

Or something like that he said, and I thought that was a foolish, funny statement to make, too, see. So from there on that was all that was said. That is all that I know, and I thought to myself afterwards when I read in the papers here and they said over TV some things about that he had a notebook in his pocket with something like that, Kennedy wasn't supposed to live until the fifth of June or something, and I thought to myself and wonder if this mysticism business, what he got into, whether he had anything to do with that that he thought probably he had to carry out or what. I don't think so. ĩ think he was always -- at least when he worked with me, I 22 never--I never heard him say that he was sick or anything 23 that he didn't or he couldn't work or anything, or something 24 like that, no. 25 26 Q Did he ever complain about anything, headaches,

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backaches, or anything like that? He never complained? 1 Well, he told me one morning he told us that he -2 A had won a case where he had been hurt by riding or some, 3 thing, and he had won the case, and he got--I guess he got 4 5 \$2,000 or something out of that case. And I said, "Boy," I says, "All that money," I says, "what are you going to 6 do with all that money?" Well he said, "I had some bills 7 for my car," and he said, "I'm going to use that for school 8 work, see. I'm going to school afterwhile." Well, I 9 thought that was pretty good. 10 11 Did he tell you about how the accident happened 12 Q 13 or--Yeah, he said he fell. He must have been working 14 Ά for some place where they had horses, and he was riding or 15 16 something and he fell off, I guess, or something, or something happened anyway. 17 Did he tell you whether he had been hurt when he 18 0 19 fell off? 20 Well, that's--that's evidently what the case was Α 21 all about. 22 Well, did he tell you himself? 0 23 Yeah, I guess he talked about it and that was A 24 the reason he got that money, he won the case, I guess, or 25 something, and he got that money. I believe he said \$2,000. 26

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But that's what he said.

But he never mentioned, or you didn't ask him 0 anything about his physical condition ---

> λ No.

Q --subsequent to the fall?

A No, and he was nice and good and strong because these boxes and things with honey in and all that other 8 stuff that we had to lift back and forth. He was good and strong as far as I could see. I couldn't see that there 10 was anything wrong with him. Of course, you'feel sometimes, you feel a little tired maybe, but that doesn't happen very 12 often, but otherwise--

> LT. HERNANDEZ: John, is there anything that --MR. MINER: Yes.

15 BY MR. MINER: Now this, of course, is under-Q 16 standable that you wouldn't be able to separate each of 17 the meetings that you had, but generally speaking, as best 18 you can, Mr. Peters, we would appreciate it if you would 19 cover that starting of the meetings, pretty much what were 20 the questions that he raised? What seemed to be the thing 21 that he was interested in that you talked with him about? 22 As best you can remember. Well, what kind of questions 23 did he ask you? What were the problems that seemed to be 24 in his mind?

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Well, I don't -- now I don't want to rebate (sic) Α

this.

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Q Uh huh.

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A But to me my desire was to get him to see how God comes in by his power to help us to keep away from doing wrong or from sinning, and so on, see?

21

Q'Uh huh.

6 A And, of course, that was what his mother was 7 interested in, too. She probably knew a whole lot more than 8 I didn't know. I was just strange as far as I was concerned as far as his life was concerned. Now that all the infor-9 mation that we get through TV and through the papers and 10 all that we hear now back and forth, now that I can see 11 that there might have been some things that I didn't know 12 13 anything about, see, but I was trying to show---

9 Without speculating on that, but rather trying 15 to now go back in your mind, you talked to him about 16 him, questions that he may have asked you or tried to where 17 you thought he was trying to understand, that would be more 18 what I would be interested in, you know. I mean that would 19 these lessons perhaps be a good way of starting from?

A Now that was what I was going to say. The main
thing was these lessons, you see, they bring up a subject.
Q Right.

24 see.

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Q Well, just taking the topics of the subject now, the first part--you have a list there?

