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Mis 322 Suits Lost in Fire,

As the world's best-dressed man (his own characterization) Khaibar Khan, exiled Iranian tribal leader, had 392 suits in his New York wardrobe when he gave a glittering party for 75 guests on the evening of Nov. 3, 1961.

Being sensible of his obligations as a modern Chesterfield, and of the changing New York elimate, he had 88 spring suits, 127 for summer, 77 for fall and 100 for winter.

All these, along with furnishings, rugs, carpets, jewelry and other valuables, to a total of \$411,952, were destroyed or stolen immediately after the party when

a fire wrecked his seven-room apartment at 923 Fifth Ave., he charged in a suit against two insurance companies.

Evidence Fire Was Set

Yesterday Supreme Court Jus-Henry Clay Greenberg awarded the Iranian \$104,316, plus interest.

The judge held there was "considerable evidence" to establish that the fire was of incendiary origin. But he tossed out, as not proved, charges by the Continental and Actua insurance companies that Khaibar knew of its incendiary nature and "gave false testimony with respect to his knowledge thereof."

The companies, Justice Greenberg noted, did not, however, claim that Khaibar Khan himself was guilty of the incendiarism.

Fraud Not Proven



Khaibar, at the trial, offered two possible explanations for the

Accidental: He had just received from Mrs. Lauren Osias, a divorcee who attended the party, a gift of two candelabra illuminated by butane gas. During the party someone smelled fumes and the butane was shut off. The apparatus may have been responsible.

International plot: Two mysterious strangers, the only men not in tuxedos, appeared among the guests but drifted away when they were questioned. They might, Khaibar suggested, have been Iranian agents seeking to steal or destroy government records he



The documents, along with his jewelry box, were missing after the fire, according to Khaibar.

Suing Shah's Brother

In another court action here, he is trying to collect \$11/4 million each from a brother and sister of the Shah of Iran.

Khaibar also has lodged with the Senate's McClellan investigating committee charges that there has been "outright theft of millions of dollars" of American aid funds sent to Iran.

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

In early December of 1967 three courriers came directly from the When of Iren to Washington, D. C. with special messects of importance for the Ambassador and the Shah's agents in the U. C. namely Goorge W. Ball and George V. Allen. The courriers informed them that the Shah is planning to visit the U. S. courties in June and it is up to them to carry the command of the Shah and Work out one of the three following plans:

- 1. To attempt and make peace and settlement between the Shah and myself.
- 2. To secto it that the Shah gots what he vants after having gone through such heavy pay-offs and that is to have me departed to Iran.
 - 3. To get rid of me permanently.

They relayed the displeasure of the Shah that daspleas of heavy expenditure on their behalf and charging it to his rich position no posetive action has been taken place so far and hisis running the of patience and fed up with unfulfilled promises.

The Ambassedor and his staff knew the importance of these messages and started planning right sway. Remarkus modings and telephone conversations took place between them and the final influential agents George Allen and George Ball. Policying morela were approached and reprimended for not showing an end mosult:

F. E. Esperdy and Cook of the Immigration Service in Nov Your City, Miss Watson and Miss Folger of the State Department. The importance and urgency of the Shah's desire to have me deported to Iron Wis montioned and repeated to these people.

On December 14, 1967 while I was riding in Grizzith Park accompanied by my sister and some friends we heard sudden sounds of shuting mus which caused my sister's horse to become frightened and the horse threw her down. This resulted in my sister being bodly injured and sustain a fractured pelvis bone. She underwent an operation which lasted more than eleven hours and stayed in the hospital for two wooks and has been on crutches ever since.

