PRESS COMMENTS ON ASSASSINATION OF KENNEDY

[Comment in the Malagasy press on the assassination of Senator Kennedy]

[Excerpts] The 7 June 1968 issue of IMONGO VAOVAO, organ of the Party of the Congress for the Independence of Madegascar (AKFM), stated: "What is disturbing for observers of present-day events in the United States of America is this: it is the 'gangsters' who control the entire development of national affairs, and we perceive that they are even in the highest echelons of the government." After referring to the previous assassinations of President Kennedy and Rev Martin Luther King, IMONGO VAOVAO concluded as follows: "In addition to the indignation and the anger of the whole world, the simple conclusion is this: during the time of Mr Johnson the gangsters reign in the United States. This is a great danger which threatens the world, for, in the international relations, it is this 'gangster' method which is practised."

ANTSON' NY NOSY-HITA SY RE, pro-AKFM, said in its 8 June issue:
"Within the space of 3 years, three great men who fought against injustice and who loved equality have succumbed to bullets in the United States, this state which claims to be the most advanced and the most powerful in the world. This is what life is like in the United States, this state which claims to be the most advanced and the most powerful in the world. This is what life is like in the United States; these are everyday facts in the liberal democracies of the West; this is the masterpiece of the 'free world,' which calls itself the protector of the freedom of the world."

The 10 June issue of SAHY, an independent opposition paper, stated: "We think that the fact of turning world opinion toward the affairs of the Middle East simply tends to obscure the truth. The three successive assassinations derive from the political situation in the United States. One can indeed say that is is among the high-ranking figures in the United States that the bandit chiefs are found, but they know how to hide themselves. The assassins are well paid and well protected. But if the police (American) are effective, they should be able to unmask the top assassins."

MARESAKA, also an independent opposition paper, said in its 7 June issue: "For us and for those who reflect it is a single person and not several who--in the United States--paid the assassins of the late John Kennedy and the one who fired the shots at Robert Kennedy. Only imbeciles fail to understand who paid the assassins. He is indeed visible but he knows how to conceal his game. It is a sanguinary being who does not fear to take away people's lives. In the face of this, it is astonishing that some Malagasy people still lend their confidence to the Americans; they treat as hateful those who oppose the Americans."

LA REPUBLIQUE, organ of the Social Democratic Party (PSD), stated on 8 June: "One can well say that this new assassination which has struck the Kennedy family has evoked considerable emotion, not only in the United States but also in the whole world. It at once recalls what happened 5 years ago, when—as now his brother—John Kennedy was killed by a bullet in Dallas. The two brothers were popular and they respected fraternity and equality; they devoted their lives and their energies to make peace and equality reign on earth. But this was not to the liking of the evil ones, of those who repudiate amicable settlement and who prefer to shed blood in order to support their principles. Thus John and Robert Kennedy died. They died as the martyrs of patriotism and of respect for the rights of men."

A Catholic paper, LAKROAN' I MADAGASIKARA, stated on 9 June: "Like his older brother, President John Kennedy, like Rev Martin Luther King--and all in America--now. Senator Robert Kennedy has in turn been struck down by those who hated him. He had won, in fact, in the presidential primary elections in California; he was on the way to becoming president of the republic; he loved the Negroes; he was opposed to the policy of President Johnson on Vietnam. And now he has been assassinated by a young white man 23 years old ... O America, O America, you who kill the prophets who are sent to you!"

GOWON SENDS CONDOLENCES TO JOHNSON, WIDOW

In the message to President Johnson, General Gowon said that he received with shock and deep grief the news of the premature death of the senator in similar circumstances as those of his brother, President John Kennedy. He said that the death is a loss not only to the people of America but to mankind as a whole, which is now deprived of his devoted, conscientious, and courageous services.

General Gowon declared: We join all men of good will everywhere in deploring the circumstances of his death. The government and people of the Federal Republic of Nigeria join in sending you, the Kennedy family, and the people of America our very sincere condolences. Let those responsible search their conscience.

In the message to the widow of the late senator, the commander in chief said that the people of Nigeria appreciate the untold grief into which she in particular and the Kennedy family have been plunged by the death of her husband. The head of state said that by Senator Kennedy's death, mankind has lost the devoted services of a capable and a brilliant youth who provided inspirations for the young. He added: We earnestly pray to God to give you the courage to bear this irreparable loss with fortitude. General Gowon prayed that Almighty God will continue to sustain and endow the Kennedy family with more grace and favor, knowing how close they are to God.

OJUKWU CONVEYS CONDOLENCE TO KENNEDY WIDOW

[Text] Biafra's head of state, Lt Col Odumegwu Ojukwu, has sent a message of condolence to the wife of the late Senator Kennedy. In it Colonel Ojukwu described Senator Kennedy's death as most tragic for the United States and the entire world. Colonel Ojkuku said that the late senator was a champion of the poor and the downtrodden, and a friend of Africa in an era of racial strife and prejudice. He declared: He was a man of strong belief in an increasingly apathetic and self-seeking world.

Colonel Ojukwu likened the people of Biafra to the Kennedys who have been the victims of bitter envy, narrowmindedness, and blind hate, and added: We remain confident, as you might be, of the eventual triumph of truth over falsehood, justice over brute force, and love over chauvinism. Colonel Ojukwu then expressed the hope that the conscience of man will be aroused against those who, lacking consideration for humanity, attempt to eliminate the object of their envy by violence in order to achieve their ambition.

ASSASSINATION IS BLOT ON U.S. CONSCIENCE

[Excerpts] Yesterday, in the human jungle that is the United States, a crazed gunman struck. It was a vicious and horrible blow. This morning the world has been plunged into mourning, mourning the death of Sen Robert Francis Kennedy, as it did his brother about 4 and a half years ago, who was also struck by an assassin's bullet in the prime of youth. Spotlight joins in mourning the death of one who was regarded as the American heir apparent and a soldier of peace, progress, and justice.

Senator Kennedy was identified closely in the public mind with his brother.

