"If McCarthy is nominated ... I think they will kill him in September or October." Garrison

(The following is an exclusive interview conducted over the telephone between New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison and myself on Thursday, July 4.)

FREE PRESS: What is the current status of the Clay Shaw case, now that the Federal Court has halted the proceedings?

J.G. There's no change. I think the Federal Courts are trying to think of reasons to justify what they call an "evidentiary hearing." If they think of any, it would have to be fictitious, because they have no jurisdiction whatsoever. But, in a sense, you've got to understand the problem of the Federal Government, because the Federal Government is so clearly involved in the assassination of John Kennedy you really can't expect them to be very enthusiastic about a trial by some independent jurisdiction. The Central Intelligence Agency participated in the assassination of John Kennedy, and the present federal administration helped them conceal the evidence. So, they are inventing new law as they go along, and they will do whatever had to be done to try to prevent the truth from coming out.

F.P. What about legal proceedings are you in now? Are you appealing to a higher court?

J.G. Oh no. The Federal District Court has not even made a ruling yet. I think they're just trying to think of some kind of reason to justify what they're doing.

F.P. And you have no recourse until they make a ruling, then?

J.G. No. That's right. Theoretically we have recourse, but then that would be to another federal

when you look at it closely enough, the "lone assassin" is a direct employee of the CIA, as Oswald was, or is a professional sharpshooter for the CIA, as was the case with Martin Luther King's assassin, although whether it was Galt or not isn't clear. I doubt that it was, but that doesn't matter. It's a detail. He appears to have been used as a decoy, but again, that's a detail.

F.P. What about Sirhan Sirhan? Whatever connections he has with the CIA seem to have been very carefully covered, or insulated, as they call it. Do you know anything about Sirhan?

J.G. Well, I don't want to go into too much detail about that because then the district attorney and Los Angeles authorities might feel that I've interfered with their case, so I won't do that, but I'll put it in general terms. The CIA is capable of operating through many fronts. The difference in detail in this case appears to be

been killed at any exit. Once he won, he had very little chance to survive.

F.P. You feel, then, that the people in power in this country are fully determined to take over the Pacific basin, and anybody who interferes or seriously threatens to interfere, is going to be killed.

J.G. Paul, they took over the country in November, 1963. I think it's obvious, and you don't have to be a military strategist to see that they intend to take over Asia. And if anybody gets in their way, he'll be killed. If there's a compromise of some sort in Viet Nam, then they'll proceed from Laos. But whether it's the jungles they want in China, or the airfields in China, it's obvious that their attitude is that nobody is going to stop them.

ture that we have today ... But I'll sum it up by saying, yes, if Senator McCarthy continues to develop popular support, then the Central Intelligence Agency will attempt to kill him. But it will be done again by a "lone assassin" and someone will announce almost immediately that he has "leftist leanings" or is a Marxist, or a Communist.

F.P. What significance do you see in Warren's resignation?

J.G. Paul, I don't know enough about that to make a comment.

F.P. What about your investigation into the John Kennedy assassination? Are you check-mated or will you continue?

J.G. We're not check-mated in the sense of stopping. To be perfectly candid, we're kind of frustrated by the effective use of power by the federal government, not merely here, where it comes to the surface, but in many other areas ... but I would sum it up by saying that the only way that they can completely stop us would be by finding a way to kill me or remove me from office. Otherwise, we won't stop. There's not that much left. All that's left are details. We found out what happened, and I know that the federal government knows that we know what happened, and it's just a matter of accumulating more details.

F.P. Have you had any direct threats or warnings that if you proceed any farther, you will be stopped from proceeding any farther, by removing you from this world?

J.G. We have had threats, but I disregard them because they are irrelevant. The people who are doing the killing, the professional assassins of our CIA don't threa-

that I would not say "emissaries" because they did not come straight from Robert Kennedy to me carrying red briefcase or anything like that—in other words, it was a very loose liaison. I had several friends who happened to be close to him, as a result of their occasional visits down here, it became clear that he did understand what happened, and was determined to do nothing about it until he got in position where he could do something about it. Everything the Mark Lane says is true, essentially, except that I would not use the word "emissaries," because that implies somebody leaving with a specific mission. It was more casual than that. But otherwise, it's quite correct. There is no doubt that he had an understanding, but it appears that I said nothing about it to anybody. I think that he was a very strong-willed man, with a lot of integrity and he approached this in a rather unusual way. I think he decided himself that he was going to do something about it but say nothing to anybody until the opportunity

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F.P. What about Bradley? Are you going to be able to get him down there for trial?
J.G. I don't know enough about what's happening there in California to make any comment. I try not to speculate where I don't have any data.