Col. Pat Young of the State Department and his associate Walter Mercer approached my Attorney Mr. Richard H. Wels for making peace and

settlement between the Shah and myself. They were insistent upon visiting with me personally which I refused. I told Mr. Wels that I will not meet with anyone connected with the State Department under any circumstances. Approximately a month later on March 25, 1968 I received the enclosed letter from Mr. Wels and agreed to talk to Col. Young on the telephone. I telephoned Col. Young and discussed different aspects of my disagreements and oppositions to the Shah's corrupt regime. I informed Col. Young that my interest in this is not money but to achieve justice and freedom for the poor people of my country. I told him that the only time I would agree to make peace will be when the Shah agrees to honor all of the Chicago agreements which are herewith enclosed.

foring this whole period I received several telephone messages of threats and I was told that the Shah is running out of pathonce and I will be corry if I did not agree to their terms and offers and that this time they meant business and if I did not soften up they would see to it that the Shah is pleased semahow. I was reminded off my sister's accidents several times.

On April 18, 1968 I telephoned Mr. Corinblit from Eta Francisco and told him that I was planning to come to Los Angeles and will call him when I got there. On April 19, 1968 I telephoned an angeles Shirin and told her I would be in L. A. the next day and as ind king to meet me at the air port. While my daughter was at the air port che called home and my youngest son Shahpour told her that it is bred Walker had called a few minutes ago and asked togeth to uno fly son had told him that he would pass the message on to his sistily and vould be call back in half an hour. My daughter and my sister met me and three of my people, pro Davari, Mr. Khazal and Mr. Foroughi. We left the air port and whom we got to the house nobody was there. must have gone to pick up scrething. We drove out and dropped Mr. Khazal and Mr. Foroughi at the Beverly Hilton Hotel and Care back and drove into the parking lot opposite the house. The misure wo got there a car drove in and parked in the back of ear car and two people came out and rushed to both sides of our car and tried to We immediately locked the doors. Another two men open the doors. came out of the same car and one of them was pointing towards mo. Next one of them pulled out an object from his jacket and his the windshield directely facing me. I opened the door and trick to come out when I was attacked from all sides. I remember the lastiff hit on my head which caused me to fall down and was being dragged 🦮 to their car. Dr. Davari was hit, my sister and my delighter were a screaming for help. I was told later that the scream and my wife. car coming in and my son running out and boing told to call the police caused these people to run away. I was told later by Dr. Dovari and my family that a few minutes after they had called the police three police cars came and inquired from them what had happened.

said that while they were pulling out she could see the first three letters on their plate "IML". My sister also said that she heard two of the men talking and cursing in Iranian. When is came out I could not move my hands and I was bleeding very badly. We drove out of the parking lot and was directed by a police car to U.C.L.A. Emergency Room. While I was receiving troatments the police inquired from my sister what had happened. A while later two more police men came and made more inquiries both from my sister and myself. Complete description of the four men was given to the police. Police Officer Dehemmer 12738 wrote down the description of the four men and the car. I gave Officer Dehemmer the same and telephone number of my attorney and told him that my attorney will be in touch with the Police Department on Monday.

The injuries sustained by me as the result of this brutal attack were as follows: Broken thumb, three cut fingers on both hands, substantial amount of bruises and cuts on my legs, loss of an upper end tooth, damage to my left eye, extensive amount of bruises on my face and a black eye, extreme pain on my spine, head blows which resulted in severe headaches and spells of dizziness. The record of these injuries are available at the U.C.L.A. Hospital. Since that time I have been under medical care and have received regular treatments of thumb, neurosurgery and eye care.

Next day I contacted my attorney Mr. Richard H. Wels in New York and informed him of what had taken place. He edvised to contact Mr. Corinblit and inform him of the same. Mr. Corinblit Visite me next morning and was quite shocked by seeins the injuries that I had sustained. Mr. Corinblit contacted the Police Department and made an appointment for me to see you. The appointment could not be kept and was cancelled when I was told by my doctor that my hand was in a bad shape and I must have an operation as soon as possible.