He was very active in seeking solutions to human problems. He was very much concerned about America's involvement in the Vietnam war, about the racial violence now rife in the United States, and about the great gap between the developed and developing countries and between the haves and have-nots. He felt very strongly about world tensions and the possibility of a third world war. He was a man of peace, and he believed in his ability to bring hope to those in despair and peace to a wartorn world.

He felt so strongly in fact that he took the risky course of challenging an incumbent president, of his own party, to run for the presidency. In entering this race, his vigorous campaign brought him victory with each contest. He had just announced his victory in the vital election in America's most populous state when he was silenced forever by a crazed gunman.

The assassination of Senator Kennedy, like that of his brother, is a blot on the conscience of the Americans. It is scandalous and inhuman. It is wicked and cowardly, more so if it is remembered that the bullet is the only means of the American whites to silence the voice of racial equality and integration in the country. They used the same method on his brother, a hero of Negro emancipation. They did the same only 2 months ago to Dr Martin Luther King, and now to Bobby. America, which is supposed to be the most progressive country in the world, is in fact the most uncivilized, with the people still living in a jungle where the gun is (?law).

KENNEDY KILLING SAID LINKED WITH BROTHER'S

In these words Frank Mankiewicz, press secretary to the candidate for the office of president of the United States, Robert Kennedy, announced in a toneless voice the death of "Bob Kennedy" to the reporters.

Why this assassination? Decidedly the United States of America is undergoing a bad period of moral and human decay. All and sundry explain this murder on the basis that American society is sick. PRESS LAMENTS TRAGEDY, BLAMES CLIMATE IN U.S.

[Text] It is natural to see the attack on Senator Robert Kennedy as part of a general pattern of violence in the United States and in the world. Yet before one generalizes one should particularize. This is a hateful tragedy for a man whose courage had made him the only white politician who still commanded the confidence of the Negroes and the poor of America. It is also a family tragedy for a family who have already had too many tragedies to suffer. The shooting of Senator Kennedy is one of those stark events which will always be remembered with pain.

Yet the personal tragedy is a reflection of a wider tragedy. For whatever reasons violence is a growing power in the United States. For at least half a century American civilization has been subject to increasing violence, to the violence of gangsters, the casual violence of the southern states, the violence between races and now to the murder of public men. The rest of the world has often seen the United States as the vanguard of industrial society. In almost every other country the same pattern of growing violence can already be detected even though in Britain it has not reached anything like the same level.

It is natural that violence in politics should often be concentrated upon the best men. The motives of the men who shoot are usually abnormal and often obscure. The Arab in this case seems almost astonishingly irrelevant to Senator Kennedy's career. Yet one can see what the reaction is. There is in part the hatred which is the natural reaction of evil to excellence. There is in part, also, an envy which the best statesmen are more likely to provoke. The excitement of a fine political campaign is also in itself a danger. The man with the gun responds to this excitement with the excitement of his own hatred. He shows what can be done by a minority of one.

Yet those men who wish to raise themselves by destroying what others admire are alienated from society and are to be found in large numbers only in a society where alienation is common. In the United States prosperity has become an insult to those who do not share it and the process of specialization which has created such an extraordinary prosperity is by its nature also a process of exclusion. American industry is based on mass skills, but not on universal skills, and violence is the revenge on a society of those who are left out.

The paradox is that it has been the chief aim of the Kennedy family in politics to bring an end to the social alienation in the United States. President Kennedy was the first Roman Catholic to become president of the United States. His victory was to some degree a victory for all the other minority groups. The purpose of the campaign of 1960, in which Senator Kennedy played so large a role, was not only to get America moving but to involve all Americans in the movement. President Johnson's work on civil rights went further than the Kennedy administration had been able to do, but the social impetus of the Democratic Party owes a great deal to both of the Kennedy brothers.

In the case of Senator Kennedy this social concern became even more marked. His is a crusading personality and the crusading quality has cost him many political allies. There is no doubt that the shock of his brother's death caused in Senator Kennedy's mind a new desire to see American society changed.

It is the characteristic of this meaningless violence that it is turned against those men like the Kennedys or Martin Luther King who devote their lives to the task of reconciliation. They are the most likely of all to be attacked or to be killed.

The characteristics of American society which led to the death of one Kennedy and the wounding of another are in part peculiar to the United States. We have no powerful lobby in Britain for the promiscuous sale of firearms and the power of the National Rifle Association is an extraordinary defect of American politics. Yet in the main the growth of violence, like the growth of revolution, is something which reflects real failures of all the advanced industrial societies, irrespective of whether those societies are American or European, or even whether they are capitalist or communist. Our attitude in Britain can therefore only be one of sympathy with the people of the United States in the tragedy which has occurred.

#### Review of Editorials

[Editorial Report--L] The Longon TIMES, in an editorial titled "He Stood for Justice," discusses Kennedy's image, pro and con, what his chances were for the presidency, what sort of president he might have been, and to whom those who were loyal to him will now turn, and then says: "With both Kennedys murdered, some Americans will be tempted to say that their country's institutions are a sham and its destiny a mirage. The rest of the world will be tempted to turn away from America too. Each fresh act of violence spreads fresh doubt about American capacity for leadership." "The habit of assassination destroys the authority of any country."

The DAILY TELEGRAPH editorial, "American on Trial," similarly views the causes Kennedy championed and the success he might have attained, but then notes that the election campaign remains the main issue in the United States today and speculates that "the imposition of the rule of law in the United States will become an attractive theme for Nixon to begin embroidering before many weeks are out. The central issue could become 'strong government.!"

The GUARDIAN, in two editorials titled "Will the World Learn Anything?" and "Will the United States This Time?" notes that the "sickness of American society" and "international violence," as well as the Arab-Israeli war and its anniversary, and even the Vietnam war were factors in the Kennedy assassination. Deploring the absence of any real reform toward curbing violence following the murders of John Kennedy and Martin Luther King, the GUARDIAN's second editorial declares that President Johnson could have brought about "major changes" because there is already enough legislation on the books for him to use and the federal government has "enormous power over the economy through the contracts it awards."