And, of course, he wanted to know what they were,

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1	A Yeah, "Forgotten Riches."
2	Q I don't want that. I just want the name of it.
3	A "The Forgotten Riches was the first one."
4	Q Yes, now this in "The Forgotten Riches," for
5	example, was there anything in your discussion that you
6	remember about that in discussing it with him? Any questions
7	that he raised or any topic?
8	A Well, what Ithe thing was the way this topic
9	is titled
10	Q Uh huh.
11	A Of course naturally he would want to know what
.12	what that meant, and I saidwell, I said, "That's the
13	thing," I says, "today that's very little done "
-14	Q Uh huh.
15	A "is the study of the Bible or the study of
16	Christ's life so that we know and he tells us that we
.17	should follow his example because he was our example. And
18	then how to get the power to live out this word. The power
19	that's in this work if we put itI stress putting it up
20	here, see?"
21	Q Uh huh.
22	A "If you got the book up there," I says, "then you
23	have got something, but otherwise you haven't, " see?
24	Q Uh huh.
25	A And so that's the reasonand then, of course,
.26	these questions bring up different questions. I mean the

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1	questions and answers bring up different things that in
2	his lifethere may have been a lot of questions that he
3	brought up that were aside from just the main questions.
.4	Q Uh huh.
5	A But I couldn't remember them now.
6	Q Uh huh.
7	A I tried to remember them, but it would be too
8	hard to do.
9	Q BY LT. HERNANDEZ: Well, at the end of each
10	lesson there is a series of questions?
11	A Yes, I know.
12	Q Does he fill those answers out in front of you?
13	A No, I don'tsee, I left them lessons with him
14	for a week, see; and then he's supposed to fill them in,
15	See.
`16	Q Uh huh.
-17	A And then when I got there, we went over them, see
18	if he had them correct. I've got a correction sheet, you
19	see, where I got all the answers on and the text and things.
20	Q. Uh huh.
21	A And then we'd go through it, see?
22	Q Uh huh.
23	A With him, then, see, if-he did very well.
24	Q What happens to the answer sheet on lesson No. 1
25	for example? What happened after you came back the
26	following week, and you reviewed the answers with him? And

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1 whether or not he answered correctly according to the 2 Bible, what happened to those answers that he wrote? 3 I left them with him. He was supposed to have A them. Now I see they're back here again as they--aren't 4 5 the first ones in there? 8 No, they're not in there. Q. Then she's got them. They must have them because 7 Α I didn't take them back, see? 8 Uh huh. '9 Q 10 Α I left them with Sirhan. '11 Q I see. 12 See, because I told him when he's all done, then Α 13 he can put them in a little folder like that, and he's 14 got the whole book right there, see, all of them in there 15 with the questions and answers the way he answered them. 16 Then if anybody asks him a question, I said, "You can 17 refer to your lessons where you've answered them from the 18 Bible." I says, "Nobody can question that." I says, 19 "Nobody can question that," I says, "if they want to argue, 20 they'll have to argue with -- " ** "You've got the answers 21 right there." 22 Th huh. Ö 23 So he liked that. He was--he liked it very much. A 24 He was willing to study and everything, That's why I say 25

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it was such a shock to us, boy, to hear that something like

that happened. I said there must have been something else
that got a hold of him.

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Q BY MR. MINER: Now when you started working with
him, what was your impression as to why he wanted to get
into this subject matter? What seemed to be his motive as
to why he wanted to discuss these topics in the area of
religion with you?

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A Well, if I have to--

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Q What's your opinion?

A I kind of had the idea, the opinion, that his
 nother was behind this to get him to study, see, because
 she expressed it after awhile when he made that statement
 about, he says, "If you have to live it like that," he says
 --

Q The was he referring to when he said, "If we have
 to live it like that"?

¹⁷ A Well, he was referring to the--what he had
¹⁸ learned how we have to live, how we have to do, if we have
¹⁹ to follow Christ's example and Christ's life, what a
²⁰ difference it makes, see. He knew that I didn't drink and
²¹ smoke or--and he didn't either, by the way.

Q Uh huh.

