9 Q Your first name, sir?

10 A Karl, K-a-r-l.

11 Q Middle name or your last--

12 A A. A. Initial A.

13 Q Uh huh (yes).

14 A Last name is U-e-c-k-e-r.

15 Q U-e--

16 A --e-c-k-e-r.

17 Q And your address?

18 A 3025 Glenhurst Center.

19 Q What city is that in?

20 A L. A. 39.

21 Q And your home phone?

22 A 667-3106.

23 Q Are you home during the daytime hours?

24 A I guess I'm at work.

25 Q You would normally work nights?

26 A No, all daytime, Ambassador.

Q All right. What's your business phone number?

A Extension 315.

1 Q At the Ambassador, huh?

2 A Yes, Banquets Department.

3 Q 315?

4 A 315.

5 Q Okay, Karl, I'm Sgt. McGann from Homicide,
6 downtown. My partner, Sgt. Callins. Could you tell us
7 what you saw and what you did tonight?

8 A Yeah. I took Senator Kennedy off the stage and
9 he was supposed to go through the kitchen, through the
10 pantry behind it, (*) wall.

11 Q What you are talking about, this area--Embassy
12 Room, over here and this being the hallway, hallway leading
13 down to the Colonial Room, which would be the working
14 press room, I think, as it was described--

15 A There's a stage here, and through here (*) on
16 my hands 'cause the crowd was very--I think it was very
17 busy there. Everybody was (*). I had it on my hands,
18 still going to shake hands with somebody and he grabbed his
19 hand again and we went straight ahead until he got about
20 beginning of the heaters. This is pantry here.

21 Q Uh huh (yes).

22 A And heaters we keep the plates hot, food hot,
23 and right in the beginning, somewhere here, that guy, he
24 must have jumped--he must have bent down and jumped up and
25 start shooting. First shot--first shot or second shot must
26 have been shortly one after another, you know, and I saw

1 Mr. Kennody falling down out of my hand (*) and he is
2 still shooting. And then I hit his hand down and I don't
3 know how many times he shot. I don't know. I couldn't
4 even tell you--four times, five times, six times, it was--
5 but he was shooting another direction, I think, but he was
6 trying to push the gun away from the crowd into the kitchen.
7 And then some other guys came somewhere, either same side
8 or front, took the gun away from him.

9 Q But--

10 A I kept him for about seven--between seven or ten
11 minutes, my arm, like. That's all I can tell you, until
12 the police came in. They asked me to listen and came over
13 to the police.

14 Q Were a crowd, employees, in the building,
15 standing in this little area that apparently leads from
16 another hallway down to where the pantry area is?

17 A I don't know. Would be, I imagine, though
18 that the people were standing, from the kitchen, standing
19 around this area 'cause I saw him shaking hands with one of
20 the dishwashers.

21 Q Uh huh (eys).

22 A I know that, and then he came back and I grabbed
23 his hand again and pulled him through, through the crowd.

24 Q This is the Senator's hand you grabbed?

25 A Yes, I grabbed his hand again and then at the
26 time that it happened.

1 Q Where was this guy that had the gun the first
2 time you saw him?

3 A The first time I saw him, he was--I was coming
4 this way. He was standing on my left hand, coming this way
5 and about--about here, around here; this area here.

6 Q He was very close to you, then, the first time
7 you saw him?

8 A Right in front of me, right in front of me,
9 you know. He must have come up from the bottom, because
10 I don't--I didn't see him in front of me. I saw all the
11 people in front of me. He must have come up. I think he
12 must have covered the gun with something, paper or something,
13 'cause the first I didn't see no gun; then I saw something
14 white, either paper or something, and I heard a shot. Later
15 said I thought it was a fire cracker, you know. I didn't
16 even realize at the first shot that it was a gun but by
17 the second shot, I turned around and saw Kennedy falling
18 down out of my hand and then at the time that I realized it
19 must have been a gun, then I grabbed him, you know.

20 Q Did he sort of reach around you to shoot the
21 Senator?

22 A Yeah.

23 Q He sort of reached around you to shoot the
24 Senator or did he get past you or--

25 A Yes, I think he was right in front of me because
26 the way he--he was right in front of me, right in front. He

1 turned around and shot with his right hand.

2 Q He had the gun in his right hand?

3 A In his right hand, yeah, because I kept him in
4 my right hand and he was--yes, in his right hand. He was
5 trying to pull the right hand over again. I was trying to
6 move that hand over.

