



# SVEN ERIC DOSS

On March 7, 1967, Phil Wright, Chief Attorney, Veterans Administration, St. Petersburg, Florida, advised a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that Sven Eric Doss, a former patient of the Veterans Administration Hospital, St. Petersburg, Florida, a schizophrenic, who has been judged incompetent in four states, had left St. Petersburg, Florida, for Washington, D.C., possibly on March 3, 1967, and prior to leaving had stated that he intended to kill a number of people in Washington, including Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

Mr. Wright advised that Doss has a sister, Christine Kemnitz, 1091 North Rademacher Street, Detroit, Michigan, and subject has threatened to kill his sister because he felt that she was retaining his Social Security checks,

It was ascertained that Doss had called the Veterans Administration Hospital in St. Petersburg shortly after 3:00 p.m., on March 3, 1967, stating he had received \$150 by wire from his sister.

Doss was born on March 18, 1922, in Mora, Sweden, and is a naturalized citizen of the United States. He is seventy-one inches tall, has brown hair, ruddy complexion, and no teeth. He has a thorax operation scar on right side; gunshot wound on left leg and a hernia operation on left side. Doss has a long history of tuberculosis and asthma and is classified as a schizophrenic and incompetent. His Veterans Administration Number is C15373724 and his FBI Number is 559846D.

On March 6, 1967, Doss telephonically contacted the FBI in Washington, D.C., advising that he was residing in Room 426, Harrington Hotel, Washington, D.C. In a subsequent call on March 6, 1967, Doss indicated that he was leaving Washington, D.C.



Reference is made to Tampa memorandum dated March 17, 1967 and captioned as above.

On June 5, 1967 Mrs. CHRISTINE KEMNITZ, Detroit, Michigan, advised a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that she had received a letter on May 15, 1967 from Dr. MAURIS M. PLATKIN, physician in charge, John Howard Division, St. Elizabeth Hospital, Washington, D. C. According to Mrs. KEMNITZ, Dr. PLATKIN informed her that her, KEMNITZ's, brother, SVEN ERIC DOSS, had been discharged from St. Elizabeth. The letter from Dr. PLATKIN, according to Mrs. KEMNITZ, revealed that DOSS had been released to the custody of authorities for transfer to the District of Columbia Court of General Session for disposition of the charge pending against him. Further, the letter reflected, Mrs. KEMNITZ said, that the charge against DOSS was nolle prossed and that DOSS had been released from the court.

Mrs. KEMNITZ related that she had received a postcard from DOSS, the postcard having been postmarked at Fredericksburg, Virginia, on May 13, 1967. DOSS asked, according to Mrs. KEMNITZ, that the latter send him \$150 to 7330 4th Street North, St. Petersburg, Florida.

On May 31, 1967 Mrs. KEMNITZ pointed out she received a postcard from DOSS dated May 28, 1967, and in this communication, the latter asked the former to send him his Social Security money but no amount was specified. Concluding, Mrs. KEMNITZ said that she planned to send DOSS some of his Social Security money at St. Petersburg by mail on June 5, 1967.

On June 9, 1967 Mr. PHIL WRIGHT, Legal Officer, Veteran's Administration Regional Office (VARO) St. Petersburg Beach, Florida, advised that two days previously DOSS had been in St. Petersburg but that on June 9, 1967 the VARO received a postcard from DOSS in Ocala, Florida and he pointed out in this communication his plans to proceed to New York City in order to play baseball. He did not elaborate further. According to Mr. WRIGHT, on June 9, 1967 VARO received a telephone call from DOSS in Savannah, Georgia and he claimed to be out of funds. He furnished his address as in care of Western Union at Savannah. He requested VARO send him some money.

Mr. WRIGHT informed that previously DOSS had received \$150 from his sister in Detroit. Also, Mr. WRIGHT pointed out, DOSS promised VARO officials, prior to his departure from St. Petersburg, that he would advise them as to his whereabouts.

On June 13, 1967 Mr. WRIGHT informed that SVEN ERIC DOSS had returned to St.Petersburg and that the latter spent the night of June 12 -- June 13, 1967 with Mr. ERNEST O. LIECHLEY of 234 80th Avenue North, St. Petersburg. Mr. WRIGHT did not know the relationship between LIECHLEY and DOSS but pointed out that Mr. LIECHLEY seemed to be a thoughtful and humanitarian older man who was concerned for DOSS' safety. Mr. WRIGHT said that DOSS, during the night he spent with LIECHLEY, exited the latter's home and threw rocks and other objects at neighboring homes. He exhibited no further yiolence than this and was restrained and persuaded by LIECHLEY to go back into the latter's home.

Continuing, Mr. WRIGHT said that on June 13, 1967 he received a telephone call from DOSS who informed that he was then in front of the Sheraton Inn Hotel at 6800 Skyway Boulevard in St. Petersburg. DOSS told WRIGHT, according to the latter, that he was "hitchhiking" to Key West, Florida from where he intended to board a boat to China. He informed Mr. WRIGHT that his funds were exhausted and that it was necessary for him to borrow 10¢ to make a telephone call to WRIGHT.

Mr. WRIGHT told DOSS, according to the former, that he should remain at the Sheraton, then Mr. WRIGHT placed a telephone call to the manager of the Sheraton and requested the latter to afford housing accomodations for DOSS during the evening and the latter agreed. Mr. WRIGHT said that the manager then informed him that he did not see DOSS in front of the hotel but would attempt to locate him if possible. Mr. WRIGHT said that he did not hear further from the manager.

Mr. WRIGHT said that he had a Veteran's Administration (VA) check for DOSS in the amount of \$336.00, payable to DOSS but that he was hesitant to give DOSS the entire amount as the latter merely spends the money without reason. He said for example, prior to his departure from St. Petersburg on the first occasion, DOSS spent almost an entire day wrapping a baseball bat which he ultimately sent to the New York Yankees via airmail. Mr. WRIGHT said that the postage on this item was considerable. He said another example is that one of the postcards he had received from DOSS had \$.66 in postage on the card. He said that this is a habit of DOSS and that he frequently repeats this habit.

In conclusion, Mr. WRIGHT said that the VA has already been responsible for having a petition for guardianship filed concerning DOSS but that the latter does not remain in one place long enough for the VA to taken any further action. He concluded by saying that DOSS seldom, if ever, remains in one place for more than a day or two.

On June 7, June 9 and June 13, 1967, the Secret Service Field Office at Tampa, Florida was notified of pertinent developments concerning DOSS' whereabouts.