The editorial in the MORNING STAR declares that "Even if the gun was fired by a Jordanian, as is reported, this does not alter the fact American imperialism and the monopolists and militarists who run it have turned the country into a forging house for murder and assassination. The last word in hypocrisy was surely spoken by President Johnson" who spoke against violence, yet who "only a few hours before the killing" was making a speech "believed to herald another stepup in his bombings of Vietnam." President Johnson has done, the editorial says, "as much if not more than anyone in U.S. history to create an environment in which the bullet and the bomb are held up as a proper and manly answer to the progressive ideas of peace, liberation, and racial equality."

So too was the Vietnam war, which had added to the severe strains within the United States.

The GUARDIAN writes: Will the shock lead to any softening of rigid attitudes? In every zone of war or imminent war the way could be opened for nonviolent solutions. Over the Middle East, Vietnam, and Biafra, negotiations are being sought; over each, a deadlock exists; over each, the lines of a settlement can be seen but the willingness to reach it is never sufficiently strong; over each, a change of heart is needed, for the alternative is a relapse into more killings, devastation, and misery.

The telegram to Mrs Kennedy says: "After the hours of anguish and the prayers for his life, we are all deep in mourning at the news of his death."

## Chancellor Kiesinger

### Lower House President

"The German Lower House mourns with you the end of a great hope," SPD Chairman Foreign Minister Brandt said. The tragic death of Kennedy has caused within the SFD and among wide sections of the population grief, dismay, and deep shock. In the view of Brandt the attempt was as senseless as every act of violence. "But its consequences are heavy." The minister expressed to Mrs Kennedy, her children, and the whole family his sincere sympathy.

PRESS FEATURES KENNEDY, VIOLENCE IN U.S.

[Excerpts] DIE WELT writes of a new policy sought by Robert Kennedy in the United States: "It was not just his ambition for the presidency and the interests of his party that motivated him, the brother of the assassinated president was concerned, according to his own words, about 'our right to moral leadership on this planet.' Following the crimes in Dallas, Memphis, and now in Los Angeles, the international public is questioning America's claim to moral leadership. The worldwide excitement and astonishment and the skeptical attitude toward the eruptions from beneath the smooth and glittering surface of U.S. society indicate a changed assessment of the leadership and people of the United States.

"The shots of Los Angeles may be the beginning of a fatal radicalism in the political controversy," STUTTGARTER ZEITUNG fears. The commentator asks: "Does America suffer from an atmosphere of violence? Is the assassination attempt on Senator Kennedy a symptom of brutality which is particularly widespread in the U.S. cities? The Congress has not yet enacted an effective law to control the sale and possession of weapons. These are very depressing facts to sober-minded Americans and those Europeans who realize that America's condition of health affects its international standing."

According to Bonn's GENERALANZEIGER, "the moral fiber of American society has been badly torn. The assassins may have acted on their own initiative and had a variety of motives, but can we still doubt that the violent atmosphere surrounding black and white, poor and rich, conservative and progressive, young and old is the common cause of these political crimes."

BRAUNSCHWEIGER ZEITUNG draws a parallel to the assassination of John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King. The commentator declares: "The doubts about the official version of the crime in Dallas have never ceased. After the murder in Memphis the police are still groping in the darkness. In Los Angeles, however, the assassin is in the hands of the police. Will he live longer than Oswald? Will he speak? Will the world learn what he has to say?"

With the assassination of the second Kennedy, the United States and other nations have once again become apprehensive. Robert Kennedy, candidate for the presidential race, should not have been assassinated. [Text] We Austrians have feared for the life of Senator Robert Kennedy during the past few hours, and now we mourn the grave loss suffered by his family and all the American people. Robert Kennedy, like his brother, symbolized for the youth of the free world the ideals of democracy and progress. We stand in awe at the bier of this great world citizen. As friends of the American people, however, we hope from the bottom of our heart that the image of this largest democracy will not be disfigured by acts of violence. We hope that the grave sacrifices which had to be made by one single family were not in vain; but that they will call to mind those values which we all, irrespective of conflicting political views, have to defend.

The sympathy of millions of grieved Austrians these days resembles a big demonstration of condolence for a big, sorely afflicted family, and for a big, sorely afflicted nation.

# LATIN AMERICA

PRESS AND GOVERNMENT MOURN ROBERT KENNEDY

[Excerpt] Buenos Aires--The passing of Senator Robert Kennedy caused profound sorrow in Argentina. His death was announced over several radio stations in the early morning hours, since they had especially extended their programs through the night, awaiting the fatal outcome. The morning papers were already on the street when Kennedy died and did not carry the report.

Enrique Mores Boderai, presidential press secretary, made the following comment on learning of the event: "Argentines deeply lament the death of Robert Kennedy, who was dearly loved in this country. The horrible crime is a shame for all the civilized world."

## . CLARIN Opinion

[Buenos Aires ANSA in Spanish at 1305 GMT on 6 June quotes CLARIN: "Like John F. Kennedy and Luther King, Robert Kennedy is now the victim of that somber anonymous conspiracy which government spokesmen have hastened to declare non-existent in order to make the attempt appear as an unconnected incident, that is, an isolated incident, by classifying it as an personal and uncontrollable act of a new type of madman: the political madman."

[CLARIN, according to ANSA, holds that the attempt, as well as the assassinations of President Kennedy and Luther King, are linked to "strange, hidden, cloaked forces' lurking behind the shadows; opposing all initiatives, destroying the best intentions, and blocking objectives and efforts to attain development."]

PAPERS CONDEMN U.S. VIOLENCE, KENNEDY DEATH

[Summary] Santiago--The news of Senator Kennedy's assassination has captured the nation's attention. The daily EL MERCURIO points out that the world "condemns what happened in Los Angeles just as it helplessly lamented the incidents of Dallas and Memphis." It adds that the right to kill must be ended, even though the laws are liberal during the present campaign for human rights.

The communist daily EL SIGMO says that "the criminal attempt against the principal candidate for the U.S. presidency and the foremost critic of the Johnson policy confirms the fact that murder is one of the basic political weapons in the United States." The paper also says: "To pretend to explain one attempt after another as the work of mentally disturbed individuals is absolutely unacceptable to conscientious humanity. In this context, murder becomes an established tactic in a social regime that allows it, particularly agadnst its leaders."

