Introduction

THE hieroglyphic inscriptions on the temples of Egypt, though in existence for centuries, remained a mystery to modern man until the discovery and deciphering of the Rosetta Stone, which became a key to their meaning. The Rosicrucian Order, though in active existence for centuries, is also not known to some persons, institutions, or organizations as it should be, because of the lack, heretofore, of a concise work referring to its objects, practices, and history. A number of recognized literary reference sources, such as the encyclopedias, refer to the organization, but they are not always available and it is for this reason that this brochure is prepared. It is hoped that it will also be a key to the solution of any mysteries which, it may seem to some, surround the world-wide activities of the Rosicrucian Order.

This brochure has been published with a realization of the need of editors, publishers, authors, and research workers, for brief, relevant facts pertaining to the subject of The Rosicrucians. Therefore, all unessential information has been deleted and elaboration has been left to the larger bound works on the subject. What Are the Rosicrucians?

 ∇

Nature of the Organization

The Rosicrucian Order is, broadly, a world-wide fraternal organization, established and operating on a lodge system. It expounds a system of metaphysical and physical philosophy intended to awaken the dormant, latent faculties of the individual whereby he may utilize to a better advantage his natural talents and lead a happier and more useful life. It accomplishes this end by a method of personal instruction and guidance. The member is taught the significance and application of the Cosmic and natural laws which are found manifest in the universe around him and in himself. It unites, into one livable philosophy, metaphysical idealism and such practical sciences as physics, chemistry, biology, physiology, and psychology. It also seeks, by its educational campaign, to rid society of the enslaving influence of superstition.

The Order, throughout the world, is divided into jurisdictions, in each of which there are established Grand Lodges with temples of instruction. The Supreme Temple for the international jurisdiction of The Americas, British Commonwealth, France, Germany, Switzerland, Sweden, and Africa is located in San Jose, California. (For history, see page 8.)

What Does the Name Mean?

The word "Rosicrucian" is the Anglicized form of the original Latin name of the Order-Rosae Crucis, which means of the rosy cross. The name is derived from the Order's centuries-old symbol-the cross and a single red rose. Although the symbol consists of a cross, it has no sectarian or strictly religious significance, but an allegorical meaning of its own.

"Rosicrucian" is pronounced: Ro'zi-kru'shan.

What Does A.M.O.R.C. Mean?

The initials, A. M. O. R. C., are an abbreviation of the words, "Ancient Mystical Order Rosae Crucis," which is the complete name of the Order throughout the world. In Latin, the full title of the Order was originally: Antiquus Arcanus Ordo Rosae Rubeae et Aureae Crucis. In various lands at various times the Order has been known by slightly different abbreviations of the original Latin title. In modern times the initials, A.M.O.R.C., usually follow the popular phrase, "the Rosicrucian Order," to designate authenticity.

Is It a Religion?

The Rosicrucian Order is absolutely NOT a religion. It is nonsectarian in every respect. As its membership is world-wide, it of course includes persons of every creed and denomination, as does any other world-wide fraternity of a cultural nature. Many leading clergymen of Protestant denomination, rabbis, and priests are members; but the Order itself, in the past and at present, is free of religious alliances. Although its ethics adhere to the principles of Christianity, it must not be considered a religious movement or a Christian sect. The teachings do not interfere with the religious freedom of its members.

Is It a Commercial Enterprise?

The Supreme Grand Lodge of AMORC (The Rosicrucian Order) is incorporated in the State of California, and its subordinate bodies are incorporated elsewhere, as nonprofit corporations. No funds of the Order inure to the personal benefit of any officer or member. There are no stockholders or shareholders, and all funds are held in trust for purposes as defined by the Constitution and Statutes. The nonprofit status of the Rosicrucian Order is recognized by the United States Department of Internal Revenue, and in similar departments in other nations.

What Does It Teach?

An individual listing of the subjects included in the membership curriculum would be too lengthy for the space provided here. In main, it includes such topics as the mysteries of time and space; the human consciousness; the nature of matter; perfecting the physical body; the effect of light, color, and sound upon mind and body; the ancient philosophies; development of will; human emotions and instincts, and their relation to personality; important discoveries in Rosicrucian chemistry and physics; explanation of the phenomena of intuition, etc.

The organization maintains its own editorial and research departments, composed of men and women of its membership who have skill and training in specialized fields of science and literature, as well as being well versed in Rosicrucian principles. The instructions are either delivered orally in temples of the Order to the members, or sent privately to them in manuscript form. The subjects are accompanied by experiments which the member must conduct in order to remove the material from the realm of theory and make it entirely practical and applicable, by demonstration, to his personal life. Highly speculative, fantastic, or improbable subject matter is not included in the teachings of the Rosicrucians.

