CRISPIN CURIEL GONZALEZ, ALSO KNOWN AS CRISPIN CURIEL

On June 18, 1968, Robert Winandy, Los Angeles County Probation Department, Metropolitan Area Office, 439 South Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles, California, advised that Crispin Curiel Gonzalez, a juvenile, has been under the supervision of his office since October 1967. Gonzalez first came to the attention of the probation authorities following his arrest by the Los Angeles Police Department on October 24, 1967, according to Winandy. At that time, Gonzalez was arrested in the vicinity of Zonal and Mission Road in Los Angeles and charged with violation of Section 601 of the Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC). At that time he was found wandering without a settled place of abode; no visible means of existence or proper guardianship within the confines of the jurisdiction of the Los Angeles Police Department.

Upon questioning by investigators, he first told them he was from Bolivia, South America, having departed from there about three weeks prior to the date of his arrest. He later stated he was from Colima, Mexico. He explained his parents had come to Los Angeles, leaving him at home; and he had stolen 800 pesos from them to come to Los Angeles. He was declared a ward of the Juvenile Court and was subsequently furnished residence at Boys Oasis, 40892 Harper Lake, Hinkley, California, on January 18, 1968. According to Mr. Winandy, Boys Oasis is a privately operated residence authorized by the Juvenile Court to accept juveniles for residence and Los Angeles County pays for their expenses. Gonzalez ran away from Boys Oasis on January 22, 1968, and was picked up on that date by the San Bernardino, California, Police Department as a run-away juvenile. He was returned to the custody of the Los Angeles County Probation Department and remained in Juvenile Hall until March 22, 1968, when he was then furnished residence at the Manhattan Project Residence (MPR), 602 South Van Ness Avenue, in Los Angeles, California.

MPR, according to Mr. Winandy, is a residence approved by the Probation Department operated by the Salvation Army under the supervision of Mr. Edward Boyle of the Family Service Section of the Salvation Army. On March 29, 1968, Gonzalez ran away from the MPR and on April 1, 1968, voluntarily surrendered himself to the custody of juvenile authorities. He was subsequently returned to MPR for residence and on May 21, 1968, again ran away, and his whereabouts, until June 17, 1968, were unknown to juvenile authorities. A warrant has been issued for his arrest, charging him with being a run-away juvenile.

On June 17, 1968, Mr. Winandy received a collect call from Gonzalez from El Paso, Texas. Gonzalez desired to know what would happen to him if he were to return to Los Angeles. Mr. Winandy explained to him that a warrant was outstanding for his arrest and if he returned to Los Angeles, herwould probably be referred to the California Youth Authority (CYA). During that telephone conversation, Gonzalez advised Winandy he was involved in international - narcotics smuggling between El Paso, Texas, and Mexico. He furnished as a Los Angeles "connection" a restaurant called the Mexico Lindo, 2829 Washington Street, Venice, California. Winandy referred the foregoing information to Sergeant Ralph Zappey of the Los Angeles Police Department Narcotics Detail. In that telephone conversation, Gonzalez told Winandy he would arrive in Los Angeles within six hours. Winandy has received no further information from or about Gonzalez since the telephone call.

During the period of time Gonzalez was a resident at MPR, he attempted, on two occasions in May 1968, to commit suicide by cutting his wrists. On one of those occasions, he was admitted to the Los Angeles County General Hospital on or about May 8, 1968, for medical treatment. The second suicide attempt occurred sometime between May 14 and 22, 1968. On that occasion, he leaped onto the roof of a nearby building, threatening suicide and considerably upsetting other members of the MPR residence.

According to Mr. Winandy, observation of this individual while under the supervision of the Juvenile Court indicates that although he is 16 years of age, he acts like a 13 year old; is considerably immature for his chronological age and will do anything to get attention. He was not considered reliable and frequently engaged in conduct and/or activities which could be characterized as fantacy.

According to Mr. Winandy, Gonzalez has a father, Crispin Curiel Zamora, who resides at 353 General Nunes, Colima, Mexico, and who has corresponded with the Probation Department. Also, during the period of time Gonzalez was a ward of the juvenile authorities, it was determined that he was born November 10, 1951, in Ephrata, Washington.