After the operation my attorney made another appointment with you for May 17, 1968. As you recall I met with you on that ento accompanied by my attorney and my sister. I told you that incidents like that had happened before (enclosed you will find a biographical sketch of myself pointing out these planned incidents). I informed you that I was makin, my own investigation too to get to the bottom of this matter. I mentioned to you at that time that my information leads me to believe that George Ball was one of the people behind this attack. I agreed with your suggestion that I continue with my investigation and inform you of the result which would give you a better lead as sec the identity of the people involved in this crime.

Now I have reliable information from the inside of the Iranian Embassy that George Ball, Ansari (Iranian Ambassador) and Yazdanyanah (Iranian Press Attache) were behind this. I also have the names of two SAVAK Police officers who attacked me that night and who are presently in this country. They are Major Naser Naza and Captain Faraj Sepahbodi.

I am herewith making an official charge against the people I mentioned above and I hope that these criminals would be punished for the crime they have committed. If you need any further information please contact me at the following addresses.

Dr. Khosrovani:

It is not necessary to identify myself to you, as I am sure you will recall our meeting several years ago. I was very surprised to learn of your return to this country, especially as an Ambassador considering the facts of your previous recall.

For the past few months, it has come to my attention that in your own "jovial fat" manner you have had reason to concern yourself with my personage. Although, my existence seems to bother you, and with good reason, may I take this opportunity of discussing for your clarification certain factors.

- I. The American Public at large are not stupid. In this country the truth is important.
- 2. It is my information that you have illicited several poignant remarks about myself.
- .3. That my Military Reserve Status and records concern you and your staff.

As my country has accepted you as the responsible "agent" for the Shah, I will not try to belittle my State Department's decision. Albeit, unfortunately on occasions they have and do misinterpret events and personages. However, "Right or wrong, it is my country

It is my fondest desire that the complete facts as to the Foreign Aid Scandal, Sports! Project and World Athletic Sports Corp. be brought and kept before the American Public. This country is populated with so many more Americans with "gutts" than the relatively few "corruptible" ones. When the truth is known, justice and truth must and will prevail.

I understand that my "uniform" seems to bother you and that you would like to see that I am removed from the Air Force Reserve Program which I have been participating in for 20 years in active and reserve time. Also that you have recently informed one of your attorneys, Mr. Marshall, that you are concerned as to the activities of "that Dirty Jew." Dr. Khosrovani, as I remember you, you are a man who is short in stature, fat and whose though not immaculate, was not loud. Was it not his hatred of the Jews and a strong desire to align his country with Hitler that led to his downfall and replace ment?

This is a little more data for the public to be acquainted with, strange when you think back as to the many members of the Royal Families who have some form of Jewish Heritage in their background. This will be most interesting to the public.

Dr. Kosrovani, I want to reacquaint you with a few facts. You are in the greatest country in the world. Anyone, yes anyone, can "shoot" their mouths off here and you enjoy that privilege as well. It is a lot different than under the conditions in your "POLICE STATE", you lucky devil. In this country one wouldn't be involved in corrupt activities, removed from a post and then reassigned to a job in the Oil Industry - rather such a person would go to prison and justly so.

Now you can't blame me for refusing to sell out my country and my friends? Can you? I believe that quite a number of "controlled dummies" yes, Americans, have sold out their country and principles to a number of crooks in your country. That shame lives on within them and some day they will pay for this deceit.

Dear Mr. Chandor:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of September 17, 1963, with which was enclosed an amendment to your registration statement filed under the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended.

In your letter you advise that you do not anticipate any further activities on your part on behalf of the Khaibar Khan or his organization which would necessitate notice to the Registration Section. It is presumed from this statement that you wish to have your registration terminated under the Act. In order to accomplish this, it will be necessary for you to amend Item 5 of your original registration statement indicating that as of June 12, 1963, the date of your registration, you performed no further services for your foreign principals. If you have performed services for the foreign principals subsequent to June 12, 1963, it will be necessary pursuant to Rule 260 under the Act to file a final statement for the final period of the agency relationship not covered by the original registration statement.

Amendment forms and forms for a final statement are enclosed herewith. The appropriate set of forms should be filed in duplicate with this office as soon as possible.