A He didn't do that, no. All the while I was with
him, he didn't smoke or he didn't drink, or--and he didn't
use any vulgar language or anything. That's why I say he
was to me he was a good bright boy and nice to everyone.

Q Uh huh.

A I can't--we just--we just--

Q Did he ever talk to you at all or make any mention of his own national origin of being a Jordanian or an Arab, or any of the problems that he had been through? A I--well, I knew--I didn't have to ask him at all, see, because I knew he was an Arab.

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Q Uh huh.

9 Because I've got a nephew out there--he's married Ά 10 to my niece, and he's also an Arab, see; but--and they are 11 courteous--these people are courteous. Joe, my nephew, is 12 --Sue (sic) married--he's the most courteous boy I have 13 ever seen. Boy, no matter what happens, he's right there 14 on the spot to help and to--and they're that way. That is 15 in their system so to speak. That's why I say we can't 16 understand how this come about.

Q BY LT. HERNANDEZ: Other than your knowing this,
 though, because of your nephew Joe, did Sirhan himself ever
 make any oral mention to you about any difficulties or
 problems or anything concerning his early childhood back
 in Palestine?

A Huh uh, never. We only read it now through the
papers and through TV is where we got how he was treated
back there. See, that's all there, but he never, never
discussed it.

- 26

Q Did he ever tell you anything about how he

resented things that happened in childhood?

A No, never. He seemed to be well satisfied with everything. He seemed to be--well, he seemed to be happy as far as I could see.

Q BY MR. MINER: Did he ever mention anything about how he felt toward Israel or the Jewish people?

A That's just the point. He never mentioned anything to me when anything--any of his troubles, he never brought up to me. John told us one time that he had talked over some things with him; but as far as with me, never.

¹¹ Q What did John tell you that Sirhan had talked with ¹² him about?

A That I think John has given you folks, has told
 it over TV, and that's all I know, see?

Q Uh huh.

A Just what has John expressed it and told it the
 way it was.

Q Did he ever discuss Mr. Weidner with you?

19 No. As--well, the only thing that he said he had Α 20 an argument with him on account of one morning loading the 21 car, see. John wanted to put more in, and I could see 22 where Sol had been right. I was there, too, and John 23 wanted to put more in. It was a little Rambler car or 24 station wagon; and, boy, it was overloaded. I was really 25 afraid to drive on the freeway with that thing like that. 26 So, I told John, I said, "That's an overload," I says, "boy,

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I says, "if we have an accident on the freeway, what then?"
 So Sol was right in what he said, but Sol let it go; and,
 therefore, didn't say no more because--so we drove away,
 and we took the stuff. Both of us went that morning.

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Q You mean by we, you and Sol?

A Yeah, me and Sol, we went and delivered the stuff;
7 but we had an awful load for a dolly.

Q Uh huh.

9 A Why I said we should really not drive on the
10 freeway with that.

.11

Q Uh huh.

A Going around these curbs, you know, with an overload, and should the cops have caught us, they'd have sure made us unload some stuff because it was really--

Q During the time that you knew Sirhan, did you ever see any example of a display of temper or irritation on his part?

I'd have to lie about--I'd have to lie. No, he 18 A didn't. He never--I've--that's why I say, we were just 19 dumbfounded to think that such a nice boy as--I had him 20 even working up by John's house when we put that--they 21 have an overhang--what they call those things? Patios or 22 something on stilts for the house, and they wanted that 23 enclosed, and I had him up there two days working with me 24 to staple those things on, see? 25

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Q Uh huh.

