toward the Senator? Yes. Where is the Senator at this time that his movement commences? He must have been in this area (indicating), shaking hands. Would you draw a mark there? Would you 7 put "R.F.K."? (Whereupon the witness complied with the request of Mr. Howard.) 10 We are keeping you with the color red so if 11 we have other colors, you will be red. 12 Right. 13 How close did -- we will call him the 14 suspect -- get to the Senator? 15 It couldn't have been more than six feet. 16 It was impossible to be more than six feet away from him 17 because Mr. Uecker was almost right next to him. He was 18 pushing the crowd back. 19 How close to the Senator was the suspect 20 when this gun started firing? 21 Four feet -- four to six feet. 22 What did he do? 23 He kind of went around Mr. Uecker, and he 24from here -- he looked like -- though he pulled his hand 25

out from here and came around.

1	And when he stuck the gun, he looked like
2	he was on his tiptoes because he wasn't that tall.
3	Mr. Uecker is quite huge, and he tried to
4	get Mr. Uecker out of the way, and he shot him.
.5	Q How close to the Senator were you at the
6	time of the first shot?
7	A The same amount of distance, five feet.
8	Q And how many shots were fired?
9	A I heard live distinct shots. I could swear
1.0	to five, but
1.1	Q Could there have been more?
12	A There could have been. I don't know if the
13	confusion I was standing behind there the next thing
14	I knew, I had blood all over my face and my glasses.
15	And then the man that got shot in the head
16	fell in my arms.
17	And then the other boy that got shot in the
18	thigh, he fell on top of me, and they pushed me down, they
19	fell on top of me.
20	Q Did you see what happened to the Senator before
21	you went down?
22	A He was on his way, falling he was falling
23	down.
24	The first shot, he kind of reared back very,
25	very sharply.
26	Q Did you see any movement of the Senator's
[

arms after the first shot? Both hands went up like that (indicating). He was kind of on an angle. He was just about to shake hands. The Senation was? The Senator was. And he got pushed back, and both hands 7 went back like that (indicating). You indicated that both hands --Went up, they both went up. 10 And is that all that you saw of what had 11 occurred because of the other two people being wounded 12 in your proximity? Yes, sir. 14 You say someone was shot in the head. Do 15 you know that person by name? 16 No, sir According to the papers, the 17 first name is Paul. I don't know his last name. 18 You wouldn't know it? Would you describe 1.9 him by size? Did he appear to be quite large? 20 Yes, sir, he was, and --21 MR. HOWARD: May I approach the witness --22 THE FOREMAN: Go right ahead. 23 MR. HOWARD: -- Mr. Foreman? May we mark, with the 24 Foreman's permission, as Grand Jury Exhibit 9, a 25 photograph of a patient in the hospital? 26

THE FOREMAN: Permission granted. BY MR. HCWARD: I'd like to show you Grand Jury Exhibit 9, if I can. 3 Are you familiar with the person depicted in that photograph? Yes. It looks like --Does this appear to be the person that you have identified by a first name and as a heavy set individual, to your knowledge, shot in the head --9 Yes, sir 10 A -- and fiell upon you? 11 Will you return to your seat, please? 12 (Whereupon the witness complied with the 13 request of Mr. Howard.) 14 As near as you can, will you recall for 15 Q the Jury the events immediately after the shooting? What 16 17 happened? How did the crowd react, what you saw, and 18 with particular reference to the person identified as in 19 3-A and 3-B? 20 Well, the suspect turned almost immediately; 21 and after all the shots were fired, he was trying to 22escape. 23 He was trying to escape. He tried very, 24 very hard to get away. 25 But Mr. Rafer Johnson -- and by this time

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Mr. Grier and Mr. Uecker were all holding him against the heater. It's the stainless steel table. And people were trying -- were hitting him and cursing at him, and it was utter confusion. I mear, everyone was trying to kill him. There were very few -- at that time there were only four of us around the Senator. There was -- the busboy was holding his head, another gentleman with glasses, and myself, and two other people on the other 1.0 side of him. 11 And we were trying to, you know, see if 1.2 we could help him in any possible way. But all we could do was unbutton his shirt 13 and see -- try to get the people back. 14 At that | time Mr. Unruh pushed me out of the 15 way, and at that time I tried to help keep the suspect 16 subdued, but it was, you know -- wasn't really worth it 17 because everyone else grabbed him already and were beating 18 up on him. But he was apprehended at this time? 20 Yes, almost instantly. 21 Did some police officers arrive? 22 Yes, they did, but at the time involved, 23 I have no idea. 24 The passage of time? 25 The passage of time, I have no idea. 26

Were you there when the police arrived? Q Yes, I was. Did they take custody of this person? Yes. They took im out through the Colonial Room, which was where the Senator was going to have his press conference. 7 And they got him out as quick as they could? Yes, sir, they did. 9 At the time of the shooting, could you tell 10 us anything about the gun that you saw in the suspect's 11 hand? 12 Yes. À It was -- | well, I don't know how you 14 describe the gun, but it s -- it wasn't much longer than 15 maybe four to five inches long. 16 And I thought, at first, it was a .25 17 caliber pistol because I had seen a .25 caliber pistol 18 once before that a friend had. 19 And at the time, I didn't know what it was. 20 I just knew it was a gun. 21 MR. HOWARD: With the Foreman's permission, may we 22 mark and envelope and content, the revolver, as Grand 23 Jury Exhibit 7? 24 Pennission granted. THE FOREMAN: MR. HOWARD: We have just gone through it, Mr. 26