On February 11, 1967, Mr. Guadalupe Urban Camacho, a farmer, residing at 195 West Grant Street, Healdsburg, California, advised he and his family are friends of Mr. Crispin Curiel and his wife, Cruz Conzalez Curiel, farmers, who reside at General Nunez Number 353, Colima Col., Mexico. Mr. and Mrs. Curiel have a 15 year old son who goes by the name of Crispin Curiel Gonzalez. Gonzalez accompanied his mother to Los Angeles, California, on about January 25, 1967, and there the mother found she had cancer and she was hospitalized. Gonzalez then took an airplane to San Francisco and stayed over night at the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) and was picked up by juvenile authorities because he was a minor without any identification or means of support. Gonzalez spent several days in Juvenile Hall and then was able to get in contact with the Camacho family, and he was invited to come to their home in Healdsburg. He was permitted to do this by juvenile authorities, and he stayed with the Camachos for several days. Mr. Camacho then received a telephone call from Mr. Curiel in Mexico who advised his son had run away from home, which he had done previously, that the son is emotionally disturbed, and he instructed the Camachos to call local police and hold the son until arrangements could be made to return him to Mexico.

Mr. Camacho advised that Gonzalez overheard the telephone conversation and ran out of the house, and his present whereabouts are unknown. Camacho advised he informed local police authorities of Gonzalez' juvenile status and that he disappeared without identification or money.

Mr. Camacho stated that in his opinion, Gonzalez is a brilliant young man but unstable. His parents have been repressive toward him and he is antagonistic. He speaks fair English and he appears older than his actual age. He is a junior in high school. Gonzalez informed Camacho that without his parents' knowledge, because they would highly disapprove, he joined a Nazi Club in Colima, Mexico. He said he was in a leadership capacity and spoke before audiences of from two hundred to three hundred people regarding the subject of Nazism. He said he gained his audiences in parks and street corners. He said he curtailed his speech making only when he began to get threatening letters from people objecting to his activity. He was also afraid that his activity in behalf of the Nazi Club would get back to his parents. He then advised that he took a dislike to Nazism and began to study books on communism. He said he got so interested in communist theory that he intended to run away from home and write a book on the matter of communism. He also said he was not in favor of the United States Government's policy in Vietnam, and he thought the United States Government should have been censured for its intervention in Cuba.

On 6/28/68, Mr. H.D. FELDKAMP, Administrative Assistant, U.S. Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia (USP-A) made available for review the file on Inmate JAMES JOSEPH O'BRIEN, Inmate Register Number A86064, reflecting he was convicted in USDC, EDPA, at Philadelphia, Pa., on 4/20/60, sentenced to custody of A.G. for a period of 15 years for violation of the bank robbery statute. Sentence commended 4/20/60 and scheduled to expire with good time 5/15/70 and full time 4/19/75.

Review of file indicated subject was transferred from Lewisburg, Pa., to Atlanta, on 5/12/67. Therefore, O'BRIEN was at USP-A on Memorial Day, 1967.

An attempt to interview O'BRIEN by SAs JOHN G. SULLIVAN and JAMES J. ROSE on 6/28/68, met with negative results. After O'BRIEN was summoned to an interview room

He returned to Cell Block D thereafter. It should be noted that in a case entitled "ROBERT NEIL CONDER", Atlanta file 52-4613, O'BRIEN also refused to discuss facts in that matter with Bureau agents.

In view of the above, no FD-302 is being submitted and no further attempts being made to contact O'BRIEN, UACB.

BY TELEPHONE CALL JUNE TWENTY NINE LA ADVISED SANDLIN ASSIGNED
THIS CASE ON LAPD. HAD PLANNED TO INTERVIEW OWEN AT NAPA BUT
HAD DEFERRED INTERVIEW UNTIL OWEN RETURNED TO LA AREA. IT HAD BEEN
DETERMINED THAT OWEN HAD HIRED AN ATTORNEY NAMED DAVIS WHO ONCE
REPRESENTED CARYL CHESSMAN AND THAT OWEN WAS TO BE INTERVIEWED BY THE
PRESS WITH HIS HEAD COVERED BY A SACK. MEVIS HAD INFORMED THE LAPD
OWEN WOULD RETURN TO LA EARLY IN THE COMING WEEK AND WOULD BE AVAILABLE FOR INTERVIEW.