Your letter of November 20, 1964 addressed to my attorney Mr. Richard H. Wels Was called to my attention by him. In that letter you acknowledge that the Department of State undertook some investigation in Tran at your request.

I have found through my sources that the people from the Department of State and others who have been assigned to do this investigation are not doing an honest job either for your Committee or the poor people of my country. They are working hard to satisfy the Shah, his corrupt Iranian at Americar collaborators. They have been in close contact with the Iranian Embassy and have been conducting an investigation according to the instructions of the Iranian Embassy which are intended to be turned against me.

I have been aware of this fact for quite some time and it was even brought to my attention by some of my American friends in this country like Miss Elizabeth Heinz, Mr. Ashley Chanller and others that an investigator from your Committee has been twisting and distorting their testimonies which were favorable towards me. Investigator Wolf even has gone asfar as trying to turn them against me.

The investigation that the Department of State undertook for you in Iran was even worse. Their so-called investigation has not been intended to find the truth, instead they have been in close contact with the SAVAK Police of the Shah and have prepared a report only with the intention of pleasing the Shah and his corrupt officials and dishorest American Collaborators. It has become a joke among Iranian circles that ever since I submitted these documents to your Committee nothing has come out of it except costing the Shah a fortune and making some investigators of the Department of State, the Department of Justice and your Committee rich and prosperous.

If you recall during my first and second visit with you and your Committee members even before I submitted the documents to you, it was understood between us that the Department of State would not be the proper agency to undertake such an investigation in order to learn the truth about the misuse of the Foreign Aid program to Iran. As you are evero, on Besember 22, 1964, bir. Eugene Anderson, Chief of the Civil Division of the United States Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York, advised me of your schooland meeting for three o'clock in the afternoon of that day with the Foreign Maister of Iran, and of your concern that our efforts to effect convice of an ender of the Suprema Court of the State of New York upon Mr. Mehanud Foreughi, the Ambaseador of Iran, was an emberrasement in maintaining friendly relations between the United States State Department and the Shah of Iran.

Of course, I immediately informed Mr. Anderson that I would adhere to such request made on your behalf, and would instruct our Washington representatives to cease immediately all afforts to affect service upon Ambassador Foroughi. As soon as Mr. Anderson and I completed our telephone conversation, I immediately gave such instructions. I am to meet with Mr. Anderson for a further discussion of this matter on Monday, December 28, 1964, at 11:00 A.M.

I should like to make it clear that such action on my part was taken because of my high regard and respect for you, and because I would not wish to embarress you in your conduct of the foreign relations of the United States.

I em somowhat concerned that, in the exchange of telegrams which Mr. Andercon and I had confirming our conversation and understanding, he should have had escapion to say

"While the Department of State is cypreboxeive that a matter of such delicary
rests solely upon your word, I have
secured them that there will be no difficulty in this regard."

I cm, of esures, quite sure that this apprehension on the part of the Department of State is nothing thick you share, and that it had its origin with subordinates.

I have had consider to deal with the Department of State many times in the twenty-eight years that I have been admitted to the bar, sametimes in an official correctly and other times in a private capacity. On mone of these exceptons has the Department had any receen to feel that anything which I said was not completely excurate or that I broashed any commitment or agreement.

From the text of his Andorson's tolegram
I have the impression that there may be a feeling in the Department
that I have coted capalaiously and without cause in including
Ambasedor Foroughi among those to when the court order was directed.
Let us dispol this feeling if it does in fact order.

There is no doubt whatever that on November 28, 1964, he urged his Eghbal to disregard the subposes and restraining order of the Suprem Court of the State of New York, to leave the country, and not to appear in court. In doing so in connection with private litigation to which the Covernment of Num was not a party, he was abusing his position and status, and was contemptuous of our courts and judicial precess.

