

1 A Yes.

2 Q And then somebody misquoted you or stated that you
3 had said that this girl had told you to the effect, "We have
4 shot him?"

5 A Uh huh. Right.

6 Q And you said, "Who is--who did you shoot?" And
7 that they told you, "Kennedy." Now this is also--

8 A --I didn't say--

9 Q --out of proportion here?

10 A Right.

11 Q Is that right?

12 A Right.

13 Q And in effect what you have told me previously
14 is that this person told you "he shot Kennedy" or "they
15 shot Kennedy"; is that right?

16 A Uhm, something or something about shooting
17 Kennedy, yeah.

18 Q Well, also before you had stated that you had
19 heard some shots?

20 A No, I never said I heard shots.

21 Q You never said that. Well, now, somebody quoted
22 you as saying that you had heard shots.

23 A No, I never said I heard shots.

24 Q Okay.

25 A I heard backfires of a car, and I know they were
26 backfires from a car, I know they weren't gunshots.

1 Q You know for a fact they were not gunshots?

2 A I knew it.

3 Q Okay, also, where was it that you saw the waiter,
4 the waiter--the kid that was a waiter in the kitchen? Where
5 did you see him and hear his statement?

6 A Upstairs.

7 Q In the Embassy Room?

8 A Uh huh.

9 Q Okay, now, why had you before said that you hadn't
10 been up to the Embassy Room?

11 A I hadn't until they took me up.

12 Q Oh, until the police took you up?

13 A Until the police took me up.

14 Q And is that when you heard the kid say something?

15 A Right.

16 Q About a woman?

17 A Right.

18 Q In a white polka dot dress?

19 A Right.

20 Q So that's where that thing about--

21 A I guess. I don't know.

22 Q --the polka dot dress, that's where it was
23 started?

24 A I guess. Well, I think so because that was the
25 day they took me down to the Ambassador, and Ambrose said,
26 "When did you tell me it was a polka dot dress?" And I said,

1 "I don't know; when did I tell you?" "Wasn't that outside
2 in the parking lot?" "Yeah, I think so; okay."

3 Q Well, regardless of what was said before, now we
4 know that it was a girl in a white dress that you saw?

5 A Right.

6 Q And then you heard the kid up in the Embassy Room
7 after the police took you up there, you heard him say
8 something about a girl with a black polka dot or white dress
9 with black polka dots?

10 A Right.

11 Q That's the first time you saw or heard anything?

12 A Right.

13 Q About polka dots. Now, just to clarify your
14 statement which is now a truthful statement; right?

15 A Right.

16 Q Is that when you said earlier that you had seen
17 a woman coming down the stairs with another man, as a matter
18 of fact you saw a lot of people coming down the stairs.
19 About how many people did you see would you say, just
20 roughly?

21 A I don't know. Three or four.

22 Q Could it have been more than four?

23 A Couldn't have been more than five, I know.
24 Couldn't have possibly have been more than five.

25 Q All right. Okay. Also, I think you said
26 something about you called home after you had heard?

1 A Right.

2 Q About Kennedy being shot?

3 A Right.

4 Q Do you remember after you got con--made contact
5 with your parents, do you remember telling them anything
6 about, or not telling them anything about knowing who had
7 shot or anything?

8 A No, I didn't.

9 Q Did you mention anything about that to them?

10 A No.

11 Q Okay, Sandra, just for the purpose of possible--

12 A I just told them that he was shot.

13 Q Yeah, that he was shot?

14 A That nobody knew about it. I think I mentioned
15 that to them that nobody knew that he was shot, or something.

16 Q I wonder if you can tell me, Sandy, if you will,
17 in your own words, why it is that this thing was magnified in
18 your mind to the proportion when you first knew either
19 through television or through the newspaper media?

20 A To everything?

21 Q To everything that you saw.

22 A Right.

23 Q When was the first time that you knew that this
24 was a pack of mistruths, and somebody else had misquoted or
25 printed?

26 A When I went down to the police station.

1 Q Which one, this police station?

2 A Rampart.

3 Q At Rampart, okay. What did you hear at Rampart
4 that you knew was not true on that date?

5 A What did I hear?

6 Q Yeah, what did you hear? You knew this is
7 starting to magnify, right?

8 A It was already magnified.

9 Q It was already magnified at that time?

10 A Yeah, it was already magnified.

11 Q What were they saying?

12 A Well, while I was back there they were asking
13 questions, yes. Yeah, it was a man in a waiting seat. Yeah,
14 yeah, yeah, you know--I don't--fifty people--I don't know,
15 around fifty--actually there were about five--four, you know,
16 people were asking me questions at the same time; and all I
17 knew that was when I was sitting there, I knew from what I
18 said--well, you put this and this together, and you've got
19 it. "Leave me alone now, and then we can all go now."
20 That's it.

21 Q Why didn't you correct them at that time, Sandy?

22 A I don't know. After--well, two reason, so I
23 didn't want to look like a fool, which I look like now.
24 Another reason, because everybody figures--everybody thinks--
25 they say, "Yeah, let's go; that's right." You know, know--
26 I was sitting there hearing descriptions and descriptions

1 of these people, of these people, of these people. Oh, God,
2 no, maybe that's what I'm supposed to have seen. Did I see
3 this woman? You know, I thought I was supposed to see more
4 than--more than I did. I was really going to believe that.
5 It messed me up, that's all; and I figured, well, they must
6 know what they're doing--I mean, they are police--after all
7 they have to know what they're doing, and I just figured
8 they knew what they were doing. That's all.

9 Q Sandy, just for my own personal edification, now
10 why, when I talked to you earlier this evening, in front of
11 your Aunt Maggie, why didn't you then tell me the truth?