7 Q He was trying to get the gun back to where he
8 could shoot people?

9 A Right.

10 Q And you were trying to prevent this?

11 A Right.

12 Q Did you see the gun?

13 A I saw the gun, yeah. Yeah.

14 Q All right. Let me show a gun, and you tell me
15 if this appears to be a gun similar to the one you saw?

16 A I tell you the truth, I don't think it was that
17 big, but could be. I really don't--

18 Q You're not sure?

19 A No, I'm not sure because I didn't pay too much
20 attention to the gun. See, I was trying to hit his hand
21 away and was trying to hold him.

22 Q Uh huh (yes). Uh huh (yes).

23 A Uh huh (yes), and he was trying to get away
24 from me and I was afraid if I let him loose, that he's
25 going to shoot me in the (*)--in my stomach, you know.

26 Q Uh huh (yes). Did he say anything to you? Do

1 you recall did he--

2 A No.

3 Q Did you hear him say anything at all?

4 A No, just when (*) very tight and he was making
5 noise and somebody else was talking, but it was about two
6 or three minutes afterward, was talking over my back and I
7 think it was time to hit him and I told them, "Don't hit
8 him," and he was talking to him and he says something. I
9 don't know what he said.

10 Q Could you--

11 A I was so excited.

12 Q I could understand that. Could you describe this
13 man?

14 A The man standing behind me?

15 Q The man who did the shooting?

16 A Oh, yes. Oh, yes. He was smaller than me.

17 Q He was a small--

18 A Dark head--dark hair.

19 Q Dark hair?

20 A Dark hair.

21 Q How old would you think he was?

22 A I think--I wouldn't think he was more than 24
23 years old.

24 Q Uh huh (yes).

25 A Maybe less than that.

26 Q What nationality do you think he was?

1 A I--I think he was--I couldn't tell you. He
2 never opened the mouth. He never talked, so he never had
3 any accent I could tell; but he could easily be a Mexican
4 or Puerto Rican.

5 Q Latin descent?

6 A Latin descent, yeah.

7 Q Would you know him if you saw him again?

8 A I would say yes. Yes. Yes.

9 Q What color hair do you say and how was it--

10 A Dark.

11 Q Dark hair, and would you describe it?

12 A Slightly backwards, combed slightly, but a
13 little backwards.

14 Q Was it normally normal or long or short?

15 A Yeah. He didn't have this long hair, no, I don't--
16 he didn't have that.

17 Q Uh huh (yes).

18 Q What was he wearing; do you remember?

19 A As a matter of fact, I thought it was one of
20 our banquet housemen because he had a blue suit on, a dark
21 suit on.

22 Q You mean a work suit or--

23 A Work suit, dark. I think it was blue.

24 Q Uh huh (yes).

25 A The first idea I had, I thought it was one of the
26 busboys, one of the housemen.

1 Q Uh huh (yes).

2 A When I looked at the face, I didn't recognize
3 him.

4 Q You had never seen him before--

5 A No.

6 Q --as far as you know, anyway? Now, you say
7 when you first saw him, he was more or less appeared in
8 front of you?

9 A Right here, and we struggle about--until we get
10 about right over here somewhere in the middle, middle of it,
11 'cause I pulled him away and I--

12 Q Was he still firing?

13 A He was still firing, yeah. Oh, yeah. Like I
14 said, I don't know how many shots he shot, but I was trying
15 to get his gun away and his arm away and he was pulling him
16 on the side; so I don't know how many feet. I think we got
17 almost to the middle of the heaters, approximately.

18 Q Did you ever look back and see the Senator or
19 any other persons down, apparently wounded?

20 A I saw Kennedy laying down and saw blood coming
21 somewhere from his head, but I was holding him and people
22 came following me. Afterward I saw somebody else laying
23 almost close to him, next to him.

24 Q Now, you say you looked down and you saw other
25 persons standing down in this area, right?

26 A Right, there were people in front of me when I

came out.

Q In other words, when you left the Embassy Room--

A Yes.

Q --and cleared these doors here and passed where the employees were standing--

A Uh huh (yes).

Q --you looked down the hallway and you saw other people standing--

A I saw them; not too many, but I don't know--six, seven, eight people. I don't know.

Q Did you recognize anyone standing down here?

A Huh hu (no).

Q Not a soul. In other words, do you think they were the employees at the hotel or news people or just bystanders?