In an editorial, the tabloid LA TERCERA says that it is strange that the nation that claims the greatest progress in the world and show people give others lessons in sincerity and moral clearliness should repeatedly be the scene of the most horrible crimes.

The daily CLARIN summarizes its opinion by pointing out that "terror and blood rule over U.S. politics," where there is "a dangerous accumulation of hatreds that ' are contradictory to progress."

PRESIDENT, LEADERS REACT TO KENNEDY DEATH

[Excerpts] La Paz--"It is horrible, it is horrible," exclaimed Bolivian President Barrientos to the newsmen who came to his office minutes after Senator Kennedy's death was announced. Noticeably shaken, he added: The leaders of the world must not die. Every shot fired at the leaders of U.S. democracy makes that great nation die a little. He added that the great powers must not be known as great for their exploitation of the small countries, but for their service to humanity. The people should not seek justice through violence. Bolivia received the news with anguish and we hope that calm will prevail over violence. Referring to the fact that Kennedy had won the California State primary elections, Barrientos said that the democratic will of the people must not be [word indistinct] with bullets.

Bolivian political leaders were unanimoussin stating that the event detracts from the prestige of the U.S. democracy and that the assassins of John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King are the same ones who wielded the revolver to eliminate Robert [Kennedy]. They added that by picking up his brother's banner, Robert Kennedy wanted to fight for the underdeveloped nations, and that this attitude was opposed with violence by the underworld of U.S. capitalism.

SPECIAL EDITIONS PUBLISHED; KENNEDY MOURNED

[Summary] Rio de Janeiro--Three special [newspaper] editions were published announcing the tragic death of Robert Kennedy, who was the victim of an attempt described here as "irrational and stupid" by a grieved people. The residents of exclusive homes as well as shantytowns in this city were gripped with strong emotions and many broke out in tears. Here Kennedy was considered a world champion of integration.

Recife Archbishop Helder Camara, relentless struggler in behalf of nonviolence and social progress, declared that the assassination was another indication of the violence unleashed against progressive leaders in our modern world.

President Costa e Silva cabled President Johnson and expressed sympathy for Kennedy. Former President Juscelino Kubitschek expressed deep regret over the death of a man who, despite his youth, understood the errors and plight of Latin America as no one else did.

A columnist of the progressive daily ULTIMA HORA charged "that the murder was the work of unknown leaders of an extreme reactionary 'Mafia' opposed to the ideas of a man who particularly wished to prove that Latin America's development and progress are the best bastion of security for the United States."

In an editorial, JORNAL DO BRAZIL stated that "Senator Kennedy exercised the democratic right of running as a presidential candidate in his country, a right which he was winning by totally legal methods [words indistinct]."

The opposition daily CORREIO DA MANHA's lengthy editorial stated that "the attempt against Kennedy was a blow to prevent the victory of the liberals over a terrorist minority." It added that "this crime was an attempt against the future of the United States, against U.S. relations on democratic terms with Latin America, against the prestige of a powerful nation, against peace in Vietnam, and against understanding between races." O JORNAL asserted "that Latin America, particularly Brazil, cannot help but feel the threat looming over the continent in view of the extent of unbridled sayage violence in the wealthiest and most cultured nation of the continent. TRIBUNA DA IMPRENSA holds responsible the political and economic groups that would have been harmed by the young leader's election. ULTIMA HORA carried three editorials stating that the assassination was an attempt against Latin America.

KENNEDY ATTACK STUNS PUBLIC: FREI COMMENTS

[Excerpt] Santiago -- The news of the attack on U.S. Senator Kennedy spread rapidly this morning, leading people to gather before newspaper bulletin boards, prompting special newspaper editions, and making people stay close to their radios for news. The general public unanimously condemned the attack and the sorrow over the violence was evidenced by the question people asked each other: "What do you think of that?" which brought the answer: "This no longer has a name." The newspaper LA TARDE issued a special edition at 1000, followed by the newspaper LA SEGUNDA. Both were sold out in less than an hour.

"More than as President of Chile, I speak as a human being in pain and sorrow over the terrible tragedy of a human being," declared President Eduardo Frei to newsmen, referring to the attack on Senator Robert Kennedy. Frei talked to the newsmen who usually cover the government palace beat.

[Newsman's question]: The news of the attack on the life of Kennedy is shaking the world. We have come to hear your opinion of this bitter event. President Frei answered: "I believe that all men throughout the world, irrespective of their political or ideological position, have been, as you stated, shaken by the news. I am speaking now more than as president of Chile. I am speaking as a human being in the midst of pain and tragedy and this terrible tragedy of a human being. This morning I sent a cable to Mrs Kennedy expressing our concern, affection, and hope that she can successfully cope with this difficult moment for her husband and children. I truly believe that we were all upset by the news and can describe it as horrible without exaggeration. That is what I have to say."

Mr President, at what time did you hear the news? "Early this morning I received a telephone call at home." Mr President, what is your opinion on this climate of violence in the world, from which even our country is not always excluded? "I really do not want to give an opinion on this terrible event because I want to keep my sentiments regarding Kennedy's case on the level of personal affection and respect for his family, his person, and the American people. On another occasion I will be pleased to discuss this matter with you. I believe that it is a new worldwide phenomenon and also believe that our country has to face it calmly. In Chile, we will once more show what we are.

"On the world scale there are many rankings [uses English] of economic, social, and scientific development, but there should also be rankings of human development, and I believe that our country could give a great example of human development at this time because I believe that violence in Chile is minor and very localized. Most of our nation has faith in the political parties—the Nationals, Radicals, Socialists, Communists, Independents, not to mention Christian Democrats. The important thing is that we solve this matter in a humane and not in an inhumane manner."