12 A Because I knew I was going to tell you later.

13 Q Did you know you were going to tell me later?

14 A Yes.

15 Q Do you feel better now, Maggie?

16 A My name is not Maggie.

17 Q I mean Sandy?

18 A Yes and no. Well, yes, I feel better. In fact,
19 you know, finally I got--you know somebody and that's why I
20 didn't want it to bother me anymore because I knew that it
21 would keep growing and growing and growing. That's why that
22 day I got so filled with everything over there and they
23 wouldn't even let me talk to anybody, that's what killed me.
24 They wouldn't even let me talk to anybody, and I told them
25 that I wanted to talk to somebody. They wouldn't even let
26 me--uhm, uhm, then put two and two together I figured, well,

1 they must know what they're doing. There must be something
2 out of this, you know. I feel bad for the fact that I
3 didn't--that I didn't stand up in the beginning and say
4 something, and I should have.

5 Q But you are standing up now and saying the truth
6 which is--

7 A Yeah, but it's not that I--the whole thing was a
8 lie; that's it, and I don't know which fellow that I--I
9 really, to tell you the truth, I don't really feel it was my
10 fault. That's what--that's that man in that interview tape.

11 Q All right.

12 A --I didn't even know--I didn't even know I was on
13 television. To tell you the truth, I didn't even know it.

14 Q Remember when you--I understand that you were
15 before some people, some TV cameras or something, and you
16 were looking at some polka dot dresses; remember that?

17 A Yes.

18 Q Why didn't you correct it then? When you were
19 being shown the polka dot--

20 A Because everybody was making me nervous.

21 Q Everybody was making you nervous?

22 A Yeah, you know they didn't have stuff and we were
23 down there, down there a long time and doing nothing. Just
24 doing nothing and that stuff. And, you know, because they
25 came and picked me up at work around 11:15, and I never got
26 home until six o'clock. And we didn't do anything during

1 that time, anything, and then when I finally wanted to talk
2 about it, they wouldn't even let me talk to anybody--"take
3 her home--take her home." And now you're supposed to do this,
4 now you're supposed to do that. They didn't even know what
5 they were doing between themselves. That's what killed me.
6 That's why--that's what it did to me is that I'm not never
7 going to say anything anymore. And that's when if I'm going
8 to have a hassle between myself whether to say anything or
9 not, because you--you say something, and it turns out to be
10 something else, and you know it but it's so involved or it's
11 so messed up that you can't say anything. You really feel
12 you can't say anything, and you know you're supposed to say
13 something. But I'll tell you what, and I don't know--I
14 guess everybody feels that way, and I got kind of nervous,
15 that's all. And I think it was the first cop's fault. I
16 want to put the blame on somebody. I want to shift it from
17 me or something.

18 Q Tell me--tell me about that, about the first cop.

19 A Nothing--nothing--nothing like the one I have.

20 Q That first policeman that you talked to?

21 A The first policeman that I talked to was Ambrose,
22 and he talked to me about the kid following me, I remember
23 that much. "What do you see, a bunch of people following
24 you"? I said, "Oh, what in--yeah, I guess so." Yeah, you
25 know now everything was a hassle. Everything was in a daze.
26 I told him that I was in a daze, and I knew I was in a daze.

1 Q Uh huh.

2 A Because you can't--because I've been in front of
3 TV cameras before; and you know when the cameras are on you
4 because you can feel that heat, and I didn't feel anything.

5 Q Well, at least you're being a decent, honest
6 woman right now; aren't you, you know?

7 A Yes, yes, yes. I don't think I'm very decent.

8 Q Well, you are being decent. You're telling the
9 truth now.

10 A Yeah, in a way. You know what I think? Some
11 changes should be made.

12 Q For example?

13 A Well, for example, first, when somebody sees
14 something, let them go--I mean, you don't--don't feed
15 something to them which I really thought was being done to
16 me.

17 Q Fed information about the people?

18 A Yeah, and you know when somebody sees something,
19 keep them away from other people who have seen it. Because
20 you don't know--you don't know what happens, anything that
21 while that you really thought seeing something. I under-
22 stand that, that you know that everything was quite messed
23 up, and you know you can't be as careful, you know, and all
24 that stuff; but I really think--I mean--I'm really sorry that
25 it happened.

26 Q Sure, I think most people are sorry, and that I

1 think that we know that we're trying to do the best job we
2 can in this final investigation on this thing.

3 A Yeah.

4 Q And you see all the man-hours that we're going--

5 A --well, you see another thing, too, you know that
6 is that that other newspaper came out with that somebody else
7 had seen it, and then I--and then I seen it on television
8 somebody else had seen the girl in the white dress, and I
9 thought maybe that girl did have something to do with it,
10 you know. I kept thinking to myself, maybe--you know, gee--

11 Q But when you saw the big difference was that the
12 one you saw was a white dress and the one that somebody says
13 that they saw was a white dress with black polka dots, and--

14 A --someone saw--

15 Q --and regardless of what they saw, you know we
16 just want to get the facts, and the facts that you saw were
17 partly, apparently, were misquoted, or misprinted, or
18 mistelevised to the actual true facts?

19 A Well, they can't have been mistelevised because
20 I said that. I actually said that. None of them--

21 Q What you--

22 A --I don't know. Somewhere I heard it. I don't
23 know why I said it, but it just fitted. Then it happened
24 that it all fitted in, and I couldn't understand it, you
25 know. Then, yeah, I really thought there was something
26 behind it. I was scared. I tell you I've been scared all

1 this time.

2 Q Okay, well, don't be scared anymore; okay? I'm
3 going to stop this, and I'm going to be right back. I'm
4 going to catch my call, and I'm going to see if your aunt--
5 your auntie's back.

6 A Where did she go?

7 Q Well, I think they took her up for a coke or
8 something, or coffee or something. Just bear with me for
9 a couple of minutes.