It's the kind of gun that you cannot break, but there is nothing in it. Would you examine Grand Jury Exhibit 7? Does this appear to be similar to or appear to be the gun that you saw in the hand of the suspect? The same gun. The reason I say it is -the reason is it had the funny little corkscrew here. 7 That is in the front of the gun, below the barrel? Yes, sir ! It's the same thing I saw. 10 That's the gun you saw in the hand --Q 11 Yes, sir! A 12 That's the gun that did the shooting? Q 13 Yes, sir! A 14 You say you got blood from the Senator? Q 15 I think it was the Senator. I'm not sure. 16 But all I can remember was I couldn't see, . 17 and one of the other waiters yelled across at me, "Are you 18 all right, are you hit or what," because he didn't know. . 19 And I just -- it was all over my face. 20 When the police officers left, you said that Q 21 there were certain people that had hold, or they were 22 holding the person identified in the picture. 23 Yes, sir. 24 Did you recognize one as Roosevelt Grier? 25 Q Yes. Mr. Grier was bent over the man, Α 26

24

25

holding him.

Q And did you know -- or was Rafer Johnson identified to you?

A Rafer Johnson was one of the first people to touch him.

He kind of grabbed him around the waist.

It looked as though he had great hold of him.

And Mr. Wecker had him around the neck, and he was holding the arm out with the gun.

Q Did you see what happened to the gun, how the gun was removed from --

A No. I think -- I think it was Mr. Johnson who tried to get the gum.

Everybody's hand was all over him. When they got him on the table, everybody's hands -- and then someone started stepping on everybody's hands, which wasn't too smart.

Everybody, you know, was trying to hold it down.

Q Now, the shots that you heard, were they fired in rapid succession?

A The first shot was definitely a distinct shot. I mean, it was a pause in between the next three. It was three rapid ones that were fired.

The firs one I saw, you know, I was stunned after that. I tried to -- by the time I tried to

jump him, the person, the other fellow was in my arms and got shot in the head. And after that, I couldn't see very much because I had the blood all over. I took my glasses off, which was, you know, it had blood on it. That's all. I tried then to subdue the person. MR. HOWARD: May we mark the photograph as Exhibit 2-A? So ordered. THE FOREMAN: 10 BY MR. HOWARD: I'd like to direct your 11 attention, if I may, to a photograph that we have now 12 marked on the back as Exhibit 2-A. 13 Would you study that for a moment? 14 Yes, sir 15 Can you tell us, first of all, if you are Q 16 familiar with any individual depicted in that photograph? 17 Two -- Mr. Uno, U-n-o. 18 Will you stay with the red and --19 This is -- do you want me to write on the 20 21 picture? Write on the picture. It won't come out, 22 is that correct? 23 That's true. 24 Will you try my ballpoint --25 Here is one. A GRAND JUROR: 26

THE WITNESS: A felt pen? MR. FUKUTO: Here is a felt pen in red. BY MR. HOWARD: You are indicating the left of the picture, there is an individual shown there standing, is that correct? 5 Yes. Α That's Mr. Uno? Q 7 Yes, sir! He is the Manager of the Food ĸ and Beverage Department Keep it loud, now. Q 10 This is Mr. Uecker, here. 11 All right. Would you identify him? Q 12 (Whereupon the witness complied with the 13 request of Mr. Howard.) 14 THE WITNESS: I don't know how to spell his name. 15 BY MR, HOWARD: All right, I will get it Q 16 for you in a minute. U-e-c-k-e-r. 17 (Whereupon the witness complied with the 18 request of Mo. Howard.) 19 BY MR. HCWARD: That's the individual shown 20 full face in approximately the center, is that correct? 21 22 Α Yes, sir. · Who is Mr. Uecker? 23 Q ` He is the Assistant Maitre d' at the hotel, 24 assistant to my father. 25 Is there anyone else there that you Q

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recognize? No, sir, not at this -- not in this photo. Did you see the individuals that you have identified appear to be holding someone down, is that correct? 5 Yes. Mr. Uecker is still holding onto his arm -- looks as though it's his arm. By reference to that picture, can you tell 8 us what is occurring at that time? There - at that time, there looks as 10 though they keep trying to keep the gun. The man on the 11 right side is trying to hold down the gun. 12 Did you see that occur? 13 I did not see this particular photo No. 14 I did not see the scene at all. 1.5 You did not see that? 16 No, because I was on the opposite side. 17 Fine. If we may go back --18 Yes, sir. 19 After the police left the scene, did you 20 stay there? 21 Yes, sir, I did, for a moment, because the 22 officer -- I don't remember his name -- put me into the 23 chef's office with the cook and the busboy. The three of 24 us were in this one room.