ON JUNE TWENTY NINE SF CONTACTED MRS. JOSEPHINE HARDISTER, NAPA, CALIF., BY TELEPHONE. SHE ADVISED THAT OWEN WAS NOT THEN AT THE RANCH. SHE SAID SHE WOULD GET A MESSAGE TO HIM CONCERNING THE IDENTITY OF SANDLIN.

THE "SAN FRANCISCO EXAMINER" NEWSPAPER FOR JUNE THIRTY REPORTED INFORMATION CREDITED TO GEORGE T. DAVIS, SF ATTORNEY, CONCERN-ING AN UNIDENTIFIED SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA MINISTER WHO WAS HIDING IN THE SF AREA BECAUSE HE HAD EVIDENCE OF POSSIBLE CONSPIRATORS IN THE KENNEDY ASSASSINATION AND HAD RECEIVED THREATS AGAINST HIMSELF AND HIS FAMILY.

ACCORDING TO THIS STORY, ON JUNE THREE THE MINISTER PICKED UP
TWO HITCHHIKERS IN LA AND AGREED TO SELL THE SMALLER OF THE TWO A
PONY FOR USE AT A RACE TRACK. THIS INDIVIDUAL SAID HE WAS FROM JORDAN
AND CAME TO THE U. S. AT AGE THIRTEEN.

ON THE NIGHT OF JUNE THREE THE MINISTER MET THE PROSPECTIVE BUYER ON SUNSET BLVD. HE WAS ACCOMPANIED NEW ETWO-176EN AND A WOMAN. HE

ON THE NIGHT OF JUNE FOUR-JUNE FIVE MINISTER SAW TV ACCOUNT
OF KENNEDY ASSASSINATION AND RECOGNIZED PHOTO OF SIRHAN AS THE
SMALL MAN WHO WANTED TO BUY THE PONY. THE MINISTER IMMEDIATELY WENT
TO THE LAPD WHERE HE WAS INTERVIEWED. ON THE SAME NIGHT HE RECEIVED
AN ANONYMOUS CALL WARNING HIM TO KEEP HIS MOUTH SHUT IF HE KNEW WHAT
WAS GOOD FOR HIM AND HIS FAMILY.

ON THE FOLLOWING DAY (APPARENTLY JUNE SIX) THE MINISTER WENT TO OAKLAND, CALIF. ON BUSINESS. HE RECEIVED A CALL AT HIS MOTEL FROM A MAN CLAIMING TO BE L. L. SANDLIN OF THE LAPD WHO WANTED TO TALK TO HIM AT THE HYATT HOUSE IN PALO ALTO. THE MINISTER THEN CONSULTED AN OLD FRIEND, BEN HARDISTER, WHO BELIEVED IT WOULD BE FOOLISH TO SEE THE UNKNOWN CALLER IN VIEW OF WHAT THE MINISTER KNEW. HARDISTER REPORTEDLY CALLED THE FBI AND WAS INFORMED THAT A CHECK WOULD BE MADE CONCERNING THE IDENTITY OF SANDLIN. THIS IS AN APPARENT REFERENCE TO THE CALL MADE BY GARDNER TO THE VALLEJO RESIDENT AGENCY.

DAVIS IN THIS RELEASE WAS CRITICAL OF THE LAPD AND SAID QUOTE

LOS ANGELES AUTHORITIES HAVE TAKEN THE POSITION THAT THERE IS NO

CONSPIRACY IN THIS CASE, SO THIS MAN'S STORY IS NOT IMPORTANT. UNQUOTE

THIS STORY ALSO REPORTED THAT THE MINISTER HAD NOT HEARD ANYTHING FROM THE FBI CONCERNING SANDLIN. THIS IS UNTRUE IN VIEW OF INFORMATION FURNISHED MRS. JOSEPHINE HARDISTER FOR HER GUEST ON JUNE TWENTY NINE.






REF Your Memorandum of 17 June 1968

We have no factual information to confirm or deny the "Star" story of 17 June 1968. However, our impression from reading stories sourced to the "Star's" "usually reliable sources" inside China over the past year is that the "Star" does not have any such sources in the mainland. Many of the stories sourced in this manner have been simply manufactured. Others have been based on known facts which have been embroidered with imaginary details. We have checked on some authentic pictures from inside China which the "Star" has attributed to its "usually reliable sources" in the mainland and have found the pictures were purchased from a newsman or other westerner who transitted China. We believe that the "Star" does not have sources either inside or outside China who would have reliable access to the kind of information presented in the article in question. It is, therefore, highly doubtful that there is any substance to the information.

