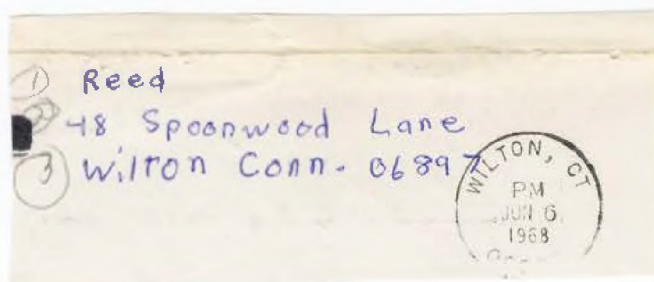

Dear Mr. President,

I write this bitter and sick at the news of the assassination attempt on Senator Kennedy.

I am convinced, more than ever, that legislation for the control of guns is essential. Small, hand guns serve the only purpose of killing humans. I urge you to keep Congress in session until they pass a gun control law that makes it a stiff Federal offense for non-law enforcement people to own hand guns of any kind, and strict control, by registration, of other arms.

Please, Mr. President, use your good office to do something about this terrible situation. If Congress won't do it perhaps you can legislate by means of an Executive Order.

I respectfully ask you to please also reexamine the present draft regulations, and issue the necessary order to make the current Selective Service System more equitable along the lines you mentioned about a year ago.

I take this opportunity to wish you the best of health and happiness when you leave office in January. Thank you for The Great Society.

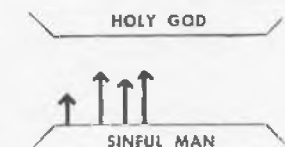

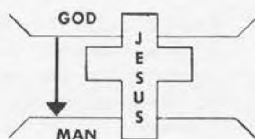

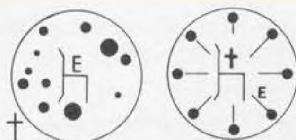

PERSONAL INVITATION

Revelation 3:20 (Christ is speaking) "Behold I stand at the door and knock: If any man hear my voice, and open the door, **I will come in to him . . .**"

"Receiving" Christ involves commitment of the total person—intellect, emotion and will. (The change which follows this initial act may be sudden or gradual according to one's personality.)

Is there any good reason why you wouldn't like to **receive** Christ right now?

WHAT TO PRAY AS AN ACT OF RECEIVING CHRIST:

Pray in your own words. God knows your heart and is not concerned with your words, but rather with the attitude of your heart. The following is a suggested prayer:

And this is the record, that God hath **given** to us eternal life, and this life is in His Son. He that **hath** the Son **hath** life (right now); and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life. These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may **know** that ye **have** eternal life."

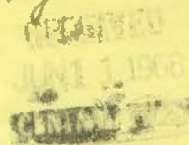

To what have most of us people turned to when we heard that Senator Kennedy was seriously wounded? Different officials and news reporters ended their statements somewhat in this fashion: "... my sincere regrets to the Kennedy family, ... and my prayers that the Senator would recover and return to normal life."

We, whether consciously, or unconsciously,

turned to prayers in a time of need. But prayers, to whom?— Prayers to God, to Him who has the power of all thing, and to Him who gave us the word of truth and showed us how to live together.

You say, "What's wrong with America", and you as ^{the} president of this Nation asks a commission to find out the cause which is destroying the foundation of this country?

Now, How can we, in one hand ask God to help senator Kennedy, and on the other hand, form a commission to find out the cause of this and many other evil deeds? It doesn't quite make sense.

When we're in trouble, we suddenly turn to prayers - one of

man's own natural instincts. And that is the need for this country, to turn our hearts to prayers.

We have forsaken the God who gave us the land and made us to prosper; but above all, we have forsaken the God who gave us the just word of truth to live by.

We say we are a Christian nation, but morally we fail to stand up to it. Our trouble is that we have forsaken our Lord and have turned to our own weakened thoughts and hearts to lead us in a world of turmoil.

If we can turn to God when we're in trouble, why cannot we turn to Him and thank Him when we're prospering. After all, ~~He~~ He's the one

who increases our prosperity.

And many people ^{might} say: "this is a free country and I worship or not worship God if I so please".

This country was founded upon the freedom of worshipping and the freedom to live together by just precepts; it was not founded by people who wanted to be free from worshipping. Those type of people were the enemy of this nation, and will always be.