We had, of course, corofully considered the question of immunity of an Ambasader. The United States Supreme Court, in an opinion written by Mr. Justice Holmes in Repoviel v. Algor, 280 U.S. 379, 383-4, has held that state courts word not procluded from entertaining suits against consular officials. And, in an ourlier decision in Expanse Rein, 135 U.S. 403, the Court had held that for purposes of the jurisdictional requirement ambasadors, ministers, and consuls were all in the seme category.

Title 22, United States Code, Section 252, to

which reference was also made in Mr. Anderson's telegram, prohibits the arrest or imprisonment of an ambaseador, or the selence or distraint of who goods and chattels. It goes no further. Neither the arrest nor imprisonment of the Ambaseador, nor the selence or distraint of the Ambaseador's goods or chattels, are of course involved hore.

Interpolicaal Sales Comp., 204 N.Y.S.2d 971, 25 Micc. 2d 299, affirmed 17 A.D.2d 927, 233 N.Y.S.2d 1013...

I would normally have consulted with the Department before taking this action. I did not do so because of the fact that all but one of a whole series of letters addressed by my

Washington associate, Mr. James R. Sharp, and myself, from December 2, 1964, have been ignored and gone unanswered. And, in the one letter which was answered as well as in telephone conversations, the Office of the Legal Advisor has demonstrated an extreme partison attitude in this litigation, and, although doing extraordinary things to assist the defendents, has refused us the most elementary courtesy and assistance.

I regret that enything thick to may have done chould have been construct or had the effect of coherresoing you in the conduct of foreign relations. I would welcom the essistance of the Department in bringing this whole matter to a conclusion, and I will be gled to make myself available at your convenience.

Dear Jack:

This afternoon I went down with Khaibar Khan to see Mr. King at the U.S. Attorney's office in connection with chataining the exhibits which Khaibar Khan needs for his appointmente before a grand jury in Los Angeles. Mr. King said that Khaibar Khan could obtain from the U.S. Mershal today travely funds for the California trip. He said that Mr. Van der Kanghad talked personally with the U.S. Marshal to make sure the funds would be available.

Incidentally, we arranged with Mr. King that even though the check was made out to Khaibar Khan Goodzarian, accordance of the check in that name and endorsement in that name will not be deemed to be admission or to be construed in any way that Khaibar Khan is snybody but Khaibar Khan.

Khaibar Khan and I then went down to see Mr. Costa in the U. S. Marshal's office. To my surprise, Mr. Costa dockined to make payment of the trevel funds at this time. The reason given for this was that the U. S. attorney in California might change his mind and might not want Khaibar Khan to appear before the grand jury after all. As you probably will recall according to your advice, I have stayed behind my charges and tried to clear certain unjust and untrue remarks made by Senator McClellan and some of his colleagues which were made in an effort to pressure The Nation into deciding not to publish its April 12. 1965 issue and to diminish the truth.

In order to clear these matters and bring out the truth, I have made several voluntary appearances before the District Attorney of New York, Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York and also appeared before a Federal Grand Jury in Los Angeles and have testified in detail and submitted full documentations.

Much to the disappointment of the Shah, his corrupt officials and his dishonest American agents and collaborators in this country, I have cleared these unjust and false accusations and have not and will not give up my struggle to achieve justice and freedom for the poor people of my country.

The Shah has been spending millions ofdollars through his agents in this country to damare me, my reputation and the reputation of my associates. They have even gone as far as trying openly to persuade seem of my American friends and associates who understood my cause and were knowledgable of his corrupt regime and dishonest actions to be turned against me. Enclosed you will find copies of letters of May 2,1966, May 26,1966 and May 31, 1966 showing how some of the Shah's American backers tried to do this. I am also enclosing a copy of my letter of December 12,1966 to Robert L.King, Assistant U.S. Attorney which is suff-explanatory and tells of how some original documents are checks as important as exhibits of a Federal Grand Jury have found their way to the Iranian Embassy.