JULES J. WITCOVER, 2505 Fowlers Lane, Reston, Virginia, telephone number: 471-1539, advised he is employed as the Serior Correspondent by Newhouse National News Service, Washington, D. C. He related he followed the ROBERT F. KENNEDY campaign both in Oregon and California. WITCOVER related he was at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, California on the night of June 4 - 5, 1968, when ROBERT F. KENNEDY was assassinated.

WITCOVER informed that he had congratulated him on his victory when he came into the area of the hotel where he was located and had followed KENNEDY to the platform in the Embassy Room of the hotel. When KENNEDY finished speaking, he passed through the corridor the same way that KENNEDY had come into the Embassy Room. or RICHARD GRAHAM, aldes to KENNEDY, had advised him that a press conference was to be held immediately after in the Colonial Room and thus he presumed that KENNEDY would be going to the Colonial Room via the kitchen, through which he had come to enter the Embassy Room. WITCOVER stated that access to the Colonial Room and the Embassy Room could be gotten by going through the kitchen. WITCOVER stated that when KENNEDY left the platform in the Embassy Room he was approximately thirty feet ahead of KENNERY going down the corridor which was ten to twelve feet wide and he noted that two women were sitting in this corridor. They were sitting in chairs on the right side. He believed these women were with the KENNEDY party and possibly wives or some of the aides and he based this upon the fact that they were very casually dressed and definitely not actively working for the KENNEDY campaign as they were not visibly excited at the particular time. WITCOVER stated he then came to a passage way about six feet wide. At no time did he see anyone other than these two women in the corridor. He stated he had almost reached the doors into the kitchen when he heard a shot. He first was unimpressed and thought it was a firecracker and then he heard rapid firing, at least four or five shots. He informed he could not be positive that there

were four or five shots, or more. He informed that there was a definite pause between the first shot and the subsequent shots. WITCOVER stated that he turned around and first noted ROOSEVELT GREER and others whom he did not immediately identify. He advised he did not notice the suspect immediately as there was alot of pushing in one area. He did notice an individual with his hand in the air and there was a gun in this hand. He advised he is not certain at this time in which hand the gun was, but he believed it was in the right hand.

WITCOVER informed that he did not see KENNEDY on the floor immediately as there were three or four people around him. He stated there was no crowd at that particular time. He advised that he noticed blood on KENNEDY's head and his hand and that his mouth and eyes were open. He thought that KENNEDY had been shot in the head and stomach, inasmuch as the hand on his stomach had blood on it. He noticed that KENNEDY at this point was still alive.

WITCOVER informed that he then turned around and noted a scuffle was continuing with the suspect and now ROOSEVELT GREER and RAIFORD JOHNSON and others were holding the suspect. Present at this point were yells," Get the gun, kill him, don't kill him, " and the scene was complete pandemonium.

He informed that there were no police or doctors for approximately fifteen minutes and it was his thought that it took approximately five minutes to get the gun from the suspect.

He noticed that GREER had a headlock on the suspect and that they had finally succeeded in removing the suspect down the corridor away from KENNEDY.

He related that photographers were all around KENNEDY at this time taking photographs and finally the aides came and pushed the photographers out of the way,

however, the photographers continued to take photographs. Mrs. ROBERT F. KENNEDY came several minutes later, knelt down beside her husband and said something to him or was praying. She finally got up and asked the photographers to leave and then knelt back down by her husband. Shortly thereafter, a security police came, took his gun out and then WILLIAM BARRY, an aide to the KENNEDY campaign, told this man to put his gun away. This man then went to the area where the suspect was. Finally, about one half dozen Los Angeles police officers came into the area and relieved GREER of the suspect and took him away. Shortly thereafter, an attendant came, placed KENNEDY on a stretcher, and he was taken out of the area and put into an ambulance. WILLIAM BARRY and Mrs. KENNEDY accompanied KENNEDY in the ambulance.

WITCOVER informed that after KENNEDY was taken out, he stood in the room, observed the room, and went to the press room to write his story.