I am not a preacher, nor a white collar man; but I am simply a common man, who works hard by building wood-cabinets, and who values the worth of freedom; and what things I perceived this morning I thought might be of help to you.

You are to be commended for your action in appointing a committee to investigate the reasons behind the disregard of life and property that is apparent today, especially in the light of what happened in California yesterday.

We all believe in freedom of speech and of the press, but these freedoms have been so blatantly abused that some action is essential if any freedoms are to survive.

The generation weaned, educated, and deeply influenced by television has now come of age. The examples that have been set for them through this medium - the shooting, knifing, and many, many sadistic films shown daily - are, to many of them, an accepted way of life. How can anyone fail to see the effect of horror movies and horror news reports on television and in the press on the attitudes of the generation now coming of age, and on their thinking and actions?

It may take a generation or more to undo the harm that has already been done, but I believe that everyone associated with television, the movies, and the press should do some serious soul-searching on this subject, and that our legislators who are elected to provide means for maintaining law and order should also be deeply concerned.

This constant dwelling upon the bad and ugly, the sensationalism and indifference to human dignity, has done more harm to America in the eyes of the world than our many programs of aid and counsel can overcome. I trust and hope that you will continue your endeavors to bring cohesiveness of spirit back into the efforts and lives of the American people.





It was only a few months ago. He was speaking in California to Mexican migrant workers.

"...If there is anything that we have learned during the 1960's, all of us that were here, it is that violence is not the answer to our problems. Let no one say, let no one say, that violence is the courageous way, that violence is the short route, that violence is the easy route. Because violence will bring no answer..."

In a WCBS Radio editorial yesterday, we said it would not suffice for us to wallow in one more national orgy of self-denunciation. In the wake of this latest bloody act of violence, national hand-wringing is not enough.

For there is a real danger that as a nation we are becoming apathetic to what Sociologist Gunnar Myrdal has called "the politics of assassination." There is a danger, that as a people, we are coming to accept as one more everyday hazard of our times, the growing pattern of violence in America.

It is too easy to intone with the pundits that this latest tragedy is one more symptom of what they like to call "Our National Sickness." Too easy to go on accepting the malady of unrestrained violence as unfortunate and incurable. Too easy to do nothing at all as the "stain of violence" -- that is what Senator Kennedy himself called it -- continues to spread.

Senator Kennedy was speaking before Congress in support of a bill intended to curb the deadly traffic in firearms across the nation. That bill, like a similar one introduced in Albany at the last session, was defeated.

Of course, registration of all guns could not be expected to prevent all crimes of violence committed with a gun. But it could and would prevent some of them. At the very least we can no longer tolerate a system that makes it easy for the emotionally unstable, the criminal, to get their hands on lethal weapons.

President Johnson has summed up the mood of a large part of the country in a call to Congress. "In the name of sanity," said the President, "give America the gun control law it needs."

But the bill Congress has sent to the President for signature falls far short of that. It limits but does not effectively control the sale of pistols. And it does not regulate the sale of rifles.

"The brutal loopholes" in our gun laws, of which the President spoke, remain.

This bill isn't good enough.





Senator McGee--

Calls for Deeper Level of Understanding

Editor's Note: This is the statement made by Senator McGee to his colleagues in the United States Senate in commemoration of Sen. Robert Kennedy.

* * *

Mr. McGEE. Mr. President, the death by assassination of Senator Robert F. Kennedy has left us all with a deep sense of shock and grief. But we are also experiencing the stark realization that, while character assassination in politics has almost become an accepted course of action, we cannot be deluded by its "harmlessness". The line between character assassination and political assassination is almost indistinguishable. The price of either is too high. It behooves Americans everywhere, therefore as voters and constituents, to raise our level of expectations with respect to those who would serve in public life.

We are experiencing today a rising sense of anger because of what the death of this remarkable young leader symbolizes and what it may portend. These feelings mix with the sorrow that we share and the compassion that we have for the Kennedy family, which has been struck once more by unspeakable tragedy, by a sorrow transcended only by the measure of service they have given this country.