We were taken away from the crowd.

Other than the two people that fell near or 0 upon you, did you see other people that were shot? Yes, sir, I did. I saw two other additional people, other than the Senator. ' The Senator -- there was one man behind him who was kind of heavy set. Then there was the man who fell on top of 8 me and the boy who got shot in the leg. Those are the only four people I saw. 10 Now, going back to just before this shooting, 11 you observed a nice looking girl? 12 Yes, sir, I did. A 13 Could you identify her again if you saw her? Q 14 To some degree, yes, sir, I could. 15 I would never forget what she looked like 16 because she had a very good looking figure -- and the dress 17 was kind of -- kind of lousy. 18 Flousy? 19 Lousy. 20 Now, after the shooting, you remained at 21 the scene; did you happen to see this girl again? 22 No, after the shooting I did not see her. A 23 I only saw her before. 24 You didn't ask her her name or anything? 25 No, sir, I didn't. 26

Did any of the fellows or guys you work with by any chance --No, no one had, other than myself, had seen her, I don't believe. You have inquired around, I take it, since? I have only talked to one fellow that was across from me, that had seen me, that was with me the 7 whole time. I asked him, and he said that he had seen her but that he didn't know where she went or what her name 10 was. 11 Could you describe what she was wearing? 12 It looked as though it was a white Yes. 13 dress and it had either black or dark purple polka dots 14 on it. 15 It kind of had -- I don't know what they 16 call it -- but it's like -- looked like a bib in the front, 17 kind of went around. It's like that (indicating). 18 A GRAND JUROR: A lace dickey, probably. 19 THE WITNESS: It was like over the material itself; 20 it was the same as the clothing. 21 And then she was -- she -- the person who 22 is accused of shooting him was -- like I say, they were 23 both on the -- standing together. 24 BY MR. HOWARD: Back of the tray stand?

26

Yes.

And what happened, he looked as though he either talked to her or flirted with her because she smiled. This is just before he got down. So, at least, heir association, in Q proximity of the tray, they are smiling, perhaps --Together; they were both smiling. As he got down, he was smiling. In fact, the minute the first two shots were fired, he still had a very sick looking smile on his 10 That's one thing -- I can never forget that. 11 Where was Mr. Unruh, if you know, at the 12 time of the shooting? I don't know. 14 Mr. Salinger, if you know? 15 No. I didn't see hin -- either one. 16 MR. HOWARD: That's all we have, Mr. Foreman. 17 This person identified in 3-A and 3-B, he 18 Q was not known to you, was he? No, he wasn't. 20 He did not work at the hotel? 21 As far as I know, no. 22 Would you have an explanation how he 23 arrived at and was standing in the kitchen? 24 The only possible conclusion I can come to 25 is he was one of the -- what I thought at the time --26

well-wishers. And I thought he got in there just the way all the other people. In other words, this party was jammed --Q 4 Yes, sir. Α -- is this a fair statement? A Yes. They were following the Senator anywhere 8 he goes? Yes, sir. Α 10 And probably even the pantry, the kitchen 11 area, the rampways were just a mass of humanity? Yes, sir, every exit in there was jammed Α 13 14 with people. Would you describe the facial characteristics, first of all, of this girl? 16 She had dark hair that was cut, I Yes. 17 would say, just above the shoulders, just around in here (indicating). 19 And it just kind of looked like it was 20 messed up, at the time, I mean. She could have changed 21 that -- she could have come with curls. 22 I don't know, it was just messed up at the 23 time. Her face -- facial expression, she had what looked like a short nose. She wasn't too -- facially, 26

she wasn't too pretty; she was not that pretty. 1 And like I say, figure -- she had a very good figure. 3 MR. HOWARD: I think that's all we have. Wait a minute. After the Senator had completed his tall: to the crowd, did you know the Senator was going to come 7 back and follow the path that you have described on the 8 diagram? Yes, I did, because I was right next to Mr. 10 Minasian when he said we are going to have to change it. 11 I asked -- you know, I had -- I asked 1.2 him, "Which way are you going to take him?" 13 He said, "Through the back of the stage." 14 I says --15 Where were you when you asked that -- at 16 Q what position? 17 Oh, I was by the door, the same position 18 then. 19 S-1? Q 20 S-2. А 21 S-2? Q 22 S-2. A 23 Did you see the person identified in 3-A Q 24 or 3-B at that time? 25 No, sir. 26

The moment I noticed him was when I walked through the swinging doors. But is it a fair statement that you knew that the Senator was coming out through the rampway? Yes, I knew because --Did other people seem to know it? No, no. | Everyone was quite surprised because all of the Kennedy Girls had lined up to make a pathway out of the same door that he had entered. 10 Did you have guards on the door that would prevent other than employees to go into the pantry or 11 12 kitchen area? 13 Yes, sir 14 There were two security guards that I 1.5 remember seeing in the pantry area from the hotel. There were two security guards from the hotel, and he was -- one was stathoned at the opposite door and one was stationed at the door that the Senator had to go through. Can you explain to us how these thirty, forty, or fifty people --They were either news reporters or representatives from the Kennedy people that were there or were friends of the reporters that somehow had gotten in with them at the time people were coming, before the

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Senator had come down.