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Because it was a little high for me. I couldn't A 2 reach it, so we had to hold the ladder up there, and he'd 3 go up and staple it for me, see? 4 Uh huh. Q 5 Ά So I had him working with me. As far as working 6 with him, you couldn't want a better man to work with. 7 Uh huh. 0 8 А I cannot say anything against him. He was really 9 a nice boy. 10 BY LT. HERNANDEZ: Well, did he ever express to Q 11 you any deep-seated feelings that he had possibly of being 12 subjected to Mr. Weidner's harassment or Mr. Weidner's ill-13 treatment of him where he felt bad about the fact that Mr. 14 Weidner in his mind treated him badly? 15 I guess he did say just a little bit about it, A 16 but one time he wanted to -- I don't know what -- it wasn't a 17 promise, anyway it was something about money that he would 18 get, and regardless of -- I guess what happened or something, 19 and anyway he stayed there, and he wanted to have that job, 20 and I was told afterwards he had to have police there to 21 get him out of the store. He was sitting there and 22 demanded his \$200, I guess, he said he had coming to him 23 or something. Anyway it was about wages. Well, that was 24 nothing to us because we didn't have nothing to do with it, 25 and--and I don't know, he said afterwards he felt that John 26 belittled him a little by doing that. He should have kept

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his promise or something, but I don't know what they
promised or--or I didn't--I said, "Well, Sol, I don't know
anything about that." I says, "I didn't promise or anything."
I said, "If John did," I says, "that's John's business to
tend to it." I had nothing to do with it, see? That's all
that he really---

Q Well, you know the incident on the overload on
8 the Rambler?

A Well, that I agreed with him. I agreed with Sol,
and I told John afterwards when we came back, I said,
"John," I says, "that was--that was wrong. We certainly
shouldn't have overloaded that car like that." I says,
"Boy, I was scared all the while we drove down there."

Q Was there an argument prior to this with Sirhan
 and John?

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A No.

Weidner?

Q

18 A No. It was just because we couldn't hardly get 19 it in there any more, and we had to reload it a little bit in order to get more in, see? And John thought we should 20 21 have waited with the load until he had all the stuff that 22 he wanted to go along on that load and why there was no reason at all why he could have left Sol do it because the 23 24 next day we went down anyway. He could have sent it the 25 next day, see, anyway; but some how or other John didn't think--of course, he apologized--he apologized to him 26

afterwards and told him he was wrong, and so he felt all
right about that.

Q Did Sirhan, Sol Sirhan, ever mention to you that he did not or was not desirous of continuing the Bible lessons because of the church, the Seventh Day Adventist Church, allowing John to talk before the congregation of the church during services, and that he felt that John should not be allowed because of his personality and the way that he treated Sol, what kind of person he was?

A No.

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Q He never told you anything like this?

A No, never, never. Huh uh. No, I don't think he
 had anything that I know of that he had anything against
 that or anything.

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Q Anything else there, Mr. Miner?

Q BY MR. MINER: Well, getting back to this matter
of the kind of topics that you discussed with him; and, of
course, what we're really sort of asking for is your
impression, you opinion. Did he appear to you in any way
to be irrational about any subject--that is not to seem to
be quite in contact with realities in any way, anything
like that? Anything sort of strange or--

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Q No, to you--to you.

A You mean about his conduct while we were studying?

You mean that it seemed strange to him?

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1 While you were studying or while you were working 0 2 together while you were talking together, anything that ---3 anything that -- that --

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No, I couldn't--I couldn't say. Sure, he was--Ά 5 some of those things he didn't understand them, and of 6 course he asked. I told him, I says, "Anything that you don't 8 understand," I says, "I can show you in the text where the answers are for you," I says, "if there's anything, just 9 10 ask."

> Uh huh. 0

12 See, and I think he -- I think he acted the gentle-Ά 13 man all the way through. I think he did.

14 Would this be a fair statement, Mr. Peters, that 0 15 in your opinion during the time that you knew Sirhan that 16 he seemed to you to be a rational, intelligent human being?

> A That's right.

Ô Is that a fair statement?

19 А That's a fair statement. While I was--as much 20 as I knew of him, I think he was a nice boy. I--I would uphold him from that because there is nothing, anything 21 22 that he -- any wrong moves or anything that he ever made 23 that I could say that there was something that -- you know, 24 when people do some things sometimes, you say well there's just a little something, see, but that was not with him. 25 Very nice, I think. 26

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Q One other aspect now you not only talked Bible subjects with him, but you actually physically worked with him in the store. You told us about his going up on the ladder and stapling for you things like that. Did you ever notice or did he ever complain of anything physically the matter with him at any time?

