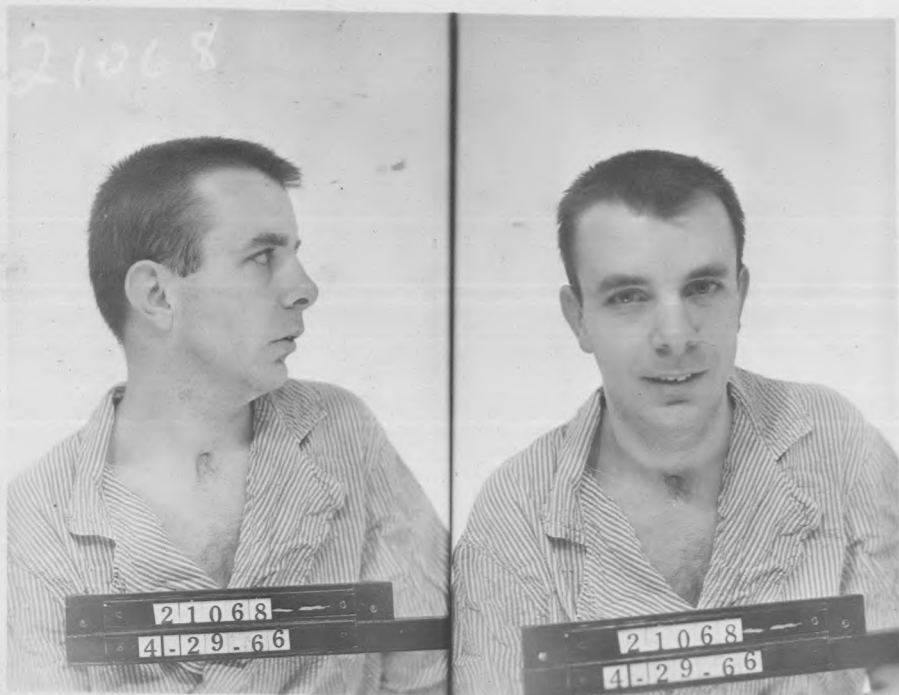



Each left his mark on the statement. Sorensen tried to soften the rupture with the President, while Lowenstein inserted passages conciliatory toward McCarthy.

Once the speech was delivered two immediate problems remained: the students and New York. The thousands of students who had gone to New Hampshire for McCarthy were certain to hate Kennedy for months. They picketed his New York office, denounced him in speeches, sent him hundreds of mocking telegrams. Through much of Sunday Kennedy brooded about this and was even apprehensive about what his reception might be the next day at two big Kansas universities.

But Kennedy's appeal to the young proved much deeper than even he dared to hope, and in Republican Kansas, too. He was still his brother's brother. He was against the war. He stammered and slouched like they did. They mobbed and crushed him, tore his shirt, kissed him and cheered his plea for "a new America."

The McCarthy students stand in the tradition of Adlai Stevenson—above pragmatic politics, literate,

moral, willing to lose for a noble cause. Kennedy's appeal cuts across a broader sampling—from apolitical girls infatuated with him, to tweedy careerists hot to go with a winner, to radicals who just want to end the war and build the "new America" he held out in Kansas.

Says a Kennedy strategist: "The students will be a key to the California primary. We'll get the students because we have the blacks and the Mexicans. Kennedy can get cheered walking in Watts; McCarthy can't. Floyd McKissick and Cesar Chavez will be for Kennedy. They'll get the kids, and the kids will be the energizing center of the campaign. Also, we can win, and you have to win in order to end the war."

Kennedy spent much of Wednesday of that first week trying to unite the Congo-like factions of the New York Democratic party behind his candidacy. The week before he had said, looking every bit as determined as his enemies imagine him, "I've got to have New York. It will be a terrific bloodbath. But I must have it."

Despite his fears, the leaders and bosses at the top hardly resisted. Said one county leader who dislikes Kennedy and is a hawk: "I do what I'm told. Even if he loses, Bobby is still the senator

from New York. He can always do more to me than the White House can do for me."