ZEA HERNANDEZ DEPLORES! ATTACK ON KENNEDY

Bogota Radio Cadena Nacional in Spanish 2330 GMT 5 Jun 68 P

[Text] Foreign Minister German Zea Hernandez issued the following statement today regarding the attempt on Senator Robert Kennedy's life: "The Colombian Government deeply deplores the attack on Senator Robert Kennedy in the midst of his campaign for nomination as a candidate for the U.S. presidency. "This new act of violence has increased the consternation of humanity by a critical world situation at a time when a stable peace appears as the only means to insure the spiritual and material progress of nations.

"The government hopes fervently that Senator Kennedy recovers completely and that this terrible deed does not cause greater unrest in the United States and threaten the development of normal elections. The government condemns and repudiates the recurrence of political crimes, which can and have had serious repercussions upon the rest of the world."

[Bogota Radio Cadena Nacional in Spanish at 1800 GMT on 5 June reported that what they called the "criminal attempt" to kill Senator Kennedy had caused "great concern" in Colombia. The station said political groups, diplomats and students were concerned about the attempts against the lives of American political leaders, "especially in a country where democracy has proved to be a special characteristic." The announcer said Guillermo Angulo Gomez, president of the Colombian Senate, expressed "amazement over the continuance of violent acts against political leaders in the United States." Jacobo Perez Escobar, Secretary General of the Government Ministry, said, "The attempt is even more regrettable as it occurs in a country that has been a democratic example," the radio station reported. Radio Cadena Nacional also announced that Hernan Jaramillo Ocampo, president of the Conservative Unionist National Directorate, said, "It gives one the impression that a state of social decomposition exists that is corroding the paths of coexistence in the United States. It is possible that acts such as this one will cause the United States to lose its democratic ways."]

# KENNEDY MURDER BLAMED ON SPIRITUAL WEAKNESS

[Excerpts] The crime has been consumated. As in the previous cases of John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King, the world has been shaken with anguish and pain, and there has been unanimous solidarity with a family--pursued by implacable fate--that has once again paid the price of greatness.

It is true that the United States is experiencing one of the most critical periods in its history, but violence is not the exclusive product of that nation, which is populated, generally, by generous people who pay homage every day to the noblest spiritual values. Violence is a universal phenomenon that is manifested, as a bad sign of the times, everywhere. Its origin must be sought in the abandonment of the Gospel, particularly in the lack of charity, which is not merely the more or less scornful distribution of alms.

PAPER SEES ORGANIZED PLOT IN KENNEDY MURDER

[Excerpts] Everything came to an end early yesterday morning, as was painfully predictable. The magnificent youth, Robert F. Kennedy, succumbed, in the end, defeated in his battle with death. The young captain, in the full flower of all his intellectual and moral virtues, died when life was most beautiful and promising to him. Ensnaring hatred put an end to his generous life, another victim of its wanton fury. Senator Eugene McCarthy had good reason for making this terrible, but correct, statement: "We are all guilty. It is the act of one man, possibly not in full possession of his faculties, but the nation shares the blame. It is the reflection of the violence that is flooding the world."

And that is the case. As we saw it yesterday, the brave paladin of the civil rights of the neglected classes has fallen before the machinations of that sinister conspiracy which is threateningly hovering over all societies and which, principally, has made the United States the favorite target of its insanity. What we are confronted with is a conspiracy, for the violence which prevails in the world has the characteristics of something planned, a sinister and savage plan with obvious aims. The events that have assaulted the dignity of mankind are not isolated. They are all the product of a devilish plan designed to disrupt world coexistence and sow resentment and vengeance, in order to disturb the social order of the nations.

We do not pretend to indicate its origins, nor to locate its wicked roots. We are simply listing the evidence of the events for the consideration of those who may have the frightening responsibility of investigating them and the urgent duty to stop the demoralizing, ignominious, and infamous process. Who are the organizers of this flaming conspiracy? What are the objectives of the perpetrators of the organized crime?

Let those who must confront the conspiracy think about this. It would be unwise to shrug their shoulders and accept the most likely story. No, the peace and the dignity of mankind require a firmer reaction to the cowardly advance of those who do not have the courage to reveal their objectives and proclaim, as did those anarchists to whom we have alluded, the stupid boast of their atrocious sins.

RADIO PROTESTS ATTACK ON SENATOR KENNEDY

PRESIDENT DECREES DAY OF MOURNING FOR KENNEDY

PRD YOUTHS ARRESTED LEAVING KENNEDY MASS

The Dominican Revolutionary Youth stated that actions such as the denounced arrests are what place the people on alert against abuses. They demanded the release of the four arrested youths. They also charged that student Hilario (Inoa) was arrested at the Republica de Haiti School as his classmates were being invited to attend the mass offered in memory of Senator Kennedy.

NEWSPAPER CALLS KENNEDY ATTACK 'MONSTROUS'

[Summary] Quito--What is happening in the United States? This is the question that, like all Ecuadoreans, the daily EL COMERCIO asks in today's editorial. "The richest nation on earth sees itself submitted to tragic convulsions which seem difficult to explain," it adds, pointing out that the crime which so brutally removed President John F. Kennedy from the North American scene was undoubtedly of the same nature as the shot fired at his brother so recently.

"We should ask ourselves," it continues, "if that nation's social crisis is similar to those that followed the 19th Century's Civil War and the assassination of Lincoln, the great reformer and symbol of the universal democratic spirit." It then goes on to say that "the Kennedys stand for a policy of change and social justice. Robert identified himself with the poor and the youth of his country. He expressed a new attitude in his ideological viewpoint and in his outlook on life. The great oligarchic interests condemned him as a demagog, and heard his statements without considering the basic problems that inspired and guided the reformer's ideas."

However, EL COMERCIO maintains that it would not be sensible to offer an opinion on this new monstrous act, although it calls for renewal of the investigation of his brother's assassination. "To what extent did the extreme rightist groups, alarmed over reforms, participate in this?" it asks. "In some sinister place," it replies, is the origin of these crimes that threaten the stability of U.S. institutions, and, as a side effect, reflect on the nature of its institutions and world relations."

The news of Robert F. Kennedy's death fell like a heavy weight on Ecuadoreans, who had stuck doggedly to the more optimistic reports that said the famed politician might be saved. Eager, though deeply solemn, people continue to stand by their radio and television receivers which are continuously broadcasting news of the tragedy.