10 A Well, please tell me what's going to happen or
11 something.

12 Q Oh, yes. Excuse me a second. Okay?

13 A You could have left that. I wouldn't look at it.

14 Q I know you wouldn't but I just want to look at
15 it myself.

16 (Short time lapse here of about three or four
17 minutes)

18 Q Okay, Sandy, they tell me you have got a talent?

19 A Oh, really?

20 Q For the purposes of the interview now, we're
21 completing this interview at 10:35 p.m.

22 A It's not on.

23 Q 10:35 p.m., and everything you have told me now
24 is the truth that you remember?

25 A Right.

26 Q Ah--

1 A How can I tell all these people that?

2 Q What we're going to do, Sandy, is I'm not going
3 to tell your aunt anything. I think we should decide how
4 we're going to handle it. Will--will you--do you want to
5 tell her yourself? I don't want to tell her unless you want
6 me to.

7 A No, I don't want to.

8 Q Okay, then, in the event that there is any--

9 A I don't want anybody saying anything.

10 Q Well, to her you mean?

11 A Just to her.

12 Q Well, I'm not going to tell anyone here. Of
13 course, we're going to have to cancel--

14 A --I know that.

15 Q --all these reports, you know that.

16 A I know that.

17 Q But in the event that I have to talk to--to you
18 again, can I have your phone number for the purposes of this
19 tape? Now, where you can be reached. Your address is what?
20 Where you're staying now?

21 A 2212 North Marengo, Altadena.

22 Q 2212 North Marengo in Altadena, California.

23 A I don't know my phone number.

24 Q You don't know your phone number there at the
25 place?

26 A No, we just had it changed.

1 Q Okay, where--oh, you mean the new phone number?

2 A The new phone number.

3 Q Okay, we'll get that from Maggie then. What about
4 the phone number at work?

5 A I don't know it either. I just started working
6 there.

7 Q What's the name of the place where you work?

8 A Martin Luther King Westside Study Center, 19--
9 1948 North Fair Oaks.

10 Q 1948 North Fair Oaks, and it's the Martin Luther
11 King Study Center.

12 A --Westside Study Center.

13 Q Westside Study Center. Okay, now, I will not--

14 A --what if I lost my job over this damn stupid
15 thing, and I lost pay and everything?

16 Q But the thing is this, that if we have to contact
17 you, I will call you myself; okay?

18 A Yeah.

19 Q And I hope that we won't have to talk to you
20 again. I don't think that we will. Okay?

21 A Yeah, yeah.

22 Q Okay.

23 A Oh, well, you said you were going to tell me
24 what's going to happen--about what's going to happen.

25 SGT. HERNANDEZ: Let's go back into the other
26 side.

Mrs. DONA (No Middle Name) HERRICK, residing at 9436 Pentland, Temple City, California, telephone number AT 6-7877, furnished the following information:

Her husband is BENJAMIN JAMES HERRICK. Together they own and operate the Lock, Stock 'N Barrel located at 8972 East Huntington Drive, San Gabriel, California, telephone number 287-0051. This is a gun and ammunition sales store.

Mrs. HERRICK furnished the following written statement:

"June 16, 1968
San Gabriel, California

"I, Dona Herrick, hereby furnish the following voluntary information to B. Bruce Bradford and Norbert R. Linker who have identified themselves to me as Special agents of the FBI.

"I live at 9436 Pentland, Temple City, California. My husband, Ben J. Herrick and I operate the Lock Stock 'N Barrel located at 8972 Huntington Dr. San Gabriel, California. I am 42 years old.

"On or about April 3, 1968 I was working at the store. Sometime between one and six p.m. three males of foreign extraction entered the store. I had never seen them before or since. Only one of the three spoke And with such an accent I could not understand him. I asked Ben to help me to understand him. I then understood this same person to say, 'Do you have any 357 Mag. tank piercing ammo', or words to that effect. Ben replied 'We don't have any'. The three then left without speaking further. They were here only three or four minutes. I did not see them leave in any car. As they were leaving they picked up one of our business cards from the counter. They made no purchase.

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"On June 16, 1968 I was shown a group of six photo's by agents Bradford and Linker. I selected a photograph of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan and I am positive this is a photo of the man who inquired about 357 Mag. tank piercing ammo on or about April 3, 1968.

"A photo of Adel Sirhan and Munir Sirhan have been shown to me by the FBI on this date and both of these men bear strong resemblance's to the men who were with Sirhan Bishara Sirhan on or about April 3, 1968 in our store.

"I was not at the store on June 1, 1968 when cash sale No. 2372 was made.

"I have given original bill of sale No. 2372 dated June 1, 1968 to agents Bradford and Linker this date June 16, 1968.

"S/ Dona Herrick

"Witnesses:

S/ B. Bruce Bradford, Special Agent, FBI, Los Angeles,
6/16/68.

S/ Norbert R. Linker, Special Agent, FBI, Los Angeles,

In addition to this written statement, Mrs. HERRICK furnished the following information:

She did not see any of these three men carrying or exhibiting any type of weapons on or about April 3, 1968. None of these three men mentioned or inquired about any .22 caliber ammunition.

Mrs. HERRICK advised that cash bill of sale Number 2372, dated June 1, 1968, was apparently filled out by an employee, LARRY ARNOT. It indicated the following sales were made:

She explained each box contained 50 cartridges. The "CCI" refers to the manufacturer, Cascade Cartridge, Incorporated, Lewiston, Idaho. The "22" refers to .22 caliber cartridges. According to the price of \$1.00 per box the sale was for .22 caliber, long rifle, hollow point, mini-mag ammunition. She explained the second two boxes would have been for .22 caliber, long rifle, standard Super X, manufactured by the Winchester-Western Division of the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation. The original, white copy, of the sales slip is kept by her firm with the second tissue copy. The third copy, colored yellow, is given to the customer as his receipt. Mrs. HERRICK advised she would keep the book from which sales slip Number 2372 was taken and make it available if needed.