But the stubborn middle-class reformers did resist. They held firm for McCarthy, just as they held firm for Adlai Stevenson against John Kennedy in 1960. So Robert Kennedy, just as in 1964, is trapped with too much old-line support in New York and not enough reform backing.

The same ironic script is being played out in California, where the liberal, grass-roots California Democratic Council has endorsed McCarthy, and hard-nosed Assembly Speaker Jesse Unruh is leading the Kennedy charge. It is this unwanted situation that is reluctantly forcing Kennedy to shoot for an early knockout of McCarthy. His strategists believe that if they can beat McCarthy in Nebraska (May 14) and Oregon (May 28), McCarthy will be compelled to withdraw before the critical California primary on June 4 and the New York primary on June 18. Only that way can Kennedy tap his natural strength among the middle-class liberals.

But even if he wins every pri-

mary he enters, Kennedy will still be much less than halfway to the nomination. He is counting on the psychological impact of a California victory to jolt loose organization votes the President controls in states like Illinois, Pennsylvania and Ohio. If Kennedy can deny Johnson's renomination on the first ballot, he will pick up much of McCarthy's committed support on the second; certainly McCarthy's 72 Massachusetts votes.

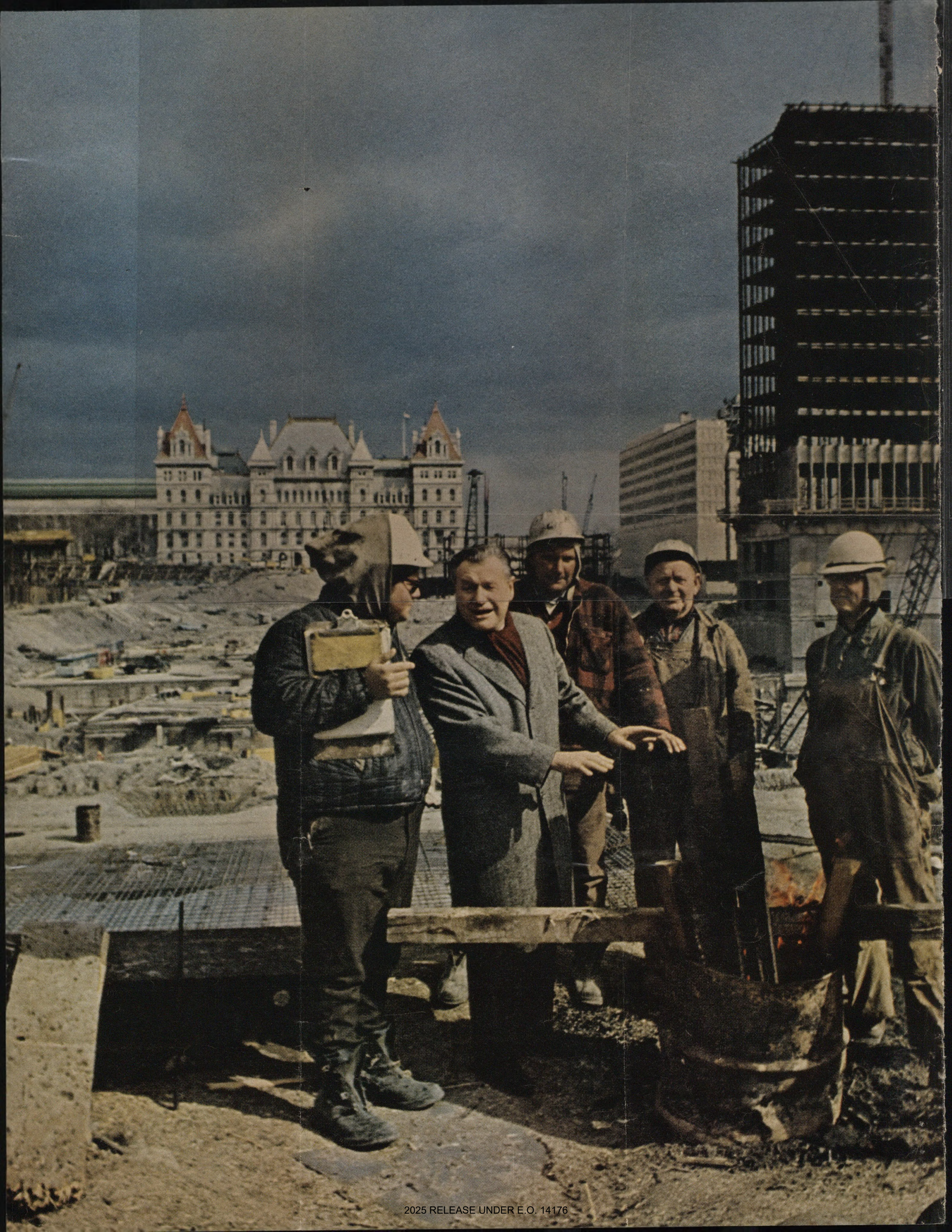
Beyond the problems Kennedy and his staff worked on in the first week of his campaign, there are these others: He remains hated in the South and is unpopular with business and labor leaders, with those working men who don't like his stand on civil rights and with the hawks. But he has one great asset, the luminous legend of the once and future Kennedy. Marching in Manhattan's St. Patrick's Day parade, he was predictably booed by war supporters and, just as predictably, applause smothered jeers when two persons—Jacqueline Kennedy and her son John Jr.—appeared at a window to blow him a kiss. It could have been a prophetic vignette.

