## INFORMATION: (WHO, WHAT, WHEN, WHERE, WHY &amp; HOW)

Dr. Mc Broom was interviewed at his office & made the following statement: I arrived at the hotel approx. 10:20 PM. I entered the kitchen about 10:40 & as I walked through I noticed the susp. standing by a steam table. He was wearing a light pullover shirt & dark pants. He was standing nearest the third table by the door to the press room. He looked out of place as he did not seem dressed for the occasion nor was he dressed like the kitchen help. At the time of the Senator's speech, I stood at the right side of the stage. At the conclusion of the speech the Senator left to his right. I waited a few moments then I started for the door leading into the Anteroom at the right side of the stage. Just as I stepped through this door I heard shots & I saw the susp. with the gun in his left hand. I saw Roosevelt Grier in the kitchen (near the ice machine) as he lunged forward. I then saw Mrs. Evans turn & take a step back toward me, she was bleeding about the head. I left the Anteroom, crossed the ballroom where I stopped to listen to a newsman who was saying that Senator Kennedy had been shot. I then went to the entrance of the Embassy room where I located Dr. Ross Miller & Dr. Parrott & then went into the press room & proceeded into the pantry. As I entered the pantry with Dr. Miller, Jesse Unruh passed me with the police & the susp. I heard Mr. Unruh say "Do you know what you've done?" The susp. replied, "I did it for my country. I can explain everything." I then went into the kitchen & saw Schrader on the floor. He had his head on a hat. The man that had been shot in the stomach was lying on the floor. Mrs. Evans was lying against the wall near the Anteroom door, the north side of the pantry. I think that Senator Kennedy had been taken out as I did not see him on the floor. I helped carry Mr. Weisel out to the ambulance then I came back & helped carry Mr. Schrader out.

Investigators at this time showed Dr. McBroom a picture & he exclaimed "That's a picture of me." He then asked when the picture was taken & he was told approx. 5 seconds after the first shot was fired. The witness is depicted in the picture standing on a platform outside the Anteroom. He was then shown other pictures which contradicted his statements. In one of his original interviews the Dr. had stated that he obs. Roosevelt Grier walking & joking with the Senator before the shooting. He retracted this statement stating that he obs. this prior to the Sen. speech. He had also indicated that he saw a susp. run from the ballroom

after the shots had been fired. He retracted this statement stating that he had seen a male who appeared to be acting unnatural but that he had no reason to believe that this person was involved. He positioned the people in the kitchen that were injured in a manner that is contrary to fact. Two victims he claims to have seen on the floor could not have been located in these positions (Weisel & Evans). When informed that the statements were not consistent & when used in court would certainly embarrass him, he stated, "The one most positive aspect I can testify to is the statements by Unruh & Sirhan. I'm also positive that I saw Sirhan by the steam table approx. 10:40 PM."

Investigators feel that this witness would be unreliable as he has given statements that he alleged were fact & could easily be disproven.

At the time and date of this LAPD interview, witness had not been interviewed by the FBI. He has been interviewed by the following: June 5, 1968 - ABC; CBS on a direct line to New York Network. TV Stations 2, 5, and 7. Radio Station WINS, New York. Newsweek-reporter unknown. Newspaper- a reporter from India. World Press-Mr. Berger. Interview and photograph.

On June 4, 1968, 10:30 PM, witness arrived at the Ambassador Hotel as an official of the Kennedy Campaign. Alone, he entered through the kitchen area as two guards prevented entry through the regular doors leading to the Embassy Ballroom. In passing through the kitchen, he noticed a person he believes may have been Sirhan B. Sirhan, sitting on a kitchen table. This person was wearing a dark pullover and dungree pants whereas the other employees were wearing white uniforms or white jackets and black pants.

