly for awhile. Although the patient was pushed around by the rore aggressive children, as he came to his ficen ago years he began to become the aggressive dominant person himself and by the time he entered high school was known to the school authorities as a rather aggressive juvenile. He was brought to the attention of javeable authorities rather frequently over a period of ages 12 to 15 usually because of street juvenile gang activities such as streetwelking, street fights, wholeving curfow and general insolones. The peace officers report that the boy had a cockey ship on his shoulder attitude and would not form any report with authorities and mainteined aloof reserve without apparent concern. Finally at age 16 he was expelled from high school along with several other boys because of their intransigent belligorout attitude and constant porty misbehavior in the school. It was felt that their chronic, anticocial attitudos and behavior would soon involve them in as mous difficulties. The mother however notes that during this time of his early "teams he was always very police and cooperative at home and sleeps contributed to the welfare and care of the home and seemed to have a very protoctive concern for lor welfare and for the sustanance of the home functioning. He would help with the chores and volunteer for tasks requested of him and worked regularly at several add jobs to contribute to his own support. It is also noted that the patient was an extremely norvous child who was noted to wet the bed, be insormise, would often run away from . home to his grandmother's but would quickly return on his own accord. Interestingly the patient claims that he had a nervous breakdown shortly after his mother resummed for the fourth time and that he had to be taken to a hospital. We might mismile that this "mervous breakdown" was an acute reaction of the boy to a compatitor in the form of the new foster-father. Juvenila authorities report that the mother was always quito concerned about the bay but that the step-father was rather blace and diffident about the whole matter. The mother reports that there was constant friction in the home during all this time contexing around rivalry between the two boys and also friction between them and the step-father.

Uson reaching his 17th birthday the patient enlisted in the Air Force with his parents' consent. We finished basic training without incident and went to Myoning for elerical training. While there he became involved in the instant offense with a training instructor whom he alleged hit him in the stemach and physically abused him. He was found to be carrying a reser blade in a black of wood with which to alleged he would slit the officer to pieces were he to over approach him again. This incident apparently was accepted without further comment and the patient was

transferred to the Joose Air Force Base in Lebrador. There, as elaborategin the Grass proceedings, the patient very quickly developed animosities between himself and his fellow workers and superiors. They noted that he often acted rather bizerre and strange. He was noted to frequently forget things, to wander off his job or to perform tanks contrary to explicit instructions just given him. He claims soveral times that he would pass out when he was about to become involved in some assaultive behavior and was known as a moody, impulsive, withdrawn, depressed individual. On the evening prior to the offense the patient was in a cauteen when an argument areas between him and another fallow concerning the pathont's tracing and playing his records too loudly in his room. The patient says he called the other men a lier who replied "your mother." The patient says that he felt this was an insult and slur to his mother and his first impulse was to hit the man. Hewever, controlling himself, he decided that he would kill him. That night he obtained a pistol, a mile and the following morning proceeded to kill the man. However another soldier happened into the catheat's way and be shot him instead. Stating that he had to get this fallow out of the way so he could kill the man he wanted to kill, he shooting the one coldier merely because he was in his way. The pathont has given many different accounts of exceptly hat hoppened although he has never proffered a reason so far as any records show. However he now states that he had a list of things for which he lived for and on this list was his girl friend and his mother. Showly before the offense his girl wrote him saying th t she was no longer going to continue corresponding with him. He states that when this fellow east appersions upon his mother that this removed the only other thing from his list worth living for and that he was ready to die. He states that he has been wondering whether it was worth living for quite a walle and that this ended it all. One may infer thet the prtient reacted so violently to the elleged inmult to his mother because it pin-pointed the fact that he had indeed massive hostile aggressive impulses toward his own mother which he could not consciously accept and hance there was a strong need for him to kill the man the had expressed his own unacceptable conscious desiros of death toward his own mother, It is noteworthy that the patient had propured a list of eight fellow officers and soldiers whom he was going to kill because they had been neking imenite and alighting remarks consorning him. That an innocent bystander was killed rather than the real offender is not particularly surprising in view of the fact that the patient's hestilities were actually an expression of his own solf-anger which he needed to express against comebody else since he could not empress them against himself and we see indeed that he had been battling with his own suicidal wishes for some time prior to the murder he committed. Hence we can see the astual murder as being an alternative to his ora suicide and he was in feet making a suicide gesture since murder would make that he would be established.