Who May Become Members?

Any law-abiding citizen of either sex and over twenty-one years of age, of good repute and having a firm conviction in a Supreme Being, is eligible for membership in the Grand Lodge of the Rosicucian Order regardless of creed or financial status. Thus, the organization includes in its membership a cross section of all classes of people. Its membership includes manual laborers seeking to better themselves, and also prominent businessmen, directors of industries, physicians, attorneys, scientists, artists, editors, educators, and authors, who find the teachings stimulating and very livable.

Those desiring membership may write to the Rosicrucian Order at its Grand Lodge in San Jose, California, requesting free literature which fully explains membership and its benefits.

What Rosicrucians are NOT

 ∇

The Rosicrucian Order (AMORC) IS independent. It never was and is not a part of or sponsored by any other movement or organization. It has at times during the centuries of its existence entered into a federation of orders or fraternities of like nature, but it has never submerged its individuality or forfeited its independent functioning. Regardless of the similarity that some persons believe exists between the honorable Freemasonic Order and the Rosicrucian Order (AMORC), there is, in fact, no relationship between the two orders.

The Rosicrucian Order does not teach, endorse, or practice astrology, fortunetelling, crystal gazing, or any past or present superstitions, or similar popular pseudo-scientific practices.

The Order makes no demands upon its members to conduct themselves in any manner that would cause public ridicule or condemnation. The members are not required to dress, eat, or act differently from any intelligent and morally responsible man or woman in conducting his or her ordinary affairs. They resort to no practices or rites which in any sense are injurious to health, family relationships, or morals.

No Political Affiliations. The Rosicrucian Order (AMORC) is nonpolitical, and not aligned or associated with any movement, society, or group having political activities. Political affiliations are considered to be the prerogative of the individual member and not a matter for intervention or counsel by the Order.

The following, however, is ascertained from each member who desires affiliation with the Rosicrucian Order: "Are you doing your best to be a good and useful citizen and to obey the laws of the country in which you live?" Also, the Rosicrucian Oath of Membership has for many years exacted the promise—"that I will honor and respect the flag of my country and the country in which I live; that I will never be guilty of treason; that I will be a good and useful citizen contributing to the advancement and welfare of the country in which I enjoy the privilege of being a resident."

History of the Rosicrucians

Traditional History

Traditionally, the Rosicrucian Order traces its origin to the mystery schools or secret schools of learning established during the reign of Thutmose III, about 1500 B. C., in Egypt. Though he devoted himself seriously to an investigation of "the mysteries"-in other words, natural phenomena-Thutmose III still clung to the ancient religions of the period. His descendent, Akhnaton, 1355 B.C., known as the heretic king, also became leader of the mystery schools; but, being extremely progressive, he abolished the polytheistic religions of the time to advance in their stead the world's first doctrine of monotheism. The Rosicrucians look upon Akhnaton as their traditional first Grand Master.

From Egypt, the secret teachings of the brotherhood spread into Greece, and thence into Rome. During the Middle Ages they were concealed under various names due to circumstances of the times.

Chronological Records.

Chronologically, the Order is mentioned as far back as 1115 A. D., in a book of the collection of Brother Omnis Mariar in Germany. It rose to considerable prominence during the Sixteenth Century when, following the invention of the printing press. a small pamphlet entitled The Fama Fraternitatis was issued and given wide circulation. The authorship of the Fama has often been erroneously attributed to Johann Valentin Andrea (1586-1654). The pamphlets were part of a campaign for the revival of the Order. The Order first came to America in 1694, locating in what is now Fairmount Park. Philadelphia.

For a detailed history of the Order, refer to the fourteenth edition of the Encyclopaedia Britannica; New Standard Encyclopedia; and Rosicrucian Questions and Answers with Complete History of the Order, by Dr. H. Spencer Lewis, available in public

libraries.

Current Rosicrucian **Activities**

Rose-Croix University

The Rosicrucian Order maintains, as part of its cultural program, what is known as the Rose-Croix University. The University is located in Rosicrucian Park, San Jose, California. The University is divided into three distinct colleges: The College of Fine and Mystic Arts, The College of Mundane and Arcane Science, and the College of Humanities.

The Rose-Croix University building contains wellequipped modern laboratories. The faculty members have academic degrees from world-recognized universities in their chosen fields of teaching. Students from all over the world attend the University's special semester. The University is strictly a noncommercial venture.