Senator Kennedy made his speech and immediately left the podium going to his right with a crowd of people following close behind. The procession headed towards the kitchen. Witness states he was ahead of Rosie Grier and behind Mrs. Evans who preceded him through the swing doors at arms length. Inside the doors, the group came to a complete halt. He heard the popping sound of what he first believed to be balloons bursting. Looking directly ahead, he saw Senator Kennedy place his right hand to his head. He could see a person with a gun in his left hand but could not see the face of this individual. Others were surging towards this person and witness counted six shots. He got the distinct impression that a slug narrowly missed him. In front of him, Mrs. Evans spun around and he saw blood on her forehead. Someone up front yelled "he has been shot." A lady in a black dress was crying and calling for someone to go and get a doctor. Witness exited through the swinging doors and entered the ballroom and saw a F/C, brunnet, 20-26, medium build and wearing a white dress with silver dollar size polka dots, either black or dark blue in color. This young lady showed no signs of shock or disbelief in comparison to other persons in the room and she seemed intent only on one thing--to get out of the ballroom.

Dr. McBROOM located two doctors, Dr. Fred Parrott, 1704 W. Manchester 750-0590, and Dr. Ross Miller, 537 W. Compton 639-5515. Back at the doors to the kitchen they were stopped by a guard in uniform; however, they were allowed to enter when it was explained they were doctors. Witness improvised a stretcher from a table and with the assistance of his two doctor friends and a kitchen helper, carried Mr. Schrade downstairs and requested an officer to summon an ambulance. At this time, Senator Kennedy had already been transported from the scene to Central Receiving.

Returning to the kitchen, witness observed Mr. Unruh speaking to Sirhan (ID'd from mug shots) saying "Man, don't you realize what you have done?" He heard Sirhan reply, "I did it, I did it, I did it for my country. I can explain everything." Sirhan, handcuffed was then taken away in custody of two uniformed police officers.



Prior to the shooting and during the Senator's speech, I  
was in the vicinity of the Colonial Room (Press Room).

When I first learned of the shooting, I entered the kitchen  
area through a double door leading from the main corridor  
to the entrance to the Embassy Ballroom. As I entered I  
observed a large crowd of people halfway down the room.

I jumped up on a metal serving table. I could see what  
was later identified as the suspect's head. He was being  
held in custody by several people. I then jumped down off  
the table and went to the Senator's assistance. I was the  
first one to his side. I took off my coat and put it next  
to his head. About this time Bill Barry and Fred Dutton  
arrived. There was really nothing we could do for the  
Senator until the ambulance arrived. Mr. MacDonald was  
shown a map of the kitchen area and he placed himself just  
prior to the shooting at the double doors at the far east  
of the kitchen area. These doors lead from a corridor from  
the main entrance hallway into the Embassy Ballroom. They  
are just south of the doors leading into the Colonial Room.

The only time I saw Sirhan was in the cafeteria of P.C.C. about 6:50 P.M., 6/4/68. He walked up with another person I don't know. He just came to the table. Sirhan was talking about how he came to the U. S. - by boat or plane & nothing else was said that I remember. He was smiling & ;quite normal. I noticed nothing odd about him at all.

Marof & I came into the cafeteria to have coffee than Sirhan just walked over to the table. I left at 7:00 P.M. for class with Anwar. I think it was only 10 minutes that I talked to Sirhan.

A check with CII and LAPD Intel Div showed no rec. or File on this person.

This is information related to Captain Hugh I. Brown from Bill Curtin over the telephone on June 27, 1968 at 4 P.M.:

They told us that the U.S. Consulate General in Jerusalem had visa applicant records on three of these individuals. The three of them are the two brothers and HALKI. I will give you the information on each one of these three.

The first one is BADRAN MAROUF and they have the same date of birth that you gave me. Address of POB 123, Jerusalem, black hair, brown eyes, height 177 cm. - I don't know what that breaks down to. He applied for a student visa on January 14, 1963 to study at Pasadena City College. He never did complete processing at Amman for the visa. He stated that his uncle, and he didn't give the name of the uncle, would help to support him. He said his uncle was moving permanently to Beirut, Lebanon. The card on him noted that the brother's visa, that would probably be CHALEB, had been extended in the United States from February 15, 1963 to January 31, 1964. There was also a notation on the card that an inquiry had been received from the U.S. Consul in Valencia, Spain, on the subject - on MAROUF, indicating that as of August 9, 1963, MAROUF was studying there. It appears likely that he received his U.S. visa in Beirut. I don't know why they say that. His Jordanian passport, same number, issued January 6, 1963, at Jerusalem.