### KENNEDY ATTACK PROMPTS BITTER COMMENTARIES

[Summary] Mexico City--[two lines indistinct] Mexican President Diaz Ordaz added that "all Americans, wherever they may be, are praying for the prompt and full recovery of Senator Kennedy." Foreign Minister Antonio Carrillo Flores said that the attack on Senator Kennedy "is an absurd act of violence that is deplorable from any point of view." He added, "I fervently hope for the Senator's recovery. I sent a message of condolence in mine and my wife's name."

The Institutional Revolutionary Party (PRI) declared that the act "constitutes another blot on the development of democracy and the attainment of world peace. The PRI publicly condemns that criminal attack." The National Action Party (PAN) considered the attack another example of how freedom degenerates into license and violence when persons or people lack moral support. The Popular Socialist Party (PPS) commented that the attack shows "that there exists in the United States a secret murder organization which began operating with the assassination of the unforgettable President John F Kennedy. The existence of that secret organization was confirmed with the later assassination of several Negro leaders, especially Martin Luther King. We deplore the fact that assassination and violence are used to eliminate those who hold different ideas." The Leftist Independent Peasant Central (CCI) said that the attack was the result of the decomposition of the U.S. political system and added that it considers the attack the graver because efforts are being made to solve the world crisis over events in Vietnam.

Beyond the world of politics and the authorities, the Mexican people bitterly commented on the events that took place at the Hotel Ambassador in Los Angeles. Poet and editor Thelma Nava said: "It is terrible, incredible in its savagery, what has happened to Senator Robert Kennedy. One cannot imagine how such an act can occur in the country that is believed to be the most civilized and advanced in the world. One asks oneself where the United States is going to end if it continues violently eliminating its best men, such as John F Kennedy, Martin Luther King, and now Robert Kennedy. This appears to bear out what many sociologists have said about the United States being a country that went from barbarity to decadence without going through culture. Imperialism is in crisis, and this is apparently the final one."

YOUTH SAID TO BE LINKED WITH KENNEDY MURDER

I also feel that the assassination of Senator Kennedy is an attempt against representative democracy, which should lead us to defind with greater conviction and strength the democratic institutions and peace that are the most efficient means for the development of progress and better welfare for all our countries."

PRESIDENT, CHAMBER COMMENT ON KENNEDY DEATH

[Excerpt] Lima--President Belaunde sent a message of solidarity and condolences to Senator Robert Kennedy's wife, joining in the expressions of sorrow and condemnation for the attack that extinguished the life of the young U.S. presidential candidate. "Deeply moved by the unspeakable action against a great citizen and dear friend, Senator Robert Kennedy, I express to you and your children my solidarity at this hour," the message said.

For its part, the Chamber of Deputies strongly condemned the shooting by means of various motions which expressed general repudiation for the course of insane violence evidenced in the political life of that country. Spokesmen for the various groups coincided in stating that there is something strange happening in that country, as they recalled the recent killing of Negro leader Martin Luther King and the assassination of President John Kennedy 4 years ago.

Senator Luis Alberto Sanchez, former president of the Chamber and current chairman of the Senate's Diplomatic Committee, expressed his disagreement with the U.S. Attorney General, who said the attempt was an isolated pase: "To me it does not appear to be a casual incident. It is by no means an isolated case. At least it is part of a plan," he emphasized.

PEOPLE EXPRESS DISBELIEF OVER KENNEDY ATTACK

[Summary] Montevideo--The attack against Senator Robert Kennedy has caused stupor and indignation in Uruguay. Newspapers and radios are being swamped with calls from persons seeking further information on his condition. EXTRA devoted its first three pages to reports on the attack. Its editorial, entitled, "Crime Opens Another Abyss in the United States," concludes that "the effects of the abyss opened by this stupid and criminal attack are as difficult to predict as those caused by the death of Martin Luther King, and in the long run may be greater."

The progovernment newspaper ACCION also speaks of the attack against Senator Robert Kennedy in its editorial, "Stupor, Horror, and Sadness Felt in the World Over the Attack." The editorial says: "Still feeling the horror of the loss of Martin Luther King--a good man of peace--and with painful reminders of the loss of President Kennedy, the United States is again the scene of a crime that has deeply shaken the world. Murderous bullets guided by hatred, evil passions, intolerance, and disdain for the lives of others are cruel and cynical recurrences in the complex developments of North America."

The editorial concludes: "The people of the United States, who have created their nation's greatness--profoundly moral, enterprising, optimistic, and vital--are today suffering unconsolably over this unwanted and stupid attack. Our people, whom we have seen today questioning, reacting with stupor and disbelief, and avidly following the condition of Robert Kennedy, are without a doubt, with the people of the United States in their pain."

Although there has been no official reaction yet, political and government circles are unanimous in their statements of sorrow and amazement at today's attack in California.

BARRIOS SAYS KENNEDY ATTACK REFLECTS ON U.S.

# LEONI PRAYS FOR KENNEDY'S ETERNAL REST

[Excerpts] Caracas--"The attempt has caused indignation and alarm throughout the whole world." These were Venezuelan President Raul Leoni's first words upon learning of the bloody incident in Los Angeles that ended the life of Robert Kennedy, who was warmly remembered by Caracas residents who personally met him during his tour through Latin America 2 years ago. The President added: It is hard to express an opinion on the real nature of the attempt against that outstanding fighter and Democratic Senator, Robert Kennedy, before learning the details. But the deed in itself is unheard of, shocks the entire world, and arouses feelings of indignation and repudiation."

Following these brief statements, Leoni prayed for the eternal rest of the slain senator and that this grave incident will not unleash internal commotions contrary to the interests of continental democracy.

For his part, Alfredo Lafee, president of the influential Association of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FEDECAMARAS), felt that such an act was not appropriate to a country that should be an example of patriotism, and added that there was deep concern in national economic circles because of the wave of violence unleashed (words indistinct].