International Board of Lectureship

A trained lecturer, with sound motion-picture equipment and films and scientific devices to demonstrate the Order's teachings, personally visits countries in which the organization is active. In each city, lectures and demonstrations are given, not only to the membership of the Order, but to the general public as well, without charge. The lecturer is a part of the International Board of Lectureship of the Rosicrucian Order.

Support of Public Libraries

Public libraries in the Americas and many libraries in Europe receive one or more of the large, bound, Rosicrucian philosophical works gratis. As readers' demands increase, additional copies are sent without cost to the library. A number of the books have been translated into several languages, and Braille.

Rosicrucian Science Museum and Planetarium

The Rosicrucian Science Museum, located in the Planetarium building in Rosicrucian Park, San Jose, California, and built at considerable cost, includes a series of exhibits to demonstrate fundamental laws of the physical sciences. It was one of the first science museums of its kind in the western United States. Here, instruments are arranged in order according to the spectrum of energy, progressing from the lower rates of vibration upward in the scale of manifestation. The visitor presses a button, automatically operating equipment for illustrating the principle explained on a placard within the case. A model of sound waves in slow motion, an electronic picture of sound vibrations, electric generation, object suspended in space, mechanical rotation produced by heat, and the mystery of black light are only a few of the exhibits in this growing institution.

The Planetarium building also houses a modern air-conditioned amphitheater called the "Theater of the Sky," portraying the greatest drama of all the ages. Astronomical mysteries, present in the sky, are simply revealed for both young and old. The building includes a seismograph for recording earthquakes, a Cosmic ray coincidence counter, a uranisphere, and many other scientific instruments.

Egyptian, Oriental Museum and Art Gallery

The Rosicrucian Egyptian, Oriental Museum is the largest museum devoted to Egyptian antiquities in western United States and is a member of the American Association of Museums. It contains a collection of several thousand exhibits from all parts of the Orient and from interesting centers of ancient civilizations. The exhibits consist of Egyptian mummies of human beings, animals, and birds; statuary, jewelry, utensils, clothing, and works of art of vanished races. The Museum also contains the only full-sized exact reproduction of an ancient Egyptian rock tomb to be seen in America—such a tomb as one sees in the sandstone cliffs on the west bank of

the Upper Nile. Its collection has been secured from leading museums of the world. Models of the Great Pyramid, King Tutankhamen's mummy case, and other objects of historical importance enchant the visitor. A prominent art gallery in San Jose is maintained here. Outstanding exhibits are made available to the public.

Admission to the Museum is FREE to the public as well as to members of the Rosicrucian Order. It is visited annually by 120,000 persons, including school and college groups.

- More foreign money orders are received by AMORC monthly than by any other institution between San Francisco and Los Angeles.
- Over 6,000,000 pieces of literature are mailed to all parts of the world annually by AMORC.
- AMORC maintains the only public, free museums in San Jose-the Science museum, and the only strictly Egyptian and Oriental museum on the Pacific Coast. A modern art gallery is included.
- At every Rosicrucian Convention nearly all states in the Union, the provinces of Canada, and several foreign countries are represented.
- If all the 7,120,000 sheets of letter-size stationery used by AMORC in one year were laid end to end, they would form a path of paper from New York City to Kansas City, or 1,236 miles.
- The number of readers of magazines and newspapers in which AMORC advertisements appear monthly is in the tens of millions or exceeds the entire population of many countries.
- The Reading Mail Department of AMORC reads 7,000,000 words monthly, or the equivalent of 160 standard-sized volumes of 300 pages each, of approximately 145 words to the page.






THE ROSICRUCIAN EGYPTIAN AND ORIENTAL MUSEUM AND ART GALLERY






ROSICRUCIAN RESEARCH LIBRARY




LECTURE AND DEMONSTRATION HALL







THE IMPOSING EXTERIOR ENTRANCE TO THE SUPREME TEMPLE EDIFICE

In her articles, she claimed that she had a close association with Communists, which was not true. She stated, however, that she knew JOSEPH RUSSELL, who died of an overdese of heroin and was a Communist organizer.

Mrs. CESPEDES then advised that the night President JOHNSON amounced he was not seeking re-election, she went to a local bar to celebrate. While there, she was approached by two men. One showed her a gold badge and credentials in a black leather or plastic folder.

From the conversation, she got the impression that they were interviewing her because of the last letter she had written to Radio Station KIAC. One week later, she came to the conclusion that her house was under observation when she noticed three men in suits standing outside her home which is on a dead end street.

On an unremembered date, she telephonically contacted Navy Intelligence, San Diego, California, and talked with the duty officer, Mr. WINDERHALTER, because she thought perhaps Navy Intelligence had something to do with her being under observation.