CHALEB MOHAMMED, same date of birth at Silwan, the same POB 123, Jerusalem, brown hair, brown eyes, height 168 cm., 143 pounds., single. He was issued a student visa on January 18, 1964, valid until January 18, 1965, to study at Los Angeles Pacific College. CHALEB stated that his father was a teacher in Jerusalem. His uncle, MOHAMMED D. SILEMAN SYAM, said to reside at 5002 Monte Vista Street, Los Angeles 42, California. His uncle, who had been a building contractor in Jerusalem, sent CHALEB \$750 to defray expenses for his trip to the United States. His passport #257 684, issued September 17, 1960, in Jerusalem.

ABDO HALKI, date of birth, April 12, 1940, in Jerusalem, POB 123, Amman, Jordan, applied for a visa on June 7, 1966. No record the visa was ever issued. Consul received a petition in July, 1966, for ABDO's sister to have ABDO immigrate under her sponsorship to the United States.

The sister is named ELLEN JABRA MU ADDI, maiden name ALKI, 133 East Harvard Street, Pomona, California. A petition, dated July 25, 1966, to have him immigrate under her sponsorship to the United States. She was born March 3, 1935 in Jerusalem, naturalizing in Los Angeles May 20, 1966 under [REDACTED]. She was planning a petition for entrance for entrance of the following family members:

Parents: JABRA and SHEMOUNI HALKI  
Brothers: HAMEIA and MURQUES  
Sisters: JULIE and MARY

The family apparently resided in Amman, Jordan, since ABDO listed his address at that POB since 1958. That is all on these three.

They didn't come up with anything on HALKI from the U.S. Embassy in Amman, Jordan or the U.S. Consulate General in Jerusalem.

## INFORMATION: (WHO, WHAT, WHEN, WHERE, WAY &amp; HOW)

Mr. Mallard was employed by Ace Guard and assigned at the Ambassador Hotel on the night of the Kennedy shooting. Mr. Mallard was assigned at the doorway of the Rafferty Roadquarters in the West Venetian Room.

Mr. Mallard states he was standing at the doorway when he observed Michael Wayne (I-95 & I-1096) pushing his way through the crowd. Mr. Mallard then heard someone say the senator had been shot, at which time he handcuffed Michael Wayne (I-95) and took Wayne into the Lido Room to wait for the police. Enroute to the Lido Room Mr. Mallard was photographed by Fontaine, a staff photographer for the L.A. Times.

Mr. Mallard states Wayne (I-95) was cooperative and had no weapons on his person at the time he was taken into custody, and was asking to use a phone.

Mr. Mallard states he observed a person that resembled Sirhan standing near the Colonial Room between 6:30/7:00PM and again approx 9:30PM on the night of June 4, 1968. Mr. Mallard described the person as poss. Male/Latin, wearing a white dinner jacket and dark pants. Mr. Mallard stated he could not be positive but he believed the person was wearing a white shirt.

Mr. Mallard was asked why he noticed this person and what the person was doing? Mr. Mallard stated the person was just standing there doing nothing and he noticed him for no special reason. Mr. Mallard stated he did not see anyone wearing a polka-dot dress that evening.

Mr. Mallard stated he was interviewed by the FBI 1 or 2 weeks after the shooting and again 3 or 4 days after the FBI interview by the LASO.

Mr. Mallard stated, "Wayne did not have a rifle in the roll." "The only property I can recall him having was the posters." I did not have a camera.

Mr. Mininsian was interviewed on June 18, 1968, 4:45 p.m., in the kitchen of the Ambassador Hotel. He related the following circumstances including Kennedy's activities prior to taking the stage and his whereabouts at the time the shots were fired.

We brought Senator Kennedy down from the fifth floor in the service elevator to the kitchen. The kitchen area was almost empty. This was about 12 midnight. I did not see anyone that did not belong in the kitchen. From the service elevator we walked past the employees' eating area and then onto the stage through the swinging doors. At the conclusion of his speech, we exited the rear of the stage, turned right, and walked briskly into the kitchen. The Senator slowed at the door to the employees' eating area. I turned and noticed he was shaking hands with the employees. I glanced ahead, and the area was clear except for Mr. Uno Timinson. Next I saw a person move in from my right. I saw a flash and then Mr. Eucker grabbed the suspect around the next. I pushed the two of them against the serving table. The shots continued. No other people grabbed the suspect. I saw the fellow behind the Senator fall, then the Senator fell. Mr. Eucker had the suspect and others were helping him, and I ran to a telephone.