RATIONAL BEHAVIOR, NOT QUICKY SOLUTIONS

For those of us outside the magnificent family, the message is clear that we must rise up to our highest level of rational behavior, to the level of public conduct which Bob Kennedy and his family have established as a guideline for leadership. This means that we not act out of a fit of anger or grope for quicky solutions to the problem that must be solved in the hearts of Americans.

It is understandable that we hear new calls for

gun legislation, or demands that we pass new restrictive immigration laws because Senator Kennedy's assassin was a foreigner. But if we do this, we will only deceive ourselves, even though there might be gratification for some who could point to specific legislation.

But we are thinking about and talking about political assassination and the hazards of leadership in our country. They are very real. Political assassination has become too real. In recent years and days it has claimed Robert F. Kennedy and his brother, the late President John F. Kennedy. It has claimed Dr. Martin Luther King. It has claimed Medger Evers. And it has claimed Malcolm X and George Lincoln Rockwell, who were not greatly admired by many perhaps, but whose deaths also illustrate the frightening ease of political assassination.

"WE MUST BEGIN TO DEMAND . . . A HIGHER LEVEL"

This tendency reflects the evil virus of extremism injected into our body politic, first by the right wing and more lately by the so-called new left. The one describes a President as a "traitor" or a "comsymp" and the other denounces a President as a "murderer." On one side the poisonous vernacular of extremism demands "Impeach Earl Warren" and on the other it spits out "Hell no, we won't go." One brand of extremism can call Martin Luther King "nigger," while another cries back, "Burn, baby, burn."

Political assassination differs from other crimes, but this atmosphere is also engendered by forces which affect the broader problem of crime and lawlessness in America. As child psychiatrist Robert Coles put it in Trans-Action magazine recently, those senseless killers Bonnie and Clyde become "us" if we pay attention to what the social critics are saying about our society

today. The Nielsen ratings reflect this, too, for violence gets an audience and the media can be depended upon to go where the audience is. We must begin to demand from the media a higher level of entertainment, as well as a higher quality of news reporting which places less emphasis on the extremes and upon bloodletting, real or verbal, and more stress on the significant and substantive events that take place every day of our lives.

THE MOLOTOV COCKTAIL AND THE FOMENTIVE TYPEWRITER

In politics, too, we must all learn to disagree without being disagreeable and quit demanding that candidates hit hard, low and often in order to excite their audiences. For all these factors have helped bring to the surface the kind of nut who will kill because law and order are too slow a process for him. Draftcard burners, campus rioters, those who throw molotov cocktails in the ghettos of our cities, and those who sit behind a typewriter or a microphone to reproduce the mood these people over-react from are equally guilty of helping to foment disrespect for law and disregard for order and for their fellow men.

It is easy to point a finger at Congress, or at the State Legislatures, and say "Pass a law." But that misses the point. What we have to do to come to grips with this problem is to begin with ourselves as individuals, and with our neighbors and our own communities. We must demand a higher level of conduct and forswear name calling, fear, suspicion, and distrust. We must acquire a deeper sense of tolerance and understanding of the other fellow's point of view and take to heart President Johnson's warning that, "There is never—never—any justification for the violence that tears at the fabric of our national life."

Is America Sick! Sick! Sick? And Is Richson Nixonfeller Our Prophet?

By the time this issue of the SPOKESMAN reaches its subscribers so much will have been said about the death of Senator Robert Kennedy that any additional comment will be in the nature of saturation. What more is possible in the way of verbal commemoration? To what further extent can the nation's anguish be eased by talking it out? This is the moment when the shock has begun to wear off and the ache has begun. In each of us that ache will continue to reoccur for the rest of our lives. New memories will superimpose themselves over those of John Kennedy and Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy—but in unguarded moments the sense of loss will return. It is thus each generation is brought to the supreme test of its courage and purpose.

Once again we have been forced to look minutely into the nature of life and have found it inexplicable. We rage in our grief. It is intolerable things should happen this way. Once more we are forced to rediscover what we forget between times, that a large part of the unendurable tragedy of this world is human in origin. Some men dream and create. Others are haunted by nightmares and destroy. That we should still be surprised at this is a sign of the intellectual childhood of the species. If we were wholly without illusions our grief would be honest and intense, but it would not be incapacitating.

A Sick Society?

Or a Silly Society?