Dear Senator McClellan:

Reference to the kangroo court held by you on March 30, 1965 at the instance of the Shah's agents and unjust and falls accusations made by yourself and some of your colleagues on the floor of the Senate on April 5, 1965 in an obvious attempt to pressure the Nation into stoping to pusblish the article entitle 'Million Dollar Mystery' of which you had a galley proof a week ahead; I would like to make the following comments.

That is to remind you of the contents of my letter to you of December 23, 1964 of which I am sending you a copy in case it has disappeared from your files and landed up at the Iranian Embassy like other documents.

Also I would like to remind you of what took place during our second meeting when I informed you that the Shah's sister had stated that 'this is the Americans' baby and they have no choice except to white-wash these charges'. You stated that it is true, a lot of influential people who are involved in this matter would try to do that but they will not be successful. You even went further in order to reassure me of your good intentions and made the following statement in front of other members of your Committee 'I am glad I did not receive a gold watch from this during his last visit!, meaning the Shah. You requested me to have private talks with your counsel Jerry Adlerman during which time I was approached by him to take off the names of five most influential Americans involved in these charges in order to make the investigation easy for you. When I brought this to your attention and informed you that I refuse to be a subject to these kind of approached and do not trust Adlerman you tried to convince me that he meant well and assigned Paul Kemrick in his place who turned up to be the same.

Even as recently as February of this year I telephoned Paul

Kemrick and told him that one of the Senators in your Committee has been in close contact with the Iranian Embassy and the investigators are making a report according to the desire of the Embassy, Kemrick stated that this is a matter that I should discuss with you. You telephoned me later at Mr. Wels' office at which time I advised you of the same and told you that the reports of your staff's investigation are being prepared practically at the Iranian Embassy with the intention of white-washing the entire matter and making me and my people the guilty party. You denied any knowledge of this and asked to talk to my attorney during which time you assured him and me that you would investigate this matter and pretended to be shocked.

Therefore my information that certain dishonest people connected with your Committee, State Department and the Justice Department had been working and cooperating all along with the Iranian Embassy to white-wash this entire matter and to make me and my people the guilty ones has been right and accurate.

I do not entirely blame you as I understand that you have been under tremendous pressure but one thing makes me happy and that is ever since Senator Robert F. Kennedy left the Justice Department as the Attorney General I stoped to furnish your Committee with additional documents. I will shortly receive copies of the reports made by your staff and investigators according to the desire of the Shah's Embassy through my confidential sources at that Embassy which will always remind my people of the great injustice done to us by you and others connected with your Committee.

I would like to repeat that all the remarks made by you and some of your colleagues on the floor of the Senate on April 5, 1965 are falls, inaccurate, phony, nonsense and without any foundation which you are aware of. I really would like to hear them away from the Senate floor to show to you how absurd and phony they are.

In conclusion I, on behalf of my people stand and support the charges brought to your Committee for investigation in the hope that justice would be done. You dear Senator stand, support and protect the Shah's corrupt regime, his dishonest Iranian and American collaborators and try to do us injustice.

Senator John L. McClellan (D., Ark.), Chairman of the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, announced today the beginning of a preliminary inquiry into certain aspects of the Foreign Aid Program. At the present time the inquiry is expected to deal primarily with the administration and the effectiveness of United States aid to Iran.

Yesterday the Subcommittee heard in executive session the testimony of The Khaibar Khan, leader of the Bakhtiari Tribe of Iran, who is temporarily living in the United States and who spoke for a group he described as "K. K. United Patriots for Justice." During the course of his secret testimony, The Khai escribed Foreign Aid operations in Iran and surrendered to the Subcommittee voluminous documents in his possession in full substantiation of the testimony he gave the Subcommittee. These documents, if corroborated, point is a cossic corruption and misuse of funds in excess of \$100,000,000.00 in consistion with the administration of United States aid to Iran. The current inquiry will follow avenues of investigation suggested by the documents and by the estimony of The Khaibar Khan. Future action by this Subcommittee will be determined by the facts developed during the preliminary.

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