Witness was interviewed June 17, 1968, 7:30 p.m., in the kitchen area of the Ambassador Hotel. He gave the following account of his recollection on the evening of the shooting.

I was in the hallway leading into the north end of the kitchen when I heard what sounded like firecrackers. I'm not sure how many. I kept walking through the swinging doors into the kitchen. As I looked in, I saw Mr. Timinon to my left. There were no women in this area of the kitchen. I looked south through the kitchen, and I saw a group scuffling. I recognized Mr. Eucker, who had the suspect around the neck and was holding him. I went behind him, and I could see that Senator Kennedy was on the floor. No one walked past me as I entered the kitchen. The only person I saw was Uno Timinon. I'm sure that that's me in the picture behind the colored gentleman (Richard Aubry). I gave a complete statement to the F.B.I.

Mistri was in the P.C.C. cafeteria on the night of June 4, with Sirhan Sirhan. The following is an interview with Mistri taken on the above (7-11-68) date.

I have known Sirhan since 1963 at P.C.C. but have never been out with him personally. I've seen him on campus and at functions of the International Club. I saw Sirhan earlier this year inside Santa Anita. There were several other friends of Sirhan at the track who were also known by Mistri. All that was talked about was horses.

On the night of the 4th, I went to Bobs' Restaurant by myself around 6:15PM to have coffee. Around 15 minutes later Sirhan came in and sat down at the counter next to me. First we just chatted about general things, then he read the headline of the Herald Examiner Newspaper that I had and made the remark "This is bad, this is terrible." After this he started talking about the track and horses. (The headline was a statement about the Jordan situation and the gunfire that had broken out between Jordan and Israel.) Sirhan then paid for my coffee and we left. Outside he asked me what I was going to do. I told him I wanted to check the summer scheduals at P.C.C.. He then told me that he would like to come along and we both left for P.C.C.. We entered the cafeteria and obs. some mutual friends sitting at a table. We said hello and sat down. A few minutes later everyone left for class and Sirhan and I remained. He showed me a piece of metal he was holding in his hand that I thought was a slug from a gun. He started talking about rabbit hunting and that he was learning to shoot and hunt. About 7:05PM we left the caffeteria and went back to Bobs' parking lot where our cars were parked. In the lot he again asked me where I was going, stating he would like to play like to play pool with me. I told him I was going to Johns (John Dordy, 176 N. Michigan, Pasadena, Phone SY 5-2033). We both left in our own cars. The time was around 7:15PM.

A check with CIL showed no record or info on Mistri. A check with LAPD Intel. Div. showed no file for this person. Immigration file [REDACTED] - package out out of file - No other info. Immigration will advise when file is available.

Mr. MISTRY had recognized the photo, of SIRHAN B. SIRHAN, shown on T.V. earlier that day. Mr. MISTRY stated that he had attended Pasadena City College with SIRHAN approximately 3 years ago and had seen him on several occasions since - Mr. MISTRY was shown a mug shot of SIRHAN and stated that this was the same person but he could not recall his (SIRHAN'S) name. Mr. MISTRY further stated that he had had coffee with SIRHAN at Bob's Drive-in, near Pasadena City College, in the early evening of 6-4-68. At this time they had a conversation concerning horse - racing - Mr. MISTRY then went to Pasadena City College. Approximately 6:00 pm, Mr. MISTRY had another conversation with SIRHAN in the Pasadena City College Cafeteria. SIRHAN was seated with 3 or 4 other (thought to be Jordanian by MISTRY) Mr. MISTRY conversed for a short time with SIRHAN and his companions. During the course of conversation SIRHAN asked MISTRY if he had ever shot rabbits when MISTRY replied in the negative no more conversation ensued on that subject. MISTRY also states, that while he was seated with SIRHAN, SIRHAN conversed in Jordanian with his companions. As Mr. MISTRY is from India, he recognized the language but did not understand it. STATEMENT:

Yesterday at about 11:20 A.M., 6-4-68, my buddy, Henry Carreon and I went to the San Gabriel Valley Gun Club, 4001 Fish Canyon Road, Duarte. We went to the range and unpacked our stuff and waited for the next break, approximately 30 minutes. Then we put our targets out there and started shooting. About 20 minutes after we started shooting, the range officer came and told us that we could not shoot my pistol at this section, as only rifles are allowed. We talked it over and decided Henry would shoot the pistol for a while and I would stay with the rifle. Henry went over there and started shooting and I was shooting my rifle on the rifle range. As I was shooting, I heard this rapid firing. I thought it was a Luger, with a long clip on it, an automatic, because it sounded real loud and very rapid. I walked over to the pistol range to see the man who was firing it, and then I saw Henry firing my gun, a .22 magnum Colt, and I asked him (Henry) who the gentleman shooting this rapid fire was. He said that it was the man down there and to his (Henry's) left, west. There were two men down there, and I thought it was the first one, but it wasn't. The first man was an Anglo-Saxon, in his fifties; and the second one was the one that was actually firing the pistol. I could see the shape of the gun, and thought it was a .38 from the way it sounded. It was very loud. So, I stayed there and shot a few more rounds with my pistol. Then I went back to the rifle range and shot a few more rounds. After 1:00 P.M., I approached the second man, described as 5'5" or 5'6", approximately 145 pounds, very curly, dark hair, with high cheek bones, and of Latin descent, and asked him if that was a .38 and he said no. He said that it was a .22. I was in doubt and said, "That loud; a .22?" He said, "Yeah." So he put down the gun. Then I approached him and started conversing with him and about that time he picked up the gun again and flipped open the lid where you put the bullets in and picked up a small screwdriver, and injected the bullets from the cylinder. Then he started inserting the rounds. - I don't know how many, into the cylinder. During our conversation the gentleman asked me how I aimed my gun. I told him that mine didn't have a sight and that I held it firm in a downward position. I told him that this way I could get better accuracy. He said, "Oh," and then fired one or two shots with his gun, holding it like I had told him. After that, Henry asked the gentleman how many rounds does that hold, 6? The man said, "No, it holds 8." Then he put down the gun again and talked to us. I left and went to get my gun to show him and brought my gun over and he asked me if it was a .22, and I said, "No, a .22 magnum." About that time I noticed that he had approximately 8 boxes of .22 ammunition, six of which I think were Super-X brand, and two boxes that

said Mini-Mag. I had never seen anything like this before so I asked him about it and he proceeded to tell me that they were about 25¢ more expensive and were a hollow point and upon impact on an object, they spreaded more. So thereabouts, he showed me the difference in size between the Super-X and the Mini-Mag. I saw approximately 400 expended casings to his left and about seven empty boxes to his right. During this conversation between this gentleman and I, he told me that he stopped shooting at the stationary target and at the break he had placed a small piece of wood about 2½ inches in length and placed it way above the target and was shooting at it to see what damage it would have on the wood. He told me that he wasn't even getting close to the wood and it was making him angry. Henry asked him who made the gun and he didn't say anything and he took a couple of shots, and then pointed at the top of the gun where the name was. After I saw the name of the gun to be Ivar-Johnson, I noticed that it was an 8 shot, 2-inch, double action. After a while we left him. I think the distance between where the man was standing and shooting at the target and piece of wood is approximately 30 feet or more. A short time later we left. I heard about Senator Kennedy being shot at about 1:00 A.M., June 5, at my house. After hearing the description of the suspect, Henry asked me about the individual at the range, what he was wearing, and I started thinking. I said that it was dark trousers, might have been blue, and he was wearing a shirt. As soon as the caliber of the weapon was announced, I began to realize that it was too much of a coincidence, especially when they said 8 shot. Henry called the police station a short time later. Approximately 4:15 A.M., an officer came to my house and identified himself as Officer Estrella, Los Angeles Police Department, Homicide Division, who had some mugs with him. Of the six mugs that I saw, I picked one which in my mind was the individual at the range. On the mug the following was there: C-6-5-68, Los Angeles PO, J BK 495 139. I came to the police station and dictated this statement. I have read it and consider it accurate.

