6 Mr. Barry indicated that the Senator, at the conclusion  
7 of his speech, was to go from the stage to the Embassy Room  
8 through the kitchen where the shooting occurred and give an  
9 interview to the "writing" press in the Colonial Room.

11 Barry indicated that he was approximately three feet from  
12 the Senator's right by the ice machine and approximately  
13 six to nine feet behind the Senator, moving up on him.  
14

15 This would place him somewhere between the petition that  
16 jets out next to the ice machine and the edge of the first  
17 steam table where the shooting occurred. Barry indicated  
18 when he heard the shooting, he moved forward along the  
19 ice machine, made a pivot to his left and came in on the  
20 suspect. As he approached the suspect, he stated the sus-  
21 pect was standing with his arm extended and a gun in his  
22 hand. There was no one holding him at that time. He went  
23 for the suspect and knocked the gun from his hand. The  
24 suspect grabbed the gun again. Once Barry felt that the  
25 suspect was under control, he left him and went to aid  
26 the Senator. Mr. Barry indicated there was a male Arab or  
Indian, 5'4", 130 pounds, that may have been the suspect.  
This person's picture appears in the June 14th issue of  
Time Magazine on page 16. It is the first photo on the top  
of the page and the suspect is in the right corner area.



He stated he was in the Colonial Room when the shooting  
took place. He had gone to the room as the Senator was  
to have been interviewed by the writing press. At the  
time he stated there were 15 to 20 people in the room.  
The door to the room was open. This door is the one leading  
to the kitchen. He heard what he thought were firecrackers,  
recalled there was a feeling of excitement, and then a Hays  
Corey of Time Magazine and a Bob Sheagy, a reporter for the  
Boston Globe, ran into the kitchen ahead of him. He saw  
a large group of people around a man and at first thought  
this was a group around the Senator. He later learned  
it was the suspect Sirhan and that the Senator was shot and  
lying on the floor. He did not see the shooting.

I was with the Senator in Room 512 at the Ambassador Hotel  
on June 4, 1968, 11:55 p.m. The Senator received word that  
it was time to go down to the Embassy Ballroom and make  
his victory speech. The Senator and his party left the room  
and took a freight elevator to the kitchen area. He then  
proceeded to the stage in the Embassy Ballroom. During  
the speech I was on the stage behind the Senator and stand-  
ing next to Mrs. Kennedy. After the speech, the Senator  
went out through the back of the stage. I followed him out  
and was about 12 feet behind him. I was also behind Jim  
Wilson's TV crew. I had not gone through the double doors  
into the kitchen area when I heard what sounded like pop,  
pop, and then a very rapid four more pops. Then I took  
off running towards where the sounds were coming from.  
Jim Wilson's TV crew was just ahead of me. The first  
thing I saw was Paul Schrader was down. I then ran forward  
and saw the Senator was hurt. I never saw the suspect or  
the actual shooting. From the time that the Senator left  
his room until after the shooting was over, I had taken  
about 30 or 40 still shots.

Mr. Eppridge was shown a map of the kitchen area, and  
he placed himself, at the time of the first shot, approxi-  
mately two feet before the double doors leading into the  
kitchen area. Mr. Eppridge also volunteered that he would

1 send prints of all his pictures he had taken on the  
2 night of the shooting.

3 Senator's campaign. Gallivan stated at the time of the  
4 shooting, he was approximately three quarters of the way  
5 down the length of the metal tables in the kitchen area  
6 and was en route to the Colonial Room. He was walking by  
7 himself, and although there were other people near him, he  
8 does not recall who they were. He heard the shots and on a  
9 about the fifth shot recalled turning and looking back.  
10 He remembers seeing Barry (William G. Barry, a security man  
11 for Senator Kennedy), along with a group of other men,  
12 wrestling with the suspect. He ran to where they were, told  
13 by Barry he could handle the suspect, and Barry left to  
14 help the Senator. He recalled that during the struggle of  
15 the suspect, he had the web of his left hand between the  
16 hammer and the frame of the gun to keep it from firing

19 Gallivan's location at the time of the shooting would

The below statement was taken June 21, 1968, 11:20 a.m.  
Mr. Hankiewicz stated that on June 5, 1968, at approximately  
12 midnight that he was with Senator Kennedy in Room 512  
at the Ambassador Hotel. When it was time for the Senator  
to leave his room and go to the Embassy Ballroom to make  
a speech, the Senator stated, "Let's not go down through  
the crowd." One of the hotel personnel suggested the  
freight elevator and through the hotel kitchen. We left  
the room and took the freight elevator and walked through  
the kitchen and up onto the stage and the Senator made his  
speech. After the speech, I did not know which way we  
were going to leave, but I assumed we would go off the  
stage on the right side and walk through the crowd to the  
Colonial Room for a short press conference. but someone  
at the last moment changed the plans (probably Fred Dutton).  
The Senator jumped off the rear of the stage and went out  
the back way. I was following him. I had just entered the  
kitchen area and had walked five or six feet beyond the  
swinging doors when I heard a pop. It sounded like a fire-  
cracker, and then five or six more shots. They still  
sounded like firecrackers. I had some papers in my left  
hand. I put them down on a table and ran forward. I  
saw Schrader was down and it looked like he was shot right