A I think bystanders. Maybe one of them newsmen. I don't know. Really, I don't know.

Q Do you--

A Course, at the time I got to him, I didn't pay no attention to anybody left or right except the guy that standing behind me was talking to--the colored guy; he was there.

Q Mr. Johnson?

Q Mr. Johnson.

Q Rafer Johnson?

A Mr. Johnson, yeah. He was talking to him. Then

1 I saw somebody else hitting him on the head and then I
2 looked backwards and saw somebody else laying there; but
3 that's all I know--he had the gun in his hand and I was
4 trying--

5 Q Did you ever get any indication that there was
6 anybody in that area that was helping this man with the
7 gun, that was a friend of his or anything?

8 A No. No. No.

9 Q Nothing?

10 A No, not at all.

11 Q Did you notice any--any--any male latins,
12 what you could describe as male latins dressed similar
13 or dressed not in normal business suit or sports coat and
14 slacks and tie--

15 A No.

16 Q No one else?

17 A I didn't see anybody, but could have been.
18 I don't know. I don't remember.

19 Q You didn't see anybody, as far as you remember,
20 anyway?

21 A No.

22 Q Fine. You had the Senator by the left hand, did
23 you say?

24 A Yeah.

25 Q Your left hand and his left--

26 A (*) He let it go one time and he was shaking

1 hands with somebody just shortly before and I got his hand
2 again, was trying to pull him through the crowd, get him
3 away from there.

4 Q Were you on the right side of him?

5 A On the right side of him, yes, but it was close
6 to the heaters, you know.

7 Q Uh'huh (yes). Right along--when you say "heaters,"
8 you mean the steam tables?

9 A Yeah, I was in front of him just like this. I
10 was holding his hand just like this.

11 Q And he had stopped to shake hands with somebody?

12 A Shake hands with somebody, stopped, and I
13 got this hand again and was trying to pull him.

14 Q You was more or less right in front of him,
15 pulling him sideways?

16 A Right.

17 Q He stopped to talk to a dishwasher, is that right,
18 or to shake hands with a dishwasher?

19 A Yes, he shook hands with one of the--I think it
20 was one of the dishwashers (*) get ahold of him again.
21 Son of a gun.

22 Q Did it happen in the fight?

23 A It was close, you know.

24 Q Oh, the button was pulled off?

25 A Yes.

26 Q Oh, I see.

1 A Was he bleeding? Must have been bleeding, some-
2 where.

3 Q I don't know. Did you leave the little diagram
4 here?

5 SGT. MCGANN: Yeah.

6 SGT. CALKINS: Okay. Thanks a lot. It was

Uecker was holding Kennedy's hand. Has Kennedy's right hand. Kennedy had stopped to shake hands with dishwasher. Uecker again grabbed Kennedy's right hand with his left hand and pulled him out of the crowd towards the Colonial Rm. Was slightly to right and in front of Kennedy. Saw susp. standing directly in front of him holding gun in right hand. Fired 2 or 3 times at Kennedy. Uecker grabbed gun and susp. pushing gun and hand away susp continued to fire. Can I.D. susp. and gun.

The pan and platter holder by the ice box is used by all persons in the kitchen, to move pans from one location to another. Head Steward, Devyak, Andy, is in charge of clean up. The Latin print team, Knott #10447, Dorman, #10247, were at scene and attempted to lift prints from pan holder and ice box, but had no success.

Mr. Unruh stated that on the night of the shooting, he was with the Kennedy party. He arrived on stage sometime prior to the arrival of the Senator and began speaking about the Senator pending his arrival. According to Unruh, the Senator arrived and gave his victory speech. During the speech, Mr. Unruh was on stage with the Senator. At the conclusion of the speech, the Senator exited the stage via a rear door. Mr. Unruh exited via a door to the left of the stage. He followed the Senator into the kitchen area. At the time of the shooting, he heard between five and ten sharp shots but could not distinguish them as individual reports. He did not see the suspect do the shooting, nor did he see the Senator or Paul Schrade fall. He said at the time his attention must have been directed somewhere else, or he was possibly engaged in conversation. There was a tremendous amount of confusion in the crowd during the shooting. Immediately after the shooting, he moved forward and recalled passing victim Paul Schrade, who was lying on the floor, on his left side. He made a short right turn, and this placed him at the feet of the Senator. He felt there was nothing he could do for the Senator and therefore engaged himself in holding back the crowd of people who were coming from the direction of the Colonial Room. After order had been somewhat restored in the room, he went to check on the suspect. He took upon himself the responsibility of maintaining the suspect's safety. He kept the suspect under observation although not under physical control until the arrival of the police. Once the police arrived, he accompanied them and the suspect to Rampart Station. En route to the Police Station in the police vehicle, the suspect made the statement, "I did it for my country." Mr. Unruh asked the suspect, "Why him?" (referring to the Senator) to which the suspect replied, "It's too late."