Mrs. HERRICK advised she would described the clothing worn by all three men as being very similar as though they might have been "in uniform clothing". She stated, however, that she did not observe any lettering on the clothing. She was impressed with the fact that all three appeared to be "neat and clean".

In addition she advised that when she saw these three men in their store on or about April 3, 1968, she and her husband were the only ones working at the time. Her husband was waiting on one other customer at the time. This was the only other person in the store at the time but she advised she can not recall the identity of this other customer.

Mrs. HERRICK advised she is unable to furnish any other additional information at this time.

Mr. BENJAMIN J. HERRICK, 9436 Pentland, Temple City, California, telephone Number AT 6-7877, advised he is the owner of the Lock, Stock, 'n Barrel Gun Shop, 8972 Huntington Drive, San Gabriel, California, telephone Number 287-0051. Mr. HERRICK furnished the following signed statement:

"San Gabriel, Calif.
June 17, 1968

"I, Benjamin J. Herrick, make the following statement to James H. Stanton and C. Kenneth Arnold who have identified themselves to me as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I understand this statement may be used in a court of law.

"I have discussed with my wife, Dona, the events surrounding the visit of three men, all foreign appearing, to my gun shop, the Lock, Stock 'n Barrel, 8972 Huntington Drive, San Gabriel, California, about April 15, 1968. I now recall that three men entered the store and looked around. My attention was drawn to them because they were very interested in the handgun display. I drew the impression that they were foreign because of their interest in the display. I have observed that other persons of foreign nationality show unusual interest in gun displays, perhaps because such displays are unknown in their own countries.

"I did not observe these three men until they were in the store. I did not see them arrive in a vehicle. I did see them when they approached my wife and asked her a question and she then turned to me for assistance. At this time one of them asked me if we had any armor piercing ammunition in the store. I do carry such ammunition which I sell to law enforcement officers. After observing that these men were not law enforcement officers I said that we did not have such ammunition in stock. The three men then

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left the store. I did not observe the men closely on this visit and I now only recall that they were short, dark and foreign looking.

"On June 1, 1968, I was again working at my store. I don't recall the time of the incident, but it was sometime after opening hour of 12:00 noon. I was talking to a customer about a shotgun. I do not recall the name of this customer, but he was interested in trap shooting and I think we were discussing a Browning over/under shotgun. During the conversation I was standing near my desk in the northwest corner of the store. Larry Arnot, one of my employees, was standing at the ammunition counter which is at the southwest corner of the store. I happened to glance over my shoulder and observed there were three short, dark, foreign looking persons talking with him. From their appearance I thought they were the same three persons who had been in the store on the April 15th date inquiring about the armor piercing ammunition. I observed these three persons from the rear only. I continued my discussion with my customer and when I finished the three men were gone.

"I cannot give specific descriptions of the three men because of the short period of time I had to look at them. I believe they were all males, in their early 20's, all about 5'5" or 5'6" (all shorter than I at 5'8"), slender build, about 130 lbs. I recall that they all were very dark complected. One had kinky hair. The other two had curly hair. They were all wearing casual clothing, probably pants and sport shirts. None of them had glasses, tattoos or jewelry which I can recall. None of them was carrying anything when they were in the store to the best of my recollection. I have the impression they were all clean, neat and well groomed.

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"I recall discussing the nationality of the three men. I remember someone saying they were possibly Philipino. I commented that I did not think they were Philipino because they had curly hair and all Philipinos have straight hair. I could not identify any of the three men as being from a middle east country.

"I have observed photographs of Adel Sirhan, Sharif Bishara Sirhan, Saidallah Bishara Sirhan and Munir Sirhan and cannot identify any of them as being in the store.

"I cannot identify Sirhan Bishara Sirhan as one of the three men in the store. I have seen his photograph in the papers and on TV and cannot now state that I am identifying him from being in my store or from seeing his picture in the news media.

"I have read the above 2 page statement and to the best of my knowledge it is true.

LARRY KENNETH ARNOT, Salesman, Lock Stock 'N Barrel Gun Shop, 8972 East Huntington Drive, residence 517 Melcanyon Road, Duarte, California, residence telephone 358-7887, was interviewed at his employment.

ARNOT advised that sometime during the mid-afternoon of June 1, 1968, three men entered the gun shop and walked directly to the last counter on the south side of the building where they momentarily paused and appeared to be looking over the various boxes of ammunition which were located behind that particular counter.

ARNOT stated that as he approached the three men to inquire whether he could be of any assistance, the shorter of the three men stated, "I want two boxes of Mini Mags", or words to that effect. ARNOT stated that simultaneously, one of the three separated himself from his other two associates by a distance of approximately six to eight feet and appeared to be intent on the items which were located behind the counter on the west side of the building.

He related that as he turned towards the ammunition stock, he asked the man who had ordered the "Mini Mags" whether he desired the standard type or the hollow point type.

After learning that the purchaser desired the hollow point, he obtained two boxes of high velocity .22 caliber long rifle bullets, each box of which contained 50 shells.

On returning to the counter and placing the ammunition directly in front of the purchaser, his associate, who was standing along side him, then informed him that he wanted two boxes of .22 caliber long rifle shells of the standard type. ARNOT returned to the ammunition stock, removed two boxes of .22 caliber Super X ammunition and, on returning to the two men, placed all four boxes in a paper bag and then proceeded to complete a sales invoice.

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He related that on completing the sales which totaled \$3.99 including tax, he removed the yellow copy of the three copy sales invoice from the sales book and placed it in the bag with the four boxes of ammunition.