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ï	People were flowing through there freely.
. 2	They were allowed to pass freely because no one knew the
3	time the Senator was coming until about five minutes before.
4	Q When you came in, as you indicated, through
5	the back or service area, was there a guard there?
6	A I had to pass the guard by the door. He
7	tried to stop me.
8	And then one of the waiters recognized me
9	and he said, "It's all right. He is with the hotel."
10	Q So there was some type of control?
11	A Yes, sir, there was.
12	Q Internal?
13	A Yes.
14	Q But from your observation, was it effective?
15	Was the area kept clear of people?
16	A No. It was congested with people.
17	MR. HOWARD: That's all we have.
18	THE FOREMAN: Any further questions?
19	It is my duty to caution you and warn you
20	not to impart to anyone or discuss with anyone any of the
21	proceedings that went on in this room this morning.
22	THE WITNESS: Yes.
23	THE FOREMAN: Thank you very much for coming in.
24	MR. HOWARD: Could we hold on?
25	THE FOREMAN: Did you say something? One more
26	question?

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1	Q BY MR. HOWARD: You asked someone what route
2	the Senator would take?
3	A Mr. Mirasian. I asked Mr. Minasian.
4	Q And he works with your dad?
5	A Yes. Le is also an assistant to my father.
6	Q Did you tell anyone the Senator was coming
7	in?
8	A No, sir, E didn't.
9	MR. HOWARD: Thank you.
10	THE FOREMAN: That will be all. Thank you very
11.	much.
12	(Whereupon the witness was excused and
13	withdrew from the Grand Jury Suite.)
14	
15	MR. HOWARD: Ira Goldstein.
16	
17	IRA GOLDSTEIN,
18	called as a witness before the Grand Jury, was duly sworn
19	as follows:
20	THE FOREMAN: Would you stand right there, please,
21	and raise your right hand?
22	(Whereupon the witness complied with the
23	request of the Foreman.)
24	Do you solemnly swear that the testimony
25	you are about to give in this matter pending before the
26	Grand Jury of the County of Los Angeles shall be the

truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God? THE WITNESS: I do. THE FOREMAN: Would you be seated, please. the record -- pull your chair just a little forward -- for the record, would you give us your name? THE WITNESS: Yes. My name is Ira Goldstein. EXAMINATION 10 BY MR. HOWARD: Can you hear me all right, Mr. Goldstein? 11 Q 12 Yes. If you get in any distress or pain, will 13 you te 1 us? 15 No, I feel fine. 16 Will you tell us your age? Α I am nineteen and a half. 18 Q Your business or occupation? 19 I am a news reporter for Continental News. 20 May I direct your attention to election Q 21 evening and the early morning of July 5th. That would be Tuesday night -- I'm sorry -- June 4th and June 5th. 23 Were you at the Ambassador Hotel? Yes, I was. Were you there at the -- we will call it 25 the Kennedy celebration? 26

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Yes. And did the Senator arrive? The Senator arrived around 12:00 o'clock to make a speech. He was in the hotel at the time, but he didn't come on to the Embassy Room until about 12:00 o'clock. I looked at my watch. Are we talking about the area of the Embassy Room, is that correct? Yes. This was the podium that was set up 10 for his television broadcast. 11 And he arrived and did address his following 12 there, is that correct #- a correct statement? 13 Yes, right. 14 Where were you at the time of the address? 15 At the time of the address, I was walking 16 around, looking at a monitor. I stood on a table for a few 17 minutes, trying to see if I could see him. 18 And then someone mentioned that there was 19 sandwiches in the kitchen for the press, so I hadn't had 20 dinner, so I walked into the kitchen to see if I could 21find them. 22 I walked to the end of the kitchen and 23 I didn't see anything. In fact, I didn't even see this man here (indicating). 26

1	So I started walking back, and all of a
2	sudden, the Senator started walking through.

And the first thing I said was, "How is Senator Kennedy? What happened to him?" And this woman walked by, and she said to me, "How dare you talk about my husband that way," and she slapped me across the face. And I said, "I am sorry, lady, but I was I'd like to know how the Senator was -- " or shot, too. " -- is." And she said, "Oh, I am sorry, Honey," and kissed me. This was Mrs. Ethel Kennedy. 10 At that time she was not in tears. 11 a little hysterical though, but she wasn't crying. 12 Did you remain in that chair until you were 13 taken for medical treatment? 14 Yes, I did, and that took about ten minutes. 15 Did you see some police officers arrive? 16 I didn't see a police officer until I was wheeled out of the hotel. 18 Did you hear sounds of struggling behind 19 you? 20 There was a lot of confusion, that's about 21 all I heard. 22 Now, the fellow you fell against, was he 23 the chap that we brought in here on the wheelchair? Yes. I fell against him and I knocked him 25 to the floor. 26

ï	Q But you saw him here this morning?
2	A Yes. I was chatting with him.
3	Q So there is no doubt that that was the
4	fellow you were talking to?
5	A Yes, uh-huh.
6	THE FOREMAN: Is that the one in the wheelchair?