The attached statements are from a David R. Montellano of 3314 Maceo and a Henry A. Carreon, 1838 Workman, both of Los Angeles. These witnesses, while practicing shooting a .22 caliber Colt revolver at the San Gabriel Valley Gun Club, 4001 Fish Canyon Road, Duarte, on 6-4-68 at approximately 1:00 P.M., observed a male Latin, described as 5'5", 130-135 pounds, black curly hair, very thin build, brown eyes, fitting a .22 caliber revolver, 8 shot, at a target. After conversing with the above male Latin, witnesses went to Montellano's home.

On approximately 1:00 A.M. on 6-5-68, witnesses had heard of Senator Kennedy and others being shot. The more they heard of the description of the suspect in the shooting and the description of the weapon used, the more they were convinced that the suspect was the same male Latin that they had spoken to at the gun range the afternoon before.

Upon hearing that the weapon used was an Iver-Johnson .22 caliber, 8 shot, they telephoned the Los Angeles Police Department. At approximately 4:15 A.M. on 6-5-68, Officer Estrella, #10658, Homicide Division, went to Montellano's home with six mugs. Witnesses observed the six mugs and both picked out the mug that was taken earlier in the morning of the suspect taken into custody. Witnesses were positive that the mug shown to them and the person they conversed with at the gun range on 6-4-68 is the same person. Witnesses also stated that they can identify the weapon.

Informant interviewed at his place of employment on above date and time. Montellano and a friend of his HENRY CARREON (K-30) arrived at the San Gabriel Valley Gun Club on 6-4-68, 12:10pm. After obtaining their targets. They went to the rifle range (addendum).

When they arrived Montellano had a conversation with a man and woman who were already firing on the range. The man and woman have been identified as GEORGE MIOCH, Deputy parole officer, and his girl friend CORLISS EDWARDS. They had their teenage children with them, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED].

MONTELLANO fired his rifle and CARREON fired a pistol. After CARREON fired about 6 rounds, the range master approached them and stated pistols could only be fired on the pistol range.

CARREON complied and went to the pistol range. MONTELLANO remained on the rifle range an additional 10 to 15 minutes, then joined CARREON on the pistol range, target #18 (addendum). As MONTELLANO arrived on the pistol range his attention was directed to target # 5 or 6 where a man was firing in rapid succession. MONTELLANO identified a mug shot of SIRHAN as being that person.

Shortly after MONTELLANO went to the pistol range MR. MIOCH and MISS EDWARDS and their children came to the pistol range and took up a position on target (15 or 16).

When MONTELLANO first arrived on the Pistol Range (12:45pm) a male/cauc, early 30's, 5-10/6, thin hair, heavy set was firing a Ruger or Luger on target # 23 or 24. This person left shortly after MONTELLANO arrived.

There was another person (male/cauc) firing to the left of SIRHAN. This was probably CHARLES KENDALL (I-316).

MONTELLANO went to SIRHAN's position and asked if the gun he was firing was a .22 caliber or .38 caliber. They had a short conversation and SIRHAN stated it was a .22 caliber. After SIRHAN fired a few more rounds MONTELLANO asked what the make of the gun was. SIRHAN pointed to the top of the revolver and he noted it was a Iver Johnson.

MONTELLANO described the Iver Johnson as a Blue Steel in color with a v. r

short barrel. MONTELLANO noted a total of eight boxes of .22 caliber shells in front of SIRHAN's position (50 shells to a box). Six of the boxes were super x caliber .22 long rifle and were empty. Two boxes were .22 Caliber Minnie Mags. At least one of these boxes were full as SIRHAN was taking bullets from it to fire. After firing SIRHAN took the casings from the cylinder and placed them in a pile on the bench in front of him. MONTELLANO estimated that there were 350 to 400 empty .22 caliber shell casings. MONTELLANO did not know what SIRHAN did with these casings after he was through.

MONTELLANO and CARREON left the range about 2:00/2:30pm. When they left SIRHAN was still firing. MR. MIOCH and MISS EDWARDS along with their children had left their target before MONTELLANO and CARREON left.

While MONTELLANO and CARREON were on the pistol range they did not see SIRHAN have a conversation with any one else on the range.