A new tune called by the kids

The Insider Tells You Why Bobby Kennedy Will Be Murdered!

Before this decade is finished, Senator Robert F. Kennedy will be the second member of the Kennedy clan to fall under an assassin's bullet!

Wild imagination? We think not.

The same type of twisted mind that spilled the blood of John Fitzgerald Kennedy will entwine Bobby in its death plans. Both JFK and Bobby are public idols—worshipped by the young generation of intellectuals that will soon take over the nation's reins.

Bobby—as did Jack—will woo the under-30 crowd, a liberal, imaginative generation seeking alternatives to war and poverty. But in doing so, Robert Kennedy will lose the faith of the older generation. It will be a member of that generation that spills more Kennedy blood.

Before this decade is out, Robert Kennedy—and his attractive wife, Ethel—will be accused of selling out the country to Communism. Kennedy will be called a "nigger lover" and a "pinko." His own Congressmen will accuse him of "seeking a police state in this very country."

No Love For LBJ

You will hear some of these accusations as soon as 1968!

Just who are Robert Kennedy's enemies?

There is certainly no love lost between Bobby and President Johnson, who has already—in veiled form—blasted Kennedy's stand on "snooping and bugging" devices. However, though Johnson may be Bobby's greatest enemy, he is the last man in the world who would commit such an act. The President is a moral man who fights his battles in the political arena!

But there are others who don't.

While there may have been a foreign influence in the death of President Kennedy, the chances are high, however, that the death of Robert Kennedy will be a national affair—perpetrated by American killers!

Bitter Foes

The Insider, in a far-reaching investigation, sought to pinpoint the most bitter enemies of Robert Kennedy. The two best-known enemies of the young senator are James Hoffa and the Cosa Nostra. It is unlikely, though, that Hoffa himself would go as far as to order

the New York senator gunned down.

An FBI agent in Washington, formerly associated with John Kennedy, admitted the possibility that Bobby could be assassinated even more easily than was his brother:

"We were unable to fully protect Jack when he was in the White House. With Robert Kennedy, it's even worse. Bobby doesn't get the protection his brother had. But he does have a helluva lot more enemies.

Mafia Or Union?

"What I'm afraid will happen is that some wise guy will kidnap one of the Kennedy children—as a beginning. They'll hit as close as they can to this man!

"The Mafia or a labor union most likely will be behind it—although the rank-and-file union member won't know a thing about it. The average union member doesn't have anything against Kennedy. It's the bosses—the ones who get their toes stepped on.

"Whether Bobby was right or not, I'm not in a position to say. As an agent, I can't say much about what's going on between the Mafia and the labor unions.

"Both groups have some pretty high officials on their death list. Officially, of course, I can't name names. I can't say Bobby Kennedy is or is not a target. That's something you'll just have to guess at."