19	There being no further questions, I must
20	MR. HOWARD: Wait a minute, we do have one.
21	Q You indicated there was a young lady with
22	A Yes.

24	A Yes. I had known her well, through some
25 ·	other friends, and she was kind of following me around that
26	night.

Will you describe what she had on? She had a white dress on, kind of short, lacey -- I believe, white stockings. 3 What color hair? Brown. She was sitting outside, by the way. The Senator fell against her and got some 7 blood on her dress and on her face. 8 She was the young lady that shook his hand. MR. HOWARD: Thank you very much. 10 THE FOREMAN: There being no further questions, I 11 must caution and also warn you not to impart to anyone or 12 discuss with anyone any of the proceedings that went on 13 here in this Jury Room this morning. 1.4 I understand it, yes. 15 THE WITNESS: Thank you very much for coming in. 16 THE FOREMAN: .17 THE WITNESS: Thank you. I hope we haven't tired you too much. 18 THE FOREMAN: 19 THE WITNESS: Okay. 20 Watch the step down. THE FOREMAN: (Whereupon the witness was excused and 21 22 withdrew from the Grand Jury Suite.) 23 Let's take a five-minute recess. THE FOREMAN: 24 (SHORT RECESS.) 26

MR. HOWARD: We'd like to call Placencia. He is one of the arresting officers. 2 ARTHUR PLACENCIA. called as a witness before the Grand Jury, was duly sworn as follows: THE FOREMAN: Would you raise your right hand, 7 please, sir? (Whereupon the witness complied with the request of the Foreman.) 10 Do you sollemnly swear that the evidence 11 you shall give in this matter now pending before the 1.2 Grand Jury of the County of Los Angeles shall be the 13 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so 14 help you God? 15 16 THE WITNESS: Yes. 17 Would you be seated, please, and for THE FOREMAN: 18 the record, would you give us your name? `i9 THE WITNESS: My name is Arthur Placencia. 20 EXAMINATION 21 BY MR. HOWARD: 22 What is your business or occupation? 23 I am a police officer for the City of Los 24 Angeles, working out of the Rampart Patrol. 25

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Are you one of the arresting officers in

19	. A	Yes, sir. We worked the mid-watch, from
20	6:00 p.m. to 3	:00 a.m. in the morning.
21	Q	Were you in a patrol car?
22	A	Yes, sir.
23	Q	Did you hear a call coming over the radio?
24	A	Yes, sir.
25	Q	Did that indicate some kind of difficulty or
26	trouble or pol	ice problem at the Ambassador Hotel?

2	Q And were you near the ho	otel?
3	A Yes, sir, We were on E	ghth and Vermont.
4	Q That would be a matter of	of blocks?
5	A Yes, sir	
6	Q Did you respond to the c	:a11?

8	8 Q What time would you judg	ge you arrived at
9	9 the hotel?	
1.0	A We got the call around 1	2:20. It didn't
1,1	take us more than ten minutes around	1 12:30, I think.
1.2	Q Were you, upon arrival,	directed to a
13	certain area within the hotel itself?	
14	A Yes, sir.	
1.5	Q Was that by people that	obviously were
16	familiar with the hotel?	
17	A Yes, sir.	
1.8	Q Probably people that wor	ked there?
19	A Yes, sir.	
20	Q Where were you directed	, generally?
21	A When we got off the car	, sir?
22	Q Yes.	
23	A Some ramp we went up	a ramp. It was in
24	the side it was in the side of the	Ambassador.
25	Q Did you arrive though in	n the interior of the
26	hotel, in a certain area that you coul	d describe? Would

it be like an office area? A kitchen area. Kitchen area. Did there seem to be some excitement going on in that kitchen area? Yes, quite a bit. And you had received a report, had you not, there had been some type of trouble. What information did you have upon your arrival in that kitchen? Well, all we knew was what came out of the 10 radio, that came out, an ambulance, shooting, man down, 11 3400 Wilshire, so we responded to the call. And when we got there, we got off the car, 13 and then people started directing us and telling us, "He 14 is over here, he is over here -- the man that shot him is 15 over here." 16 . 17 So we just started following people up this 1.8 kitchen area and that's 19 You finally arrived at a location within 20 the kitchen. Did you see some type of struggle going on 21 or occurring? 22 Α When we got up to this area where Yes, sir. 23 we got the suspect, there were people holding this suspect down on top of this sheet metal table, I guess you could say. 26

1.	Q That suspect is the person identified in,
2	shown
3	A Yes, sir.
4	Q in Exhibits 3 before you, is that
5	correct?
6	A Yes, sir.
7	Q Were there a lot of people or more than one
8	person holding this suspect?
- 9	A Yes, sir. There was well, I couldn't
16	exactly tell you how many.
11	There was quite a few. I remember one
12	distinctly of
13	Q Pretty big, large fellow?
14	A Colored guy. It turned out later to be
15	Rosie Grier.
1.6	Q When you saw this happening, were you
17	apprehensive about the safety of the person?
18	A That was the first thing we thought of.
19	We seen all the people around there. We knew we'd have
20	to get him out fast.
21	Q What did you do? Did you take one of them
22	off?
23	A Yes, I took Rosie Grier off.
24	Don't laugh. It wasn't funny.
25	Q And your partner, White, did he take someone
26	off?