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A No. He--why he could do the work just that I did,
too. Now if I had to climb up, hang on a ladder and staple
up above. He could do that. You know that's a back-breaking
--that's pretty hard work, and he could do it, and I'd
climb up and do it and so far as I could see, he could do
it just like I could.

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Q Did you see him lift heavy weights?

¹⁴ A Yeah. These honey boxes, and sometimes these
¹⁵ barrels out there where all this powder stuff, different
¹⁶ stuff that comes--and believe me, to lift them up sometimes
¹⁷ above you is heavy, but he did it just like I did, so--

Q How much weight are you talking about?
A Oh, they are around 50 or some 80 pounds and so
on. Why there were some that were over a hundred. Of
course, them I helped him, and we worked together and pushed
them up, see?

Q

Q Uh huh.

A They were so--

Q Did he ever complain to you at all about his vision?

2	Q His sight?
3	A No, he never said anything about his sight.
4	Q You never noticed that he had any problems with
5	1t?
6	A No, no, never did.
7	Q When you read together, he was able to read fine,
.8	huh?
9	A Just as nice as I could.
-10	Q Uh huh.
11	A That's all.
12	Q And did he ever mention to you about having an
13	accident, a fall from a horse?
14	A Well, that was the thing. He said hehis back,
:15	I guess, was hurt or something. I don't know, I can't
16	even remember what it was, and that was the reason he had
17	those \$2,000, see; and one morning when we were working
18	together out in the vegetables, and he then said that he
19	won his case and got \$2,000. And I said, "My," I said,
20	"all that money, what are you going to do with all of it
21	now? You going on a spree?" "No, "he said, "I'm going to
22	pay my little bills that I got on the car." He was fixing
.23	up a car, he said, and then the rest of he says, "I'm
24	going to put away for education." He says, "I'm going to
25	school afterwhile."
26	Q Uh huh,

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1 Well, now what's wrong with that? There's nothing Α 2 wrong with that, is there? This was sense. 3 Did he tell you when he said he planned to go to 0 .4 school what subject he planned to study? 5 No, that he didn't. Just that he was going to A 6 go back to school and to school somewhere, and --7 0 He didn't tell you what school he had in mind to 8 go to? 9 Α No, no. 10 Did he ever talk to you at all about his family, 0 11 his brothers, his sister who died, his mother? 12 I never--I never questioned him because I was a Ά 13 little surprised afterwards when I found out that it was--14 that three boys were here and his father was over across, 15 and I almost one time I was going to ask him, well, what 16 the reason was, see; but I never did, see. I thought well 17 it was none of my business, I thought; so I didn't see--and 18 of course, he never said anything either. 19 Uh huh. 0 20 Ά But when we were at the church one night, I asked 21 the mother about where her husband was, see. 22 0 Uh huh. And she says, "He's over in Europe or Arabia," 23 A wherever it is, see; but that was all. I didn't mention --24 well she says he wanted to go back and that was all she 25 26 answered me, and so I thought, well, probably she didn't

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¹ want to discuss it, and it's none of my business either,
² so I left it alone, see, if people kind of act as though
³ they don't--well, I keep my mouth shut, see. There's no
⁴ use getting into a thing if it isn't necessary, see. But
⁵ here we find it all out now.

Q BY MR. MINER: What about did the subject of
 communism ever get mentioned at all?

A No. No. Anything like that as far as political
or that order, never was anything said about it.

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Q Uh huh.

Q BY LT. HERNANDEZ: Did he ever mention anything
 to you about girl friends, or girls that he was seeing or
 going out with?

A He never--I don't know whether he was anti-girl friend or something; he never had no girl friends, as much as I know, never said anything about--I kidded him once in awhile a little bit, but he never did he mention of having one.

19 Q How did he take your kidding about it?
20 A Well, just laughed it off is all, like anybody
21 else would.

Q What would you tell him, Mr. Peters--

A What?