Predictably an abundance of nonsense found its way into expression after Senator Kennedy's death. A Russian government spokesman who conveniently forgot his own good fortune in having escaped the Stalinist extermination mill managed to relate the assassination to capitalism. Charles Evers seemed to see behind the tragedy a conspiracy against the civil rights movement. There was the unparalleled fatuity of the attempt to link Senator Kennedy's death with the Vietnam war. From conservatives came the suggestion that the tragedy was further evidence that ours is a sick society. Meanwhile, Mayor Yorty of Los Angeles kicked the judicial process squarely in the teeth by strewing conjectural evidence right and left in such a way as to guarantee a burden of perplexities at the trial of the alleged assassin.

It was Wyoming's governor however who made it all the way unassisted to the peak of ultimate absurdity. Grasping the occasion of Senator Kennedy's death as an opportunity to strike a Napoleonic stance, the governor let it be known he will not tolerate civil disorder in Wyoming, nay, not even in such strongholds of radical sentiment as, say, Sheridan. Here was Bonaparte resurrected, facing down the mob by casually suggesting to the cannoneers that the time had come to give the rabble a whiff of grapeshot. And yet, and yet one puzzled and wondered, trying to imagine where the governor expected the Wyoming uprising of 1968 to materialize. From Wyoming's few and scattered Negro families? From its relative handful of Spanish-surnamed? Did the

governor perhaps expect the plains of Laramie to explode in student rioting. Or had he heard reports of war drums warning of an incipient Indian uprising? He did not say. He would not tolerate civil disorder in Wyoming, he said, thereby striking a heroic chord in the hearts of all right-thinking voters. But he did not explain how he would stop it elsewhere except, by insinuation, that he would match violence with violence. If you want evidence that ours is a sick or at least a silly society the governor of Wyoming will make a very convincing item indeed.

* * *

But it is not the purpose of this editorial to suggest ours is a sick society. Quite the contrary. Before you are swept into depression and fear and hopelessness and anger; before, that is, you allow the Republican campaign to turn your mind into a quaking jelly of despair, take time to consider the following—

The victim, Senator Kennedy, was an American, a product of the inculcation of American values, a spokesman for those values, a man of and for his times, wholly committed . . . while his alleged assassin is the product of a land where, as far back as one can remember, political murder has been commonplace.

Whose society did you say is sick?

The Politics of Guilt

I mean no disrespect to the memory of Senator Kennedy when I say the politics of martyrdom is as dangerous in its implications as the politics of assassination. The politics of martyrdom is the politics of nostalgia and a sense of deprivation, of the nihilistic mood of "What's the use if this is the way matters will turn out?" It is the politics of paralysis because it is the politics of grief and anger and the futile search for a scapegoat. This is the political atmosphere that is creeping up on us this summer and its consequences could be grave. In a primitive way we may be concluding that we are being collectively punished as a nation for being too materialistic or for being immoral or too much this and not enough that. We are psychologically primed to accept the notion that in the tragic death of a political leader is an implied rebuke against each one of us.

Thus the politics of martyrdom evolves directly into the politics of guilt.

And the politics of guilt is very convenient to the G.O.P. because if the average voter can be persuaded to swear by it the Republican party will take the election next fall by a landslide. "America is sick! sick! sick! Richard Nixon (or Nelson Rockefeller) is your prophet! Repent . . . and vote Republican!" This is the message that the G.O.P. is fashioning.

Those who do not believe this are advised to watch the Republicans from now on. They will redouble their efforts to convince the country it is sick, sinful, spendthrift, broke, blasphemous, godless, violent, vice-ridden and going to hell in a bucket. The approach is shrewd. The G.O.P. fully gauges the extent of the shock and sorrow and indignation over Senator Ken-

nedy's death. It knows each one of us is concerned over Negro rioting, the rising crime rate, student violence and the other signs of unrest in today's America. The G.O.P. suspects that a substantial number of Americans can be persuaded if they are not already that Negroes are behaving the way a minority of them are because, don't you see, they just aren't equal to white civilization. The G.O.P. will not say that outright. It delivers its message by talking archly about "crime in the streets." Similarly, the G.O.P. will talk dolefully about student rioting but never about the origins of student discontent. The irony of the situation is that the Republican party of this century is copiously at fault for having ignored Negroes and cities and for having brought forth no challenging values and goals to motivate the hearts and minds of today's students—yet from the effects of its own passivity and obstructionism it expects to wring votes.