He took two persons. One had him in an arm strangle, and another person, which turned out to be Rafer Johnson, grabbed him from the arms, I think. And he took him off, and we got him off the table. We cuffed him Were you in a police uniform Q Α Yes, sir. -- telling everyone you were taking him 8 into custody? 9 We had to keep telling 'em, 'We are police. 10 A. step aside." 11 And after a while we got tired telling 1.2 them. We just started pushing. 13 We got the suspect off the table and 14 handcuffed him and proceeded to take him out. 15 Now, after you took the person into custody, 16 did you attempt to get him out of the location as quickly 17 Is that a fair statement? as you could? 18 Yes. Well, like I said, we knew we had to get him 20 out there fast because everybody was hollering, you know, 21 "He did it. He is the one that shot him." 22 We didn't know who he had shot. We just 23 knew he had shot somebody. 24 All we knew was that he was a suspect. 25 Knowing, when you left, there were other Q 26

officers arriving, and arriving in response, also? Yes, because when we were driving into the bi; driveway, we were talking to the taxicab driver that was taking other people, I guess, gotten injured, and another patrol car came in right behind us. And I seen about three or four about half a block away, so when we ran in, I remember there was only 7 four of us that ran in there, four police officers. Now, after, did anyone go with you, if you recall, from the area of the hotel to the station? 10 11 Yes. 12 Do you know who that person was? 13 Jesse Unruh, I think. 14 The person identified as Jesse Unruh? Q 15 Yes. 16 Was there some reason he went with you? Q 17 Did he say something? 18 What do you mean, "Did he say something"? You mean why he thought he should go? 19 20 No, he just was tagging along, I guess. 21 We never asked him to come. He had aho d 22 of the suspect. 23 My partner had him from the right, from my partner's right, and the suspect's left, and Unruh was on 24the other side -- kept hollering, "We don't want another 25 Oswald, we don't want another Oswald.". 26

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1	Q With those remarks, did that indicate to
2	you the subject of the shooting?
3	A No. I wasn't thinking about who he had shot.
4	I was just thinking of getting him out of
5	there because these people were were, like I say, were
6	really looked to me like they were really out to get
7	him.
8	Q Now, after, you took the subject in the
9	pictures into custody to the station, is that a fair
1.0	statement?
11	A Yes, sir.
1.2	Q Did you keep him in your custody for a
13	period of time?
14	A Well, we had him in our custody from the
15	time we got him off the table all the way until we got to
16	Rampart Station.
17	Q Was he handcuffed at that time?
18	A Yes, sir, all the time.
19	Q Now, upon your arrival, or during, perhaps,
20	the trip, did you attempt to locate the name or ask this
21	person his name?
22	A The suspect's name?
23	Q Yes.
24	A Yes, I asked him, you know, "What is your
25	name?'
26	And he wouldn't say anything.

'Cause I knew I was going to have to make a report on him, I asked him, just like any other suspect, 2 I asked him, "What is your name?" 3 He didn't say anything. World he communicate at all with you on the ride to the station? 6 Well, When I was giving him -- Travis 7 turned around, my partner, White, and told me, "You better give him his rights. Partner." For the subject -- or the suspect, of his 10 constitutional rights? 11 Yes. So I took out my officer's Field 1.2 Notebook, and I startled reading off the rights. 1.3 And after I read them off, I asked him, 14 "Do you understand your rights?" 15 And he looked at me, and I asked him again; 16 and then he mumbled something. 17 So I told him, "Look, I will give them to 18 19 you again." So I read them off again. 20 Then I asked him again, "Do you understand your rights?" Then he looked at me and said, "Yes." 22 And then I said, "Do you wish to remain 23 silent?" 24 And he just didn't say anything. 25 Then he looked at me again and he said, 26

"Yes," Then I said, "Do you wish an attorney present?" Then at that time he just said, "Yes." So after that I didn't ask him any more. And then, after that, I asked Jesse Unruh, I said, "By the way, who did he shoot?" And he goes, "Bobby Kennedy." And I said, "Oh." Then I looked at him and I go, "By the way, 10 who are you?" 11 12 He goes, "Jesse Unruh." I said, "Oh," so we just kept going to the 13 station. 14 Q Upon your arrival at the station, is it 15 customary to search or make a search of a person in 16 17 custody like this individual was? Well, it's customary to search him before 1.8 19 we usually handcuff him. 20 At that time I didn't think it was right to do it there, so as soon as we got to the station we 21 22 took him into the Interrogation Room and we emptied all 23 his pockets. 24 And is it customary to make police reports of what you find? Α Yes, sir. 26