24 Q --for example what would you tell him? 25 A Well, one time I said, "Gosh," I said, "you're 26 getting now in years where you ought to look for a partne"

37 I said, "pretty soon." "Oh," he said, "oh, I got time yet." 1 He kinda brushed it off, you know. He never--2 What about money? Did he ever tell you or dis-3 0 cuss the fact that he might have envied people for having 4 money or certain people for having money? 5 A I don't know. I guess he never--the occasion 6 never arose that we discussed that or anything. 7 Did he ever show you any large bills that he 8 0 carried with him? 9 No, he never--he never showed any money. I never 10 Α saw him when he paid the gas and that. That was generally 11 done at the filling station right there next to the store 12 where John would pay by the month, see. So these slips 13 were given, see, so otherwise another station, of course, 14 we weren't too much together as far as buying gas and things 15 is concerned. We generally had gas from there--we make 16 our trip, and so that wasn't anything that -- I don't think 17 that could be of any value to anything there. Never said 18 anything about money that way. 19

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Q Uh huh.

A And he did--if he had to go over to the bank to get John some change for the store, he did that; he went over there and just like anybody else would, and you could trust him and anything, otherwise you could trust him. I'm telling you I can--I must say Sol was nice to us, very nice. Q BY MR. MINER: How did he get along with the

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1 other people who worked in the store?

A You mean Sol? How he got along with the others? Q Uh huh.

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I think they all spoke highly of him. Everyone. 4 Ά Boy, I think it was a shock to them as well as to us, 5 because I have often wondered what in the world could 6 actually go wrong with me now if I did anything like that, 7 what in the world could go wrong. But, you know, I guess 8 human beings are so fickle you cannot trust them. God says 9 man doesn't know anything as he ought to know, and a lot of 10 times it says, "Do not trust in the arm of flesh." God 11 tells us that, and I can see now why we can't trust mankind :12 no matter what it is. 13

14 Q BY LT. HERNANDEZ: Well, we're trying to be as
15 objective, as open-minded as we can possibly can in this
16 investigation, and we're trying to get facts.

A Yeah, I know you've got to do something or you
 couldn't find anything out.

19 Q One thing that concerned us, Mr. Peters, is that 20 sometime around the 28th of June, there was some people 21 from the FBI talked to you--

A Uh huh. From Madison.

23 Q Yes, and at that time their report indicated that 24 you mentioned to them that you had had no conversation in 25 which Sol Sirhan talked of any of his political or religious 26 philosophies. Did you tell the FBI that?

1 Well, here's what I told them. They never asked Α 2 me anything about religion; and, of course, I didn't answer 3 them on that. Otherwise I could have told them just what 4 I told you here now today, and it doesn't directly state 5 in there, it ** speaks something about--read that again. 6 Right. We've had the same feeling that you have 0 7 just spoken of here. 8 See, and I just--because of the fact they didn't A 9 ask anything about religion, so I didn't. 10 Did they ask you anything about going to Sirhan's 0 11 home at any time?

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A Yes, I think they did. Is that in there?Q No, it isn't.

A See, because they didn't ask me about it, there wasn't too much said, and I don't think there is anything gone in there that could in any way change what we have had here now. It's about the same thing. Only I say they didn't ask me about those because I could have told them I was studying with him.

20 Q Well, we appreciate the fact that you've been 21 frank with us and **

A Well, there's no use beating around the bush because they find you out anyway, see. That's all I know, and I'm telling you what I told you. That's the way it happened.

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Form 618 (R-3-4)

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Has anyone from either the newspapers or television

or magazines tried to talk to you or talk to you on the
 phone or in any way?

A Huh uh, never. I'm glad they didn't because what's the use of broadcasting all that stuff?

Q This is very important from the standpoint that legally we cannot jeopardize anybody's chances for a fair and impartial trial, and therefore in Los Angeles they have put out a court order of prohibiting--

MR. MINER: ** press at all. It's better not to.
A I think a lot of times the press is messing things
up, but I've just listened to this convention down here.
Man, alive, some of the things they pull, I can't understand
how they get by with the stuff but they do.

