William Bradford Hule has written a third article for "Look" magazine. The article appears in the issue dated April 15, 1869, but this issue was circulated on April 1, 1869. A review of the article reveals that James Farl Ray allegedly registered at the Travelodge Motel, Five Points, Pirmingham, Alabama, on March 29, 1866; at a motel near Florence, Alabama, on April 1, 1868; and at a motel near Corinth, Mississippi, on April 2, 1868. It is to be noted that Ray, using the name Sarvey Lowmyer, negotiated the purchase of a rifle at the Acromarine Supply Company, Dirmingham, Alabama, on March 29 and 39, 1868. On April 3, 1868, he was registered at the Rebel Motel in Memphis, Tennessee.

In an effort to establish whether or not Ray was in contact with any individuals immediately prior to the assassination, appropriate investigation should be conducted by the Birmingham and Jackson Offices. It should be understood that there is to be no indication made whatsoever that the following investigation has any connection whatsoever with the case involving James Earl Ray.

Dirmingham and Jackson Cilicen should make inquiries of the motels in or near the cities indicated above to determine the identities of individuals registered during the period March 20 to April 3, 1968. Efforts should be made to identify all individuals listed, as well as

obtaining descriptions and registrations for the automobiles of such persons. A review of such records might indicate whether any one individual might have accompanied May or been in contact with him during this period. Fertinent or questionable registration records should be obtained if possible for examination by the FBI Laboratory.

Memphis should insure that the Bureau is kept currently advised of pertinent developments in this case, particularly all aspects of court action since the death of Judge Battle on March 31, 1969.

Referenced Buairtel reviewed an article by WILLIAM BRADFORD HUIE, in the 4/15/69 issue of "Look" magazine, which alleged RAY stayed at a motel near Corinth, Miss., on 4/2/68.

In an effort to determine if RAY was in contact with any individuals immediately prior to the assassination, the Bureau directed those offices to determine the identities of individuals registered in motels in those cities 3/29/68 to 4/3/68 and to obtain descriptions and registrations of automobiles used by them. It was hoped a review of motel records might indicate whether any of such individuals might have accompanied, or been in contact with, RAY during this period.

It was emphasized no indication was to be made that the requested investigation was in any way connected with the case involving RAY.

Referenced Jackson airtel set forth identities of numerous persons registered at motels in or near Corinth. Miss., during the pertinent period, and requested:

- (1) Their names be checked thru office indices.
- (2) They be identified thru appropriate credit and criminal record checks.

Government Admits FBI Altered Wiretapping Log Of King-Clay

WASHINGTON (AP) - The see the original transcripts. Epgovernment has admitted the FBI changed—without informing the Justice Department-a recorded log of wiretapped conversations involving former heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay.

In disclosing this to Clay's attorneys, the department Monday contended it did not learn of selves. the FBI action until June 13, several days after copies of what were purported to be the original logs were filed in U.S. District Court in Houston.

John S. Martin Jr. and Michael T. Epstein, who are handling the government's case against Clay, said the original record contained the notation, "Sum up in memo."

But the hand-written phrase was blanked out on documents submitted to the court concerning a Sept. 4, 1964, telephone conversation between Clay and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The discrepancy came to light when Clay's lawyers, unsatisfied with copies, demanded to

Government attorneys were unhappy about the affair, expressing concern that the differences would cast doubts on the validity of the documents them-

No reason was given for the omission. The FBI had no comment. And special FBI Agent Robert R. Nichols, who supervised the tap on King's telephone, claimed in an affidavit the notation was of no consequence.

"When I initially scanned this log," Nichols said, "I made the handwritten notation 'sum up in memo,' as a flag to myself to consider this as an item to be placed in memorandum form.

As summarized in the record. the conversation which Nichols considered unimportant was one in which Clay advised King to "watch out for them whities."

Clay, sentenced to five years' imprisonment for refusing induction into the armed forces, is seeking further federal court hearings in an effort to overturn his conviction.

Meanwhile, Clay's lawyers contended at the Houston hearing the government took positions which "test the naivete of even their most willing believers."

"In short," they said, "the gap of credibility in this case now approaches a crater."

It reported the substance of a conversation Evans had just had with Kennedy in which the Attorney General asked about the feasibility of installing electronic devices on King's telephones. King headed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

Concerned About Allegations

Kennedy, according to the Evans memo, was concerned about reports that King was a student of Marxism, that he was associating with a New York attorney with known Communist connections, but that he did not openly espouse Marxism because of his religious beliefs. The Evans memorandum indicated Kennedy wanted to know if it was technically feasible to use electronic devices to prove or disprove these allegations.