Can you recall what you found when you emptied the pockets of the subject? 2 We found four \$100.00 bills, I think one 3 \$5.00 bill, four \$1.00 bills, some change, paper clipping two paper clippings, and a key, two unused .22 bullets, one -- then there was one with the head of the bullet I don't know what you call it, and he had a white sheet there, some kind of a Kennedy yell -- I guess it was their yell for that night $\frac{1}{1}$ and then he had a key. I think that's about all he had. 1.0 You took those into your possession, is 0 11 12 that correct? Yes, my partner and I did. 13 Were these items booked into evidence? 14 15 Yes. MR. HOWARD: May we have one moment? 16 THE FOREMAN: | Surely. 17 MR. HOWARD: |We are trying to locate one exhibit. 18 Do you recall, you said you found an 19 Q article, is that correct, when you searched him, when you 20 21. searched --We found two paper articles. 22 MR. HOWARD: May we have one minute? May we mark, with the Jury's permission, 24 an exhibit that is entitled, "This Man is Your Man," for 25 identification, as exhibit next in order, Grand Jury 10?

1	THE FOREMAN: Permission granted.
2	MR. HOWARD: Nay we mark what appears to be a
3	political comment in a newspaper as Grand Jury's 11?
4	THE FOREMAN: So ordered.
5	Q BY MR. HOWARD: May I direct your attention
6	to Grand Jury Exhibit 10 and 11. Would you examine those?
7	First of all, 10 being what appears to be
.8	a typewritten piece of paper containing is that
9	A Yes.
10	Q Is that what you said was a cheer or
11	A Yes.
12	Q Did you take that from the possession of
13	the suspect after his arrest and upon his search?
14	A Well, when we searched him, this was he
15	had Officer White is the one that marked it.
16	Q But you were there?
17	A Yes, we marked I seen him mark it.
18	Q May I show you 11. Will you examine that?
19	A Yes. This is the one of the paper
20	clippings.
21	Q And that was also taken upon your
22	examination of the suspect, is that correct?
23	A Yes, sir.
24	Q Now, will you describe again you say you
25	found two bullets, is that right?
26	A Yes, sir.

1	Q Were they .22 type bullets?
2	A Yes, sir.
3	Q You are familiar with that, is that correct?
4	A Yes, sir.
5	Q Would you examine what we have heretofore
6	marked, a gun that we marked Grand Jury Exhibit 7?
7	Would you be familiar with that gun?
8	A No, sir.
9	Q Could you tell it's a .22 by looking at it?
10	A Is it a cylinder? Yes, sir.
11	Q Is this a .22?
12	A Yes, sir.
13	Q What did you do with the items that you
14	took, Exhibits 10 and 11? Did you book them into evidence?
15	A Yes, sir.
16	Q Did you also book the two .22 shells?
17	A Yes, sir.
18	Q Would they go over normal routine business
19	to the Police Laboratory for ballistic tests, or would you
20	know that?
21	A Well, unused shells, I really don't know,
22	but we booked it as evidence.
23	Q You didn't go back to the scene or anything;
24	you stayed with the subject?
25	A The night of the shooting
26	Q Right.
I	·

-- or the morning? Yes, sir. Would you direct your attention, Officer, to what we have marked as Exhibit 1? Could you step over here and look at it? There has been testimony of the nature that this appears to be a portion of what we'll call the kitchen facilities adjoining and serving the Embassy Room of the hotel. There has been testimony, for example, that this area would be a pantry, there would be a ramp down 10 here into an area for storage of -- shelves -- dishes and 11 things necessary for a banquet, down through an area of a 12 serving kitchen. 13 Would that be -- generally, looking at that, 14 would you be familiar that this would depict the scene that 15 you effectuated the arrest? 16 No, sir. 17 18 You wouldn't recognize it? Would you 19 recognize this, generally, as being the area you went to, 20 with that description? Well --Speak up loud. This area over here on this side is the area where we made the arrest. But visualizing the whole thing as one unit, I was going to ask you this, where was the arrest made?

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Well, we came in through the east passage-1 way. All right. Can we do this, we have used 3 the color red. I guess we will stick with another --THE FOREMAN: Use the pencil. THE WITNESS: Is all this one floor? BY MR. HOWARD: Right. Will you show us where you came? Yes. We came in up a flight of stairs 9 which, I guess, would be these (indicating). 10 And my partner and myself, we came this 11 way (indicating). 1.2 I know there is a little room in here. 13 It's a manager's office, right here. 14 And the other two officers came through 1.5 16 here (indicating). They had the suspect on the first table 17 right here. My partner came around, and here, and then 18 I came around to this side, so there was two of us here 19. on this side. 20 The suspect was here and Rosie Grier was 21 here, and Rafer Johnson was here. 22 And there was another man on top of the 23 table which had him in a headlock, who I don't know who he 24 was, but I remember the headlock. 25 Anyway, from here, this is where we got him 26

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from, and we took him out east, which would be that way.

We took him straight out through these hall
doors which was, now, I guess, the Colonial Room, and from
the Colonial Room ---

Do you want to know which way we got out of the place?

 \mathbb{Q} No. I think that would be sufficient.

A We got out through the Colonial Room, and the Colonial Room faces -- we were walking out this way, and then I made a right turn and I went out through two more doors.

And I remember that -- these doors because there was a red carpet and -- there was a red carpet.