F.P. What parallels and similarities, if any, do you see between the John Kennedy assassination, and those of Martin Luther King, and Bobby Kennedy?

J.G. Paul, there's no mystery about what's happening. I think most of the people in the country sense it, although every magazine and all the slick news media pretend that this is the best of all possible worlds, and that there's nothing to worry about. What's happening is that we're in the midst of a counter-revolution, which began on Nov. 22, 1963. John Kennedy ... by an accident we elected a man as president who was concerned about the human race. Not just the human race in America, but the human race all over. And, beginning in the fall of '62 he was in effect, warring against the

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The point about John Kennedy's assassination is that he was dismantling the war machine, and he was ending the Cold War, and he said he was going to "break up the CIA into ten thousand little pieces." So they tore his head off. Because they don't intend to be broken up. The war machine is like a living organism which will not tolerate anybody getting in its way. It's like a juggernaut, sitting in the woods. And once anybody finds his way to the juggernaut, then they have to be killed, so they can't tell anybody else about it.

F.P. Do you think that McCarthy is in danger of getting zapped?

J.G. I think that McCarthy is one of the most impressive men to run for president in my time because of his uncomplicated honesty. And I think also that if he continues to develop, and continues to pick up support, and if it becomes apparent that he will become the next president, for example, if he is nominated by the Democratic Party, which I would like to see—that would be in August—then I think they will kill him in September or October ... unless he is able to solve the problem with sufficient bodyguards. Now, they have one problem there—they can't use ambushes any more. They used one with John Kennedy, firing from four points,

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J.G. We have had threats, but I disregard them because they are irrelevant. The people who are doing the killing, the professional assassins of our CIA don't threaten. For example, John Kennedy didn't receive any threats. The threats that we receive, and we've had some, I regard as threats from nuts. We don't pay any attention to them. The ones you have to be concerned about are the ones who don't threaten—they just kill.

F.P. What about Mark Lane's story in our paper about the two emissaries from Robert Kennedy, who approached you and said that Kennedy was aware of what happened and if elected president, intended to vigorously go after the people responsible for his brother's assassination. Could you tell us about that?

J.G. Well, that is correct, except

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The counter-revolution began on Nov. 22, 1963, when his head was torn off by this operation which was set up by the Central Intelligence Agency. The counter-revolution is continuing, that's all. They are eliminating, one by one, anyone who is a leader who is concerned about the human race, against the military power structure in the country, or anybody who is eloquent enough—anybody who stands between them and the project of war in Asia, is being eliminated, one by one. John Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Robert Kennedy ... It's a new political instrument which America really developed and basically it's the same technique. You always end up with an individual who represented the human race, against this fantastic power structure, and he ends up dead. And there is a "lone assassin." All the other differences are difference of detail.

F.P. A lone assassin with leftist leanings ...

J.G. In quotes, yes. Actually

that, the Central Intelligence Agency has over 500 fronts, and they have no problem in motivating individuals. It can be done by force or many other methods. The family can be killed if he doesn't act.

Undoubtedly, every pathway Robert Kennedy had to pass. If he won the election in California, was covered with some individual who was going to kill him, and yet was a member of a front, and was not necessarily conscious of the fact that the front was an instrument for the Central Intelligence Agency.

It would have been between Kennedy and McCarthy. If he had continued, the real possibility was there. This power structure is not greatly different from the power structure that took control of Germany in the thirties, the Nazi power structure, except that it's much more sophisticated. And it's essentially invisible. And the one thing that they will not tolerate is a president who is concerned about the human race, and is not interested in the thrust for empire which now guides this country. If Robert Kennedy had lost in California, he'd be alive now. But having won, he would have

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You always come back to the analogy of Nazi Germany. After Hitler Germany finally came to ruin, which is ultimately what happens when a government feels it has the right to lie to the people, and the right to murder and to initiate war with no real reason ... AFTERWARD, you could find a number of Germans who could tell you what really happened, in government. But before then, you couldn't find any. We have the same situation now, because the power of the government is so strong, and their willingness to resort to murder immediately, as retaliation, is so evident, that nobody will say anything. The major instrument being used now by the United States Government for political control now actually is murder.

F.P. What about the average guy, what would you say to him? What can he do?

J.G. The guy on the street understands, further more, that the Warren Report was a fraud. His common sense tells him that. But somewhere along the line, apathy has developed. I think it may be that Congress had been removed from his access, perhaps by a process of taking aside individual congressmen and finding out what they wanted, whether they wanted a bridge here or a post office there. Theoretically, Congress is the solution. The man on the street knows that something is wrong, and he is represented in Washington by a congressman. Congress should take action. This is a federal problem. Actually, no intelligent man whose jurisdiction is limited to a county can pretend that he can solve the problem completely. All I can claim to be doing is to try to keep the door open until enough people in the country can see the terrible thing that is happening to America. The real solution lies in an honest, objective federal investigation. Theoretically, that can be brought about by the man on the street who recognizes something is wrong, causing Congress to act. But Congress does not act. If the man on the street can see what's wrong, as 75% by now do, then the men in Congress can see what's wrong. But they're like while the leaders of our country while the leaders of our country — at least the surviving members of the human race — are being killed, they continue to



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
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F.P. Do you plan to indict any other people in the conspiracy to assassinate John Kennedy?
J.G. I can only say this in a general way — remember that we have jurisdictional problems. All I have jurisdiction in, really, is Orleans Parish. And except in a rare case when somebody who participated in the operation came into Orleans Parish, then I don't have jurisdiction. Most of the people engaged in the operation to kill John F. Kennedy did not come into New Orleans. Although New Orleans was a city very much

vice, every major element of the press, and they have control. So, I really don't know if we can solve the problem of control. We're going to keep trying to. From my point of view, it's better to have no government at all than to live under a government under which truth and justice have no meaning. I would rather live in the woods and eat berries, or live in a cave, much rather than live in a government such as you had in Hitler's Germany, and such as you have in the United States today, in which truth and justice have no meaning. I'm not as confident now as I used to be, that we will be able (a) to have the trial and (b) to communicate all the facts to the 200,000,000 people we have in the country. They have such tremendous communications, in terms of ability to stop the trial, and in terms of ability to

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

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Warren Panel Critic Scores Garrison

Edward Jay Epstein, one of the first best-selling critics of the Warren commission's investigation of President Kennedy's assassination, has written a 25,000-word attack on District Attorney Jim Garrison's inquiry and charges of conspiracy in the President's death.

A Federal judge has currently stayed the New Orleans District Attorney's prosecution of Clay L. Shaw, a businessman arrested March 1, 1967, on such charges, pending a ruling on defense complaints of "misuse and abuse" of the district attorney's powers.

Mr. Epstein's report said that "in the year I have been studying Garrison's investigation and have had access to his office, the only evidence I have seen or heard about that could connect Clay Shaw with the assassination has been fraudulent — some devised by Garrison himself and some cynically culled from criminals or the emotionally unstable."

The new report by Mr. Epstein, whose book, "Inquest," first came out in June, 1966, was published yesterday in the issue of The New Yorker magazine dated July 13.

In Cambridge, Mass., the 32-year-old author, who is teaching urban politics at Harvard University this summer, said he was expanding it for December publication by Viking Press as "The Tangled Web."

In New Orleans, Mr. Garrison was reported as not immediately available for comment yesterday when an effort was made to reach him by telephone.

'Prepared to Believe'

Mr. Epstein wrote that he had been "prepared to believe" that District Attorney Garrison's claims might have some substance "when the Shaw arrest was first announced. This was because of his own view that Chief Justice Earl Warren's commission had been constrained by "bureaucratic pressures" and "limits of time."

He said he had been welcomed by Mr. Garrison in mid-April, 1967, and, with Jones Harris, a New York independent investigator, he had been "allowed to examine objects seized from Mr. Shaw's home and designated 'evidence'" despite a judge's order against disclosures.

Mr. Harris, he said, found a five-digit number, "19016," in a Shaw address book identical to a number preceded by two Cyrillic letters in an address book owned by Lee Harvey Oswald, the man the Warren Commission concluded was the sole Kennedy assassin. He charged that Mr. Garrison had "constructed a piece of evidence" by an alleged code seeking to link the two.

The case on which a three-judge panel ruled Mr. Shaw could be held for trial, Mr. Epstein wrote, "was based on the allegations of two witnesses who had both waited four years before disclosing uncorroborated stories and who, both subsequently cast considerable doubt on their own testimony."

