was quite crowded and the complexity of the situation was increased by the presence of television cameras and cables.

At the time of the shooting, he placed himself in the vicinity of the doors leading into the kitchen, however, he had not yet entered the kitchen. He estimated he was two or three paces from the door. He recalled hearing what he had first thought was the pop of two balloons but then in looking into the kitchen area he observed smoke. He immediately ran into the kitchen area and headed toward the direction of the smoke. He recalled seeing a man lying on the floor who he thought was dead (probably Paul Schrade). He then saw Senator Kennedy lying on the floor and paused momentarily over the Senator.

He related that at the time he felt there was 14 nothing he could do for the Senator and so he turned and went 15 16 in the direction of a group of men scuffling with the man. 17 He heard someone shouting, "Get the gun, get the gun". At 18 that time, he observed Rosie Grier, along with other men, 19 holding a suspect. He saw the gun in the suspect's hand and 20 dove across the table in an effort to grab the gun. He got 21 his hand on the gun but Rosie Grier had better control of it. $\mathbf{22}$ Rosie removed the gun from the suspect's hand and gave it to 23 him. Johnson stated he kept the gun in his possession until 24 his arrival at Rampart Station at which time he turn the gun 25 over to a police officer named McGann (Sgt. McGann, Homicide Division). 26

Witness states he arrived at the Ambassador Hotel at approximately 10:00 p.m. on June 4, 1968. Upon arriving, he had tried to gain entrance to the Embassy billroom, but was refused. He then went to the Ambassador ballroom and remained there for approximately one half hour. He then went to the floor below the Ambassador ballroom into a kitchen area where he obtained a cook's uniform which he put on and then went back up the stairs to the Embassy room where he gained admittance. He removed the uniform.

During Senator Kennedy's speech, he stood in front of the podium on the west side. When the speech was concluded and Kennedy left the stage by the rear exit, witness jumped up on the stage and followed the Senator out the back. He observed the Senator enter the pantry area and was approximately three or four feet from the door when he heard what he thought was four or five firecrackers go off. He then ran forward and observed one man lying on the floor who appeared to be dead. He then observed two males struggling with the suspect. He believes one of the males was Roosevelt Grier. He then jumped up on the metal table where the struggle was going on. He yelled for someone to get the gun. He also states that he hit the suspect on the chest and on the knee.

He remained in the kitchen until after the police arrived and took the suspect away.

Sometime prior to the Senator making his victory speech. I was asked by one of the Kennedy 17 campaign workers to watch one of the doors leading into the pantry area. This door is the second door east of the stage I watched it for about ten minutes while the regular fellow. went and got some refreshment. During this time, some people came out of the kitchen and this group included the suspect who I later saw

the police take away. He was described as a male Mexican in his early twenties, 5'6", 135 lbs,, with black curly hair, He was wearing light blue pants and a light blue shirt. The clothes were fairly snug-fitting. He was standing at a

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location where no one was supposed to be standing so I went up to him and told him that he would have to move back. He was very nice and moved back.

After the regular fellow, who was watching the door, came back, I went into the pantry area and I met Judy Royer. She was coming from the staff press room which was located just west of the stage. We both walked slowly into the pantry and down towards the Colonial Room. Judy was commenting on the lack of security. She told some guy with a rolled up picture of Kennedy he would have to leave the pantry area. He told her he had part of an autograph of Senator Kennedy and the Senator told him he would finish signing it when he came back through the kitchen. Judy made him leave the pantry area at that time.