During the conversation between MONTELLANO and CARREON and SIRHAN, SIRHAN mentioned he had put a piece of wood on his target and was going to see what effect the Minnie Mags would have. The results of this test were unknown by MONTELLANO.

During their conversation about shells SIRHAN stated the Minnie Mags he was firing were about 25% more than the super x but that they were hollowpoint and spread out more on impact.

MURRAY is a reporter for the Chicago Sun Times. He arrived at the Ambassador Hotel during the speech. He went to the Colonial Room and was advised by Dick Drayne that: "We're going to bring him in here so the writing press can have a crack at him."

MURRAY was in the Colonial Room 5 to 10 minutes when he walked into the kitchen to meet Kennedy. He was a few feet into the kitchen, and looking at some TV lights, when he heard shots.

It took a few moments for MURRAY to orient himself to the location of the shots. When he did, he ran toward the sound. On his right, he observed a struggle in progress at one of the serving tables. He couldn't distinguish any individuals in the struggle, but did see a gun.

In front of him, MURRAY observed a wall of people who seemed to be leaning forward. He saw Kennedy lying on the floor, blood streaked across his face. He was lying on his back, head raised, eyes half open. Kennedy's right fist was raised off the floor and was twitching.

BBC had a camera in the kitchen and appeared to be taking pictures during the shooting.

MURRAY did not see the shooting. He cannot ID anyone in the kitchen. After seeing Kennedy, he ran to a telephone to meet a 2:30 AM deadline. (12:30 AM PDT)

He did not see Sirhan prior to the shooting. He did not see a woman in a polka dot dress. He was interviewed by the FBI. He did not have a camera. He wrote articles for the Chicago Sun Times.

MURRAY did not observe anyone run from the kitchen after the shooting.

SIRHAN then started talking about the track and horses. SIRHAN then paid for MISTRIS coffee and they both walked outside. SIRHAN then asked what MISTRI had planned and was informed that MISTRI was going to look at the summer schedual at P.C.C. SIRHAN stated he would like to come along and both walked to P.C.C which is directly next to the Restaurant. Both entered the Cafeteria and observed several mutual friends sitting at a table. They all exchanged salutations then MISTRI and SIRHAN sat down. At the table were M. BADRAN, MALKI, SAYEGH, AND other unknown persons. SAYEGH and SIRHAN discussed religion for a short time and SIRHAN stated he was Catholic. They also discussed coming over to the U.S. from Arabia. At a few minutes later, around 7:00 PM, everyone left for class except SIRHAN and MISTRI. SIRHAN showed MISTRI a piece of metal he was holding in his hand and started talking about rabbit hunting and that he was learning to shoot and hunt. MISTRI thought this metal was a slug from a gun. About 7:05 PM both left the cafeteria and went back to Bobs' parking lot where their cars were parked. SIRHAN then asked MISTRI if he would like to play pool.

with him and MISTRI declined stating he had other commitments. Both then left the parking lot in their own vehicles. The time was about 7:15 PM.

Also contacted in regard to this investigation were the Hostess and the manager of Bobs' Restaurant. The Hostess cannot recall SIRHAN ever being in the Restaurant and the Manager cannot recall SIRHAN being in the Restaurant of the night of the 4th.

Immigration files and Visa applicant records were also checked of the above mentioned subjects. (See original reports)

All the persons contacted stated that SIRHAN was in good spirits on the night in question, Was chearfull, and gave the appearance of having no problems at all.

All persons present at the two meetings were checked through LAPD records and Intellegance Divisions and CII with negative results.

This is information related to Captain Hugh I. Brown from Bill Curtin over the tel. Memo on June 27, 1966 at P.M.:

They told us that the U.S. Consulate General in Jerusalem had visa applicant records on three of these individuals. The three of them are the two brothers and MALKI. I will give you the information on each one of these three.