Meanwhile, in a brief statement, Congress President Armando Vegas told newsmen that every democrat hopes that tragedies such as the one that befell Robert Kennedy in Los Angeles will not be repeated in the free world. He added: "It seems incredible that such things as these should happen in the United States, a country of deep-rooted and traditional democracy. This is an indication of decay, inasmuch as it is not an isolated incident, but an example of what has occurred there frequently."

Luis Beltran Prieto Figueroa, presidential candidate of the People's Electoral Movement (MEP), declared: "It is the sad result of the aggressiveness and hate provoked by the U.S. policy." He added, "It is shocking to see how incidents such as President Kennedy's, Martin Luther King's, and now Senator Robert Kennedy's assassination can occur in a civilized nation."

Rafael Caldera, presidential candidate of the Social Christian Party (COPEI), stated: "It is truly a savage act which has caused amazement and indignation." Visibly moved, he added: "Undoubtedly, a powerful Mafia is operating in the United States, and has shown that it possesses infinite resources to do away with valuable elements that oppose its aspirations." He concluded by stating that the assassins of President Kennedy and Martin Luther King, and the bullet that killed Robert Kennedy are links in a dangerous chain that does not stop before anything and could even cause new, incalculable damage.

PAPER EXPRESSES GRIEF ON DEATH OF KENNEDY

[Text] Rangoon--Commenting on the assassination of Senator Robert Kennedy, the official paper, WORKING PEOPLE'S DAILY, said editorially today that not only the United States but the whole world was appalled by the killing at a time when the senator was emerging as a strong contender for the U.S. presidency. The paper said that Senator Kennedy's assassination has called to mind the death under similar circumstances of his brother, President Kennedy, and that of Dr Martin Luther King, Negro civil rights leader.

The paper said that these recent events are viewed by the world as a definite trend toward violence and lack of reasoning. For each assassination and each act of violence is not an isolated case, but part of an atmosphere of hatred, cruelty, and moral weakness, it added. Each act signifies that many men still believe in the right of might and that the cult of the gun is far from dead, the paper went on. A spirit of lawlessness and nihilism seems rife throughout the world, the official daily asserted.

It said for this tragic condition, governments are no less responsible than individuals. Only understanding, tolerance, and a firm belief in nonviolence can lead the world on to a saner path and a happier [word indistinct]. What the world needs is a revival of old fashioned virtues of understanding, tolerance, and patience, the paper stressed. However, it is doubtful if individuals will ever have due respect for such virtues, so long as governments openly pursue policies of violence, the paper concluded.

KENNEDY SHOOTING POINTS TO TREND IN VIOLENCE

[Text] The attempt on the life of Senator Kennedy only a few months after the odious assassination of Dr Martin Luther King clearly indicates that violence is increasing in the United States. Violence also exists in other places in the world. It appears ever more clearly to be a contagious phenomenon which tends to develop even further. People note that violence exists almost everywhere—whether it is a murder plot with political motives, as in the United States, a civil war in a country or outside it, or subversion in some region. Sociologists wonder about the cause of this violence. The cause of this violence is not psychological or social, but purely political, for it appears that all violence, especially if there is subversion and terrorism, is used to promote politics. Thus, international law receives less and less respect. One wonders where this contagion of violence will spread and what remedy must be used to prevent its continuous expansion.

Under such troubled circumstances, our country deserves all the more the name of oasis of peace, for violence has no right to exist on our territory despite the criminal attempts of a few traitors who have tried to resort to it. As devout Buddhists, the Khmer people unanimously condemn the methods of violence which some people want to introduce into our country on order from their foreign masters. Their odious attempts have been in vain because we abhor doctrines which advocate violence and because we already have a better doctrine—the socialist Buddhist doctrine, which advocates peace, tolerance, solidarity, and unity. Acts of violence cannot be established here, as has been demonstrated by the defeats inflicted upon those engaging in subversive activities. The events in many areas outside our country infuse in us a deep hatred for acts of violence under all forms, because Cambodia under the Sangkum has long chosen a just path which is contrary to violence: the path of peace, a road much sought after by others on the international stage.

Other countries are not like the United States, which has lost its reputation by allowing the existence of violence in its political life. Nobody admires the law of the jungle and violence. For their part, the Khmer people will never agree to bow to this law of the jungle, since they have courageously and daily resisted acts of aggression from outside as well as subversion emanating from foreign inspiration.

KENNEDY DEATH INCREASES UNCERTAINTY IN U.S.

[Text] It is with consternation, anxiety, and deep indignation that the world hears of the death yesterday of Senator Robert Kennedy. His assassination in Los Angeles has occupied so much space in the world press that the political consequences will be considerable. In fact, the electoral situation in the United States is modified in a great measure following this indescribable political assassination, and people wonder, not without anxiety, who will ultimately benefit from the tragic disappearance of the lamented senator.

The electoral uncertainty will increase because following the victory he had just won in the California primary election--one of the most important states for presidential elections--Senator Robert Kennedy could have hoped to obtain his party's nomination, and it was very likely that he (?would be chosen as) the Democratic candidate. Thus, the United States could have hoped to see, at the end of the year, a president who would have given a new orientation to U.S. policy by taking inspiration from the (?generous) views of President Kennedy, who also was killed under disconcerting and tragic circumstances.

But the United States will no longer have such a president, because the candidate who was the most appreciated and most apt to lead his country onto a more humane and peaceful path was killed. People see once again that violence has triumphed in a country which has so far (?followed) its democratic traditions but which has allowed these traditions to be bypassed by shameful political (?murders). Therefore, it is quite easy to understand the anxiety voiced in reaction abroad and even in the United States.

Doubtlessly, a number of Americans today wonder whether (?they will) become the most frightening people on this planet, as was stated the day before yesterday by an adviser and friend of the lamented President John Kennedy. This belated question recalls the (?need) to modify the baneful tendencies which are developing in U.S. political life. It is doubtful whether this will occur, because there seems to exist today in the United States a secret, but deliberate will to set aside, through unscrupulous recourse to violence, those young people who want to rejuvenate U.S. policy.

With regard to one of the great powers in the world, this remark cannot but justify the fears voiced following the revolting assassination of Senator Kennedy.