We walked into the Colonial Room. We stayed there for a short time and then went back out into the pantry area. We were about in the center of the pantry area when we saw the Senator and the crowd come through the door leading from the stage. We turned around and headed back towards the Colonial Room. We had reached the last serving table when I heard what sounded like five firecrackers go off. I turned around and all I could see was a mass of people milling about and a lot of activity. I just stood there stunned. I heard someone yell, "Guard the door" so I went to the doors leading into the Colonial Room and stood guard. I looked back and I could see someone wrestling up by the serving

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tables. About this time, someone came running toward me and ran into the Colonial Room. He stopped and talked to one of the uniformed security guards. After that, I went into the Colonial Room. I was in a daze for about four or five minutes. She went on to state that after the shooting she talked to two waiters, one was a Negro, the other was a Male/Cauc of poss Dutch descent and described as old and short. The Cauc told her that the suspect (Sirhan) had asked him earlier two or three time if Senator Kennedy was coming through this particular area. Mrs. Lee feels that it might have been this conversation with this waiter that resulted in the police looking for the girl in the "Polka Dot" dress. She thinks that she might be this girl. Mrs. Lee is a Fem/Cauc 48 yrs, 5-52" 120 lbs, blk hair, haz eyes. She claims that she was wearing a blk long sleeved dress and a large white hat similar to a "Chef's" hat (nothing with Polka dots however).

Mrs. Lee stated that she entered the "Embassy." room through the main doors at approx. 9:00PM, Tues, June 4th. Sometime later she entered the hall which leads to the kitchen area, passed through the doors leading to the kitchen and sat in one of two chairs located just inside these doors. Just before the Senator finished his Victory speech she left this location and went to one of the bars off the main lobby and got a drink. She returned shortly thereafter and was in the area of the doors leading to the Colonial Room when she heard the shots and subsequent commotion. She did not see the Senator after he was shot. The only person she recalls seeing at this time was Mr. Shrade and this was just after he had been shot and was down on the floor. "Ight after the shooting a large group of men who had Sirhan in custody passed by her and into the Colonial Room. She claims that she struck Sirhan on the head with her purse and they passed by. She does not recall seeing Sirhan at any time prior to this.

It is this investigators' opinion that this witness is not the woman sought that was wearing the "Polka Dot Dress", based on her age, physical description and her own description of the clothing that she was wearing.

10 Suzanne Locke stated that she was a member of the 11 "Kennedy Girls", a volunteer organization working for the 12 election of Senator Robert Kennedy. She was at the Hotel the 13 evening of the shooting to meet the Senator along with other 14 members of her group. She recalled just prior to the Senator's 15 speach, when she was standing on the left side of the stage. 16 (this would be the left side looking from the stage to the 17 audience) that she noticed Irwin Stroll, one of the victims 18 of the shooting, standing there also. She recalled that the 19 room was quite crowded and there was a lot of pushing and 20 shoving in order to get a position close to the stage. She 21 was with a friend of hers, Acquline Sullivan.

While standing in the area, someone stepped on, or in some other way injured, Locke's friend Sullivan. The two decided to leave the Embassy Room and went to the area behind the stage. They were resting in this area when Richard.

She and Sullivan went into the kitchen after and watched the remainder of the speech on a television nonitor which was located on the left-hend side of the room immediately upon entering the double doors into the kitchen from the Embassy Room. As she recalled, Sullivan was seated to her left at the edge of the table and on her right was Lagurre, the Hotel employee.

At the conclusion of his speech, the Senator 11 entered the kitchen area and when he walked by her she 12remembered congratulating him and referring to him as 13 "president" and that he turned, smiled and acknowledged the 14 The next thing that she recalled was hearing a 15remark. popping sound which she later came to know to be shots. She 16 heard approximately eight to ten of these sounds. She saw 17 a man fall to the floor (probably Paul Schrade) and she saw 18 another lady hit in the head (probably victim Evans). Sho 19 turned to her left and saw her friend Sullivan sink between $\mathbf{20}$ the table they were sitting on and a cabinet. Her first 21 impression was that Sullivan had been shot. She jumped from 22 the table and began exiting the room via the double doors 23 going in the direction of the Embassy Room. She did not see 24 the suspect nor did she see the Senator being shot. 25

the course of conversation she mentions to him, "If you want to see Senator Hennedy get killed, cowe to--" Q BY SGT, COLLINS: Used the word "killed" not shet or anything?