He advised that although not certain which one of the two individuals paid him for the sales transaction, he received the money, thanked them, at which point all three men departed the store leaving via the front door.

ARNOT also recalled that midway through the course of the transaction, he asked the shorter of the two men who had purchased the ammunition whether they planned to go rabbit hunting, as the .22 caliber bullets they were buying appeared ideal to him for that type of game. He advised that the shorter man acknowledged that that was their plan, to which he asked, "Are you going toward Red Mountain", which ARNOT explained was located off Highway 395 in San Bernardino County, as ARNOT knew this area to be an excellent rabbit hunting ground. ARNOT stated that he specifically recalled that the shorter man answered in the negative and cited another spot where they planned to go hunting but, at this time, ARNOT cannot recall that location.

ARNOT stated that one or two days subsequent to the shooting of Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY, he observed a photograph of KENNEDY's alleged assailant SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN on either television or in a newspaper, at which time he instantaneously realized that SIRHAN was the shorter of the two men to whom he had sold the two boxes of "Mini Mags" on June 1, 1968, while SIRHAN was in the company of two associates.

At that point in the interview, ARNOT was displayed the below listed photographs:

SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN

MUNIR SIRHAN

(Two photographs, one of which depicts
MUNIR with glasses, the other without glasses)

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ADEL SIRHAN

SHARIF BISHARA SIRHAN

SAIDALLAH BISHARA SIRHAN

After closely reviewing the above photographs, ARNOT identified the picture of SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN as being identical to the individual to whom he had sold the two boxes of .22 caliber, long rifle, high velocity shells to on June 1, 1968. Upon completing his identification of SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN, ARNOT affixed his initials and the date of June 16, 1968, on the rear of this picture.

Continuing his review of the remaining four photographs, ARNOT chose the photograph of SHARIF BISHARA SIRHAN from the remaining pictures and advised that he was of the opinion that SHARIF "bears a strong resemblance" to the individual who, while standing next to SIRHAN in the shop on June 1, 1968, ordered and purchased two boxes of .22 caliber, long rifle, Super X bullets. ARNOT stated that he could not make a positive identification of the photograph of SHARIF BISHARA SIRHAN but could be positive if afforded the opportunity of viewing this individual in person.

Regarding the third individual who had entered the store and then had parted from the other two men to view other merchandise, ARNOT stated that he was not confident that he would effect the identification of this person by either photograph or in person viewing.

ARNOT was then displayed Lock Stock 'N Barrel original sales invoice number 2372 which reflects the date June 1, 1968, for a cash transaction of two boxes of CCI .22 caliber ammunition and two boxes of Super X .22 caliber ammunition with tax totaling \$3.99. ARNOT identified the writing upon this invoice as his own and advised that he believes this is the sales slip covering the purchase made by SIRHAN and his associate. After viewing the sales slip, ARNOT affixed his initials to the document as well as the date June 16, 1968.

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At this point in the interview, ARNOT prepared the following voluntary signed statement in his own hand:

"June 16 - 1968
San Gabriel California

"I, Larry Kenneth Arnot hereby furnish the following signed statement to Norbert R. Linker and B. Bruce Bradford who have identified themselves as Special Agents of the F.B.I.

"I am 36 years of age and reside at 517 Melcanyon Rd. Duarte California. I am employed as a salesman at the Lock Stock 'N Barrel gun shop, 8972 E. Huntington Dr. San Gabriel California.

"During the afternoon of June 1, 1968 3 men entered my employment and walked to the rear of the store where out stock of ammunition is located. Two of the men remained positioned at the counter, their associate parted from them at a distance of about six feet and began to look over the items behind another counter.

"One of two men standing together appeared interested in the ammunition behind the counter. After approaching them to inquire if I could be any help the shorter of the two men responded by stating 'I want two boxes of Mini Mags' or words to that effect. On questioning he added that he wanted the hollow point as opposed to the standard type. I would like to point out at this time that 'Mini Mag' is a brand or type of high velocity .22 caliber ammunition of short, long or long rifle sizes.

"I obtained two boxes of hollow point .22 caliber high velocity, long rifle 'Mini Mags' made by the Cascade Catridge Inc. of Lewiston Idaho and placed them on the counter. Each box contained fifty cartridges.

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"After placing the cartridges on the counter the person standing next to the person who had ordered the 'Mini Mags' then asked me to get him two boxes of .22 cal. 'Super X' long rifle bullets. On returning to the counter I placed two boxes of .22 cal. 'Super X' standard long rifle bullets manufactured by Winchester-Western Division of Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp. along side the other two boxes.

"I totaled a sales receipt arriving at a total of \$3.99. I placed the four boxes of ammo. in a paper bag along with the customer yellow copy of the cash sales slip. I cannot recall whether one of both of these men paid me the cash covering the \$3.99 sale.

"I have been shown a photograph of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan by agents Bradford and Linker of the F.B.I. and positively identified this individual as the person to whom I sold the two boxes of .22 cal. high velocity, long rifle, hollow point 'Mini Mags' on 6-1-68.

"I have been shown a photograph of a person identified to me as Sharif Bishara Sirhan by agents Bradford and Linker and believe that he strongly resembles the individual who was with Sirhan Bishara Sirhan and to whom I sold the two boxes of the standard .22 cal., long rifle 'Super X' Western ammunition on the same date.

"I have read this statement, initialed all corrections and find it to be true and correct.

ARNOT stated that he felt confident that he could effect a positive identification of this individual if afforded the opportunity of viewing him in person.