The patient was brought to the U. S. for trial and after the adjudication of the court and contending he was incorporated at Leavenworth Berracks and has been in the various Federal institutions since.

Y. PHISICAL & TUROLOFICAL EXAMINATION:

VI. PRESENT ILLNESS: is has been noted, the pathont had a very traumatic childhood with a very pubhological mother figure and no father figure. We see early in life the cooks of personality fermation beginning to form. Early in life he is noted to have been aggressive and inpulsive with very pote control of his aggressive hostile impulses. Furthermore there is a very embivalent nother figure who is the only source of support and yet is a repelling, rejecting, despicable figure who is barreelf dependent on her some. Hovertholets she is the mother and must be leved despite her unlovablenese. To add to this the mother is openly provocative to the boys in a sermal manner such as is esen in the patient's mother standing unlied. It is not surphising then that we find vary intense rivalry between the patient emi his older brother with attempts to kill the brother populatedly noted in the pailout's bictory. Her is it surprising new to note the unconscious hostility toward the younger half-sinter who occupies the position that the prileit so cavets and yet cannot have. We note that the policet is a cickly beby which covaloped cloudy and has many courable mannerisms during infancy and early childhood with many payehorometic complaints and that when the 'teen age years come here is a boy the becomes hypochondrices. in his salf-consers. Furthermore we note a shy, diffidens, timid individual we has difficulty making friends and is bullied by other problem leter again as he enoughs into adoleroome we find the bimidity being compensated for by open aggreestverness. Of note is the fact that the mother writes that the patient had many girl Arienta with whom he would were easily and deeply fall in love. He would give them expensive proceeds and would often give them every cont that he had in his posted and would be suborbillant in lewishing gifts upon them. The cotter water that the girls water often had very little offeethen for him but that he would soon to almost knock bimseld out in Azying to denominate his everyweeding love for the girl friend. A rathur obvious displacement of effection on to the girla as the mother figure would enou to be appropos here. As noted, we see a boy who has dever hed any softenestery modele from which to learn ego control and no a matter of fact has ration apily copical the alceholic uncontrollable ego of the infinitile mother which is a hadenistic ego. Therefore we are not surprised to find him demonstrating astisocial behavior during his from age yours now are we surprised to find that he demonstrates very poor ego control of his hostile and aggreealvo impulses while in the service and the development of feelings of suspicion, persocution and hosbility from other scaple with a projection on to other people of his own hostility toward them. The dynamics of his behavior resulting in the murder have been elucidated.

Following the murder the patient was seen by a paychiatrist in Labrador who node a diagnosis of Schirophronic Posetion, Pernodid Type, Chronic, Severe and was of the opinion that the patient was paychotic and incompetent. Accordingly the patient was transferred to the States and while expense was very disturbed, conjusted and apparently disordented although full records are not available. However, the patient finally arrived at Shophard Air Force Base where further paychiatric avarianties was performed by a second paychiatrict the felt that the patient sepresented an extraordy severe behavior or character disorder the was close to mild paychical. It was the second paychiatrict's column that the patient was reversely ill but probably competent. At the time of trial the first paychiatrist who had seen the patient in