'Spoiled Brat'

The Insider turned to jailed Teamster boss James Hoffa for a look at what the short labor wizard thinks of his greatest adversary:

"Now, I regard Bobby Kennedy as a spoiled brat! He's just a brat that believes everybody is supposed to surrender and give in to whatever he wants, right or wrong. In my opinion, he prostitutes his oath of office, and he's violated the Constitution of the United States and is subject to go to jail.

"I question whether or not he has a single friend, and I question whether or not his associates are other than people who

have to associate with him, and who are involved in a question of their position. . .

"... he has used every underhanded tactic he could use, and the greatest public relations campaign in the world, to try to distort, deceive, and destroy James Hoffa."

As friends of Hoffa will tell you, when someone tries to destroy James Hoffa, Hoffa retaliates "with vigah" and closely follows the rule of "survival of the fittest." Whether Robert Kennedy will be the one to survive is very doubtful.

A close friend of the Kennedy family revealed that there have been hundreds of hate letters sent to the Kennedy home and office.

'Serious Threat'

"Bobby doesn't take many of them seriously. They're just the usual assortment of cranks and crackpots.

"But once in a while he runs across one that has to be a really serious threat. Sometimes the writer mentions certain plans or something of that nature pertaining to an upcoming trip—something only the Kennedys were supposed to have known.

"Someone hates Bobby with a passion! He knows it. He never lets Ethel see the letters. But I think she knows. Whoever it is that wants him dead has powerful contacts up on the Hill (Capitol Hill). Someday I'm afraid they'll succeed."

The weak spot of the Kennedy clan is their utmost trust in others.

It was a Thursday evening when Jack Kennedy said he did not want a top on the motorcade convertible. Yes, he said, he knew Dallas had spat upon Adlai Stevenson only a few weeks before. Yes, he had seen

the threat of death published in a Dallas newspaper.

Jack Kennedy had even comically acted out his own assassination—grinning childishly as he brandished a make-believe machine gun!

But John Kennedy belonged to the people. And the people belonged to him. They were one and the same.

Part Of People

Less than 24 hours later John F. Kennedy was dead.

Prior to November 22, Bobby Kennedy had been much the same way when it came to pleasing the public. Today that ardor has dampened only slightly. Bobby still likes the crowds, the cheers, and the noise. He is a part of the people. And the people are a part of him.

The bigness of the Kennedy heart was recently demonstrated by Ethel when she was taken to court for "stealing" a horse. The owner, Nicholas Zemo, told a jury of seven men that the horse was valued at \$50,000 because of the racing blood in his ancestry.

Ethel Kennedy told the same jury she found this so-called "prize race horse" starving and uncared-for and took it home to feed it. Five days later it died—of starvation.

White House Out!

When jurors heard that ancestors of Pande, the dead horse, "had never won a race," the case was dismissed.

This is the Kennedy heart. Someday soon, for Robert F. Kennedy, that heart will stop beating. Robert Kennedy will never live to see the White House!

While the assassins will try to quench the life of Robert Kennedy, they will do the most damage to his wife, Ethel. The murder will have a much more profound effect upon her than did the assassination of the President upon Jackie Kennedy.

Jacqueline's poise—if we are to believe her statements in William Manchester's "Death of a President"—was an act of anger. She "wanted the world to see what they had done to Jack."

Ethel has little of Jackie's queenliness; Ethel could be just another housewife in Smalltown, U.S.A. She has none of Jacqueline's reserve, none of the timidity. Ethel is closer to the people than Jackie ever was. This will cause her the pain—the fact that the people Ethel Kennedy was so much a part of would be responsible for murdering her husband.

Lonely Sorrow

While widow Jacqueline has only Caroline and John-John to consider, Ethel will have nine fatherless children to clothe, feed, and love.

The sorrow of the exquisite and beautiful Jacqueline Kennedy were shared by a grieving nation. The sorrow of equally beautiful Ethel Kennedy will be borne alone.

This story is one the Insider takes little pleasure in presenting. But nonetheless, we have good reason to believe that the young New York senator with the Boston accent and the Harvard haircut will soon be given his own resting place in Arlington National Cemetery.

He will go down in history as the second Kennedy in public office to die at the hands of an assassin's bullet!