1 between the eyes and he looked like he was dead. I looked  
2 over to my left and saw a struggle going on. I could see  
3 an arm out with a gun. There was a bunch of hands pinning  
4 the gun and arms down. I then looked over to my right and  
5 saw the Senator was down and had been shot. I went over  
6 and tried to aid the Senator. At that time Bill Barry and  
7 Fred Dutton were over next to the Senator also. I then  
8 left them and went into the kitchen to phone for an ambulance.  
9 Mr. Hankiewicz was shown a map of the kitchen area and he  
10 placed himself, at the time the shots were fired, just  
11 inside the two swinging doors traveling towards the Colonial  
12 Room. He figured he was somewhere on the left side of the

a group struggling with the suspect. She stated there were  
other people in front of her walking in the same direction,  
but she does not recall who they were. (Her husband was  
walking in front of her, but she was not aware of it.)  
She recalls seeing John Marquand coming toward her from  
the press room (Colonial Room) right after the shooting.  
She does not know what he saw. She states he is a writer  
or a reporter in New York City and his phone numbers are



5 Mr. Weisel was interviewed at his home, 2700 Upton Northwest,  
6 Washington, D.C., and made the following statement regarding  
7 the shooting and the injury incurred. Mr. Weisel indicated  
8 that after Senator Kennedy left the stage, he followed  
9 along with a large group through the small room between  
10 the stage and the kitchen area where the shooting took  
11 place. When he reached the double doors entering into the  
12 kitchen area, he was facing the stanchion that divides  
13 the double doors. He was walking sideways at the time  
14 trying to get through the crowd and catch up with the  
15 Senator. Just at the time that he reached the stanchion  
16 (he indicated on the map that he was facing this stanchion  
17 at the time he was shot), he heard what he thought were  
18 firecrackers. Although his body was facing in the direction  
19 of the stanchion, he was looking to his left in the direc-  
20 tion where the Senator was at the time of the shooting.  
21 He recalls feeling the shot strike him and at the same  
22 moment having a clear field of vision in observing someone  
23 going down. (This person later identified as Paul Schrader.)  
24 He also recalled at the time of the shooting that a friend  
25 and coworker, David Jayne, was behind him and has his hand  
26 on his shoulder. He stated to Jayne, "I think I've been  
shot." He did not see the suspect, but was aware of the  
struggle. He was removed from the scene to Kaiser Hospital

1 on Sunset Boulevard in Los Angeles. He was confined for  
2 approximately one week and released on June 12. He is

Mr. Wilson indicated he was carrying a portable television camera on his shoulders and was approximately one or two paces outside the double doors going from the stage to the kitchen. He recalled hearing the first shot but did not react. On the second shot, he turned on the camera and went through the double doors. The electrician, John William Lewis, III, who was working with him stated, "They're shooting." He recalled that the crowd parted and he moved forward with his camera. The first time he saw the Senator, he was down. He indicated his path of vision was limited as he was looking through the sight on the camera. This prevented him from being able to see more in the room. He ran out of film, dropped his camera, and helped contain the crowd. Also working with him at the time was his soundman, Robert F. Funk. As he recalled Lewis, his electrician, was to his left as they entered the room, and the soundman, Funk, was to his right or right rear. He indicated that both Funk and Lewis lived in Virginia. They could probably be contacted in Room G-329, New Senate Office Building, and are both presently working for NBC. Wilson indicated that in moving forward after turning on his camera, he moved between Paul Schrader and the petition. He was directly in line with the Senator's body between his head and the petition.

4 Mr. Witcober stated he was on stage with Senator Kennedy  
5 and exited the stage on the left side. He was proceeding  
6 from the Embassy Room to the Colonial Room via the kitchen  
7 and were between the end of the steam tables and the door  
8 to the Colonial press room. He heard one pop, a pause,  
9 and then rapid fire. He first thought the shots were  
10 firecrackers. He reacted to the rapid fire by turning to  
11 his left and observed a scuffle where four or five people  
12 were wrestling with someone. He observed Rosie Grier  
13 running towards this group. He stated when he first heard  
14 the shots and turned, he had a clear field of vision to  
15 the area where the scuffle was. Although there were other  
16 people walking in the same direction, he does not recall  
17 any of them at that particular time. He stated he was  
18 walking fairly close to the tables and did not see the  
19 suspect prior to the shooting.

20 Mr. Wilcober wrote an article which appeared in the

4 She indicated that during the Senator's speech, she was  
5 about three feet from his right. At the conclusion of  
6 the Senator's speech, she exited the stage and followed  
7 the Senator along with the crowd into the kitchen area.  
8 At the time of the shooting, the only way she was able to  
9 place herself was to indicate that the victim, Paul Schrade,  
10 was slightly in front of her and to her left. She did  
11 not see the suspect with the gun until after the shooting.  
12 She recalled hearing eight shots. Her recollection of the  
13 sequence of the shots were one, a pause, two shots, a  
14 second pause, and then the balance of the shots. She  
15 recalled Paul Schrade being hit in the head from one of  
16 the shots. The only person she could remember in the room  
17 was Sandy VanOker of NEC, whom she heard state, "Get the  
18 gun." She had no idea where anyone else was in the room.  
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