OFFICERS' COMMENTS: In viewing the CBS film which was made immediately after the shooting, Mr. Unruh appears approximately 15 seconds after the start of the film. He is seen holding back the crowd. Mr. Unruh's statement that he went to the Senator first, felt he could do nothing for him, and so attempted to control the crowd is therefore verified by the film. Because of the time involved in the film, it would definitely indicate that Mr. Unruh was in the pantry area of the kitchen where the shooting took place at the time of the shooting. He

Supplemental Interview:

This investigator received information that the business card of Keith Duane Gilbert was in the possession of Wayne, at the time of his apprehension after Sen. Kennedy was shot. Gilbert is reported to be an extremist and militant who has been involved in a dynamite theft, previously.

Michael Wayne was contacted and asked to explain his possession of the card. Wayne stated that he does not know Gilbert. He does not know how the card came into his possession, and does not remember ever having it.

He cannot recall having a card from any Reloading Shop.

During the interview with Augustus Mallard (I-260) he was asked about the business card. Mr. Mallard could not remember anything about the card, and does not know if he found it or even saw it. Mallard was the Security Officer who apprehended Mr. Wayne on 6-5-68.

Mr. Wayne was brought to our attention by Mr. Charles Winner (I-239), who stated a Michael Wayne had spoken to him in the kitchen area, prior to Sen. Kennedy being shot.

A photograph was taken of a man in handcuffs at the Ambassador Hotel. This photo was taken by Mr. Fontanini, L.A. Times. The man in the handcuffs was Mr. Wayne.

Mr. Wayne was in the kitchen when Kennedy was shot, and was the subject of reports by Patti Nelson, Tom Klein and Dennis Weaver (I-623) of a man running through the lobby with a long object in his hand, which appeared to be a rifle.

Wayne was on the 5th floor of the Hotel prior to Kennedy going down the elevator to the Embassy Room. He was attempting to obtain an autograph from Kennedy. Kennedy went down the elevator and Wayne went down in the one with the press. They arrived at the kitchen at approx. the same time.

He moved through the kitchen with Kennedy, and managed to stop Kennedy at one point and get his signature on a roll of posters.

After signing the poster, Kennedy moved into the Embassy Room with his party, to make his victory speech.

The poster is described as approx. 3 ft long, tightly rolled (1 1/2 in.)

There were not too many people in the kitchen area after Kennedy left. At this time, Wayne spoke to a man, attempting to get a Humphry tie clasp. (Wayne collects political campaign souvenirs). This man was Charles Winner (I-239).

Wayne went into the EmbassyRoom and listened to Kennedy's speech.

Wayne recalls observing two women in the kitchen area prior to Kennedy entering the Embassy Room. One woman was caucasian, blond, wearing a light colored dress, and had a Kennedy Press Pass in a plastic holder, on a chain around her neck. She told him to leave the kitchen area.

The second woman he described as Fe. Latin, 5-5, heavy, dark hair, looked messed up, wearing the sash across her chest that was similar to that worn by the Kennedy Girls. She was also wearing one of Edward Kennedy's tie clasps from his 1962 campaign. Black skirt.

Wayne left the Embassy Room and returned to the kitchen prior to Kennedy completing his speech. After completing his speech, Kennedy returned to the kitchen. When Kennedy entered the kitchen, Wayne was standing on the east end of the kitchen, close to the doors which lead to the lobby outside the Embassy Room. Kennedy walked toward Wayne as he walked through the kitchen.

Wayne became aware of noises, and someone stated "He's been hit." Suddenly I was aware of the shots. I turned and saw him beginning to move, and men falling on top of a man in a blue shirt.

I paused, people panicked, I went into the Press Room and tried to use the phones with the light on them, but was unable to get the operator.

He states people didn't know about the shooting - He tried 4 or 5 phones - for a few seconds. Unk how long.