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. Milled or shot, one of those two words. Elthor 5 A killed or shot. Well, saybe she didn't say killed; maybe G she just said shot. You'd have to get him. You know, he's 7 very anti-police about telling them anything, he says, 8 because they're always after me. "They bug my phone and 9 all that." And I says, "Well--" ** the FBI and all that. 10 They're all -- I can't believe it -- they all want to play CIA, 11 and he comes --- you know, he came in here once, and he looks 12 out the window, and he looks all around and he says, "You 13 sure the room isn't bugged?" " "Christ sake, if you want 14 to talk, sit here and talk. All I got is my tape recorder 15. running, see?" And he says, "Nave you got that on? I said, 16 "No." You know, give me that -- ch, boy, James Bond stuff, 17 but you'd never know with these nuts--not nuts, but he wrote 18 a story, and it was in the Hollywood Citizen News. I Saw 19 it the other day, "What Happened to the Girl in the Polka 20 21 Dot Dress?"

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Q We saw that.

Q He says nothing in that article, though. A All he does is the beadlines.

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Q All he's got is a boadline and cold a lot of
 popers in one day, and I'm sure it greatly increased

were so interested in the story that they came out here,
and with the Times Magazine Bureau on Wilshire Boulevard,
and I know they spent a lot of time here investigating
whether there was a girl in a polka dot--

10 Q BY SAR. MACANTAUR: Do you know who the guys 11 were by name?

A I could find out.

Q Yeah, let's get them and find out. We'll talk to them because they have probably gone through it pretty good with them.

The Rupsau Chief at Times knows Fernando. He'd 16 А be the guy--I don't know his lost name, but you see Time is 17 puring his expenses. He's been all over this dama country. 18 Te Coesn't stay hore, this Fernando, he goes down to Mexico, 19 and he goes all over. I don't know what he does down there, 20 but apparently they're paying him for schething. Time does 21 not come up with money and They have their own investigator 22 and all that. They don't pay them both. They pay big 23 expenses, so they may have something to believe him. Time 24 is a protty good magazine. If they believe it, they'll do 25 it. That's where I would go, Time Magazine. The Murcau 26

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Chief here on the story, if he'll tell you, but this is
 what Fernando---and he called me from this guy's office,
 the Bureau Chief's office, and he says, "Do you know this
 guy?" And I said, "Yeah." The Bureau Chief's name I knew.

Q Where is Time's office at?

A On Wilshire Boulevard, Hevorly Hills. Then all kinds of people, you know, ever since I went to you and told all my story down there. I mentioned to one or two other people that, you know, I had been to the Police Department, and this ** You know Bill Turner? He came in here yesterday and--

Ê. --out of a blue sky--Bill Turner ran for Congress 13 in San Francisco, former FBI agent, former something. I 14 don't know. He went from the MEI to another post in the 15 United States Government, like out of the country for three 16 years, then can't back. Then he resigned his government 17 post, and he wont up--he's an attorney now, but he's not 16 really an attorney, he's a writer for Ramparts Magazine. 19 It's a way out ** 20

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Q Oh yeah, I know the name now.

A Gut of a clear blue sky he called me up yesterday, and he started asking me about the same people you asked me about the other day. This cop--I mean not cop--this lawyer, Davis, George Davis, apparently there's a preacher here that picked up--supposedly picked up Sirhan Sirhan

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and wanted to sell him a horse or Sixhan wanted to sell a
horse to him, and he was to meet him at the Ambassader Hotel,
and they'd pay him \$400 at eleven o'clock at night; did you
hear that story?

SAT. COLLENS: Yes.

61 And the preacher has disappeared, and they're A 7 holding him incommunicado up in Northern California. George 8 Davis won't let anybody talk to him. I can't believe all 8 this stuff, and I believe that their story is just set up 10 to do this so people can start making dough out of them or 11 just -- to me it's -- I just don't understand it. A man is shot -- a senator is shot -- it seems like it was clear cut 12 Sixhan did it, but all these background things now are kind 13 14 of cerie that Sirhan was in a plot. It was all a big deal. He was paid off. There were more people in the plot, I 15 don't know. I don't think we'll ever know because that 16 guy's not going to open his mouth to anything. He's going 17 to say, okay, I shot him, give me the -- I'm nuts. And that's 18 what they'll come in and tell them ho's mentally sick, put 19 him in a mental home, and that's it. Nobody will ever 20 21 find out.