ARNOT, thereafter, furnished the description of the individual who, on arriving in the store, remained

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separated from SIRHAN and his other associate at a distance of approximately six feet throughout the sales transaction:

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The following investigation was conducted by
SA C. KENNETH ARNOLD and SA JAMES H. STANTON:

Mr. BENJAMIN HERRICK, Owner, Lock, Stock 'n Barrel Gun Shop, 8972 Huntington Drive, San Gabriel, California, was contacted on June 18, 1968 and made available for review his records of handgun sales. Mr. HERRICK explained the laws of the State of California require a person purchasing a handgun wait five days after purchase before picking up the gun from the store where it is purchased.

The handgun records were reviewed and it was observed that JEFFREY EWING, 1110 East Claremont, Pasadena, California purchased a handgun on May 25, 1968. ARNOLD GERSON, 11204 La Maida, North Hollywood, California purchased a handgun on May 24, 1968.

The handgun records disclose that there were no purchases of handguns made on June 1, 1968.

Mr. HERRICK also made available his records concerning the sale of rifles. These records indicate Mr. JOE CRNOGORAC, 9730 Paramount Boulevard, Downey, California, was in the store on June 1, 1968 and made a purchase.

The sales receipt books of the gun shop were also reviewed for June 1, 1968. These records did not contain the names of any persons making purchases on that date. Mr. HERRICK reviewed each of the sales tickets in an effort to recall who might have made purchases, but was unable to remember any specific customer in the store on June 1, 1968.

Mr. HERRICK checked his records of credit card sales for the BankAmericard and Master Charge credit card sales. These are the only two credit cards which Mr. HERRICK recognizes. There were no sales made on either of these cards on June 1, 1968.

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Mr. HERRICK said that he could not explain how SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN selected the Lock, Stock 'n' Barrel Gun Shop to make his purchase on June 1, 1968. He advised that he does not advertise in any kind of daily, weekly or throw-away newspaper. His only advertisement is a small ad in the Yellow Pages of the San Gabriel Valley section of the telephone book. He also advised he does not cater to any gun clubs, shooting clubs, etc.

Mr. HERRICK advised that he could not recall any deliveries being made to his store on June 1, 1968 other than the regular mail delivery which comes about 2:00 p.m. He pointed out that June 1, 1968 was a Saturday and that most delivery services, which frequent his shop do not make deliveries that day.

Mr. HERRICK stated he has given the matter of identifying customers who might have been in the store at the same time that SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN was there careful consideration. He stated he could not recall any customer being in the store during the pertinent period. He said he would continue to consider this matter and would advise if he could recall anyone who had been in the store at the appropriate time. Mr. HERRICK said he has discussed this matter with his wife and neither of them could recall any customer who might have seen SIRHAN and his associates when they were in the store.

Mrs. BENJAMIN HERRICK (DONA), advised on June 18, 1968 that she could furnish no information other than that already furnished by her husband. She stated she was not at the store on June 1, 1968. She recalled that she was at home on that date. Her mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. RICHARD L. HINELINE, 606 Circle Drive, Solano Beach, California, were visiting her. She recalled that sometime during the day they went to the store to talk to her husband. She did not accompany them. She said she has discussed the possible appearance of SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN on June 1, 1968 with them several times within the last

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few days. Both her mother and stepfather have advised Mrs. HERRICK that they do not recall anyone fitting the description of SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN and his associates in the store while they were there.

Mr. JEFFREY EWING, 1110 East Claremont, Pasadena, California, advised on June 19, 1968 that he purchased a handgun at the Lock, Stock 'n Barrel Gun Shop on May 25, 1968. He was going to pick the gun up on May 30, 1968. He received an invitation to go camping in the desert and left on May 30, 1968 and did not return to the Pasadena area until the morning of June 2, 1968. He went to the gun shop at noon, June 2, 1968, and met Mr. HERRICK when he came to open the shop for business. He picked up his gun at that time and has not been back to the store since. He stated that he has been in the store on only two occasions, May 25, 1968 and June 2, 1968. He is not a regular customer at the store.

Photographs of SIRHAN SIRHAN, ADEL SIRHAN, MUNIR SIRHAN, SHARIF SIRHAN and SAIDALLAH SIRHAN were displayed to Mr. EWING and he could not identify any of the photographs as someone he has seen before.

Mr. ARNOLD GERSON, 11204 La Maida, North Hollywood, was contacted at his employment, the U. S. Navy Under-Sea Warfare Center, 3202 East Foothill, Pasadena, California. He advised that he purchased a gun at the Lock, Stock and Barrel Gun Shop, on May 24, 1968. He picked up the gun approximately June 7, 1968. Mr. GERSON said he was out of town on business on May 30 and 31, 1968 and was unable to pick up his gun until the following week. He stated he has only been at this shop on two or three occasions and that has always been around 1:00 p.m. on a weekday, while he is on his lunch hour.

Photographs of SIRHAN SIRHAN, ADEL SIRHAN, MUNIR SIRHAN, SHARIF SIRHAN and SAIDALLAH SIRHAN were displayed to Mr. GERSON who advised he was unable to identify any of them as persons he has seen before.

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Mr. JOE CRNOGORAC, 9730 Paramount Boulevard, Downey, California, telephone 928-1908, advised he is a reserve Los Angeles County Deputy Sheriff. He stated he occasionally visits the Lock, Stock and Barrel Gun Shop in San Gabriel, California. He said that he purchased a gun from this store on June 1, 1968. He said he usually goes to the store in the evening hours. He said that he can not recall ever having seen anyone in the store. He said that he usually goes in to see if BEN HERRICK has any guns to trade. He talks to him for only a few minutes and then leaves. Mr. CRNOGORAC said he would not be able to recognize anyone who was in the store when he was there, because he does not pay any attention to other customers who are there.

MARY SIRHAN (MARY) 1696 East Howard Street, advised that she never observed a gun or ammunition in the possession of her son SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN (SIRHAN).