I made a left turn to some -- it's a big lobby; I remember the two pillars on the side, the corner pillar, and there was the other pillar which cause a little passageway.

We made a left turn on that passageway and we were going down, and then to the right there are some stairs, sort of wind down into the lobby.

We went down those stairs into the lobby, and I remember this because -- what is his name? -- Unruh he was with us and he hollered back, and he goes, "Slow down, slow down. This isn't a race," and all.

And I looked back and I seen all these people behind my partner, and these people -- and all I

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can think of is getting the suspect out of there. And here is this Unruh -- "Slow down, slow down, it's not a race." 3 And I just looked and I said, "Come on, Partner, let's go," you know. So we just kept on running down the stairs. and then -- which was -- came into this main entrance where the canopy is, and we walked out through there. My partner and I put the suspect in the car. I went around to the other side of the car. 10 I jumped in. 11 12 My partner run around to the front. 13 jumped in. 14 When we got in the car, the next thing we 15 know, Jesse Unruh is in the car with us. That's how he 16 got in the car. We didn't ask him. He just got in. 17 There was people all the way through from 18 the time we were taking the suspect out, the people hollering, "That's him. That's him. Kill him. Kill him. 20 That's him. He did it." That's him. 21That's why you moved as quick as you did? 22 Yes, sir. 23 Fine. Would you return to the stand? MR. HOWARD: 24 (Whereupon the witness complied.) 25 MR. HOWARD: That s-all we have unless there is a 26 question from the Jury.

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THE FOREMAN: Does anyone have a question he'd like to ask the officer?

There being no further questions, it's my duty to caution you and also warn you not to impart to anyone or discuss with anyone any of the proceedings that went on in this room today.

THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.

THE FOREMAN: Thank you very much for coming, in.

THE WITNESS: It's my pleasure.

(Whereupon the witness was excused and withdrew from the Grand Jury Suite.)

MR. HOWARD: Karl Uecker, please.

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KARL UECKER,

called as a witness before the Grand Jury, was duly sworn as follows:

THE FOREMAN: Would you raise your right hand, please?

(Whereupon the witness complied with the request of the Foreman.)

Do you solemnly swear that the evidence you shall give in this matter now pending before the Grand Jury of the County of Los Angeles shall be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God?

THE WITNESS: Yes, I do. THE FOREMAN: Would you sit down there, please, Mr. Uecker, and for the record, would you give us your 3 name into the microphone so they can all hear it? THE WITNESS: My name is Karl Uecker. THE FOREMAN: How do you spell that last name? THE WITNESS: U-e-c-k-e-r. EXAMINATION BY MR. FUKUTO: 10 Q Mr. Uecker, what is your business or 11 occupation? 12 I am the Assistant Maitre d' in the 1.3 Banquet Department in the Ambassador Hotel. 14 MR. HOWARD: May I interrupt? Will you talk slow? 15 I am having a little difficulty following you, and I 16 think maybe the reporter is. We are getting tired now, 17 it's not you, so will you talk slow for us? 1.8 19 THE WITNESS: I am the Assistant Maitre d'at the Ambassador Hotel in the Banquet Department. 20 21 BY MR. FUKUTO: And were you working there 22 on election night and the following morning? 23 Yes, I was. A And were you present during the time some 24 25 shooting occurred at that location? 26

Yes.

1	Q That was on the second floor by the
2	Embassy Room, is that correct?
. 3	A At the Embassy Room pantry.
4	Q Pantry?
5	A Right.
6	Q You see the diagram which is next to you,
7	Mr. Uecker, and which has been marked Grand Jury Exhibit
8	Number 1. Can you see it from your angle?
9	THE FOREMAN: You may get up and walk over.
10	THE WITNESS: Number 1?
11	Q BY MR. FUKUTO: The whole diagram is the
12	exhibit.
13	A Yes.
14	Q Do you recognize that sketch?
1.5	A Yes, I do.
16	Q Is that a diagram of the pantry of the
17	Embassy Room?
18	A Must have been right here, yes, in through
19	here.
20	Q You are indicating the area where the
21	serving tables are located, is that right?
22	A Yes. It's what we call a pantry.
23	Q Pantry?
24	A Yes.
25	Q And this has been designated as a place where
26	Senator Kennedy made a talk to the public, is that correct?

A. Right, yes. 1 And I am referring to what is labeled 2 "Stage Antercom" and the area where the serving tables 3 are located. You call that area -- it's --A Pantry. Q Pantry. Embassy pantry, yes. Q Now, were you in the area of the pantry 8 when Senator Kennedy came into that location sometime 9 after 12:00 midnight? 10 Yes. I took Mr. Kennedy from the stage 11 into this area by my left hand. 12 Q By your left hand? 13 Holding him on his right hand. 14 You kind of escorted him them? 15 Q Right. Α 16 17 Did you go from the stage through the doors immediately to the north of the stage? 18 19 To the north, right. A And you went through the hallway toward Q 21 the pantry, is that correct? 22 Right. 23 And did you proceed with Senator Kennedy through the swinging double doors? 25 Right. I was leading him through. I went first, and he was right behind me. 26