Mrs. CESPEDES advised she has been working in the Senator KENNEDY campaign as a precinct worker and telephone worker. She advised that two weeks ago when Senator KENNEDY was in town, she attended the rally in San Ton Ysidro. While KENNEDY was speaking, she shouted, "We want justice for the dead President!" The crowd hushed and KENNEDY continued his speech. She followed KENNEDY to the airport had Friefly talked to him there. She said to him, "We know that the evidence of the killing of JOHN P. KENNEDY is in the Archives." KENNEDY repled, "Yes."

On the night of Sunday, June 2, 1968, she was working late at the KEHNEDY campaign headquarters in downtown San Diego. She noticed a strange man who she had seen often in campaign headquarters. He identified himself to her as HUGO ANOYES or HUGO ANORES.

That night about 9:30, she left the campaign headquarters and got her automobile from the U. S. Grant garage. As she was heading north on Highway 395 entering Balboa Park, she advised she is certain someone took a shot at her. She got out of her car and hid behind it. Two young men in a Volkswagen pulled up and attempted to start her car. A uniformed policeman arrived in a squad car. She advised him of what had happened and she stated she must have run over something.

When she arrived home she called the KENNEDY campaign headquarters and asked if anyone knew of or if there was a record of HUGO ANOYES. She was advised there was no record of this individual.

Mrs. CESPEDES advised that last week she wrote a letter to Corporal ROBERT D. CORNELL, Marine Serial No. 2270356. currently in Vietnam, MABS-12, ORD MAG-12, FPO, San Francisco, California 96502, in which she stated she feared for the life of Senator KRNNEDY.

Mrs. CESPEDES indicated she feels the individual known to her as HUGO AMOYES may have had something to do with her being shot at.

At 6:51 PM instant date MRS. FREDA BAKER, 2430 Calle Ouebrada, San Diego, California, telephone number 479-6903, telephonically contacted this office to furnish the following information.

MRS. BAKER advised that between 12:30 A.M. and 1:30 A.M. this date she and her two daughters were watching chanel 10. On this station newsman Sander VanOaker (ph) was interviewing a heavy Mexican-American girl who told him that she had been a group leader in the Kennedy campaign. This girl also told VanOaker that she had seen a young girl, of Spanish descent, running down some stairs at the rear of the location of the shooting. The girl was reported to have been yelling, "We shot him, We shot him:" This girl was follwood by a boy of similar coloring. MRS. BAKER went on to state that she had heard reports of one shot being fired and then shortly thereafter a series of shots and she feels that these other people explain the other shots, or shot. She advised that she has been watching television constantly since the shooting and all the reruns of VANOAKER's interviews stop with the person just before the girl in question.

MRS. BAKER made statements to the effect that she felt that it was more than one man and that she did not want to see the others get away "this time." She also stated that she had contacted several newscasters and television stations and told them of the above and that she had been told to contact this office.

At 7:10 pm this date, EDWARD ANDERSON, 8110 Binney Place, La Mesa, Calif., 466-1021, telephonically contacted this office and advised that he had seen an interview on television (Channel 10 in San Diego - NBC) early in the a.m. this date in regard to the shooting of Senator KENNEDY, et al, in Los Angeles.

ANDERSON stated that a young girl was being interviewed along with a Negro fellow and that several things that the girl told the interviewer were rather suspicious under the circumstances. They were as follows:

The girl stated that she was a Kennedy campaign worker and that she also attended Pasadena College (a Nazarene school) which is in the immediate vicinity of the subject SIRHAN's address on Howard St. in Los Angeles. ANDERSON stated that this school is a fundamentalist school and that they have a variety of way out beliefs.

According to ANDERSON, the girl was most explicit in describing the subject and his activities during the commotion. The girl also gave the impression that she was watching the subject run away from the area after the shooting, which would be physically impossible in such a confined and crowded area.

The girl stated that she left the immediate area of the shooting two or three times and on one occasion she left to call her mother in Ohio and advise her of the shooting of Senator KENNEDY. She then came back to the area inquiring as to who was shot.

The girl gave ANDERSON the impression that she was in some way more familiar with the subject than just a passing happenstance would indicate.

ANDERSON stated that his only reason for calling was to bring this information regarding this interview to the attention of the proper authorities and further advised that he thought that due to the nature of the information given during this interview, it was quite possible that the same information had already been given.

Mystery Woman Is Sought

EVENING TRIBUNE News Report

LOS ANGELES — The man accused of assassinating Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., was described today by acquaintances as honest, goodhearted and a hard worker.