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Labrador maintained his original diagnosis of paychetic santal it was not of such a degree as to render the patient incompetent because of the fact that the patient had planned the murder before hand and had also planned to kill the eight officers and soldiers. He maintained the diagnosis of Paranoid Schisophrania however. The only other opinion was rendered by a physician who saw the patient just after the time of offence for a brief period of time and thought that he represented a paranoid schizophromie as well as a major character disorder. Following the briel in which is was concluded that the cetient was men tolly semetent and know right from no being reviewed and coerated by mode to life, the cald icknie. Upon essistant to loavenmosta Engracka the patient procent sure, children behavior with an inability to remain on one leb for any length of time, requiring close supervision and unable to refrain from juvenile nularnes behavior. His attitude varied from poor to very good depending upon the particular supervicers or the job. He received a number of behavior reports for fighting, insolence and disobedisabe which finally resulted in his transfer to force Wante after the payenia aries at Leavenuerth Barracks felt that the eathers reorganized a case of emotionally immeture personality disorder which is to say a semiopath who is emobionally immature. Upon arrival at Terro House the patient continued bis former balligurant chip on the shoulder attitude provoking other people to fights, frequently being involved in impulsive aggreealth being or which was very remediated often of his behavior at the time of the surger. The payehintries of Terro Haute moded that the patient was seclusive and tended to concess his thoughts and was not too corperative with physbiatric ememination. Because of his continued adverse behavior the publicut was transferred to Leavenworth whom shortly after education he has noted to be morely, depressed, expressing suicidal thoughts and was transferred to the scychiatric unit for electrotion. There he became progressively more disorganized, began to have auditory and visual hallucinations, became grossly disorganised and did not respond to acute tranquilising thorapy. He was accordingly cordified as payabetic with a diagnosic of Schlasphrenic Receiton, Asuto Farmond Type and was transferred to the Medical Center. Upon arrival at the dedical Center the patient was placed in the source treatment ward whore he republy reorganised himself although there were evidences that he had continuing auditory hellucinations. The patient remained withdrawn and seekeekye without revealing such of his thought content to the different espekistrists. He has since that time progressed slouly through three of the saminan security units to the most liberal regime available under maximum surpression. Only now has he began to demonstrate come of the more juvenile, immature demanding eggressive behavior that has been recorded in the past since up to this time he has been very passive, quiet, withdrawn and obsequious in his behavior.

At the procest time the patient voices much natorial which is obviously psychotic in mature and he continues to have auditory hallucinations which he donlos. We would consider this man actively and still acutely psychotic cuffering from a parabold type of echisophrenic reaction. More important than the patient's mental mental status at this time, however, is the longitudinal picture of this man's illness times it becomes apparent at this time that what has superficiently on the surface apparent to be a sociopathic type of perconality has in actuality been a longer term chronic parabold achisophrenic reaction which was perhaps in a more incidious state in carlier

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years and we see now blossoming the more overtant obtious manifestations of his offense. It is a rather most point as to whether he was competent at the time of his offense or at the time of trial since the patient received several psychiatric examinations. It would seem from this vantage point that the patient has been rather obviously a chronic paramoid schizophrenic for most of his life but to what extent it actually interfered with his competency and responsibility is something that cannot he determined at this time and from what we see of the patient it would appear that any such determination must be made at the moment such as was indeed actually done at the time of trial quite adequately.

The patient is a tell, muscular lagro make in excellent physical soudition with a slight obsoly because of tranquillaing regime. The patient very superficially appears to be in good contact but then obviously demonstrates marked anxiety and very tenuously controlled personality organisation upon closer serving. There is marked psychomotor egitation throughout the interviews and them the patient begins to become pressed, repidly disintegrates into stuttoring, atcamering and automatic motions. Frequently his thought patterns are broken by autistic procequation and frequently the patient displays marked inappropriate mod clicked and cries spectaneously the patient displays marked inappropriate mod clicked and cries spectaneously throughout the interviews. Rapport is established and maintained only by the use of massive support mechanisms by the exercises to help the patient maintain ago integrity throughout the interviews. Here not this support maintained the patient would frequently lapse into gross psychotheally disorganized relationships and only by the enternal ego support is he able to maintain a caherent relationships

The patient's perceptual processes demonstrate hyperalorance to the interviewing situation elthough to in frequently distracted from the interview by the own preoccupation and autistic thought. He is only tensously extented to time and place and
containty is confused and envious about his own percent with evidences of interest
depercevalisation very close to the curfece. He admits to up on an off moment that
he had marked influeinatory experiences at night which are entruely threatening to
his ego integrity and then later he velocently dealer his his admitsion since he four that
he will be given shock treatment if he admits hallucinations. The hallucinations center
around (1) his nother's denial of him, (2) the accumpanty hestile feelings of the witenesses at the trial and (3) the angulated cries of the man he markered.

The patient's intellectual functioning demonstrates an excellent masony for recent and remote events although this is frequently contentated by his our conscious suppression of very psychleally conflicting and destructive material such as his memories of the distorted pathological figure of his mother when he alternately layed and bates. At the present time he is able to bring things into memory only after the examiner gives him algorit and the patient is able to appreach threatening material via circumstantial evenues. His store of knowledge is commencurate with a MAS ID of 105 and he demonstrates an acceptable store of knowledge compatible with about an eighth grade edge-them. His range and type of ideas are markedly constrained.

