can't go to achesh on it (a) you know, that's -- those are the things that were in his head. You know, in many different kinds of things, but that was one of them. Did he tell you that he had a gun? Q Δ Mo. Did you know that he had a gun? \mathbf{O} A Did I know that he had a gun? I know now that he had a qun. 0 No. I mean, then, did you know that he had a--I guess -- I guess not. A Dld you say "you guessed not"? Is that what you Ö. said? Or I don't recall (*) A High? Q I don't recall him having a gun. A Then you can answer "no" to gun truthfully? Ω Ω Yeah, I would -- I would answer "no" to that, but it scares me, nevertheless. I should have seen a lawyer (*) I should have seen a lawyer. Why do you say that, a lawyer? I mean because the political implications in this thing, also personally for me the implications. (*) I might lose my job, be called to a trial. Cetting into this thing up to the hilt just destroy we personally. Plus that, I mean, you guys are vorking, you know, for Mayor Yorty and Reddin.

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See, I think that-that Yorty and Reddin may want to play up

the political aspect of this thing. I've heard his statements on the radio (*) $\Omega \quad \text{He's a politician though, } \text{Con't (*)}$

A (*) Reddin these are the-that this information is going to go to, they are going to see this, they're going to have a tool to hurt-to hurt the Party, to hurt the left, to start a red scare. And this is where the information is going to go. And this is one of the things (*) when I answered I felt that I was lying because I think is there anything that you are afraid to tell me or something like that.

Q Un huh.

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A Yeah, shit, yes.

Q Well, what is it?

A I don't know how this—you know, how this is going to come out in a report, what—what—I mean, Yorty, you know, was able to build the thing out of the fact that his car was seen outside of a DuDois Club meeting and that was obviously bullshit because there had been no DuDois Club in Los Angeles for a year. We dre by court order restricted, any person working in the investigation of this thing, and now this thing has been cleared up, and if you don't think for one second that Yorty, Mayor Yorty was--shall we say--slapped a little bit, you know? And talking about the senior-senior law enforcement agent in this county, he has been talked to and he knows what his position is. There is-there is a group of people working on this investigation even within the Police Department, those fellows, including myself, are prohibited from discussing thin case with anyone, and I'm not going to run out of here and talk. anyone about what we're talking about right now except the man that's in charge of the unit. He has to be aware because we have to be responsible to semeche. But I think, Walter, that what we should do here is, before I continue this examination. A I told him that the Arab Israeli struggle was akin to a national liberation struggle. I also gave him, I believe in a position to—to Israelis that the Javish people have a right to national discretion, they have a right to their own state. But there is another Israel which is an alter (*) which is a religious, political, you know, political system (*) religiously (*). What is needed is to, as I say, de-Zienie Israel to give the Arab people an equal political voice, an equal position in the community.

Q And how do you think that saying this, that it should be the way you put it to him, how do you think this had an effect on him deciding to shoot Kennedy?