But he was a fanatic when it came to discussion of religion and politics, they said.

His name is Sirhan Bishara Sirhan. He is 24.

Police say he is a cool, close-mouthed Jordanian who fired a bullet from close range into the brain of Kennedy.

Bulletin Issued

Los Angeles police have issued an all points bulletin for a woman sought in connection with the assassination. The bulletin said her identity was not known, described her as a white woman 23 to 27 years old.

Police said she was seen with Sirhan prior to the shooting and was clad at the time in a white dress with black polka dots.

Mayor Samuel Yorty told a news conference the assassin was stirred by biterness over the Middle East situation —

and was inflamed by Communists.

Head Injury Told
Sirhan apparently wrote
in a 9-by-12 inch notebook
about "the necessity to assassinate Sen. Kennedy before
June 5, 1968."

Many — neighbors, former employers and the authorities — say he hates Jews.

He hurt his head in a fall last year, says his mother.

"All I know is he is a pice kid," says one of his four four fromers.

The record says Sirhan is 5-feet-3, weighs about 120 pounds, has a swarthy complexion and wiry hair. He has been an exercise boy at a race track, wanted to be a jockey and worked in a health food store.

Charges Are Listed

He is under maximum security guard in a hospital ward at the Los Angeles County central jail, charged with six counts of assault with intent to commit murder.

Asst. Dist. Atty. William L. Ritzi said his office will ask the Los Angeles County Grand Jury to indict Sirhan on a charge of murder tomorrow.

Sirhan's index finger was broken and his left ankle sprained in a tussle that ended in his capture, seconds after Kennedy was shot early yesterday.

Attorney Is Refused Sirban has talked to police,

Sirhan has talked to police, but not about Kennedy or the shooting. Officers said he was advised of his rights, but didn't want an attorney. He refused to give officers his name.

Jordan and anti-Israel," said John Shear, who worked with Sirhan at Hollywood Park race track. "When there was trouble between Jordan and Israel, he would become inflamed."

"Sen. Kennedy said the other day he wanted to help Israel," said Sirhan's recent employer, John H. Weidner, 57, operator of a Pasadena health food store chain.

"So I was not surprised after he was shot that Sirhan's resentment had pushed him emotionally to do what he did."

M. Weidner Jr. said Sirhan told him he had to flee Jordan as a child and had seen Jews kill members of his family.

"He was not a citizen and didn't like the United States," Weidner said. "You had to be careful not to walk on his feet. He wanted you to respect him intellectually."

Called Good Student

Mrs. Elsie Boyko, who worked with Sirhan at the store, said he was "a hard worker, honest and goodhearted, but nonetheless a fanatic when it came to discussion of religion and politics."

High school classmates called him a good student and a polite one.

With permission from Sirhan's family, police recovered two notebooks from his room. They contain 18 to 20 pages of handwriting. Some in Arabic, most in English.

In a notation entered either May 17 or 18, the mayor said, Sirhan apparently wrote "a direct reference to the necessity to assassinate Sen. Kennedy before June 5, 1968."

Anniversary Cited

Kennedy was shot when June 5 was only a few minutes old. It was the first anniversary of the beginning of the six-day Arab-Israel war.

There's much scribbling, repeated phrases, many references to Kennedy.

"He does a lot of writing pro-Communist and anticapitalist, anti-United States." said Yorty. "Evidently he was quite pro-Arab in the Arab-Israeli matter."

"My son —it can't be. No. Oh; no," cried Mary Sirhan, when she learned her boy was arrested. Mrs. Sirhan is a housekeeper at a Presbyterian nursery school in Pasadena.

"Ever since he had a fall about a year ago, he hasn't been the same. I can't talk to him."

Mrs. Sirhan said her son fell from a horse and "hurt his head here." She pointed to her right temple.

"All I know is he is a nice kid," commented Said Sirhan, brother of the accused many

Father In Jordan 💢

In Israeli-occupied Jordan, Sirhan's father, Bishara Sirhan, 53, commented, "Lam very, very sorry. I brought up my children as best I could and to fear God. I am sorry for what happened."

The jobless father lives alone in a stone cottage in the sleepy mountain village of Taiyeba, overlooking Jericho.

Sirhan Bishara Sirhan was born March 19, 1944, in Jordan, territory seized by Israel during the lightning war last June.

As a child, Sirhan said he saw an Israeli soldier cut off the breast of an Arab woman with a bayonet.

The Sirhans came to the United States in 1957. They moved into a white frame house. The father returned to Jordan in 1961 after a family fight.

He is an American citizen and visited the United States twice after 1961.