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He completely dismisses anything that has bappened prior to his incarceration, feeling that he has never lived before thistime and there are repeated evidences of conscious impoverishment of his thought material. He is constantly presecupied with the hallucinatory voices which speak to him and the observious be has constraing his own hostility and aggression. The patient does not confabulate at this time nor does be present any delusionary material although he cortainly feels at times persecuted and maligned by authority.

His functional aspects of intellectual functioning demonstrate some rigidity of thought pattern although chiefly there is noted the psychomotor retardation, the very frequent endiety provoked blocking and the marked over-symbolization and over-determined responses that he presents. In general the patient's intellectual functioning is well presented and does not show the gross and obvious distortions of schizophrenic distortion but are rather the distortions of interpersonal perception and intropersonal acceptance such as we see in the paramoid type of schizophrenic restaion.

Als emotional responses are rotarded and inappropriate at times with burnts of laughter and flights of thought with alternating periods of weeping, belf-depresation and at other times bectility, suspiciousness, withdrawd and apprehensiveness.

In his relationship to other people he reveals mitharwel, heatility, successions nose, inability to form respect with projection of his our feelings on to other people leading to feelings of personation and heatility. The patient feels that he was being made into a homosexual at Leavenworth and voices many strong feelings of personation in regards to radial projection. He denies may prior heatstrand, experiences or cativity which one might expect in the scute psychotic state which he is in. Contraction we would expect that he would possibly be more homosexual ware he to become requestivity of stated again.

The patient has a good deal of current encloty in part engendered by his notice hallusinatory experiences as well as his limited ability to control aggreealon or relate successfully to other people. The patient has used flight or flight mechanisms to deal with unconfertable situations and no see his current flight into illness as a way of escepting from expressing hostility too openly toward other people. The patient is embly torn in his receptance toward his illness supressing at times a demine to be helped and at other times fearful of the implications of mental illness.

cought to inhis own ambivalency toward his mother, his arbivalency toward authority, his inability to devolop an adequate paychosenum. Identification and he is leaded down with massive guilt feelings which he has contexing around his aggression woward his mother. This leaves either one of two cituations; wither he intermalines the guilt and aggression upon himself which produces more psychotic disorganisation or else he organises bimself more efficiently and expresses his hostility externally toward his environment. Either one of these colutions much he uses is call-destructive and hence the patient is caught in a perpetuating triangle of affairs. The primary

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is presently better organized than at the time of his initial acute disorganization at Leavenworth but he continues to maintain personality organization only at the expense of great psychic effort and very limited internal economy.

Will. FORWHATION: This is a 21-year old, single Negro male doing life for promodificated murder. He was the second illegitimate sea born to a woman who was
irresponsible and alcoholic for approximately ten years of the patient's life producing
a very chaotic and heatic home life for the patient. The incipient seeds of a
paranoid achieophronic personality are repeatedly documented from carliest callificat.
The chief psychopathology is centered around the patient's cun ambivulence toward
the mother figure which subminated in the instant offense which was murder of a sother
soldier. Psychically this represents an expression of the hostility which he had toward
his mother being expressed for him by another individual. Since this expressed the
patient's can hestility be surfaced as an expression of his hostility rather than
committing suicide. Following the patient's incarceration he has demonstrated juvenile
immaturity, belligarent athibute, withirewal, seclusive men and progressive parchic
disorganisation until he at last became appealy psychotic. The patient at the present

This would include developing some rapport with the patient or than he can form acceptable relationship with a parental curregate honce recolving some of the intence emplyaloney which he feels at the present that. Further therapeutic efforte might be bent toward developing sems acceptance of the mother which the petient continues to have large amounts of hestility toward. Were this to happen we sould aneliorate some of the internalised aggression and hence increase personality organimation and a larger degree of self-acceptance. Having accomplished this goal it would them be possible to start a progrem of ago strengthening of his extérnally directed aggreesion toward authority and parental symbols. This usans that the patient is going to seed long term supportive and later interpretive therapy which he seems to have the intellectual equipment to handle. First efforts must be directed toward emplicating his more psychotic muchanisms of defense and shoring up his manger age resources. It is socialpained that the patient will require well defined limits for some time until bis ego develops mero edequately. F. Wand on and

S. Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas,

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by reason of physical disability; that the diagnosis in his case was "Schizophrenic reaction paramoid type, chronic, severe, VA Code 9203, rated at 100%"; that the disability was permanent, and that the date he became unfit was about June 1957.