22 SGT. COLLINS: They pled straight not guilty, so
23 they're not going to do that.

A Oh, they did? I thought he was going to come with the insanity thing. He pled straight not guilty? I don't know why they would plead not guilty. There must be

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other people besides me that saw him shoot. In other words,
they're people that are going to say, "I saw him shoot him."
And everybody on television saw him being arrested, I mean.
Warranted we can't get a fair trial.

Q BY SGT. COLLINS: Oh, I'm sure they know what
 they're doing. By the way, you said Garrison was coming
 out here, did he ever get---

A He was.

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He was out here?

10 Yeah, he come here. I talked to him on the phone. A 11 then, but another guy came out here with him and I said to 12 him, I said to the Police Department, and I told him I told 13 some officers everything I knew about what you told me and 14 about your investigators have told me. He said, "Well, why 15 did you do that?" And I says-well, I feel that--God dawn 16 it, I don't know who to believe at this point. I've got 17 so much information on this, and I'm really tired of 18 talking about it, you know, because I don't really care any 10 more. If there was an assassination plot to kill John 20 Kennedy and you knew it, why in the hell hasn't anybody come 21 out with it? Why don't you go to the Federal Government. $\mathbf{22}$ If you say the Federal Government is the guy that did it 23 in some way, then you should have gone to the Time Magazine 24 and somebody would have printed it, but I don't think it's 25 true unless I see all your evidence, you know, unless you 26 show me a gua wa unless you show me a person--the persons

you said who had the shooter, and he says, "Well, I couldn't 1 do that because we're still going into court." You know 2 there was a Federal ruling on 1t. It was upheld in this 1 court and tricl, and State brial, the first time it happened. 4 A Federal Judge handed down a writ that they couldn't go to 5 trial, but they broke that and now they're going to trial 6 on this guy, Clay Show; so anyway I pays, "Why don't you 7 come over to my office, and I'll set up a meeting with 8 people I know that are policemon and maybe they could tell 9 you something and you could tell them something." I mean he's told me up to the point which he told 21 other people, you know, but he won't-well, in a way he's 22 might, if he has the evidence, you think he's going to 23 bell me, or you, or you? Because he can't. He's got to 24 wait until he goes to trial, then he'll bring it cut. If 25 there is a total.

Q Did he indicate to you that he thought there was

any conspiracy here in Los Angeles. 21 SOT. COLLINS: Lots of them have been published.
22 A Nut it spens like he was conducting his com
23 little investigation down there about Hobert Kennedy's
24 accassination and trying to link it to John Kennedy's
25 accassination. He definitely feels, by the way, the same
26 group killed John Kennedy that hilled Nobert Kennedy and

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Martin Lather King. Ulta Right Wing Conservatives, conserva-1 tives putting up large amounts of money and acting through 2 different people and some way or another convincing Sirhan 8 Sirhan to shoot him, or paying him off to shoot him. But ζ. he montioned one other thing which he also montions, one 5 other thing which he also montions, a special bullet that 6 Sirian Sirian used. It wasn't a common every day .22 7 caliber pistol that you could walk in the store and get. 8 It was a cortain type of bullet that wouldn't cause deep 9 damage. How did Sirhan Sirhan know about that? Why would 10 Sirhan Sirhan chooting the gun at a target range a couple 11 weeks before -- I read that in the paper, too, that he had 12 13 been out practicing shooting.

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14 Q DY 26T. MacAREMUR: Did Carrison say that it was 15 a special bullet?

I don't know how he -- I know he hasn't got your 16 A files, and he says it was some form of a special bullet 17 that certain people know about and others don't. The average 18 guy going in off the street with a .22 calibor pistol would 19 buy .22 callbor amunition to fit the gun, but these bullets 20 were not regular bullets that you go off the street -- you have 21 to go around to a sporting goods store or a special type 22 store to get these bullets. So I don't know if this is 23 true or not, but I assume he must know something because 24 he said -- and people can direct you to what sporting good 25 stores to go to buy these bullets, and he also tied in that 26

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