Q BY LT. HERNANDEZ: So we would like to ask you unless there is something else, John, that you have in mind that you would like to ask?

Q BY MR. MINER: No, unless--let's just ask the shotgun question, so to speak. Mr. Peters, is there anything at all that in your contact with Mr. Sirhan that we haven't talked about that you feel would be helpful to us in understanding his state of mind? That's really what we're trying to understand how the man thought, what was in his mind?

A Well, that's why I say this thing is a rather hard question to answer because--

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Q It is, I know.

A Because all I know is what I gave you now, and from that I can't see, as I said, we're shocked. We can't understand how all of a sudden a man can pull a stunt like that out of a clear sky and we don't know anything. We had no idea the man could ever pull anything like that, and so I can't say.

Q Let me ask you this, did you get the impression,
for example, that he accepted the concepts of the religious
beliefs that you talked with him about? I mean he believed
in God, for example?

A Well, that I can't say. I can't speak for another man, see, but as far as we went--

Q Uh huh.

A He seemed to like it.

Q Uh huh.

¹⁶ A And wanted to study on, see, or I wouldn't have
 ¹⁷ gone there no more, see?

Q Sure.

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A But, and his mother, of course, she liked it
very much. She wanted him to study because she mentioned
that one night to him. She says, "Yeah, see, Sol, I told
you a lot of times you should study with me, the Bible,"and
see?

Q BY LT. HERNANDEZ: Did she sit, and was she there at every meeting that you had?

A Practically at every meeting, yeah.

Q BY MR. MINER: She sat right with you?
 A Well, right at the table. We were just sitting
 at the dining room table.

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Q I see, very good.

Well, I wished a lot of times--I wished I hadn't 5 A gone home that time, but I would have stayed there and I 6 kept going there. I think if I had gone through the whole 7 series of lessons, I think I could have changed even if he 8 did go to some other organization, I know the power of God 9 is strong enough to -- to outdo all that, and I sometimes 10 felt, boy, I wished I had never went home, I had stayed out 11 there and got him off of that. Well, you know we feel for 12 a fellow when he gets himself in trouble like that. We 13 feel for him because he was so nice and everything, you 14 know, if you say for instance you have somebody that you 15 like and all of a sudden this word comes that he pulled some 16 awful stunt--by the way did you hear one of our judges 17 here in Milwaukee here just shot himself? Well, we don't 18 know whether he shot himself or whether somebody else did, 19 but they found him in a washroom. 20

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Q Yeah, we just heard that on the radio.

A Yeah, the reporter said he was dead already, but now there was another news bulletin came in that he's still alive, so I don't know. Oh, I'm telling you this world sometimes it's terrible. Well, what I was going to ask you fellows now while you were here--

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1	Q Yes, Mr. Peters.
2	A You think that you don't know, of course, when
3	the trial comes off yet, do you?
4	Q Well, there is a trial date scheduled, Mr. Peters,
5	for November 1st.
<u>,6</u>	A Oh.
7	Q But whether there be another motion for a con-
`8	tinuance, there is no way for us to know.
9	A Yeah.
10	Q As far as I am concerned in the prosecution side
-11	A You are a district attorney?
.12	Q Yes.
13	A Isee.
-14	Q We'll be ready to go to trial when we're supposed
15	to on November 1st.
16	A I was hoping that they wasn't going to subpoena
,17	me; that I'd have to come way out there. All the informa-
18	tion you got now that you could take care of that.
19	Q As far as we're concerned, Mr. Peters, we will
20	not be putting you on in our case in chief. The way it
21	works is the prosecution first puts its case on.
22	A Yeah.
23	Q Then after we rest which means after we finish
24	putting our case on, then the defense puts its case on.
25	Then we have an opportunity to put on rebuttal testimony
26	that is against what the defense advances. Whatever it

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