He was tried and convicted by a General Court-Martial on 12/12/57, for on or about 6/23/57, did at Goose Air Force Base, Labrador, with premeditation, murder another Airman by means of shooting him with a .45 caliber pistol. He was sentenced dishonorably discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and confinement at hard labor for the term of his natural life. However, by General Court-Martial Order Number 38, dated 10/10/67, paumuant to the direction of the Secretary of the Air Force, the findings of guilty and the sentence in the general court-martial case of KDMONDSON, were set aside. Also, all rights, privileges, and property of which KDMONDSON had been deprived by virtue of the findings of guilty and sentence were restored. He was released from confinement at the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri.

Special Progress Report of the U. S. Medical Center, Springfield, Mo., revealed the following diagnosis for MDMONDSCM: "Schizophrenic Reaction, Paranoid Type, Chronic, with acute exacerbation as characterized by an individual with a life history which demonstrates the incipient seeds of a schizophrenic type personality with the evidence of mounting paranoid type of reaction throughout the years culminating in a gross psychotic disorganization at this time with only partial amalioration seen currently." The records further indicated that MDMONDSCN had made two suicide attempts and that in 1963 electro shock therapy was initiated following self-mutilation attempt.



This group visited the shop on several occasions and each time period their cur out of the shop area. On April 7, 1968 they were using the brown Genillac, and on April 13, 1968 the blue Cadillac, as described above. Members of the group gave names and addresses as shown on the attached JJJ invoices. Jackson stated he does not believe the names as shown on the invoices are correct.

During the course of one of the visits, a member of the party stated, we sure took care of Martin Luther, or words to that effect. He immediately corrected himself and stated, "I manut they took care of him". Following this visit, Jackson stated he found some publications of the Minutenan Organization at his store and a summed the publications were left by one of the party.

On July 11, 1968, Special Agent George Armsti, FEI, Kansas City, Missouri was advised of this activity because of the references to Martin Luther King.



She stated that at the time she was with friends there and JERRY was introduced to her and attempted to sell her a German Shepherd puppy. She further advised that she subsequently saw RAY on two or three occasions at the Grapevine, a bar on Arsenal Street, St. Louis, Missouri. However, she never dated him. The last time she saw JERRY RAY was on July 5, 1968 when RAY drove her home in the early morning hours, from the Grapevine, after a July 4 party. She advised she has not seen him since nor has she heard from him, although she had heard through friends that JERRY RAY had left town shortly after the July 5.







DONALD JAMES NISSEN, FBI Number 607 320 A, was a parole violator in case in which Phoenix was origin. He had previously made telephonic contact with SA G. WAYNE MACK of the Phoenix Office and made arrangements to surrender himself to agent MACK at St. Louis on August 5, 1968.

On the morning of August 5, 1968, NISSEN called the St. Louis Office from the Municipal Airport at St. Louis stating he had just arrived by plane from Tampa, Florida, and desired to surrender to the FBI. He was subsequently taken in custody by SA CLETIS B. BIDEWELL and SA G. WAYNE MACK and upon interview furnished the following information:

NISSEN has remarried and his wife, who is pregnant, is living and working in Tampa, Florida. NISSEN has been working as a salesman for a book company which he declined to name and stated he has been doing very well financially. Until around the first of December NISSEN was living and working in the Atlanta, Georgia, area. Around the first or second of December, 1967, as he was leaving the Federal Building in Atlanta after having made his regular contact with his probation officer, he was hailed on the steps of the Federal Building by an individual, unknown to him. This person asked if he was DON NISSEN and when he replied in the affirmative, this individual stated he had a message for him from MAC. NISSEN understood MAC to be LEROY MC MENAMAN, who had advised him while they were fellow inmates at Leavenworth Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, that \$100,000 had been offered by the White Knights of the Ku Klass Klan of Mississippi to be paid to anyone who would kill MARTIN LUTHER KING.

The person accosting NISSEN on the steps of the Atlanta Federal Building then stated that apparently somebody had done some talking and NISSEN assumed he made reference to information that he had furnished to the FBI in Sherman, Texas, in April, 1967. Before any more conversation transpired, the individual who had transported NISSEN to the Federal Building called to him from across the street and the unknown individual immediatel walked away from him. It was NISSEN's assumption that this person thought the individual calling him might be an FBI agent or police officer and did not desire that his identity be learned.