He rushed out of the Press Room (Colonial Room) and through the crowd. People asked him what happened and he told them "I can't say"

When he left the Press Room he turned right, then went to the Gold Room where he talked to a Hotel Employee who didn't speak English. He couldn't locate a phone, so he walked and ran through the crowd in the lobby, to the fountain area, turned right, and went to the area of the Venetian Room where he ran up to a Security Guard (Augustas Mallard) and said "I need a telephone quickly." Mallard wanted to know why, and Wayne made a statement about Sen. Kennedy having been shot.

Mallard took Wayne into the room and placed handcuffs on him.

Wayne was taken to the Hotel Security Office,, and later to the Gold Room and interviewed by LAPD Personnel. He was released from custody.

Wayne states he did not have a camera, or take any pictures that night. He cannot place a woman in a polka dot dress in the kitchen.

He has not been interviewed by the FBI, Press, or District Attorney's Office.

The only person he recognized in the kitchen area was Roosevelt Grier, and people Wayne only knows by sight, not names. He was not aware of Sirhan's presence in the area prior to the shooting. He has not knowingly seen Sirhan prior to that night.

Wayne was born in Manchester, England, entered the U.S. in 1951, naturalized in 1960. He professes to be of Jewish background, but not from the Middle East.

WAYNE was re-interviewed by investigating officers. Officers had information that Sirhan or some body resembling Sirhan was in the electrician's booth adjacent to Rafferty's headquarters at the Ambassador Hotel between 10:15 & 11:15 PM the night of the shooting. When WAYNE was questioned about being at this location, he replied that he was uncertain and did not recall.

He had spent the evening at Kennedy headquarters on Wilshire Blvd. From there he went to McCarthy headquarters at the Hilton and from there to the Ambassador Hotel. He was not sure of his times, but he estimated somewhere between 8 & 10 PM he arrived at the Ambassador. After arriving at the Hotel, he went to the Ambassador Ballroom area, from there to the Colonial Room which he entered via the main hallway. He was refused admittance to the room itself, left the room, went back into the main hall, and from there took a short corridor into the kitchen area and then entered the Colonial Room via the kitchen area. He gained admittance and managed to obtain a press button. With this button he then went to the 5th floor where he mingled with the crowd in the Kennedy suite. When the Senator left his suite to go to the Embassy Room, WAYNE followed. WAYNE recalled going down in an elevator next to the elevator used by the Senator. He went into the kitchen area and after loitering about, was asked to leave. From there he went into the main hall and then into the Embassy Room where he watched part of the speech. He left the Embassy Room via the front entrance and from there entered the kitchen again through a short corridor. He placed himself in the kitchen area somewhere between the ice machines and the doors to the Colonial Room at the time the Senator entered the kitchen area. He did not see the Senator, but saw the group which he assumed the Senator was a part of, entering the kitchen area. His next recollection was that of noises which were the shots from the suspect's gun. He recalled looking in the direction of the sounds and observing the rear of the suspect. He did not see the gun and could not state which hand was holding the gun. Sometime during the struggle with the suspect, he ran into the Colonial Room and picked up several telephones attempting to call for help and

stated he was unable to get a line. He left the Colonial Room and was in the main lobby area by the fountain and was taken into custody by a guard as a possible suspect. He was later released. WAYNE was interviewed on 7-12-68 at 3:30 PM by Sgt. Varney, S.U.S. Unit. This interview goes into more detail regarding WAYNE'S activities that evening. The purpose of the re-interview was to establish whether or not WAYNE was in the electrician's booth prior to the shooting. This could not be substantiated or denied by WAYNE.

Central Receiving Hospital records indicate that victim Weisel was admitted at 12:41 A.M. and discharged at 1:27 A.M. June 5, 1968 after being brought to the Hospital via a Goodhue Ambulance. He was treated for a bullet wound on the left abd., abd soft VS OK AD&C. Treatment received was LMD Hosp. for X-Ray and ABC Surgery. MS 1/4 SC fluids deferred. Ambulance condition on discharge was declared satisfactory by Dr. Bazilauskas. On June 5, 1968 at approximately 8:30 P.M. Nurse M. Carlon was interviewed at Kaiser Permanente, 4857 Sunset Blvd., Hollywood, and gave the following information regarding victim Weisel. Victim was admitted at approximately 2:15 AM. this date via Goodhue Ambulance in the company of Dr. Bernard Arias. It appears that victim Weisel and victim #2 Schrade shared the same ambulance to Kaiser Foundation Hospital. At the time of interview with Nurse Carlon victim Weisel was under sedation and not available for questioning. His Physician of record was Dr. William Neal a Surgeon on the Kaiser Hospital Staff. Even though victim Weisel's condition was listed as satisfactory the prognosis was doubtful as to his possible personal appearance at a hearing scheduled for Friday June 7, 1968.