Instant Progress

It is customary among Republicans and, truth requires it be admitted, among some Democrats, to fault Lyndon Johnson for our uncomfortable world.

As John Kennedy said, "Life is unjust"—and the abuse that has been heaped on LBJ is testimonial of that fact.

Historians will hardly fail to note what ought to be apparent to most of us, that the assault on LBJ was so crudely motivated and so vile in some instances as to merit little respect and attention.

If you check the Kennedy-Johnson record you will note that in instance after instance legislation was proposed by the two presidents aimed at 1. striking at the roots of urban decay 2. securing basic rights to the discriminated-against citizens of this country 3. providing the nation's young people with opportunities to serve their country and obtain the training to make possible their own successful careers 4. reduce unemployment to the greatest possible extent 5. tame the economic cycle of boom and recession 6. bring under control the damaging effects upon our environment of industry and technology 7. make the greatest possible effort to eliminate from American life the hideously unequal circumstances under which American children start life 8. aid education at all levels 9. bring the nuclear powers of the world into such association as to provide hope that the deadly radiation which showered down on the world from nuclear testing will never resume 10. help the country and the world come to grips with famine and overpopulation.

These 10 points do not summarize the achievements of the Kennedy-Johnson years in toto but they are a substantial part. Their significance is better understood when we check the Republican years, 1952-60, and find that the efforts and the legislation represented by these 10 points HAVE ALMOST NO SUBSTANTIVE ANTECEDENTS IN THE EISENHOWER YEARS.

Chew on that for a while.

Then consider this. We have any number of people who are disappointed with LBJ because, in five years, he has not been able to master the problems besetting America, particularly those in the cities. Imagine that! The legislation he has been instrumental in proposing and enacting in the last five years has not yet rectified the oversights, neglect, greed and stupidities of more than a century.

Harold Howe, the able Federal Commissioner of Education had something to say about the critics who can't understand why we don't have Instant Progress now that we've got the legislation. His words were aimed, too, at the Republican critics who want to toss the Kennedy-Johnson legislation out the window and start all over with something else. Howe said these people remind him of the fellow who plants a tree and then comes along every three weeks or so and yanks it up by the roots to see how it's coming along.

In Love With Violence

None of the foregoing should be interpreted to mean that all is well with this country, that the ugly violence of the times is only in the eye of the beholder, that "Students for a Democratic Society" are really benign scholars sincerely in search of purpose and meaning, that there is not an awful crime problem in Negro ghettos, that there is not a great deal in contemporary America that is alarming and depressing.

But are we decadent? Or were we always decadent? Were we less in love with violence all those years we could not—or would not—pass an anti-lynching law than we are now? Was our failure to protect human life during lynching's heyday a sign of a more moral America compared with the fact that property rights in American slums are currently being disregarded? From what heights of propriety as a nation have we descended? Or have we actually been climbing? When men were shot and clubbed and blacklisted for union organizing activities, were the times more righteous? When students unquestioningly accepted the dogmas and prejudice of their teachers and traditional shallow life goals, were they more spiritual? Were the years during which Negroes were fleeing starvation and night riders in the South for neglect and repression in northern cities more godly than now when the Negro has at last found himself cornered and is striking back? Were we a less violent country when unsuccessful attempts were made to assassinate Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry Truman? Is it the accuracy of the assassin's bullet that defines our times?

In short, are the moral years the ones during which the problems are allowed to accumulate from neglect while the immoral years begin when the accumulation explodes.

Or is what we are really upset about the fact that never again in

our lives are we going to be allowed to forget the nether America that has always existed, where children begin life under unspeakable inequity and men are denied jobs because of skin color and families fitfully beget more children to begin their lives in squalor and thus to repeat the dreadful cycle?

There may be a sickness in America but I submit it is in the soul of the man who says "nigger" and in the soul of the political leader who encourages him. There may be a morbidity in this country and if there is I submit it is in the newspaper or television report that emphasizes violence ONLY and strife ONLY and bitterness ONLY and says nothing about the overwhelming majority of us who seek reconciliation. We have come to believe our press notices so completely that in each of us there is a deep sense of sin and guilt and a potential Republican vote.