MARY related that she doubts very seriously if any of her other sons socialized with SIRHAN or were seen in SIRHAN's company during recent months. She explained that SIRHAN was a boy that kept to himself and did not talk to his brothers other than ADEL. She said that SIRHAN has not said more than hello to his brothers SAIDALLAH and SHARIF in over three years, and she is positive that during the last three years SIRHAN did not see either SAIDALLAH or SHARIF away from her residence at 1696 East Howard Street.

MARY related that several months ago SIRHAN and his brother MUNIR had a violent argument and during the last several months were barely on speaking terms.

She said the only brother that SIRHAN was on speaking terms during recent months was ADEL.

SAIDALLAH noted that on numerous occasions he would visit the family residence at 1696 East Howard Street, at which time he would say hello to SIRHAN and on numerous occasions SIRHAN would not even acknowledge his hello. SAIDALLAH stated that during this period he and SIRHAN never socialized together and he had not seen SIRHAN for approximately one month prior to June 4, 1968.

SAIDALLAH stated that he does not own any firearms and he personally has not frequented a gun shop. SAIDALLAH stated that at no time did he ever frequent the Lock Stock and Barrel Gun Shop at 8977 Huntington Drive, San Gabriel, California, with his brother SIRHAN.

SHARIF said that at no time has he ever been to the Wooden Shoe Restaurant in the company of SIRHAN and to his knowledge SIRHAN has never been to the Wooden Shoe Restaurant.

SHARIF said he does not know any woman at the Wooden Shoe Restaurant by the name of SHARON or SHERYLL who is described as follows:

Detective AHARONIAN related that last evening, he received information from ANDY and CARL MARTIGANI, mentioned above, to the effect that SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN had visited their bar on a number of occasions in the recent past. On or about the last of May, ANDY MARTIGANI overheard SIRHAN say to "JIM", "We will wait till he gets into town and then we will get him." When they saw ANDY MARTIGANI approach, "JIM" said "Cool it". Also, ANDY MARTIGANI stated that a KATHY VENNE, 1145 South Chapel Street, Alhambra, had dated "JIM" in the past. According to Detective AHARONIAN, both ANDY and CARL MARTIGANI had advised that when SIRHAN and "JIM" were in the bar, they were accompanied by a dark complexioned, similar nationality to SIRHAN's, man, who had a mustache and beard which he has recently shaved off. The MARTIGANIs believe that "JIM" works at the Worthington Corporation, Alhambra.

Detective AHARONIAN also advised that ANDY and CARL MARTIGANI had informed the Alhambra Police Department that the following individuals had also reportedly seen SIRHAN in the Golden Garter in the recent past:

ANDY and CARL MARTIGANI advised Detective AHARONIAN that approximately one month ago, "JIM", mentioned above, had come into the Golden Garter Bar and, either on that occasion or another occasion, mentioned that he knew of a girl who would be willing to work in the Golden Garter as a barmaid. He subsequently introduced a girl, using the name DOROTHY MANNING, to ANDY MARTIGANI and she was hired by the MARTIGANI brothers. At the time of employment, she listed her address as 2317 West Main Street, Alhambra, and indicated that she was either presently employed part-time or previously employed at the Purple Bunny, Imperial and Norwalk Boulevards, Norwalk, California, telephone number 868-6672.

Detective AHARONIAN related that in checking public utilities and the Post Office Department, it was determined that a JAMES L. WILSON resided at 2317 West Main Street, Apartment A, Alhambra, and that he had left this address on or about June 1, 1968, no forwarding address given. Post Office information was obtained from Inspector JACK CLIFFORD, United States Post Office, Los Angeles, who had advised Detective AHARONIAN that the mail carrier covering that address had reported a JAMES L. WILSON was receiving mail at that address and the mailman indicated this particular mail appeared "subversive" to him.

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From utility records, Detective AHARONIAN determined that JAMES L. WILSON was last employed by the International Extrusion Corporation (International Aluminum), 1000 South Meridian Avenue, Alhambra.

Inquiry with BETTY CLEVELAND, Personnel Manager of the International Extrusion Company, revealed that JAMES L. WILSON was formerly employed with this concern; had Social Security Number [REDACTED] date of birth April 24, 1940, 5'9" tall, 174 pounds; was a white male and resided at 2317 West Main Street, Alhambra. According to company records, his employment was terminated on May 9, 1968, and he had Texas driver's license number 6248463.

Detective AHARONIAN also advised that when DOROTHY MANNING was introduced to ANDY MARTIGANI, Golden Garter Bar, for employment, she gave her Social Security Number as [REDACTED]. According to Detective AHARONIAN, this Social Security Number is subscribed to D. D. SANFORD, as of February 1966.

Detective AHARONIAN related that no further investigation has been conducted by his office concerning this matter other than an inquiry at the last known address of DOROTHY MANNING, 2317 West Main Street, Alhambra, and no positive information was obtained from neighbors other than WILSON was reportedly driving a blue Ford. Also, Detective AHARONIAN stated that he is presently awaiting further utility checks and other established checks in an effort to identify "JIM" and also DOROTHY MANNING and their locations.

ANDREW MARTIGANI, Golden Garter Bar, 2605 West Valley Boulevard, Alhambra, was interviewed and furnished data on an individual he believed to be SIRHAN SIRHAN:

MARTIGANI related that approximately one month ago, an individual came into the bar who identified himself as "JIM". He became a semi-frequent customer of the bar and, during the course of his early visits, indicated that he knew a girl who would be willing to work in the bar as a barmaid. On a later occasion, he came into the bar with a girl who was identified to MARTIGANI as DOROTHY MANNING. DOROTHY MANNING stated she resided at 2317 West Main Street, Alhambra; gave her Social Security Number as [REDACTED] and indicated that she was presently connected with, or was formerly connected with, the Purple Bunny Bar, Imperial and Norwalk Boulevards, Norwalk, California, telephone number 868-6672. ANDREW MARTIGANI described DOROTHY MANNING as a white female, 5'5" tall, 125 pounds, light complexion (rosy cheeks), bleached blonde hair, blue eyes and appeared to be approximately 23 or 24 years old.