WITCOVER stated that at one time he noted that they had moved the suspect down to the end of the table, and heard the suspect say, "My leg, my leg."

He described the gun as being a snubnose revolver.

WITCOVER stated that he did not see anyone else on the floor initially, however, all attention was focused on KENNEDY, but then noticed another individual on the floor who was wearing a press badge. He later found out that this person was PAUL SCHRADE.

WITCOVER stated in reconstructing the matter that when he left the platform he had a clear passage way before him although there were two women sitting in chairs on the right side of the corridor and when he turned around, he also had a clear passage back to the group of individuals. He stated he believed he was immediately ahead of KENNEDY when proceeding through the corridor. He stated that he was concerned with getting to the Colonial Room which was to be used for the press conference, inasmuch as he was interested in getting the best possible story.

WITCOVER stated that another reporter, ROBERT HEALY, The Boston Globe political editor, wrote a story stating he was coming through the door at the time of the shooting, however, WITCOVER informed that he has no recollection of HEALY being in that position.

WITCOVER stated thatothers that were in the area as he recalls were RICHARD TUCK, a KENNEDY advance man; RICHARD DRAYNE, a KENNEDY press man actually Senator EDWARD KENNEDY's press man; HUGH McDONALD another KENNEDY press man; PAUL HOPE, a reporter for the Washington Star; JIMMY BRESLIN for the New York Post; VIRGINIA GOI of Flair Magazine; and WARREN ROGERS, The Washington editor of Look Magazine. Also noted was JESSE UNRUH, a democratic leader in California.

WITCOVER stated that when he noticed the suspect he recalls thinking he was a member of the kitchen staff. He recalled this man was short of stature, was dark complexion, dark eyes and hair was wearing a blue denim shirt and tan pants.

The Los Angeles, California, Police Department advised that on June 25. 1968. Munir Sirhan, brother of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, was afforded a polygraph examination. It was concluded by the police department that Munir Sirhan was not involved in the assassination, but that he did lie about the purchase of the gun. (The gun used in the assassination was traced through several owners, one of whom, George Erhard, advised that he sold the gun to Munir Sirhan while Sirhan Sirhan was present. Munir had denied that he ever had ownership of this weapon.)

The polygraph examination indicated that Munir Sirhan did not accompany Sirhan Sirhan to a gun shop on June 1, 1968, when Sirhan Sirhan purchased ammunition. (A salesman at this store had stated that Sirhan Sirhan was accompanied by two as yet unidentified individuals when he purchased ammunition on June 1. 1968.)

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has voted to authorize \$20,000 for the protection of Sirhan Sirhan and the judge and jury that will be concerned with his trial. This money will be spent to install armor-plated courtroom partitions, bulletproof glass and other security devices.

On June 28, 1968, Sirhan Sirhan appeared before Superior Court Judge Richard B. Schauer, Los Angeles, California, in order to enter a plea to the indictment pertaining to the assassination of Senator Robert F. Kennedy and the wounding of five other individuals. Court was convened in the chapel of the Los Angeles County Jail for security reasons. EX-103

REC-71 62- 587-734 Mr. Russell E. Parsons, who represented Sirhan, was officially substituted by the court as the attorney of record replacing the Public Defender's Office. Mr. Parsons advised the court that he was not yet

Cooper's identity was obtained on a confidential basis, it was recommended and approved that a summary concerning him would not be furnished to the Department until his participation was announced publicly.

(We sent a summary to the Department pertaining to Russell E. Parsons on 6/25/68. Parsons has been publicly announced as the attorney of record for Sirhan Sirhan.)

A UPI release received on 6/28/68 announced that Grant B. Cooper would be codefense counsel with Parsons.

As mentioned in my memorandum of 6/24/68, Cooper is rated as a very prominent, capable criminal trial lawyer. Since his name has now been mentioned in a news release, we should send a summary to the Department.

ASSASSINATION OF SENATOR ROBERT F. KENNEDY LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

Press reports indicate that Grant B. Cooper, a Los Angeles, California, attorney, will serve as an additional defense counsel for Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, accused assassin of Senator Robert F. Kennedy. Martin-dale-Hubbell Law Directory reveals one Grant B. Cooper, born in 1903, was admitted to practice in 1927 and attended law school at Southwestern University in Los Angeles, California. For your information, there follows a brief summary of data in our files concerning Grant Cooper.