The Danger Is Disengagement

I submit further that the real disaster potential of our times is not the country may go up in smoke of civil disorder but that the contending factions will become exhausted and disengage. This is most of all to be feared because while we are locked in conflict we can never wholly ignore each other. In the contention between white and black America is the salvation of both, a dreadfully painful one to be sure, but far preferable to a new isolation in which one side will again batten on the myths of race while the other grows monstrous in its alienation. Disengagement without reconciliation will almost certainly set the stage for a bona fide national earthquake.

This is not the time for parties or leaders who believe that what America needs is a whiff of grape-shot down the street into the face of the mob and a return to a contrived, enforced, counterfeit civic tranquility. The answer to the tumult of our times is passionate engagement by each of us in support of federal, state, group and personal efforts aimed at furthering justice and opportunity for all in this country. The means whereby America can meet her problems are, and should be, varied. It is not "How?" It is "Whether?" It is, this summer, the question of whether having been thus far committed by the Kennedy-Johnson years we are willing to take the next essential steps. If instead of feeling guilt we are willing to acknowledge our debt to the Kennedys and Kings and to the unsung and unremembered of our times who went down before the assassin's bullet and the bully's club whilst in pursuit of justice, we shall redeem our destiny. There is no other way to quiet the ghosts that wait patiently beyond our door for a sign their lives were not gathered up in vain. . . . M.L.

State Chairman Sets Convention Routine

Editor's Note: The following communication has gone out from State Chairman John Rooney to Delegates and Alternates to the Democratic National Convention.

To: Delegates and alternates to the National Convention

The following covers housing, finance, transportation, committees and first meeting with reference to the convention. Please read it promptly and carefully and take immediate action with reference to that set out in the final paragraph.

1.—Finance Most of you have already sent me \$100.00 for incidental expenses to be incurred in connection with the convention. There was no request by me, and I appreciate your action. For those of you who have not done so, I request that you do so now. The money will be used as follows: \$50.00 deposit on your rooms (you will ultimately therefore receive this back since you will receive credit for it on your room charge. If you are not staying in the delegate reserved rooms you should send only \$50.00 instead of \$100.00). About \$30.00 to purchase a coat or jacket, gold in color, with pocket label "Delegate — Democratic National Convention 1968". About \$20.00 to pay a portion of the caucus and headquarters suite at the hotel. I will make a special accounting of expenditures to you after convention.

2.—Housing We have been assigned to the Pick Congress Hotel in Chicago. This is a 1,000 room hotel on Michigan Blvd. and Congress in the Loop. It is air conditioned with TV and radio in rooms. It is a first class hotel and probably ranked number 2 of the 23 hotels to be used for delegates. The delegations from Connecticut "Baileys

own state", Maryland, Montana, Arizona and Louisiana will also be at the Pick Congress. We must send a \$50.00 per room deposit to confirm and hold our reservations. I have telephoned the hotel and was advised that the single rooms run from \$13.00 to \$24.00 and the twin bedded rooms for two people run from \$19.00 to \$30.00. The minimum rental time is 5 days. Please see the final paragraph in this letter which will indicate the information needed by me for reservation purposes.

3.—Transportation I am still trying to firm up an acceptable plan with the air lines. Many of you are going by train or personal auto. About 50 air line spaces are anticipated. I am trying to work out stops in Billings "or Sheridan", Casper and Cheyenne for boarding but we may have to settle for one place. I will send a follow up memo on this as soon as possible.

4.—Committees The task of committee assignments was made easy by the fact that most delegates declined assignments and a few indicated they would accept only if needed. Alternate delegates could not be assigned, except that women alternates could be assigned only if women delegates were not in attendance. We have 5 women delegates. All said yes except Renee, who said no. June said, "if needed". Only 3 men delegates gave an unqualified yes. 5 said yes "if needed". Accordingly, the 4 women delegates who said yes or if needed were assigned and the 3 men delegates who said yes were assigned. Rather than pick between the men who said "if needed", I assigned myself. As it appears now, I will have to be there early anyway and the committee to which I am assigned does little other than approve arrangements already made.

I hope this meets with your approval. Please advise if it does not. The assignments are:

Credentials—Vi Lawler and Don Hubbard

Resolutions and Platform—Alice Burridge and Don Anselmi

Rules and Order of Business — Nora Mix and George Cox

Permanent Organization — June Boyle and John Rooney

Direct contact will be made by the committee chairmen with committee members concerning time for committee meetings.