ANDREW MARTIGANI advised that on one occasion, "JIM" came into the bar with an individual who appeared to be of Spanish descent and he received the impression that he was the boy friend of DOROTHY MANNING. MARTIGANI added that after two days, he became displeased with the work of DOROTHY MANNING and fired her for personal reasons.

MARTIGANI related that on May 29, 1968, an individual he believed to be SIRHAN SIRHAN was in the bar along with "JIM", mentioned above. During the course of the evening, he happened to be walking by their table and overheard this individual comment to "JIM", "We will wait till he gets into town and then we will get him." When they saw ANDREW approach, "JIM" said, "Cool it." ANDREW heard nothing further concerning this conversation.

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MARTIGANI advised that on the occasions he had seen this individual at the bar, he was driving a 1958 or 1959 De Soto believed to be orange and white in color and it was always parked in the rear of the bar.

MARTIGANI advised that "JIM" was a white male, approximately 28 years old, 5'10" tall, 170 pounds, hazel eyes, sandy, curly hair, medium complexion, appeared to be smiling all the time and had a southern accent. He continued that he had furnished the above information to the Alhambra Police Department and that based on this description they had made up a composite photograph of "JIM". MARTIGANI related that he had seen this individual on one occasion (May 29, 1968) and that his partner, CARL MARTIGANI, had seen him on three previous occasions; Detective DON TRUMBLE, Alhambra Police Department, had observed this individual at the bar on at least one occasion and had played pool with him; and, also, the following customers of the bar had reported seeing the same man at the Golden Garter Bar:

MARTIGANI stated that most of the above individuals he had mentioned in this interview were frequent customers of Thompson's Bar and Cafe located in Alhambra between Date and Palm Streets, and he believed that they might be able to identify "JIM", mentioned above.

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He added that recently, he had made inquiry at the Purple Bunny in Norwalk and was informed by a STANLEY (Last Name Unknown)(LNU) that DOTIE was known at that bar as a barmaid. He continued that STANLEY might possibly have background information on this girl, who probably is identical with DOROTHY MANNING.

MARTIGANI advised that he would try to remember further details concerning the above incidents and would gladly furnish this information to the FBI. He stated that his partner, CARL MARTIGANI, was not in the bar at the time but could be interviewed at a later date. He furnished his home address as 22901 Concord Avenue, Alhambra, telephone number 289-1707, and advised that the Golden Garter's telephone number is 282-2457.

On June 8, 1968, ANDREW MARTIGANI, Proprietor, Golden Garter Bar, 2605 West Valley Boulevard, Alhambra, was reinterviewed and furnished substantially the same information he had furnished to SA DOUGLAS R. LUND on June 7, 1968, with the following exceptions:

MARTIGANI related after viewing a photograph of SIRHAN SIRHAN that he was ninety per cent certain that this was the individual he had observed with "JIM" at the Golden Garter Bar on or about May 29, 1968, wherein he overheard SIRHAN comment to "JIM", "We will wait till he gets into town and then we will get him." In connection with this conversation, he related that "JIM" owed him \$5.00 and this was the purpose in going to speak to "JIM" sitting at the table with SIRHAN on that evening. "JIM" had requested more credit at the bar and MARTIGANI advised that he informed "JIM" in the presence of SIRHAN SIRHAN that he would not extend any more credit and wanted the \$5.00 that was owed to him. He added that "JIM" became somewhat upset; and after a few words, both he and SIRHAN departed the Golden Garter Bar.

MARTIGANI continued that he has not observed "JIM" or SIRHAN since that event.

On June 8, 1968, CARL M. MARTIGANI, Proprietor, Golden Garter Bar, 2605 West Valley Boulevard, was interviewed and furnished the following information:

MARTIGANI related, on approximately May 13, or 14, 1968, he saw an individual he believed to be SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN come into the Golden Garter Bar. From that date up until the Memorial Day weekend, He saw this man on at least three separate occasions. On one of these occasions he saw this individual with an individual known to him as "JIM"; and on the other two occasions, he observed him with an individual who appeared to be of Mexican descent.

MARTIGANI described "JIM" as follows:

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MARTIGANI added that the above individual of Mexican descent had very, very dark skin but yet appeared to be of Caucasian race.

MARTIGANI related at approximately one and a half months ago, "JIM", while in the Golden Garter, recommended a girl for employment at this bar as a barmaid. At a later date he appeared at the bar with this girl who identified herself to MARTIGANI as DOROTHY MANNING. She filled out the customary employment applications, specifically the W-2 Form, and advised she is presently residing at 2317 West Main Street, Alhambra; that she had been married twice previously; and had three children. She also advised MARTIGANI that she had been arrested in the recent past for a traffic violation; and after failing to appear for a hearing, she received ten days in jail and was released from jail just two days previous. She informed him that she previously worked at the Purple Bunny, Norwalk, California. He contacted the Purple Bunny and inquired concerning DOROTHY MANNING. He was advised by an individual, who identified himself as STANLEY at the Purple Bunny, that they were not acquainted with a DOROTHY MANNING, but they did have a DOTTIE who worked there.

MARTIGANI had observed the individual believed to be SIRHAN SIRHAN and the Mexican looking individual arrive at the bar in an orange and white Desoto (had white strip down center of doors and orange had appeared to be oxidized).

MARTIGANI described DOROTHY MANNING as follows:
