SHOULD the murder indictment be quashed, the prosecution would have to start all over again. Long weeks spent in picking a trial jury would be washed

But no one expects this to happen, least of all the defense. The move is being made primarily to pile up points for an appeal if Sirhan should be convicted. Asked what he'd do if the indistment were tossed out, Cooper laughed and told reporters: "God forbid. I don't know."