The cause of peace--not only in Vietnam but also everywhere else--cannot but suffer from this tragic event because where violence triumphs under any form whatever, peace will become remote--civil order within each state and peace among nations. However, one may hope that the outburst of violence which is shaking the world today and the case of the assassination of Senator Kennedy, which constitute a new and particularly dramatic era, will ultimately come to an end. However, henceforth the grave perils resulting from the continuous recourse to violence will persist and call for the greatest vigilance from countries which, like ours, condemn violence under all forms and whatever its source.

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KENNEDY DEATH LINKED TO HONG KONG COMMUNISTS

The STAR previously reported that Huang Hua is actually in charge of communist underground work in the United States. Huang allegedly has also established contact with the black power movement in the United States.

PRESS COMMENTS ON KENNEDY ASSASSINATION

[Text] The entire press has come out with editorials on the assassination of Senator Robert Kennedy. We give below extracts from a few.

The STATESMAN, Delhi and Calcutta, says: Now the second Kennedy brother has died at the hands of an assassin in circumstances of grave import to the country both sought to serve. Though Robert Kennedy was merely an aspirant to the U.S. Presidency, his murder comes as an almost greater, because cumulative, shock than that of his elder brother who died in office. The paper adds: Sympathy with Kennedy and his family, stricken by a succession of tragedies, has been prompt and universal, indeed, no more than due a man whose last coherent words were an attempt to find out whether other people were safe. It endorses President Johnson's view that even rigorous measures to prevent further assassinations may not be enough so long as the climate of violence exists.

The STATESMEN points out: Rightly or wrongly, Robert Kennedy seemed of all the Democratic andidates the favorite of the Negro citizens. The Negroes' already embittered condition is not likely to be eased by its champion's violent removal. The courage and the vigor with which he stood against racism and intolerance made him a symbol of hope to a people torn by doubt about the senseless war abroad and mounting tensions at home. There was an undeniable quality about him, as with his brother, which is all too rare in politics. It may prove very difficult to replace.

The INDIAN EXPRESS, Delhi, Bombay, and Madras, says: It was perhaps too much to hope that the surgeon's knife would save Robert Kennedy's life. Both the manner of his going and its timing are truly tragic. Yet another Kennedy and yet another American liberal has been snatched from the political scene in the prime of life. John Kennedy was at least spared until he had been able to impress his stand of greatness on his country's history. In a sense Robert Kennedy's death has been crueler. He has fallen to an assassin's bullets just when he was approaching the center of the stage to play a crucial role in American politics. The paper also points out that Robert Kennedy wanted to take America forward to liberalism and adds: He might yet achieve his goal posthumously.

The PATRIOT of Delhi, quoting Bernard Shaw, says that only the greatest and the noblest of men are assassinated. It says that the youth of America, a great part of the poorer sections of its population, and the Negroes had begun to see Robert Kennedy as different from the usual American politician—a man who was not committed entirely to the dark influences that govern American politics today. He humourously remarked a few days before he was shot that both big business and big trade unions disliked him. This summed up his position.

## COMMENTARY ON KILLING OF ROBERT KENNEDY

[Text] Dear listeners: In November, the United States will observe the fifth anniversary of the death of President John Fitzgerald Kennedy, who was shot and killed on 23 November 1963. In the same month, 6 months from now, the late John Kennedy's younger brother, Robert Kennedy, could have won this year's presidential election to occupy the White House his brother once occupied.

However, last Wednesday Robert Kennedy met the same fate as his brother while campaigning in the Los Angeles Democratic Party primary, and died Thursday from a bullet wound in the head.

In connection with the incident, President Lyndon Johnson said that this wasteful act created a national tragedy. President Johnson condemned the killing of the senator and said that the shooting indicated that force would fell America's best sons. He called on his people to forsake the use of force which had also killed President John Kennedy and Dr Martin Luther King only a few months ago.

As of today, the motive of the assassin, a Jordanian Arab by the name of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, is still not clear.

We are also still uncertain whether the mysterious killing will remain an insoluble mystery similar to the assassination of President John Kennedy, which was believed committed by Lee Harvey Oswald, or the killing of Dr Martin Luther King, whose killer has yet to be arrested.

Whatever the reason for the assassinations, we believe that in a democratic country like the United States there is an urgent need for the strongest protection of its citizens.

We know that there have been frequent killings and the use of explosives to blow up people's homes. Force has also been frequently used in civil rights demonstrations which ultimately caused losses to both the government and society.

We greatly appreciate the freedom of thought and the freedom of speech which have been practiced in a democratic country like the United States, where every citizen has the opportunity to express his views. On the other hand, we see the need for increasing the protection of citizens, so that they always will be able to pursue their democratic aspirations.

We know that democratic life in the United States has been mature for quite some time. However, it seems that the social conditions have not always been able to provide the opportunity for the fullest exercise of man's democratic and basic rights. Is this a remnant of the old way of life which was practiced by the pioneers who crisscrossed the country in search of natural wealth and a living place? Or is it, as is said by some people, that American society is sick, sick because of its materialistic way of life and the lack of spirituality? Or is it because, as has been said by Europeans who are proud that their country has been a source of world culture, that although the United States has made tremendous technological progress it is still dependent on Europe for its culture.

The assassinations which have taken place in the United States in the past few are have caused deep disappointment among the people of the world. This development can no longer be said to affect merely the country's life; it also affects the country's good name and it may even affect the world's respect for the American way of life.

REACTIONS TO DEATH OF SEN ROBERT KENNEDY

According to the Sohyo delegation (delegation head Seiichi Suzuki and four others) which is visiting Hanoi, when the delegation talked with Hoang Quoc Viet, chairman of the Vietnamese Federation of Trade Unions, on 6 June, the latter said: "The assassination of Kennedy indicates the internal confusion of the U.S. ruling groups. These groups have finally reached the stage of murdering each other. Because of such confusion in the United States, U.S. imperialism is likely to become more violent in the process of carrying out the Vietnam war."

Vietnamese information media on 6 June, such as NHAN DAN, QUAN DOI NHAN DAN, and radio broadcasts, merely reported that Senator Kennedy was assassinated.