In 1941 the chief investigator for the Jack Tenny Committee investigating communism in California advised that one Grant Cooper, then on the Los Angeles County District Attorney's staff, and close to Mayor Fletcher Bowron, was married to a daughter of Mrs. Norton, Mayor Bowron's secretary. Phyllis Norton Cooper, the wife, was reportedly a former close associate of Celeste Strack, a prominent Young Communist League leader in Southern California and formerly active in New York City.

News and other sources reported in 1949 that Mr. Cooper was the attorney for a bit actress, Lila Leeds, who was arrested along with Robert Mitchum and others on a narcotics charge. Reportedly Mr. Cooper had as one of his associates in his law firm the son of Los Angeles County Sheriff, Eugene W. Biscailuz.

Mr. Cooper represented one Samuel Jesse Berland in his appearance before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in April, 1956. Berland, according to our files, was prominent in communist activities in the Los Angeles area for an extended period of time.

ASSASSINATION OF SENATOR ROBERT F. KENNEDY

Grant Cooper was the attorney in 1957 for one Philip Watler, a business agent of a Local Teamster's Union in California, in connection with a Grand Jury indictment for perjury.

In November, 1960, the Governor of California established a Special Committee on Insanity and Criminal Offenders to study insanity in relationship to law. Attorney Grant Cooper of Los Angeles, who reportedly defended Dr. Bernard Finch for wife murder, acted as chairman of one of the discussions of this committee.

In connection with an investigation of James Riddle Hoffa in 1961, a reliable source advised that he had contacted one Bill Bufalino, Teamster official in Detroit, Michigan, and was instructed to telephonically contact a Mrs. Williams at the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, and assist her. The source discovered that Mrs. Williams was in fact Viola Carbo, wife of Paul John (Frank) Carbo, then under prosecution for extertion and anti-racketeering in connection with the boxing racket. Mrs. Carbo requested the source to locate an attorney for her husband. Source took Mrs. Carbo to the home of Grant Cooper, at which time Cooper set his fee for representing Carbo at \$50,000. Mrs. Carbo indicated that she would have to make the payment in cash rather than by check and Cooper advised that he was not interested in handling the case in that manner.

In June, 1962, it was reported that Grant B. Cooper was the Southern Committee Vice Chairman Pro-Tem of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency. The announced purpose of the organization was to formulate a "crash" program to marshal the best know-how and experience in the State to bear on crime and delinquency.

Grant Cooper has represented numerous other individuals in the criminal element as well as one Chinese espionage subject who was under deportation proceedings in the Los Angeles area and is rated as a very prominent capable criminal trial lawyer according to news sources.

Although there is no proven scientific basis for accurately determining qualities such as age, education, occupation, regional accent, etc., on the basis of a limited voice sample, the following subjective aural impressions based on the voice quality and language usage of the unidentified caller, are set forth:

The voice of the anonymous caller is that of a mature male, possibly between the ages of 35 to 45. Although the thoughts which he expressed are somewhat disorganized and vaguely stated, it is believed that the caller is intelligent and well read but probably has little if any formal education.

The accent of his initial comment seems to be somewhat affected "hillbilly;" but, thereafter, his accent can be broadly characterized as Southwestern United States. His speech patterns are idiomatic and do not appear to be contaminated by foreign influence.

It is noted that the anonymous caller, with the exception of his initial comment, pronounces his words fully without swallowing syllables or clipping word endings, particularly final (r).

Although there is no proven scientific basis for accurately determining qualities such as age, education, occupation, regional accent, etc. On the basis of a limited voice sample, the following subjective aural impressions based on the voice quality and language usage of the unidentified caller, are set forth:

The voice of the anonymous caller is that of a mature male, possibly between the ages of 35 to 45. Although the thoughts which he expressed are somewhat disorganized and vaguely stated, it is believed that the caller is intelligent and well read but probably has little if any formal education.

The accent of his initial comment seems to be somewhat affected "hillbilly" but thereafter his accent can be broadly characterized as Southwestern United States. His speech patterns are idiomatic and do not appear to be contaminated by foreign influence.

It is noted that the anonymous caller, with the exception of his initial comment, pronounces his words fully without swallowing syllables or clipping word endings, particularly final (r).