5.—First Meeting Pursuant to direction of the State Convention, I plan to call the organization meeting about 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 25th in our caucus room at the hotel. The specific call for this meeting will be sent out at a later date. At the meeting each delegate will place a slip containing his name in a box or hat and the first 12 names drawn will have 1 vote, the other 12 will have the ½ vote. At the meeting, we will ballot for a delegate chairman, a delegate vice-chairman and a caucus secretary. The caucus chairman will announce his rules and procedure.

Accordingly, please return the enclosed immediately and send your check if you have not already done so. Enclosed is a slip of paper indicating the information which I now have concerning you and the information which I further need concerning you. Please verify the information I have and supply the information I need. Please return the slip whether or not you add information indicating that the information I now have is OK.

How TV Causes Social Unrest

The President's Committee on Civil Disorders and others who have studied the big city riots make much of the fact that TV cameramen get would-be rioters to perform in front of the cameras, even to committing acts of arson or breaking store windows.

If there were no TV cameramen on the spot, some police officers hold, there would probably be no riots, or inflammatory speeches that incite disorder.

Perhaps there is some truth in the criticism. Having grown up in the news media and having covered my share of disorders, I am aware that we have our share of irresponsibles who would rather get a "good story", even if it is not altogether true, or a "good picture", even if it distorts a situation.

But I have always had the nagging feeling that these analyses were somewhat superficial and, in any case, only a small part of the story.

Now, at this conference at Fordham, we are getting a glimpse of some of the more basic problems that are created by television and to a lesser extent by the other news media. The purpose of this meeting, which deals mainly with the discontent among lower middle class whites in our big cities, is to find out what is hardening so many in their racial hostility towards poor Negroes.

* * *

The young Negro youth who breaks a store window to snatch a pair of fancy shoes or a rich-looking jacket is not so hard to understand. After years of working he still feels poorly clothed, while everyone else around him looks snappy and well-dressed. It's a frustrating experience that causes the crack-up.

With the lower middle class white the problem is somewhat different. Every night he watches the better off youngsters, as portrayed on television, riding their snazzy sports cars, rushing off to plush parties, and altogether living the life of Reilly.

If father cannot provide him with these luxuries the kids get mad, or the wife gets sore about having to do all the drudgery around the house, while other wives are playing tennis and bridge and attending social teas.

What television does for the lower middle class American, in the opinion of a position paper of the Education and Urban Planning Staff of the American Jewish Committee is to develop a style of life where "the reach exceeds the grasp."

Or, as it is put in more learned terms:

"The appetite and the sense of possibility generated by an affluent society create both the need and the assumption of wherewithal to consume conspicuously and repetitively.

"The average American is bombarded by the mass media message of abundance. From his radio in the morning, to advertisements on the buses, to the evening TV commercials, he is told that elegance and luxury are well within the means of any hardworking citizen.

"But the affluence of the lower middle class American is a tenuous one, historically and even currently, and it does not allow him the comforts which the media say he deserves."

In order to live the way people on television live it is often necessary for both husband and wife to work. If, after hard work, they think "others", by which they usually mean Negroes, are getting something for nothing the seeds of resentment have been sown.

When we talk of avoiding future racial conflict and reconciliation of the races these are factors that have to be taken into consideration. Once they are recognized it may be a little easier to de-fuse the racial time bombs that exist in almost every big city.

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QUESTIONS FOR THE CAMPAIGN

1. The Governor of Wyoming, a Republican, has asked the mineral industry to help him write new tax legislation. Did he ask you?
2. Word has leaked out that you are being charged as much as \$30 on new model cars over former prices because the industry says this is what the seat belt installation calls for. Automotive writers say it's costing the industry more like \$5 per car. Why does Senator Hansen, a Republican, line up with the auto industry when safety questions come up?
3. Signs that pollution of various kinds—water, air—is increasing are evident all over Wyoming. Take a look at some of the lumbering operations that Hathaway-Peck and the Natural Resources board people are telling us is clean industry of the sort Wyoming needs. The governor says federal standards are not necessary for the states in this area—that the states can police their own problems—but his own failure to seek remedy for the new sources of pollution that have sprung up during his tenure indicates his lack of sincerity.