The first one is BADRAN MAROUF and they have the same date of birth that you gave me. Address of POB 123, Jerusalem, black hair, brown eyes, height 177 cm. - I don't know what that breaks down to. He applied for a student visa on January 14, 1963 to study at Pasadena City College. He never did complete processing at Amman for the visa. He stated that his uncle, and he didn't give the name of the uncle, would help to support him. He said his uncle was moving permanently to Beirut, Lebanon. The card on him noted that the brother's visa, that would probably be CHALEB, had been extended in the United States from February 13, 1963 to January 31, 1964. There was also a notation on the card that an inquiry had been received from the U.S. Consul in Valencia, Spain, on the subject - on MAROUF, indicating that as of August 9, 1963, MAROUF was studying there. It appears likely that he received his U.S. visa in Beirut. I don't know why they say that. His Jordanian passport, same number, issued January 6, 1963, at Jerusalem.

CHALEB MOHAMMED, same date of birth at Silwan, the same POB 123, Jerusalem, brown hair, brown eyes, height 160 cm., 143 pounds, single. He was issued a student visa on January 18, 1961, valid until January 10, 1965, to study at Los Angeles Pacific College. CHALEB stated that his father was a teacher in Jerusalem. His uncle, MOHAMMED D. SILWAN SIAM, said to reside at 9032 Monte Vista Street, Los Angeles 42, California. His uncle, who had been a building contractor in Jerusalem, sent CHALEB \$750 to defray expenses for his trip to the United States. His passport #257 694, issued September 17, 1960, in Jerusalem.

ABDO MALKI, date of birth, April 12, 1948, in Jerusalem, POB 123, Amman, Jordan, applied for a visa on June 7, 1966. No record the visa was ever issued. Consul received a petition in July, 1966, for ABDO's sister to have ABDO immigrate under her sponsorship to the United States.

The sister is named ELLEN JABRA MU ADDI, maiden name ALKI, 135 East Marand Street, Dunsmuir, California. A petition, dated July 23, 1966, to have him immigrate under her sponsorship to the United States. She was born March 3, 1935 in Jerusalem, naturalizing in Los Angeles May 20, 1966 under [REDACTED]. She was planning a petition for entrance for entrance of the following family members:

Parents: JABRA and SEMOUNI MALKI  
Brothers: HANNA and MURQUES  
Sisters: JULIE and MARY

The family apparently resided in Amman, Jordan, since ABDO listed his address at that POB since 1958. That is all on these three.

They didn't come up with anything on MISTRI from the U.S. Embassy in Amman, Jordan or the U.S. Consulate General in Jerusalem.

18 his glasses all of a sudden come up with blood.

19 Q Uh huh.

20 A Over him, across the way and then I heard another  
21 shot and then they started to push me and I started running  
22 into the kitchen alcove.

23 BY SGT. McGANN:

24 Q Who is [REDACTED] Is he an employee?

25 A Yes, he's Angelo's son. He's the maitre d'.

26 Q Was he shot also?

1 A No, he wasn't shot. He was standing next to  
2 the guy that got it in the --

3 BY SGT. CALKINS:

4 Q What's his last name?

5 A [REDACTED]

6 Q Did you get a good look at this guy that did the  
7 shooting?

8 A Yes, pretty good.

9 Q Did you see the gun?

10 A I saw the gun, but I don't know exactly what make  
11 it was. I thought it may have been a .38 or a .22; I wasn't  
12 sure. I can't tell guns, I don't know what they look --

13 Q How close did you get to the guy that did the  
14 shooting, at close as -- you are quite a ways away, huh?

15 A Well not really on top of him. I seen Carl. Carl  
16 was holt -- pulling Kennedy through on Carl Uecker. He was  
17 pulling Kennedy through I think on the left side I think by  
18 his coat sleeve and all of a sudden I seen Carl reach out  
19 and grab the guy and Carl was holding him down, in a head lock  
20 down there, and he was waving the gun on the floor at the time,  
21 you know.

22 Q Uh hum.

23 A Back and forth and something like a piling noise  
24 came like off the ceiling and I seen Eddie jumping down on top,  
25 hitting the guy. Eddie, you know, another captain, was  
26 jumping down on top of Carl and that and the next thing I

1 knew they had the guy rushed over on to the steam table,  
2 across the steam table. I think Rosey was on top of him  
3 down there and the gun was waving back and forth and people  
4 tried to get up on top of him.

1 A No.

2 Q Okay, we sure thank you for coming in.

3 A Okay.

4 Q Sorry we took so long but we --

5 A That's all right.

6 Q We've got a lot of people to talk to.

7 A I know it's a tied up situation.