Raymond Russo, who asserted he attended a meeting with men he identified as Mr. Shaw, Oswald and David W. Ferrie, now dead, discussing the planned assassination, and Vernon E. Bundy, who testified he saw Mr. Shaw meet Oswald on a lakefront.

A 'Pyrrhic Victory'

Mr. Epstein asserted a perjury conviction of Dean Andrews, a lawyer, was a "Pyrrhic victory" for Mr. Garrison because of a prosecution charge that Mr. Andrews had "foisted on the world" the name of "Clay Bertrand." This, Mr. Epstein said, raised a question as to Mr. Russo's identifying Mr. Shaw by that name after his memory had been jogged by "truth serum."

Mr. Epstein wrote that Mr. Garrison's statements had built up to a theory of a 16-man team of assassins at five spots. The sixteenth, Mr. Epstein asserted, was "extrapolated from two photographs" interpreted by Mr. Garrison as showing that a .45-caliber bullet that killed the President wound up in matted grass. He said the prosecutor had cited this to support "the theory that an assassin was in a sewer."

A man Mr. Garrison theorized as diverting attention from the assassins by simulating an epileptic fit has been identified, Mr. Epstein said, as an employee of The Dallas Morning News who fainted 20 minutes before the Kennedy motorcade arrived.

Analyzes 'Eight Items'

Mr. Epstein quoted Thomas Bethell, a Garrison aide, as reporting "concern among the staff members" when Mr. Garrison ordered a warrant of arrest for conspiracy against Edgar Eugene Bradley, a Los Angeles radio fund-raiser. Mr. Epstein said "there was nothing in the files on Bradley except [an] anonymous letter" alleging that a Eugene Bradley once made "inflammatory comments on President Kennedy."

Mr. Epstein analyzed "eight specific items" that he said Mr. Garrison had cited as linking the Central Intelligence Agency

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with a Kennedy assassination conspiracy.

Three of these, he said, were "unverifiable" claims of (1) a picture of Oswald with an agent in Mexico City, (2) files on Mr. Ferrie and (3) Kennedy autopsy pictures; and "other vital evidence."

A fourth item, he held, was a misinterpretation of a document title to suggest that Oswald was involved in a spy plane project. A fifth, he went on, was a contention that the C.I.A. had destroyed a memorandum on Oswald's activities, although a copy appears in Volume XVIII of the Warren documents.

A sixth item — the contention that Oswald had a "C.I.A. babysitter" — refers, Mr. Epstein asserted, to a New Orleans order of Jan. 20, 1961 for 10 trucks for a purchaser named "Oswald," accompanied by a "Joseph Moore." Mr. Epstein said Lee Harvey Oswald was then in the Soviet Union.

A seventh item—a reference to a "C.I.A. 'courier'" involves a convicted bank embezzler whose story of delivering \$50,000 to "a dead ringer for Oswald" in Mexico in 1962 has been rejected by the Garrison staff, Mr. Epstein said.

And the eighth item, Mr. Epstein said, was Federal refusal to provide Mr. Garrison with "any information" on a C.I.A. assassination role.

Assertions Challenged

Mr. Epstein accused Mr. Garrison of giving "false or capricious" examples of alleged news suppression. As for a statement that there were no Oswald fingerprints on the alleged assassination gun, Mr. Epstein said that there were fingerprints that "could not be positively identified" but that a palmprint on the barrel's underside had been identified by three experts as Oswald's.

An assertion that "nitrate tests exonerated Lee Oswald" was "questionable," Mr. Epstein said. He reported paraffin casts found nitrates on both Oswald's hands although not on his cheek and none on a Federal Bureau of Investigation agent who had fired the rifle three times.

A contention that it was "virtually impossible for Oswald" to go down four floors before being seen after the assassination was "specious," Mr. Epstein said, because the time was uncertain and "could have been as long as five minutes."

Mr. Epstein said that Mr. Garrison had charged in a Texas telecast that President Johnson had "issued the Executive order concealing vital evidence for 75 years." Mr. Epstein asserted there was "no such Executive order," although many investigative files had been withheld for this period as exceeding "the lifespan of persons likely to be mentioned."

As for the Warren commission documents, Mr. Epstein said McGeorge Bundy, acting for the President, had asked the Archivist of the United States to waive the 75-year ban "wherever possible."

He said virtually all documents that could be declassified by Bundy guidelines had been opened to public scrutiny by the time Mr. Garrison started his investigation.