Mr. West was interviewed at Parker Center on June 18, 1968, at 11:00 a.m., in Room 318.

At the time of the shooting, Mr. West was in the kitchen following the Senator and had a tape recorder in his possession. After the shots were fired, he turned on his tape recorder and related what he was seeing; and, of course, the background noises can be heard. This tape is booked evidence in this case under property #55. At the time of this interview, Mr. West made the following statement in regard to his actions at the time of the shooting.

I followed the Senator from the stage through the curtain at the rear of the stage. He was ahead of me. I knew he was ahead of me as I walked into the kitchen because that is the way the crowd went. I walked into the kitchen, and I heard two shots. I was about here. (Marked place on map) I think Mrs. was behind me. I turned on my tape recorder just as a woman screamed--some-one yelled, "The Senator has been shot." I pushed forward and saw a man down on the floor. I recognized him, but I could not identify him. I pushed forward kind of sideways past two or three people and saw Mr. Kennedy lying on the floor. I started looking for the gun. Then I saw two Caucasians holding the suspect, and the gun seemed to be pointing at me. At this time I noticed Rosie Grier just ahead of me, and he grabbed this guy. I reached for the barrel of the gun, but there were other hands on it; and I remember yelling, "Get the gun." I can't remember which hand the gun was in. I couldn't get a hold of the barrel because there was so many hands on the gun.

I yelled, "Grab his thumb!" The gun was freed, and I couldn't say who got it. Then I noticed Johnson moving up (Rafer Johnson). I moved back toward the door of the main kitchen. Next I saw Jesse Unruh on top of the table. He seemed to be taking charge, and at this time the suspect had moved out of my view. The crowd at the time I heard the shots was not too heavy. I don't know who was left or right of me, but there only seemed to be a sprinkling of people around me.

1 whatever the itinerary--and change whatever need be changed.

2 A I--I couldn't possibly tell you--I know the
3 itinerary was changed a number of times. I don't think we
4 were ever on schedule except the time he lost the election
5 in Portland and he arrived ahead of time. What the changes
6 were, I couldn't tell you other than going out and getting
7 our sheets and trying to compare them; that's all I can do.

8 Q Did he--shall we say then to both pick your mind
9 and follow this as a guide, the itinerary that I handed
10 you? Is that--would be the easiest way?

11 A That's the only way--

12 Q Okay.

13 A --we can do it. First of all, let's see, Sunday
14 --well, I would say that on June 2nd we--this schedule is
15 correct up until the Strawberry Festival. We did not go to
16 the Ambassador form the Strawberry Festival. We went to--
17 to Disneyland.

18 Q You picked him up at the International Airport?

19 A I picked him up in Orange County just as it says.

20 Q Orange County.

21 A In other words, the itinerary is correct up
22 through participating in the Strawberry Festival parade--

23 Q Okay.

24 A --at Garden Grove, and from there we proceeded
25 to Disneyland with the children.

26 Q When you picked him up at the Orange County Airport

1 there, was you the driver?

2 A I drove his car all the time.

3 Q You drove the vehicle, and he had his wife then
4 with him?

5 A Wife, and I believe there were four children--
6 I'm not sure.

7 Q Then you drove to this Strawberry Festival?

8 A We drove as it indicates here. We went up
9 through the Garden Grove--City of Garden Grove, to the Bolsa
10 --or whatever it was. It was a ball park in Garden Grove
11 behind one of the schools. I guess the high school ball
12 park, and where he addressed the Strawberry Festival
13 gathering, and from there we proceeded to Disneyland.

14 A May I stop you one second. Did you stay for
15 the speech thing?

16 A Oh, yes, I stayed for the whole thing.

17 Q This was a campaign speech to this group?
18 In a Strawberry Festival, what would that consist of?

19 A You got me. It was--it consisted of, I guess,
20 strawberry growers of Orange County. I really don't know
21 who it was.

22 Q It sounds so unusual to have strawberry growers

23 **

24 A I think so, too; but it was some sort of--their
25 usual harvest, or whatever it was. I suppose it's a large
26
